It is expected the assistance from the Hereford group will be about \$4000 a year.

The American National is a trade association for the cattle industry. Traditionally it has been involved in such affairs as legislation, taxation and market development as these things affect the cattle industry.

Currently the group is going thru reorganization in which new emphasis is being put on what the cattlemen feel is their problem - marketing.

Orderly marketing, according to Bill House of Cedarvale, a leader in the American National's effort and a former Hereford Association president, is what cattlemen are striving for so that they can produce for effective demand.

They are striving, Dr. W. T. Berry, Jr., explained, to tailor production to demand in such a way that the price on cattle will give a reasonable profit to all segments of the industry, from the cow and calf man to the feeder of the fattened animals. Putting it another way, he said, they seek to adjust the flow of their product to market. Berry soon will be the executive secretary of the American Hereford Association, succeeding Paul Swaffar, who is retiring.

The contribution being made to the American National is to help that organization carry on a marketing program that already is being developed. This association has employed an economist who will be working with cattlemen all over the country to develop information both on supply and demand which will be hopefully far broader that that available from government statistics.

This information will be made available to farmers and cattlemen in all segments of the industry across the nation. The information will serve to guide producers. As an example, if the economic data supplied the producers suggested that cattle herds were being built too large, situation would indicate marketing heifers rather than holding too many for replacements.

There is nothing compulsory in the program - it can't be in a free market.

"Cattlemen are committed to a free market, House said. "But we are determined that it will be free all along the line, not just from our side. That's one reason for this program.

House and Berry said they were hoping other breed associations would take similar steps to finance the American National's market promotion work. Obviously, if the program is effective it would have a tendency to reduce the violent swings, the boom and bust periods, in the cattle business.

An agricultural economist said Mid-West farmers were switching from the production of livestock and livestock products to cash grains.

Roby L. Sloan, an economist for the Federal Reserve bank of Chicago, said the proportion of cash receipts from cash grains marketed in Illinois, Indiana, Iowa, Michigan and Wisconsin increased from 29 percent in 1959 to 35 percent in 1964

Sloan's report appears in the current issue of Business-Conditions, a magazine published by the bank.

He said the shift was most evident in Illinois, Indiana and Iowa, leading states in corn production, which goes handin-hand with livestock production.

Sloan said that in the 5-year period of his report, the proportion of farms deriving at least half their incomes from the sale of corn, soybeans and small grains increased from 38 percent to 48 percent in Illinois.

The increase in Indiana was from 20 percent to 28 percent and in Iowa from 18 percent to 24 percent.

Sloan said the factors which contributed to the shift in production were still present.

He cited the greater possibilities for mechanization of grain farms as one factor. The expanding productivity of grain farm workers compared with dairy workers and meat production

employees also influenced the trend.

Government price supports and income programs also helped boost incomes of grain producers, he said. Payments to crop producers in the five states rose from 85 million dollars before the agricultural act of 1961 to 523 million in 1964.





The transaction was made by valuing Mooney stock at \$15 per share and Alon at \$12.

This would amount to a recovery of 15 cents per dollar invested. However, stock quotations on Mooney last week put value on that stock closer to


investors.

Warren Won't Take Job But Still Sides With Governor

Within a couple of days after Governor Docking named him as the nominee to become the Kansas Livestock Sanitary Commissioner, Ralph Warren backed down from the post.

But, while the Silverdale stockman said he quit because he wanted to avoid embarrassment to his relatives -- Ward Warren, incoming Livestock Association president, and Joe Warren, state senator - he let it be known that he stood with the governor in the controversy with the Livestock Association. "As a cattleman," Warren

said in his letter to the governor, "I think you are absolutely right in your insistence that

you, as governor, should have a choice in the selection of a state official since the governor usually is held responsible for the policies and actions of his employees.

"The leadership of the Kansas Livestock Assn. has denied you a choice in this matter. I think they are wrong, and I think that most cattlemen and members of the association agree with me.

"The livestock industry in Kansas will be better off if you are able to break the grip held by a few men on this state job." Docking also said Warren's

withdrawal would not open the door to possible negotiation on a compromise candidate with the cattlemen.

udy And Census At K-State explained the white-haired doctor, was to determine the number of each species, trapped under a uniform system, their age distribution and their reproductive condition. A secondary study of small mammal parasites also was conducted

during the census, he added. The census, started in the spring of 1948, was actually begun as a secondary study, itself, Gier added with a smile, "In early '48," he explained, "we began a study of the coyote. We soon discovered that the well-being of the coyote depended strongly on the rodent

population and decided to start taking a rodent census in some of the University pastures."

"It wasn't too long before we decided we weren't getting enough information so we started talking with other biologists in the state and found there was considerable interest in taking such a census."

The upshot of this talk was the establishment of 18 stations in the fall of 1950, from Atchison to Garden City and Pittsburg to Norton. Each station was manned by college or high school instructors and students. Six nights each year, three in April and three in November, each station would set 90 small animal traps.

Following each trapping session, the results were carefully identified and recorded, then sent on to Dr. Gier. More than 5,000 mammals were tagged. "We established," he explained, "that coyotes were about as proficient in catching rodents as were our trappers."

From this lengthy study came many results. "First of all, we discovered that the population of all Kansas small mammals is closely related to the weather," continued the doctor. "Their population is hurt by dry summers and long, cold winters. During summers of reasonable moisture and winters of moderate temperatures, they have a high population. We found very little evidence of a built-in cycle. Climatic conditions accounted for at least 80 percent of the population fluctuations."


"We also found that the coyote reproduction is directly related to rodent population, therefore, the weather. The big thing we have here is a longterm study of mammals over a wide spread area and their connection to climatic conditions. This study provides us with more information about our state's mammal life than any other state in the country has available. Already a large number of masters and doctoral dissertations have been done on some phase of the census."

"For me, this has been a fascinating study," concluded Gier. "We set no time limit on it but I'm forced to wind it up now, as I'm getting too involved in the study of cattle reproduction and embryology in general."

Mrs. Francis Moser Of Hollenberg Wins Prize

The weekly prize winner is Mrs. Francis Moser of Hollenberg. Mrs. Moser writes, "Since this is hen-culling season with old hens selling for a "song," I am sending you my favorite egg noodle recipe:"

HOMEMADE NOODLES

Beat until very light:

3 egg yolks 1 whole egg

Beat in:

3 tablespoons cold water

1 teaspoon salt Stir in and work in with hands:

2 cups sifted flour

Divide dough into three parts. Roll out each piece as thin as possible (paper thin) on lightly floured cloth-covered board. Place between 2 towels until dough is partially dry (like chamois skin). Roll up dough as for jelly roll. With a thin sharp knife cut into strips of desired width $(\frac{1}{6})$ " for fine noodles; up to $\frac{1}{2}$ inch for broad noodles.) Shake out the strips and allow to dry before using or storing. Makes 6 cups or 10 oz. ("Occas-

ionally I find that more or less flour must be used, depending upon the size of the eggs.") "Incidentally, I wonder if some of your readers have a good old-fashioned recipe for the genuine Bohemian Kolaches (with detailed instructions). Would surely appreciate one. Thanks!"

Wheatgrowers, Farm Bureau Huddle -But No Specific Details Told

DODGE CITY - A first step toward closer relationships between general farm organizations and farm commodity groups may have been made here last week as directing boards of the Kansas Farm Bureau (KFB) and the Kansas Association of Wheat Growers (KAWG) met to discuss mutual problems.

"The farm bureau can play an important role in agriculture and commodity groups can provide great assistance in pinpointing specific problems," Ray Frisbie, McDonald, Kans., KFB president said.

George Meeker, Garden City, president of KAWG termed the meeting one of "good will and general agreement on most of the topics discussed."

Meeker heads a group composed of about 30,000 wheat producers in Kansas and is vice president of the National Association of Wheat Growers. The Kansas Farm Bureau is composed of some 50,000 to 55,000 voting members, Frisbie said.

The Dodge City meeting, from

Abilene Flour Mill Plan To **Resume Output**

ABILENE - Two G&G area feed companies are unaffected by a reorganization of the Abilene Flour Mills. Naturich Mills and Abilene Alfalfa Mill are separate corporations, tho related to the Abilene Flour Mills, which has resumed production under the jurisdiction of an operating receiver.

The current plan, to be admnistered by Law Brooks of Wichita, formerly of the Fourth National Bank there, is a temporary one. A permanent plan will be filed with Federal District Court at Wichita to allow the company to meet long-term contract committments.

Officers of the company had filed an application for approval of a reorganizational plan before the referee in bankruptcy in the federal court at Wichita.

Set Date For Area Bank Trial which members of the press were excluded, is believed to be the first formal session of boards of directors of general farm and farm commodity groups in Kansas.

About a dozen board members of each group attended.

Frisbie and Meeker said later the entire group discussed corporate farming, export certificates for wheat, strategic grain reserve legislation, soil bank programs, general farm programs and farm products imports.

The meeting was considered both important from the standpoint that it provides a means of communication between two important farm groups and because both groups have state conventions scheduled next month.

Meeker will appear before the resolutions committee of the Kansas Farm Bureau in its annual convention in Wichita next month to discuss part of the meeting here Thursday.

This, too, may be a first in Kansas as a farm commodity group representative appears advocating a specific policy for a general farm organization.

John (Junior) Armstrong, Muscotah, KFB's vice president, said he believed the KFB resolutions committee would view favorably Meeker's ideas for a wheat export certificate plan to advance farm income.

The appearance of Meeker at the KFB sessions was agreed after Meeker told of a plan whereby all wheat produced in

Alter Outflow At Area Lakes

JUNCTION CITY - The flow of water from Milford Dam was reduced last week while the outflow at nearby Tuttle Creek was raised.

The change is to get Tuttle Creek's level, now five feet above conservation level, down for the inspection of outlet facilities Nov. 7.

Milford's outflow was cut from 1500 cubic feet per second to 500 cfs but it will return to

the higher rate this week. Milford is 4.4 feet above conservation level.

the United States could be rated at parity price.

Under current farm legislation only domestically consumed wheat is eligible for parity prices for the farmer. This parity is supported through a 75cent bushel tax on processing wheat, plus a federal subsidy bringing total price equal to parity.

Meeker described a plan whereby the entire crop, planted under the allotment system, would be priced at parity for the producer. The federal government would pay enough subsidy to exporters to guarantee U.S. wheat would be competitively priced in the international market, and the remainder of the parity price would be paid farmers in the form of export certificates.

(This system would for instance, if the world price is \$1.30 a bushel and the required subsidy to exporters is 30 cents a bushel — then the wheat farmer-would receive a \$1-a-bushel export certificate.)

The amount of the export certificate would vary with the need for subsidizing exporters, Meeker said.

KFB board members agreed this sounded like a good plan.

"All farmers are interested in seeing their income get better, not just farm bureau members," Frisbie said.

Leaders said the two groups also found themselves in general agreement on the subject of corporation farming.

"We believe that incorporation in individual cases for individual farmers may be advantageous," Meeker said. "However, there is fear that the current proposals before the Kansas House may prove to be a threat to current law allowing family corporations."

Frisbie pointed out that they believed generally "that we cannot cure all our ills through legislation."

Only formal cooperation to date among Kansas farm organizations had been the committee for farm organizations, which joined in hiring a legis. lative representative to the Kansas Legislature during the 1965 session and the occasional sponsoring of specific farm laws

Perhaps significantly this bit of intelligence did not come directly from Sears, but it seemed to shake the Chamber committee members up.

Can the law be passed? The Chamber committee concludes that there is sentiment for a Sunday closing in Kansas and perhaps the legislature will agree with this sentiment. The problems of writing a Sunday closing law that is constitution-

ally acceptable appear to many so large that time spent on such a subject is a waste of the legislature's time.

More Marijuana Again Found In Area Barn

SALINA - Saline County sheriff's officers and Salina police raided an abandoned barn near here last week and confiscated marijuana worth more than \$16,000.

Two men were held in the case, their identities undisclosed pending filing of charges.

Sheriff James Martin said the raiders found two duffel bags of marijuana spread on the floor of the vacant barn for drying. The substance will be analyzed by the Kansas Bureau of Investigation laboratory. A 25-year-old man in the barn was arrested. A 30-year-old man already was in city jail after being arrested by the highway pa-

trol. The sheriff said authorities learned of the hoard when two men tried to make contacts in Salina for sale of the drug.

Three G&G area bank employes pleaded innocent last week in U.S. District Court in Wichita to charges of violating federal bank laws.

Kenneth M. Chase, 23, Talmage, and Charles S. Montgomery, 26, Junction City, both former officials of the Talmage State Bank, pleaded not guilty to grand jury indictments of making false bookkeeping entries and embezzling bank funds.

The men are charged with making false entries in bank books crediting deposits ranging as high as \$5000 to other banks. They also are charged with embezzling amounts of up to \$5000 from the Talmage bank.



Dole: 'Consumer Coddled At Farmer's Expense'

HOLTON - The Johnson Administration is coddling consumers at the expense of American farmers, Rep. Bob Dole told the Jackson County Farm Bureau here last week.

Dole said production expenses for Kansas farmers increased \$117 million from 1965 to 1966. advancing from \$1.118 billion to \$1.235 billion.

In turn, he noted, actual figures and projections indicate net farm income this year will be about \$60 million below last year.

Dole outlined seven recommendations to improve farm income, which could, he said, "be implemented without additional legislative authorty."

These include cutting unnecessary federal expenditures; providing advanced payments of up to 50 per cent to cooperators in the wheat program; increasing Public Law 480 shipments, and prohibiting the secretary of agrculture from selling commodity credit stocks of wheat and feed grains at less than 100 per cent of parity.

RED CLOVER SEED CROP BELOW NORMAL

The 1967 red clover seed crop in Kansas was the smallest since 1957, being 18% less than lats year and only about onethird the 1961-65 average. Total production is forecast at 675,000 pounds. Yield averaged 75 pounds per acre, but acreage was down to 9000 acres.



10,000 Years, **Still Germinate**

Canadian botanists have grown normal, healthy plants from seeds believed to have lain dormant at least 10,000 years in Canada's frozen Arctic wastes. They are thought to be the

oldest living organisms on earth, three times as old as the giant sequoias in California, said Dr. A. E. Porsild, a botanist at the National Museum of Canada and leader of the project.

The previous record for seed longevity was 2000 years, held by three dormant sacred lotus seeds found buried in a canoe in a peat bog near Tokyo in 1951.

The sprouted seeds are Arctic lupines, commonly found today throughout Alaska and Arctic Canada. They are similar to the Russell lupine, a garden plant sometimes grown in moderate climates for its spikes of colorful flowers.

The seeds, about the size of rice kernels, were unearthed in 1954 by a mining engineer in Canada's Yukon territory.

Farmers are storing more grain under government price support loans this year than a year earlier. This increased resort to such loans has come at a time when grain prices have declined rather sharply under influence of this year's record production.

The Agriculture Department reported Tuesday that 139 million bushels of wheat from this year's crop had been placed under support loans through Sept. 30 compared with 76 million a year earlier.

The quantities of other 1967 crops stored under support loans to Oct. 1 compared to a year earlier, respectively, included: barley, 15,867,000 bushels this year and 7,227,000 last year; corn, 404,919 and 135,519; oats, 857,558 and 1,139,000; rice, 3,348,000 hundredweight and 1,355,000, and sorghum grain, 295,000 and 582,000 hundredweight.

Kansas, the major producing state, led with 34 million bushels of 1967 crop wheat under loan.

Poor Crops Dent Wheat Histories In Western Kansas

Wheat farmers in 16 western Kansas counties received a shock this week as average yield regulations for Kansas wheat under the 1968 acreage allotment program were published.

A declining average per acre yield in the counties will mean a decline in the amount of certificates for which farmers will be paid for the 1968 wheat crop in some areas of the state.

Wendell Becraft, state Agriculture Stabilization Conservation Service (ASCS) director, Manhattan, said the state ASCS had used all of a .2 of a bushel per acre leeway allowed for Kansas in the 16-county area in an effort to soften the blow.

The new regulations may cost a typical farmer \$2 to \$6 per acre.

Counties whose average yield the past five years has declined thus causing a cut in the certificates in western Kansas are Greeley, Sherman, Thoma,s Wallace, Logan, Gove, Trego, Ellis, Wichita, Lane, Ness, Hamilton, Hodgeman, Ford, Morton and Comanche.

For the entire state in 1968, the average yield per acre will be cut by .8 of a bushel, a U.S. official said.

A Washington, D.C., administrative official said the new ruling follows by a year a duplicate regulation applied to cotton growers in the 1967 crop year.

In prior years, historical yield averages could be adjusted to not ness than 95 per cent of the past five-year average, with a 5 per cent adjustment factor, applied so that the farmer got the benefit of the percentage plus the adjustment. Under the 1968 regulation, the Washington official said, each state is given a base on historical averages, plus a .2 of a bushel factor to apply in areas where extreme weather conditions prevailed.



For the past five months, Frontier Grain Co. has been



experimenting with the food, sively for hogs and adding cotusing the cooked grain exclutonseed hulls for roughage in the cattle rations.

In addition, nutrients are included in the mixer operation of the feed plant. The portions of these supplements are changed for both cattle and hogs according to weight progress of the animals being fed.

The wheat is being cooked in a plant leased from Process Engineering co., at Red Rock. Feed lots have been set up by Frontier at the Olsen Feed Lot, Newkirk, Okla., the Russell Evans farm near Red Rock, and the Robert Sullins farm east of Ponca City, Okla.

Conveyors from storage bins at the Red Rock plant feed the oven where the grain is preheated to 90 degrees. This opens grain pores. The grain then is rotated around a steam boiler in the core of the cooker. The continuous operation through the cooker requires 20 minutes.

Breaking through the starches of the wheat grain to make it more digestible is a uniform amount of steam, seeping into the pores of the wheat. The grain comes from the oven ready to be carried on conveyors to a flaking machine. The rolled wheat then goes to a mixer where it is enriched with vitamins and then is ready for consumption.

Although the new method of feed preparation has not yet been scientifically measured, according to Stan Meek, owner of Frontier Grain, all evidence points to an operation that will take several days off the normal cycle required to bring hogs to top weight and subsequently produce a higher grade of meat.

Gene Ellis, Ponca City, president and owner of Process Engineering Co., said the controlled cooker at the Red Rock processing plant is the only one of its kind in operation although two are being installed at Wayne, Nebr., and Rocky Ford, Colo.

Agriculture departments at a number of universities are showing considerable interest in controlled cooking of grains, Ellis said. He said Process En gineering has built an oven for installation at Oklahoma State University this fall.

Meek said wheat is being used for the feeding program now

He said hogs fed on cooked grain have averaged a pound of gain to 2.9 pounds of feed, while hogs on regular feed required 3.31 pounds of feed to gain a pound.



In Frontier Grain's experiments, Ellis said, some hogs switched from raw to cooked grain made the change readily, but hogs going from cooked to raw grain were definitely off their feed for about three days.



administration for constructing 109 floodwater retarding dams in the watershed, and cost of 16 miles of channel improvement. The watershed encompasses

179,000 acres in the drainage area of the Black Vermillion river, North Fork and Irish Creek in Marshall, Nemaha and Pottawatomie counties.

The project will cost \$101/2 million in federal funds, plus a half million for land treatment and slightly less than one-half million for land and land rights.

Sites have been contributed on 33 dam locations and a part of 13 more. Surveying and core drilling has been in progress on 26 sites for some time.

Two project agreements for land treatment have been approved and work is being done on clearing and shaping of eight waterways, on a cost-share basis with the landowners contributing 30 per cent of the cost. This land treatment phase of the watershed plan is unique to the Upper Black Vermillion watershed, it being the only one in Kansas to have this feature.

As the board of directors recognized that land treatment would be necessary to protect floodwater structures from excessive siltation it was included in the general plan.

A 10-year construction period is planned. When completed the watershed will have about 85 percent protection from flooding. Sixty percent of the area will be above the dams. These improvements will regulate the flow of water downstream and also serve to stabilize gullies above their location, soil conservationists said.

Troop Return To Ft. Riley May Hit A Snag

Hopes for a major troop addftion at Fort Riley may have hit a snag.

The Army Times, an unofficial weekly newspaper, said last week that the 35,000-man cut in American troops in Europe may be cancelled.

Previously it had been assumed, without official confirmation, that the 24th Infantry Division in Germany would come to Fort Riley early in 1968.

The Army Times said military planners in Europe are trying to discourage Washington from making a major troop withdrawal in Europe.

If there were a cutback, as previously supposed, there would still be 220,000 U.S.
