

# Marketing Promotion Gets A Hereford Boost

The American National Cattlemen's Association, seeking to promote a more orderly marketing of cattle, has gotten a financial boost from the American Hereford Association. The Hereford association is paying one cent for every Hereford registered to the Cattlemen's Association to aid the latter's campaign.

It is expected the assistance from the Hereford group will be about \$4000 a year.

The American National is a trade association for the cattle industry. Traditionally it has been involved in such affairs as legislation, taxation and market development as these things affect the cattle industry.

Currently the group is going thru reorganization in which new emphasis is being put on what the cattlemen feel is their problem — marketing.

Orderly marketing, according to Bill House of Cedarvale, a leader in the American National's effort and a former Hereford Association president, is what cattlemen are striving for so that they can produce for effective demand.

They are striving, Dr. W. T. Berry, Jr., explained, to tailor production to demand in such a way that the price on cattle will give a reasonable profit to all segments of the industry, from the cow and calf man to the feeder of the fattened animals. Putting it another way, he said, they seek to adjust the flow of their product to market. Berry soon will be the executive secretary of the Ameri-

can Hereford Association, succeeding Paul Swaffar, who is retiring.

The contribution being made to the American National is to help that organization carry on a marketing program that already is being developed. This association has employed an economist who will be working with cattlemen all over the country to develop information both on supply and demand which will be hopefully far broader than that available from government statistics.

This information will be made available to farmers and cattlemen in all segments of the industry across the nation. The information will serve to guide producers. As an example, if the economic data supplied the producers suggested that cattle herds were being built too large, situation would indicate marketing heifers rather than holding too many for replacements.

There is nothing compulsory in the program — it can't be in a free market.

"Cattlemen are committed to a free market, House said. "But we are determined that it will be free all along the line, not just from our side. That's one reason for this program.

House and Berry said they were hoping other breed associations would take similar steps to finance the American National's market promotion work. Obviously, if the program is effective it would have a tendency to reduce the violent swings, the boom and bust periods, in the cattle business.

## See Great Lakes Area Shift From Livestock

An agricultural economist said Mid-West farmers were switching from the production of livestock and livestock products to cash grains.

Roby L. Sloan, an economist for the Federal Reserve bank of Chicago, said the proportion of cash receipts from cash grains marketed in Illinois, Indiana, Iowa, Michigan and Wisconsin increased from 29 percent in 1959 to 35 percent in 1964.

Sloan's report appears in the current issue of Business-Conditions, a magazine published by the bank.

He said the shift was most evident in Illinois, Indiana and Iowa, leading states in corn production, which goes hand-

in-hand with livestock production.

Sloan said that in the 5-year period of his report, the proportion of farms deriving at least half their incomes from the sale of corn, soybeans and small grains increased from 38 percent to 48 percent in Illinois.

The increase in Indiana was from 20 percent to 28 percent and in Iowa from 18 percent to 24 percent.

Sloan said the factors which contributed to the shift in production were still present.

He cited the greater possibilities for mechanization of grain farms as one factor. The expanding productivity of grain farm workers compared with dairy workers and meat production

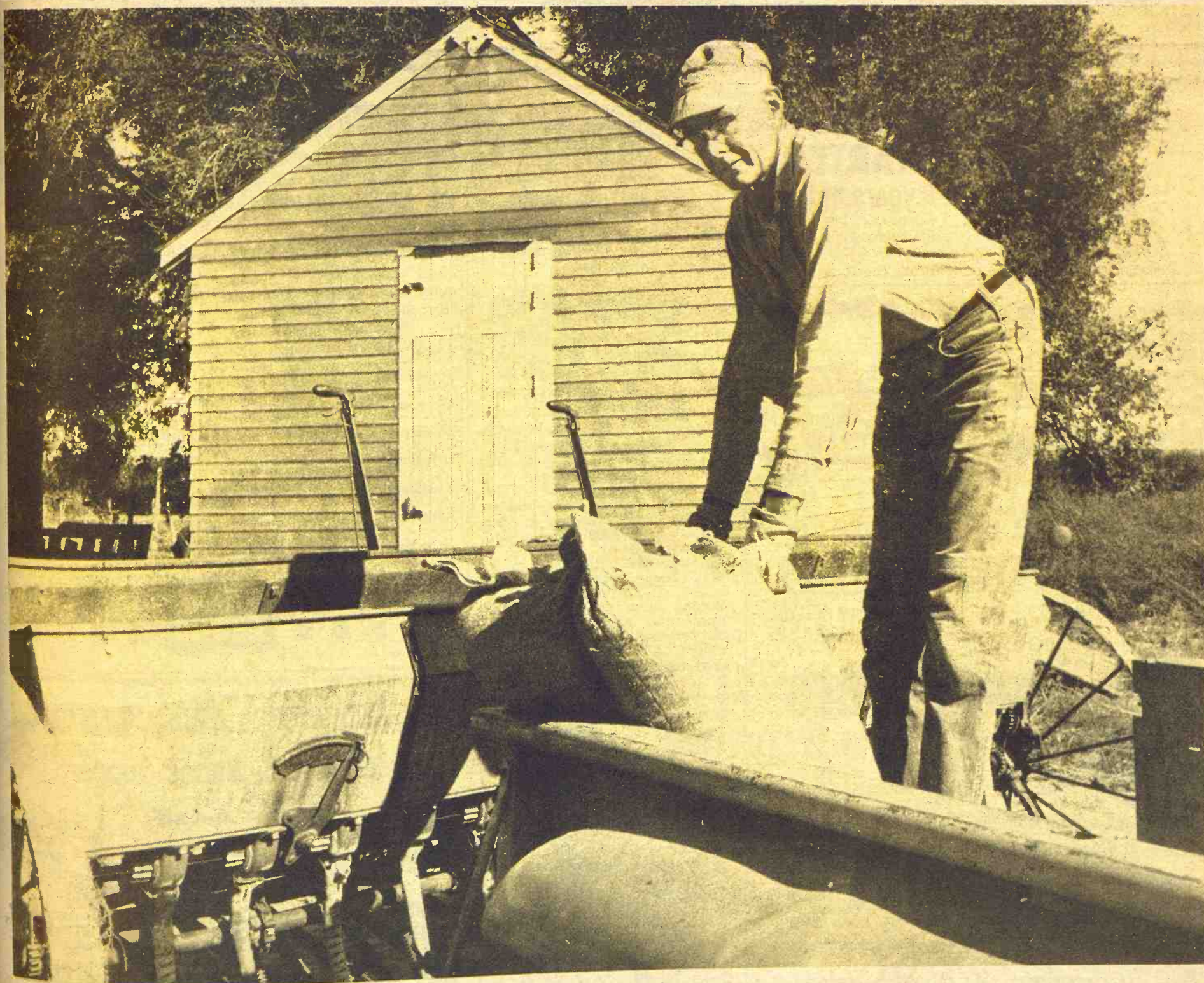
employees also influenced the trend.

Government price supports and income programs also helped boost incomes of grain producers, he said. Payments to crop producers in the five states rose from 85 million dollars before the agricultural act of 1961 to 523 million in 1964.

## Aircraft Venture At McPherson A Loser

McPherson appears to be about to lose its aircraft plant, and investors in the Alon Inc. plant have a stock loss they can itemize on their income tax returns.

Alon, manufacturer of the Aircoupe, has merged with Mooney Aircraft Inc. of Kerrville, Texas, with a stock transfer of 100 shares of Alon for one share of Mooney.

The transaction was made by valuing Mooney stock at \$15 per share and Alon at \$12.

This would amount to a recovery of 15 cents per dollar invested. However, stock quotations on Mooney last week put value on that stock closer to \$10 a share, which would indicate a 5-cent recovery for Alon.

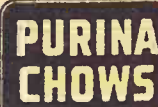

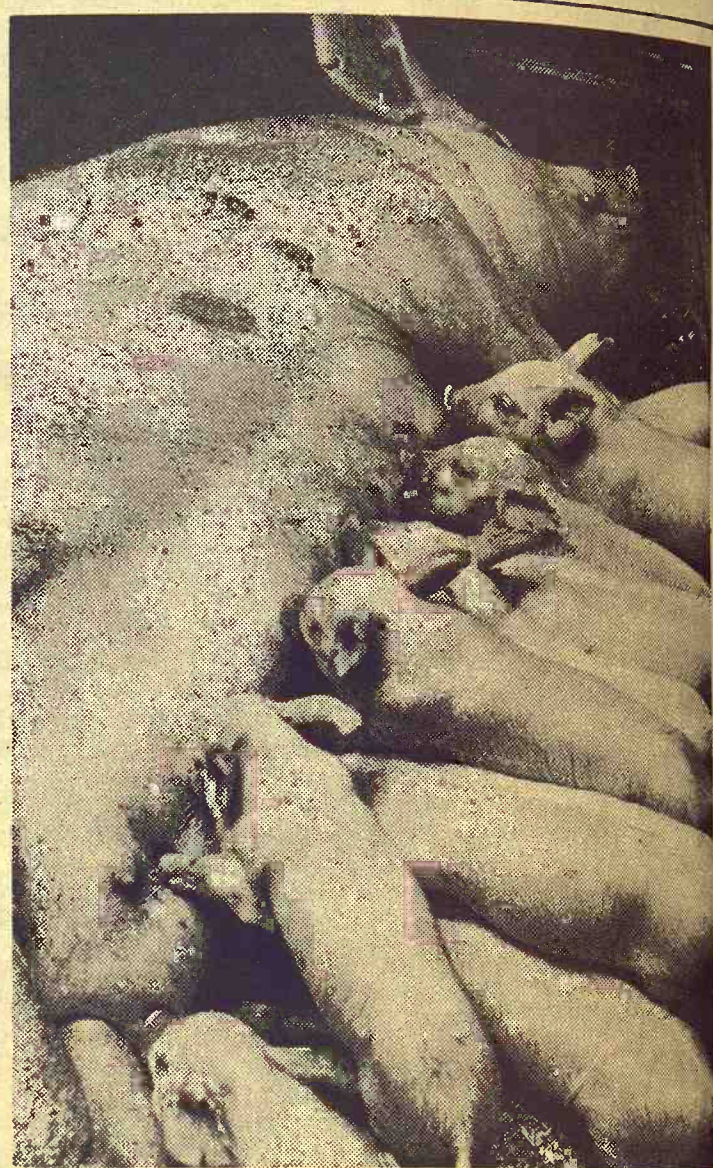

## New Wheat A Replacement For Ottawa

A new wheat variety like Ottawa but highly superior in bread-baking qualities will be available to Kansas farmers after harvest next year.

Called Shawnee, the new variety is particularly outstanding in dough mixing time, a weak character of Ottawa. Shawnee also has yielded as well or better than Ottawa in four-year comparisons at many Kansas locations.

The new variety was developed by the Kansas Agricultural Experiment Station and the U. S. Department of Agriculture. It is expected to replace Ottawa throughout Kansas as seed becomes available.

The Experiment Station plans to remove Ottawa from the list of varieties recommended in Kansas in 1970, Dr. Floyd W. Smith, director, said. Its resistance to soil-borne mosaic has kept it on the recommended list for such areas in eastern Kansas, despite its mediocre baking quality, Smith said.

Shawnee has the best combi-

nation of quality, straw strength and resistance to soil-borne mosaic and Hessian fly of all

wheat varieties available to Kansas growers, Smith said. However, it is susceptible to

wheat-streak mosaic, stinking smut, loose smut and some rust races.

When Ottawa was developed (to resist soil-borne mosaic and Hessian fly), 14 brown-chaffed lines were bulked to produce the variety that was distributed to Kansas certified growers in 1960. Shawnee has been developed from one of the 41 lines bulked for Ottawa. During testing, it was designated Ottawa Selection KS60770. It is like Ottawa except that it has superior bread-making qualities and often is about one inch tal-

ler and matures about one day later than Ottawa.

Kansas certified growers had about 1400 bushels of Shawnee to plant this fall.

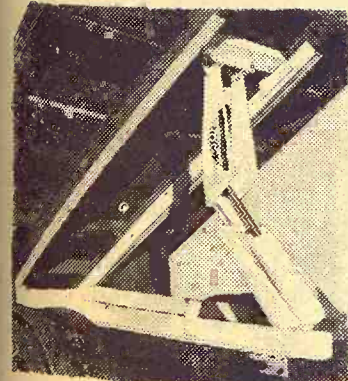

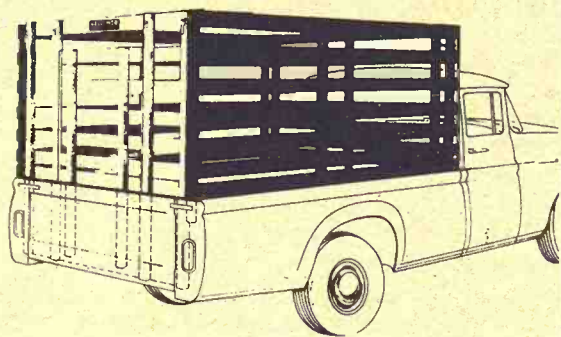

# Warren Won't Take Job But Still Sides With Governor

Within a couple of days after Governor Docking named him as the nominee to become the Kansas Livestock Sanitary Commissioner, Ralph Warren backed down from the post.

But, while the Silverdale stockman said he quit because he wanted to avoid embarrassment to his relatives — Ward Warren, incoming Livestock Association president, and Joe Warren, state senator — he let it be known that he stood with the governor in the controversy with the Livestock Association.

"As a cattleman," Warren said in his letter to the governor, "I think you are absolutely right in your insistence that

you, as governor, should have a choice in the selection of a state official since the governor usually is held responsible for the policies and actions of his employees.

"The leadership of the Kansas Livestock Assn. has denied you a choice in this matter. I think they are wrong, and I think that most cattlemen and members of the association agree with me.

"The livestock industry in Kansas will be better off if you are able to break the grip held by a few men on this state job."

Docking also said Warren's withdrawal would not open the door to possible negotiation on

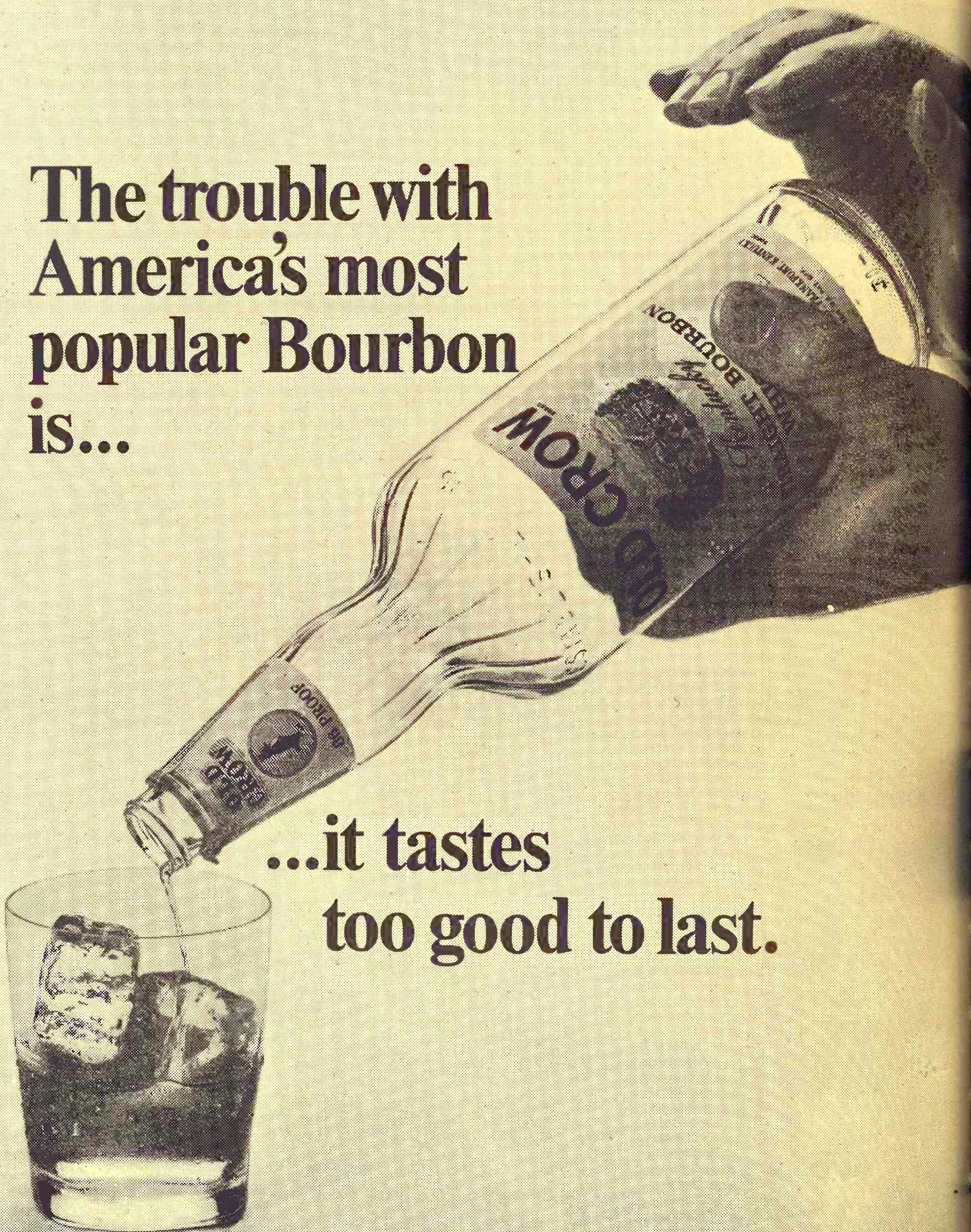
a compromise candidate with the cattlemen.

The Livestock Assn. last week had unofficially asked to meet with the governor to discuss the impasse, but Docking said today no formal request has been received from KLA officers.

The feud between Docking and the Livestock Assn. stems from the 1966 election campaign when the KLA's monthly magazine, The Kansas Stockman, editorially supported his opponent, William H. Avery.

Pickett is executive secretary of the KLA in addition to his state job and draws salaries from both the state and the KLA.

## OUR DAILY BREAD

### Mrs. Francis Moser Of Hollenberg Wins Prize

The weekly prize winner is Mrs. Francis Moser of Hollenberg. Mrs. Moser writes, "Since this is hen-culling season with old hens selling for a 'song,' I am sending you my favorite egg noodle recipe."

#### HOMEMADE NOODLES

Beat until very light:

3 egg yolks  
1 whole egg

Beat in:

3 tablespoons cold water  
1 teaspoon salt

Stir in and work in with hands:

2 cups sifted flour

Divide dough into three parts. Roll out each piece as thin as possible (paper thin) on lightly floured cloth-covered board. Place between 2 towels until dough is partially dry (like cham-  
ois skin). Roll up dough as for jelly roll. With a thin sharp knife cut into strips of desired width ( $\frac{1}{8}$ " for fine noodles; up to  $\frac{1}{2}$  inch for broad noodles.) Shake out the strips and allow to dry before using or storing. Makes 6 cups or 10 oz. ("Occasionally I find that more or less flour must be used, depending upon the size of the eggs.")

"Incidentally, I wonder if some of your readers have a good old-fashioned recipe for the genuine Bohemian Kolaches (with detailed instructions). Would surely appreciate one. Thanks!"

#### APPLE CAKE DESSERT

$1\frac{1}{2}$  cups sugar  
 $\frac{1}{2}$  cup shortening  
2 eggs

Cream above together.

pinch salt  
3 cups apples, sliced raw  
 $1\frac{1}{2}$  cups flour  
1 teaspoon cinnamon  
1 teaspoon nutmeg  
dash of cloves  
1 teaspoon soda

Bake 25 minutes at 350 degrees. Remove from oven and cover with the following: (Do not cook before putting on cake.)

3 tablespoons butter, melted  
3 tablespoons milk  
 $1\frac{1}{2}$  cups brown sugar  
Bake again 25 minutes. Serve with whipped cream or ice cream.

**Early Demand For Replacements**

Ample grain and roughage prospects have created an early demand for stocker calves. Many of our customers are laying in replacements earlier this year in anticipation of higher prices when harvest nears completion. Even though lighter weights are not moving in large numbers yet, many buyers are picking up odd lots trying to avoid the post harvest rush. Also, the possibility of wheat pasture in the west could raise prices another \$2 a hundred.

Cattlemen seem to be holding onto heavy feeders since prices have slumped in sympathy with the fat market. They feel that demand will pick up as the near record feed grain crop and immature grain in the corn belt will surely encourage more full feeding during the winter months.

Some farmers in this area plan to ensile their late milo that won't mature. Others will glean corn and

milo fields after harvest. In any case there won't be any forced selling this year as everyone has abundant feed.

Measure cornstarch into measuring cup; gradually stir in syrup from pineapple, vinegar and soy sauce. Add water to make 1½ cups. Add cornstarch and liquid mixture to skillet with tuna, pineapple and bouillon cube. Cook, stirring constantly, until sauce is clear and

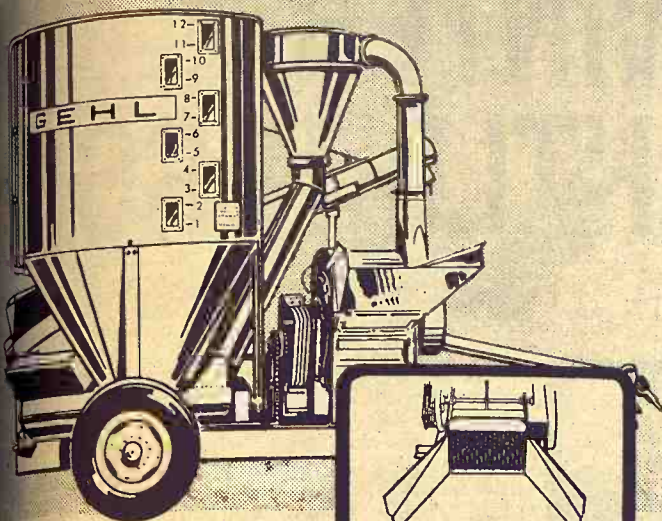
Snapdragons act this way because they aren't really annuals — we just treat them as if they were. They're really perennials and, given a chance, their roots will survive the cold.

## Nebraskans Learn More About Withholding, Higher Sales Taxes

LINCOLN, Nebr. — Nebraska's first state individual income tax will be collected at a rate of 10 per cent of federal tax liability starting Jan. 1, the state board of equalization has announced. The 10 per cent tax will be applied to a person's federal income tax. For example, a person paying \$350 in federal income taxes would be assessed \$35 in state income tax, less certain credits.

The measure also provides a 2 per cent corporation tax ap-

plied to taxable income rather than tax liability.

At the same time the board announced that the 2½ per cent sales tax which went into effect last June will have to be increased to 3 per cent Jan. 1,

1969, instead of dropping back to 2 percent as the legislation envisioned.

Gov. Norbert Tiemann noted that after the combination sales-income tax law was adopted, the legislature undertook such

new expenditures as state aid to education, and repealed head taxes, intangible property taxes, and taxes on household goods and personal effects. He estimated the income tax would

yield about \$50 million annually. The change in Nebraska's tax structure was precipitated by a referendum vote in the 1966 election which banned a state property tax.

## Sunday Closers Won't Give Up

The Kansas Chamber of Commerce still isn't giving up on a Sunday closing law.

The Retail Council of the organization has unveiled a new proposed law which they hope the 1968 legislature will approve.

Sunday closing has been a quiet issue the past two years but it was quite lively in the early 1960s. A 100-year-old blue law, which had been largely ignored for many years, was declared unconstitutional in 1961. A new Sunday closing law was passed by the 1963 legislature but it also was declared unconstitutional.

The Sunday closers had another crack at it in 1965 but the measure got thru the legislature, perhaps because no one could figure out how to write a law that would meet backers' intentions and still be applied equally, and partly because many legislators felt that backers were unusually heavy-handed.

The 1963 law, largely the product of the State Chamber, was a "mom and pop" law; i.e., one that attempted to close the big stores but allow the smaller ones to remain open.

Grocers and discounters especially challenged this law, and the new version specifically avoids collision with the grocers by exempting groceries from the proposed law, as well

as medicines, drugs, gas, oil, farm implements and repairs.

The Chamber's new version specifically would ban sales on Sunday of "motor vehicles, footwear, clothing, furniture, housewares, furnishings, appliances, tools, paints, and building materials." The proposed law gets more specific than that, but obviously backers hope to keep the discounters, the major chains, and department stores closed.

Backers hope that these larger stores may not oppose the law as much as before because of new minimum wage law's which presumably make 7-day operations more costly.

At a meeting in Hutchinson last week of the Retail Council, a Kansas City merchant, Saul Kass of Harzfeld's, said Sears, Roebuck & Co. would open on Sundays in Kansas if a new law was not passed. Perhaps significantly this bit of intelligence did not come directly from Sears, but it seemed to shake the Chamber committee members up.

Can the law be passed? The Chamber committee concludes that there is sentiment for a Sunday closing in Kansas and perhaps the legislature will agree with this sentiment. The problems of writing a Sunday closing law that is constitutionally acceptable appear to many so large that time spent on such a subject is a waste of the legislature's time.

## More Marijuana Again Found In Area Barn

SALINA — Saline County sheriff's officers and Salina police raided an abandoned barn near here last week and confiscated marijuana worth more than \$16,000.

Two men were held in the case, their identities undisclosed pending filing of charges.

Sheriff James Martin said the raiders found two duffel bags of marijuana spread on the floor of the vacant barn for drying. The substance will be analyzed by the Kansas Bureau of Investigation laboratory. A 25-year-old man in the barn was arrested. A 30-year-old man already was in city jail after being arrested by the highway patrol.

The sheriff said authorities learned of the hoard when two men tried to make contacts in Salina for sale of the drug.

# Wheatgrowers, Farm Bureau Huddle —But No Specific Details Told

DODGE CITY — A first step toward closer relationships between general farm organizations and farm commodity groups may have been made here last week as directing boards of the Kansas Farm Bureau (KFB) and the Kansas Association of Wheat Growers (KAWG) met to discuss mutual problems.

"The farm bureau can play an important role in agriculture and commodity groups can provide great assistance in pinpointing specific problems," Ray Frisbie, McDonald, Kans., KFB president said.

George Meeker, Garden City, president of KAWG termed the meeting one of "good will and general agreement on most of the topics discussed."

Meeker heads a group composed of about 30,000 wheat producers in Kansas and is vice president of the National Association of Wheat Growers. The Kansas Farm Bureau is composed of some 50,000 to 55,000 voting members, Frisbie said.

The Dodge City meeting, from

which members of the press were excluded, is believed to be the first formal session of boards of directors of general farm and farm commodity groups in Kansas.

About a dozen board members of each group attended.

Frisbie and Meeker said later the entire group discussed corporate farming, export certificates for wheat, strategic grain reserve legislation, soil bank programs, general farm programs and farm products imports.

The meeting was considered both important from the standpoint that it provides a means of communication between two important farm groups and because both groups have state conventions scheduled next month.

Meeker will appear before the resolutions committee of the Kansas Farm Bureau in its annual convention in Wichita next month to discuss part of the meeting here Thursday.

This, too, may be a first in Kansas as a farm commodity group representative appears advocating a specific policy for a general farm organization.

John (Junior) Armstrong, Muscotah, KFB's vice president, said he believed the KFB resolutions committee would view favorably Meeker's ideas for a wheat export certificate plan to advance farm income.

The appearance of Meeker at the KFB sessions was agreed after Meeker told of a plan whereby all wheat produced in

the United States could be rated at parity price.

Under current farm legislation only domestically consumed wheat is eligible for parity prices for the farmer. This parity is supported through a 75-cent bushel tax on processing wheat, plus a federal subsidy bringing total price equal to parity.

Meeker described a plan whereby the entire crop, planted under the allotment system, would be priced at parity for the producer. The federal government would pay enough subsidy to exporters to guarantee U.S. wheat would be competitively priced in the international market, and the remainder of the parity price would be paid farmers in the form of export certificates.

(This system would for instance, if the world price is \$1.30 a bushel and the required subsidy to exporters is 30 cents a bushel — then the wheat farmer — would receive a \$1-a-bushel export certificate.)

The amount of the export certificate would vary with the need for subsidizing exporters, Meeker said.

KFB board members agreed this sounded like a good plan.

"All farmers are interested in seeing their income get better, not just farm bureau members," Frisbie said.

Leaders said the two groups also found themselves in general agreement on the subject of corporation farming.

"We believe that incorporation in individual cases for individual farmers may be advantageous," Meeker said. "However, there is fear that the current proposals before the Kansas House may prove to be a threat to current law allowing family corporations."

Frisbie pointed out that they believed generally "that we cannot cure all our ills through legislation."

Only formal cooperation to date among Kansas farm organizations had been the committee for farm organizations, which joined in hiring a legislative representative to the Kansas Legislature during the 1965 session and the occasional sponsoring of specific farm laws.

## Abilene Flour Mill Plan To Resume Output

ABILENE — Two G&G area feed companies are unaffected by a reorganization of the Abilene Flour Mills. Naturich Mills and Abilene Alfalfa Mill are separate corporations, tho related to the Abilene Flour Mills, which has resumed production under the jurisdiction of an operating receiver.

The current plan, to be administered by Law Brooks of Wichita, formerly of the Fourth National Bank there, is a temporary one. A permanent plan will be filed with Federal District Court at Wichita to allow the company to meet long-term contract commitments.

Officers of the company had filed an application for approval of a reorganizational plan before the referee in bankruptcy in the federal court at Wichita.

## Set Date For Area Bank Trial

Three G&G area bank employees pleaded innocent last week in U.S. District Court in Wichita to charges of violating federal bank laws.

Kenneth M. Chase, 23, Talmage, and Charles S. Montgomery, 26, Junction City, both former officials of the Talmage State Bank, pleaded not guilty to grand jury indictments of making false bookkeeping entries and embezzling bank funds.

The men are charged with making false entries in bank books crediting deposits ranging as high as \$5000 to other banks. They also are charged with embezzling amounts of up to \$5000 from the Talmage bank.

Mavis Lavonne Luce, 27, El Dorado, pleaded innocent to charges alleging she made false entries in bank books ranging from \$57.93 to \$237.82 as an employee of the El Dorado National Bank. The charges are contained in a seven-count grand jury indictment.

District Court Judge Wesley E. Brown set their trials for the next term of court.

## Alter Outflow At Area Lakes

JUNCTION CITY — The flow of water from Milford Dam was reduced last week while the outflow at nearby Tuttle Creek was raised.

The change is to get Tuttle Creek's level, now five feet above conservation level, down for the inspection of outlet facilities Nov. 7.

Milford's outflow was cut from 1500 cubic feet per second to 500 cfs but it will return to the higher rate this week.

Milford is 4.4 feet above conservation level.

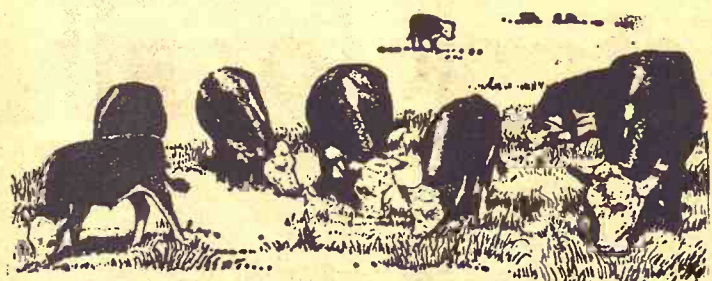

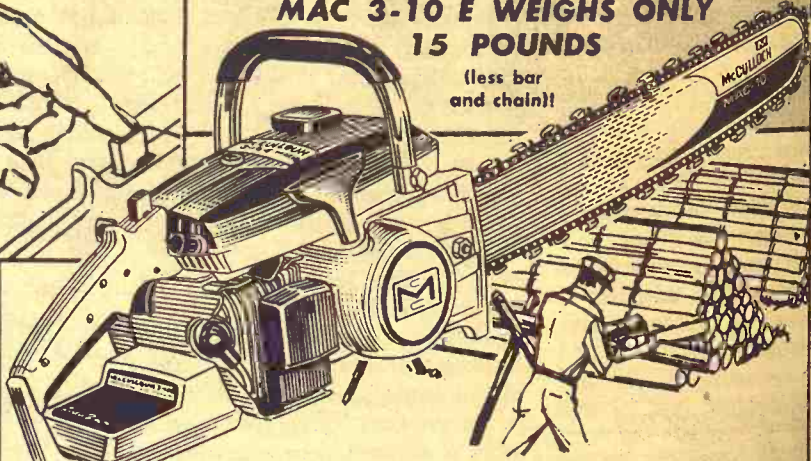

**Seeds, Dormant**  
**10,000 Years,**  
**Still Germinate**  
Canadian botanists have  
grown normal, healthy plants  
from seeds believed to have lain  
dormant at least 10,000 years in  
Canada's frozen Arctic wastes.  
They are thought to be the  
oldest living organisms on  
earth, three times as old as the  
giant sequoias in California,  
said Dr. A. E. Porsild, a botan-  
ist at the National Museum of

# Poor Crops Dent Wheat Histories In Western Kansas

Wheat farmers in 16 western Kansas counties received a shock this week as average yield regulations for Kansas wheat under the 1968 acreage allotment program were published.

A declining average per acre yield in the counties will mean a decline in the amount of certificates for which farmers will be paid for the 1968 wheat crop in some areas of the state.

Wendell Becraft, state Agriculture Stabilization Conservation Service (ASCS) director, Manhattan, said the state ASCS had used all of a .2 of a bushel per acre leeway allowed for Kansas in the 16-county area in an effort to soften the blow.

The new regulations may cost a typical farmer \$2 to \$6 per acre.

Counties whose average yield the past five years has declined thus causing a cut in the certificates in western Kansas are Greeley, Sherman, Thomas, Wallace, Logan, Gove, Trego, Ellis, Wichita, Lane, Ness, Hamilton, Hodgeman, Ford, Morton and Comanche.

For the entire state in 1968, the average yield per acre will be cut by .8 of a bushel, a U.S. official said.

A Washington, D.C., administrative official said the new ruling follows by a year a duplicate regulation applied to cotton growers in the 1967 crop year.

In prior years, historical yield averages could be adjusted to not less than 95 per cent of the past five-year average, with a 5 per cent adjustment factor, applied so that the farmer got the benefit of the percentage plus the adjustment.

Under the 1968 regulation, the Washington official said, each state is given a base on historical averages, plus a .2 of a bushel factor to apply in areas where extreme weather conditions prevailed.

This places the state as a whole in a better position, but

does bring difficulties in an area where several bad seasons have caused a decline in historical yield values.

The entire regulation was approved on the basis of administrative efficiency and fairness of application from state to state, the official added.

At the state office, Becraft said:

"If we start getting better yields again in some of these counties, of course their yield averages will be higher and certificates issued on the better averages — but when historical averages go down, the downward adjustment for certi-

cate purposes must be made too."

The Kansas wheat allotment for 1968 is 11,117,320 acres, down about 15 per cent from last year's allotment. Allotment for the United States' wheat crop in 1968 is 59.3 million acres.

Sample of what occurred in some of the counties is what happened to Greeley County

this year on the 1968 crop average forecast on which certification payment is made.

Greeley County's predicted average yield per acre for 1967 was 26.3 bushels per acre. This was cut 14.5 per cent to 22.5 bushels per acre.

But the program for payment is based on a five-year average — and for the past 10 years,

production in Greeley County has been erratic.

Beginning with 1957, average per acre yield each year was: 1957, 13 bushels; '58, 25 bushels; '59, 29 bushels; '60, 33 bushels; '61, 17 bushels; '62, 23 bushels; '63, 13 bushels; '64, 10 bushels; '65, 14 bushels; and '66, 13 bushels.

So, the ASCS in order to allow for a bad year in 1964, left out that year's average and took production in 1966, '65, '63, '62 and '61 for averaging. The historic average, adjusted for the weather factor, came out

14.4 bushels average production per acre.

Based on a 10-year average, the production average would have been 19.0 bushels. But, state officials computed for the weather factor, giving the county an historic average of 20.5 bushels.

This still was almost six bushels to the acre less than the 1967 payment — so the officials took part of the .2 of a bushel leeway allowed the whole state to boost Greeley County's payments for 1968 to 22.5 bushels to the acre.

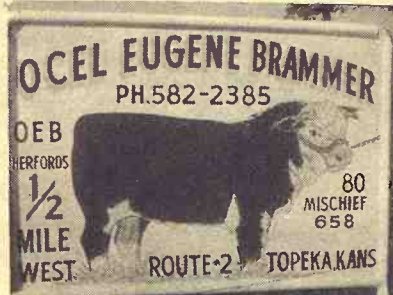

## Bigger Gains On Cooked Feed?

RED ROCK, Okla. — Oklahoma livestockmen are expressing interest in a new cooked food experiment, with wheat as the principal ingredient, for cattle and hogs in this area.

experimenting with the food, sively for hogs and adding cot- using the cooked grain exclu- touseed hulls for roughage in the cattle rations.

In addition, nutrients are included in the mixer operation of the feed plant. The portions of these supplements are changed for both cattle and hogs according to weight progress of the animals being fed.

The wheat is being cooked in a plant leased from Process Engineering co., at Red Rock. Feed lots have been set up by Frontier at the Olsen Feed Lot, Newkirk, Okla., the Russell Evans farm near Red Rock, and the Robert Sullins farm east of Ponca City, Okla.

Conveyors from storage bins at the Red Rock plant feed the oven where the grain is preheated to 90 degrees. This opens grain pores. The grain then is rotated around a steam boiler in the core of the cooker. The continuous operation through the cooker requires 20 minutes.

Breaking through the starches of the wheat grain to make it more digestible is a uniform amount of steam, seeping into the pores of the wheat. The grain comes from the oven ready to be carried on conveyors to a flaking machine. The rolled wheat then goes to a mixer where it is enriched with vitamins and then is ready for consumption.

Although the new method of feed preparation has not yet been scientifically measured, according to Stan Meek, owner of Frontier Grain, all evidence points to an operation that will take several days off the normal cycle required to bring hogs to top weight and subsequently produce a higher grade of meat.

Gene Ellis, Ponca City, president and owner of Process Engineering Co., said the controlled cooker at the Red Rock processing plant is the only one of its kind in operation although two are being installed at Wayne, Nebr., and Rocky Ford, Colo.

Agriculture departments at a number of universities are showing considerable interest in controlled cooking of grains, Ellis said. He said Process Engineering has built an oven for installation at Oklahoma State University this fall.

Meek said wheat is being used for the feeding program now because it is cheapest and most available.

He said milo is likely to replace wheat as the crop comes on in Oklahoma. It is the cooking and moisture control that is most important, not the grain, he said.

In Frontier Grain's experiments, Ellis said, some hogs switched from raw to cooked grain made the change readily, but hogs going from cooked to raw grain were definitely off their feed for about three days.

### LAWRENCE GETS MAJOR INDUSTRIAL PLUM

LAWRENCE — This city has walked away with a major industrial plum in the G&G area. The B. F. Goodrich Co. will build a \$4 million facility for use to distribute Goodrich footwear, such as canvas shoes, women's shoes, and hunting boots. The warehouse will employ about 100 people. It is located near the Hallmark Card and Lawrence Paper plants near the Kansas Turnpike. The city of Lawrence will finance the construction with revenue bonds.

He said hogs fed on cooked grain have averaged a pound of gain to 2.9 pounds of feed, while hogs on regular feed required 3.31 pounds of feed to gain a pound.

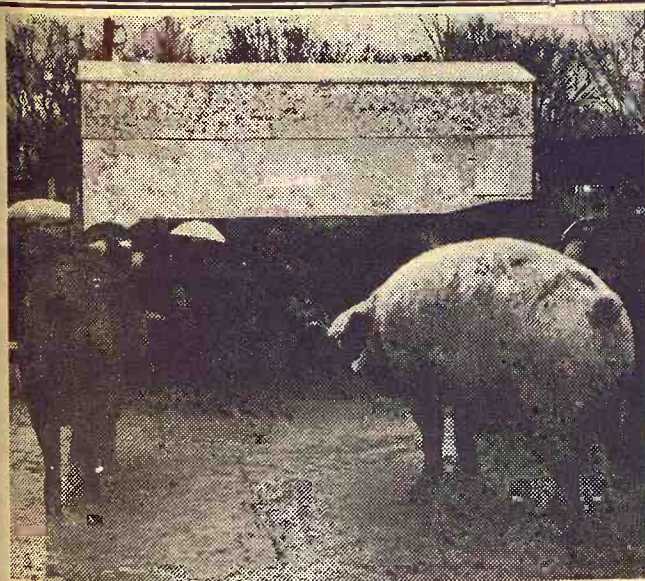

## Vermillion Watershed Vote Oct. 28

Landowners of the Upper Black Vermillion watershed will vote October 28 in special assessment areas of the flood-plain on issuance of bonds to help pay various costs. Costs include obtaining of land rights, easements, contract

administration for constructing 109 floodwater retarding dams in the watershed, and cost of 16 miles of channel improvement.

The watershed encompasses 179,000 acres in the drainage area of the Black Vermillion river, North Fork and Irish Creek in Marshall, Nemaha and Pottawatomie counties.

The project will cost \$10½ million in federal funds, plus a half million for land treatment and slightly less than one-half million for land and land rights.

Sites have been contributed on 33 dam locations and a part of 13 more. Surveying and core drilling has been in progress on 26 sites for some time.

Two project agreements for land treatment have been approved and work is being done on clearing and shaping of eight waterways, on a cost-share basis with the landowners contributing 30 per cent of the cost. This land treatment phase of the watershed plan is unique to the Upper Black Vermillion watershed, it being the only one in Kansas to have this feature.

As the board of directors recognized that land treatment would be necessary to protect floodwater structures from excessive siltation it was included in the general plan.

A 10-year construction period is planned. When completed the watershed will have about 85 percent protection from flooding. Sixty percent of the area will be above the dams. These improvements will regulate the flow of water downstream and also serve to stabilize gullies above their location, soil conservationists said.

## Troop Return To Ft. Riley May Hit A Snag

Hopes for a major troop addition at Fort Riley may have hit a snag.

The Army Times, an unofficial weekly newspaper, said last week that the 35,000-man cut in American troops in Europe may be cancelled.

Previously it had been assumed, without official confirmation, that the 24th Infantry Division in Germany would come to Fort Riley early in 1968.

The Army Times said military planners in Europe are trying to discourage Washington from making a major troop withdrawal in Europe.

If there were a cutback, as previously supposed, there would still be 220,000 U.S. troops in Europe.

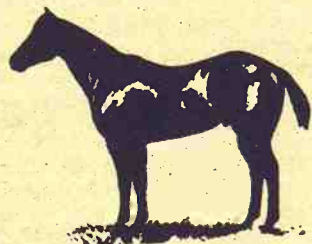

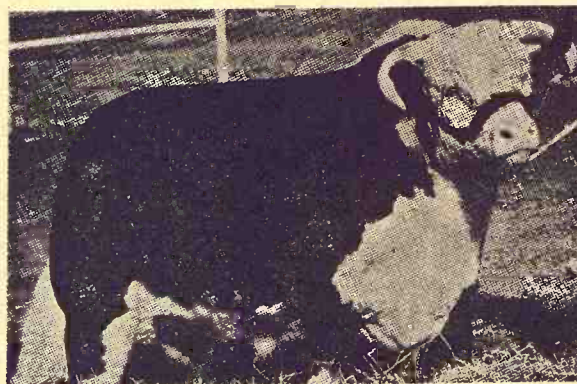

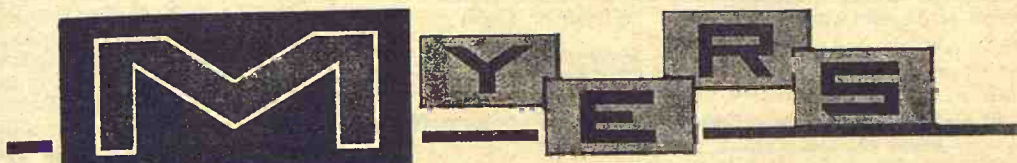

GLEN ELDER — The Glen

Elder dam's Solomon River by-pass was closed last week to allow water to flow through the dam outlet.

James M. Ingles, Bureau of

Reclamation, region 7 director, said, "The closure will create a dead-storage pool of about 1500 acre-feet but active storage will not begin until next spring."

The reservoir, Waconda lake, will have a total conservation and floor capacity of 976,000 acre-feet, covering 35,200 surface acres between the cities of Glen Elder and Downs.

The dam is an earthfill structure 130 feet high and 2½ miles long.

The \$64 million project began in June, 1963, and will be completed in 1969.

### MARIJUANA LAWS TOO TOUGH HE SAYS

The federal commissioner of the Food and Drug Administration says he favors removing all penalties for the possession of marijuana. Dr. James Goddard said he did not think marijuana is more dangerous than alcohol.

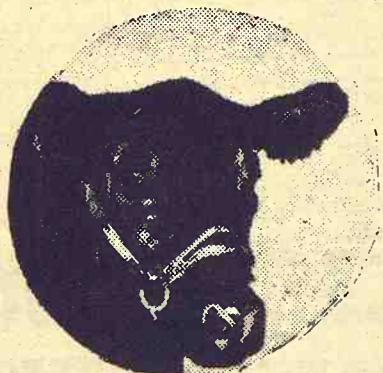

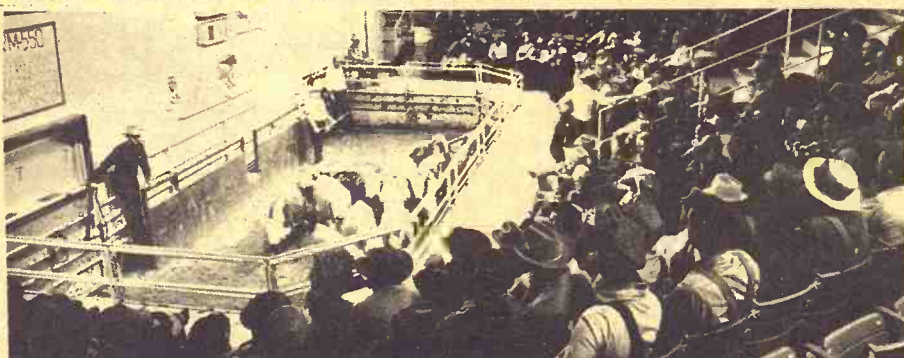
