been entirely cut, but there is little doubt that ties of the Kansas Livestock Association to the state government have been loosened not inconsiderably.

And both sides of what once appeared as a bitter feud between Governor Docking and officers of the Livestock Association show little inclination to revive it.

In fact Docking was the featured speaker at a Governor's Tour sponsored by the Association just last month. The Livestock Association made a recommendation of four men for State Brand Inspector, and Docking appointed one of them. Both sides seem to be anxious to have it appear that if there was a small disagreement once, it ended without a winner or loser.

Perhaps. But both contestants came out equal, the Governor came out a little more equal.

Kansas has had a livestock sanitary commissioner since 1905, and as early as 1909 the men who held that job was also secretary of the Livestock Association.

In 1919 that man, Joseph Hooker Mercer, got the dual role written into the law.

The principle was stretched more than it has ever been in late May when Governor Docking found a man of his own choosing among four names submitted for the post of state brand commissioner by the KLA.

Ward Warren of Silverdale, president of the association, said the KLA board of directors came up with the new list "as part of its policy to divorce itself from state government.'

An earlier such move was the decision by the association to move its offices out of the state office building and into a private building in Topeka.

Joseph Mercer would have been flabbergasted. Mercer was one of only six livestock sanitary commissioners to have held the position since it was created in 1905. There have been 22 governors in that span.

Mercer held the job for 33

The ties have certainly not years, from 1909 to 1913, and again from 1915 to 1944.

> Mercer told something of the organization's history and of his view of the role it would play in state government in a report to Gov. Capper in 1918.

> "Back in 1884 there assembled a small gather of livestock producers in Emporia. The purpose of this organization was to combine the efforts of cattlemen in opposing the unjust treatment which the railroads of the state were meting out to Kansas shippers.

"It was in this gathering of Kansas stockmen at Emporia that the Kansas Livestock Association was born and during the past 24 years this association has answered its purpose of fighting for the interests of Kansas livestock producers whenever their rights have been in jeopardy.

"Having served as secretary of the Kansas Livestock Association for the past 18 years, and also having served as livestock sanitary commissioner for eight years, I am fully convinced that on account of the similarity of duties, these two offices should be filled by the same head."

Mercer said the move was practical, efficient, and economical and was aimed at removing the office "from politics." But that very law was at the center of a poltical wrangle thru much of Governor Docking's first year in office.

Docking said the law in effect delegated the governor's appointive power because the executive committee refused to give him any choice except to renominate A. G. Pickett as livestock sanitary commissioner.

The feud began in the 1966 gubernatorial campaign.

There were charges that livestock Sanitary Commissioner A. G. Pickett doubling as executive vice president of the KLA, attempted to promote the candidacy of Docking's Republican opponent, former Gov. William Avery.

Docking cut the sanitary commissioner's budget by \$250,000, eliminating state support of the agency's calfhood vaccination program. The governor also applied pressure to get the KLA to move out of its leased quarters in the State Office Building.

But despite threats that he would go to court, Docking has been unable as yet to appoint a new livestock sanitary commissioner. And he has shown little inclination lately to revive the feud.

Pickett is no longer serving as an active officer of the KLA. The KLA board of directors has given him the title of vice president emeritus and taken away his title of executive vice president. Charles Esslinger of Manhattan has replaced him as executive vice president, the chief administrative officer.

There has been speculation that Pickett, 67, may retire next year. His term ran out March 31, 1967 but he continues in the office under a law which allows him to exercise all the rowers of the office until a successor is qualified and appointed.

The board of directors of the KLA has a dual role as a state agency in its capacity as brand commission with the power to decide and award ownership of disputed brands.

The 1939 legislature enacted a law to require state registration of livestock brands. The 1947 legislature established a separate office of brand commissioner. Since that time, there have been three brand commissioners, including Heft.

The Democratic minority in the 1968 legislature tried to consolidate the offices of brand commissioner, and livestock sanitary commissioner.

As the law now stands each member of the seven-man livestock commission must bear the recommendation of the KLA's board of directors. Using the recommendations, the governor then appoints one member from each of the five congressional districts and another from the state at large. The seventh member is the president of the KLA.

Sens. Charles B. Joseph, D-Potwin, the Senate minority leader, and Joe Warren, D-Maple City, sponsored a bill that

would have required the KLA board to recommend three persons for each position. The commission then would have named a livestock commissioner, to direct the consolidated office.

But Sen. Norman E. Gaar, R-Westwood, offered an amendment that would have stripped all of the KLA's power to make recommendations, prompting a complaint by Warren that the amendment ruined his bill. Sen. Warren is the brother of the president of the KLA.

The Senate-passed bill died in the House Livestock Committee.

Paul Pendergast, administrative assistant to Docking, says the governor's office is not pressing for a resolution of the impasse.

"We have good communication with the Livestock Association now and we want to maintain it," he says.

So the great dispute of 1967 has fizzled into a quiet standoff in 1968 with neither side showing any inclination to test the power of the other.

Sawdust To Control Dairy Heifer Intake

By this time most dairymen that pasture their heifers for the summer have already turned the heifers out. For most farmers this will mean less labor when it comes to feeding the heifers. But as the dairyman turns his heifers out, it will also mean an end to the grain that the heifers were getting since before they were taken off milk or milk-replacer.

Most farmers don't have the time to go to the pasture everyday to grain their heifers. Consequentially, the heifers do without the grain for possibly five months. This means that the heifers do not reach breeding weight as soon as they should.

Most dairymen check pastured heifers about once or twice a week and at the most every other day. If the dairyman brings the amount of grain that the heifers should have for that day plus the amount they should have for the days that he didn't show up, the heifers would founder and possibly bloat.

The ideal solution to this problem would be for the heifers to eat just the amount of grain they are supposed to and save the rest for the future. Any healthy heifer will eat grain until she is full and this is usually too much unless the heifer has been put on full feed. What the dairyman needs is some way to control intake of grain.

This is where sawdust comes into the picture. As far as it is known, sawdust has no ill efeffects on cattle that eat it. Why couldn't sawdust and grain be made into a pellet together so that the pastured heifers could eat the pellets until they are full and still not get too much grain.

This is the same question that James L. Morrill, assisprofessor of dairy science at Kansas State University, thought of about one year ago. Morrill has been experimenting with a pellet that is 35 per cent sawdust. The heifers on the experiment eat all the pellets that they want and still get the amount of grain that they should. Morrill is experimenting to see if the sawdust will have any ill effects on the hei-

Morirll believes that there is real potential in the use of control intake. The obvious advanwould lay in the fact that hei-

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fers pastured in the summer would get the right amount of grain everyday without the driryman having to bring grain to the pasture everyday. The dairyman could bring a bulk amount of these pellets to the pasture whenever he came to check on the heifers and leave it in a self-feeder. By the trial and error method, the dairyman could see how often the feeder had to be replenished.

Another advantage would be that no matter how much the heifers varied in size, they would all get the right amount of grain. The larger heifers would, no doubt, eat first, but when they got full the smaller heifers could go up and eat their share. This would eliminate some of the "hogging" by the bigger heifer and the smaller heifers would have the chance to grow at the same rate as the larger ones.

There still has to be some research done before a dairyman can go to a saw mill for some sawdust and put grain and the sawdust in a pellet and feed it. For one thing the sawdust used Kansas State is white pine. Whether any other kind of sawdust will have an ill effect on cattle is not yet known.

Also the sawdust comes from lumber that is kiln-dried. Wet lumber or non-kiln dried lumber could harm the heifer. Sawdust that is screened to just a certain size is used in Morrill's pellets. Any other size of sawdust might not work for the pel-

Morrill says that he would like to use a smaller percent of sawdust in the pellets, because 35 percent is really too much non-digestable material to be putting into a pellet. He believes that it would be better to have the sawdust per cent around 10 to 15. But at this level

the heifers would consume to much grain. For this reason Morrill is still looking around for a substance for control in

It is possible that the he fers may be digesting some of the sawdust. Now it is not known whether this is possible If the sawdust does have a nu tritional value, it could be of more value than was originally thought possible.

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
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Dandy Jack Is Dead

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



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Wheat Condition Variable; Pastures, Hay Improving

Prospects for the 1968 Kansas wheat crop improved during May and on June 1 production was forecast at 231 million bushels, according to the Kansas Crop and Livestock Reporting Service.

Prospects were quite variable over the state ranging from poor in the drouth damaged western areas to good to excellent condition in central and eastern areas.

Cool, damp weather during May provided excellent condition for filling of the heads and substantially improved prospects for the crop.

Pastures responded well to the May precipitation and were in above average condition on June 1.

Prospects for hay production, though helped by recent moisture, were only fairly good as the first cutting of alfalfa was badly damaged by pea aphids. However, wild hay prospects were well above average.

Winter Wheat

As of June 1 the 1968 Kansas winter wheat crop was forecast at 231,360,000 bushels, up 39 million bushels from the May 1 forecast. If the forecast is realized, wheat production in 1968 will be 4 percent above last year and 11 percent above the 1962-66 average production.

This production represents an average yield of 24 bushels per harvested acre on 9,640,000 acres expected to be harvested for grain. General rains during May and damp, cool weather of late May provided excellent filling conditions that contributed to improved prospects since May 1.

However, the rains were too late in many far western sections where drouth, insects and winterkill resulted in heavy abandonment before the first of May. Hail damaged wheat in some local areas over the State and heavy rains and minor flooding in southeast areas caused some lodging of wheat there.

Pasture and Hay Crop

Pastures benefited from May rains and on June 1 farmers and ranchers reported the pasture feed condition at 79 percent of normal, up 8 percentage points from a month earlier, 20 points above a year ago and 12 points above average.

At the first of the month pas tures were providing excellent feed supplies over the eastern half of the State but in western areas pasture feed supplies were limited by earlier drouth and cool weather of May.





Production of Irish Potatoes was forecast at 133,000 cwt., about 4 percent above the 1967 production but 19 percent below the 1962-66 average production. Cool,damp weather during May resulted in favorable yield prospects of 95 cwt. per acre which compares with the average of 90 cwt.

Europe Won Chicken War'

WEZEP, NETHERLANDS -Common Market poultry production figures show that the poultry war of 1965 ended in a defeat for the United States, a poultry economist says.

Dr. J. Wilmink said that the production of broilers in West Germany nearly doubled from 1964 to 1966. The Netherlands showed the second biggest rise in the Common Market with a 90 percent jump in broiler production from 1964 to 1967, Dr. Wilmink says.

He credited the Common Market preferences with ousting U.S. and Danish imports from the rapidly growing West German market where poultry consumption per capita quadrupled since 1955.

He said that another factor was that Common Market production costs were at par with those of the United States.

West German production is supplemented by imports from the Netherlands which exports 75 to 80 percent of her broiler production of 163,000 tons or more than the entire West Germany production — to Western Germany.

Wilmink said that adoption of U.S. production and slaughtering methods removed the ad-

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

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Dwarf Wheat Plumping Asians' Harvest

Two years ago, the rains didn't come to the Indian state of Bihar and the wheat crop failed, causing widespread famine and, in turn, bitter riots by starving people. The U.S. shipped grain from its ample storehouses to help feed the hungry.

This year the Bihar farmers, clad in white and swinging scythes similar to those described in the book of Ruth, are harvesting a bumper crop of wheat. The rains came this year, to be sure, but the big difference is that some of the wheat yields are nearly 10 times greater per acre than they used to be.

The cause of this dramatic boost, in Pakistan and Turkey as well as in India, is hardy strains of Mexican semidwarf wheat. Farmers in these countries are harvesting yields of 50 bushels to 90 bushels an acre where they once got as little as 10 bushels. These yields compare with the average U.S. yield last year of 25 bushels an acre.

This super-yielding wheat is a derivative hybrid, the result of cross breeding several genetically different wheat varieties. In the U.S. researchers have hard at work for years trying to develop hybrid wheats that would give higher yields and possess other characteristics better than their parents. Hybrid corn, introduced in the 1920s, and sorghum hybrids, first marketed in the 1920s, and sorghum hybrids, first marketed in 1956, have greatly increased production of these grains. But, researchers say, wheat hybrids for U.S. farmers are at least several

ly available commercially because of several technical problems in hybrid seed production.

The Mexican wheat strains were developed in Mexico by scientists from the Rockefeller Foundation who have been involved in agricultural research there since 1943. Bred into the hybrid, in addition to several Mexican strains and a U.S. type, is a gene from a Japanese wheat variety, Norin 10, that expresses itself in short, sturdy stalks capable of holding up heavy, lush heads of grain.

Short but Sturdy

The short stalk is necessary to the success of the hybrid, which responds to heavy fertilization with its startingly high yields. Most other varieties of wheat tend to "lodge," or topple over, from the weight of grain heads when large amounts of fertilizer are applied to boost

Both Pakistan and India are harvesting record wheat crops. The estimated 600 million-bushel Indian crop exceeds the previous record crop, in 1964-65, by 150 million bushels. Pakistan claims near-sufficiency in wheat production with an estimated 220 million-bushel crop. Turkey also has a bumper harvest.

In these three countries, a significant part of the acreage was seeded with the semidwarf wheat. About 6 million of India's million wheat acres were planted with the Mexican seed, as was 6% of Turkey's acreage. Semi-dwarfs accounted for 2 million acres of Pakistan's current crop. West Pakistan's Ag-

Bankhsh said in a recent New York speech that the hybrid is "a main catalyst of the Pakistan agricultural revolution."

If the semidwarfs continue to boost the wheat production of these nations, American wheat prices could be hurt. U.S. wheat and shipments to India and Pakistan alone have averaged more than 200 million bushels annually during the past four years, representing one-seventh of the average U.S. domestic and export consumption in that per-

Nelson Cornelius, grain analyst for Merrill Lynch, Pierce, Fenner & Smith Inc., says the Mexican semidwarfs "will be a significant price factor in two to three years when the U.S. probably will radically trim wheat aid shipments abroad." Mr. Cornelius theorizes the National

Advisory Committee on Grains this spring recommended a 15% cut in the 1969 wheat allotments in part, because of the possible influence of semidwarfs on aid exports.

Thought traditionally suspicious of change, the three countries' farmers have taken to the hybrids quickly. In 1965, for example, a Turkish farmer from the Mediterranean port of Arsus planted 66 pounds of semi-

The semidwarfs have proved very adaptable to conditions in the Near East and the Indian subcontinent. They must be grown in areas of irrigation or heavy rainfall, but mature on schedule regardless of variations in climate. Moreover, the Mexican wheat resists rust and other diseases common to the areas where they've been plant-

Grow-Your-Own-Seed

Most important, perhaps, the hybrids are self-pollinating and thus self-propagating strains which breed "true" without a drop in vigor. Farmers can grow their own seed grain rather than purchasing new seed each year as must be done with hybrid corn and sorghums. Underdeveloped nations lack transportation facilities and seed industries to supply their farmers every year.

Scientists from the Rockefel. ler and Ford foundations are as sisting Indian and Pakistani scientists in further adapting the Mexican semidwarfs to h cal conditions. In both countries, breeders have added na tive strains to the hybrids to achieve greater quality and re sistance to local diseases, One Indian scientist has used radia tion and chemical treatment develop amber, high protein si midwarf mutants. Indians and Pakistanis prefer the amber wheat to Mexican hybrids that are soft red wheats.

The Mexican hybrids would have only limited success in the U.S. Much of the Great Plains wheat country is too arid for their growth, and they lack the milling and baking characteris tics preferred by U.S. mills and processors for bread making. Dr. Horville Vogel, a U.S. D. partment of Agrciulture scien tist at Washington State Uni versity, has developed a semi dwarf called Gaines, that is grown in the heavy rainfall ar ea of the Pacific Northwest. Gaines is primarily used in cookie and cake flour.

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
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

Four Resign Over Welfare In Harvey County

NEWTON — Four members of an advisory board to the Harvey County welfare department resigned last week in protest against the 1969 budget.

Resigning were Preston Bacon, Jay S. Holstine, Paul Loyd, and Richard Nordstrom.

A letter explaining their resignation cited the gain in welfare and administrative costs in relation to population as a cause of their resignation.

Figures cited for 1961 showed a Harvey County population of 25,643, monthly case loads of 380, a budget of \$459,892 including \$27,602 for administration. In 1968 the Harvey county population was 27,697, average case load was 440, budget was \$851,022 including \$118,000 administration costs.

The 1969 proposed budget of \$1.025 million contains \$127,000 for administration.

The four men also noted that the unified school district in the county which serves 4200 children has an operating budget of \$1.8 million (not counting capital outlays) and the city with 16,500 citizens has an operating budget of \$1.7 million.

The Columbia Broadcasting System, whose prevailing projection in California last week went far wide of its mark, said that, it may alter its method of projecting returns.


Robert Chandler, director of operations for the CBS election unit, said the network is considering withholding percentage projections on the candidates until more of its sample precincts have been tabulated.







Orville Freeman, secretary of agriculture, said in a statement the agreement would mean "better income for U.S. wheat growers as well as additional assistance to the U.S. balance of payments."

Roth also said the arrangement would mean a higher return for U.S. farmers, at the same time giving "a timely boost for our balance of payments."

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





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The outlook is anything but bright for wheat prices as harvest gets underway in southern Kansas counties.

A number of factors - including prospects for a near record crop and a drop in exports are exerting downward pressure on prices, says Don Pretzer, grain marketing economist at Kansas State University.

In short, the loan rate is expected to floor wheat prices in Kansas, he says.

Winter wheat production is estimated at 1.2 billion bushels, only 2 percent less than last year's record. Production of winter wheat - estimated at 300 million bushels — will push the total 1968 wheat crop to a record high.

Pretzer looks for carryover to total 545 million bushels on July 1, 1968, up 120 million bushels from 1967. This, too, has been pressuring wheat prices down-

Secretary Freeman's National Advisory Committee on Grains has suggested a 10 percent required acreage diversion from the 1967-68 allotment of 59.3 million acres. Along with additional voluntary diversion, this should reduce the 1968-69 carryover by 50 to 100 million bushels. But the total supply available assuming normal production and use would still be large enough to exert a downward influence on price.

Exports may be the single most important influence on wheat prices, Pretzer believes. Competition from other wheat producing nations plus large world stocks point to a slump in U.S. exports from 750 milion bushes in 1967-68. Exports of 650 million bushels seem more likely for 1968-69 at this time.

A legislative proposal directs the Commodity Credit Corporation to reduce "free supplies" by 400 million bushels in 1698-69. If passed by Congress, this could favorably influence shortrun prices. Long term price effects would depend on purchase and release of the 400 million bushels controlled by CCC.

Opposes lowa Cholera Action

HUMBOLDT, Iowa - Dr. S. D. Linn, president of the Iowa Veterinary Medical Association, is critical of Iowa legislative action which will prohibit vaccination of hogs against cholera after Dec. 1 in this state. He feels the incidence of cholera should be lower than it is before vaccination is stopped. An outbreak of cholera, he said, would be difficult to fight without vaccina-



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
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

Alfalfa Stimulates Milk Production

Dairymen expect increased milk production when cows are changed from stored feed to legume pasture in the spring, but until recently bloat made it difficult to assess the full potential of legume pasture.

Milk producing potential of alfalfa pasture, grazed freely by cows taking bloat preventive, was tested by Kansas State University dairy scientists. Bloat was controlled with poloxalenc, the bloat preventive developed at Kansas State University in

Milk fat percentage usually declines when cows are changed from hay to succulent pasture, and this was the case with cows that went on bromegrass pasture. But milk fat percentage increased for cows on alfalfa pasture, Dave Stiles and Dr. Erle E. Bartley, dairy scientists at KSU, told members of the American Dairy Science Association this week in Columbus,

Cows on alfalfa pasture produced more milk than those fed bromegrass pasture or alfalfa hay, Bartley said. Cows pasturing bromegrass produced more milk than those fed alfalfa ! ay.

While grain was fed according to milk production, grain intake was not related to production of cows pasturing alfalfa because cows on alfalfa pasture refused portions of grain throughout the trial; whereas, cows fed al-

falfa hay or bromegrass pasture ate all the grain offered.

Cows on alfalfa pasture consumed considerably more forage (dry-matter basis) than those fed alfalfa hay or bromegrass prsture. The forage (dry-matter basis) intake of cows on bromegrass pasture declined markedly as the experiment progressed, probably related to the stage of maturity of the brome.

Increased milk production of cows on alfalfa pasture over hay is probably due in part to the increased intake of energy and protein by cows on pasture. Stimulation of milk production from pasture, generally a mixture of grasses and legumes, has been reported in previous research studies.

If cost of roughages in this trial is considered equal, milk income over cost of grain was higher for pasture-fed than for hay-fed cows. Weather conditions at the test site favored bromegrass; however, alfalfa pasture produced more milk, less body weight loss, and more hay for mechanical harvest in addition to pasture.

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
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
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Best Bluestem Of The '60s

Pastures in the 14-county Bluestem area of Kansas were providing excellent grazing for cattle on June 1 this year, according to the Kansas Crop and Livestock Reporting Service.

Grass growth was good nearly everywhere in the Bluestem area as the result of ample rainfall this spring. Water supplies for livestock were ample, with most ponds full and streams

Condition of cattle in the area was reported as good as for any year in the 1960's. Pastures were reported 97 per cent filled by June 1, reflecting strong demand for grass at higher prices this year.

Pasture feed condition in the Bluestem area was 90 percent of normal, up 20 points from last year and 9 points above the 1962-66 average. Grass was in plentiful supply on June 1 following good rainfall during April and May.

Stock ponds were well filled in most areas but in a few places could use some additional run-

Cattle condition on June 1 was reported at 88 percent of normal, up 7 points from last year and up 3 points from average. Cows that wintered in the Bluestem area and those that were shipped in for pasturing are both doing well.

Reports indicate that some cattle have taken on considerable flesh already. Stockmen expect the peak marketings off grass this fall to be about September 10, a few days later than average.

Around 14 million head of cattle were on the Bluestem area pastures on June 1, up slightly from last year. Shipments into the area this spring were estimated to be 158,000 head of cattle, 3000 more than last year. Spring movement of cattle into the Bluestem area was at about the same time as in 1967.

The number of all cattle in the Bluestem area on January 1 this

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year totaled 1,109,000, an increase of 26,000 from a year ear-

Combined Bluestem & Osage Pastures of Kansas And Okla.

The June 1 condition of grazing feed on the Bluestem pastures of Kansas and the Osage pastures of Oklahoma is well above both a year earlier and average. Spring rainfall has been ample and prospects for summer grazing are good. Stock ponds are mostly full.

Movement of cattle into the Bluestem-Osage area during January through May total 184,000 head, about the same last year but 20 percent bel average.

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



No Western Kansas Switch To Mountain Time

Department of Transportation Secretary Alan Boyd has said the department had decided against moving the time zone boundary in Kansas.

The Kansas Legislature last fall petitioned the department to include the entire state within the central time zone.

Under Secretary Boyd's decision, the northwest corner of the state, which has been in the mountain time zone, will remain in that zone.

Secretary Boyd said that in a

survey of those living in the affected area, only 4 per cent responded to the department's quey but of that 4 per cent, 75 per cent wanted to remain on mountain time.

Because there was so little response combined with the overwhelming opposition to moving the time zone boundary, Secretary Boyd said it was concluded that moving of the boundary was not justified.

The secretary emphasized that the decision is not related to the operation of daylight time in Kansas.

Since the Kansas Legislature has not taken action to exempt the state from daylight time, the entire state would operate on it, he said. This action also includes the northwest portion of Kansas, which will remain on mountain time.

Expect Harvest Peak June 20

Unless moisture keeps farmers out of fields, the 1968 Kansas wheat harvest is expected to peak sometime around June

The first cutting in southern Kansas indicated wheat was running better than forecast, Fields in Barber, Harper, and Sumner counties were running five bushels over June 1 estimates.

Harvest wages have run about the same as last year. Combine operators are receiving \$1.50 to \$2 an hour, with truck drivers getting \$1.50 an

Custom cutters are getting \$3.50 per acre plus 5 cents per bushel over 20 bushels. On wheat flattened by rain, prices are higher.

Ray Arvin said latest Federal Aviation administration reports list 266 airport facilities in the state plus one heliport.

prise many farmers in telling that net income (that is, gross sales less expenses) is down from 1966.

For all six associations, covering 2780 farm units, the net average was \$7995 in 1967 compared to \$11,079 in 1966 and \$6845 for a 10-year average,

After deducting interest on investment, a new figure roughly what a farmer's "salary" would be - is arrived at, which figured as low as \$2210 in one association and as high as \$6371 in another.

The main reasons for lower incomes in 1967 than in 1966 were lower prices on commodities sold, poorer crops and higher production expenses.

One part of the record keeping concerns the differences in the farms with the highest net incomes and those with the low-'est. These usually are separated as to the highest 25% in an association compared with the lowest 25%. This affords an excellent opportunity to search for the reasons why.

In general, John Coolidge, extension economist who directs farm management at K-State, says the high income farms manage more resources, produce more and are more effic-

They earn on the average four times as much for their labor and management. Often these farms are partnership deals.

This is the way he summarizes the differences between the high and the low income produc-

"The high income fourth of the association farms are 2-man farms of from 900 to 2400 acres, representing total investments of from \$200,000 to \$300,000. The larger units are on the western side of the state and the smaller on the east.

"On the average, the operators manage \$184,000 in resources per man in the west: \$120,000 in Central Kansas and \$106,000

"The uniformity of these figures emphasized the importance iency of a 2-man unit, high crop of adequate resources, the efficyields and large, well-managed livestock enterprises for higher incomes regardless of the area of the state."

Salina Trades For Land For New Golf Course

SALINA - A land swap between Salina and the Graves family has paved the way for construction of a 18-hole, \$200,-000 grass greens municipal golf course here

The city will transfer 20 acres to the Graves interests, which will deed 40 acres of their property to Salina.

The two-for-one trade will enable the city to construct the 6245-yard, par 70 course on the west side of the former taxiway of the old Salina airport. The terminal building will be converted into a clubhouse, and the airplane parking apron will be used for automobile parking.

The airport runway will be available for other recreational uses, such as Grand Prix sports car races, model airplane clubs. and go-kart races.

The golf course will be financed 50 percent by city funds. from issuance of revenue bonds, and 50 percent by federal funds through the Bureau of Outdoor Recreation.

City officials hope to award a construction contract by mid-July, with completion before the 1969 season.

City Manager Norris Olson said the cost of retiring the revenue bonds will be met with green fees.



The top 500 companies in the U.S. in sales showed a nearly 8 percent increase in gross sales in 1967 altho profits fell by about 3 percent. The gross sales of the top 500 were \$359 billion with profits at \$22 billion.

GM had the top earnings, \$1.6 billion, altho its profit fell by 9%. Standard of New Jersey was the only other corporation to make a billion. Texaco and IBM had the highest profit margins in relation to sales, more than 12%.

Ranking the companies by assets rather than sales or profits produced a more compact list, dominated by banks and insurance companies. Ranking by "sales" wouldn't work for commercial banks and "profits" would be excluded by mutual life insurance companies.

American Telephone & Telegraph is first on this list, with \$37.6 billion in assets.



Trade Protection A Farm Threat

A protectionist philosophy growing in several sections of the economy looms as a real danger to U.S. agriculture, which already is being sorely tested. Dr. John A. Schnittker, undersecretary of Agriculture, said in Kansas City last week.

Dr. Schnittker said protectionism is apparent in the steel, fabrics, chemical and beef industries, the latter, of course, itself a vital part of agriculture. Orville Freeman, Agriculture secretary, has testified before a congressional committee on the peril of protective legisla-

"We are greatly concerned about it because of our position as an agricultural exporter," Dr. Schnittker said. "It is a very important issue, almost a crisis.

"If we cut off, or make it difficult, to import steel, fabrics and chemicals from Japan and Europe, they are going to retaliate in wheat, rice, corn and soybeans."

Exports account for roughly one-sixth of the dollar volume of the 40-billion-dollar agriculture economy, the undersecretary observed, and for the produce of one out of every four acres in grain production. Thus, any threat to these markets must be viewed as grave, he

Railroads Shed No Tears Over Loss Of Passenger Trains

The railroad industry says the nation's passenger trains may soon join the stagecoach in oblivion — and it doesn't appear to be sorry.

The fault lies with the modern American traveler who has deserted the trains for planes and automobiles, says the Association of American Railroads in a pamphlet responding to complaints of late trains, poor service and ancient equipment.

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While the industry didn't exactly say "good riddance," it was clear railroad officials are shedding few tears.

The pamphlet, entitled "The Case of the Vanishing Passenger Train," says railroads are losing money on passenger service that could be better spent in modernizing for an expected heavy increase in freight traf-

The railroads, frequent target of complaints from the public and members of Congress whenever a passenger run is abolished, doesn't think any more money should be spent to try to save money-losing trains.

"There is nothing to gain and much to lose - by continuing these runs with present equipment," the pamphlet says.

New high-speed trains being developed with the help of the Department of Transportation are described as "an expensive experiment" in which the industry apparently has little





Auto Policies To Cover Risk Of Uninsured Driver

All companies writing automobile liability insurance in Kansas must offer uninsured motorist coverage in the policies effective July 1, a State Insurance Department official said.

Ron Todd, supervisor of the fire and casualty section of the insurance department, said this is the result of a law passed by the 1968 legislature.

He said the insured had the right to reject the coverage but must do so in writing. Otherwise the coverage will be added automatically to all policies that do not include this provision as the policies come up for renewat after July 1.

Todd said rates vary among insurance companies but the added coverage would cost about \$4 a year on the average.

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



He Believes Minimum Tillage Way To Cut Corn Costs

By Gary J. Morehead

Minimum-tillage practices in the growing of corn and other farm crops have come about because the farmer is constantly looking for ways to improve his products and at the same time reduce his operating costs. This has become possible largely because of the adaptation of chemicals to farm use which enables a farmer to raise a weed free crop without repeated cultivation practices.

Wilfrid Johnson, a Riley County farmer, has employed a method of minimum-tillage for corn which at the same time makes flood irrigation possible before the corn seedlings emerge.

Johnson's system starts with minimum-tillage in the preparation of the seedbed. The crop residue from the previous season is chopped and mixed with the topsoil to a depth of six inches by a disking operation. At this time a dry starter fertlizer is broadcast on the field. Then anhydrous ammonia is applied by a knife-type applicator which at the same time serves to loosen the soil. Following this the ground is chiseled to a depth of nine or ten inches.

At planting time the ground is first blank listed in 40 inch

rows. This operation involves listing the soil deep enough to produce ridges upon which the seed is then planted. After the ridges have been established by the listing operation the corn is planted by a furrow opener with the disk openers removed. By this method the corn is placed on top of the ridges at a depth of about two inches. An insecticide is applied during the planting operation to reduce insect damage as the seed sprouts.

Thus this system of planting corn leaves the corn plant on top of the ridges with a furrow between each row. Johnson believes that this will be better than having the plant in the furrow for several reasons. First he feels that the seedlings will have a better chance of emerging through the soil without the danger of crusting because any heavy rains will run off into the furrows thus leaving the ridges to dry off without excessive packing. Second he feels that by having the seeds on top of the ridges this will enable him to flood irrigate the field to start the crop off in the absence of adequate moisture. The water can be channeled down the furrows, thus preventing erosion of the seed out of the ground.

"Another advantage to the system comes when you can irrigate the crop at any stage in its growing period, Johnson stat-

Johnson feels that the percentage of kernels planted to the number of stalks that survive will be higher because you eliminate any coverage of the small plants that occurs when the

crop is cultivated.

Immediately after planting Johnson applied a pre-emergence herbicide in broadcast manner. He feels that this application will prevent the growth of any weeds for the duration of the growing season. Broadcasting the field should prevent any weed growth in the field, thus eliminating the necessity of cultivating the crop.

If by chance weeds were to start to grow in the early summer Johnson feels it will be possible to cultivate the crop with a conventional cultivator. This process would then add soil to the ridges which would continue to allow for flood irrigation.

Minimum-tillage practices have become popular in recent years because of the increased savings in labor and machinery costs afforded to the producer. Johnson feels that this system of corn production can save as many as three cultivations which were previously required in the conventional method of planting corn in the furrow. This will amount to a savings of up to five dollars per acre.

Johnson also feels that the yields can be increased due to the elimination of weeds by the broadcast treatment method. This could add five to ten bushels to the yield per acre.




