# ION Lowest Annual Parity Figure Since 1937

Prices received by farmers rose 1% in the month ended Dec. 15, but the increase wasn't enough to benefit the 1967 parity ratio. In line with earlier indications, the parity figure hit 74, down from the 1966 ratic of 80 and the lowest yearly average since 1937, when the Agriculture Department began keeping monthly parity statis-

For December alone the parity ratio figure, which is followed closely as a sign of how well farmers are doing in comparison with the rest of the economy, continued at 73, unchanged from a month earlier. A year earlier it stood at 76.

The parity ratio expresses the relationship between farm rev-

enue and farm costs as compared with their relationship during the 1910-14 base period, a particularly good period in American agriculture, when parity was considered to be 100. Theoretically, farmers in December had 73% of the buying power they had in 1910-14.

The "adjusted parity radio," which the department began issuing earlier this year to reflect direct Government payments to farmers, stood at 79 as of mid-December, up from 78 a month earlier. The result was a 12-month average adjusted ratio of 79. However, this would have been the lowest level since 1933 if such an adjusted ratio had been figured that farm back, the department said.

# Quiet Change At State ASCS Post

There was a quiet change in the chairmanship of the state ASCS committee last week.

#### Deere, IHC Profits Down

Both John Deere and International Harvester have reported decreased profits in 1967.

Deere & Co., having just settled a 34-day strike, reports a net income for the year ended October 31 of \$57.6 million, off sales of \$1.08 billion. Gross sales were up 2% but net income was off 20%. Earnings were\$3.90 a share compared to \$5.46 a share in 1966.

IH had a small decline in sales, ending with \$2.58 billion, earning a \$98 million profit, off 15 per cent from 1966. The International profit amounted to \$3.31 a share.

Deere reached a new contract agreement with the United Auto Workers union, in a pact similar to the one negotiated in the automabile industry.

Contracts are up with both International and Allis Chalmers, but both companies have yet to reach agreement with UAW altho there has been no

Deers said it had greater losses overseas than in 1966 but did not detail them. Reportedly a devaluation of currency in Argentina and heavy startup expenses in West Germany were heavy losers for Deere.

Brennan at one time was Breeding's administrative assistant. Egbert was Fifth District Democrat chairman at the time of Breeding's first successful race in 1958.

Eghert gave no reason for quitting the post. "I'm just stepping out and that's it," he said.

Egbert had been state chairman for seven years. He said the biggest change during this period is that the county ASCS committees "are more active in the administration of farm programs" than they were when he first took the post.

Egbert, who farms 3000 acres and has a cattle herd of 125, says he doesn't see how present grain prices can be helped in the year ahead, adding, "I just

hope we can hang onto what farm programs we now have."

Brennan was appointed to the Kansas Wheat Commission after the last session of the legislature revised the Wheat Commission setup to provide for "bi-partisan" operation. He was promptly elected vice chairman of the commission.

"My first thought when approached about the new position, was to see if it met with Gib's approval," Brennan said.

"My second concern was to find out if this appointment would interfere with my position on the Wheat Commission, since I think we have finally got ten it lined out to help the farm-

"I found out that Gib wanted to resign, I presume because of his health, and I also learned that I could stay on the Wheat Commission and hold this job, so I accepted this new chance to be of service," Brennan explain-

Wendell Beecraft will remain on as administrator of the state ASCS offices in Manhattan. Beecraft, veteran agriculture department employee, became administrator under U.S. Agriculture Secretary Ezra Benson.

"I assume that there will be no immediate changes in the Manhattan offices," Brennan

Brennan said he had "no idea" how or why he was picked for the top state post. He said he was first approached about the job in November.



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

# they were exempt from Sherman Anti-Trust Act under the Capper-Volstead Act, which exempts from anti-trust law farm marketing co-ops formed by persons engaged in the produc-

tion of agricultural products. Since Sunkist membership includes some fruit-packing houses, the Supreme Court said Sunkist was not entitled to antitrust immunity. Case-Swayne had argued the Sunkist system was a conspiracy in restraint of trade and thus violated the Sherman Act.

Co-op officials are uncertain of the implications of the decision, but it may mean that co-ops may be vulnerable if their membership is not limited strictly to producers.

#### Milepost In Cholera Control

For the first time since records have been kept, the nation's most important hog state has gone an entire month without an outbreak of hog cholera.

Iowa, with 25 per cent of the country's hogs, went through the month of November without reporting a single confirmed hog cholera outbreak.

Last July, hog cholera was not diagnosed in Illinois — No. 2 state. This was only the second month in over 100 years that hog cholera was not known in that state. Illinois accounts for almost 15 per cent of U.S. pork production. Both states are in Phase III (stamping out phase). Iowa entered this phase this past July and Illinois in July, 1966.

Throughout the entire nation, however, more outbreaks have been reported in 1967 than in 1966. There have been 717 confirmed outbreaks during the first 10 months of 1967.

#### SUMNER AGAIN LEADING STATE WHEAT PRODUCER

Sumner county for the eighth time in 10 years, has been Kansas' leading wheat producer, harvesting 6.48 million bushels in 1967. Reno ranked second and Barton third. McPherson, Thomas, Pratt, Rawlins, Stafford, Rice, and Cheyenne followed in the top 10.

#### Defer Funds For Nebraska Meat Research Center

The Agriculture Department said \$3,450,000 worth of construction of facilities at its big meat animal research center at Clay Center, Nebr., has been deferred under the Johnson administration's move to cut back on federal spending.

Funds were appropriated by Congress lest year for that amount of construction to be contracted for in the current fiscal year ending next June 30.

Officials said a decision has been made to defer entering a contract for these facilities until some time in the fiscal year beginning next July 1.

The total cost of the facilities at the center, located in a for-

mer military land unit, has been set at in excess of 7 million dollars.

So far, less than \$500,000 has been spent, largely on development of plans for the center.

# Another Cut On Passenger Rails

The Union Pacific Railroad has proposed that is discontinue operation of the "Portland Rose" passenger train effective Feb. 19.

The train operates between Kansas City and Portland, Ore. The "City of St. Louis and the Kansas City-Ellis, Kan. local will not be discontinued.

The "Portland Rose was involved in an accident about four weeks ago with a west-bound freight train near Wamego.

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Prices received by Kansas farmers at mid-December were slightly above the previous month but well below last year, according to the Kansas Crop and Livestock Reporting Service.

The all-farm products price index was 219 percent of the 1910-14 base period, compared with 214 percent at mid-November and 244 percent a year ago. Moderate price increases were noted for cows, steers and heifers and eggs while corn, wheat, sorghum grain, calves and milk increased only slightly.

A sharp price decline was noted for chickens while the prices of hogs and lambs were only slightly weaker.

Crop Prices

The crop price index was 159 percent of the 1910-14 base period at mid-December, up 3 points from November but 36 points below last year.

Wheat at \$1.34 per bushel was 3 cents above November but 31 cents below December 1966.

Corn averaged \$1.04 per bush-

el compared with \$1.02 last month and \$1.30 last year.

Oats at 75 cents per bushel were 1 cent above November but 3 cents below a year earlier. Barley averaged 98 cents per bushel compared with 99 cents last month and \$1.04 last year.

Sorghum grain brought \$1.66 per cwt., up from \$1.63 a month earlier but well below \$1.82 per cwt. last year.

Soybeans at \$2.40 per bushel were 1 cent above a month earlied but 34 cents below December 1966.

Livestock Prices

The livestock and livestock products price index at mid-December was 287 compared with 280 in November and 300 a year ago. The meat animal price index was 332 percent of the 1910-14 base period at mid-December compared to 323 last month and 339 last year.

Hogs at \$16.10 per cwt. were 40 cents below November and \$2.60 below December 1966.

Beef cattle brought \$?1.30 per cwt. compared to \$22.50 per cwt.

last month and \$21.20 per cwt. last year.

Steers and heifers at \$22.80 per cwt. were 60 cents above last month but 20 cents below a year earlier. Calves averaged \$25.50 per cwt., up 50 cents from last month and 80 cents above December last year.

The dairy products price index was 314 percent of the 1910-14 base period in December compared with 312 percent last month and 306 percent last

#### **REA Loans To** Two Kansas Co-ops

rederal loans have been approved for two Kansas electric co-ops, at Altamont and Scott City.

The larger loan from the Rural Electrification Administration goes to the Wheatland Electric Cooperative at Scott City which will use \$1.84 million, principally for 93 miles of new line to serve 500 new customers. Wheatland will then have 8476 customers over 2560 miles of line in 13 counties in Kansas and Kiowa County, Colorado.

The loan to Twin Valley Electric Cooperative at Altamont is for \$131,000 to finance eight miles of distribution line to serve 74 new customers.





# Pinch On Custom Slaughter Firms CLAFLIN — Frank Buehler,

CLAFLIN — Frank Buehler, Claffin food merchant and custom slaughterer, Thursday took issue with the new federal law's meat-inspection act, declaring Kansas must pass a state act immediately.

Buehler is president-elect of the Kansas Frozen Food Locker and Provisioners Association.

The federal law which exempts custom slaughtering operations from continuous inspection, but prohibits them from selling any meat for human consumption, "would break every custom slaughterer in Kansas," Buehler said.

The KFFLPA is advocating adoption of a state law at state expense.

"We believe, as the federal government said, that this is a law for all the people — and we believe all the people should pay for it," Buehler said.

"But custom slaughterers in Kansas all sell meat, too. Many of them buy meat from federally inspected plants and sell it to their customers.

"Now, this law would make it impossible for an man to operate a custom-slaughtering business and a meat business together.

"Under the federal law, we would have to have continuous inspection. We couldn't stand that kind of cost.

"We must have a state law that is equal to the federal law, but will allow the custom slaughterers to stay in business. None of us in Kansas are big enough so that we can exist on slaughtering business only without selling any meat, too," he added.

#### 'But We Don't Call This Cold In Ouebec'

When the temperature slipped to zero and below in the G&G area last week, one could get some small comfort from a news item from the Soviet Union.

In parts of Siberia the thermometer slipped to 60 degrees below zero last week, and The Ministry of Trade sadly admitted there was a shortage of gloves. On order were 120 million pairs of gloves, but only 48 million were delivered.

How can we explain all this to timber cutters and schoolboys?" asked the Communist party newspaper Pravda.





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

some 6000 persons are killed by fires and burns in the home. More than 1000 of these are children under five years of age. About one third of the children are alone at the time.

The Council on Family Health suggests some ways of preventing accidents caused by heat and flames in the home.

Never leave little children alone at home, no matter what the urgency.

Never leave small children alone in a room with a heater going, a burning fireplace, or lighted candles. Children are fascinated by flames.

When you have finished ironing, place the hot iron where it can't be touched by little children. Coil the cord nearby, out of reach of little hands.

Clothes of fire resistant materials help provide some protection, but care should be exercised wherever heat is used in the home. Some clothing materials are so highly flammable they can burn to ashes in an instant. Other materials melt and burn into the body.

Heaters should have protective covers and be located where family members can't brush against them. Fireplaces should be screened and the entire family should keep a safe distance from the hearth.

Burning candles should be snuffed out before everyone leaves a room.

Keep cigarette lighters and matches out of reach of youngsters. Many a parent has been surprised to discover a child under five is strong and skillful enough to flick a lighter or

strike a match.

It takes only an instant for a fire to start. The presence of a responsible adult in the home can be the best guard against children playing with fire.

#### New Protection For Children's Teeth

Phosphate compounds are likely to be the next chemical to enter the battle to reduce tooth decay among children, says Dr. Samuel Dreizen, physician-dentist of Houston, Texas.

In tests in which phosphates were added to breakfast cereals or other foods, or used in chewing gum, researchers reported reductions of up to 30 percent in new decay among school-age children, he says.

# How Devaluation Could Help

by Jack Richards **Extension Economist** Kansas State University

England's devaluation of the pound may have little effect on U.S. farm exports and prices in the short run and may actually benefit our farm sector in time.

Our fifth best dollar market for farm exports, England was followed in its devaluation by about 20 other nations on dependencies, mostly with close English trade ties.

England, Bermuda, Guyana, Ireland, Israel, Jamaica and Spain devaluated their currency by 14.3 percent. Ceylon devaluated by 20 percent, New Zealand by 19.5 percent, Denmark by 7.9 percent, and Hong Kong by 5.7 percent.

These 11 nations took a little more than 10 percent of all U.S. exports in 1966, but about 15 percent of our farm exports. They accounted for about 17 percent of dollar sales for U.S. farm exports.

Tobacco was the leading U.S. export to England in 1966. Corn was No. 1 export to all 11 nations, followed by tobacco and sovbeans.

How much will U.S. sales to these countries be reduced by the devaluation? The answer depends on several factors:

- How much prices will increase for foreign buyers.

Response in purchases by foreign consumers due to price increases.

Alternative markets for U.S. farm products.

- Devaluation by our competitors, giving their products more favorable prices in world markets.

Consumers generally do not cut their food purchases drastically due to small increases in price. The same is true for purchases of tobacco and similar commodities.



Farm products from nations that devaluated now cost less than before. However, major agricultural product exporting nations that devaluated now cost less than before. However, major agricultural product exporting nations — Australia, Canada and Argentina — did not devalue their currency.

The final effect on U.S. exports will depend on the ability of other nations to capitalize on this advantage by increasing sales. This may require increased production that may make

their products most costly. Availability of alternative markets may also prevent more than minor price changes.

Farmers may benefit if they use products imported from nations that devaluated. In the short run, however, the net effect of devaluation will be negative.

In the long run, the market for U.S. farm products may improve if devaluation succeeds in stimulating economic growth and demand by these countries.

Success or failure of devaluation to accomplish its purpose of providing the means for fundamental economic adjustment in the economies of these nations will be the important question in the long run for U.S. agriculture.





# USDA Seeks More Poultry Inspection Power

USDA apparently wants to extend its poultry inspection pow-

ers as high as those in the new meat inspection act.

Secretary of Agriculture Orville Freeman said three Democratic members of Congress have agreed to expand poultry inspection laws.

About 87 per cent of all fowl slaughtered are already under

federal inspection laws. About one billion pounds of chicken, turkeys, geese and other fowl, however, are produced in-state plants not under federal inspection. These plants may be subject to state inspection, but 32 states have no poultry inspection.

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

# Denver Likes Its Auction Switch

Officials of the Denver Union Stock Yard Co. say the switch of their terminal market to selling completely by auction 18 months ago is working out quite well altho receipts have not shown dramatic gains.

The switch of the Denver yard fro mprivate treaty selling to auction in July 1966 was a drastic change for a terminal market, altho several of the so-called river markets have turned partly to auction methods in recent years as their receipts have been greatly reduced, and local auction barns took over a larger share of livestock selling.

Besides switching to auction, the Denver market consolidated the various commission firms whch operated there into one corporate commission firm.

Most of the commission men went along with the incorporation, altho one firm moved to the old Armour yards and started operations as a private treaty stockyard. Others continued to office at the exchange building but operate only as country buying and selling organizations. One other firm moved its sale yard to Burlington, Colo.

Altho Denver is considered a terminal market, it has not been a major one. The market sold about 270,000 cattle in 1967, considerably less than the Dodge City, Kans., and Norfolk, Nebr., auction barns move. Interior barns in Kansas like ones at Salina and Emporia move half as many cattle as does Denver, altho they hold only one or two sales per week.

At the time the Denver market made its switch, they opened new physical facilities. There are few accommodations any better. The seating is comfortable for about 500; lighting and acoustics are good. Marketers agree that the system for handling, selling, and paving for cattle is well organized.

A vacuum tube system installed between the auction block of the sale ring, the scales, and the office works so fast that "we can have a man's check ready for him about as quickly as he can leave the sale ring and walk the 60 yards to the office," a company official, Vince Dwyer, says.

#### Revise Theory On Age Of Farm Operators

Farmers average about the same age as self-employed persons in other countries, according to the U.S. Department of Agriculture.

A report by USDA's Economic Research Service compares median ages of farm operators and hired farm workers with their counterparts in the general eco-

It briefly discusses ages and educational attainments of farm operators and their ages by types of farms, with supporting data from the 1960 population census and the 1949, 1954, 1959 and 1964 censuses of agricul-

Contrary to some beliefs, farmers generally are no older than other comparable groups of businessmen and workers.

Although the farm population does differ from others in the economy in the share of older and younger workers - proportions of workers under 25 and over 65 are somewhat higher in farming - the median ages of farm operators and other self-employed workers in the economy are about the same.

The average age of operators of larger farms is somewhat below the national median age of other self-employed workers,

In other words, farmers in more in sales annually - tend to be somewhat younger than their counterparts in nonfarm occupations.

The FDIC alleged funds used by Oltjen in the purchase of the Winfield Livestock Auction were funds of the Cedar Vale Bank that were advanced to "fictitious persons and from their account transferred to the Winfield Livestock Auction ac counts."



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

# **Experts See Little Farm Action From Congress**

The future of many Johnson administration farm-aid programs doubtless will be debated during the 1968 presidential election year, but most farm leaders doubt Congress will act on them before 1969.

Current programs affecting wheat, cotton, corn and other major feed grains, wool, and some provisions of dairy and rice plans are scheduled to expire at the end of 1969 unless extended or revised by Congress.

Undoubtedly, President Johnson and Secretary of Agriculture Orville L. Freeman would like to see Congress enact legislation this year continuing these programs.

But because these programs are highy controversial in Congress as well as among farmers and their leaders, it is considered likely that the lawmakers will want to avoid blowing them into campaign issues.

However, the administration may feel that it would have a better chance getting them through the present Congress than through the new Congress to be elected in 1968. That's because of a possibility the Republicans may gain seats at the expense of Democrats at the elec-

Freeman is expected to make an all-out campaign for Johnson's re-election and for the election of a Democratic-controlled Congress on the basis of the present temporary pro-

#### Set Kansas City Rally For LBJ Farm Programs

Farm groups endorsing Johnson administration farm policies plan a midwest rally at Kansas City, Mo., Feb. 8 to urge greater farm participation in Agriculture Department grain control programs.

The meeting will be hosted by the Missouri Farmers Association. Secretary of Agriculture Orville L. Freeman and other federal officials plan to attend.

Other participants expected include officials of the National Grange, the National Farmers Union and the National Farmers Organization.

These farm groups, like Freeman, say a very high level of farmer participation in this year's wheat and feed grain programs will be essential if growers want any significant improvement in prices and income from these grains.

Under these voluntary programs price supports and government payments are offered those growers who plant within federal allotments for wheat and who hold more land out of production of corn and sorghum this year than last.

Record crops of wheat and corn last year contributed to a sharp decline in grain prices and a lower income to growers.

The department will conduct a signup campaign Feb. 5. March 15 to get growers to take part in the production-reduction programs.

#### Ian. 15 Is Estimate Time For Farmers

Farmers who earned at least two-thirds of their gross income last year from farming should file a declaration of estimated federal income tax on or before Jan. 15.

Harry Schribner, district director of the Internal Revenue Service in Kansas, said Form 1040-ES should be used.

Scribner said the estimate was not necessary if farmers file the 1967 form 1040 and pay in full any tax due by Feb. 15, 1968.

#### Study A 'New' Wheat Mosaic

RUSSELL - A new strain of wheat mosaic may be threatening Russell County wheat.

Claude King, Kansas State University plant pathologist, reporting on streak mosaic found in the 1967 crop, said that it is possible that this is a new severe outbreak, or that perhaps it is a new or unknown virus.

But he didn't expect much trouble with this streak mosaic, because of late planting date last fall.

Streak occurred severely in 1967 in some fields in Ellsworth and Barton Counties, as well as in Russell County. Scout wheat was determined to be the most susceptible of any to the new virus.

It was last spring that King found severe damage in Russell County after he had been called in by Del Jepson, county agricultural extension agent. Scout variety was the most severely affected. Triumph, Bison and Kaw also had some damage.

A few varieties of wheat in the K-State greenhouse were inoculated with the strain found in Russell County last year, and three other strains of streak virus collected in the last year. The Russell strain cut the size of the plants in all varieties to 25 per cent of the other strains.

#### SHOULDER HARNESSES TO COST ABOUT \$25

It's going to cost a car-buyer \$20 to \$70 to cover the expense of front-seat shoulder harnesses which became required by federal law January 1. General Motors said the harnesses, previously optional but now required as standard equipment in new cars, cost \$22 in most models but \$25 in the Buick Electra and Riviera and Oldsmobile 98 and \$30 in the Cadillac. Chrysler said it was adding \$25 on all models and American added \$23.20. Ford was expected to add similar amounts to its new car prices.

#### 'Programs Miss Small Farmer'

CHANUTE - Farm programs are missing major targets in helping small farms, operators in a nine-county area of Southeast Kansas said last week at a Department of Agriculture meeting here.

The farm operators said the greatest problem was the mostprice squeeze. They said attempting to beat the squeeze by increasing production, would lead to overproduction and lower prices.

They also discussed taxes as factors in farm operating costs, and revisions of equitable property taxes to standards of production or earnings, instead of arbitrarily fixed valuations.

Farm programs work to the advantage of the big operator, the speakers said. They said farmers should be limited on the amount of land-crop payments they received. Provisions of some programs conflict with provisions of others. Yet the programs are financed with tax money, which contributes to the tax burden.

The operators said some land

should be kept out of use to prevent overproduction, but this should be done on an operator acreage percentage basis, Farm ers should be free to decide for themselves what they produce, allowing them more flexibility in adjusting to supply and demand, the operators said.

The United States has signed an agreement to sell South Vietnam 132 million pounds of wheat flour this year for what amounts to one-fifth the normal

The Agriculture Department said South Vietnam would pay \$4.8 million for the flour with its own currency, but 80 per cent of the money would be returned to the government as "a grant for common defense."

#### Remove 'Wild Spenders,' Says FU'S Phil Doyle

BELOIT — The National Farmers Union of Kansas has announced it will call a series of meetings to protest tax rates on farm lands and private homes.

Philip Doyle of Beloit, president of the group's Mitchell County chapter and a former Republican state senator, said he will head a drive to "remove the wild and reckless spenders from the legislature."

A Farmers Union spokesman said voting records of legislators will be examined at the meetings, and lawmakers will be invited to defend their ac-

The main objective is the new Kansas property reassessment law which has raised taxes on farmlands, the group official said, and action against incumbent legislators will be on a bipartisan basis.

"Our land and homes are almost being confiscated by exorbitant and senseless taxes," said Doyle. "It's time the people let the legislators know we've had enough."

Doyle said Kansans are "sick and tired of being misrepresented to by members of the legislature who talk economy to the home folks, then vote tax increases to please every pressure group that comes on the scene."

He said state government is "tied to the horse and buggy age," with too much power held by "bureaus and commissions that serve no one and account to no one."

A first-class letter cost three cents from 1917 until 1919, when the price was reduced again to two cents. That's just to remind readers that there was once a

AMES, Iowa — "Someday, the slaughter of young feedlot bulls instead of steers will be commonplace in the United States," said Dr. Roger Hunsley, Iowa State University animal science instructor, at the 49th annual Cattle Feeders Day here this fall.

Dr. Hunsley presented research results from Iowa State experiments involving 314 beef calves over a four-year period to determine the effects of various levels of stilbestrol imrlants and two methods of creep feeding on the pre-weaning performance of bull and steer calves and to determine the effects of age and sex on growth rate, feed efficiency, carcass characteristics, and meat quality of male cattle.

Calves were implanted and started on creep feed treatments at two and one half to three and one half months and weaned at seven to eight months of age. The carryover effects of preweaning treatments on subsequent feedlot performance and carcass quality were studied. Separate groups of bulls and steers were also studied and compared as to rate of gain, feed efficiency and carcass characteristics

Not much difference was found in rate of gain or feed efficiency of bulls and steers up to weaning. Various levels of stilbestrol implantation had little pre-weaning effect.

Creep-fed calves, receiving either free-choice creep or limited creep, gained much faster during the two-week adjustment

period than did non-creep calves. The creep-fed calves also gained much faster during the twoweek adjustment period after weaning.

Creep feeding beef calves proved profitable each year the experiments were conducted. However, limited creep feeding produced a more consistent weight increase than the free choice method, and at about half the cost. This may be because limited creep stimulated appetite and prepared the calves for the feeding troughs, Dr. Hunsley said.

During the post-weaning phase, bulls gained more rapidly in the feedlot than steers, were more efficient in feed conversion and produced leaner, more muscular carcasses. Steers, however, graded higher, had higher marbling scores, more backfat, were slightly higher in tenderness, and returned more total dollars on both a liveweight or chilled carcass basis. The profit advantage in favor of the steers was due to packer price discrimination unfavorable to the bulls.

High stilbestrol implants significantly increased performance and carcass quality of the bulls. Some of the Iowa State test animals were implanted with 96 mg. of the drug (48 mg. pre-weaning and 48 mg. postweaning). When sold on a grade and yield basis, bulls implanted at the 96 mg. stilbestrol level made more profit than either steers, or the low-level stilbestrol implanted bulls. Standard implant level for steers is 12 or

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

More Crop Insurance Coverage

The Federal Crop Insurance Corporation says it is extending its crop coverage in 1968 by including 23 new counties in the grain sorghum program and increasing corn and sorghum guarantees in 36 counties.

In black the map shows the 23 counties which will have grain sorghum coverage for the first time from FCIC. Most of them are in the north central area, but the list also includes seven new counties in the east and southeast.

The diagonal lined counties are ones which will have increased guarantees on corn coverage. There are 18 counties on this list, mostly in the northeast area but also extending down the Missouri border. Guarantees on corn will increase an average of 59% in these counties.

In 36 counties sorghum coverage will also be increased, but most of the guarantee gains are modest, averaging but 5%.

The federal program, which private insurance companies often say competes with them, does cover risks not generally assumed by private companies, insuring up to certain limits the costs of production lost due to drouth, freeze, excessive heat or moisture, flood, insects, disease, or any other natural cause.

FCIC payments in Kansas in 1967 totalled \$5.7 million, most

of it to wheat farmers. There were no major losses in corn, grain sorghum or soybeans in 1967.

Counties where 1967 insured loss payments totaled more

than \$100,000 included Butler, Reno, Marion, Lincoln, Dickinson, Ellis, Finney, Greeley, Harper, Harvey, Kearney, McPherson, Rush, Sedgwick, Stanton, Sumner and Thomas.

Payments in excess of \$50,000 were made in Barton, Cloud, Ford, Grant, Hamilton, Hodgeman, Kingman, Lyon, Mitchell, Ness, Rooks, Russell, Saline, Sherman and Wichita coun'ies.

Counties where payments exceeded \$25,000 were Barber, Clark. Ellsworth, Haskell, Logan, Morris, Osborne, Ottawa, Pawnee, Rice, Sheridan, Smith and Wallace.



#### They'll Study How To Keep Stored Wheat From Cracking

Higher quality grains for export and better grain harvesting and handling equipment are two possible benefits of a study underway at Kansas State University, Manhattan, to learn more about what causes damaged or cracked kernels of wheat.



The specialist can tell you how but only you can plant wheat correctly.

The study is a cooperative effort between KSU and the Agricultural Research Service of the United States Department of Agriculture. ARS agricultural engineer H. H. Converse and Dr. D. S. Chung, a chemical engineer, are studying environmental changes and the physical harvesting and handling procedures which grains undergo.

Although still in the preliminary phases of the investigation, the researchers have reached a couple of conclusions:

Some grain varieties are more susceptible to cracking than others.

Some internal cracking is due to stresses as a result of moisture and temperature gradients within the kernel. The researchers found cracking in some hand-harvested grain never touched by mechanical equipment. They also found internal cracking much worse with some wheat last summer than the previous harvest - apparently because of prolonged wet weather and delayed harvesting conditions.

In tests to measure how much pressure kernels can tolerate before cracking, Converse and Chung have learned that grain moisture content and temperaure, as well as physical properties, are important.

The K-State research was initiated after a foreign government preferred Canadian wheat over U.S. wheat because of quality differences - mostly damaged or cracked kernels. While the KSU researchers have been working primarily with wheat, the same problem exists with exported corn, soybeans and other grains.

Ultimate goal of the K-State research will be to find ways to reduce kernel damage and resulting loss of market qual-




