40 Pigs A Year Out Of Auto - Sow

The farm of the future that visionaries like to write and talk about is arriving bit-by-bit in current agriculture. Plowing by remote control and dial-a-rain machines are still off in the distance, but scientists are developing techniques and technology that could greatly

increase production without expanding acreage or labor. Among the new developments is the Autosow, which is a kind of mechanical mother for pigs. Some of the new developments are expected to cause nothing less than revolutionary changes. Such is the case with the Autosow. Developed by James Lecce at North Carolina State University at Raleigh. Lecce says the Autosow could turn the pig farm into a mass production industry much as the incubator and brooder expanded poultry output.

Two Autosows are in operation, one at the university and the other at Max Planck Institute in Germany. The Autosow system receives the pigs at birth, feeds them in isolated environment and produces animals of unexcelled health and quality, Dr. Lecce says. The Autosow pigs initially grow slightly slower than sow-nursed animals, but they catch up in the first 10 days. During the first two weeks of age, experimental Autosow pigs showed an amazing feed-conversion ratio, gaining 1.7 grams of weight for every gram of feed eaten. Between the fourth and fifth weeks, after they were removed from the machine and put on a diet of milk and feed, the pigs gained 1.2 pounds daily. The Autosow has other advantages, too. The equipment practically eliminates infant mortality and produces no runt pigs. The animals are free of pathogens, parasites and other harmful organisms common in pigs reared in a free environment. The number of pigs fed isn't dependent on the sow's limited feeding capacity or the volume and length of her lactation. Pig production per sow theoretically could increase to three litters from two and exceed 40 pigs annually instead of 14 to 20, Dr. Lecce claims. Moreover, says Dr. H. A. Stewart, North Carolina State's director of animal research, "We could tailor the product (market pig) any way we wished." As a comparison, he cited geneticists in the poultry industry who had manipulated turkey

Kanopolis Expects No. 8 Million Visitor By July

LAKE KANOPOLIS — The eight millionth visitor to Kanopolis lake and state park has a surprise coming. He or she is expected to arrive shortly before the Fourth of July, according to the U.S. Army Corps of Engineers, and a big celebration is being planned. The celebration, which will coincide with the dam and reservoir's 20th anniversary year, will include motorcycle races, square dancing, horseshoes, a fishing contest and other outdoor entertainment. The prediction is based on actual head count and traffic count, plus a good bit of guesswork on how many people will visit the lake during the Memorial Day weekend. The person chosen as the eight-millionth visitor will be guest of honor during the Fourth of July observance, and will receive many gifts and courtesies from merchants, businesses and others interested in Lake Kanopolis. The celebration will be under the sponsorship of the Lake Kanopolis Development Association, Inc., in cooperation with the Kansas City District of the Corps of Engineers and the Kansas Park and Resources authority. The Lake Kanopolis Development Association was formed by the chambers of commerce in surrounding towns to publicize the lake and help secure facilities. Virgil Lundberg, Salina, is president of the association. He said preliminary plans for the celebration have been made, and a final program will be announced soon.

breeding to produce a bird with a large breast and a broiler chicken with a desired shape, feather growth, feed conversion and so on. As a result, a 3.5 pound frying chicken is produced today in eight weeks on 7.5 pounds of feed. In 1933, that size broiler required 14 weeks and 18 pounds of feed. Better feeds and vastly improved management contributed to the increased efficiency.

Corporation Farms Catch Eye Of Congress

A Senate investigation of the effects of corporation farming has been announced by Senator Gaylord Nelson. Nelson, chairman of the Monopoly Subcommittee of the Senate Small Business Committee, said that his subcommittee would conduct hearings in at least three states including Wisconsin during the next four months. The first session is scheduled for Omaha on Monday, May 20. Dates for subsequent hearings will be announced later. "Incorporation by family farmers is not at issue," Nelson said. "Instead, it is the rapid movement of large conglomerate corporations and other non-agricultural interests into farming, resulting in family farms being pushed out of business. "We are rapidly approaching the time when this nation must decide whether the family farm — defined in terms of both size and degree of managerial independence — is forced from the American scene."

Major Hereford Show Ring Change

Announcing a dramatic series of sweeping changes, the American Hereford Association has accomplished a nearly complete overhaul of its traditional stock show procedures. "Future Hereford shows are going to reflect the most modern ideas in today's beef business," W. T. Berry, Jr., AHA Executive Secretary said. Among the progressive moves are an all-out effort to increase

emphasis on muscling and reduce the amount of finish on breeding cattle; furnishing judges the weight-per-day-of-age on each animal; lining up cattle in the catalog and show ring according to age; the complete elimination of nurse cows at shows; discontinuing several classes and renaming and reclassifying breeding classes.

Commenting on these changes, Berry said, "We want more people to attend livestock shows, and especially the new registered breeders and the commercial producers. We want cowmen to see what our breeders are doing and make their attendance of Hereford shows worthwhile. We are determined to make our show cattle the most practical and profitable models of our breed — exemplary in every way of what the beef industry needs."

Breeding cattle will, henceforth, be identified by birth dates and age in months to more closely identify age of cattle.



The Association has eliminated the junior bull calf class during the fall season and the spring bull calf class in shows after the first of the year. Also eliminated for the entire show season are the senior and junior yearling heifer classes. The junior heifer class has been eliminated during the fall season, and the spring heifer calf class is dropped from the spring season. All group classes will remain unchanged.

Coincident with the action on breeding shows, the AHA is contacting all Fair Managers, as well as Extension and FFA personnel, recommending that steer shows be revised to include:

- A. Recommend all fairs consider new steer classifications with more emphasis on establishing higher minimum weights.
- B. The combination of carcass shows with the regular steer shows and the slaughter of the top few steers in each class.
- C. Dental examination or other appropriate tests for age to make weight-per-day-of-age take its proper place in steer evaluation.
- D. Tattoo or otherwise permanently identify all steers.

State May Lose Roadside Park Funds

The state highway department's roadside park construction program may come to a screeching halt at the end of the current fiscal year.

On June 30, federal highway beautification funds will run out and highway department officials are pessimistic that Congress will continue to appropriate money for the program.

Since the 1965 highway beautification program was enacted, with the strong backing of Mrs. Lyndon Johnson, Kansas has collected between \$750,000 and \$1 annually for parks, overlooks and landscape planting projects.

The state will receive about \$800,000 in federal beautification funds in this fiscal year.

Under the plan, the federal government pays 100 percent of the costs. The state pays only after the project is completed.

Should the state decide to continue the program, the money would have to come entirely from state highway funds, previously earmarked for construction.

"It means we've got to make a decision between beauty and playgrounds and road construction," R. L. Peyton, chief highway engineer, says.

Peyton said that 22 roadside parks, overlooks and planting projects now are in various stages of planning for the next budgeting period.

These projects, he said, will be eliminated if Congress does not appropriate additional funds and if the State Highway Commission decides not to continue the beautification program on its own.

Peyton said Bureau of Public Roads officials with whom the state highway department works have indicated chances of a continuation of the federal program are slim.

Kansas nearly has completed its park program along interstate routes with only a few along I-35W remaining to be built.

One thing that might cause

highway commissioners to take a second look at the park program is the maintenance cost — now running about \$540,000 annually for the 180 parks.

Peyton said the maintenance costs average about \$3,000 for each park a year. The figure includes the large rest areas along the interstate routes.

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Satevepost Hopes For A Profit By Cutting Its Circulation In Half

The peculiar economics of magazine publishing is illustrated by the Saturday Evening Post's decision to cut its circulation in half in an attempt to make money.

This is a desperate move. In the past seven years the Post has been largely responsible for more than \$50 million in losses by its parent, the Curtis Publishing Co.

To most people, though, it seems strange that the way to profits is sought in a reduction of circulation. But this isn't the first time the Post has gone in that direction.

In 1964, when its finances were equally distressing, the Post cut the number of issues in half, becoming a biweekly after many years as a weekly — more than 200 if you subscribe to the official Post history.

In another attempt to get itself on more solid financial footing the publication has been raising its price. As recently as 1959 the Post sold for 15 cents. It went to 20 cents that year, 25 in 1964, and 35 in 1966.

Now, with revenues continuing to fall far short of expenses, the most drastic cut of all is being made. Subscriptions will be sliced from 6.4 million to about three or four million. Why?

Primarily because of growing expenses per copy. Production costs have been increasing. Labor and printing expenses were rising steadily recently. And now postal rates have taken a jump.

As a result, some magazines find themselves in a numbers

game. As circulation rises so do costs. If ad revenue cannot keep pace with circulation, a point can be reached where the greater the circulation, the greater the financial damage.

This situation actually occurred a few years ago when Coronet magazine — unrelated directly to the present publication of the same name — collapsed at the height of its circulation, at what appeared to be the peak of its popularity.

At the time, Coronet was selling low-cost subscriptions, hoping thereby to build a strong mass marketing vehicle for advertisers. But the ads didn't come in fast enough.

Other magazines also dropped out of the numbers game. Some folded and others simply gave

up their frantic and costly attempts to show bigger subscription totals than their competitors.

The Post decision, however, is unique in scope. Nobody seems to recall another publication that cut its circulation in half. But isn't this also going to cut the price that advertisers are willing to pay for space?

Perhaps, but the Post obviously hopes that the cut won't be drastic. Instead of seeking the largest possible market, the Post intends to emphasize "quality," and quality circulation obtains premium ad rates.

Its intention now is to make the publication a more refined marketing tool for advertisers. It has decided to retreat from mass market competition and to aim its efforts at the wealthiest, best educated readers.

It is no secret that advertisers have been grumbling that much of the circulation on which mag-

azine ad rates are based was worthless to them, that it was made up of readers who were not potential customers.

Corn Stocks Climb

We have heard many farmers say something like this: "I have spent a lot of time studying the best methods of producing my crops. Now I want to know more about the markets for them, so I can do a better job of selling and get a price." One kind of information asked for in greater details is that concerning supplies on hand, as well as rates of use and exports. Some of the most useful information about this is in the USDA reports of stocks of grains on hand at the first of each quarter. So, here is some of the information from the lat-

est report, which was for April 1:
Stocks of corn up 17 percent. Supplies of corn in all positions in the United States on April 1 were estimated at 3,168 million bushels — 17 percent more than one year before, and the largest supply for the date since 1964. Of the total stocks of corn on hand, three-fourths was on farms and one-fourth was stored off farms. The off-farm stocks totaled 806 million bushels — up 20 percent from a year earlier. Corn held on farms was estimated at 2,362 million bushels — up 16 per-

cent.
 The apparent disappearance of corn from January 1 to April 1 was 1,408 million bushels — 9 percent more than one year ago. We estimate exports during the quarter at about 156 million bushels — 29 percent more than last year. Millers and other processors used about 92 million bushels — up 1 percent. The amount used for feed appears to have been about 800 million bushels — 7 percent more than in 1967.

Larger carryover next fall. The marketing year for corn was half gone on April 1. So we can make better estimates than previously concerning the total use and exports of corn and the amount to be carried over next October 1.

Judging from figures now available, we estimate that the carryover of corn next October 1 will be at least 1,100 million bushels — one-third more than the carryover last fall.

More corn under price support. As of the first of April, farmers had 400 million bushels of new corn price support loans — 84 percent more than a year before. The total amount under loan, including that from previous years, was 622 million bushels — 63 percent more than a year earlier.

DOCTORS ADVISE CHANGE IN ABORTION LAWS

The Kansas Medical Society will ask the next Kansas legislature to remove some restrictions against abortions performed by licensed physicians in licensed and accredited hospitals. The society has proposed a statute that would charge second degree manslaughter against any person other than a physician who terminates a pregnancy but would make abortion a medical problem to be decided by physicians.

The Kansas Judicial Council had earlier recommended a proposal which would legalize abortions by doctors to protect the health of the mother; when the child would be born with grave physical or mental defect; when pregnancy resulted from rape or other felonious intercourse; or when necessary to preserve the life of the mother.

 The total amount of corn under loans and owned by the CCC was around 760 million bushels — nearly half again as much as a year before. The amount of "free" corn (not under price support) was about 2,400 million bushels — one-tenth more than last year.
Soybean stocks up 17 percent.

Supplies of soybeans on hand April 1 were estimated at 530 million bushels — 17 percent more than one year before. Supplies on farms were listed at 235 million bushels — up 8 percent. Stocks stored off farms were reported at 302 million bushels — up 25 percent from last year.

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Revise Hog Slaughter Grades

The U.S. Department of Agriculture today proposed a revision in the official grades for slaughter barrows and gilts.

The revision would make the grades for slaughter swine correspond directly to the recently revised grades for pork carcasses. A major change would be to revise the U.S. No. 1 grade and eliminate the minimum backfat requirements for that grade, in recognition of the industry's progress in producing leaner, meatier swine.

USDA's Consumer and Marketing Service officials explained that the revised U.S. No. 1

grade would include not only superior meat-type hogs that now rate that grade but also similar animals without sufficient backfat thickness to rate U.S. No. 1 under current standards.

In other respects, requirements for the proposed U.S. No. 2, No. 3 and No. 4 grades would be very similar to those for the present U.S. No. 1, No. 2 and No. 3 grades.

The grade U.S. utility would be used for barrows and gilts which will produce carcasses with an unacceptable quality of lean.

Slaughter grades for swine are used in market news reporting, futures trading, and for other general marketing purposes.


Sheep Men Find Little To Cheer

In many farm management associations, records have shown that for dollars invested, sheep return more than other kinds of livestock.

And yet sheep numbers have steadily gone down in the U.S. Why?

Basically, it appears that wool is in trouble now because it is being challenged by other products — namely, man-made fibers.

And if this problem is large for U.S. sheep raisers, consider the problem in Australia, New Zealand, Argentina, Uruguay, and South Africa. The United



States produces only 4 percent of the world supply. The five countries account for 60 percent.

The latest figure in the U.S. is 22 million head, smallest number since 1867.

Members of the Midwest Wool Marketing co-op at its recent business meeting suggest that some of the problem is labor. While most farmers in the cooperative usually handle small flocks, even they have labor problems. Sheep production is confining — because of predators, parasites and other problems — and a farmer who has a job in town in addition to his farm finds sheep too bothersome.

So he turns to grain crops or cow herds. Despite the incentive payment program, which was designed to stimulate sheep and wool production, the U.S. now imports about 60 percent of the wool it uses.

Over the world, sheep numbers are not declining. In fact, wool output is now setting new records. The trouble is price, which means a lack of markets.

The U.S. use of man-made fibers in rugs is one of the reasons for the drop in wool use. All of the wool used in the manufacture of rugs and carpets in this country is imported. But imports of wool into the U.S. fell in 1967.

In the face of this decrease by importers has been an increase in sheep numbers in some of the major producing countries.

New Zealand, for example, has a giant headache, producing about 80 percent coarse wool, the type that is in the least de-

mand.

The government of New Zealand has a price floor on wool and this last year was forced to go into the market to make substantial purchases to make this floor effective. And, as the market price of wool continued to go down, New Zealand's fund for price support began to be inadequate, so it was necessary to lower the floor from 28 U.S. cents a pound to 18.5 cents.

In Argentina, production of coarse wools has dropped some because of low prices, while there has been a moderate increase in fine wools.

Wool production in Uruguay has decreased in the past year, mostly from weather conditions.

Australia has seen an increase the last couple of years and a major recovery from 1965, a bad drought year.

Russia is another country which has been increasing both sheep numbers and wool output.

Here's what an expert from USDA, Larry Panasuk, says:

"As with most products, demand for wool and sheep in the future could go either way. The two products that must be marketed in the sheep business, wool and meat, both have been experiencing declining consumption — a trend that will not be easily reversed.

"Some analysts, on the other hand, point out that there definitely is a future for this industry. They explain that as the demand for food increases worldwide, the demand for lamb may rise, especially since sheep can be raised on low-cost rations. Moreover, ways are increasingly being sought to enhance wool's unique qualities and add to them thru research — changes that could make wool more competitive with man-made fibers.

"The negative side of this outlook is most apparent in the United States. Considering the steady downward trend in sheep and wool production over the last 25 years, it is rather difficult to become enthusiastic about the long-run future of this country's industry.

"The ever-changing structure of our agricultural economy and rising production costs are forcing our farmers and ranchers to seek more efficient use of their advantages inherent in sheep and lamb production as opposed to cattle production appear, in the long run, to be more than outweighed by the many disadvantages."

- 1/2 cup sugar
- 1/4 cup water
- 1 package strawberry gelatin
- 1 cup hot water
- 2 tablespoons crushed pineapple
- 2 medium apples, chopped with skin
- 1/4 cup chopped black walnuts

Combine rhubarb, sugar and 1/4 cup water; bring to rolling boil, reduce heat and simmer about 5 minutes. Remove from heat and let stand, covered, until partially cooled. Dissolve gelatin in 1 cup hot water; blend in warm rhubarb mixture. Chill until thickened. Fold in pineapple, apples and nuts. Chill until set. Wrap and freeze if desired.

Pinch sage
1/2 teaspoon butter flavoring
3 bullion beef cubes
3 potatoes, sliced rather thick
Put half of meat in a 2-quart casserole. Add all the vegetables then rest of meat. Dissolve bullion cubes in tomato juice, also rest of ingredients and pour over meat and vegetables. Bake at 350 degrees for 1 1/2 hours.

SWEET-SOUR SNAPBEANS

Cut washed snapbeans into 1-inch lengths. Have ready a pan with just enough boiling water to cover the beans. Add to the boiling water salt, pepper, diced small onion to taste. Add beans and simmer until tender. Drain liquid and add to it, for each pound of beans: 5 tablespoons sugar, 5 tablespoons vinegar and 3 whole cloves. Boil seasoned liquid until about one-half its original volume. Then add 2 tablespoons butter, 2 teaspoons cornstarch, dissolved in small amount of water. Add cooked beans and reheat thoroughly. Serve hot.

Squeeze lemon juice on a garment stained with iron rust. Spread the garment in the sun before rinsing to facilitate stain removal.

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

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Parental Approval An Aid In Disciplining Child

Some parents feel that children need to be punished in or-

der to learn and that they will learn only when something unpleasant happens to them.

Yet most youngsters learn best without being directly taught. They get their clues from the behavior of those who care for them.

Even a small child knows when you are displeased with him and when you are not. He knows this by the look on your face and tone of your voice, by the way you help him with his sweater or put his plate down in front of him.

Children of all ages give up many things they want to do or have in order to win and keep their parents' approval. They do this without knowing it themselves. They learn what to do and what not to do from the very love their parents give them.

Parents seldom recognize how much of this adjustment goes on quietly every day and how a child's pleasant feeling of being accepted and approved smooths the way for his learning.


In order to learn, a child needs, first, the freedom to grow, to find out for himself, to become independent. He must have the chance to explore the world around him and to experiment with all kinds of activity at his own pace. For this he needs help and encouragement from his parents.

And second, he needs control. He needs to know that there are limits to what he can do and must understand to some degree why limits are necessary.

With encouragement and direction, children can accept the standards parents have for them

and gradually take over these standards as their own. This is how children learn to decide for themselves what is right or wrong and eventually to develop a measure of self-control. In time, discipline becomes self-discipline.

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

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Choose Flattering Frames And Look Pretty In Glasses

Do you have to wear glasses? If so, you can turn these visual necessities into beauty accessories by choosing the style, shape and color of frames that are best suited to your individual face type.

A round face looks best with a squarish frame for contrast, but the rules about what frame goes with what face aren't as important as try-ons, since even minor variations in shape can make a big difference. If your eyes are small, choose a delicate frame with a rather large lens area.

The curvy, upswept frame is perfect for a square jaw. With any frame, wear only the simplest hair ornaments and keep jewelry to a minimum. Avoid chokers and dangling earrings.

The size of your frame should be tailored to the size of you. A

neat, shallow frame is just right for a small, pert face. Neutral frames are most practical because they blend best with your wardrobe. Black, dark tortoise and smoky brown all look good with dark hair. If you're a blonde, try a smoky blue, light tortoise or amber tone. Always try on glasses in front of a full-length mirror.

You can't hide your glasses but you can make them an attractive part of your whole look and even use them to help minimize less-than-perfect features. You can "shorten" a longish nose by wearing a frame with a bridge set low on the nose, or "lengthen" a short nose by wearing a frame with a high bridge. A long, narrow face seems shorter when the lens shape is deep, rather than shallow.

It is important that your eye-

brows show above your glasses — they're one of your most expressive features. Emphasize your eyes because about half of your eye makeup disappears as soon as you put on glasses. Choose clear lipsticks, not the fade-away kind, to balance glasses, which will emphasize the upper half of your face.

Reverse Drapes

Make top and bottom hems on draperies identical and every few weeks reverse the hanging, putting the bottom side up. This way, you reduce the possibility of sun-streaking.

Changes Set For Deer Season

PRATT — The first major hunting seasons of 1968 have been set by the Kansas Forestry, Fish and Game Commission with the establishment of the archery and firearms deer seasons.

The five-day firearms season will open Friday, December 13 and run through December 17. Archers will have 62 days of consecutive hunting with the season opening October 1 and running through December 1, inclusive.

A major change in the processing of firearms permits was approved by the Commission. Instead of permits being issued on a "first-come, first served" basis as in the last two years, applications will be accepted during the entire application period and permits will be issued on the basis of local public drawings. Applications will be processed for "first choice" deer management units and a public drawing will be held in each unit where the number of applicants exceeds the number of available permits. The drawings have tentatively been set for early August.

Archery and firearms application forms will be provided to county clerks and other license vendors by July 1 and will be available from those sources at that time. Applications for firearms permits must be post-marked July 26 or earlier while

the closing date for archery applications will be September 1.

A total of 6500 firearms permits will be available in 21 deer management units compared with 6,450 permits in 16 units in 1967.

For the first time, firearms



deer hunting will be legalized for permit holders throughout the entire state except for the metropolitan Kansas City area.



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

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

Two-Way Oneway

An implement that attracted attention at the recent Triple-I Show at Pratt was this two-way oneway plow, called a reversible plow by its manufacturer, Schaeffer Plow Co. of Pratt. The new plow is designed with a hydraulic control unit allowing the plow section to be reversed; thus the complete plowing of a field could be made without causing a dead furrow.

The plow is rigged with a 3-point leveling hitch at the tractor and a rear wheel level and depth adjuster. It also has a special hitch draft control and a center-mounted reversing control. In the more-than-\$3000 cost bracket, the plow is manufactured and sold in lengths from 12 to 21 feet.

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

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

A three-day celebration, Friday, Saturday, and Sunday, is planned for the event. An Armed Forces parade in Junction City is planned for Friday, with Fort Riley personnel participating, followed by a Distinguished Guest dinner at the NCO Club, Fort Riley, Friday night.

Saturday starts with a Fly In breakfast at the Junction City Municipal Airport, followed by a Sail Boat Regatta at Lake Milford and an Exhibition Jump by the U.S. Army Parachute Team, "The Golden Knights."

In the afternoon the Golden Knights are scheduled to make another jump prior to a "FLY BY" of the Kansas National Guard, 190 Tactical Reconnaissance Group, located at Forbes Air Force Base.

Concession stands will be on hand to furnish food for the crowd throughout the day.

The official dedication gets under way at 2:00 p.m. with John D. Montgomery, Civilian Aide-At-Large to the Secretary of the Army, as master of ceremonies.

Following the dedication, an official bronze plaque will be unveiled.

A motor boat, water and ski show culminates the Saturday activities.

Sunday starts with All-Faith church services at the dedication site at 8:00 a.m. Final sail boat racing will follow with the presentation of trophies.

Sunday afternoon the Milford Lake Music Festival with school groups from Abilene, Wamego, Chapman, Clay Center, and Junction City taking part, will wind up the three-day celebration.

The project, started in July 1961, was completed and placed into operation in January 1967.

Sees A Tax Loophole For Non-Farmers

Sen. Jack Miller, R-Iowa, has introduced a bill which he said would close a tax loophole permitting non-farmers to write off losses from farm operations.

Miller said his proposal would not prohibit farming as a sideline but would "simply put an end to the use of farming as a tax-avoidance mechanism by some individuals and corporations which results in unfair competition with the fulltime farmer."

Miller is a member of the Senate Agriculture Committee and as an attorney has specialized in

tax law.

His bill would allow only persons whose principal business is farming to claim tax losses on farm operations.

Research or experimental farms conducted under programs approved by federal or state agriculture departments would not be affected by the change, he said.



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

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Livestock Assn. Appears To 'Give' With Brand List

The Kansas Livestock Association (KLA) is in the process of forwarding to Gov. Robert Docking a new list of names for his consideration in appointing a new livestock brand commissioner, it was learned last week.

Docking and the association became embroiled in a wrangle that lasted through much of his first year in office over the governor's plans to replace Hade Gupton of Greensburg, the Kiowa County Republican chairman.

Term Over

Gupton, operator of Gupton Motor Co. in Greensburg, has been holding the \$6,500-a-year position of brand commissioner, even though his term officially

ran out June 30, 1967.

Ward Warren of Silverdale, president of the KLA, confirmed that the organization's board of directors had approved a new list of four names for Docking. He said the board took the action at a meeting in Manhattan.

Warren would not reveal the names except to say that Gupton was one of the four.

Paul Pendergast, administrative assistant to Docking, said the governor's office has not yet received the list.

Warren said the board passed on the four applicants "as part of its policy to divorce itself from state government. He said the board felt that Docking, a Democrat, should not be asked to appoint a Republican county chairman to the position.

In Greensburg, Gupton said he had learned his name was on the list. Asked whether he expected to continue to serve in the state position, he said: "That will be entirely up to the governor."

The law requires that a nominee for the position of state brand commissioner be selected by the governor from a list of three applicants approved by the board to submit to him a list of three bona fide applicants.

The board had recommended Wayne Rogler of Matfield Green, Francis Arnold of Ashland and Gupton.

The governor said that Rogler, Chase County Republican chairman, was offered the position but turned it down. Docking said he had no intention of reappointing Gupton or of naming Arnold to the position.

The Democratic governor accused the board of submitting a bogus list.

The KLA board of directors doubles as the State Brand Commission — a state agency in the latter capacity — and is empowered to decide and award ownership of disputed brands.

The livestock brand commissioner records brands for livestock, inspects brands and collects fees for registration of brands.

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Outline Changes For Fish & Game

A game protector points out a good fishing spot for an angler as part of the image of the Kansas Fish & Game Commission as visualized in a recent survey made by the Wildlife Management Institute for the commission.

The survey, which took 91 pages to report, makes some broad recommendations that include less expenditures for law enforcement, less administrative responsibility by appointed members of the commission, and decentralizing administrative work.

While the survey was praised by Frank Lombard, Game Commission chairman, and others, it was also apparent that there were plenty of reservations about the recommendations as being not specifically applicable to Kansas and requiring legislative and political initiative, not quite as easy to produce as just making recommendations.

One result, if survey recommendations are adopted, is that the state agency would discontinue supplying fish for stocking in farm ponds and would give priority to public land purchases over wildlife management in use of federal aid funds.

The report also recommended that general fund monies be sought. The commission has been supported entirely thru fishing and hunting fees plus federal grants.



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
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



Big Industrial Firm Buys Ehram

One of the oldest manufacturing plants in Kansas and a major G&G area employer has been sold.
The J. B. Ehram and Sons Manufacturing Co. of Enterprise and Abilene will merge

with a larger industrial corporation, Combustion Engineering Inc. of New York.
Combustion will acquire Ehram and its subsidiaries in exchange for Combustion stock. The purchase price was not disclosed.

The Ehram companies will continue to be operated as independent organizations with W. J. Ehram Jr. as president. The general offices will remain in Abilene and the home manufacturing plant in nearby Enterprise.

Ehram specializes in production of machinery for manufacturing wallboard and bulk material handling equipment. The company was founded as a machine shop at Enterprise in 1872 by Jacob B. Ehram. It now is in the management of the third generation of the Ehram family.

Besides its main plant at Enterprise and offices in Abilene, Ehram has plants in Wichita, Clay Center and Concordia. It employs about 300 persons at Enterprise and 125 at Abilene.

It has 78 employees at a foundry at Wichita. The Clay Center plant is known as Simlo Inc. It is separately incorporated but has similar ownership.

Combustion Engineering's executive offices are in New York with general offices in Windsor, Conn. It has diversified plants throughout the country in some 35 cities, ranging from machinery and steam boiler

manufacturing to nuclear power equipment, pollution control systems, oil field equipment products and services for electric utilities, petroleum, natural gas, chemicals, minerals, subsea oil production and general industrial markets.
Its various plants employ more than 20,000 people. Total sales for 1967 amounted to \$638 million.

A spokesman for Combustion Engineering said products manufactured by Ehram complements the industrial product line of Combustion and that the merger ties in with Combustion's planned corporate growth program.

Variations In Farm Price Averages

A North Dakota farm wife complains that at a time when the government reported farmers were receiving 30.4 cents a dozen for eggs, she got only 19 cents.

Her letter of protest included a market receipt showing she was paid \$5.70 for 30 dozen.

The farm wife's complaint serves to point up that farm prices as reported once each month by the Agriculture department are national averages and may not actually be the price paid producers for a single dozen.

Department figures do show that while the national average in mid-March was 30.4 cents, the average in North Dakota was only 19.4 cents. In fact, prices paid producers averaged from lows of 19.4 cents in North Dakota and 19.6 cents in South Dakota to highs of 44 cents in Rhode Island and 45 cents in Connecticut.

Egg prices averaged the highest in New England, an area of deficit production insofar as consumer demands are concerned. They were lowest in the West North Central region, an area including the Dakotas, Minnesota, Iowa, Missouri, Nebraska and Kansas, where there is surplus production with producers somewhat distant from major consuming areas.

These variations in prices by states, and even by local mar-

kets, also characterize all farm commodities. For instance, the national average price paid growers for wheat in mid-March was \$1.42 a bushel. But prices by states ranged from a low of \$1.23 in Maryland to a high of \$1.54 in Minnesota. In the case of wheat, quality differences play major roles in determining specific prices.

In the case of hogs, the nationwide average was \$18.50 a hundred pounds, but state averages ranged from \$17.20 in Florida to a high of \$19.60 in Pennsylvania. Milk, with a national average of \$5.20 a hundred pounds, varied from a low of \$4.09 in Minnesota to a high of \$6.90 in Florida.

Lowest Cotton Crop Since 1895

The 1967 cotton crop in the U. S. has been finally reckoned by USDA to be 7.44 million bales, worth \$1.12 billion. The production is the smallest since 1895.

Production dipped sharply last year because of curtailed plantings under a government program and one of the worst crop weather seasons in many years.

A larger crop is being sought this year.

The 1966 crop was valued at \$1.25 billion.

Texas was the largest producer of the states with 2.7 million bales.

Big Pipeline Moves By Fertilizer Firms

Plans for transporting anhydrous ammonia, used primarily as a fertilizer, from Gulf coast manufacturing plants to the Midwest by pipeline are gaining momentum.

Gulf Central Pipeline company, of Houston, announced recently it has signed contracts for 21 million dollars for construction of 1233 miles of such pipeline.

The contract covers more than half of a planned 2000 mile system that will include a trunk line from Central Louisiana to Northern Missouri. The system also will include lateral lines to Gulf Coast ammonia plants and distribution laterals into ammonia-consuming areas in Nebraska, Iowa, Illinois and Indiana.

The company said it has commitments from the Monsanto Chemical company, St. Louis, and Central Farmers Fertilizer Co., a Chicago-based supply organization owned by 20 regional and state farm cooperatives in

the United States and Canada, to use the Gulf central facilities when completed.

Meanwhile, Coast-Midwest Pipeline Corporation, Chicago, reported that feasibility studies are nearing completion on a different proposed 80-million-dollar common-carrier pipeline to transport the fertilizer in liquid form from Gulf coast plants to major Midwestern farm markets.

Among companies presently participating in this project are Cities Service company, Allied Chemical Corp., Olin Mathieson Chemical Corp., and American Coal Co., a subsidiary of Standard Oil Co. (Indiana).

Under this proposal, feeder lines from ammonia-producing plants on the Texas gulf coast and Louisiana delta would join the main pipeline near Lake Charles, La. From there the line would pass north through Louisiana, Arkansas, and Southern Missouri, across the Mis-

issippi River south of St. Louis and continue to Central Illinois where branch lines would serve terminals in Illinois, Indiana, Iowa and Nebraska.

This proposed pipeline would have the capacity to carry about one million tons of anhydrous ammonia a year by 1970-71 with an ultimate capacity of 2½ to 3 million tons a year.

Most of the fertilizer currently is shipped to the Midwest by barge and distributed from river terminals by rail or trucks.

Propose A Curb On Bank Interest Advertising

Legislation designed to curb "misleading" advertisements of savings interest rates by some banks has been recommended by a Senate Banking subcommittee.

The panel approved a "truth-in-savings" amendment as it cleared an Administration bill that would extend for two years the flexible authority of Federal agencies to set maximum interest rates payable on savings accounts.

The amendment, proposed by Sen. Proxmire (D., Wis.), would empower Federal agencies to regulate advertisements of savings rates. The amendment was prompted by some banks' ads that promise interest yields of 7% or more on savings deposited for several years.

A spokesman said the subcommittee viewed these ads as misleading because it felt they were based on "unrealistic" assumptions. In some cases, he said, savers would have to reinvest interest for 14 years before realizing a 7% return.

that savings and loan associations have protested that some banks were gaining an unfair competitive advantage by promising "unrealistically" high savings rates. The legislation would leave it to regulatory agencies to determine specific rules governing savings rate ads.

The basic legislation would extend regulatory authority that's due to lapse Sept. 21 under current law. Both banks and S&Ls are subject to federal agencies' rules setting maximum interest rates on savings accounts.

The bill goes to the full Banking Committee. The basic measure isn't controversial, but the reception of the "truth-in-savings" amendment remains to be seen.



A Kansas State University economist looks for grain prices to show some strength during the next few months.

Ruth E. Clifton bases this forecast on a reduced grain acreage in Kansas and the rest of the U.S.

Total acreage planted to grain crops in Kansas this year is expected to total about 18.8 mil-

by a slight increase in corn, oats, and barley.

Sorghum acreage of 4.4 million in 1967 was up by about a half million acres over 1966.

Soybean acreage was cut in 1967 when total grain acreage

was expanded. However, soybeans appeared more attractive as an alternative crop this year, and acreage is expected to return to the 930,000-acre level that prevailed during 1965 and 1966.



lion acres, down considerably from the 1967 level, according to the Kansas Crop and Livestock Reporting Service.

Wheat acreage is estimated at 11.9 million acres, sorghums at 3.9 million acres, corn at 1.4 million acres, soybeans at 0.9 million acres, and oats, barley and rye at 0.5 million acres.

Total grain acreage in Kansas was expanded from 17.9 million acres in 1966 to 20.2 million last year. The greatest change was in wheat acreage, which jumped from 11 to 13.1 million acres.

Sorghum acreage is expected to be down by about 350,000 acre from last year's levels. This decrease will be partially offset



adult life, they reported, but is more closely related to body build, smoking and eating habits, and social and educational background.

Affects a Majority

"The rates of coronary heart disease of the men studied also were quite close to those for employed white males in the United States," he said. "Between the ages of 30 and 55 about 5 per cent of men die of heart attacks while 50 percent develop clear-cut coronary heart disease, showing what a plague this disease is."

"Even the most rapidly promoted men have rates no higher than those of workmen and foremen of the same age and length of service," Dr. Hinkle said.

He also reported that the incidence of disabling coronary disease was 30 percent less for the college men studied than for noncollege employees of the Bell system.


Dr. Hinkle noted that college graduates tend to be taller and slimmer than noncollege men and that those holding degrees tend to smoke and eat less, and in general, take better care of themselves physically.

APPROVAL FOR RABBIT PLANT AT HILL CITY

A rabbit processing plant at Hill City has received approval of its plans from USDA. The proposed plant is to be built at the east edge of Hill City and would be classified as a dressing and eviscerating facility for rabbits. At opening the plant expects to slaughter 2000 rabbits in an 8-hour day. About 20 people will be hired. The facility will be financed thru a local

Tough Job No Sign Of Heart Trouble

The notion that scaling the ladder of success increases the risk of heart attack is challenged strongly by the largest medical study ever conducted of the link between coronary disease and occupational achievement.

In fact, said the scientific researchers, the chances that the future executive will develop coronary heart diseases are determined before he sets foot on the first rung of the ladder.


"The results of the study

were a bit startling," said Dr. Lawrence E. Hinkle, a specialist in psychosomatic medicine at Cornell Univ. medical college, New York. "The story did not come out the way I had anticipated."

Dr. Hinkle spent five years studying 270,000 male employees of the Bell system of telephone companies that stretch from New York to California.

He concluded that men who succeed in business by trying are no more susceptible to developing heart disease than those who stay at the bottom of the ladder.

Heart disease is not greatly influenced by the tensions of
