KANSAS 4-H APPRECIATION WEEK June 5-10

Most of us want to have good manners. We are aware that the greatest social asset that a man or woman can have is charm, and charm cannot exist without good manners. This does not mean slavishly following some rules, but using habitually manners polished by the continuous practice of kind impulses. How can we define good manners? To be well mannered means to do the thing you should do, although you are not obliged to do it.

Courtesy is far and away the most effective quality to lift you above the crowd. It makes you treat every person with such consideration that their memory of you will be pleasant. Ralph Waldo Emerson expressed a true idea of courtesy in his "Conduct of Life." Some people brush off good manners as being superficial, but Emerson said: "Manners are the happy way of doing things. If they are superficial, so are the dew drops which give such depth of the morning meadows."

Another author has said, "Manners are the knives and forks of life. One who knows how to use them will not be satisfied to eat with his hands." Expressing appreciation is no more than good manners in action. One of the important opportunities and responsibilities for volunteer leaders is that of teaching 4-H members to express appreciation for the cooperation of 4-H friends and donors. There are two separate and yet closely interlocked benefits when 4-H members are helped to say "thanks": one obviously is the development within the youngster of the valuable attitude to automatically express appreciation, the other benefit is the importance of saying "thank you," both to obtaining and retaining support of the 4-H program.

Opportunities for practicing both these advantages are available during Kansas 4-H Appreciation Week, June 5-10. This time is especially set aside to focus attention of 4-H members, leaders, parents and friends on the many possibilities of finding a suitable means of appreciation for the encouragement and support of 4-H work.

In another part of this issue of the Journal, you will find specific suggestions to help you plan and observe Kansas 4-H Appreciation Week, at almost any level of intensity and depth.

Perhaps no one ever expressed the feeling so well as Shakespeare, when he wrote: "I can but no other answer make, than thanks, and thanks, and thanks." This will be your best opportunity this year to say, "Thanks for helping 4-H."

Borst Is First Area Youth Specialist

The first area Extension 4-H and other youth programs specialist in Kansas is William H. Borst, his new duties started on April 1 in Concordia.

Borst, Wyandotte County 4-H agent for the past 12 years, will assist county Extension agents in 4-H program planning and development in Clay, Cloud, Jewell, Lincoln, Mitchell, Ottawa, and Republic counties, explains Dr. Harold E. Jones, director of the Cooperative Extension Service, Kansas State University.

A graduate of KSU, Borst earned a M.S. degree in Extension education from Colorado State University. The new area specialist entered the Kansas Extension Service in 1953 as Osborne County 4-H agent. Prior to this he was a veteran on-the-job training instructor for 3 years.





Did nutrition study of teenagers in relationship to the "Grow and Glow" program.




I am presently working on personal development projects in the areas of career exploration, manners, character development, and relationship with others.

Meeting The Need

Kansas' most important resource is boys and girls. Developing fine young people into straight-forward, upright, self-reliant citizens is a responsibility we recognize as important.

For a stronger 4-H program, finances are necessary if the goals or objectives are to be achieved. Many needs, such as the following, have been met, or partially met, with funds from 1966 donors to the Kansas 4-H Foundation:

The backbone of a successful 4-H program is the volunteer leader who works directly with 4-H members. Foundation scholarships to leaders to State 4-H Training Programs have helped materially.

The Kansas 4-H Journal has been a great asset to the 4-H Club program. It makes a worthwhile contribution to youth, and is admired and envied by many states. The Journal serves as an idea exchange for leaders and members. It creates interest, builds enthusiasm and promotes recruitment among young people, and serves as a teaching tool. Placing it in libraries and grade school classrooms throughout the state brings the 4-H program to the favorable attention of school administrators, teachers and pupils.

The promotional 15 minute movie, "The Kansas 4-H Story", is now in the advanced planning stage. It is designed to inform and promote club work.

Through the resources of the Foundation, 16 college scholarships are awarded to deserving, qualified young men and women annually. This is a great service to those wishing to continue their education, and finding it difficult without financial assistance.

Closely associated with scholarships has been the need for college housing for former 4-H girls. The Foundation has made this possible, and a 4-H scholarship house will open at Kansas State University this fall.

Research and studies in the best ways of doing 4-H Club work are needed. As a result of a Kansas study group's visit to another state, several new approaches to 4-H work have become a part of our program.

Awards are useful to attract young people to this voluntary, but most valuable, educational program. The Foundation provides many awards for recognizing achievements of deserving individuals in 4-H.

The 4-H program needs facilities for special leadership training among its youth. Rock Springs Ranch, a Foundation project, goes far in meeting this need.

Kansas is a leading state in the International Farm Youth Exchange. This program is held in high esteem. Due to assistance from the Foundation, the county's share for its delegates has been reduced from \$1000 to \$700.

I know of no greater service than that of providing a program for developing better and more useful citizens for tomorrow through 4-H work.



Rock Springs Ranch


This was the 21st year for Rock Springs Ranch, State 4-H Center. Each year has seen an increase in use; from its first year, 1946, with 2,267 to more than 15,000 in 1966. More than 112,000 meals were served during the 252 days Rock Springs was in operation last year. Some 16,000 representing more than 150 organizations and groups will use the Center in 1967.

County 4-H camps will be attended by some 5,500 boys and girls from 75 Kansas counties this summer. In addition to 4-H, many schools, churches, and various organizations are scheduled.


Increased use of the primitive camping area is expected this summer. Approximately 50 campers can be accommodated. Those using the primitive area prepare their food, pitch their pup tents, and sleep on the ground.

Recent improvements include a 1.6 acre lake where fishing and water safety will be demonstrated; a 64-unit winterized dormitory which brings available housing to 500 for summer and 220 for winter usage, and a machinery storage building for protection of large machinery and equipment.

The 1967 art exhibit in Williams Hall includes 18 paintings by amateur Kansas artists. This is a

The development plan for the Center, a project of Kansas 4-H Foundation, calls for additional winterized housing, a headquarters building, gymnasium, staff housing, guest lodge, and small group meeting rooms. A site for an old country church, one-room school house, and a "red barn" has been set aside. These buildings will be used for worship services, meetings, and recreation while preserving for posterity some of our State's early history.





We are aware of new and greater challenges to education. We pledge continued efforts to help strengthen our public school system and improve educational opportunities for young people.

We urge all Farm Bureaus to work vigorously to meet present and future needs for financing elementary and secondary education from state and local funds.

The administration and basic financing of higher education are quite properly a state, local, and private responsibility. Any further expansion of supplemental federal assistance should be based on adequate study and demonstrated need. We favor increased deductions or tax credits to individuals to help defray the costs of higher education.

We urge that vocational training in agriculture, related industries, and home economics be given adequate emphasis and financed according to present practices. State and local groups should retain primary responsibility for vocational programs.

1 c. coarsely ground cooked potatoes

 $\frac{1}{2}$ c. coarsely ground onion

 $\frac{1}{4}$ c. chopped parsley

1 tsp. salt

Dash Pepper

2 tsp. Worcestershire sauce

1 6-ounce can evaporated milk

1/3 c. slightly crushed corn flakes 1 tbsp. butter or margarine, melted

Lightly mix beef, potatoes, onion, parsley, salt, pepper, Worcestershire sauce, and milk. Turn into greased 1-quart casserole. Mix corn flakes and butter; sprinkle over top. Bake in moderate oven (350°) 30 minutes or till heated through. Pass ketchup and mustard. Makes 4 servings.

Rhubarb Dream Dessert

- 1 cup flour
- 5 tbsp. powdered sugar
- $\frac{1}{2}$ c. margarine 2 eggs, beaten
- $1\frac{1}{2}$ c. sugar
- $\frac{1}{4}$ c. flour
- 3/4 tsp. salt
- 2 c. rhubarb, chopped

Mix first 3 ingredients and pat in bottom of a 7 x 11 inch baking pan. Bake at 350° 15 minutes. Mix remaining ingredients and pour into baked crust. Bake 35 minutes at 350°. Serves 6.

Streusel Coffee Cake

Topping

 $\frac{1}{2}$ c. brown sugar

- 2 tbsp. flour
- 2 tsp. cinnamon 2 tbsp. melted butter
- $\frac{1}{2}$ c. chopped nuts

Mix together thoroughly.

- 1 egg
- $1 \frac{1}{2}$ c. flour

2 tsp. baking pwdr.

 $\frac{1}{2}$ tsp. salt

 $\frac{1}{2}$ c. milk

Mix together sugar, shortening and egg. Sift flour, baking powder and salt together and add this to the other mixture and stir in milk. Pour half of the cake batter in a greased and floured 9 in. square pan. Pour on half of the topping then the rest of the batter and finally the rest of the topping. Bake at 375° for 25-35 min.






