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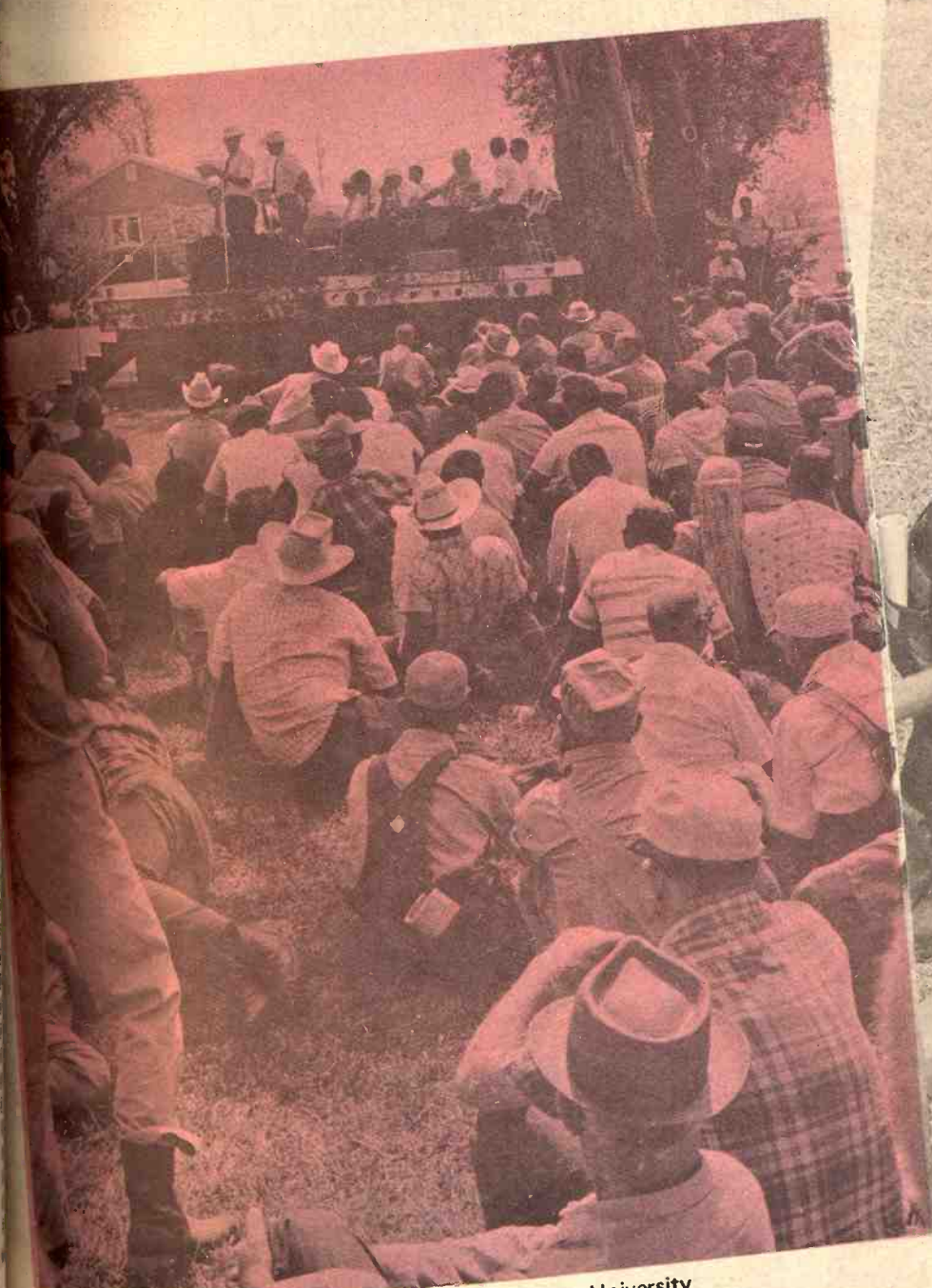

Central Soya Buys PayWay Feed

The outstanding stock of Pay Way Feed Mills, Inc., Kansas City-based livestock and poultry feed manufacturer, will be acquired by Central Soya Company, Inc., Fort Wayne, Ind., the chairman of the boards of the two companies announced.

Mrs. Oscar Straube, chairman of the board of Pay Way Feed Mills, Inc., since her husband's death in 1958, retired upon completion of acquisition last week.

Consolidation of the two organizations into a Central Soya production and marketing unit with headquarters in Kansas City is expected to be completed by Oct. 15.

Pay Way Feed Mills, Inc., of Kansas City, was founded in 1945 by the late Oscar Straube and expanded to its present size under the leadership of Straube's son, Max Straube, who died in August.

Facilities include plants in Kansas City; Moberly, Mo.; Hastings, Neb., and Hutchinson, Kan.; a toll mill in Springfield, Mo., and a warehouse in Cherryvale, Kan. Pay Way, one of the largest independent feed manufacturers in this area, distributes its products in an 8-state region.

From 1958 to 1968 Pay Way

doubled in size and doubled again in the last three years, a spokesman said. Business volume last year was more than \$14 million, and is approaching \$15 million for the current 12 months, he said, adding that Pay Way is the largest single acquisition in the history of Central Soya.

Robert F. Hagans, former president of Pay Way, has been named general manager of the consolidated organization, and Dean Warnstaff, Vice-president of marketing at Pay Way, will be sales manager of the Master Mix Missouri-Kansas feed marketing division.

There are 170 Pay Way employees involved in the transaction, but no immediate changes in personnel in either organization is planned, a company spokesman said. Central Soya employs about 7,000 persons.

Central Soya is a soybean processor and livestock and poultry feed manufacturer. Its food division provides frozen entrees, such as raw or cooked pork and beef cuts for hospitals, restaurants, nursing homes and school lunch programs.

Both companies will be in a stronger position as a result of the merger to better serve the agricultural communities of Missouri, Kansas and Nebraska, Douglas G. Fleming, executive vice-president of Central Soya, said after the announcement.

"For the long pull," he said, "we expect to effect efficiencies by combining and upgrading production and marketing facilities

of both companies and to maintain those product brand names and formulas under the Master Mix label which have proved to have the greater customer acceptance in the three states in past years."

Consumer Food Prices May Stabilize

Consumer food prices have gone up again in 1971, but there's a good chance they may stabilize from now on into fall.



Mildred Walker, a Kansas State University economist in consumer marketing, says that for all of 1971, retail store prices may average out 2 to 3 percent higher than a year ago.

Eating out isn't any less expensive either, says Miss Walker. Labor costs have risen at a higher pace than food. The cost of eating out is continuing up, says Miss Walker, though at a slower pace than last year.

The economist says families are spending a smaller percentage of

their disposable incomes on food again this year.

However, the demand for food will continue high because of increases in income and population.

Food prices at home in June averaged 3 percent above a year ago, compared with increases of 4 percent for non-food items and 5 1/2 percent for services.

Seven Inbred Milo Lines From Kansas, Nebraska

Seven inbred lines of grain sorghum, all with cytoplasm not available in presently cultivated sorghums, are being released by the Kansas Agricultural Experiment Station in cooperation with the Nebraska station and the U.S. Department of Agriculture, Dr. Floyd W. Smith, director of the Kansas station, has announced.

Smith said the sorghum inbred lines (KS34 thru KS40) are of interest only to sorghum breeders. All are Combine Kafir-60 genetic types, and all but KS40 have sterile cytoplasm.

The six new sterile cytoplasm originated in noncultivated grass sorghums. That may make them differ from milo cytoplasm so they

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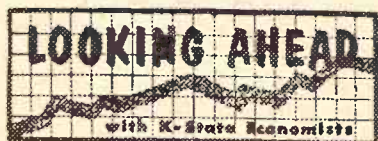
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2 Guess A 10 To 15 Cent Decline In Wheat Price

The 1971 wheat crop is the largest on record, and as a result, prices are going to drop below last year's level. Dr. A. L. (Roy) Frederick, an extension economist at Kansas State University, said that wheat prices are expected to move downward as the harvest of spring wheat progresses. "Average price paid to farmers nationally could be from 10 to 15 cents below last year's \$1.34 per bushel," the economist said. Frederick said one factor affecting wheat prices this fall and winter is the expected increase in production of feed grains this year. With record crops of corn and grain sorghum expected, less wheat will

be fed to livestock.

On the brighter side, Frederick said early 1971-72 wheat prices have been stronger than a year ago. Kansas wheat price received by farmers during mid-July, 1971, was \$1.29 per bushel compared to \$1.14 a year earlier.

Production figures based on August 1 USDA forecast show a 1971 wheat crop estimated at 1,600 million bushels. This record-breaking crop is 16 percent above the relatively small 1970 figure.

Nationally, the crop is expected to

yield a record 32 bushels per harvested acre, an increase of about 1 bushel per acre from last year's previous record high.

The total U.S. supply of wheat for 1971-72 (August 1 estimates) is predicted to be 2,331 million bushels, up 67 million bushels from last season.

Wheat stocks on July 1 were 730 million bushels, down 17 percent from a year earlier. Frederick indicates carryover stocks in the summer of 1972 could be up by around 170 million bushels.

The economist says domestic wheat use of 1971-72 will probably be down about 20 million bushels from the 800 million bushels of last season. The anticipated decline will occur primarily in wheat feeding.

Frederick says to expect a decline in U.S. wheat exports for the 1971-72 marketing year. The anticipated 10 to 15 percent reduction is due to a better harvest in Europe this year.

Spring wheat acreage in Canada is up 50 percent from a year ago.



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National Alfalfa Enters Into New Farm Fields

The National Alfalfa Dehydrating and Milling Co. has entered into three new fields—irrigated corn production, cattle feeding and retail farm supplies—by buying Charles R. Peterson Properties Inc. of Nebraska during the year.

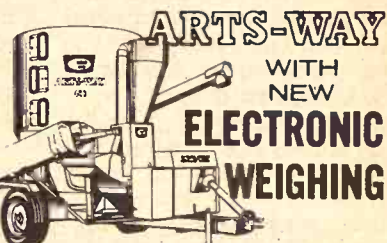
The Overland Park-based firm's president is Charles R. Peterson.

With the acquisition the company nearly doubled its gross to \$15 million from sales of alfalfa meal, corn and other farm products and to close to \$2 million from cattle feeding and management.

The company showed a \$110,000 profit before interest expense and loss on commodity futures trading. After these expenses, a loss of \$238,000 was put on the books, still less than half the loss in 1970.

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Milo Price May Hold, Even With Record Feed Crops

Record crops of corn, grain sorghum, and wheat point to lower feed grain prices in 1971-72 than in 1970-71.

That's the word, from Dr. A. L. (Roy) Frederick, an Extension economist at Kansas State University.

Frederick said current prospects for 1971-72 (based on August 1, 1971 estimates) point to feed grain supplies of around 236 million tons, or about 28 million more than 1970-71.

Feed grain demand for next year is expected to increase slightly as a result of increased feeding rates per animal unit for livestock and poultry. Domestic use may be up from 4 to 5 million tons.

"Total use, however, is expected to be 25 million tons less than 1971

production," Frederick says. "This would mean that carryover at the end of 1971-72 would be about 60 million tons on October 1, 1972."

The economist said that feed grain exports in 1971-72 may decline around one to two million tons from this year's level of 18.7 million tons.

Looking at the corn situation, Frederick says the corn supply for 1971-72 will total about 6.1 billion bushels, up approximately 20 percent from last year. Production is expected to be a record 5,345 million bushels, breaking the previous high of 4,760 million bushels in 1967.

Total utilization of corn during the 1971-72 period is expected to be 4.6 billion bushels, up 140 million bushels from 1970-71.

Corn used as livestock feed is expected to total about 3.7 billion bushels in 1971-72. This compares to 3.6 billion bushels in 1970-71. Exports



of corn in 1971-72 are expected to continue near the level of 1970-71.

Corn prices in 1970-71 are expected to be about \$1.36 per bushel, or 28 cents above the national average loan level of \$1.08 per bushel.

Frederick said that with production expected to exceed consumption by as much as 800 million bushels in 1971-72, prices will probably average near the loan level. This means that prices would be from 20 to 30 cents lower than in 1970-71.

Turning to grain sorghum, Frederick said the supply for 1971-72 will total about one billion bushels. This would be up about 7 percent

from last year's short supply, but 6 percent below the 1965-69 average.

U. S. grain sorghum production this year is estimated at 908 million bushels, more than 200 bushels larger than the 1970 crop.

Total utilization of grain sorghums in the 1971-72 marketing year is estimated at 880 million bushels, about 40 million bushels more than in the 1970-71 season.

Exports will probably decline by about 10 million bushels from the 1970-71 level of 140 million bushels, Frederick said.

The price picture for grain sorghums in relation to corn is bright. Frederick said that while much depends on the final outcome of the 1971 corn and grain sorghum crops, indications are that sorghum prices will continue high in relation to corn this fall and winter.

"If corn production estimates continue to be in excess of 5 billion bushels, look for harvesttime prices for grain sorghum in the \$1.60 to \$1.70 range. With a corn crop of less than 5 billion bushels, prices received by farmers at harvesttime are likely to be in the \$1.70 to \$1.80 range," he said.

"With overall lower feed grain prices for 1971-72, it is probable that less wheat will be fed than in 1970-71," Frederick continued. "Thus, lower wheat prices may be an indirect result of larger corn and grain sorghum supplies during the next marketing year."

Two New Soybean Strains Released

Two new soybean varieties will be available to certified seed growers in Kansas after harvest this year, Dr. Floyd W. Smith, director of the Kansas Agricultural Experiment Station, has announced.

One of them, Columbus, a purple-flowered soybean, is the first soybean variety developed by Kansas State University scientists. About 1,600 bushels of it will be distributed to certified growers.

Williams, the other one, is a white-flowered variety developed by the Illinois Agricultural Experiment Station.

The Plant Science Research Division of the U.S. Department of Agriculture cooperated in

developing both strains. Several state experiments cooperated in testing. Oklahoma is joining in releasing the Columbus strain. Williams is being released in Kansas, Maryland, Nebraska, and Ohio. It has about 600 bushels of seed to distribute to growers this year. Parents of Columbus include Lincoln, Ohio, and Kent, Columbus, and some resistance to root rot. Columbus matures 10 days later than Williams' parents. Adams, and Wayne during 1969 and 1970 in Kansas, Iowa, Kansas, Maryland, Missouri, New Jersey, Ohio, and Wisconsin. Williams averaged 45.9 for Calland and 45.9 for Calland. Williams matures 6 or 7 days later than Calland or Wayne.

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See Moderate Recovery Pace

The U.S. economy is expected to continue recovery at a moderate pace going into 1972. Personal income—both farm and non-farm—will be up slightly, but unemployment will show only gradual improvement. Farm production generally will be up, but prices will fall below the 1970 level.

That's the economic picture for Ken Kingsley, an Extension economist at Kansas State University. Looking at President Nixon's recent economic move, Kingsley says the program as a whole—including the 90 day wage-price freeze, changes in international

relationships, and the tax and spending proposals—will definitely have a short-range stimulating effect on the economy. "But the long range effect will depend on what happens at the end of the 90 days," he added.

The economist says some of the President's remarks were in the form of recommendations, such as cancelling the automobile excise tax, and would not take effect unless approved by Congress.

Discussing the U.S. economic picture as it shaped up before the Nixon announcement, Kingsley said that despite the possible detrimental effect of work stoppages in some major industries, the economic expansion will be fueled by such factors as strong demand for residential housing, businessmen's efforts to replenish inventories, and growing state and local government needs.

"Home building has reached a current annual level of two million units, and may continue at this pace into 1972," Kingsley observed. He added that recent increases in mortgage rates coupled with higher construction costs, may reduce the demand for new housing.

Looking at the job picture, Kingsley says unemployment rates will probably show only gradual

improvement by winter, due primarily to industry efforts to offset rising costs. He said to look for unemployment to run around 6 percent in 1971, dropping to 5.6 percent in 1972. "The Nixon move could possibly reduce that figure to 5 percent or below in 1972," he added.

He paints a brighter picture for workers take-home pay, indicating that disposable personal income for 1971 as a whole should average around 8 percent above last year, and could show the same kind of gain for 1972. He bases this prediction on rising wage rates, a longer working week, expanding transfer payments, and some further rise in federal tax exemptions. "Hopefully, inflation price increases will hold to a rate of 4 percent or less and new economic policy reduce it to as low as 3 percent," he adds.

Turning to farm incomes, Kingsley says producer prices in the second half of 1971 and early 1972 will average moderately above a year earlier. Cash receipts should be around \$49.2 billion, with gross farm income reaching \$56.6 billion.

However, production expenses will be up by about \$2 billion over last year's \$40.9 billion, leaving a net farm income of around \$15.7 billion, or \$5,374 per farm. For 1972, net income is expected to rise to only \$15.8 billion or \$5,495 per farm.

Car Insuror Gives 6% Back After Claims Diminish

State Farm Mutual Insurance Co. has announced it will distribute dividends totaling \$804,000 to its 238,000 Kansas automobile insurance policyholders during the next six months.

Donald W. Dugan, regional vice president for State Farm, said policyholders will be notified of the amount of their dividend with their regular premium notice.

"Most of our private passenger car insurance customers in Kansas will get a dividend amounting to 6.3 per cent of their insurance bills," Dugan said.

The dividend will be paid as a credit on the next premium due. For persons who do not wish to renew their policy with State Farm, the payment will be made by check.

Dugan said the Kansas refund is part of more than \$30 million being returned to customers by State Farm nationally. A total of 31 states and the District of Columbia will share in that dividend. The percentage paid in each state depends upon how profitable State Farm's operations were in that state.

State Farm last raised Kansas rates in August, 1970, Dugan said. He said estimates of the amount of money needed to run the company's business in the first half of 1971 were high.

"Our total costs were below what we thought they would be and we ended up taking in more money than we needed," Dugan said.

"So we're giving some of it back. It's as simple as that."

Dugan said the good first half of 1971 was due primarily to the company's Kansas policyholders having fewer claims.

He said the reduction in claims probably is associated in part with an economic recession during which people drive less.

Dugan said the frequency of bodily injury liability claims was down 12.1 per cent and collision claims were down 11.7 per cent during the first six months this year.

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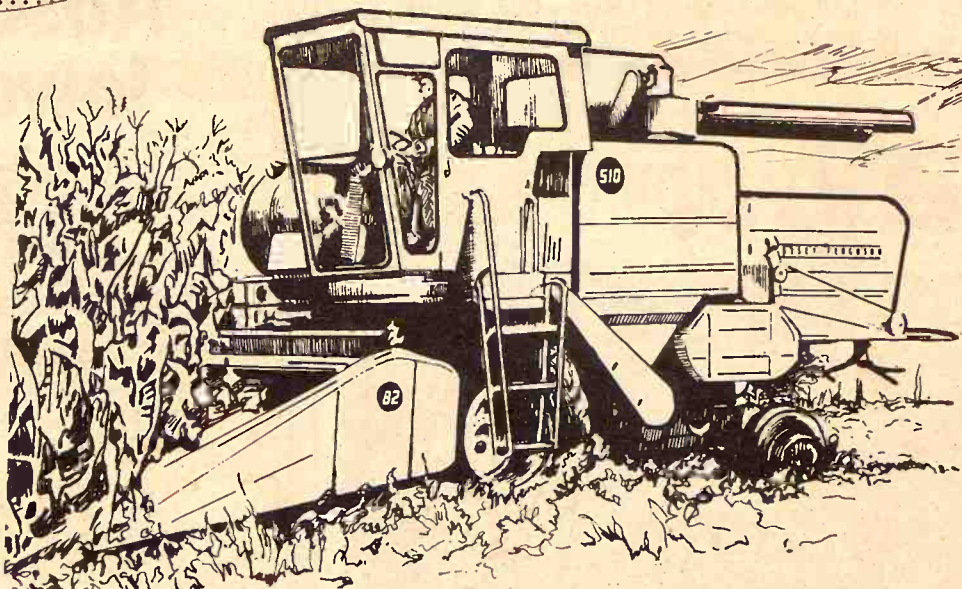

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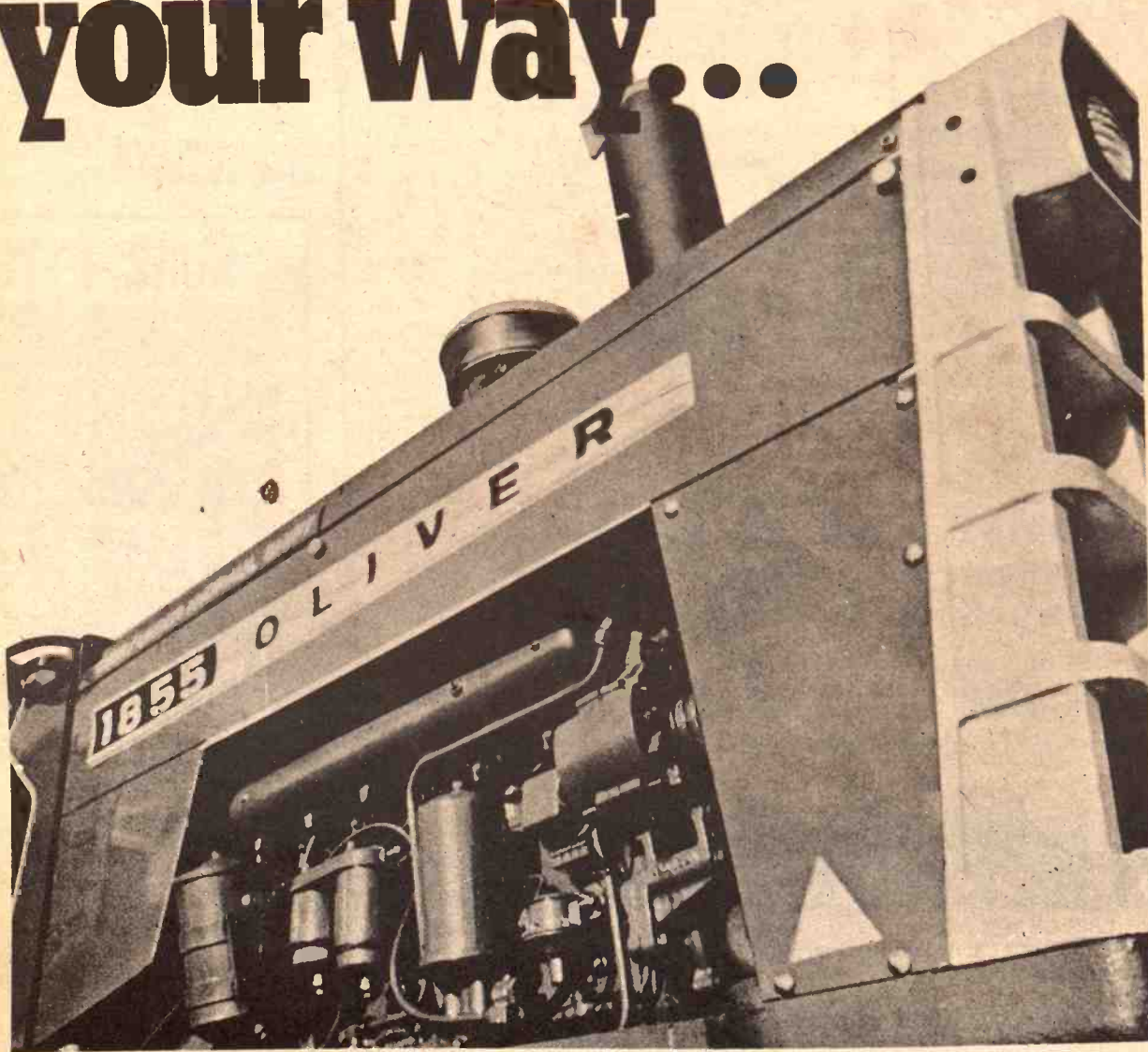
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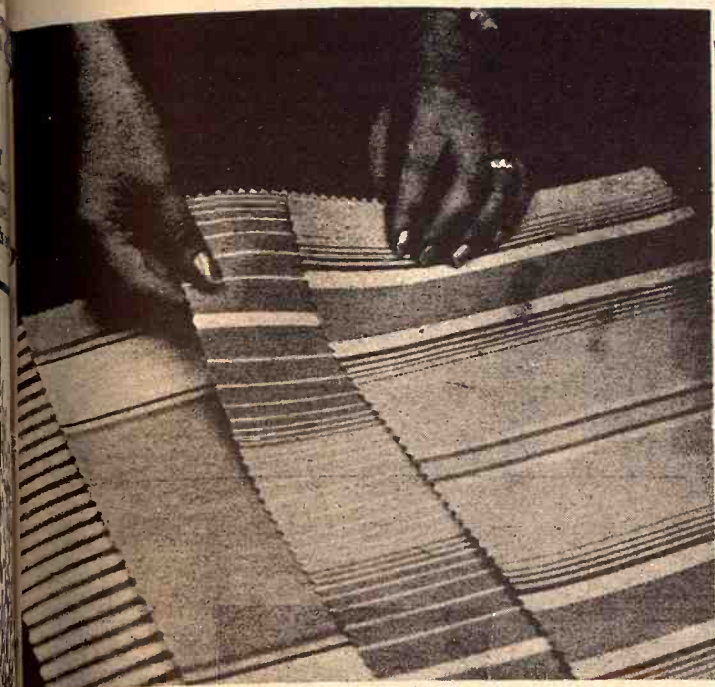
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Ticking Fabrics Fine For Decorating Purposes



Are you aware that ticking fabrics are not preshrunk because of the simple fact that mattresses will not go into washing machines?

Nonetheless, dollar for dollar, the ticking stripe is one of the best values today. Although ticking stripes have become high style, they are only a fraction of the price of comparable high style print fabrics and wear four to one.

The easiest place to find ticking is in a mattress because that is where the most fabric is used. If you want to add a decorator's touch to your home, use ticking fabrics to camouflage old walls. They make really handsome slipcovers and

interiors.

If your local department or fabrics store cannot provide you with ticking, you may have to find a jobber who stocks ticking fabrics for small manufacturers and interior decorators.

Be sure to pre-shrink ticking fabric before you cut and sew. Avoid harsh detergents and hot water. Tickings last the lifetime of the mattress on the mattress. You will have to give them a little care if you are going to use them on furniture. But you will not be disappointed if you do.

Boiler Or Baker?

How can you tell if a potato is a boiler or a baker?

By testing the specific gravity. It gives an indication of the amount of

"dry matter" potatoes contain.

If you put potatoes into a specific salt solution and they sink, the higher the specific gravity, the

better the baked potato. So when the sign at the supermarket says "best for baking," there probably is a reason.

Add Starch To Wash For Crisp Finish To Clothes

To give your freshly laundered clothes a crisp finish, try adding starch or fabric finish to your wash. The solutions should be added to your wash last. Not only do they add to the finish of the clothes but they prevent soil from becoming too imbedded in the fabric.

Available in dry, liquid or spray forms, starches are derived from vegetable sources or plastic resin.

The least expensive, dry starch, must first be mixed into a hot or cold solution. Hot starch works the best and makes ironing easier. Liquid starches are already prepared. Both are good for use in automatic washing machines.

The starch solution should be poured into a washer tub of water and agitated from two to three minutes, the controls should be advanced to spin to remove all moisture. Rinse the tub thoroughly after starching.

Spray starches are popular because of their convenience but are more expensive than the other forms of starch. But for those who do little starching, they are satisfactory.

There are also special fabric finishes in spray forms that give

some body to fabric and make ironing easier. They do not give the stiffness of starch but do result in a certain crispness and resistance to soil.

Wash Umbrella In Bathtub

When your umbrella is dusty or soiled and needs washing, take it to the bathtub and you will have plenty of room to give it a good washing. First open the umbrella and brush well. Then dip a soft brush in thick, lukewarm suds and scrub the umbrella inside and out, paying attention to the creases. To rinse, turn on the shower. Leave umbrella open until thoroughly dry.

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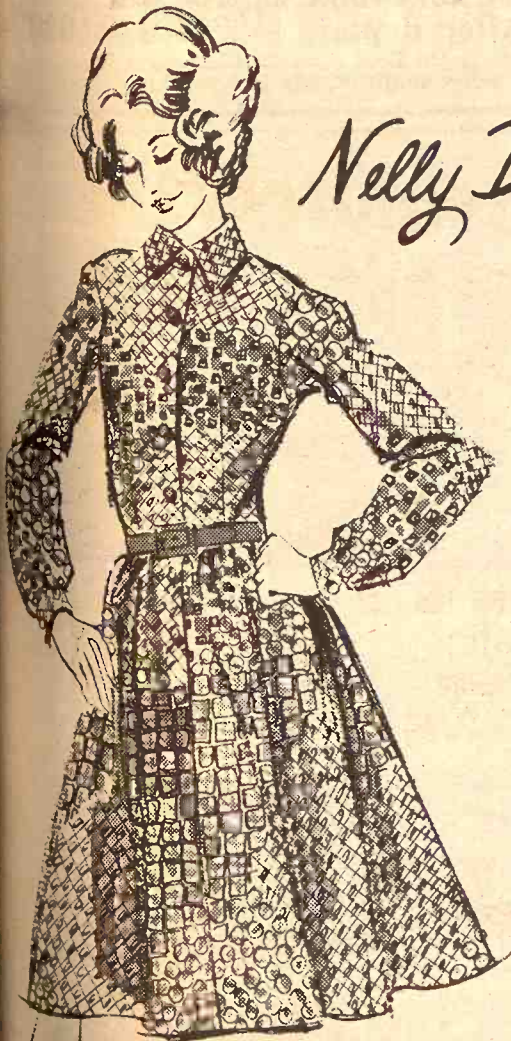
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Easier Ironing

For easier ironing of button bands, snap fasteners and other grippers, place a heavy towel on the ironing board, put the article right side down on it and iron on the wrong side. Also, use a heavy towel under a placket before ironing over a closed zipper.

Tack Down Cloth

Include a box of thumbtacks in the picnic basket. They will be handy for keeping the tablecloth and plates from blowing away on a breezy day.

Bake Frozen Pie Shell Longer

If an unfilled pie shell is frozen when you bake it, you will have to increase the baking time by at least three to five minutes.

Use Semi-Gloss On Hard Use Areas

To make walls in the kitchen, bathroom and children's play areas easier to keep clean, give them a coat or two of semi-gloss enamel.

Good For Mending

When mending men's and children's knitted underwear, use the good part of a man's worn white sock. Place the patch on the outside of the garment.

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Aim To Hold Farm Population-But How?

The major problem with the nation's countryside, as the government sees it, is how to keep what's left of the rural population out of the already crowded cities and suburbs where most Americans live.

The answer, according to the Nixon administration and Congress, is to make rural life more attractive and give farmers and small town Americans a greater share in the nation's prosperity.

There's some disagreement about means. For example, part of administration plan to improve rural life involves revenue-sharing proposals that some congressmen oppose.

But there's little argument about the goal: stemming the migration to the cities by creating more and better jobs and services in the countryside. Increased employment for marginal farmers is a major aim.

Declaring the nation's population may jump by 100 million by the year 2,000, Secretary of Agriculture Clifford M. Hardin says the question is whether all the growth will be in congested, besieged cities or whether a good part can occur in the countryside and in towns of 50,000 or less.

Before he left office, former Secretary of Agriculture Orville Freeman spoke of the "rural-urban imbalance, the anomaly of 70 per cent of this nation's people crowded into less than 2 per cent of the land and 30 per cent rattling around on all the rest."

For much of the nation's history, the countryside held the population edge. Agriculture Department figures give some idea of the switch to the cities:

o In about 1940, about 30.5 million Americans lived on farms; in 1970, 9.7 million.

o During World War II, the flight from the farms averaged 1.6 million persons yearly; during 1965-69, 600,000.

The current best guess on the exodus from farms is 200,000 or so annually, a dwindling number that

reflects not so much a reversal in the trend to the cities as the fact there are fewer farm people to leave.

The specific needs of rural America were listed recently for the House Agriculture Committee by Undersecretary of Agriculture J. Phil Campbell: jobs, housing, transportation systems, adequate educational opportunities and health care, man-power training and strengthen loan opportunities for farm and nonfarm economic growth, special attention to rural credit and taxation.

The administration claims it "has stepped up emphasis on rural development to a level never before achieved in government," according to Dr. Henry Ahlgren who heads the Agriculture Department's rural development efforts.

He cited a \$1.1-billion rural revenue-sharing proposal President Nixon submitted to Congress and accelerated administration support for existing agriculture and rural programs as major substantiations for the claims.

October 7 Date For Swine Industry Day At K-State

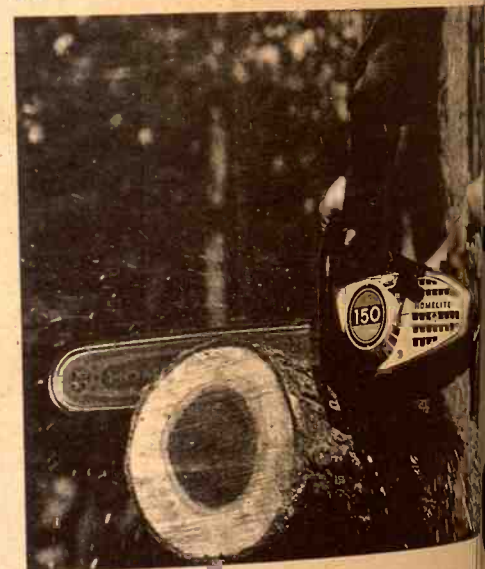
The annual Kansas swine industry day program—"bigger and better than ever"—will be held at Kansas State University in Manhattan October 7.

Wendell Moyer, KSU Extension swine specialist, said registration will begin at 9 a.m. at Weber Hall arena with the program getting underway at 10 in Williams auditorium at Umberger Hall. If

attendance at past activities is any indication, 500 persons will attend. Topics on this year's program include: finishing swine, implementation of sizeable transmissible disease (TGE), and crossbreeding. "Each of these areas has interest to Kansas," explained Moyer. Dr. Irvin T. Omtved, State University, featured out-of-state tell breeders how to tell of crossbreeding. Omtved is a researcher. His research efforts include evaluation of heat stress on performance, and feedlot performance. The afternoon program will include facilities and a research in progress. Visitors will hear reports on swine breed project, creep and post-frozen pork acceptance, addition of various ratios of weaned piglets. 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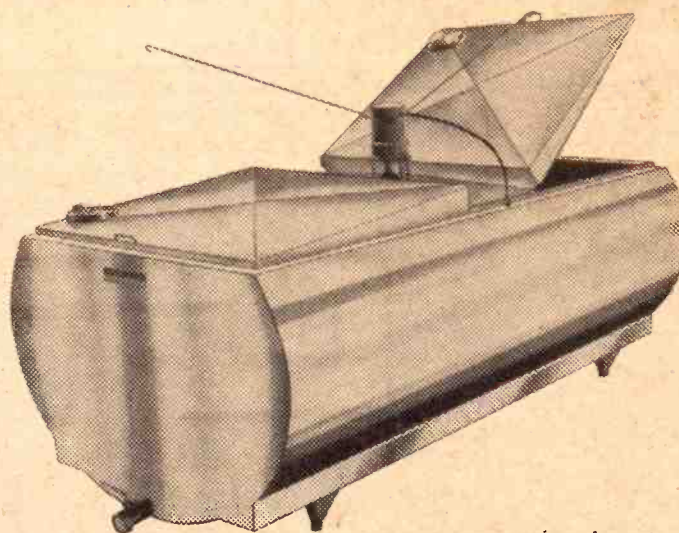
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Man's Fiddling Changing Weather?

The world's climate is cooling slightly in a 30-year trend but average temperature in New York City has risen in the last 13 years.

Does the change mean something is just a statistical vagary? Weather experts disagree, but the National Weather Service has begun a major study of long-term weather conditions in New York.

Some weather scientists think the study may show that man and his works may be effecting subtle changes in the weather.

For example, some weather experts think there is a trend to more rain than snow in winter in New York. The heat generated by the bricks-and-mortar environment may be a cause.

There are fewer clear days in New

York than in the past. Is air pollution the cause? Why shouldn't a New Yorker be able to see vast distances from the top of its innumerable skyscrapers?

Do those tall buildings serve as a brake on the winds which are needed to cleanse the atmosphere?

The aim of the National Weather Service study is a general redefinition of the climate. But there are some practical aspects of it too. For example, a fourth jetport in the metropolitan area is to be built, and the weather study will bear on its location.

Many, perhaps most, weather experts scoff that man's efforts can have much impact on the vast natural forces and energy systems that create climate. But some of them suspect that there are delicate balances in nature that can be upset by man and change the climate.

There are no real questions that cities are warmer than the surrounding countryside. Concentrations of furnaces and machines add to a city's heat and buildings and pavements absorb much heat.

This heat concentration becomes wider as cities grow in population and area.

New York City had a major weather study in 1958, and the 88 years of records studied then showed an average annual temperature of 58.1 degrees in Central Park. Since 1958, the average temperature has been higher than that every year except one.

That statistic contradicts a general cooling of global climate since the 1940s. The significance of it is a large part of what the Weather Service hopes to find out in its new study.

prices could not be frozen below levels prevailing on May 25, 1970.

Magdanz called it "heartening news to the swine industry caught in a low price bind," and indicated pork product prices might be raised to that level.

"Theoretically, they could rise," a spokesman for the association said. "There's lots of room to rise, that's for certain."

Prices have declined around 10 cents per pound under the general retail prices which had prevailed during the spring of 1970.

"But I don't think there will be any increase," the spokesman added, "because of the supply and demand conditions."

"The hog market has been somewhat in trouble since July and with the supply of hogs now, I just can't see how we can raise the prices."

In Wichita, Harry F. Scribner, district director of the Internal Revenue Service, the agency designated to answer questions and investigate complaints about the freeze, confirmed the possibility of pork price hikes.

"The freeze doesn't affect unprocessed items, such as lettuce," Scribner explained. "and it doesn't really affect the pork products until the first step in processing. But if the prices are lower than May 25, 1970, they can legally be raised to that level."

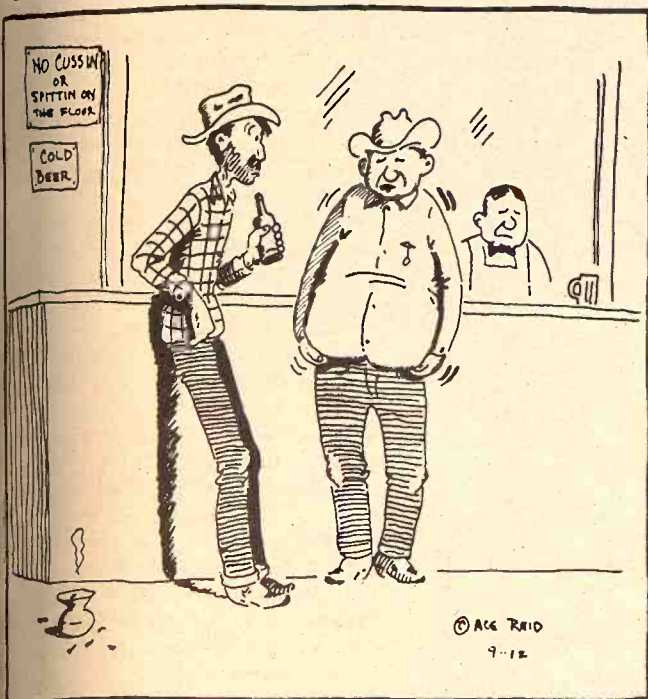

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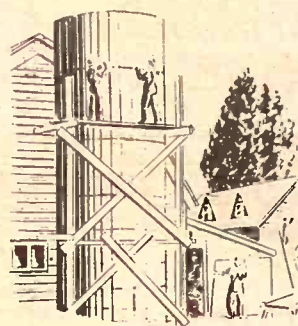
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Pork Price Gains More In Theory Than Practice

Although National Livestock Feeders Association officials claim that, theoretically at least, pork prices may rise despite President Nixon's economic freeze, they add that present market conditions won't allow such an increase.

Don F. Magdanz, executive secretary-treasurer of the organization, had claimed that under the law which authorized the President to initiate the freeze,



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Forage Field Day Covers Broad Range

Good weather and a need for up-to-date information about forage production combined to bring more than 700 farmers from the Grass & Grain area and elsewhere to the annual Fall Forage Field Day at the Kansas State University Agronomy Farm north of Manhattan.

Frank Bieberly, Extension agronomist at KSU and coordinator of the event, said that although the research plots and demonstrations shown during the field day were slightly stressed by dry weather, they still revealed meaningful information about forage and crops for farmers to put to practical use.

Dr. Floyd Smith, director of the Kansas Agricultural Experiment Station, told the visitors that "1971 will be a year long remembered in Kansas agriculture. It's the year we set a record wheat crop on a minimum number of acres which is a tribute to state agricultural research institutions.

"It's also a year of concern about corn blight, wheat diseases, and the threat of drought. These concerns have clearly shown the need for constant research effort toward crop protection from a variety of sources."

Smith also pointed out that much

agricultural research is concerned with environmental quality. He said that funding difficulties stress the need for more research efficiency and the need for cooperation among departments and agencies working in agricultural research.

Here is a rundown on the research projects and demonstrations discussed during the field day.

o Dr. Roscoe Ellis had a demonstration about hunger signs in plants. His laboratory plants showed visual signs of various plant nutritional deficiencies.

o Dr. Benny Eaton described the university's research effort toward finding safe and sure ways of controlling marijuana. These controls involve mechanical, chemical, and biological measures.

o Dr. Cecil Nickel described a newly released soybean variety, Columbus, which was bred at KSU. He said it outyields and matures later than Clark 63, Cutler, and Kent varieties.

o Dr. Calvin Drake told the effects of feeding soybeans to various types of livestock. He concluded that for most livestock, excluding swine, cracked or ground soybeans are a satisfactory source of protein and

that the economics of feeding beans was the critical factor in making the decision. Soybeans for swine should be cooked before feeding.

o Dr. Richard Vanderlip showed sorghum breeding work that indicated grain yields are usually higher with crosses of two dwarf varieties than with the widely-used three dwarf crosses. However, 2-dwarf varieties are much taller than 3-dwarf varieties and consequently usually have more field losses.

o Dr. Kurt Feltner had a demonstration of corn treated simultaneously with herbicide and liquid fertilizer. He noted that the results appeared satisfactory and the one tractor operation was eliminated.

Dr. David Whitney described the behavior of anhydrous ammonia in the soil. He noted that soil should be moist and in good tilth when ammonia is applied, otherwise some of it will escape into the air.

o Ted Walter told of variety evaluations being made on pearl millet. The crop is an important human food in many countries and lends itself to scientific breeding programs. Pearl millet is a good cattle grazer, being equal to the

hybrid sudangrasses.

o Oliver Russ discussed control in spring seeded alfalfa. He said that two herbicides, Eptam, are registered for emergent control of grassy weeds and 2, 4-D (broadleaf weeds) can be used post-emergent weed control. He emphasized the need to follow label directions.

o Dr. Edgar Sorenson outlined parentage and advantages of alfalfa varieties suitable for use. He said farmers would decide which variety to use on basis of its yield potential, disease resistance.

o Dr. Harold Jones described demonstration of deep placement in milo. Results several years' tests show that surface moisture is lacking, fertilizer placement (6 to 12 deep) is usually beneficial.

A panel of KSU professors answered questions from field visitors to conclude the event.

Interested persons can get detailed information about results shown at the field day by contacting their local extension agent.

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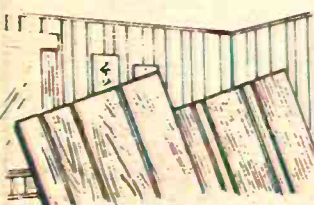


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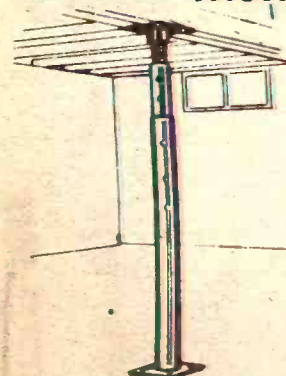
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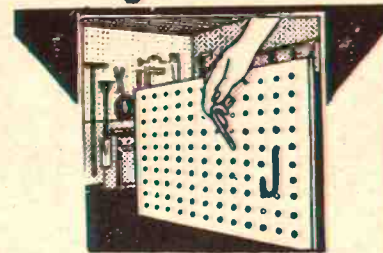
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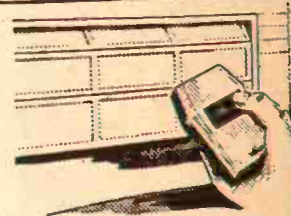

Guess At \$29 Lambs, Spring Hike To \$33-\$35

"Look for lamb prices to decline slightly as we move into the fall, but recover to the \$29 level in December," says Dr. Robert L. Coppersmith, an Extension economist at Kansas State University.



Coppersmith predicts lamb prices to move up to the \$33 to \$35 range next spring. He bases his prediction on the fact that sheep numbers are continuing to decline.

"The lamb crop has been declining continuously since 1960," the economist noted.

For 1971 the lamb crop was 12,910,000 head, or about 4 percent under 1970. Coppersmith predicts the 1972 lamb crop will decrease about 3 to 4 percent.

The feeder lamb business has not been very profitable during the last few years, due to low prices, high death losses, and competition from imported lambs. Coppersmith feels

the picture may be brighter in coming months.

"Feeder lambs will probably sell for around \$27 this fall, and with lower feed costs predicted, the 1971-72 fall and winter season is reasonably optimistic for lamb feeders," he said.

More FmHA Notes For Sale

About 300 million of Farmers Home Administration insured notes will be marketed to the public next month for terms of five and fifteen years, the Agriculture Department announced.

The offering will consist of 600 blocks of non-callable notes, each block having an approximate balance of \$500,000.

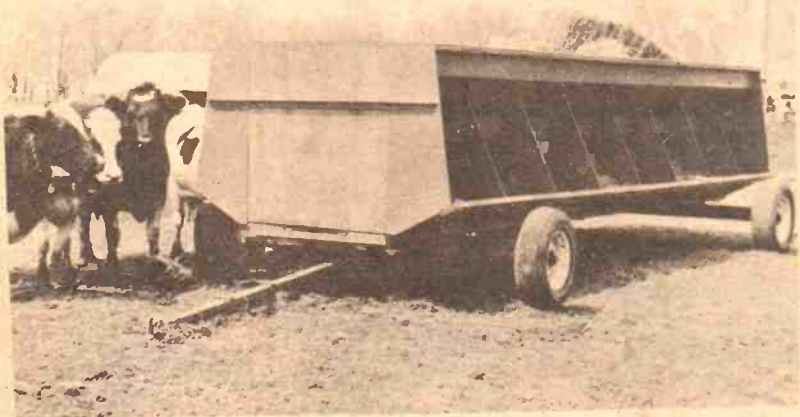
The blocks will be equally divided—30 blocks having a 5 year maturity, and 300 a 15-year maturity. The department said an investor's insurance contract covering each block will invoke the U.S. government credit to insure repayment of principal and interest. The interest rate to investors will be announced later.

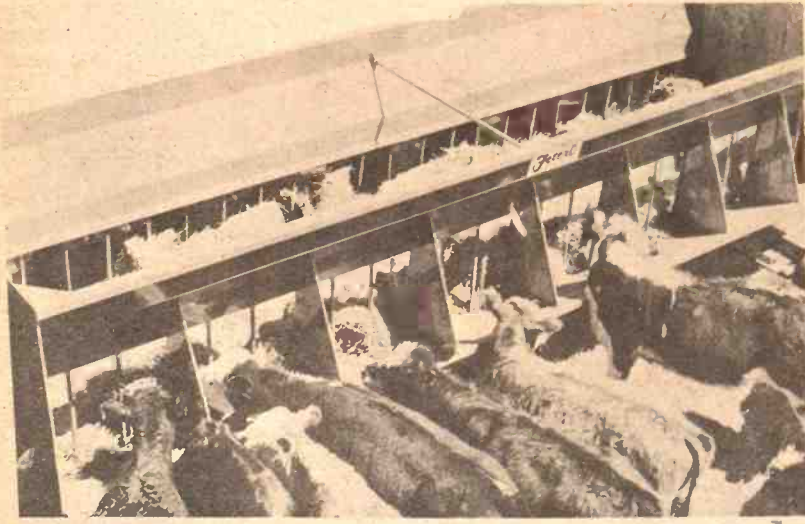

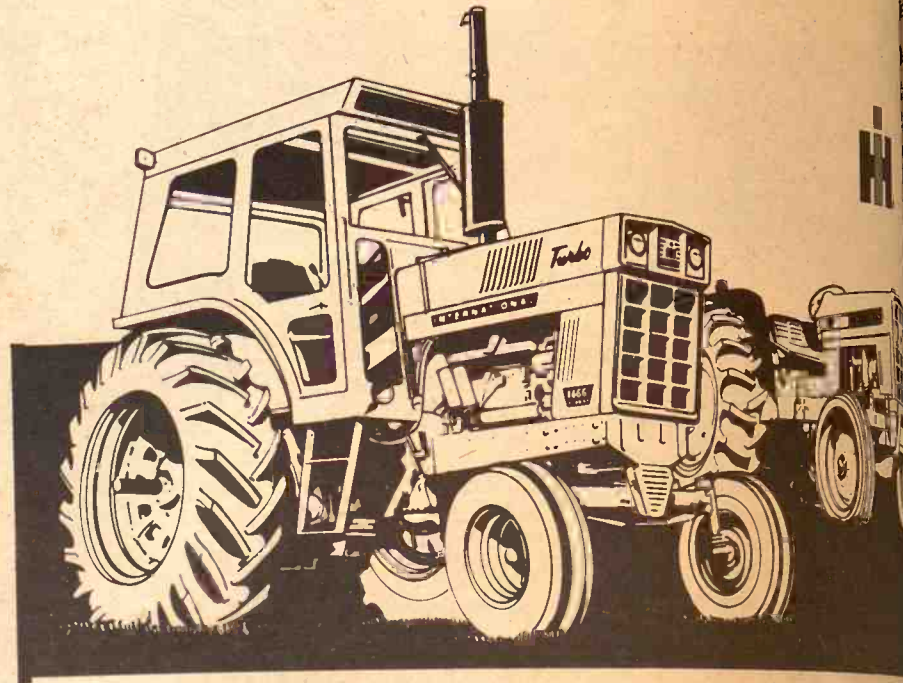

Simerl Strong For Wage Control

The date of August 15, 1971, just might become known as a very important turning point in the economic history of our country. On that date, the President announced some basic changes in economic policies—ones intended to restrain inflation, promote employment, and check the outflow of our dollars and gold reserves.

The effort to restrain inflation by a "freeze," or ceilings, on prices and wages has attracted the most attention here in the United States. While the initial freeze was only for 90 days, some form of wage and restraints will probably be continued after that period. Such

controls may become a permanent part of our economic system.

Role Of Wages Recognized

This action gives official recognition to the fact that excessive increases in wage rates and salaries are the major cause of modern inflation. Heretofore most public officials and economists in the U.S. have advocated obsolete remedies for inflation: They have argued over the relative merits of monetary and credit controls versus control by government spending and taxation. Such methods were effective fifty years ago—but that was when employers, not employees, held the dominant power in setting wage

rates and work rules.

Prices were included in the freeze for strategic purposes—to gain public acceptance, especially among wage and salary workers. I was talking with one of my relatives about this problem a few months ago. A factory worker for many years, he thought that the men there would not object much if "everything" was frozen.

Rising Prices Are Results Of Inflation

Price ceilings have a strong appeal to most people, but using them is not a remedy for inflation. Rising prices are the result not the cause of inflation.

Excessive increases in wages and salaries cause inflation, raising prices, in two ways: (1) upping the cost of providing products and services and (2) adding to the buying power of those who receive the larger pay checks. In economic classroom jargon, boosting wages reduces the supply (the amount available at a given cost) and increases the demand (the amount buyers are willing and able to

spend).

The most effective way to hold down, or reduce, prices is to increase production—to turn out more products or services per dollar. Farmers see this principle in operation with their products every day. The recent decline in corn prices is a well-known example.

Public Support Necessary

The present attempt to control inflation by restraining increases in wages and salaries may not be successful. It will surely fail if it does not receive adequate support from the public, and from all three branches of the Federal Government.

But if the President's effort does fail, inflation will continue and will accelerate. We will then have three choices: (1) let inflation run rampant indefinitely, (2) bring wages and salaries under permanent public control, or (3) lose our freedom to a military dictatorship. This is the lesson of modern history, as demonstrated in many lands.

None of these alternatives is entirely satisfactory, but there are

great differences among them. We expect that our country will make its choice during the next five to ten years.

Price Index Holding Up

Prices received by Kansas farmers at mid-August 1971 were up slightly from July this year and moderately above August 1970 according to the Kansas Crop and Livestock Reporting Service.

The index of prices received for all farm products was 259 percent of the 1910-14 base period compared with 253 the previous month and 245 a year ago.

Principal increases from last month were in beef cattle, calves, milk and eggs. Principal declines from last month were in corn, sorghum grain, soybean and hogs. Compared with a year ago, prices for grains, beef cattle, calves and milk cows were up moderately while prices for hogs were down sharply and eggs down moderately.

Crop Prices

The crop price index was 160 percent of the 1910-14 base period at mid-August, 3 points below July this year but 11 points above August 1970.

Wheat at mid-August averaged \$1.28 per bushel, 1 cent below July but 8 cents above August last year.

Corn was worth \$1.28 per bushel, 13 cents below a month ago but 6 cents above a year ago.

Barley at 95 cents per bushel was 1 cent below a month earlier but 18 cents above a year earlier.

Sorghum grain brought \$2.18 per cwt. compared with \$2.32 the previous month and \$1.80 the previous year.

Soybeans averaged \$2.97 per bushel, 13 cents below July 1971, but 42 cents above August 1970.

Livestock Prices

The livestock and livestock products price index at mid-August was 372 percent of the 1910-14 base

period compared with 356 the previous month and a year earlier.

The meat animal price index was 449 percent in August, up 19 points from July and 25 points above August last year. Hog prices averaged \$18.70 per cwt. 50 cents below a month ago and \$3.10 below a year ago.

Beef cattle brought \$29.70 per cwt., \$1.70 above the previous month and \$2.80 above the previous year.

The dairy price index was 337 in August compared with 334 in July this year and 331 in August last year. A preliminary wholesale milk price of \$5.50 was 5 cents above a month earlier but 10 cents below a year

earlier.

Eggs averaged 24 cents per dozen, 3 cents above July 1971 but 2 cents below August 1970.

Prices Paid

Prices paid by farmers for protein supplements and mixed feeds were a little higher than in August 1970.

UNITED STATES

The index of prices received by the Nation's farmers for farm products at mid-August was 287 percent of the 1910-14 base period, up 1 point from mid-July and up 11 points from August 1970. Prices were higher than in July for cattle, lambs, milk and eggs.

Price decreases from July were noted for grains and hogs.

The index of prices paid by farmers for commodities and services (including interest, taxes, and wage

rates) was 412, up 2 points from mid-July and 22 points above a year ago. The parity ratio in August was 70,

unchanged from July point from August 1970.

Forecast Strong Feeder Market

Prices received for feeder cattle should show some strength during the next 30 days, and then experience a slight decrease during the last 60 days of 1971 and the first 60 days of 1972.

That's the opinion of Dr. Robert L. Coppersmith, an Extension economist at Kansas State University.

Coppersmith expects good slaughter prices during the rest of 1971 and 1972, although he says to look for a short period of erratic price variation.

He predicts prices for choice 300-pound steer calves to range from \$42-\$46 during November and December 1971, and \$44 to \$48 during the April and May 1972 period.

At the other end of the scale, he looks for choice 700-pound steers to run \$32 to \$34 in November and December, and \$33 to \$34 in April and May.

With a good demand for feeder cattle, Coppersmith says to expect prices to remain strong through 1972.

The economist says the public's desire for fed beef will probably continue for many years. American consumers are continuing the trend toward eating more beef at higher prices.

"In 1971, per capita consumption of beef will probably approach 116 pounds, and of this amount, about 60 percent or more will grade choice or better," he says.

Coppersmith indicated that the 1971 calf crop is expected to be 47,092,000 head, up 3 percent over 1970. He estimates total cattle numbers on January 1, 1972, will be around 117.5 million head, an increase of 2.9 million head over the 1971 figure.

Imports of feeder cattle from Canada and Mexico are down by about 150,000 head. "There will be ample feeder cattle to feed this fall and winter but the supply will not be

large enough to cause any major decrease in feeder cattle prices," Coppersmith concluded.

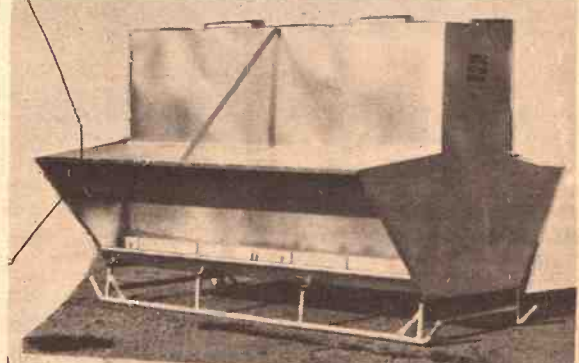

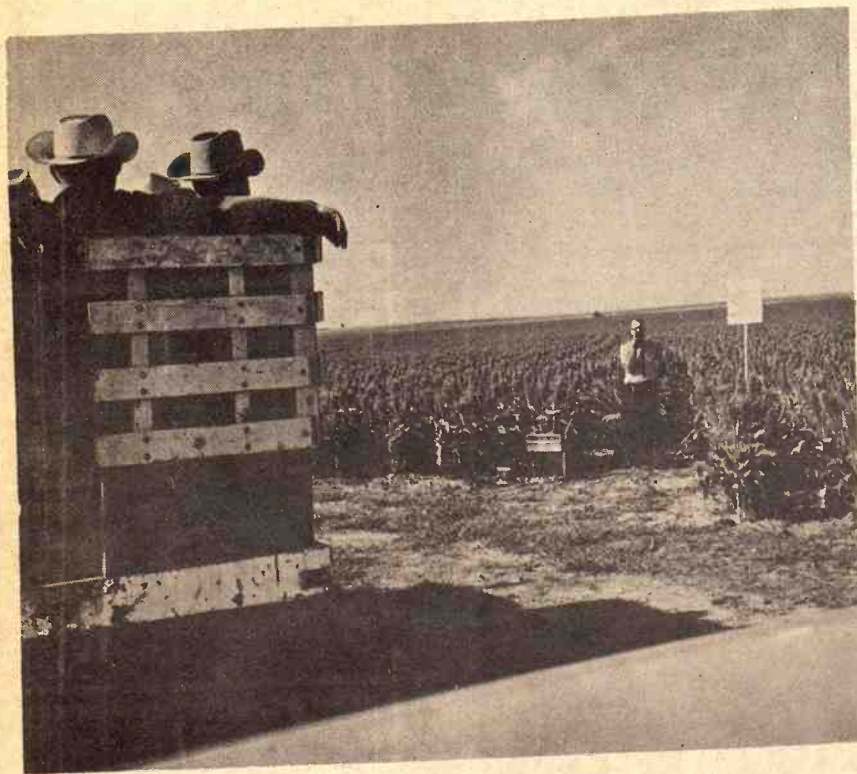

The egg outlook for the next 12 months is not good, and things don't look much better for turkeys.

M. E. Jackson, an Extension economist in poultry marketing at Kansas State University, says all indications point to an average Kansas farm price of not over 25 cents for all graded eggs sold between July 1971 and July 1972.

"Should fall prices increase some, the hatch could also increase and the price might be even lower in early 1972," he indicates.

The economist looks for turkey prices to be a little above break-even this fall even with a slight increase in turkey production.



He believes on-farm prices should be between 21 and 23 cents (live weight) on young toms, and 22 to 24 cents on young hens.

"The early market could be the best as the late hatch of turkey poult is continuing rather high," Jackson says.

Zero Tillage In Study At Field Day Next Week

BELLEVILLE—Is the plow finally obsolete? Some answers to this question and many others will be forthcoming next Wednesday, September 15. This is the date of the fall tour of the K-State North Central Kansas Experiment Fields. Maximum, minimum and zero tillage dryland sorghum plots in four counties will be shown and discussed by K-State agronomists. Cost and return comparisons will also be made by KSU extension farm management economists.

Research plots showing the extremes in systems of sorghum production will be seen on the two North Central dryland experiment fields. Some of the better systems will be seen on farmers fields, and a report from local farmers with several hundred acres of minimum tillage milo will be presented.

Tour stops will be made at 9 a.m. two miles west of Concordia on K-28; at 10:30 a.m. at the Belleville Experiment Field two miles west of Belleville on US 36; at 1:30 p.m. at the Mankato Experiment field 12 miles west of Mankato on US 36; and at 4 p.m. 2 miles north and 1/2 west of Athol in Smith County.

Two related production practices that have increased yields an average of twenty bushels per acre over the past three years will be discussed by Lowell Burchett, NCK Experiment Field Superintendent.

"It is interesting to note that these practices have worked under all tillage systems. The economic implications for our half-million acres of grain sorghum in North Central Kansas is extremely promising," Burchett added.

Area Dairymen Hear Nixon Pitch At Convention

Several hundred G&G area dairy farmers and their families were in the audience at Chicago last week as President Nixon praised farming productivity, promised a control on inflation and new prosperity for farmers, and put in some prominent plugs for his new economic policies.

Nixon spoke before 25,000 dairy farmers at the convention of the Associated Milk Producers Inc.

"Only by increasing productivity can we achieve a higher standard of living with rampant inflation at home. And only by increasing productivity can we win a stronger position over the long run in the marketplaces and trading lanes of the world."

Nixon said his new economic policies promise relief from the "brutal cost-price squeeze" farmers have suffered for years.

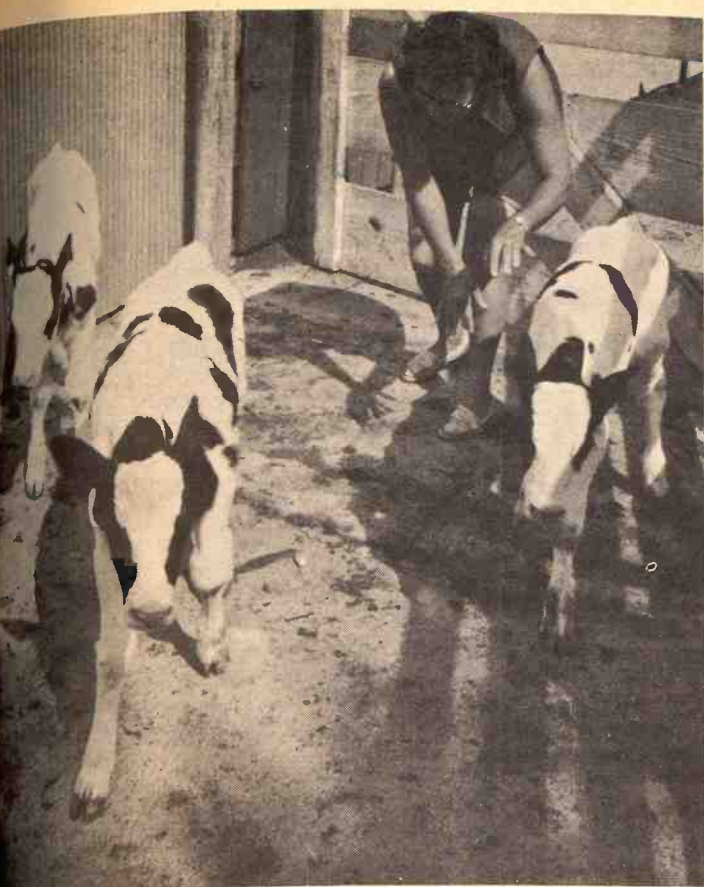

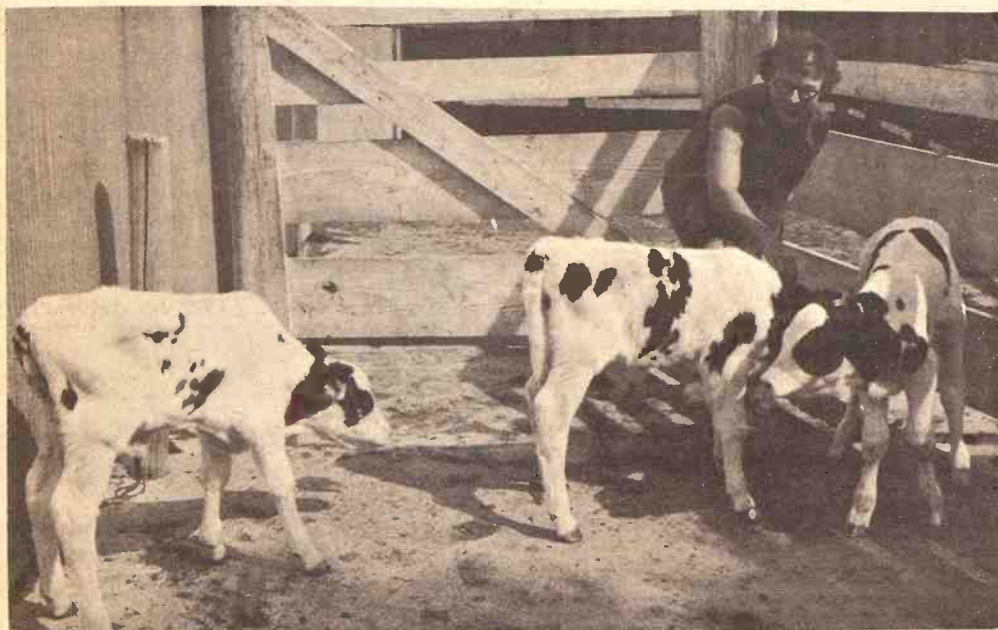

Set Deadlines Again For Cottonwood Area Feedlots

The State Board of Health has reinstituted administrative directives which will require three cattle

feedlots along the Cottonwood River near Emporia to come up with acceptable plans within 60 days for building runoff control facilities.

The directives also will require the feedlots to have their runoff control structures in operation before the start of spring rains next March or April.

Mel Gray, Chief engineer and director of the Environmental Health Services Division of the Health Dept., identified the feedlots involved as the Cattlemens Feed Lot at Emporia, owned by Jim Tieschgraber; the Crofoot Ranches Feedlot between Cedar Point and Emporia, owned by Glenn and Doris Crofoot, and the Crofoot-Robison Feedlot near Cedar Point, owned by State Sen. John Crofoot and Clare Robison.

Last Big Feedlots

The environmental health services chief engineer asserted the three feedlots are the last remaining major cattle feeding operations

along the Cottonwood without operational runoff control containment or control facilities.

He said all other sizable feedlot operations along the Cottonwood have complied with earlier board administrative directives to install such pollution prevention facilities.

Gray said if the three feedlots do not comply with the board's latest directives within the 60-day limitation, the board will be asked to issue formal orders setting firm deadlines for compliance.

Delays Granted

He said the three feedlots were under administrative directives earlier this year to come up with acceptable plans and specifications for construction of runoff control facilities, but that the Board of Health set them aside temporarily.

Gray said none of the three feedlots involved had shown any progress towards planning and building runoff control facilities.

The Board of Health and Gray's department began cracking down on the many feedlots along the Cot-

Mobile homes represented one-
third of all new one-family units in
1970 as in 1969.

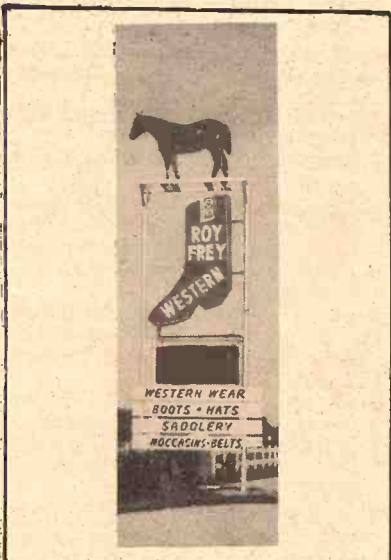
One answer to current housing
needs obviously is the low-cost
mobile home. There aren't enough
houses, and there isn't much
inexpensive housing for someone
with home ownership in mind.

The Housing and Urban
Development Acts of 1969 and the
Veterans Housing Act of 1970 now
provide for guaranteed Federal
Housing Administration loans and
for GI loans for mobile homes. This
has helped keep the mobile home
competitive in the low-cost market
as an alternate to subsidized
housing.

A recent survey reported by the
Economic Research Service of the
U.S. Department of Agriculture
shows findings of selected
characteristics of open country
mobile home residents in the East

North Central States. The survey
included interviews with 131 mobile
home owners.

Mobile home owners interviewed
tend to be younger, have smaller
families, generally have less college
education, and lower levels of in-
come than other home owners.

Cheer In Slaughter Cattle Outlook

Robert L. Coppersmith
K-State Livestock Marketing
Kansas State University Extension economist predicts good prices for choice fed steers and choice slaughter heifers this fall and winter, with possibly even better prices set for summer 1972.

The summer of 1972 should see higher prices with choice slaughter cattle selling in the \$34 range," he adds.

Coppersmith says choice slaughter heifers will sell about \$1.50 per hundred-weight under steers late this fall, and price margin for heifer prices under steer prices will expand to \$2 or more the first half of 1972.

Average carcass weights of cattle have been lighter this year, but the rest of 1971 will see cattle fed to heavier slaughter weights. Coppersmith says slaughter weights in early 1972 will run about 10 pounds

heavier than for the same period in 1971.

Total slaughter for 1971 will run about 2 to 3 percent over 1970 and total beef production will be about 500 million pounds above 1971. Beef imports are down, and will not ex-

ceed 1,160 million pounds for the year.

Cattle and calves on feed July 1, 1971, for the slaughter market totaled 10,881,000 head in the 23 major feeding states, an increase of 2 percent over 1970.

Coppersmith says placement of cattle in these 23 states during the next 60 days will be up about 1

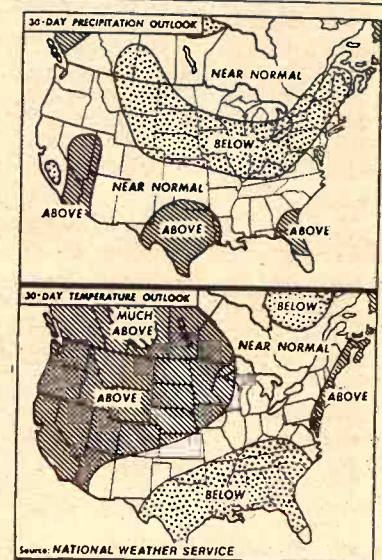

percent.
"Look for a price increase of \$1.00 to \$1.50 during the next 60 days," he says, "and then a slight price decrease in November and December when fed cattle will consistently sell around \$33 per hundred-weight."

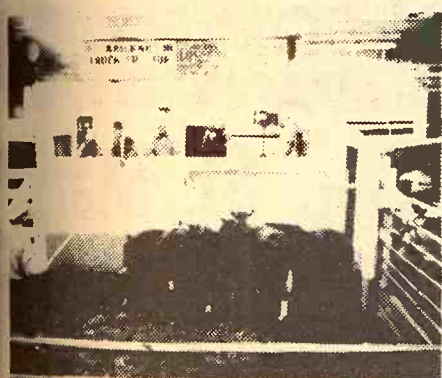

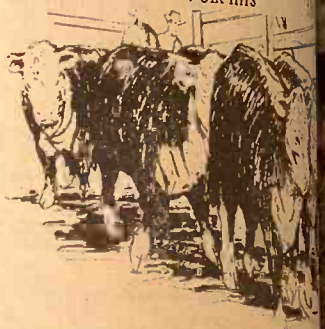

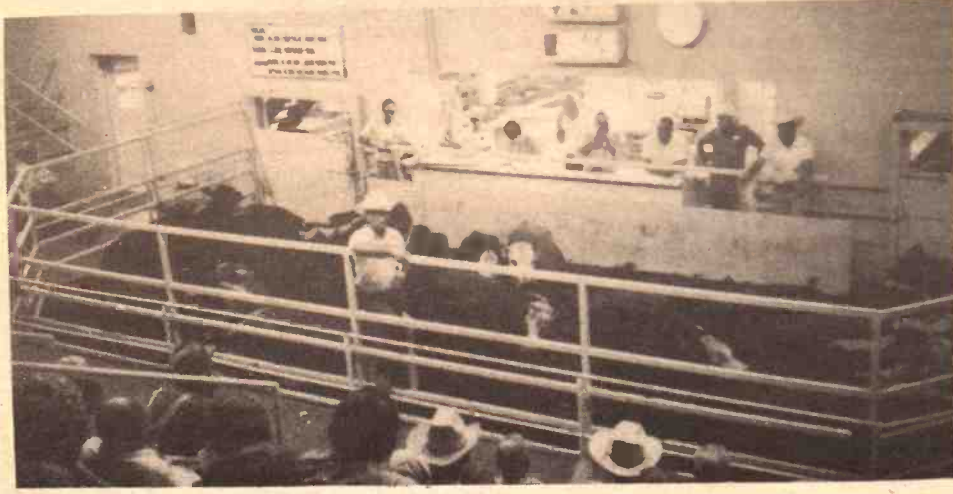
