Feeder Increase In Midwest

The number of stocker and feeder cattle and calves shipped into the eight north central states during January 1967 was 514,000 head, up six percent from January 1966 according to the U.S. Department of Agriculture.

Of the total, 211,000 head moved through public stockyards. This was an increase of 10 percent from January 1966.

The number received direct in January 1967 was 303,000 head, four percent more than a year earlier. Direct movement during January accounted for 59 percent of the total movement compared with 60 percent a year earlier.

Cattle and calves shipped into the eight states during 1966 totaled 8.1 million head, 11 percent above 1965.

Varied Pace To Grocery Prices

Prices received by farmers increased more in the past two years than did wholesale and retail food prices, but since 1950, prices received by farmers for all commodities have increased only three percent, wholesale prices of all foods increased 19 percent, and retail food prices increased 33 percent.

In 1967, prices received by farmers likely will average slightly lower, but retail food prices probably will be slightly higher than in 1966.

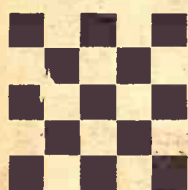
The dollar value of retail food store sales in the fourth quarter of 1966 averaged only one percent above the final quarter of 1965 even though food prices averaged 4.5 percent higher.

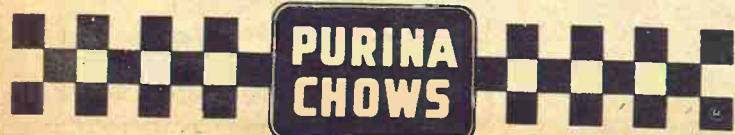

Ellsworth's Dlabal Is FUCMA Board Head

ELLSWORTH — Peter B. Dlabal, Ellsworth, is the new president of the Farmers Union Cooperative Marketing Association. Dlabal manages the Ellsworth cooperative elevator.

Dlabal was elected last week at the conclusion of the association's 2-day annual meeting at Kansas City, Mo.

He succeeds Lud Strnad, Brewster, who was not a candidate for reelection.

Dlabal was born at Wilson in 1915. He left Wilson after graduating from Wichita business college and serving 4½ years in the U.S. Army during World War II.

After the war, Dlabal was Ellsworth county treasurer.

He began working at the Ellsworth Cooperative Farmers Union in 1949.

In 1955, he became general manager of the grain elevator, retail feed, fertilizer and retail oil sales firm.

Dlabal said the Co-op marketing association had grain terminals in Kansas City, Topeka, St. Joseph, Mo., Denver, Colo., and sales offices in Salina.

There are about 450 country grain elevator stations within the association, he said.

The head offices are in Kansas City, Mo., but the association extends through Kansas, Missouri, Iowa, Colorado and Nebraska.

Dlabal said he will continue to manage the Ellsworth cooperative.

"The association is interested in promoting agriculture," Dlabal said.

"Farmers have been getting the short end of the stick for quite some time. Right now, I don't know what immediate steps will be taken by the association, but it may be in the areas of grain export," he said.

A cooperative president is chiefly a presiding member of the board of directors, Dlabal explained.

Other officers elected are M. J. Whiting, Jr., of Whiting, Ia., vice president; Dale Colglazier of Holyoke, Colo., second vice president; George R. Bicknell of Leawood, Kans., secretary and general manager.

Arnold Klingenberg of Hapman, Nebr., and Richard Wieters of Odell, Nebr., were reelected directors for two-year terms.

New directors are Fred Meek of Idana, Kans.; Truman Wes-

ton of Le Roy, Kans.; Ted Anderson of Manhattan, Kans.; Carl Dumler of Russel, Kans., and Jay Hickert of Akron, Colo.

The convention approved a resolution for creation of a national nutrition reserve. Another urged continued study of merging with other grain marketing organizations.

Birth Rate Lowest Since '36

An estimated 3,629,000 babies were born in this country last year, the lowest total since 1950.

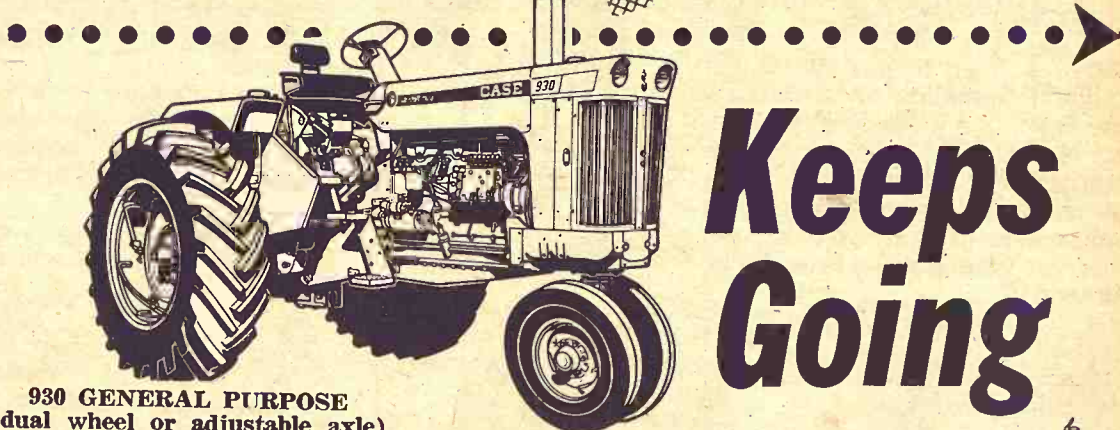
But the excess of births over deaths added about 1.76 million persons to the nation's population.

Births last year were estimated to have been 131,000 below 1965's 3,767,000.

The birth rate was 18.5 births per 1,000 population, continuing the decline from the 1957 peak of 25.3 and the lowest rate since 1936. The rate was 19.4 in 1965.

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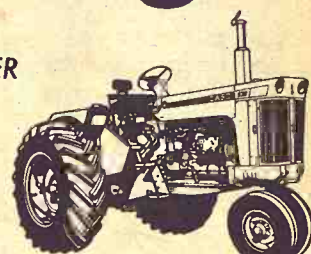


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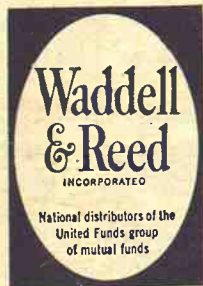
New Job In Farm Bureau

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Rebutt Water Plan Of Two Area Dams

Opponents of two reservoir projects outlined their views last week before the Water Resources Committee of the Kansas House.

The reservoirs are Towanda, on the Whitewater River in Butler County, and Woodbine, on Lyons Creek in Dickinson County.

The House committee is considering a bill which would add the two reservoirs to the state water plan.

Haves B. Beck, president of the Lyons Creek Watershed District in Geary, Dickinson, Morris and Marion Counties, told the committee inclusion of Woodbine Reservoir in the state water plan would serve no purpose but to thwart development of the watershed.

Beck said the watershed has adopted a plan calling for 53 water storage structures, ranging in size from 20 surface acres to 390 surface acres. Storage would range from 218 to 3543 acre-feet.

He said construction would

be permitted when the plan is authorized in Washington.

We are not anti-dam," Beck said. "There is a definite need for large dams in areas where the inhabitants cannot or will not make their own efforts at flood control or the terrain does not lend itself to small impoundments or the land is not worth saving.

"However, we believe none of these conditions is found in the Lyons Creek Watershed District."

Beck said he was speaking for a group of people with great community spirit, trying with best efforts to build a better community.

"Once our conservation goals are accomplished, the area will become like a sponge and slow the rate of run-off to a minimum," Beck said.

Former State Rep. Don Joseph of Whitewater, Kans., was one of the speakers opposing addition of Towanda Reservoir to the state plan.

Joseph said Towanda would make relatively little difference in flood crests downstream at Winfield.

The Corps of Army Engineers has recommended three reservoirs for the Walnut basin: Towanda and ones near El Dorado and Douglass.

"You have two good reservoirs in the plan," said Joseph — "El Dorado and Douglass — and one not so good, Towanda."

Proponents who testified earlier this week said the dams are needed as parts of basin flood control and water conservation programs.

Proponents said adding the reservoirs to the state plan would greatly increase the chance of federal money being appropriated for their construction.

WILL OVERLAY 50 MILES OF KANSAS TURNPIKE

Segments of the Kansas Turnpike totalling 50 miles will be overlaid with new surface in a project beginning April 1. The affected road segments are in the Flint Hills north of Emporia and between Topeka and Kansas City.

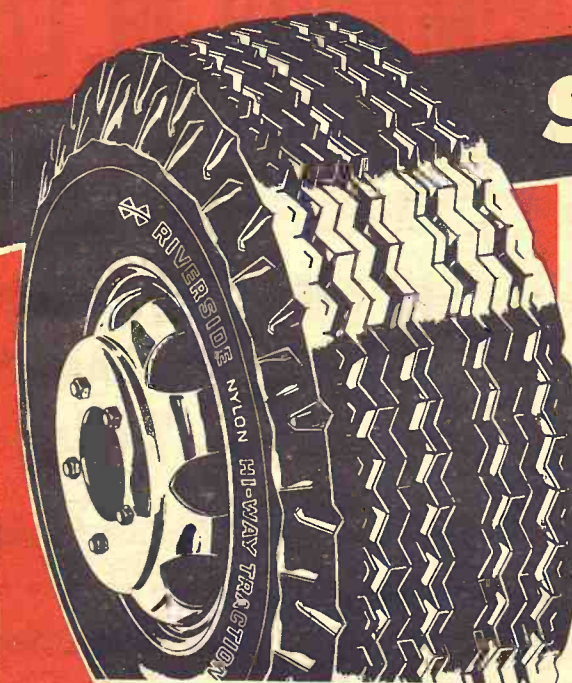

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OUR DAILY BREAD

— by G&G Area Cooks

Mrs. Del Leiszler, Linn, Submits Winning Recipe

Mrs. Del Leiszler, Linn, sends the winning recipe. Mrs. Leiszler writes, "The Easter season is getting near so I thought I would like to share one of my favorite Easter bread recipes with others. I do enjoy the recipes very much that are in the Grass & Grain."

KULICH

(Traditional Russian Easter Bread)

6 to 6½ cups flour
1 cup cream
1 package or cake yeast
¾ cup sugar
½ teaspoon salt
5 large eggs, separated (eggs must be at room temperature)
½ cup soft butter
1 tablespoon vanilla extract or 1 tablespoon grated lemon rind or 2 tablespoons brandy or cognac.

Put 1 cup of flour in a large bowl. Scald the cream and yeast into the flour-cream mixture. Beat ½ cup of sugar, and blend into the flour. Cool just to lukewarm and then stir the salt into the egg yolks. Stir into the yeast mixture. Beat the egg whites until stiff, gradually adding the remaining ¼ cup of sugar. Fold the stiffly beaten eggs (whites) into the yeast-egg yolk mixture. Place the bowl over a pan of hot but not boiling water and let mixture rise until light and full of bubbles. Stir down. Beat the soft butter with the flavoring and add. Add remaining flour gradually, using just enough to make the dough firm enough to be kneaded. Knead the bowl lightly and then place in a buttered bowl. Place the bowl again over hot but not boiling water. Let rise until doubled.

Punch down the dough and place in a 3-pound coffee tin or if you desire you may use two 8x4-inch loaf pans. Cover and let rise again until doubled in size. Bake in a 350-degree oven for about an hour or until done. Turn the coffee tin on the side to cool, then carefully turn out the Kulich. Any whipped butter spread is delicious with this bread. You may reserve enough of the dough to make two small braids and crisscross them on the top of the bread to make a cross. Brush the top of the loaf with a little cream and sprinkle it with sugar before baking. When sliced this sugar crusted piece goes to the guest of honor or to the head of the house.

HAMBURGER CASSEROLE

4 pounds hamburger
4 medium onions, diced
2 green peppers, diced
salt and pepper to taste
Cook until turns color. Add:
4 cans tomato soup
4 cans mushroom soup
Boil and add:
2 12-ounce packages thin noodles

Add:
4 packages frozen peas

Bake for an hour at 350 degrees in oven. This makes a large pan of food. Cut into squares and serve hot.

GREEN MACARONI SALAD

1 cup macaroni salted and cooked in green colored water, drain
½ cup crushed pineapple, drained
3 tart unpeeled red apples
Juice 1 lemon; add pineapple juice to make 1 cup

Put into sauce pan and add ¼ cup sugar and 2 eggs. Cook over hot water until thickened. Cool and pour over fruit mixture. Let stand 24 hours. Just before serving add ½ cup of whipped cream.

Mrs. Mabel G. Kelm, R1, Minneapolis, suggests cutting calories by eliminating the crust on an apple pie.

NO-CRUST APPLE PIE

6 medium-size tart apples, peeled and chopped
½ cup sugar
1 teaspoon cinnamon
½ cup water
3 tablespoons butter or margarine
¼ cup brown sugar
½ cup sifted flour
½ teaspoon baking powder
½ teaspoon salt

Mix apples with sugar, cinnamon, and water in saucepan. Cook about ten minutes or until apples are partially cooked. Turn into 9-inch pie pan. Cream butter gradually. Cream in brown sugar. Sift together flour, baking powder and salt. Add to creamed mixture and mix thoroughly with spoon. Sprinkle mixture over apples. Bake in moderate oven (350 degrees) until apples are tender and top nicely browned, about 45 minutes. Serve with a spoonful of whipped topping. Makes six to eight servings.

SALAD

1 package lime gelatin
1 cup hot water
1½ cups marshmallows put in while gelatin mixture is hot. Stir until dissolved and let cool.
1 9-ounce can crushed pineapple
1 cup small curd cottage cheese
1 package Dream Whip
Add cheese and Dream Whip last. Chill. "Very good and inexpensive."

MINUTE BOIL ICING

2 tablespoons cocoa
7 tablespoons milk

Boil one minute over medium heat, stirring constantly. Cool, add vanilla and beat until thick enough to spread. (On rainy or humid day, boil two minutes.)

TANGY SPARERIBS

4 pounds spareribs, cut in serving pieces
Ingredients for making tangy

sauce:

½ cup soy sauce
¼ cup water
1 cup orange marmalade
½ teaspoon garlic powder (1 clove)
dash of pepper (about ¼ tea spoon)
½ teaspoon ground ginger

Place ribs, meaty side down, in shallow roasting pan. Roast in very hot oven, 450 degrees, for 30 minutes. Remove meat from oven; drain excess fat from ribs. Turn ribs meaty side up. Lower oven temperature to 350 degrees and continue roasting ribs for one hour. Pour the sauce over ribs; roast 30 minutes longer or till tender, basting ribs occasionally with the sauce.

To make the sauce: combine the soy sauce, water, orange marmalade, garlic powder, pepper and ginger — blend thoroughly.

Make 6 servings. Serve with fluffy rice.

New Tax Value Notices Out On Cloud County

CONCORDIA — Cloud county taxpayers found out what evaluators figured their property was worth last week. In the mail they received notices showing new property valuations under a reappraisal program designed to value all county at 30% of its true worth.

New valuation figures indicate that rural property was

figured closer to that 30% criteria than had been town property. The new tax valuation figure for town real estate is \$9.5 million, compared to the old figure of less than \$7 million. Farm real estate's new valuation is \$16 million, compared to the old tax valuation of \$14.5 million.

The total county valuation jumps from \$21.5 million to \$25.7 million. The change reflects new construction as well as the appraisal.

The notices that were sent out of the office of county clerk Betty Powell listed three figures: 100% value, 1966 tax valuation under the old program, and 1967 tax valuation under the new 30% guideline.

Cloud county started on its tax equalization program in 1961. The county was one which decided to use local appraisers rather than a professional organization. The six-year task was done by Glenn Black and Kent Ferman of Concordia and Ward Butler, Glasco.

Among criteria used to value farm land were: type of road on which the property is located, distance from a trading

center, type of land such as pasture, upland cultivated, bottom cultivated, and suitable for irrigation.

Sorting Chicks By Color

When poultrymen buy baby chicks for egg production, they don't want roosters in the henhouse. If they are raising fryers, they don't want hens.

That's where chicken sexers come in, the men who command \$8 an hour to sort baby roosters from infant pullets.

The trouble is, there aren't enough persons who can tell a would-be rooster from a potential hen. Tennessee has a sizable poultry industry — and a West coast poultryman recently asked the Tennessee Employment Security department for help in locating chicken sexers.

He was told that Tennessee poultrymen have been trying to import sexers from Japan — and found that they may not need them.

The department said poultrymen have been advised that plans are being made to use chemicals instead of men to sort the hens from the roosters.

The chemicals would be injected into unhatched eggs. When they hatch, roosters will be one color and their sisters will be birds of a different feather.

He missed few meetings of the groups over the years and has been lauded by inspectors for the neatness of his books at

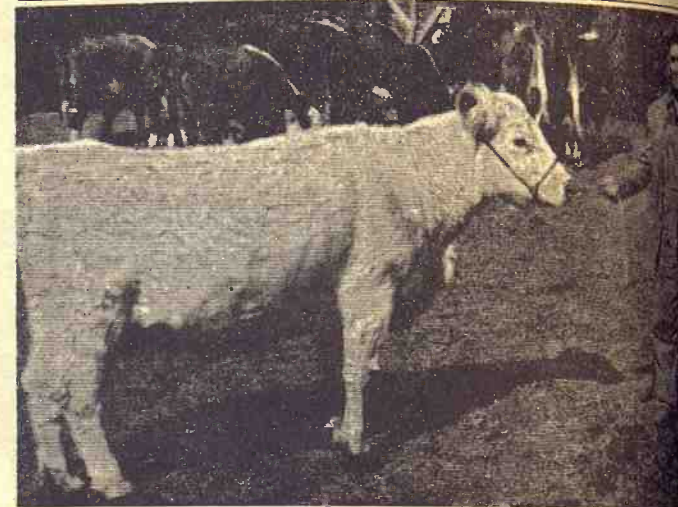
the co-op at Morganville.

More Details On Nemaha Co-op—Pure Milk Merger

More details have been given on the consolidation of the Pure Milk Producers of Kansas City and the Nemaha Cooperative Creamery Association at Sabetha, a merger which was announced in Grass & Grain two weeks ago.

Membership of the Nemaha cooperative and the delegates of Pure Milk have both voted for the consolidation, and further details were noted at the 38th annual meeting of the Pure Milk group at Kansas City last week.

Out of the consolidation will come a new corporation which now has the temporary name of Midcontinent Dairymen Inc.

July 1 is the date for the consolidation to become effective. The offices will be in the present Pure Milk headquarters at Kansas City.

The new corporation will have dairy farmer members in Missouri, Kansas, Nebraska and Iowa.

Pure Milk has 1100 dairy farmer members producing grade A milk. The Nemaha co-op has 150 grade producers and 950 producers of grade B and C milk, which is used for manufacturing purposes.

The co-op has a dairy manufacturing plant in Sabetha. P. D. Turner is manager. The two co-operatives have assets of

about 3 million dollars, Bernard L. McCracken, acting manager of Pure Milk, said.

BASE TEACHERS PAY AT SALINA TO \$5300

Base pay for teachers in the Salina school district will be raised \$200 to \$5300 next year. The increase will add \$140,900 to the district's budget. Most of the increase is attributed not to the base pay increase but changes in the general salary schedule which will give raises of as much as \$500 to some teachers already in the system. The average per teacher increase will be \$398.

COUNCIL GROVE RESERVOIR ALSO DOWN

COUNCIL GROVE — Authorities say there is no chance for a deep dip as occurred at Tuttle Lake, but Council Grove Reservoir has also fallen below conservation level.

Conservation pool level at the Council Grove lake is 1270 and the level there last week was 1266.

Pure Milk acts as a broker, for dairymen supplying the Kansas City Market—the co-op buys the milk from producers and sells it to processors. This it will continue to do.

Under the consolidation, McCracken explained, if more milk is needed by Kansas City processors, it can come from the Nemaha plant, at Sabetha.

On the other hand, when Kansas City has an over-supply of

grade A milk (milk sold in bottles or cartons), it can be directed to the Sabetha manufacturing plant.

The arrangement, he added, will result in more efficient operation, eliminating the "cross movement of milk," that is milk being sent to Kansas City and then shipped on to Sabetha.

"The consolidation also will provide the dairymen greater bargaining power because of a larger membership," he said.

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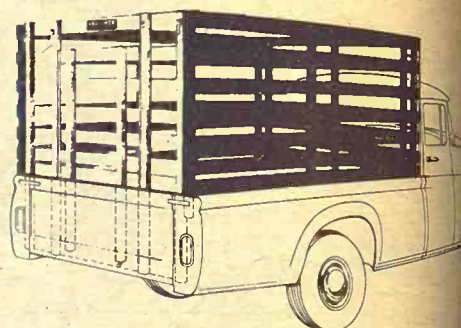

Spring Planning Is Here

The astute farm manager is well into planning his spring work. He should be determining his seed, fertilizer, and chemical requirements and lining up a source of supply. 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Livestock Industry Apparent Winner In Pollution Control

It appears likely now that the livestock industry will police itself in the feedlot pollution controversy.

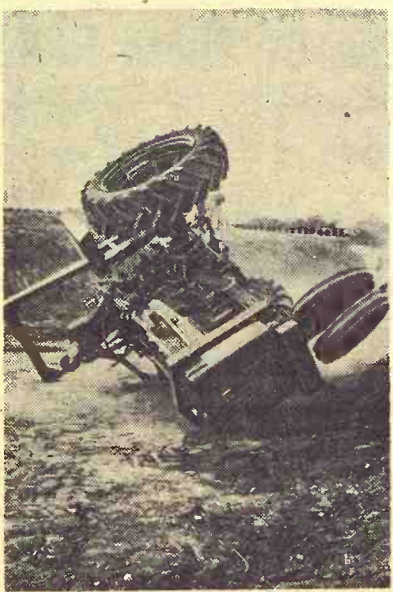
The Senate last week, by a vote of 33-4, approved a bill to give the livestock sanitary commissioner authority to control water pollution from commercial feedlots.

The vote was considered a victory for livestock interests who hoped that the livestock commission would be the controlling body over feedlot pollution, rather than the Department of Health.

The present control lies vaguely with the Department of Health, but threats of possible federal intervention had prompted efforts to write a stronger pollution control law. Much of the controversy has centered around whether it would be the livestock commissioner or the Department of Health which would be charged with the control.

The bill was sponsored by the Senate Livestock Committee, headed by Senator Louise Por-

ter, R-Miller. Her husband, Walter Porter, is chairman of the legislative committee of the Kansas Livestock Association and operates a ranch near Miller, about 30 miles southwest of Topeka in Lyon County.



The livestock sanitary commissioner, A. G. Pickett, also is executive vice president of the Kansas Livestock Association. The post is filled by appointment of the governor from a list of nominees from the executive committee of the livestock association.

Sen. Joe Warren, D-Maple City and vice chairman of the Livestock Committee, said, "I tried to tell the livestock people they are making a mistake, but they wouldn't listen. The Board of Health should decide what is pollution and what isn't."

"I managed to get the committee to agree to an amendment

that provides the commissioner may use Dept. of Health consultants in his investigations. He has no experts under his own office that he could use."

Several senators said they voted for the bill to give the livestock industry a chance to clean its own house.

"If the commissioner doesn't do his job," said Sen. Steadman Ball, R-Atchison, "we'll give authority for pollution control right back to the Dept. of Health next year."

J. Lee Mayes, director of the environmental health services division of the Department of Health, has said he opposes

the bill.

"We've long had the authority to deal with pollution problems in all areas of industry," he said. "We were already planning to strengthen our anti-pollution program to meet federal standards."

Mayes said the environmental services division had not been given an opportunity to oppose the bill at hearings. "We'll have our chance in the House," he said.

The chances appeared likely, however, that the House would go along with the Senate and leave pollution control up to the livestock commission.

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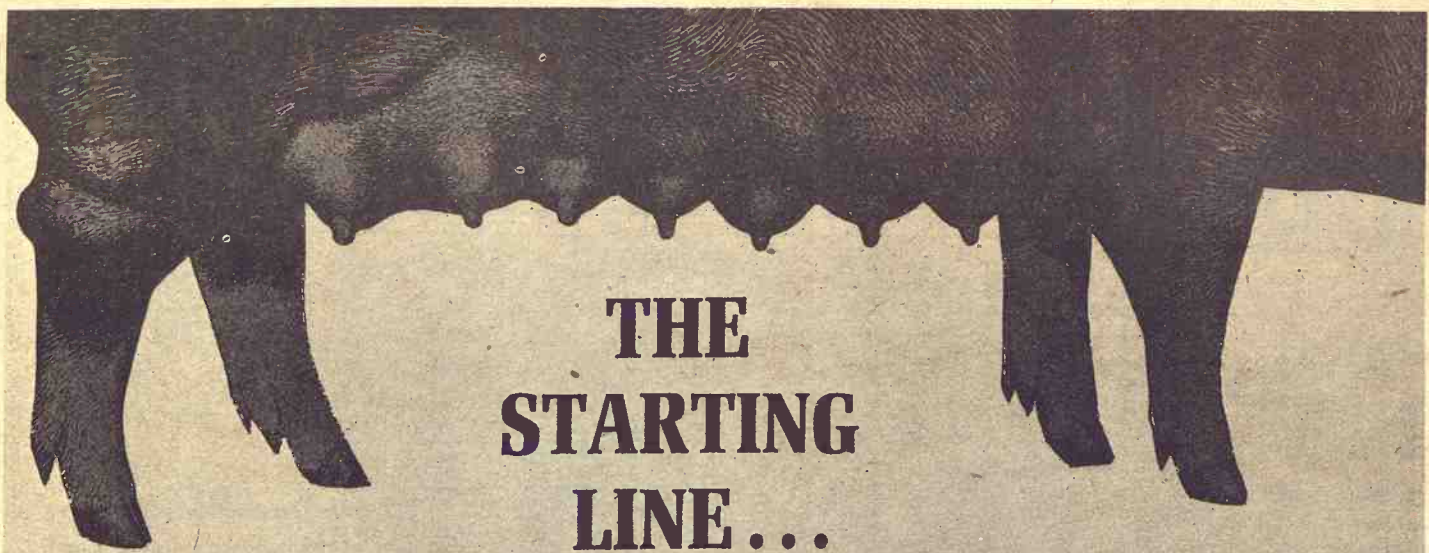

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Irrigators Should Protect Water Rights Privilege

If you operate an irrigation system, you're overlooking an important form of protection if you don't have a water right.

Water that lies beneath or runs along the surface of your land in a stream legally dedicated to the use of the citizens of Kansas, according to the Water Appropriation Act of 1945.

A water right gives you the legal right to use the water for irrigation. Water rights are also granted for municipal, industrial, water power, and recreational uses.

Many farmers have obtained rights to irrigate with water on and beneath their land. But many other farm operators have not secured these rights.



If you are planning to install an irrigation system, one of the first things you should do is apply for a water right. Applications are processed within a few weeks. If water is available, a permit to proceed is granted. But it may take between 2 to 10 years before the right is perfected, says Bob Smhra, chief engineer with the Division of Water Resources, State Board of Agriculture.

After the permit is obtained, the next step is to install the pumping system and begin using the water for the authorized use. The applicant then notifies the chief engineer and submits proof that the system is in operation.

The system will eventually be inspected by a representative from Smhra's office. If the water is being used in accordance with terms of the permit, a certificate of appropriation is

issued to the applicant for a quantity of water which has been put to beneficial use during any calendar year.

This certificate is evidence of your water right. It must be recorded with the register of deeds of the county in which the installation is located.

The State Attorney General enforces the Water Appropriation Act. He is authorized to bring actions in the name of

the state to prohibit unlawful appropriation, diversion, and use of waters of the state.

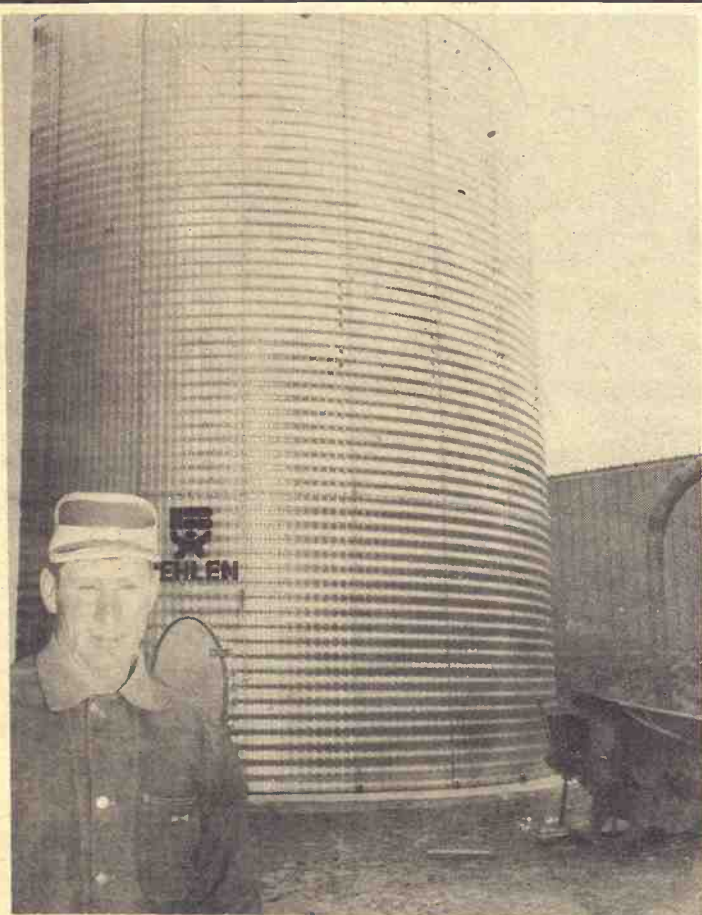

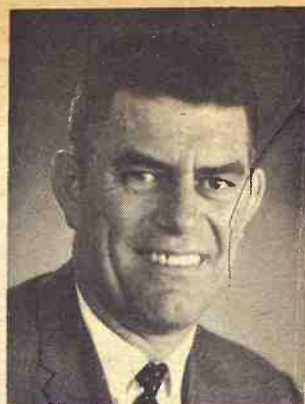

Would You Believe Shell-less Eggs?

Would you believe? Some day fresh eggs may be marketed in manmade "shells."

Only the imagination and

curiosity of the researcher are between us and this becoming a reality, explains M. E. Jackson, Extension poultryman at Kansas State University.

Think of how the egg would look. It could be in a see-through container much like the ones in which jelly is served at restaurants. Just peel off the top and pour out the egg.

An advantage of the man-made container would be the ability to see the product you are buying.

The eggshell manufactured by today's hen has some drawbacks. Jackson points out. It is fragile and will absorb odors.

A plastic container would serve as an air-tight unbreakable housing for the egg. The product in this form would keep fresh for longer periods.

Hens would be "asked" to produce eggs without the natural containers. This would release some of their energy for other purposes, the specialist says.

If the shell were eliminated, the membrane lining could hold the egg until it is sealed in plastic. Problems of management, handling, and additional cost leave unanswered questions at this time.

Will the hen cooperate? "I don't know," Jackson says. "With such a change in the egg laying mechanism of the hen, poultry science experts will need time to work with the problem."

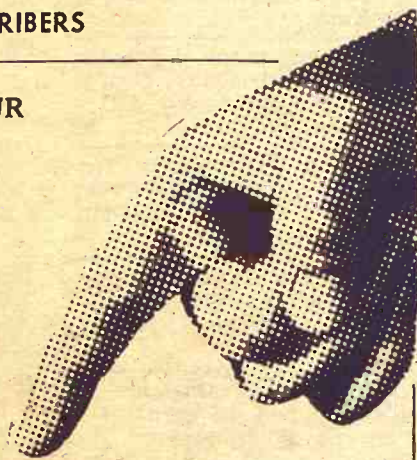

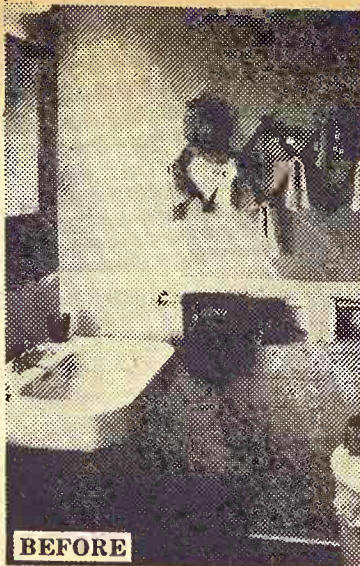

Vinyl Wallpaper Practical For Redecorating Bathroom

It's always time to remodel and the least expensive, most effective way to remodel a bathroom is with wallpaper. Why? Because, you can do it yourself. Many new wallpapers are factory pasted and trimmed, so all you need do is dip in water and hang. (Match and cut a few lengths before wetting.)

Bathrooms, for the most part, are the duller rooms in the house when walls are plain. Yet they do not have to be, for they are easy and inexpensive rooms to decorated.

In a bathroom, use paper that has been plastic coated for washability. Most papers today are treated in this manner. Check the attributes of a paper at the time of purchase. Paper-backed vinyls and fabric-backed vinyls are designed for heavier wear and therefore ideal for baths and kitchens. Because of the strength of these wall coverings, most of them will strip off when you decide to redecorate.

One very important tip in using wallpaper of vinyl papers in baths is to use the recommend-

ed type of paste. When you buy paper, usually the manufacturer will specify the correct type of paste for his product. The use of the right adhesive is of vital importance where there is a great deal of moisture. The wrong kind may permit the formation of mold between the paper and the wall, due to trapped moisture.

Select a wallpaper in colors and pattern that you like. Then match one or two of the colors with towels, bath rug and shower curtain. Bathroom accessories, soaps and lotions can further carry out or accent a color scheme.

Be sure and measure walls and ceilings before buying wallpaper. A single roll will cover 30 square feet of wall space. It's always good, too, to allow extra paper, since you might want to add other decorative touches.

Try something new: Cover bathroom hamper, waste basket and tissue box with the same wallpaper as used on the walls and ceiling. The results can be a beautiful little room.

Removes Tea Stains

Tea stains can be removed from china cups by soaking the cups in one quart of warm water to which about a tablespoon of chlorine bleach has been added.

Wants To Limit SCD Terms

On February 7, I was told at the Senate and House agriculture committees that state law must be amended if an SCS supervisor can succeed himself only a limited number of times. I submitted that a supervisor will always be elected or appointed as long as he cares to serve and as long as this continues no one is willing to be defeated at an annual meeting.

I told of many farm organizations — Farm Bureau, Extension, PCA, co-ops, and even churches — which limit terms of directors.

All of my suggestions are under consideration — and will be for a long time — unless farmers let their beliefs be heard by State Senators and Representatives. Because we haven't acted before, we may have to act with haste now. Our precious soil is basic and supports everything. Everything I have done and said has been to promote soil conservation and not myself and hope my example may stimulate others to more action.

Wage Law May Put On Indirect Farm Load

The new minimum wage legislation which covers agricultural workers for the first time will have little direct impact on Kansas farmers. But it may result in some indirect effects on agriculture in the state.

The legislation provides that farmers covered by the law must pay their labor a minimum hourly wage of \$1.00. The minimum wage jumps to \$1.15 after February 1, 1968 and \$1.30 after February 1, 1969.

The law applies only to those farmers who employ 500 man-days of labor during a quarter of the preceding calendar year. Five hundred man-days is roughly equivalent to hiring about 7 full-time workers, says E. W. Tyrchniewicz, assistant professor of economics at Kansas State University.

He points out that the legislation will apply to only 1½ percent of all farms and ranches and only 12½ percent of all hired farm workers in the country. Few, if any, Kansas farmers will be covered by the law.

Tyrchniewicz believes, however, that farmers in Kansas may feel repercussions from other parts of the country where the law will be more

important. Minimum wages in lead to a shift away from crops the South, for example, may such as cotton and tobacco which require large inputs of labor.

Southern farmers may begin to favor enterprises requiring relatively less labor, such as livestock production. Expansion of livestock industry in the South would mean more competition for producers in established livestock producing states, such as Kansas.

A second indirect effect is that the minimum wage applicable on covered farms will tend to influence the wage on neighboring farms. If the minimum wage is below the going wage, however, this will not be the case.

And finally, now that the precedent of minimum legislation in agriculture has been established, the economist believes efforts to broaden this coverage may be expected in the future.

Quarter Million Dollar Hereford Sale In Montana

A quarter-million-dollar Hereford sale at Livingston, Montana, in late February was one of the biggest livestock sales in the U.S. in recent years. The sale was a dispersion of the Clyde and Mary Sullivan herd, with over 500 cattle in 415 lots selling for \$269,200, an average of \$649.

The high-selling bull went for \$4400 and 16 herd bulls averaged \$2045 each. There were no Kansas buyers but cattle went into most states in the Rocky Mountain area and west.

Two of the auctioneers at the sale were Bob Schnell and Willard Schnell, no relation to the two G&G area auctioneers, Carl Schnell of Abilene and Bill Schnell of Herington.

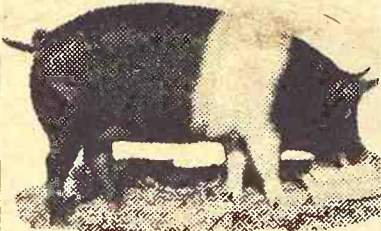

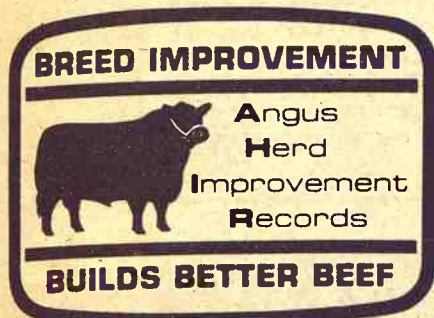

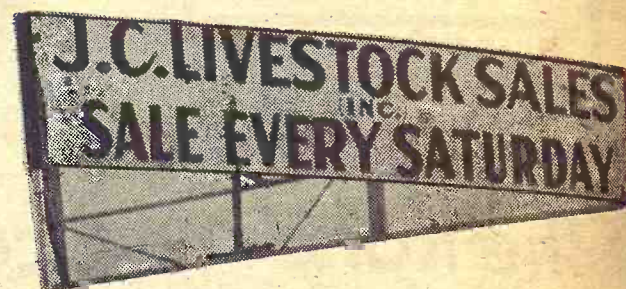

Growers Reject Tobacco Program

Growers apparently rejected a new acreage-poundage production control program for Burley tobacco in a mail referendum.

The Agriculture department, which held the referendum, said the bulk of the returns from 12 of the 15 producing states gave 113,952 votes for and 108,283 votes against the new plan. This was a favorable majority of only 51 per cent, far short of the two thirds ma-

ajority required.

In a similar referendum a year ago, the same plan was defeated by growers.
