

Nothing Chicken About Hot Dog If Beef Is Heard In Washington

has announced plans to open up the hot dog and take a good look at what's inside.

One key issue is whether producers should be allowed in the future to put in as much as 25 per cent chicken meat and still call the product a hot dog.

The Agriculture Department The poultry industry wants the change. The beef cattle industry opposes it.

Another major question is whether the department should go ahead with its own proposal to limit the amount of fat in franks to 30 per cent. There is no legal limit now.

The hearings, expected in December and January, are addressed specifically to the chicken and fat contents of frankfurters and other processed meats classified as "cooked sausage." This also includes bologna, knackwurst, garlic sausage and Vienna sausage, but not salami or pure pork sausage.

The proceedings, however, could uncover a whole market bag of other disputes.

"I'm not so worried about the chicken, although we have to look into that," said Erma Angevine, executive director of the National Consumer Federation of America. "It's some of the other stuff they put in that we ought to examine carefully."

Under existing Agriculture Department regulations, meats can be sold in interstate commerce under the name "hot dogs," "frankfurters" wieners," or "bologna" as long as they consist of beef, pork, mutton, goat meat, fat, and not more than 3.5 per cent cereal or other filler.

But if they include any chicken at all, the title of the product must so indicate. The label must read in big letters — not just in the fine print - "franks and chicken," or "chicken and hot dogs" or some such legend. Meat products labeled in this way have had poor consumer reception.

In June 1966 a Georgia chicken firm applied to the Agriculture Department for a change in the hot dog and bologna labeling rule.

It proposed that such products be allowed to include in their protein content up to 25 per cent

poultry meat without a change in the product name being required. The fact that chicken or turkey was included would be revealed only in the fine print.

The American National Cattlemen's Assn., chief spokesman for beef producers in the west, opposed this as likely to cut down on use of beef.

But the National Broiler Council and spokesmen for the turkey producers who would like more of an all-year-round market backed it strongly.



Park Ground Purchasers Groan Under Increased Costs Of Land

A major experiment to attack escalating land prices — a problem that has seriously eroded federal programs of acquisition of parks and other open space — has been announced by the Ford Foundation. Private and public conservation leaders, including Stewart Udall, secretary of the interior, said the step was of great potential significance.

The foundation announced a guarantee for a 6-million-dollar line of credit to enable the Nature Conservancy, a nonprofit organization to borrow funds for land purchases in at least 20 states. The land to be bought consists of 97 tracts carmarked for federal purchase when Congress appropriates the necessary funds. The Nature Conservancy will hold the tracts until one of three federal agencies (the Forest Service, the National Park Service, or the Bureau of Sport Fisheries and Wildlife) can purchase them at cost:

Commenting on the announcement, Secretary Udall said: "The Nature Conservancy has for years assisted government agencies in land acquisition, and the Ford Foundation's action will enable this highly effective private conservation agency to play a more significant role than over before. We are extremely pleased that the conservancy and the foundation are joining forces in this exciting conservation activity.

Under the terms of the foundation guarantee, the conservancy will establish lines of credit to provide the funds for the land purchases.

"Escalating land cost, the problem this program is designed to help resolve, has been of increasing concerd to both members of Congress and the executive agencies involved in land acquisition." Gordon Harrison, program officer in charge of the foundation's resources and environment effort, said.

Nebraska will have a special session of the legislature in December which presumably will retain the present 21/2% sales tax rather than reduce the tax to 2% on January 1,



Strict View On Car Warranties

In the view of one of the five Federal Trade Commissioners, the FTC should require automakers to provide lifetime warranties for their cars even when they have moved into the used car market.

Commissioner Philip Elman attached the observation to an FTC staff study charging automakers with stressing sales at the expense of proper warranty service and repair operation.

Elman's proposal for lifetime guarantees is in direct opposition to current industry practice. Manufacturers guarantee the cars they sell for only a certain time period or a certain number of miles, but the 1969 models are less generous than the 50,000 mile or five year warranties of recent years.

World Food Conference At K-State Next Week

MANHATTAN - World authorities on population growth, food resources, nutrition and international trade will be featured speakers on the opening day's program for the Senator Frank Carlson Symposium on World Population and Food Supply at Kansas State University, Manhattan, December 34.

The experts are Dr. Milas Macura, director of the United Nations' population division; Dr. Lester R. Brown, administrator of the International Agricultural Development Service of the United States Department of Agriculture; Dr. Ogden C. Johnson, chief of the domestic unit of the nutrition program of the National Center for Chronic Disease Control, Department of Health; Education and Welfare; and Dr. John Schnittker, undersecretary of agriculture.

According to Dr. Eugene Friedmann and Dr. William Hoover, co-chairmen for the symposium, each of the four experts will be presenting position papers to summarize what presently is known in these four areas and to project where present trends may lead.

A "What Do We Know?" evaluation will wind up pthe opening day's program. Participating in the evaluation will be Dr. Glenn Beck, K-State's vice presiident for agriculture; Dr. David Heer, associate professor of demography of the Harvard University School of Public Health; and Friedmann.

Previously announced as keynote speapker for the symposium was Sen. George McGovern, who has just been elected to his second term in the Senate by South Dakota voters.

Each of the major speakers for the opening day's symposium program is recognized as a top man in this area.

McGovern was President John F. Kennedy's first "Food for

Peace" director. Macura is as well informed as anyone in the world on population growth. He addresses the Tuesday luncheon on "Population Projections for the World's Regions: Pitfalls and Limitations."

Johnson, a former associate director of the Council on Foods and Nutrition for the American Medical Association, will discuss "Projected Nutritional Needs: Quality and Quantity,"

Schnittker, a former KSU economics professor who has been on the Washington scene for several years, will speak on "Projected Trends in International Trade in Food Production."

Heer, a sociologist, is author of two recent books on population growth. He is one of the few men who has worked on the relationship between population growth and food supply. He appears on the evaluation panel along with two K-Staters, Beck and Friedmann.

Speakers for the second day's program will be concerned with "action" programs and what they are accomplishing in the areas of population growth and food production.

The Carlson Symposium is being inaugurated this year to honor the senior senator from Kansas who is retiring after long and distinguished service in government.



While the 1968 political campaign was notably lacking in pledges on price supports, the Republican administration can be expected to move for changes and for full-scale assessment of such controversial matters as the wheat certificate program.

"A check on major changes in present programs is provided by the fact that the 90th Congress will still be under Democratic control.

"One area where the new Secretary of Agriculture may move immediately on his own is to effect revisions in U.S. export pricing to restore hard and soft winters to levels in line with competitive offerings by other countries. In this context, he should take a hard look at needed adjustments in the International Grains Agreement." Sosland's comments touched

The wheat certificate program, which provides for millers processing domestic flour to pay 75 cents per bushel as a processing tax, which in turn is sent back to the producers to make prices more nearly at parity level. Therefore, the certificate program has brought a constant fight from milling interests to

U.S. Can't Afford Good-Guy Role In World Trade Harris said that one of the nomic pressure are we

MANHATTAN - An American Farm Bureau Federation official told the Kansas Farm Bureau State-Wide County Presidents Conference here that American farmers cannot afford the "good guy" approach to world trade now being followed by our government.

Herbert Harris, Washington, D. C., legislative counsel for Farm Bureau, criticized U.S. export policies and took particular aim at the International Grains Agreement.

Harris said: "A bushel of wheat grown in Kansas and sold by the farmer for about \$1.10 per bushel may cost a foreign customer as much as \$3.42. It costs the farmer about a nickel to take it to the elevator and another 38 cents to deliver it to a seaport. At that point, our government levies an export tax of 12 cents for the privilege of exporting that wheat.

"It takes another 11 cents to ship the wheat to Rotterdam. So the wheat the Kansas farmer







Farm Bureau Would Give Up **Certificates To Lose Allotments**

The Kansas Farm Bureau adopted a resolution urging president-elect Richard M. Nixon to name someone who has been actively engaged in agriculture as secretary of agriculture to replace Orville Freeman.

The bureau also approved at its 50th annual meeting a resolution calling for less governmental intervention in production and management decisions.

"A majority of county 1arm bureaus is willing now to give up the benefits in wheat certificates and feed grain payments if they had complete assurance that allotments and quotas would be terminated and they could sell the products in an effective market not depressed by governmental activities," the resolution read.

It added that nearly all farmers believe that a major revision of farm policy is inwitable.

"We are convinced that a majority of our members believe that a program of voluntary land retirement for a per-

iod of years, with emphasis on whole farms and provision for

partial farms, is the best government program for a transition period," the resolution said.

The government's food stamp program has been expanded to serve 280,000 more low-income persons in 235 new areas in 31 states, agriculture secretary Orville L. Freeman has announced

The 235 areas designated to begin food stamp operations this fiscal year include 94 counties and independent cities where no food or commodity distribution programs have been operating.

New food stamp areas include Houston; Sacramento, Calif.; Des Moines, and Newark, N.J., Freeman said.

When implemented, the latest expansion will make coupons available to more than three million persons in 43 states and the District of Columbia, he said.

About 2.4 million low-income persons were covered before. Another 3.5 million needy persons will receive federally donated food through the depart ment's commodity distribution program in 1969, Freeman said. Food stamp programs permit low-income families to buy coupons worth more at grocery stores than the actual money spent on the stamps.

Freeman said the new areas designated were requested by state welfare agencies during a recent canvass by the department's consumer and marketing service, which administers the stamp program.

of work on the part of farmers and a Lindsborg construction company is near an end as only the finishing touches remain before one of the largest soil conservation dams in this area is completed.

Constructed on the Melvin Schneider farm about six miles north of here, the dam is intended to keep water from heavy rains from reeling across prime crop land.

The idea for the dam was fostered about a year ago, and work on the dam as a watershed type project has been under way for several months.

Local landowners, Schneider, Harry Kejr of Brookville, Leslie Bloomberg of Marquette and Mrs. Elna Haubold of Denver, Colo., discussed the idea, then asked for the assistance of Jay Payne, Saline County work unit conservationist, and Dick Mc-Chesney, office manager for the Saline County ASCS.

The plan developed a community watershed project that includes the 100 foot dam to back up runoff from about 1800 acres of pasture land.

The purpose of the project is to prevent the flooding of about 400 acres of good cropland downstream from the dam. The landowners provided 30

percent of the anticipated \$22,000 cost of construction with the federal government providing rest under the "special project" category of the ASCS program.

Constructed by the Malm Construction Co., Lindsborg, the structure will be the largest dam yet built for conservation purposes in Saline County.

Urge Tax Paying Under Protest

RUSSELL - Mrs. Elsie Killian, Russell County Clerk, predicted Friday afternoon that schools in the county may suffer financial difficulties because of an expected payment of property taxes under protest.

County Treasurer Frank Hils began mailing out tax statements Thursday and some farmers were already protesting what they considered whopping increases.

One farmer who had 134 acres of land reported his tax went from \$144 to \$222, a 64 per cent increase. He said 85 acres of the land was in pasture, the rest cultivated.

Mrs. Killian said the county now has some tax money paid under protest by oil companies in 1965 which still has not been

distributed.

"I think it will be a problem up here, a serious problem. I think perhaps some of the trees and that tax money cannot be paid to the schools," she said.

Joe M. Bohnen Sr. of Dorrance said there is going to be a "big effort" to get taxpayers to pay their taxes this year under protest

"You never know what kind of cooperation you will get in a situation like this. People talk like they're going to do it (pay under protest) but you just never know," Bohnen said.

The Department of Agriculture can't say how many horses ectric A there are in the United States, ANHATTA but when it comes to planning harns for them the experts are ---rofound.

Horse and mule stitistics were liscontinued in 1960 when the department reported 3,089,000 on the nation's farms. Since then, horses used for pleasure riding have increased dramatically, perhaps more than doubled, estimates indicate. The department has issued se-

veral pamphlets showing basic designs of horse barns. Complete drawings for building barns are available through state university extension services, the department said.

The pamphlets describes a $1\frac{1}{2}$ story barn, complete with hay loft and plenty of work area below, and two one-story barns, one with 17 stalls and another with eight.

The pamphlets acknowledged that horseback riding has become popular and that farmers may be able to "increase their income by establishing recreational facilities" on their property

Some department officials have urged that the statistics on horses be resumed so the economic importance of this type recreation can be determin-

No Favor For Woodbine Dam By Watershed Assn.

Opposition to the proposed Woodbine Reservoir was expressed in a resolution by the Association of Kansas Watersheds.

The resolution, opposing any attempt to add the reservoir to the state water plan will be forwarded to the State Water Resources Board, which recently held a hearing in the possible addition of Woodbine.

The proposed reservoir would be on Lyons Creek south of Junction City, near the town of Woodbine The resolution says inclusion of Woodbine in the state water plan would delay work on a watershed district plan now awaiting approval in Washington.

Peru First, U.S. Sixth In Fish Haul The world's total haul of fish year's 7.1 million.

surpassed 60 million metric tons in 1967 and Peru became the first nation to take more than 10 million tons, the Food and Agriculture Organization reported Monday.

Japan had the second largest haul, Communist China presumably was third, the Soviet Union was fourth and for the second successive year Norway placed fifth ahead of the United States.

The figures were given in FAO's yearbook of fisheries statistics which gave the total eatch for 1967 as 60.5 million metric tons, 5.5 per cent more than the 1966 haul of 57.3 million metric tons.

Peru, already the world's No. 1 fishing nation in terms of volume of catch, hauled in 10.1 million tons of fish. Almost all the Peruvian catch is anchoveta, used for fish meal.

Japan, with a smaller tonnage, had the world's best catch in terms of total value. Japan brought in 7.8 million tons, an increase from the previous

See Way To Cut **Output Cost Of** Liquid Nitrogen

New developments in the chemical fertilizer business were discussed at the annual convention of the Agricultural Nitrogen Institute at Topeka last week.

A trade show being held in connection with the convention brought together more than 100 exhibits, making it the largest event of its kind in the history of the institute. One of the fertilizer companies represented at the convention, Ferguson Industries of Dallas, claimed a new process in fertilizer manufacture, which it said would reduce the cost.

Sam Ferguson, president of the company, said the new process makes it possible to produce liquid fertilizer nutrients at a price competitive with dry fertilizer.

The process, he explained, produced high-analysis ammonium polyphosphate fertilizers using merchant grade 54 per cent phosphoric acid and anhydrous ammonia as feed stock. Both of these materials are widely available. Ferguson said that the new system would reduce the cost of making high-analysis fertilizer by more than 20 per cent,

A large part of the convention program is being devoted to panels on technical and business problems of the fertilizer industry. The commercial exhibits in the auditorium in the main demonstrated transportation equipment and machines for applying fertilizer to farm fields.

TIPTON — First investigation has begun leading toward a possible rural water district surving a large portion of westem Mitchell County. If organized, the district even-

ally might distribute water

from the Glen Elder Reservoir, Lake Waconda.

The communities of Tipton and Hunter probably would be included in the organized district.

A steering committee of Max Greif, Gerald Streit, Robert Corpstein, Clarence Hake and Leon Eck, all of Tipton, has been meeting with Walter J. Campbell, Mankato, supervisor for the Farmers Home Administration for Jewell and Mitchell counties, in preliminary planning.

The committee has been collecting money from prospective district patrons to finance a feasibility study. A consulting engineering firm will be hired to make the study.

If fully organized, the district could serve over 400 patrons on farms and in the Tipton and Hunter communities. Both Tipton and Hunter have had past water supply problems with Hunter facing a serious shortage in recent years.

Campbell said the district eventually might be served by a filtration plant treating water from Lake Waconda.

The district would be financed by a FHA loan repayable thru collection of charges for water.







Soybeans Under Loan Level

Prices of soybeans reached a low around the first of October, then climbed about 5 cents a bushel as the harvest neared completion. Soybean prices received some support from a bulge in meal prices early in October, then a little help from soybean oil.

Even after the small advance, soybean prices were still 20 cents or so below the county price-support loan levels. Any major price advance seems to depend on farmers locking up a large volume of soybeans under the loan program. The prices of soybean futures, however, are not promising. They indicate that soybean dealers, processors, and speculators doubt that farmers will hold enough soybeans to bring a strong price advance.

Soybeans yield well. Reports from many farmers indicate that soybean yields were generally very good, even where the corn crop was disappointing. The 1968 soybean crop seems to be well in excess of the amount that can be used and exported during this marketing year.

In early October, the USDA estimated 1968 soybean production at 1066 million bushels — up from last year's 973 million. (The November estimate was not available when this report was prepared.) Of the estimated 93 million bushel increase in soybean production this year, about two-thirds would come from higher yields per acre and about one-third from more acres.

The carryover of old soybeans was estimated at 167 million bushels, compared with 90 million a year ago. That would make the total supply available for this marketing year — carryover plus new crop — around 1,233 million bushels. The figure a year ago was 1063 million bushels.

The market for our soybeans is not growing as fast as it was a few years ago. Many users of soybeans say that beans have become over-priced, so users are turning to competitive products such as sunflower oil, fish meal, and urea.

Soybean processors in the U.S. crushed 576 million bushels of beans during the marketing year that ended September 1. If the growth rate of the past two years continues this year, processors will use about 595 million bushels. Foreign buyers took 265 million bushels of soybeans last year. If the growth rate of the past two years is extended to next September 1, exports during this marketing year will be around 275 million bushels. Farmers will need about 50 million bushels of soybeans for seed, and another 10 million probably will be fed or lost. Thus, total use and exports of soybeans may be around 930 million bushels. That would leave around 300 million bushels for carryover next September 1.

More than one-third of the expected carryover is already under price support — beans from previous crops. Another 40 million bushels is needed to "keep the pipelines full." That leaves 150 million bushels of new-crop beans that would have to be locked up, in order to bring about any squeeze on the market supply.

Farmers have never placed large amounts of soybeans under loan before, because there have been no large surpluses. Many producers do not use the loan because they have no place to store beans on the farm, and they do not want to pay for commercial storage. Soybean dealers, processors, and speculators are watching closely to see how many soybeans farmers lock up under loans.


Farmland Into Seed Business

Selling Problems In Nitrogen

The nation's nitrogen fertilizer industry, now facing an overcapacity for production, must find new markets and induce farmers to increase usage, John R. Douglas Jr., staff economist of the Tennessee Valley Authority, said at the 18th annual convention of the Agricultural Nitrogen Institute meeting at Kansas City.

"Nitrogen is leading the field in rate of increase in use, as well as the fact that facilities for its production have been expanded at an even more unprecedentedly fast rate," Douglas said.

"The United State fertilizer industry," Douglas said, "un-doubtedly has a tremendous potential for growth. However, it is evident that a large amount of over-capacity for production exists. Future potential for growth may be quite different from the past decade of growth, both by areas and by crops. Less than a decade ago, only a small share of crops, which now use the largest part of total nitrogen, was being fertilized.

"Today a large majority of the crops which use the fertilizer the most are already being fertilized, and they are being fertilized at rates which were unheard of 10 years ago."

Douglas used many charts to show the increased use of nitrogen fertilizers and pointed out that 90 per cent of the increase in its use in the corn belt was in the 1964-67 period.



DENVER - The cattle on feed report for six leading feeder states on Nov. 1 by the U.S. Department of Agriculture was again heartening in all areas since it revealed factors that mean continued stable prices, says the American National Cattlemen's Assn.

In interpreting the figures, the ANCA market development committee said the fact that October marketings were up 10 percent and October placements were down four percent "is an encouraging sign for immediate weeks ahead and for the next several months."

The analysis added that "placements in the Cornbelt are below normal levels for this time of year. The ratio of placements to marketings is more favorable in 1968 than it was in 1967 for October."

Bill Helming, ANCA economist, expressing the findings of

the committee, added that "feedlots throughout the U.S. are are down, cattle are moving in current market."





A temporary shortage of lovemaking roosters and of mature hens is one of the problems complicating efforts to produce a vaccine against the newlyfound Hong Kong strain of influenza.

This was reported by the Pharmaceutical Manufacturers Asso-

ciation, which said millions of fertile eggs of high quality are required to produce the chick embryos on which the virus strain must feed and multiply in the vaccine-production process.

Nevertheless, the PMA said six American pharmaceutical manufacturers are working around the clock to produce vaccine in time for a possible U.S. epidemic - with expectations that substantial quantities will be available for the civilian population sometime after Jan. 1.

"Smaller quantities will be ready earlier, but much of this production is committed to the armed forces," said a PMA announcement.
