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





WASHINGTON LEADERSHIP CONFERENCE



FFA OPERATION UPDATE

The FFA Operation Update program has been designed to achieve two specific objectives: to increase FFA member involvement in FFA activities as a part of instruction in all high school agriculture programs, and to increase FFA membership; therefore closing the gap between agriculture education enrollment, which was 550,823 in 1970, and FFA membership, which was 427,888 for the same period of time.

The national meeting will be held in Lincoln, Nebraska, beginning with a noon luncheon on August 22 and ending at 3:00 p. m., August 23. All interested FFA members and advisors are invited and urged to attend.

EVERY VO-AG STUDENT AN FFA MEMBER

Those who have participated in FFA activities are aware of the value in becoming involved in such worthwhile activities. Some of our students in vocational agriculture either have not been motivated or have not seen the opportunities in participating in FFA activities. There are approximately 8,500 high school students enrolled in agricultural education, with a total FFA membership of 6,146. This means that approximately 2,354 students have chosen not to become FFA members.

The value of the FFA as a leadership development facility has been proven, and our challenge is to sell the FFA to all enrolled in vocational agriculture. This will require clear thinking on the part of the chapter officers and advisor in presenting a program that is appealing. Each chapter needs to set a goal of FFA membership. Many are to be congratulated now for reaching this objective.

Let's all accept the challenge of the Kansas Association of FFA reaching a goal of 6,500 members for the year 1972-73!

NOTHING HAPPENS IN THE SUMMERTIME

I would challenge FFA members to prove that this statement is not true. Many worthwhile activities are performed during the summer months.

Public relations activities should be going on during the summer. All vocational agriculture teachers should have an organized program of activities in public relations. These activities should be grounded on real interest, sincerity, and integrity. Any program lacking these essentials will soon become apparent to the general public and the esteem of the teachers and the program in vocational agriculture will diminish. Keeping the public informed of a good program of activities is as important as doing a good job of teaching. The teacher should take advantage of all opportunities to recognize individuals and groups for their accomplishments.

Advance planning is necessary in order that less will be overlooked. Many stories may be prepared in advance for release at a certain time. However, immediate news is the best type of story with personal interest stories following close behind.
