Collegiate 4-H Club besides being the largest organization on the campus last fall, with a membership of 590, was the largest in the Club's twenty-year history.

During the fall semester, the Club sponsored an all-campus project to give \$150 to the Memorial Chapel Fund and to build an all weather bulletin board on campus.

The fall dinner-dance was held on November 14 at the Methodist Church and the Avalon Ballroom. Highlights of the dinner program were the awarding of the membership cup to Ruby Dickey, Ashland, and a talk by Dan Casement, prominent Kansas livestock man. Each table at the dinner was decorated to represent a different holiday in the year.

The Collegiate Club started in 1927 with a membership of sixty. The goal of this year's membership committee became "60 to 600 in twenty years." The final tally shows 633 active members.

Under the leadership of Lloyd Wiseman, Centralia, a group for students interested in extension work was formed. This program brings members in contact with extension work and workers. Each month, a special meeting was sponsored by the group.

Major event of the spring semester was the semi-formal Tu-lip Ball at the Community House on April 3. Howard Lindholm, Cheney, planned the event at which 110 couples danced as the wheel of the Old Dutch Mill slowly turned.

Armin Samuelson directed organization of a softball team which entered college intramural competition.

Collegiate Club members were prominent in the organization of the Kansas State UNESCO. John Sjo, Salina, spring semester Club president, is chairman of the college UNESCO group in Kansas and vice chairman of the Kansas State College UNESCO. This spring, the Club sent Kate Clark, Mayfield, and Norman Collins, Topeka, to Denver for the regional UNESCO conference. At the start of the fall semester, several Collegiate members were on the committee that made plans for the organization of the UNESCO council. Since that time, the club has taken an active part in UNESCO activities.

The Radio Committee has been under the able leadership of Floyd Ricker of Ford. Each Saturday, the committee presents music, news, 4-H talks, and the doings of the Sunnybrook Club over radio station KSAC for 4-H members over the state.

Final Club event this spring was the annual picnic at Rock Springs 4-H Camp, south of Junction City, on May 1.






325 Club members of Allen County completed a successful club year in 1947.










The new 4-H building for county fairs, banquets, parties, training schools, and meeting has been Clark County's project for the past year.

All events have been centered around the new building. One of the biggest things of the year was the 4-H carnival held to raise money for equipping a kitchen. The big 40 by 90 meeting room was filled to the bursting point with carnival enthusaists, who had come to help the 4-H with its building project.

The quonset is now completed for gatherings of all kinds. A modern kitchen and rest rooms will soon be equipped, making the building usable for all types of events.

Comanche is proud of its champions at the Wichita Fat Stock Show in October. It was the only time in history that one county had a grand champion and also a reserve champion.





Ford County was represented at the American Royal by five 4-H Club members and five Rural Life delegates.





The county came home from the State Fair with 19 blue, 21 red, and 33 white ribbons.


The county one act play group attended Round-Up and Labette County was presented the Kansas Bankers Trophy for having the most outstanding delegation at Round-Up.





Pratt Chamber of Commerce gave the achievement banquet in January. 4-H members returned the compliment with a chicken dinner in the summer.




Rawlins County has a membership of 126 boys and girls. At the present time 7 clubs are organized; 4 of these clubs are new groups.

4-H in Rawlins is on the up-grade.





4-H Club work in Riley County enjoyed one of its most successful years, with the largest enrollment since 4-H was introduced.


Progress was particularly indicated by the number of special achievement parties, given by clubs that had been organized fifteen years or more.

1948 promises to be even a better year with one new club already organized and also with the organization of a Rural Youth group in the county.









Ten members in Scott County had six entries at the State Fair, all of which placed.











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
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
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
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The above picture was drawn by Vaughen Shoemaker of the Chicago Daily News at the time of the 4-H Twenty-fifth Anniversary meeting in that city.

The 4-H movement is growing and its membership is increasing each year. Our ten publications and two radio stations consider it a privilege to boost for the 4-H organization at all times.

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
