

Cigarette Manufacturers
Must Show
More Warnings

The Federal Trade Commission has accepted a consent decree that will result in a health warning on every advertisement for cigarettes manufactured by six companies.

The orders require the companies to print in all ads the words "Caution: Quitting Now Greatly Greatly Reduces Serious Risks to Your Health."

Newspapers, magazines, billboards will come under the rule which the FTC says will take effect by summer, after consideration of many comments on the proposed rule.

The six companies are American Tobacco Co., Brown and Williamson Corp., Liggett and Myers Inc., Lorillard, Philip Morris Inc., and J. Reynolds Tobacco Co.

The warning must be "clear and conspicuous" and that is, in two lines at the bottom of the ad, set in a black rectangle, the FTC says.

"These agreements settle the last outstanding issue between the government and the cigarette industry in regard to advertising," said Robert Pitofsky, director of the Federal Trade Commission.

An FTC spokesman said some specific ads supervised by the FTC will cover posters and transit vehicles, display materials, and direct mail leaflets.

Radio and television advertising is prohibited by law.

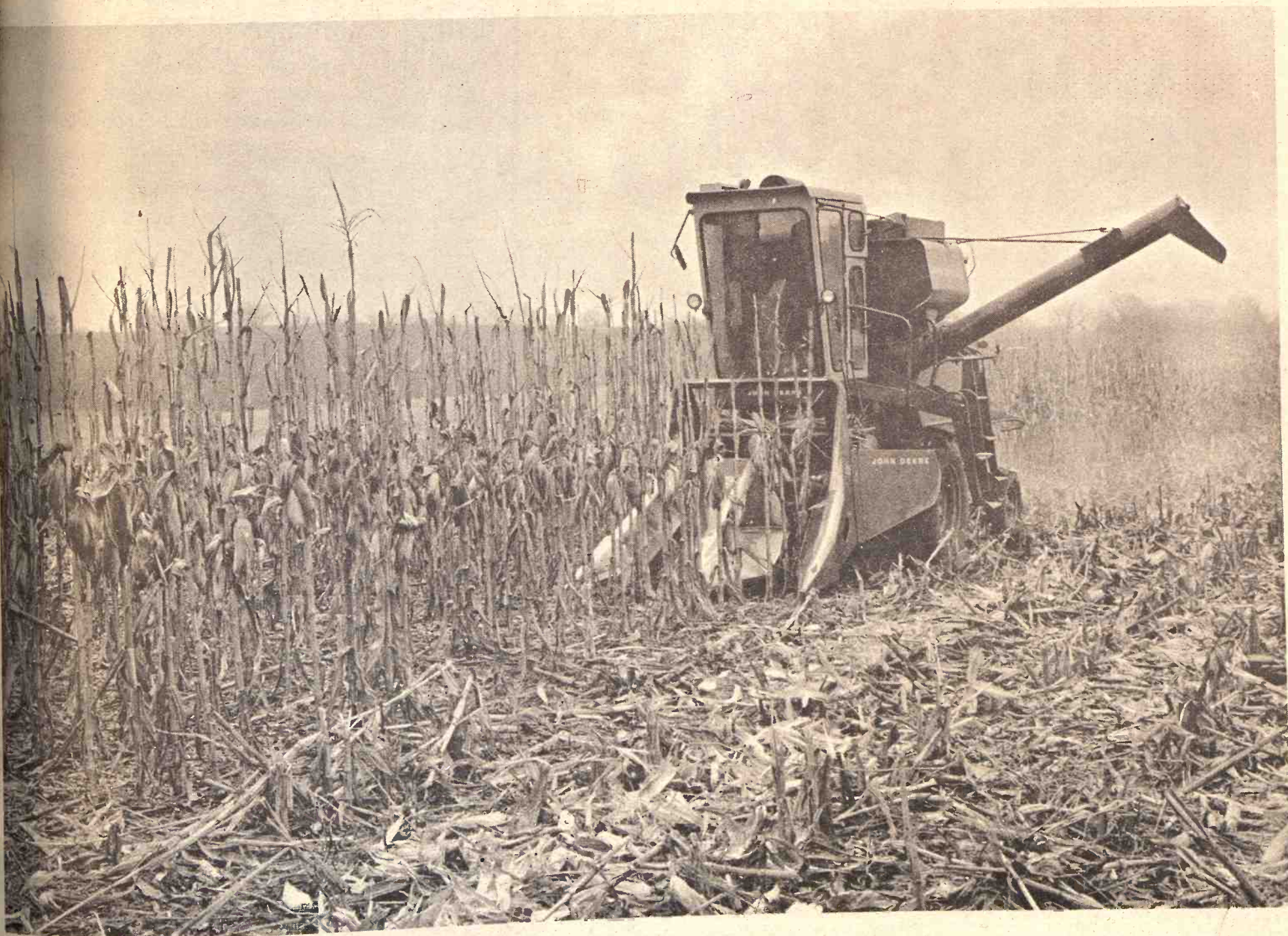

CORN HARVEST IN FEBRUARY?

Harvest is still in progress in some parts of the G&G area. Delayed by wet ground and too much moisture in the grain, cold weather moved in before it was all done. Marion Shubert of Council Grove still had about 20 acres of corn left to harvest. Referring to his combine, Shubert said "There's been a lot of grain through here this year."



Guess Livestock Prices To Be Good All Year

While the price situation on grains increases worry among government officials, prices on livestock, which have never been brought under government control, generally reflect good news.

Especially is this true of cattle. Hog producers have found much encouraging in the market the past few weeks.

Choice steers now are selling in the \$34.50 to \$37 range and hog prices have advanced to the high \$20s.

Market forecasters are guessing livestock prices will continue to be good for the rest of the year. They see some weakness in slaughter cattle prices for late March and early April.

For hogs they expect prices to

waver in early spring but to be above \$25 in late summer.

Robert L. Coppersmith, Kansas State University extension economist, took note of the recent rapid rise of hog prices to show how explosive this market can be. He pointed out that in late 1970, hog prices dropped about \$5 in two months.

He further noted that while there is no indication that the rate of increase experienced during last December and thus far in 1972 will continue, he believes that hog prices during 1972 will average \$5 above those of 1971.

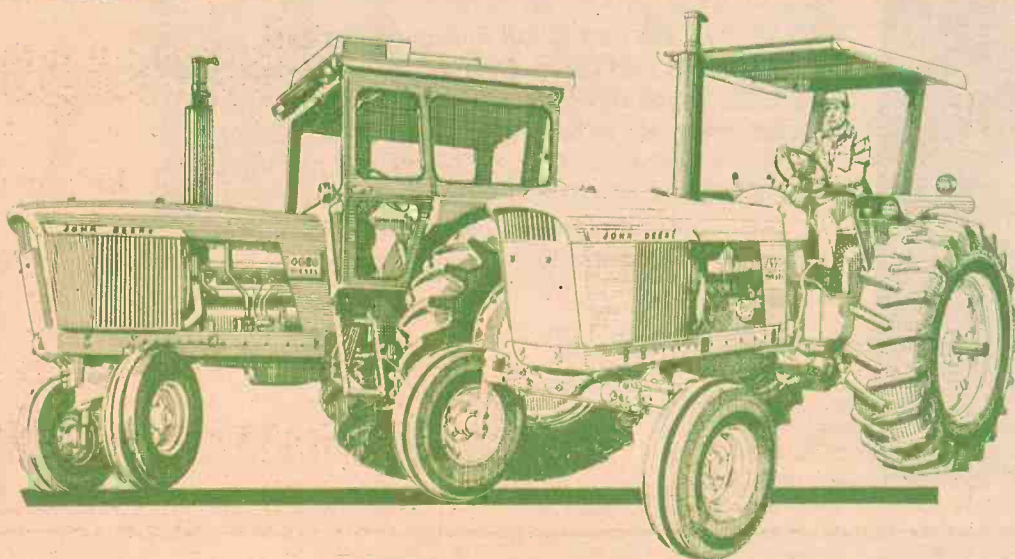
Method Thru Sterile House Fly

Agriculture Department scientists think they may be on the trail of new methods for mass producing sexually sterile male house flies, which in turn could revolutionize insect control.

The sterile method of insect control has fascinated scientists for years and in some cases, notably for screwworm control in the Southwest, has proved workable.

Briefly, it involves the release of sterile male insects which then mate with normal females. As a result, the reproductive cycle is broken by the female laying unfertilized eggs.

A major obstacle in housefly experiments has been the time and expense required for separating males from females. That problem may be overcome soon.

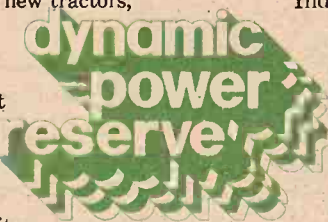

What Two Farm Reports Mean

Two important farm reports were released by the USDA late in January. These were Stocks of Grains and Planting Intentions. Here are a few highlights from these reports, plus some conclusions that may be drawn from them.

The stocks of corn on hand January 1 totaled 4,642 million bushels—24 percent more than one year before. Subtracting this amount from the supply on hand last October 1 (carryover plus new crop), shows a disappearance of 1,561 million bushels during the October-December quarter—15 percent more than a year earlier.

The supply of sorghum grains on January 1 was estimated at 715 million bushels—up 16 percent from

last year. Disappearance for the October-December quarter was down 17 percent from last year.

Oat stocks were 936 million bushels—up 3 percent. Oat utilization for the quarter was 150 million bushels—down 18 percent from a year before. Barley supplies were reported at 393 million bushels—3 percent more than twelve months earlier; disappearance for the three months was 95 million bushels—down 13 percent.

Altogether, the stocks of these four feed grains on hand January 1 totaled 174 million tons—up 20 percent from last year. And the amount used and exported was 56 million tons—6 percent more than one year earlier.

Of the total supply of corn on hand January 1, the CCC owned 144 million bushels and had loans on 760 million more. That left 3,738 million bushels of "free" corn—about 500 million more than will be needed for use and export before the end of this marketing year next October 1. Until at least half of this corn is put under price support, it will bear heavily on the market.

Stocks of soybeans on hand January 1 totaled 867 million bushels—down 6 percent from last year. This amount was about what was expected from the figures previously available—such as the size of the 1971 crop and amount used and exported after September 1.

Too Much Corn?

According to the USDA report on Planting Intentions, farmers expected to cut corn acreage only 4 percent this year. With a normal growing season, the average yield should be at least 82 bushels per acre. This would be the same as the average for the past five years, with the blight year taken out. Such a yield on the indicated acreage would produce around 5 billion bushels, which would probably be about 100 million bushels more than the amount that would be used and exported during the 1972-73

marketing year.

Farmers reported that they intend to cut other feed grain acreages as follows: grain sorghums, 7 percent; oats, 4 percent; and barley, 9 percent.

Too Few Beans?

The USDA also found that farmers intended to increase soybean acreage only 4 percent. With normal weather, we would expect yields to average near 27.3 bushels, which is the average of the past three years. Such a yield would turn out about 1.2 billion bushels of soybeans—3 percent more than farmers harvested last fall. Since all reserves of soybeans will be gone by harvest time, a crop of 1.2 billion bushels would probably require a slight reduction in domestic use and exports during the 1972-73 marketing year.

Kansas Turnpike In Black By Record \$7.3 Million

The Kansas Turnpike set a record for 1971 with an operating surplus of \$7.36 million, Jerry Brindle, K.T.A. general manager, says.

The 7.3-million-dollar surplus, after payment of operating costs and interest on bonds, Brindle said, was \$600,000 above that of 1970.

The surplus was applied to bond retirement, roadway and bridge repairs and required reserve funds, Brindle said.

The director said other records set by the K.T.A. in 1971 included 506 million miles driven by 9.4 million vehicles, a 15-year peak in vehicle total.

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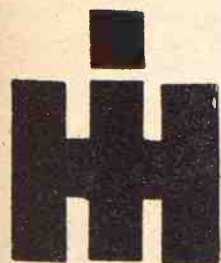

The Lord's Acre Was A Mess

J.C. Carr of Topeka sent the article from the Rochester, N.Y., Democrat and Chronicle to Grass & Grain. The article itself concerns a corn plot in Mt. Morris, N.Y., which was untreated by fertilizer and pest killers and how it compared with two adjacent plots normally treated. Said Mr. Carr, "I feel that this same program could be obtained from our own farm credit service in this area for some of our vocational classes also."

MT. MORRIS, N.Y.—There was no getting away from it. The Lord's Acre was a mess.

Planted alongside two plots of corn treated with fertilizer and pest killers, it was left strictly to its own devices by the 25 agricultural pupils of Eugene Huff at Charles May Occupational Center in Mt. Morris. One ambitious weed in the un-

treated, uncared-for plot towered seven feet tall, well over the corn. Weeds turned the patch into bushy, jungle-like undergrowth, in dramatic contrast with the tall, weed-free acreage next to it.

The ears of corn in the Lord's Acre looked as if they had been hit by some kind of blight—stunted nubbins with twisted and irregular rows of kernels.

To Huff and his boys, the experiment was intended to prove an agricultural point, not a theological one—but they believe there may be a moral, the classic one that "God helps those who help themselves."

Agriculturally, the project provided graphic proof that wholesale neglect would raise Cain with the world's food supply. Admittedly, there are ecological perils in some fertilizers, fungicides and pesticides. But Huff believes they are necessary, and used the plot as

"proof."

However, most advocates of organically grown foods, it must be said, would never leave a plot of land to be overgrown with weeds. Instead, they use natural fertilizers and non-toxic materials to assist growth and control weeds.

Planted last May on seven acres behind the vocational school, the corn was divided into three plots—the Lord's Acre, five acres treated with liquid fertilizer for which a dealer in the area recommended a formula, and one acre treated with a granular fertilizer according to a formula recommended by agricultural specialists at Cornell. The same XL316 De Kalb hybrid was planted in all three plots.

The project was complex, involving most of the problems that a commercial farmer faces. Soil was analyzed, for instance, before the corn was treated. The market was watched closely before it was sold, and careful records were kept of yield and cash proceeds.

To no one's surprise, the Lord's Acre showed a loss of \$15.77. The five acres treated with a fertilizer known as "Na-Chur" showed a profit of \$56.05 an acre, and the Cornell-Recommended plot returned \$49.34.

Yield on the Na-Chur plot was 4.88 tons an acre, on the Cornell plot 4.06 tons, and on the Lord's Acre 1.33 tons.

Yield on the treated plots was considerably above the average that area farmers obtain from their fields.

The project netted \$995, including proceeds of a small plot of alfalfa, but much of the material and equipment used in it was contributed by dealers. Huff, who was agriculture teacher at Livonia Central School for many years, estimates true profit at about \$400.

One of the most interesting and instructive parts of the project was the pupils' involvement with Farm Credit Service.

A little-known but remarkably active office, it is located in the Extension Service building in Mt. Morris, provides two types of credit—loans by the Production Credit Association, a farmer-owned co-op; and long-term mortgages

under the Federal Land Bank program.

Organized in Livingston County in 1936, the Credit service has grown steadily in both volume of business and membership, now has combined outstanding loans of about \$10 million on its books, loaned about \$3.5 million in 1971 alone.

The vocational school pupils visited farm credit manager Kenneth Winans at his office at the start of their project to describe their plans and prospects.

Convinced that they were a good credit risk, Winans authorized a loan of \$600 for seed and other expenses. The transaction was exactly like that concluded with farm operators.

The boys used all the money for their project and last week had the pleasure of paying another visit to Winans office to pay it back.

Morris Co. Hereford Sale At \$33,600 —Top Bull \$550

The annual Morris County Hereford Association Sale at Herington grossed \$33,603.50.

Thirty-two bulls grossed \$13,735, averaging \$429. Two full brothers topped the sale at \$550 and \$545 from the Kenneth Hiebert herd near Council Grove.

Jesse Bettles, Herington was the sales manager and Gene Watson handled the auctioneering.

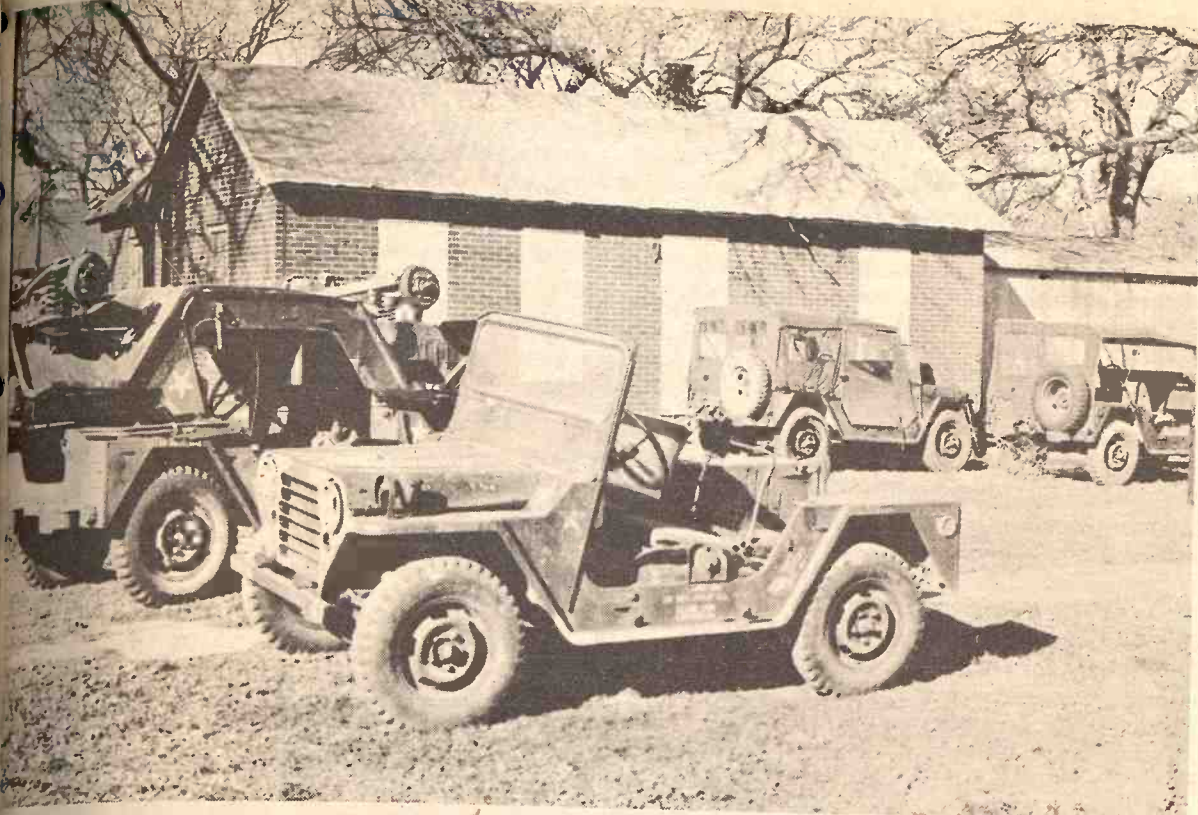

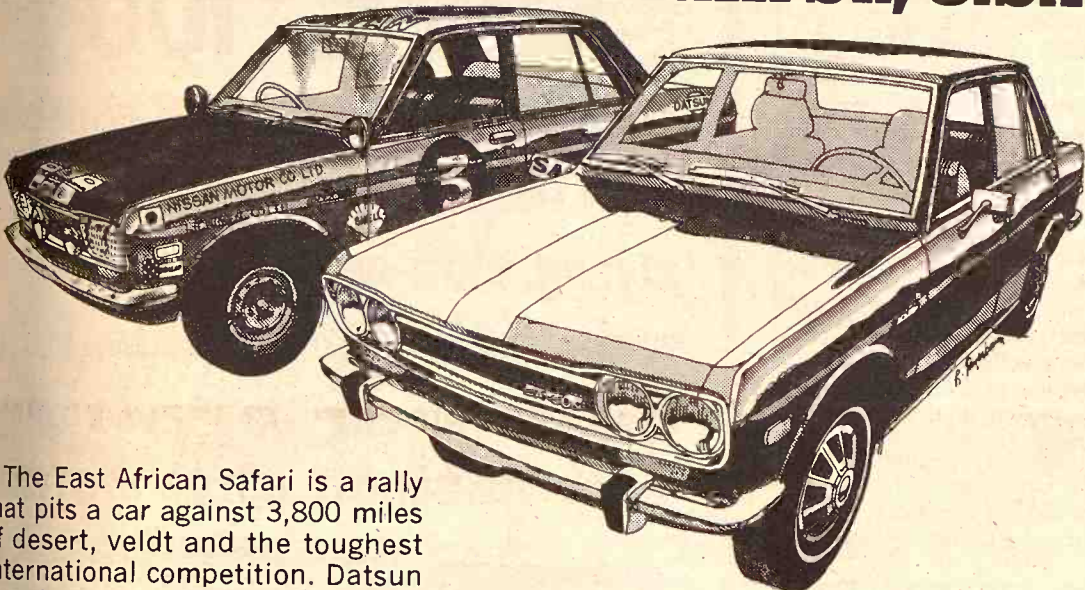

Prove Claims, Cold Remedy Makers Are Told

The Federal Trade Commission has requested documentation of advertising claims made by the nation's major cough-and-cold remedy makers.

Sixteen manufacturers were ordered to prove their claims. They have 60 days in which to comply. The action is the latest in a recent series of FTC demands that advertisers authenticate the claims they make for their products.

Car makers, air-conditioner manufacturers and makers of tooth-paste and denture cleaner have been among manufacturers ordered to show their claims were true.

Although the order does not say current advertising is false for the cold-and-cough-remedy makers, it does mean the claims must be documented.

Some of the claims the FTC is concerned about include:

- Contac provides relief from symptoms of a summer cold for up to 12 hours.
- 4-Way Nasal Spray provides effective decongestant relief as fast or faster than other decongestants.
- Alka Seltzer Plus cold tablets provide effective relief from the

sneezing, sniffing, stuffy nose, sinus headache, body aches and feverish feeling which may accompany a cold.

Warner-Lambert Co. of Morris Plains, N.J., which makes Listerine products, said it is ready to document claims about four of its products listed by the FTC.

Menley and James Laboratories of Philadelphia said they can substantiate ads for Contac and C-3 cough capsules.

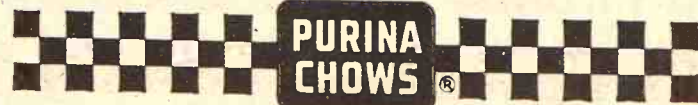

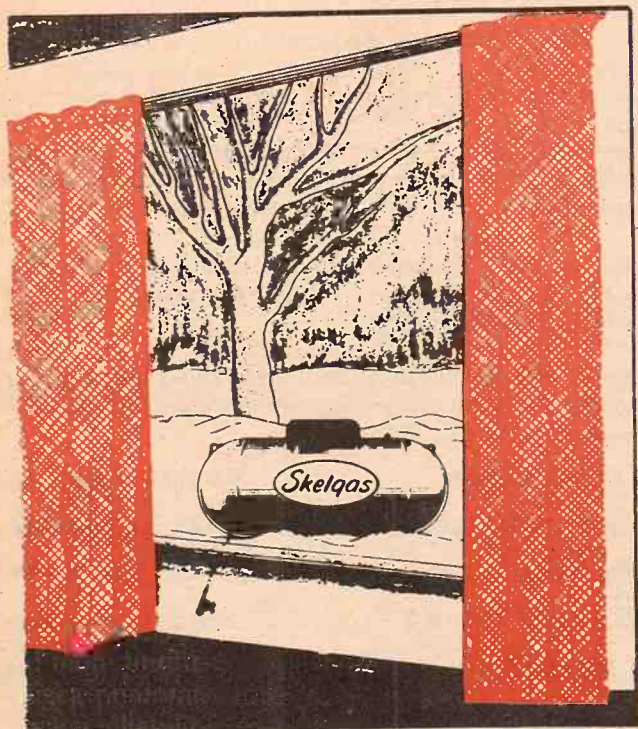
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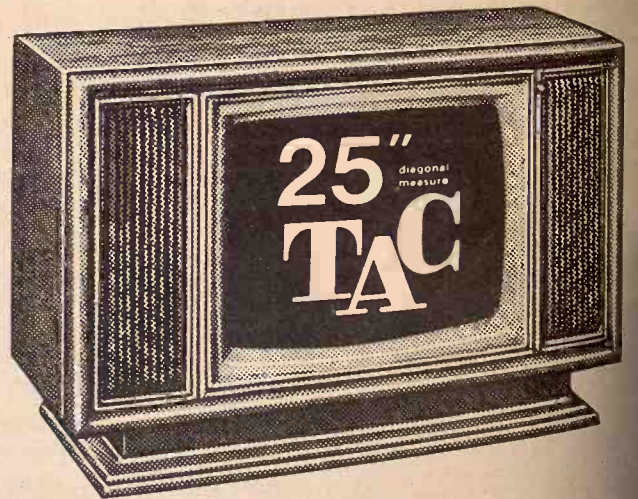

Below is given the directions for making multi-colored logs for the fireplace as requested by Mrs. James of Clay Center. I am sending the directions to her also.

"To make multi-colored logs for fireplace: Roll newspapers tightly; tie with string. In a 4 or 5 gallon jar, mix: 1 gallon water, 4 pounds blue stone, (crystal form), 4 pounds of copper sulphate, (powdered form), 3 pounds rock salt. Soak logs in this for three or four weeks, turning end for end each day and stirring the solution. Add more water if necessary. Then remove and spread

to dry."

We have also heard from Mrs. Raymond James of Clay Center, who requested the method for making the fireplace logs. Her letter follows:

"May I say 'Thank you' for printing my SOS for the 'Logs' made in the water and various solutions to burn in the fireplace. I received many replies and since some have also asked for the directions am wondering if it might not be feasible to print them. There was a bit of difference in some of them but most were very similar. Here are the directions:

"The following solutions will make very successful 'Logs' for the fireplace. Soak newspapers after being rolled very tightly and tied with twine and also with yarn to indicate the color of the flame. Must be soaked several weeks in the solution (preferably in the summer) and then dried out well for several weeks.

"YELLOW & BLUE:

4 pounds copper sulphate; 3 pounds rock salt; 1 gallon of water.

"GREEN:

1 pound boric acid; 1 gallon of water

"RED:

1 pound strontium nitrate; 1 gallon of water.

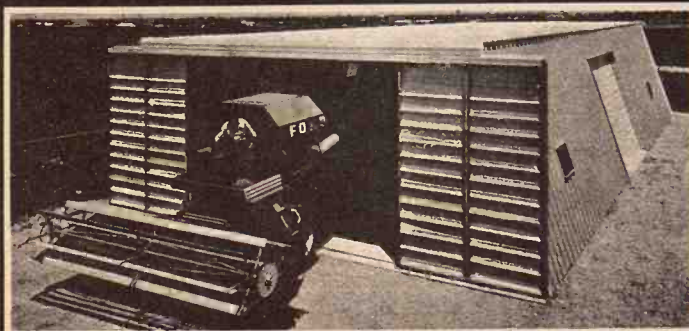

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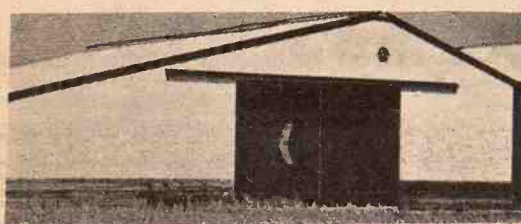
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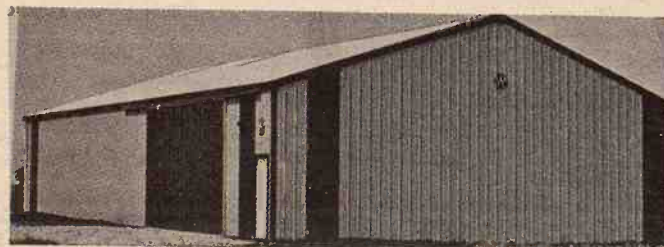

Farm Credit Assns Increase Volume 16% In Year

Loans by federal land banks, production credit associations and banks for cooperatives totaled a record \$14.4 billion last year, up nearly 16 per cent from 1970, says the Farm Credit Administration.

The three groups are part of the Farm Credit System, a network of lending agencies which are owned by farmer members and their co-ops.

Production credit associations (PCAs) loaned the most last year, \$9.4 billion, nearly 14 per cent more than in 1970. Farmers usually borrow from PCAs on a short-term basis, frequently to help pay

operating costs. Loans by federal land banks—long-term credit for real estate—totaled \$1.6 billion last year, up sharply from \$1.0 billion in 1970. Officials said the increase "represents a willingness by farmers" to resume long-term borrowing because of a downturn in interest rates.

Banks for cooperatives loaned \$2.7 billion to help farmers finance supply, marketing and business services. That was up more than 10 per cent, the FCA said.

In addition, more than \$640 million was loaned by federal intermediate credit banks, which help finance other groups in the system.

Total loans outstanding among all groups was \$16.3 billion at year end, up more than 10 per cent from 1970 the FCA said.

Basic financing of the lending agencies comes from the sales of securities in the nation's commercial money market. Altogether, the system supplies about 21 per cent of the \$65 billion of total credit used by farmers annually, the FCA said.



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A RETIRED RAILROADER
When Clyde Forinash retired from railroading, he came back to where he started his career, McFarland, a crossroads village along 170 in Wabunsee county. Forinash started his rail career tending a coal chute at McFarland in 1920. In 1928, when trains were converting to fuel oil, he became a switchman, a job that at the time was so dangerous that the life expectancy of a switchman was only 7½ years. Hearing impaired but generally healthy otherwise, Forinash retired after a switching career that took him from Canada to southern Texas.

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Alfalfa Mill Purifier May Help Industry Too

A machine built by a rural machine shop operator to remove particles from alfalfa mill exhaust may be able to scrub some of the pollution out of big industrial smokestacks too.

That's the aim of Leo Bassett of Burrton. Bassett, who operates the LB Manufacturing Inc. at Burrton, figures he can modify his alfalfa mill device and take out fly ash, tars and sulphur dioxide from exhausts of

furnaces burning fossil fuels, such as coal and oil.

Bassett has constructed the machine, patented it, and calls it a Blue Sky Air Scrubber.

"In experimenting, I ran the thick, black smoke from burning rubber tires through it and no sign of smoke came out of it," he says.

Bassett's experimental machine, which he estimates is capable of cleaning an exhaust of 50,000 cubic feet per minute, passes the exhaust through three stages before returning it to the atmosphere. First, the exhaust is forced through an after-burner to achieve more complete combustion, then it is sprayed with an ammonia water solution and finally filtered through a layer of crushed limestone rock, Bassett said.

No complicated chemical compounds are used in the air pollution control unit, he stressed. "I think that if we use natural stuff that the good Lord put here on this earth to take care of this pollution, it will work longer and do a better job than anything else you can come up with," Bassett said.

Ultimate removal of the deadly sulphur dioxide is achieved through a chemical reaction with the limestone filter, he said.

The experimental air scrubber

covers almost the entire bed of a semi-trailer. The final stage is a large rotating drum with a steel mesh outer surface layer containing 10 tons of high grade crushed limestone rock. Bassett said he has determined it will take about 14 tons of crushed limestone to double its capacity to clean 100,000 cubic feet per minute of exhaust air.

The secret to removing the harmful sulphur dioxide lies in having the limestone hot when the gases pass through, said Bassett. He said correct combination was discovered accidentally during experimentation with the machine when his assistant misunderstood his instructions and turned the gas burner used to heat the stone to its maximum output level.

"When the rock got to 300 degrees everything coming out of it (the exhaust) just disappeared," he said. "At 300 degrees, it takes out sulphur and fly ash."

To assure complete removal of pollutants from the exhaust air, the limestone is fired to between 350 and 400 degrees, he said. The tars, ammonia and sulphur pollutants are cleaned automatically from the limestone as it wears away while tumbling inside the steel mesh drum, he added.

Some fossil-fuel power generating plants under construction may utilize one-fifth of their potential generating capacity controlling pollution by using other control processes, Bassett said. "They could hook up this machine and do

away with the smokestacks," he said. "There wouldn't be any need for them."

He doesn't anticipate being able to produce any standard models of the machine. "Each one of these machines has to be designed for a job," he said. "We're not going to be able to go to work like with a Ford assembly line."

One of his machines is in use removing the dust from a ready-mix plant operation in Ogden, Utah, he said. His alfalfa mill scrubber was used to knock down the dust from the alfalfa particulate matter, he added.

Bassett estimates cost of the machine would be about \$1.60 per \$1.80 per 1,000 cubic feet of emission capacity.

New Ideas Fair Aims At Inventors

Inventors, manufacturers, investors, and curiosity seekers will converge on Hill City for the "Mid-America New Ideas Fair," March 18-19.

For the second year in a row, the Chamber of Commerce in this north-west Kansas community is sponsoring the unique program, which actually is a showplace for inventors. The idea behind the effort is to get inventors and investors together, with an eye on possible industrial growth.

The fair will give people with time or labor saving devices an opportunity to display their inventions to the general public and potential manufacturers.

The two-day event is expected to draw inventors from Kansas and neighboring states.

Exhibitors will pay a \$10 entry fee \$25 for manufacturers with patented inventions) which includes display space, electricity, and a ticket to the Awards Dinner the evening of March 18.

All exhibits will be judged and ribbons will be awarded for the top three inventions in each category. The categories are agriculture; automotive; construction equipment; electrical; household; novelty; safety; sports, recreation, and toys; tools; and miscellaneous.

Looking at the project from an area development standpoint, Graham county extension agent Jim Scott said there are many ideas being utilized in western Kansas today which could be mass-produced and sold in the area.

He indicated that 80 to 85 percent of new industry in Kansas last year was "home grown."

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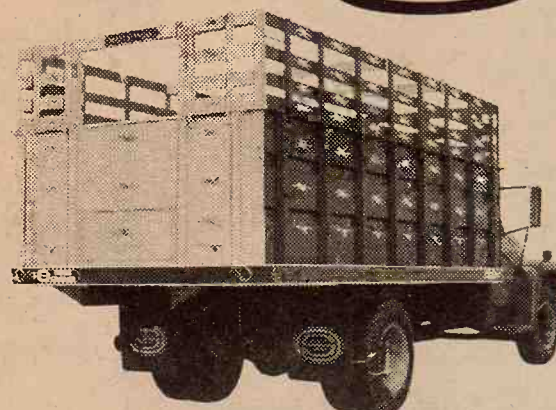
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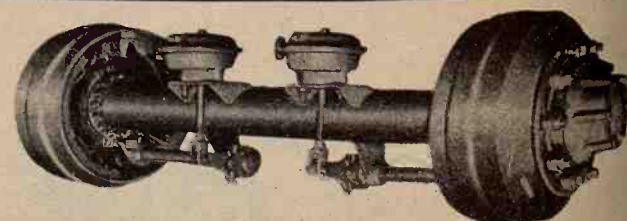
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Colleges May Cut Off Supply As Teacher Surplus Grows and Grows

Several major universities, besieged by mounting numbers of applicants for teacher training at a time when there is a national teacher surplus, are starting to limit admissions into their education schools.

Such leading institutions as Michigan State, Ohio State, the University of Colorado, Penn State, the University of Illinois and the University of Iowa are taking steps to curb teacher production. Moreover many colleges and universities are altering their curriculums to stress practical experience over theory in the education of teachers. They also are encouraging the teacher candidates to enter special areas—education of the mentally, physically and emotionally handicapped, for example—in which they are most needed.

The significance of tighter admissions standards and curriculum changes is underscored by the fact that students who earned certification as elementary and secondary teachers accounted for more than one-third of the 1 million persons who the United States Office of Education says received college degrees in the country last year.

If the present trend were permitted to continue, according to the National Education Association, there would be a surplus of 730,800 beginning teachers in five years. Educators say the dilemma they face is whether to restrict enrollments or to continue to allow virtually any student who can get into college to seek teacher certification even though teaching jobs are scarce.

Despite the tight job market most institutions of higher education still

take the position that they have no right to tell prospective teachers that they cannot enter the field.

"They are concerned that they may not be exercising good moral leadership in saying to a bright, committed youngster 'You should not do this because there is an oversupply already,'" Dr. Edward C. Pomeroy said. He is executive secretary of the American Association of Colleges for Teacher Education in Washington, to which 850 of the 1,200 institutions that prepare teachers belong.

What is happening increasingly, though, is that advisers and faculty members are increasing their efforts to make students more aware of the dire employment outlook.

"We're not trying to discourage people," said Donald J. McCarty, education dean at the University of Wisconsin. "But, in all fairness, you should let prospective students know that there is heavy competition for teaching jobs."

The rapid growth that took place in America's elementary and secondary schools during the last two decades, when school systems were begging for more teachers, has come to a virtual halt because of a drop in the number of births. Consequently if present staffing patterns are maintained, the teaching force—now 2,039,891—is not expected to be able to absorb the influx of new teachers that it did in the past.

The reaction of students to the shortage of teaching jobs ranges from despair to cocky optimism. Charles Reiff of the University of Missouri transferred out of education because he feared he would not be able to find a job; Sally Callan of the University of Wisconsin, as many other women

studying to be teachers, says she is willing and able to bide her time after graduation until a job comes along, and everywhere there are young persons who remain convinced the field has room for one more dedicated person of ability.

However word is filtering down to the students that they will enhance their employment prospects if they

specialize in such areas as education of the handicapped or the gifted, industrial arts, vocational and technical education and pre-kindergarten. A bleak picture is painted for those who concentrate on such fields as secondary English, social studies, foreign languages, home economics and men's physical education.

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'Hunters Worse Than Coyotes' -Henderson

"Most farmers and stockmen would agree that coyote hunters cause more problems than coyotes," notes Robert Henderson, Kansas' lone wildlife damage control bureau officer headquartered at Kansas State University. Henderson reacts quickly to destroy or capture livestock-killing predators roaming Kansas plains

but he views wanton killing of wildlife as undesirable and believes coyotes are maligned victims of man's prejudice and discrimination. He says this causes man to lose sight of the value coyotes have to man and agriculture.

Henderson's criticism of coyote hunters reflects the two-way street he travels in dealing with wildlife damage control.

He's quick to point out that coyote hunting is "a good sport," but says it is a fallacy to believe coyote hunters reduce farmer's predator losses.

"It's a good sport... but just like other hunters... a few have spoiled hunting" by abusing farmers and landowners, he said.

He said coyote hunters have found disfavor with farmers and stockmen because of hunting practices. Coyote hunters and their dogs flush coyotes, many times trespassing on private property during the pack's chase.

Following the dogs in radio-equipped cars and pickups, hunters have driven through farmers' electric fences, stampeding livestock.

Others have driven across planted fields, damaging crops. Gates left open are another complaint farmers have.

Stockmen also have complained that some coyote hunters, as well as jackrabbit hunters, use the "sport" as a coverup for cattle rustling. Cattlemen allege some coyote hunters have loaded stolen calves into enclosed dog carriers on pickups, Henderson related.

Henderson also discounted coyote hunters' claims of a need for bounty payments on coyotes and of coyote control by hunting coyotes.

During the bounty years, taxpayers paid coyote hunters between \$80,000 and \$100,000 annually—considerably more than today's controls, Henderson said. Presently predator control is financed under a \$15,000 budget.

Kansas paid a bounty on coyote kills for 93 years before halting the practice. At the time the bounty was reintroduced in the 1880s, the program's goal was eradication of Kansas' coyote population.

Henderson said Kansas probably had more coyotes in the 1940s than before the bounty payment had begun.

Predators, including coyotes, do cause extensive damage to livestock and Henderson estimated losses will run as high as \$600,000 in 1972, a record low.

But the losses will be inflicted by individuals within species, not by entire groups of predators, he said.

"Usually only a few individual coyotes are responsible for the stockman's loss," Henderson said. Although an area may have many coyotes, normally only one farmer or rancher in a township will have losses. By trapping and destroying the guilty killer, farmers are

protected as well as wildlife.

Henderson said coyote hunters usually hit areas where coyote populations are higher. The indiscriminate kills reduce coyote populations, making a better food supply available to remaining coyotes. Boosted by a plentiful food supply, which betters coyotes' health, coyotes produce larger litters with more survivors. Within a year, the coyote population equals or surpasses the number there before hunters came, he explained.

Coyotes are not always to blame for livestock kills. As much as 25 percent of losses blamed on coyotes actually are caused by other predators, including domestic dogs (at the top of the scale), raccoons, badgers, birds of prey, foxes, and bobcats, Henderson said.

In one instance in Western Kansas, a farmer blamed coyotes for killing baby pigs. Investigation found the killer was a golden eagle, a protected bird. The eagle was snared and placed in a zoo.

Coyotes also provide badly needed services to mankind. Their preferred diet is mice, rats, squirrels, gophers and other rodents which, uncontrolled, can devastate farms.

Henderson estimated each coyote saves farmers \$21 a year by eating mice and rabbits which destroy grain and grass.

A few years ago, Rocky Mountain cattlemen found their all-out war against coyotes and other predators had turned their ranches into gopher preserves.

Ban Poison In Control Of Predatory Animals

President Nixon has ordered the federal government to end its much protested practice of poisoning predatory animals, a program critics say has brought wholesale destruction of wildlife on Western rangelands.

Traps, gunfire and killing young animals in their dens by mechanical means will still be permitted under the presidential decree, said Jack Berryman, head of the Division of Wildlife Services that administers the predator control program.

The administration is expected to urge that more funds be spent on research to find ways to harmlessly reduce predator losses and authorize 50-50 matching grants permit states to conduct their own control programs.

The biggest beneficiaries of the old program are the Western woolgrowers, who claim losses as coyotes are increasing at the same time the price of wool drops.

NEW MEXICO SHOWS BUDGET SURPLUS AGAIN

Not all states have the tax blues. For the second time in three years New Mexico has a sizable budget excess. The legislature is going to decide whether to spend the \$10 million surplus for nonrecurring budget items or give it back to taxpayers.

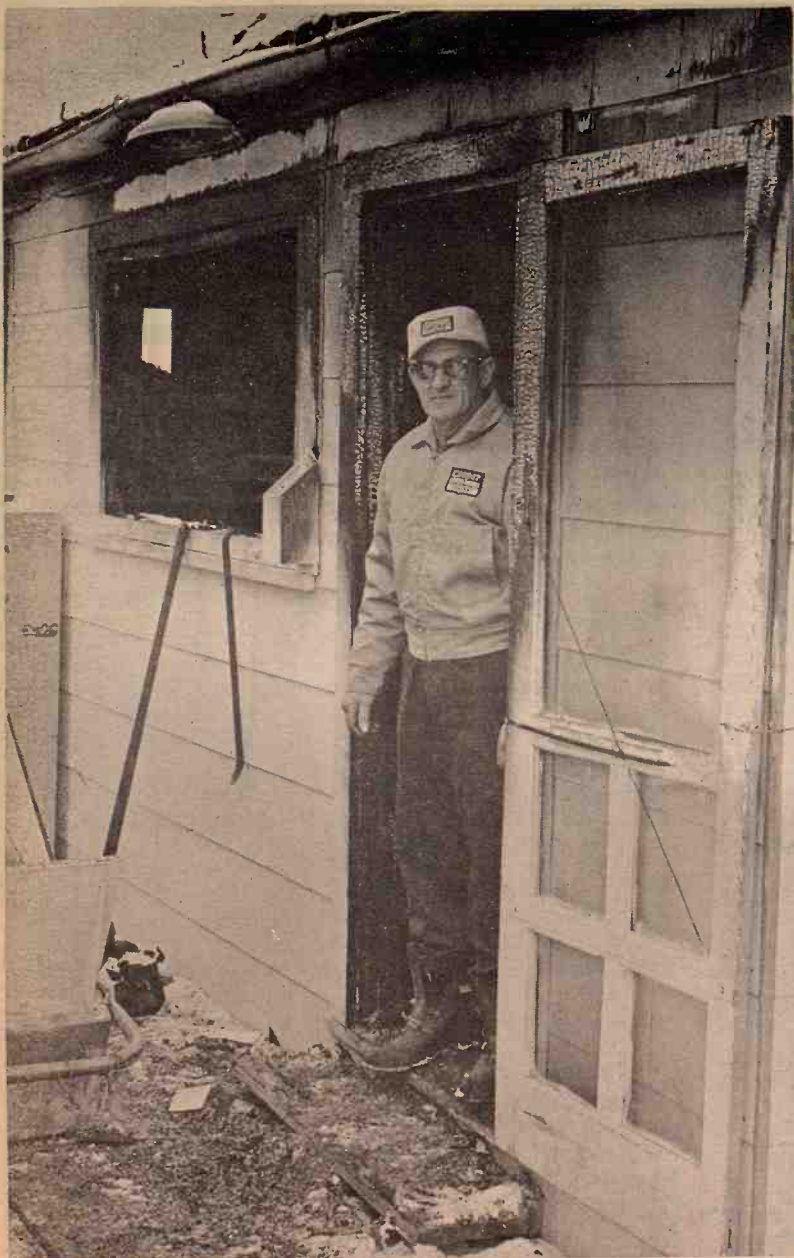

Reorganization Would Scatter USDA Army

A new, streamlined U.S. Department of Agriculture is foreseen in the rewrite of the departmental reorganization plan advocacy by the Nixon administration:

Secretary of Agriculture Earl L. Butz said the new department — if the bill passes — will have only 28,000 persons and an annual budget of \$5.2 billion. The budget would be trimmed by about half, along with about the same number of employees, it is believed.

"It will be a new department, better organized to serve its purpose and more accessible than its predecessor," Butz said. "For the first time in recent decades, all farmer-oriented services will be administered by a single politically responsible cabinet-level official who will be able to give his undivided attention to problems and needs of farmers, ranchers and other agricultural businessmen."

An estimated 8,400 employees and nearly \$1 billion in budget funds will go with the latter list to DCD, he said.

"The present alignment of departments and agencies in the federal structure is antiquated. It encourages wasteful duplication of services and competition among bureaucracies. It results in confusion among individuals and communities seeking assistance from the federal government," Butz said.

He added that REA, FHA had counterparts in the Department of Housing and Urban Development and Department of Transportation

and others. All better could be in a Department of Community Development, he said.

Under the new plans the Forest Service and Soil Conservation Service would be taken from USDA and put into a Department of National Resources.

The food assistance programs—food stamps, school lunches and other welfare programs administered by USDA would go to the Department of Human Resources.

Loss of the food stamp and school lunch programs along with other welfare programs, probably will not be particularly opposed. Loss of the

Kansas Calf Production Reaches Record High

Nearly two million calves were born on Kansas farms and ranches during 1971, up slightly from last year and a new record high, according to the Kansas Crop and Livestock Reporting Service.

The 1971 calf crop of 1,958,000 was 17 percent larger than 5 years earlier and 10 percent larger than an earlier peak reached in the mid 1950's.

The number of calves born in 1971 was 95 percent of the January 1, 1971 number of all cows that had calved. This percentage of cows that had calved is not strictly a calving rate because the January 1 inventory of cows that had calved does not include all heifers that calved during the year and includes some cows that died or were slaughtered before calving.

The 1971 calf crop for the United States is estimated at 46,974,000 head. This is 2 percent more than the 45,908,000 head in 1970.

Cows and heifers that have calved on farms and ranches January 1,

1971 totaled 49,947,000 head, 2 percent more than a year earlier. Calves born during 1971 totaled 94 percent of the January 1, 1971 inventory of cows and heifers.

This is not strictly a calving rate because the January 1 inventory of cows did not include young heifers which have had their first calf since that date. Also, the inventory included some cows that died or were slaughtered before calving.

Calves born during 1971 in the North Central States increased 3 percent from 1970 totaling 17,870,000. The East North Central States were up 1 percent while the West North Central States showed a 4 percent increase.

Missouri, the leading calf producing State in this region and second in the Nation, was up 5 percent from a year earlier.

The 1971 calf crop in the Southern States was up 2 percent to 18,019,000. The South Atlantic States registered a 4 percent gain while the South Central States were up 2 percent.

A 2 percent larger calf crop was produced in the Western States. Montana passed California as the leading calf producing State with a 3 percent gain while California was off 1 percent.

The North Atlantic Region was the only region which produced less calves in 1971 than in 1970. Output was down 2 percent to 2,275,600.

Mule Sense Leads To Book By Jack

"A mule has got more sense than most people," says Frank C. (Jack) Mills, Sterling.

Mills, 73, owned his first burro at age 10 in 1909 and began raising mules three years later — after buying his own jack. He went into the business with his father in 1915, continuing with the business until 1949. But, he still keeps mules on his farm near Sterling.

He attributes his association with the jack and mule business as a breeder, auctioneer, and buyer as his salvation during the depression years when his farming operations increased his debt rather than producing income.

To anyone who has ever been around a biting mule or Jack, Mills' description of how to break the critter from the habit is the liberal

application of the big end of a fence post over his head.

In a book Mills has written, he tells of the deviousness of mule and horse traders. His book traces the history of American jacks and mules that served the variety of farming and industrial jobs expected of them earlier this century and last. It has a glossary of horse and mule defects

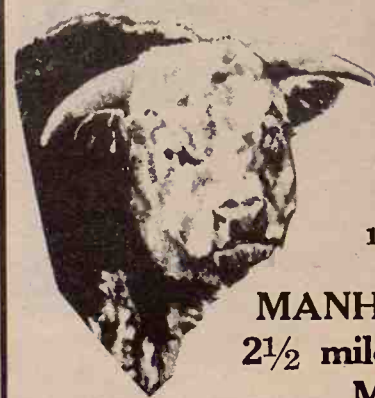

FARMERS UNION SUPPORT SEVERANCE TAX

Severance tax on gas and oil produc-
tion in Kansas would produce millions
of dollars annually in greatly needed tax
revenue for Kansas.
But two of our oil and gas produc-
tion states have enacted severance taxes
on oil and gas production.
Louisiana came into the Union with their
severance tax.
Should the oil and gas production of
the state be taxed at the Louisiana rate,
the state would receive about thirty
million dollars in tax revenue and under
the present rate some twenty million
dollars. Thus you see how grateful the
state is to someone.
While attached to the U.S. Army at Ft.
Oklahoma, my residence in Lawton,
Oklahoma, was taxed at about One Hun-
dred Dollars annually, my home in
Lawton, Oklahoma, which compares
the former Oklahoma home is
taxed at four hundred dollars. Thus the
severance tax revenue in Oklahoma
is a great decrease in real estate
taxes on residential property.
While the 1971 Kansas Legislature
passed down a severance tax the
state of Oklahoma added 2 per-
cent to their then 5 percent tax, with
an additional 2 percent yielding twen-
ty million additional revenue for Okla-
homa.
The gas that heats the homes of east-
ern Kansas is piped in from Oklahoma,
and Kansas is paying the severance
tax on it. Thus when a
owner in Topeka or Kansas City,
pays his gas bill for home heat-
ing he pays the 7 percent severance tax
by Oklahoma and in addition he
pays the 3 percent sales tax to the State of
Kansas with the present legislature
trying to increase the same to 5 per-
cent which is surely becoming ridiculous.
I am a member of our present Legislature
and I have introduced a bill for a 5
percent tax on oil and gas production
and I have thought "it might as well be
because it's not going to get any-
where and there's no use taking legisla-
tion with it." An awakened elec-

Vaccine Success Against Scours

LINCOLN, Neb. — A new calf
scours (diarrhea) vaccine
significantly reduced percentage of
calves that developed the disease
and those that died during extensive
field tests, University of Nebraska
veterinary scientists have revealed.
The vaccine is a result of research
by Dr. C.A. Mebus, Prof. N.R.
Underdahl, and Dr. M.J. Twiehaus
of the Veterinary Science Depart-
ment.
Drs. R.C. White, E.L. Stair, and
Asst. Prof. M.B. Rhodes helped in
organizing the field study, involving
9,583 calves in 35 herds, and in
collection and analysis of data and
pathologic specimens.
Ranchers administered the
vaccine, kept records of dates of
vaccination, serial numbers of the

vaccine, and dates of any observed
diarrhea. They also collected fecal
samples from scouring calves for
laboratory analysis.
The herds involved were divided
into two categories: Category 1, in
which the suspected virus had been
found in previous years, and
Category 2, in which calves were
then scouring.
In 15 of the 18 herds in Category 1,
vaccination reduced the percentage
of calves scouring, and in 17 of the 18
herds death losses were reduced,
according to Mebus.
In two herds of Category 1 ex-
periencing no reduction in the in-
cidence of scours, the owners
reported the calves were not as sick
and responded more quickly to
treatment than in previous years, he
said.
Vaccination reduced the incidence
of scours and deaths in 14 of the 17
herds in Category 2, Mebus said.
Why did the vaccine prove ef-
fective in all the herds?
The control of the target virus by
the vaccine unveiled a second virus
that is not affected by the vaccine,
Mebus said.
The scientists are now working
toward eventual testing of a vaccine
that will control the second virus.
Dr. Twiehaus believes that these
two viruses are the principal causes
of scours.
Until the Nebraska scientists
implicated a virus as the trigger for
calf scours, the bacterium E. Coli
was considered the prime cause.
The Nebraska research shows that
E. Coli is not the primary cause of
Nebraska calf scours, but when the
virus is present E. Coli can invade
blood and tissues and cause death.
Scientists have been trying to
learn the cause of calf scours for a
century. At present, the disease is
estimated to cost the beef and dairy
industries \$150 to \$250 million per
year.

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Co-op Council Hears USDA Bigwig Campbell

Farming is in a transition period, J. Phil Campbell, undersecretary of agriculture, said in an address at Topeka last week, with farmers

showing increased concern in what happens to their products after they leave the farm.

"Exploit these new opportunities to expand farmers' capacity to produce," he told delegates attending the annual meeting of the Kansas Cooperative Council. "Through cooperatives, find markets for your production."

"Farm policy is shifting in this direction. U.S. trade policy is working in this direction. With cooperatives and your leadership, we can build the necessary marketing road to turn farm productivity loose."

Co-ops succeed because business has failed to meet certain needs, Campbell said. "They must be tough and hard-headed to succeed in the highly competitive business they are in," he added.

The two greatest tasks confronting farmers in this era of transition, the official said, will be to determine

who will handle their products after they produce them and how to handle the necessary capital structure for their operations.

Campbell suggested these initiatives to be considered by farmers and their cooperatives:

Broaden efforts in product innovation, take on additional service functions in the marketing chain, expand export activities, make use of bargaining for price and other terms of sale, explore additional use of marketing orders, expand the use of existing cooperatives and further consolidate cooperative efforts.

The undersecretary noted that cooperatives now account for 33 per cent of all grain marketed, but only 13 per cent of livestock marketed.

"I suspect the farmers' support of cooperatives is higher in Kansas," Campbell said. "Yet it is intriguing to speculate what additional cost-savings and price improvement could be realized if tomorrow farmers doubled patronage of their own businesses."

In the matter of bargaining for price and other terms of sale, currently a hot issue, the undersecretary said the department has taken a favorable stance concerning the principle of bargaining. It does not favor all aspects of the bargaining bills now before Congress and he noted that all farmers do not agree on all aspects.

"Some harmonizing of views must take place," he said. Campbell said the Nixon administration is for cooperatives. He noted that Secretary Earl Butz announced at the recent annual meeting of the National Council of Farmers Cooperatives the establishment of special marketing teams to improve farm prices and net farm income.

They will focus their efforts on increasing farmers' marketing strength, increasing farm exports and improving the tax structure for farmers.

The undersecretary envisions expanded trade with Eastern Europe and the Soviet Union due to the lifting of the 50 per cent shipping requirement by President Nixon. This has opened the real possibility of additional sales of feed grains,

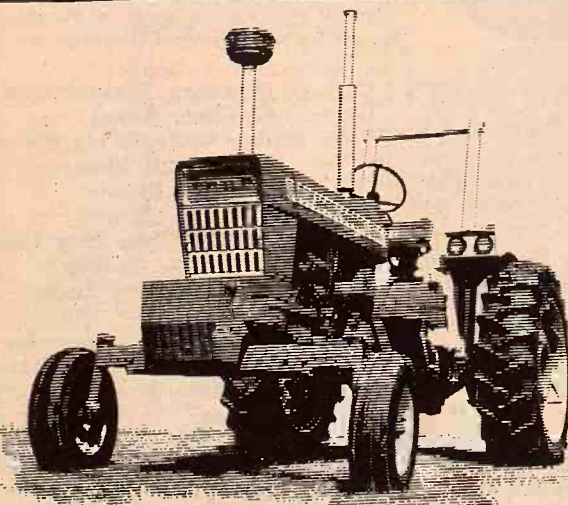

particularly wheat and soybeans.

He emphasized the need to keep ports of the nation open so that farm products can move. Legislation now before Congress to enlarge the President's authority to deal with crippling dock and transportation strikes, may now have tougher sledding, he said, because of the apparent end of the West Coast dock strike.

Campbell urged cooperatives, which he said are now evolving into greater leadership roles in their communities, to be alert and active in fighting inflation through exerting pressure on Congress.

Extend Loans On '71 Wheat, Milo

Kansas has announced a one-year extension of its federal price support loans for wheat and sorghum grain. The extension, or "reseed," enables a producer to store his grain for a year while having it under protection of price supports. Normally, farmers must redeem under loan by a maturity date set by the government assumption. The \$8 million loan extension plan for 1971-crop wheat and sorghum, in effect, gives quantities of grain from the government a longer time to be sold. Officials said the reseed plan also applies to the 1970-crop wheat still under loan in commercial warehouses. It will not apply to 1970-

crop sorghum in commercial storage. Farmers who have their own storage facilities previously were allowed to reseed 1971 wheat and feed grains under the support program. However, no reseed for 1971-corn in warehouses has been announced. The department said the 1971 sorghum crop was about 190 million bushels more than is needed this season. As of Jan. 1 there were 82 million bushels of 1971 sorghum under loan in warehouses and 28 million on farms. The wheat supply also is much larger than needed, with an expected carryover next July 1 of 970 million bushels, the most in nearly a decade and 240 million more than the surplus totaled last

summer. On Jan. 1 farmers had 167 million bushels of 1971 wheat under loan in warehouses and 192.3 million locked up in farm bins, the department said.

Livestock Values Up 22% In Year

Kansas farmers and ranchers began the 1972 year with cattle numbers at a record high and sheep numbers quite small though up slightly from last year, and hog numbers fairly large but down moderately from a year earlier, according to the Kansas Crop and Livestock Reporting Service.

Cattle and calves on January 1, 1972 totaled 6,757,000 head, 4 percent above a year earlier and a new record high.

All sheep and lambs totaled 337,000 head on January 1, 1972, up 3 percent from last year, but otherwise smallest since the 1920's.

Hogs and pigs totaled 2,100,000 head on December 1, 1971, down 5 percent from a year earlier, but otherwise largest since the 1940's.

Total value of all livestock and poultry on Kansas farms and ranches January 1, 1972 was \$1.4 billion, up 22 percent from last year and the highest of record.

Cattle

All cattle and calves on Kansas farms on January 1, 1972 numbered 6,757,000 head, up 4 percent from a year ago and the largest number of record for the State.

The increase from a year ago reflects a larger beef breeding herd, and more cattle on feed in new and expanded commercial feedlots. These were supported by a large calf crop and sharply increased inshipments of feeder stock.

All cattle classes increased from a year ago except milk cows and milk replacement heifers.

All cows that had calved totaled 2,111,000 head, 2 percent more than a year ago. Beef cows totaled 1,919,000 head, up 3 percent from January 1 last year.

Steers weighing 500 pounds or more totaled 1,622,000 head, up 7 percent from last year.

Calves weighing less than 500 pounds numbered 2,047,000 head, a 4 percent increase from 1971.

Heifers for beef cow replacement weighing 500 pounds or more totaled 311,000 head, 4 percent more than last year. Heifers other than for beef cow or milk cow replacement, at 514,000 head, were 3 percent above last year.

Milk cows totaled 192,000 head, down 2 percent from a year ago. Milk cow replacement heifers weighing 500 pounds or more numbered 58,000 head, unchanged from last year.

Bulls weighing 500 pounds or more totaled 94,000 head, compared with 91,000 last year.

The average value per head of all cattle and calves this year was \$200.00 compared with \$170.00 a year ago.

The total value of all cattle and

calves on January 1 was \$1,351,400,000 up 22 percent from last year.

Sheep

The number of sheep and lambs on Kansas farms totaled 337,000 head on January 1, an increase of 3 percent from last year but otherwise smallest in nearly a half century.

Sheep and lambs on feed for slaughter market at 97,000 head increased 29 percent from last year. Stock sheep totaled 240,000 head, a decrease of 5 percent from 1971. Ewes one year old and older totaled 198,000 head, down 3 percent from last year.

The value of all sheep and lambs on January 1, 1972 was \$7,414,000, 16 percent more than last year.

Hogs

Hog and pig numbers on Kansas farms on December 1, 1971 totaled 2,100,000, down 5 percent from a year earlier. Breeding hogs numbered 273,000 head, down 8 percent from last year while market hogs totaled 1,827,000 head, 4 percent less.

The value of all hogs and pigs on December 1, 1971 was \$55,650,000 up 20 percent from last year, while the average value per head at \$26.50 compared with \$21.00 a year ago.

United States

The January 1, 1972 inventory

estimates of livestock on U.S. farms and ranches show more cattle and calves, but fewer sheep and lambs than a year earlier.

Cattle and calves on farms and ranches on January 1, 1972 totaled 117.9 million, up 3 percent from a year earlier.

Cows and heifers that have calved were up 2 percent with beef cows up 3 percent, but milk cows were down 1 percent. There were 18.5 million sheep and lambs on farms and ranches January 1, 6 percent less than a year earlier.

Stock sheep numbers totaled 15.8 million, down 7 percent, and sheep and lambs on feed totaled 2.7 million, 3 percent more than a year earlier.

The value of all livestock and poultry on the Nation's farms and ranches totaled \$27.4 billion, up 15 percent from the \$23.7 billion a year earlier.

Meat animals (cattle, hogs and sheep) accounted for \$26.8 billion, compared with \$23.2 billion a year earlier. The inventory value of cattle and calves on January 1, 1972 totaled \$24.6 billion, up 16 percent from a year earlier.

The sheep and lamb inventory as of January 1, 1972 was valued at \$424 million, down 9 percent from a year earlier.

practices by the companies was an unreasonable restraint of trade and violates the Sherman Antitrust Act.

It asked that the practices be stopped, and sought other, specified relief.

Yearly Studies On Cattle Germ Plasm

Nebraska Livestock Research Center

CENTER, Neb. — Preliminary reports on the first calf crop of the Cattle Germ Plasm Program at the U.S. Livestock Research Center here released by Director Gregory.

Gregory said the report is strictly preliminary, inasmuch as two additional calf crops will be included in this cycle of breeds. Also, fertility and maternal milk production will be obtained on the second calf crop. The second calf crop will be born this coming spring.

The germ plasm evaluation is designed to characterize the full range of traits relating to growth, efficiency, reproduction, ability and carcass and meat traits. Gregory said the basic plan is to develop an unimproved farm, up to 15 percent better than a year earlier.

characterize Hereford, Angus, Jersey, South Devon, Limousin, Simmental and Charolais as representatives of different biological types. The data relating to calving difficulty, pre-weaning growth, post-weaning growth and feed efficiency, and carcass and meat traits relating to composition and quality are being noted and will be finally reported.

The results are too detailed for easy summarization from the tabular form. But some generalizations can be drawn.

In the calving difficulty test involving various bull breeds on two-year-old females, results were about what stockmen might expect. Jersey bulls on Hereford and Angus heifers registered the highest percentage of "no difficulty" births. However, even 14 percent of the Jersey-Hereford births were with "major difficulty."

Hereford bulls on Hereford heifers tallied 32 percent of births with no difficulty but 52 percent with major difficulty. Angus bulls on Hereford heifers showed 43 percent with no difficulty but 46 percent with major

difficulty. Hereford bulls on Angus heifers had 68 percent with no difficulty but 28 percent with major difficulty.

Exotic breed bulls — Limousin, Simmental and Charolais — all showed small percentages of no difficulty births on the British breed two-year-old heifers and large percentages of major difficulty births. The number of caesarian births was largest in the Simmental on Hereford and Angus heifers category.

In the post-weaning phase of the trials, all breeds averaged daily gains of 2.45 pounds per day and TDN efficiency of 6.35. Straight-bred Angus and Hereford steers averaged daily gain of 2.37 pounds per day and feed efficiency of 6.33. Angus-Hereford and Hereford-Angus crosses averaged 2.41 pounds per day with feed efficiency of 6.45. Simmental had 2.63 pounds per day, 6.13 feed efficiency; Charolais 2.60 pounds and 6.17; Limousin, 2.41 pounds and 6.21; South Devon 2.53 pounds and 6.31.

Angus steers led the grading percentage phase, but a Limousin scored the highest dressing percentage, 61.9. The Limousin-cross steers made the highest yield grade (2.5) and scored the largest rib-eyes (13 sq. in.)

The right side of each carcass was taken to Kansas State University to get the detailed cut-out and meat quality data. Also one steak was removed from each carcass at the 11th rib for Warner-Bratzler shear test tenderness determination. Scores appeared to be too closely grouped to indicate any significant differences in tenderness or taste.

Farm Exports At Record Pace Despite Strike

U.S. farm exports last year soared to a record \$7.7 billion, despite nationwide dock strikes.

The 1971 calendar-year total is \$500 million higher than the previous record of \$7.2 billion set in 1970.

Exports also are tallied on a fiscal-year basis from July 1 through the following June 30. In fiscal 1970-71, exports totaled \$7.8 billion, a record for a fiscal year.

Earl L. Butz, Agriculture secretary, among others, has spoken out sharply about dock stoppages hurting U.S. farm exports. Department sources say privately the dollar value of shipments last year would have been more than the record \$7.7 billion if the stoppages had not occurred. Butz also has said the United States loses export momentum when stoppages occur.

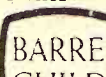

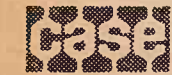

More Detail On Set-Aside Changes

The most significant change in the 1972 wheat and feed grain program is that a farmer must set aside 83 per cent rather than 75 per cent of his domestic allotment for conserving uses, ASCS county directors are telling G&G area farmers.

They say no crops can be harvested on the "set aside" acreage. The domestic allotment is based on the amount of wheat consumed by the public or used for livestock feed in the nation. Each farmer who signs into the wheat program shares in wheat certificates, a payment to the farmer for idling his land to control production.

Two other changes are:

- Additional set-aside wheat. If a farmer wants to set aside additional acres, the payment is 94 cents per bushel, times the farm's wheat yield, times the additional acreage set aside. This is limited to 75 per cent of the domestic allotment.

- If a farmer had a 100-acre domestic allotment, the required set aside would be 83 acres. This qualifies the farm for certificate payments and the commodity price-support loans on wheat. The additional, optional set aside would be as much as 75 acres for which the payment would be 94 cents per bushel, times the farm yield, times the additional set aside.

- In order to not lose this domestic allotment, a farmer must plant at least 90 per cent of his domestic allotment of wheat. On feed grains he must plant at least 45 per cent of his total feed grain base, Searls said. Assume a farmer has a domestic

allotment of 100 acres of wheat and 100 acres of feed grain base. To protect the history of his production he must plant 90 acres of wheat and 45 acres of feed grains such as barley, corn and grain sorghum.

Wheat acres in excess of wheat allotment can be used to protect his feed-grain base. Feed-grain acres in excess of 50 per cent of the total base can be used to protect the wheat allotment, ASCS said.

"Say the farmer has a 100-acre domestic wheat allotment and a 100-acre feed-grain base, and plants 150 acres of wheat, his wheat allotment and feed grain base are protected."

For 1972, soybeans may be planted and substituted as feed grain or wheat to protect his allotment and base.

In order to participate in the feed-grain program, he must sign up by March 10 and divert or set aside 25 per cent of his base. This compares with 20 per cent required the past year. Barley is also included in the feed-grain base this year, he said.

An option in the feed-grain program is that a farmer may set aside 5 or 10 per cent of the corn or grain sorghum base subject to acceptance by the secretary of agriculture.

ASCS warns that land designated as set aside acreage must be cropland capable of producing a crop, land which, in the absence of the program, would normally be devoted to agricultural purposes.

A farmer's set aside acres must be maintained in approved conservation uses.

The farmer's wheat certificates are the difference between parity prices for wheat on July 1, 1972, and the average national market price farmers receive for wheat during the first five months of the marketing year beginning July 1, 1972. An estimated 75 per cent will be paid basic allowances on July 1. Parity and balance, if any, will be paid after Dec. 1, 1972.

Believe Barn Fire Was Set

Arson was believed involved in the burning of a barn, containing 1,500 bales of hay, on the Glen Ruhnke farm south of Junction City.

The farm is located about 10 miles south of Junction City in the Lyons Creek area. The farmstead was not in use.

The fire was discovered by two Geary county sheriff's deputies, Kenneth Kidd and Don Printy, when they noticed a glow in the sky. Two county fire trucks were sent to the scene, but could do little more than watch the fire burn out. The barn was built of stone, but the roof was burned off as well as the interior structure.

Sheriff James Gross said there

was indication the fire had been set. He also pointed out it was the fourth similar fire in that area in the past few months. The investigation is being continued.

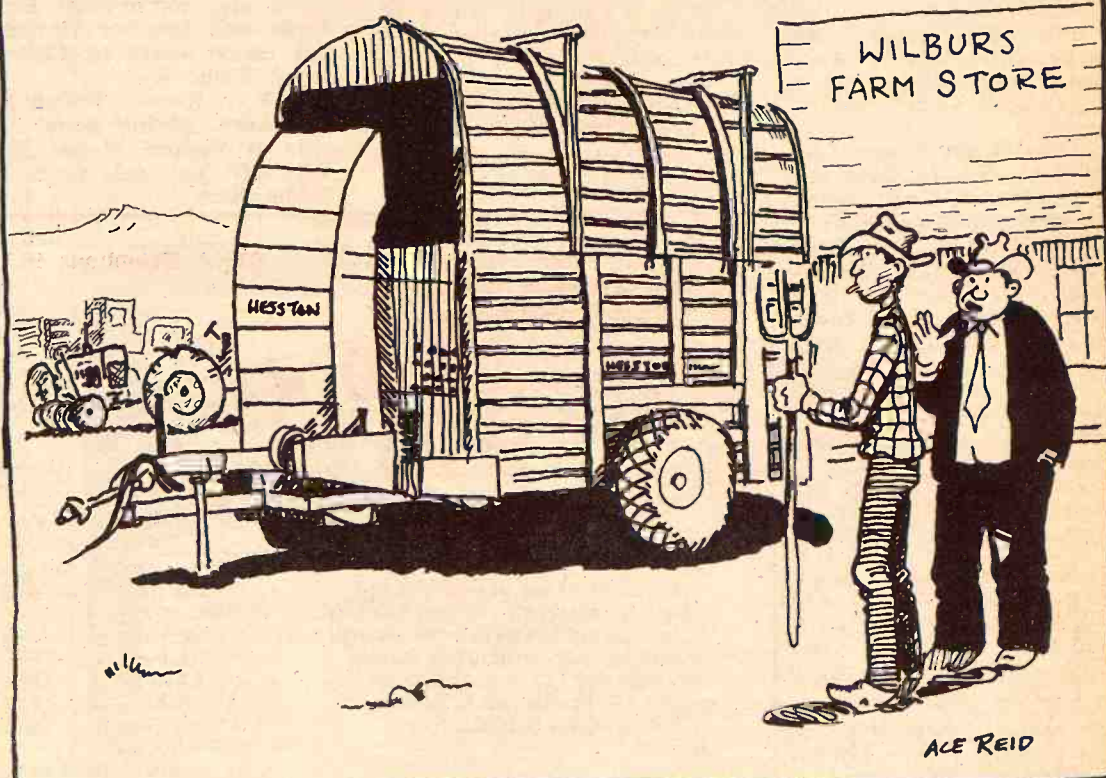

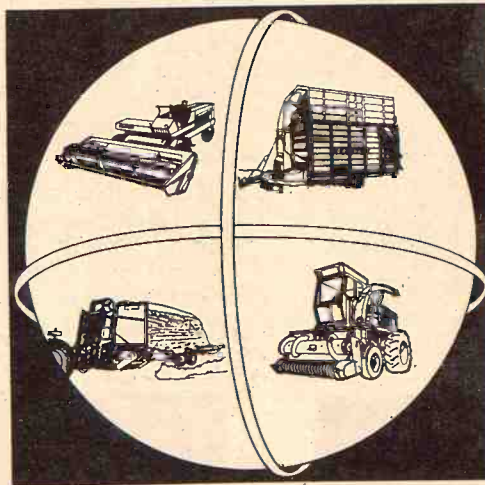

25 Years to Pass '47 Farm Income

If livestock prices hold up, farmers may realize record net incomes. They may ruefully find that if the record profit does come about, it will have taken 25 years to pass the previous 1947 high, \$17.1 billion.

A federal report last week made a

more favorable prediction on farm income than previous USDA estimates. The new report estimates income will go up \$1.5 billion to \$2 billion over last year's \$15.7 billion farm profit. Previously, USDA figures had guessed on about \$1 billion in increase.

The \$15.7 billion figure for 1971 was the same as the 1970 calculated farm profit.

The USDA February report linked

food prices to the higher farm income, predicting that food prices would increase about 4.5 percent during the year. Food prices inflated by 2.4 percent during 1971, according to the USDA reckoning.

Prices of raw farm products are not subject to controls under the

administration's phase 2 economic plan and storekeepers pass on added cost to consumers.

Agriculture Secretary Earl Butz, speaking at a dinner at Fargo, N.D., last week, acknowledged that farmers may be put on the defensive about higher incomes and higher

food prices. "It's about time," farm prices should rise, Butz said. "Yet I want to remind you that as your prices improve and begin to reflect in markups at retail counters, we may have a fight on our hands."
