# See Corn 10-15 Cents Under Loan Rate

Corn producers have quit worrying about the blight. Their chief concerns are to get the record crop out of the fields and to sell it for the best possible price.

Prices seem likely to be 10 to 15 cents under the price-support loan rate during most of the harvesting season. During the winter, prices are expected to move close to the loan rate.

Farmers will have the power to influence prices during the last half of the marketing year. If they place enough corn under price-support loans, say 700 to 800 million bushels, the supply of "free" corn will be short of needs; and prices will rise enough over the loan rate that farmers will redeem and sell the needed amount of corn. Farmers would probably sell freely with prices 8 to 10 cents over the loan level. But if the surplus is not tied up under loans, prices may sag again next spring or summer.

### Needs: About 4,600 Million Bushels

Here are the pertinent statistics. The prospective needs for corn for domestic use and export during the year beginning October 1 are expected to total around 4,600 million bushels—about 200 million bushels more than the amount being utilized this year. The use of corn is expected to increase primarily because the grain is used more freely when it is cheap.

As of the first of September, the USDA estimated corn production at 5,266 million bushels. Later estimates will be different, probably no less than 5,200 million bushels. Such a harvest would exceed expected needs by about 600 million

bushels.

### Biggest Surplus Since 1948

Only once before has a corn crop exceeded needs by as much as 400 million bushels. That was in 1948, after a very short crop the previous year. In 1948, farmers harvested some 3,300 million bushels of corn, use and exports took 2,600 million and 700 million bushels were left to be added to the carryover.

The loan rate for that 1948 crop was \$1.44 a bushel, and farmers locked up a record 551 million bushels under loans. Even so, prices sagged to \$1.12 in February, moved up to \$1.25 in July, then slumped to \$1.02 in November, 1949, when the loan rate was \$1.40 a bushel.

The national average loan rate for this year's corn crop is \$1.05 a bushel. Most Illinois farmers can realize this amount or a few cents more for top-quality corn. There will be a service charge of \$8 for loans on farm-stored corn, and \$4 for loans on corn stored in warehouses. There will be a delivery charge of 1/2-cent a bushel for corn turned over to the CCC. If the loan is paid, redeeming the corn, there will be an interest

charge at the very low rate of 3.6 percent per year. Loans on corn must be requested before June 30, and they will mature on July 31.

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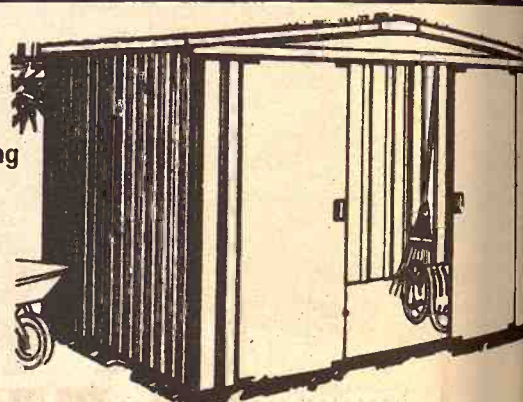
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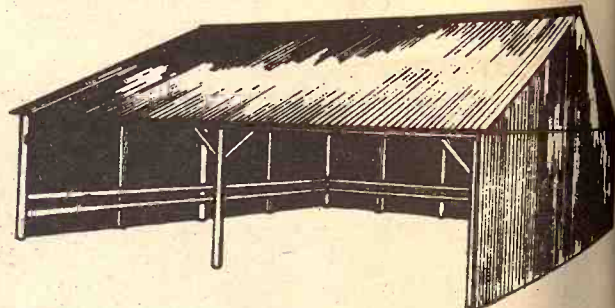

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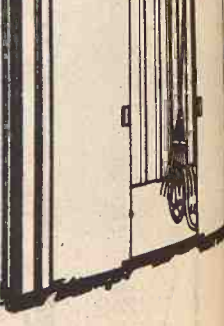
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# Call Nebraska Land, Cattle Buy A \$25 Million Deal

W. F. "Bill" Smith has announced the Colossal Cattle Company, a new Angus breeding firm, has acquired the total assets—reported at about \$25 million—of Shalco Land and Cattle Company headquartered in

Minatare, Nebraska.

Smith, of Minatare and the former president and directing partner of Shalco, is the president of the corporation; Dave Canning of Staunton, Va. is the board chairman and the third principal is Weir Stewart, Farmington, Conn., a director of Colossal and an investment banker who is one-third owner of Canadian Colossal, the million dollar Angus bull recently brought to Minatare by the new company.

Smith said also involved in the transaction are a 40,000-head feedlot, headquarters offices and sale and support facilities at

Minatare and complete breeding, grazing and sale facilities at Sugar Loaf Farm near Staunton.

Both included a total of 50,000 acres in Nebraska, Texas and Virginia.

The acreage supports 12,000 registered Angus cattle and in addition, herds are maintained at the Stampede Cattle Station, Stavely, Alberta, Can., and the Floyd Meyers and Son Farm at Twin Valley, Minn.

"The Colossal Cattle Company will be dedicated to perpetuating, improving and intensifying the famous Canadian Colossal line," Smith observed in making the an-

nouncement.

The president of the new corporation also announced the first sale of colossal Cattle Company will be held at Sugar Loaf Farm in Virginia on Fri. Nov. 5.

## Set 3rd Forum On World Grain

Authorities on world grain and grain product marketing will meet at Kansas State University, Manhattan, November 1, 2, and 3 to discuss and recommend how the grain industry can help solve world food needs of the 1970s.

The occasion, announced by Dr. James A. McCain, president of KSU, will be the third Senator Frank Carlson Forum on World Food Problems sponsored by Kansas State University.

The forum series honors the former Kansas senator who had a distinguished service record in international affairs, especially in the fields of world agriculture and economic development.

Persons to be invited as conference participants include leaders in world grain marketing who represent industry, government, the news media, and educational institutions. The list of invitees contains, for example, experts in such

specialities as grain production, processing, transportation, research, economics, nutrition, and communications. High-ranking officials of the U.S. Agency for International Development including the top AID administrator, Dr. John A. Hannah, will attend. Prior to assuming his position in AID, Hannah was president of Michigan State University at East Lansing. Senator Carlson, who will appear on the program, commented on the importance of the grain industry gearing its efforts toward solving the immediate food needs of the 1970s.

"Grain is the primary source of food for most people," the former senator said. "It is appropriate, therefore, that we direct our attention to problems associated with the nutritional qualities of grains and how best to meet the world nutritional needs of the decade ahead."

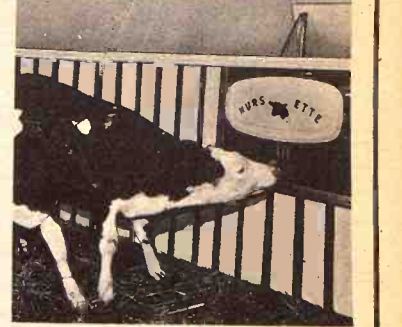

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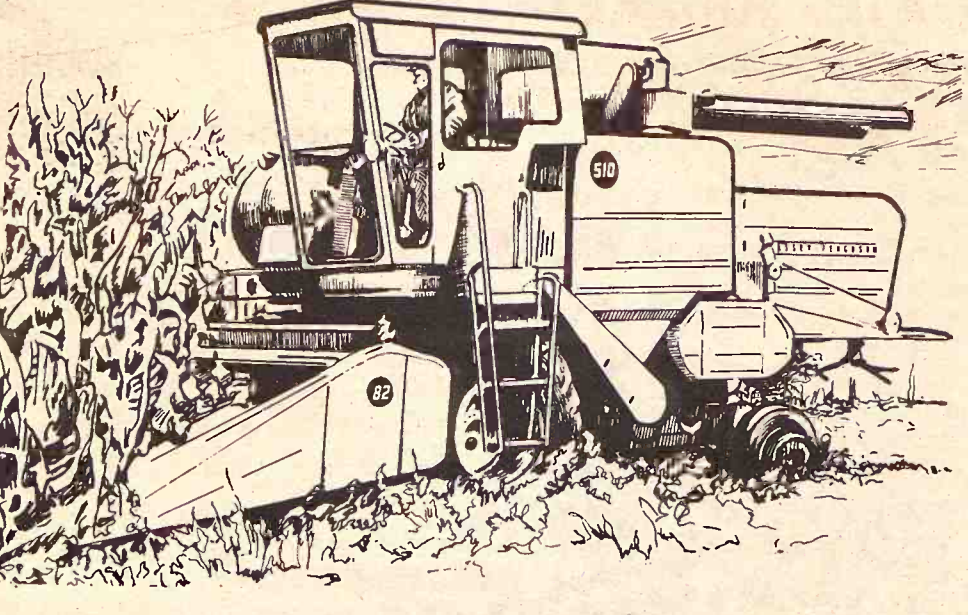
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## North Dakota Keeps Ban On Corporate Farms

BISMARCK, N.D.—The North Dakota State Supreme Court has reaffirmed the state's ban on corporation farming.

The unanimous ruling came recently when a lower court decision was reversed. The Supreme Court held that Secretary of State Ben Meier was correct in refusing to issue articles of incorporation to the Coal Harbor Stock Farm in McLean County.

The "anti-corporation farming law" enacted by voter initiative in 1932 prohibits corporations from engaging in agricultural enterprise in the state.

The unanimous opinion written by Associate Justice Obert C. Teigen said, "the proposed articles of incorporation of Coal Harbor Stock Farm Inc. describes a business which is prohibited and, therefore, unlawful."

McLean County ranchers, G. Clark and Dave M. Robinson brought suit to force the secretary of state to issue the articles of incorporation after Meier rejected their application in July, 1969. The lower court decision issued last February 16 by Cass County District Judge Roy K. Redetzke of Fargo had ordered Meier to issue the farm a corporation charter.

Redetzke's opinion was based on an exception to the law which makes it illegal for a corporation to own farm land "except such as is reasonable and necessary to the conduct of its business." The judge held that the purpose of the proposed incorporation was valid and legal "within the express exemption."

The state's highest court held, however, that all sections of the law, considered together, prohibit farming by corporations other than cooperatives. At least 75 percent of the stockholders in a corporation must be actual farmers residing on farms, or depending principally on farming for their livelihood to qualify as a cooperative.

The Supreme Court said that to qualify for the exemption, a corporation must be a business which is

"authorized by law and not a business which is prohibited by law."

Clark Robinson said he believed the law was initiated because "farmers were afraid outside conglomerate corporations would gobble up North Dakota's real estate."

"We contended it shouldn't apply to bona fide North Dakota farmers," he said.

Robinson is a state senator and his brother is a former president of the North Dakota Farm Bureau.

"It is possible we may initiate action again and go all the way to the U.S. Supreme Court," he said.

## USDA Seeks Wing To Handle Plant, Animal Health

The Agriculture Department wants to create a new agency called the Animal and Plant Health Service to administer federal regulatory programs ranging from disease control to import inspections.

The plan was announced by Clifford M. Hardin, agriculture secretary. All such functions currently are handled by the Agriculture

Research Service.

Under the proposal, to take effect Oct. 22, sub-agencies in ARS dealing with animal health, veterinary biologics, plant protection and quarantine inspections will be transferred to the new operation.

The parent agency, ARS, will continue to handle research programs.

"Both agencies will still be large,"

Hardin said in his announcement. "Their purposes are different, and both need full-time administration. This change will make it possible for the programs in each agency to be fully responsive to current problems."

There are approximately 16,000 employees in ARS. Under the reorganization plan, about 5,000 will be transferred to the new agency. J.

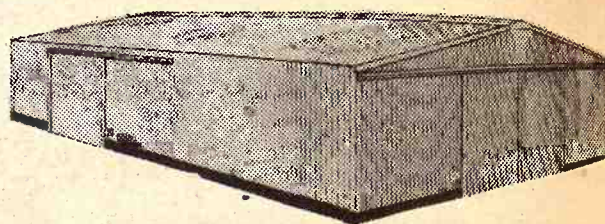
Phil Campbell, Agriculture Undersecretary, told a news conference the move will not mean more people will be hired. Talcott W. Edminster, recently appointed as head of ARS, will continue as administrator of that agency. Dr. Francis J. Mulhern, now associate administrator, will be in charge of the new Animal and Plant Health Service.



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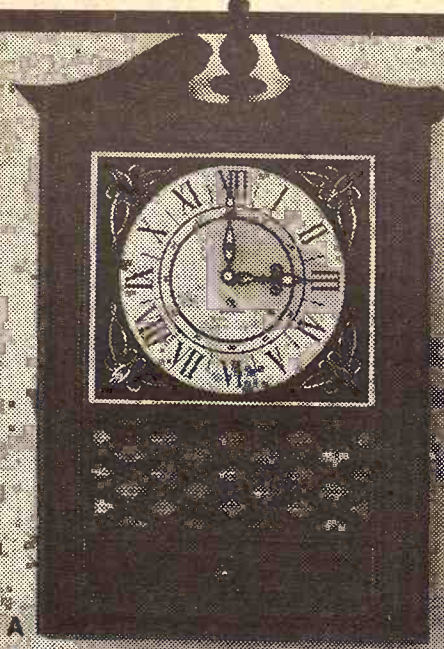


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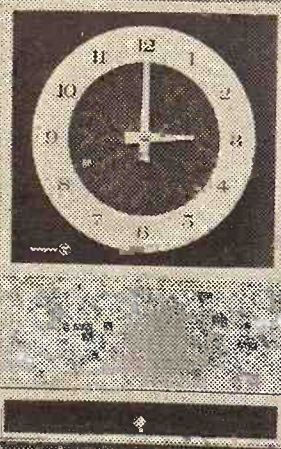
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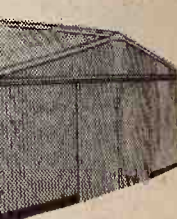
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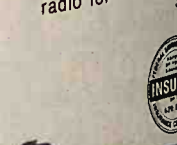
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## Total U.S. Welfare Costs Nearly Doubled In Four Years

National welfare costs skyrocketed a record 27 percent in the fiscal year ending June 30 despite a shrinking of relief rolls in the last two months.

The Department of Health, Education and Welfare said state, local and federal expenditures for all forms of public assistance, in-

cluding medical aid and welfare, increased \$3.4 billion to \$16.3 billion in the 12 months. The total is almost double the \$8.9 billion four years ago.

"These are the biggest increases in the history of the program," said John D. Twiname, administrator of HEW's social and rehabilitation

service.

Paradoxically, a downturn toward the end of the record 1970-71 welfare year may signal the beginning of a period of public assistance austerity.

With eleven states cutting welfare eligibility and payments, relief rolls dropped in June for the second consecutive month.

The 14.3 million recipients in June were 22,000 fewer than May. The number on rolls four years ago was 8.9 million.

"There is an obvious tightening up in the states," Twiname said. He conceded that the resultant lessening of pressure on state budgets has reduced momentum, for a short while at least, for President Nixon's proposed welfare reform and revenue sharing measures.

HEW disclosed meanwhile that an army of 80,000 new federal employees in 4,000 offices nationwide would be needed to run the welfare system under the reform proposal.

They would replace 61,000 state employees and would almost double the size of the 107,000-man HEW department, according to Richard P. Nathan, deputy undersecretary of HEW.

The job of replacing 200 separate state and local welfare systems with a computer-based federal program would require 18 months after congressional approval of the President's family assistance plan, Nathan added.

He said possibly 25 million persons would have to be interviewed to determine their eligibility for benefits, including reinvestigations of the 14.3 million persons now receiving relief.

The family assistance program would replace separate state welfare systems with federal checks totaling \$2,400 a year for a family of four. The working poor would be eligible for the first time for supplemental assistance.

Nathan said the bulk of the new federal welfare workers would be recruited from the ranks of state employees whose jobs would be eliminated. Only 2,400 of the 80,000 would work in Washington, with the other 97 percent stationed in 4,000 field offices, he said.

## Laflin Kids Dominate Angus Fair Honors

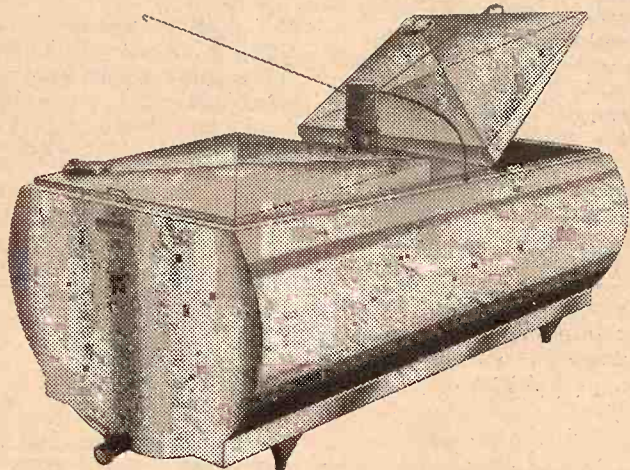

Put in layer of beans, mushrooms and diced cheese and half of the sauce. Repeat and top with cracker crumbs, Parmesan cheese, paprika and dot with butter. 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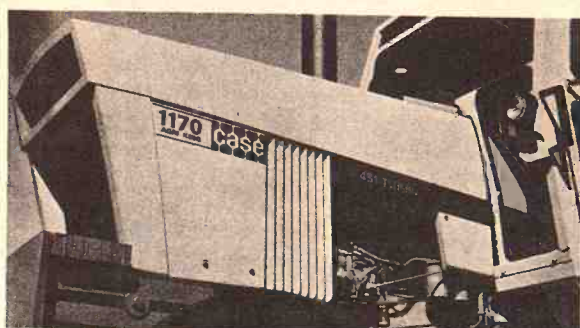

#### PLUM NUTTY CONSERVE FREEZER STYLE

2 pounds (about) ripe purple prune plums  
1 orange  
one-third cup finely chopped pecans  
2 1/2 cups sugar  
3/4 cup water  
1 box (1 1/4 ounces) fruit pectin  
Wash and drain plums; pit but do not peel. With a sharp knife cut into small pieces and then chop very fine. Into a large mixing bowl, measure 3 cups finely chopped plums. Wash and dry orange; grate enough rind from it to make 1 teaspoon and add to plums. Squeeze orange, measure 1/4 cup juice and add to plums, stir in nuts, add sugar, mix well and let stand. In a small saucepan mix together the water and fruit pectin. Stirring constantly

bring to a boil and boil one minute, stir in plum mixture; continue stirring for about three minutes. Quickly ladle into jars. Cover once with tight lids. Let stand at room temperature until set—this may take as long as 24 hours; then store in freezer. If conserve will be used within two or three weeks, it may be stored in the refrigerator. All kinds of glass containers may be used for the freezer conserve. But food jars are fine or use containers that are no larger than a pint. 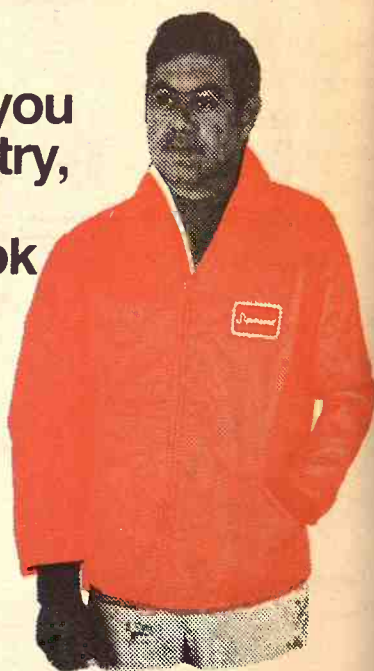

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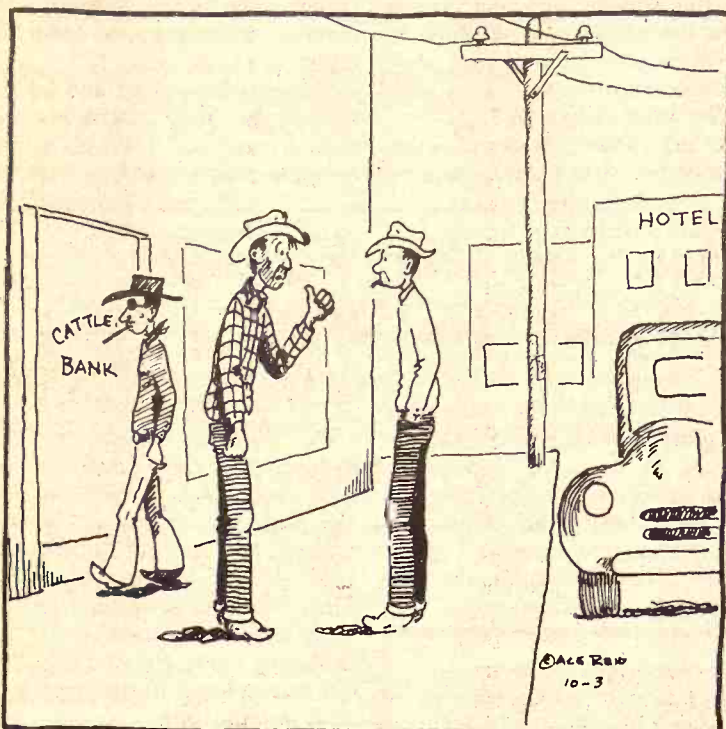

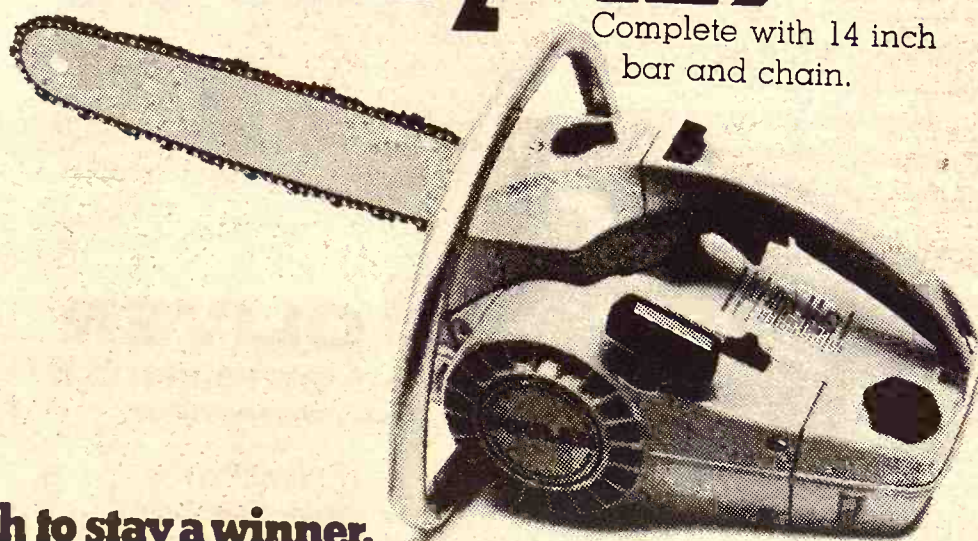

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## Another Step In Rebuilding State Veterinary Campus

Kansas State University expects construction work to soon begin on the second phase of the new veterinary medical complex, based on the Kansas State Board of Regents approval of awards for construction at Manhattan.

Dr. Paul Young, K-State president for university development, said construction of the second phase should get under way soon and be completed in about two years.

The veterinary medicine complex to be constructed in four phases includes facilities for research, teaching, hospital, and surgical buildings. The first phase is about 75 percent complete now, Dr. Young said. It is under construction on the north end of the campus, and includes the State Veterinary Diagnostic Laboratory, other veterinary medical labs and offices. Its cost is about \$3 million, to be paid by state and federal funds already granted.

Phase II will include a disciplinary teaching building costing about \$5 million. About \$2,472,400 of this will come from state funds, and \$2,345,700 from the National Institutes of Health.

Still pending for Phase II is a recommendation from Kansas State Board of Regents to the Legislature for \$400,000 for portable equipment. This won't be needed until the third stages of construction.

### Another Step in Rebuilding State Veterinary Campus

Kansas State University expects construction work soon on the second phase of State's new veterinary complex, based on the Kansas State Board of Regents approval of awards for construction in suburg.

Dr. Paul Young, K-State president for university development, said construction second phase should get under way soon and be completed in a few years.

The veterinary medicine building to be constructed in four phases includes facilities for teaching, hospital, and buildings. The first phase is 90 percent complete now, Dr. Young said. It is under construction on the north end of the campus, adjacent to the medical sciences building and the State Veterinary Laboratory, other veterinary labs and offices. It will be about \$3 million, to be paid for by state and federal funds.

Phase II will include a disciplinary teaching building, costing about \$5 million. \$2,472,400 of this will come from state funds, and \$2,527,600 from the National Institutes of Health. Still pending for Phase II is a recommendation from the Robert Docking to the legislature for \$400,000 for portable equipment. This won't be needed until the next stages of construction.

### Continue Cut in Soybean Stocks In State

There were 2,736,000 bushels of old crop soybeans stored in Kansas on September 1 this year, less than on September 1 in either of the past two years, but the third largest September 1 stocks of record, according to the Kansas Crop and Livestock Reporting Service.

Stocks held on farms September 1 totaled 226,000 bushels, down from the 754,000 bushels

on July 1, but moderately higher than the 196,000 bushels on September 1 last year.

Off-farm stocks of soybeans in hands of oilseed crushers, mills and elevators totaled 2,510,000 bushels on September 1 compared with 5,188,000 on July 1 and 3,172,000 on September 1, 1970.

The largest September 1 total stocks of soybeans on record in Kansas was 4,294,000 bushels in 1969.

At 21 million bushels, farm stocks were down 49 percent from September 1, 1970, and off-farm stocks of 77 million bushels were down 59 percent.

The Commodity Credit Corporation owned 2.5 million bushels of the soybeans in storage and had loans outstanding on an additional 9 million bushels.

## To Seek Less Control On Freight Handlers

The Nixon administration is preparing to ask Congress for a fundamental overhaul of federal regulations of the trucking, railroad and barge industries.

The administration's proposal would significantly relax regulation in an attempt to stimulate more competition among trucks, railroads and barges—and, thereby, force freight rates down.

Although the reform has been discussion since early this year, the White House is now apparently nearly ready to submit its legislation. A draft of the bill obtained Monday, indicates the administration will urge Congress to:

- Eliminate "rate bureaus" as a vehicle by which trucking, railroads or barge firms can get together and agree on common national (or regional) freight rates for their industries. These rate agreements, now immune from antitrust prosecution, can be approved, rejected or modified by the Interstate Commerce Commission.
  - Reduce the ICC's control over the number of truck lines that can haul freight over a specific route.
  - Relax the ICC's control of rates.
- Although the commission would still be able to reject carrier rate proposals, it could do so only if freight rates met one or two conditions: They failed to cover the carrier's costs on the low side; or, on the high side, they represented more than 50 per cent margin of profit.

Economists have long argued that tight federal regulation has stifled competition in the transportation industry, resulting in higher freight rates.

Spokesmen for railroads and truckers have disputed such predictions, and strong opposition from transportation interests—particularly the truckers—is expected to the administration's proposal.

## Young Boys Admit Ft. Riley Destruction

FT. RILEY—Four boys, all dependents of Ft. Riley military personnel, have admitted taking part in the break-in and vandalism at Ft. Riley Junior High School here. An estimated \$4,000 in damages

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and theft losses were reported by school officials.

The youths, two of elementary school age and two of junior high age, will be referred to the U.S. attorney for Kansas.

Eight student-owned and two school-owned musical instruments taken in the break-in were recovered by Ft. Riley criminal investigation detail agents, who investigated the incident.

The junior high building, owned by the government and leased to Geary County Unified School District No. 475, was entered by breaking a window and releasing a latch.

Extensive vandalism was done in a band room, gymnasium and shop area. Six violins were smashed by throwing them on the floor or at the walls.

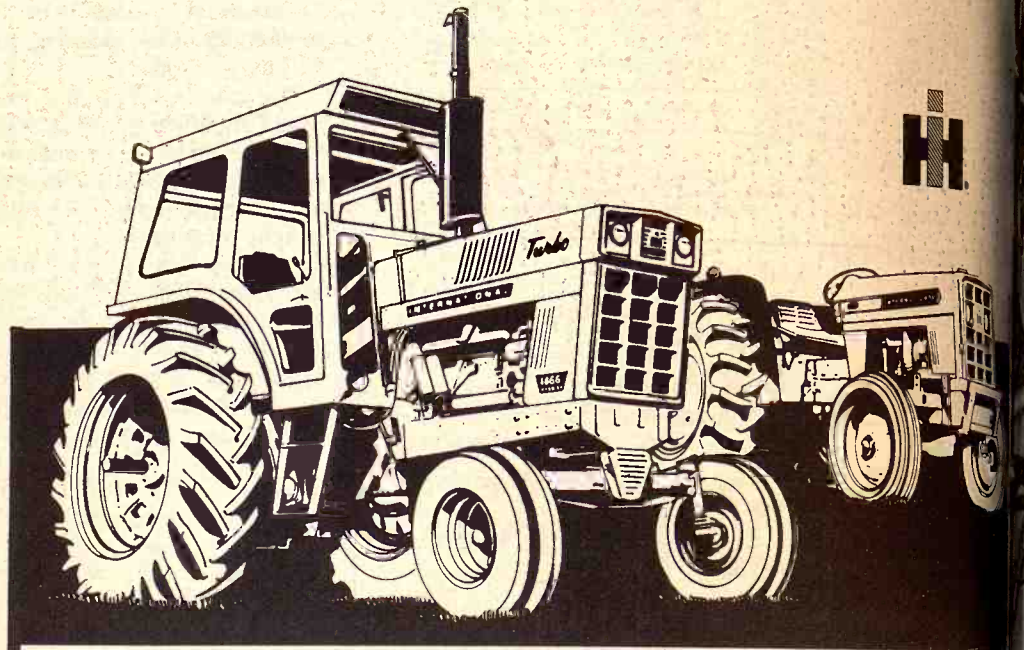

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## Inventors Never Able To Solve Air Car Problems

A decade ago, judging from the ballyhoo and hoopla, the day was near when we would all be riding on vehicles that floated on a cushion of air.

Air cars, the prognosticators said, would revolutionize the world. William R. Bertelsen, a country doctor in northwest Illinois and builder of his own air car, predicted suburban developments with "broad grassy expanses" for air cars instead of ribbons of concrete highways.

Canadian officials believed air cars, which could glide over swamps and frozen wastes, would guarantee development of the northwest Canadian wilderness.

So what happened to the air car?

The main problem was directional stability. Imagine the poor fellow who ventures onto a highway going about 50 m.p.h. in his air car and suddenly comes to an "S" curve.

With no friction to hold him to the pavement, the Civil Air Patrol would be more likely to spot him again before his friends.

Curtiss-Wright Corp.—which in the early '60s always seemed to be only weeks away from mass-produced air cars—blames the directional stability problems for phasing out its program.

Ford Motor Co. was similarly disenchanted with its Levacar research and development.

The Army, which was a prime customer for air cars around 1962, criticized the prototypes it received because the cars couldn't even make it over lowlying bushes.

Bertelsen, who predicted an end to freeways, brought his 4-passenger air car to Chicago in 1960 and was hit with gawkers. A return trip in 1962, however, was less than a triumph. Bertelsen tried to float over Lake Michigan in another type of hovercraft, but he floundered in choppy waters.

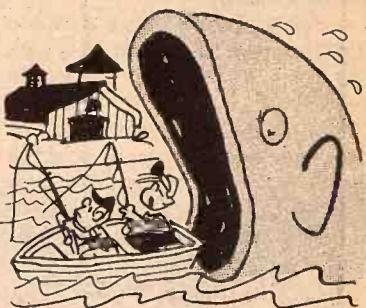
In England, where air car experiments were less flamboyant, there was more success. Huge air-cushion hovercrafts regularly ply their way 40 miles across the

English Channel carrying as many as 254 passengers and 30 cars.

But that trip is paltry next to the 1961 dreams that hovercrafts would be shooting at 1,500 m.p.h. down special tubes carrying 12,000 passengers between New York and San Francisco.

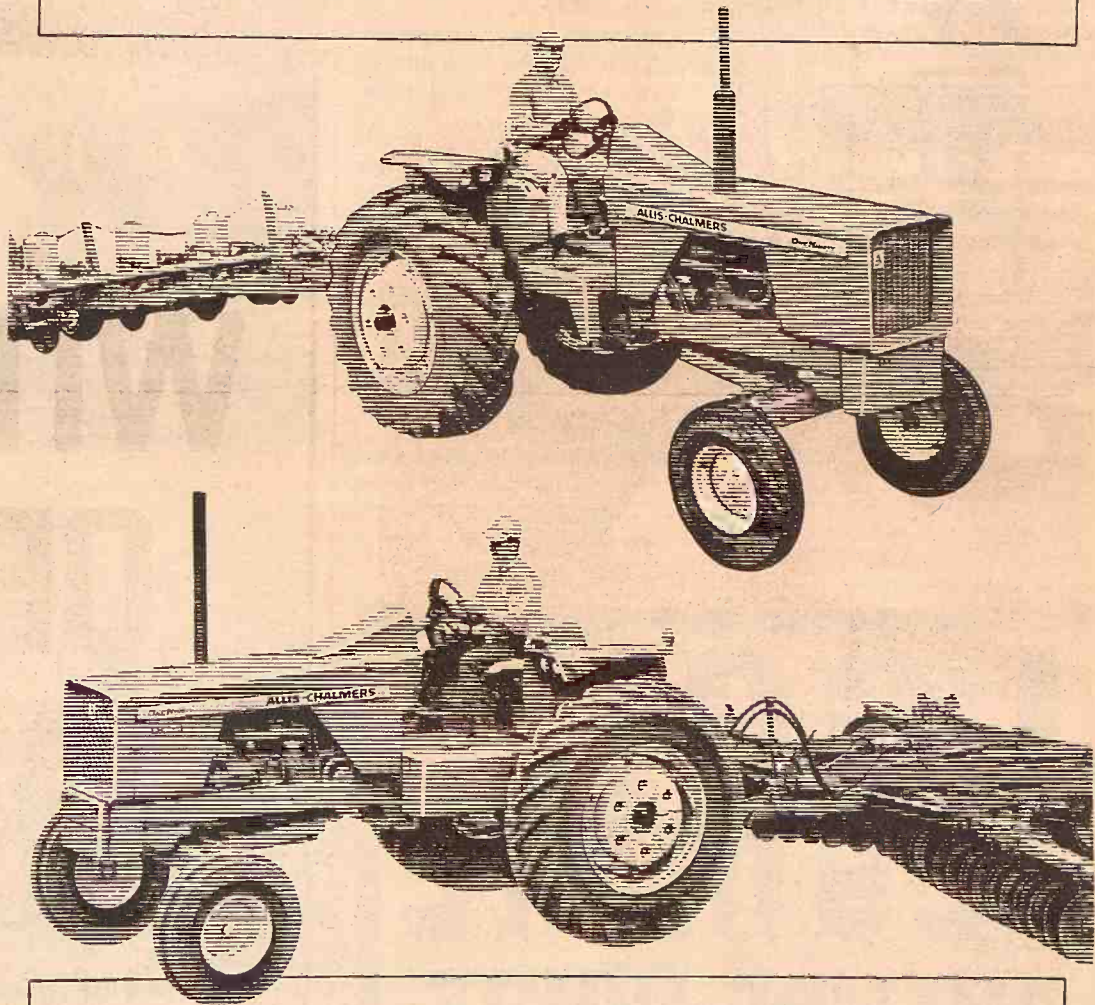

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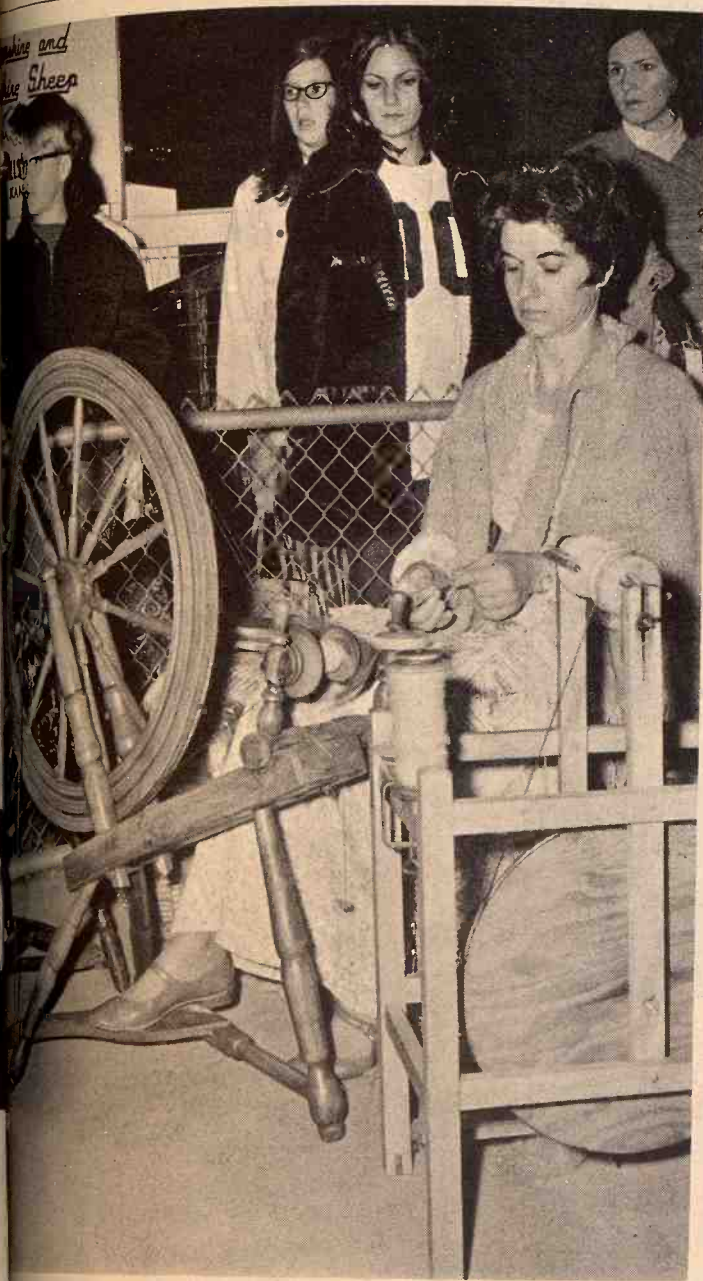

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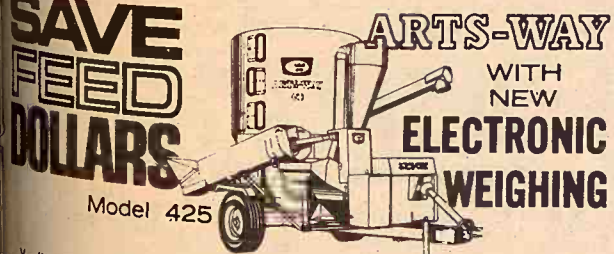
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# Cheaper To Let Feds Inspect Meat Packers?

Kansas could save her taxpayers \$650,000 in direct tax funds if the state followed a growing pattern of federal meat inspection.

Nebraska has asked the USDA to take over its inspection program Oct. 1.

Gov. James Exon estimates that change will save Nebraskans \$400,000 annually.

Iowa now is considering a switch to USDA inspections because of high state costs for its own inspection program.

Some consumer groups say a federal inspection program would be less susceptible to meat industry pressure.

"That could be a question for the future," says Dr. Earl E. Huffman, assistant director of the meat and poultry inspection department of the State Board of Agriculture. "States have to be a little more diplomatic in handling these things, but I don't think you have to worry about that in Kansas."

"If at all possible, I think a state should maintain its own program. If people want to operate it as a matter of state's rights, I think they should hang on to it."

A bill, being pushed by both Senators James Pearson and Bob Dole, would provide federal funding

of inspection programs at 80 percent, with the state to provide 20 percent—but control would be left with the states. The move has been sharply criticized because of scandals growing out of state meat inspections, notably in Massachusetts and in some southern states.

But Huffman believes the Kansas' meat inspection program is a success.

Huffman, a federal employee on contract loan to Kansas for two years, ends his job with the state Wednesday.

He says the state ranks in the top 10, "possibly the top five" in inspection programs in the nation.

Kansas has a full staff, including 86 field inspectors and eight supervisors, and is running on a budget of \$1.3 million per year.

The inspectors are finding that about one percent of all the cattle slaughtered in the state must be condemned. On a parts basis (liver, heads, and so on), the inspectors are having to condemn about three percent of the total, Huffman said.

"There is no way to compare this with what was being sold before. We figure the condemnation has to be slightly higher. There were a few livers and things like that that some people didn't object to before that I certainly wouldn't want to eat now," Huffman said.

He said that some uninspected meat still is being used from time to time in nursing homes and other institutions.

"It usually is a matter of people not being educated to what the law is. When they are told they can't use uninspected meat, they comply," Huffman said.

But much of the public is educated as to what meat inspection means.

Huffman said that while the federal rules on inspection were liberalized for plant owners starting July 1, most plant owners are continuing with regular inspection. Custom plants were allowed leeway in inspection under the new rules, and so were larger processing plants on a spot basis.

"The inspection is voluntary to

some of the custom places under the change, but apparently they like it like it is. People in town apparently like it because the inspection is going as it was," Huffman said.

The Clean Meat Act passed Congress in 1967. States were given a year to comply. After an extension of the deadline, Kansas started its own program in December of 1969. Before that time, the state inspection of meat was carried out by local veterinarians (who were paid by the processors, not the state), who usually were only contacted to "go over and look at the animals if something cropped up," Huffman

said.

When the program started, there were about 320 meat processing outlets in Kansas. This figure included retail stores, some of which decided to go out of the slaughter business when full inspection arrived, Huffman said.

The number of outlets being inspected today is 267, but the retail stores were a major part of the drop, Huffman said.

"Probably not more than a dozen or so plants were actually closed by the program," Huffman said. He said the plants that close usually are in such a state of deterioration that it isn't financially feasible for the

# Earth Does A Little Polluting Of Its Own

It may come as a surprise to many, but man is not even in the running compared to the earth itself when it comes to pollution of the environment.

Dr. William W. Hambleton, director of the Kansas Geological Survey, pointed out that en-

vironmental degradation is a natural process of the earth itself.

Dr. Hambleton, whose office is at the University of Kansas, pointed out these natural processes are often cataclysmic. If caused by man, they would be termed environmental pollution. There is no effort on the part of the Kansas scientist to use the environmental processes of the earth that contribute to changes in the environment as an excuse for what man is doing.

"Without man, the earth then is a cycling machine, concentrating and dispersing its resources," Dr. Hambleton said. "The introduction of man changed the entire time-frame of this process."

"His numbers and his capabilities enabled him within a short time to actually accelerate earth capabilities for concentration and dispersal of resources. His ability to create toxic substances and trash outstrips the natural processes of the earth."

Dr. Hambleton sees the only question being that of whether man will survive as the earth at its own rate naturally purges itself through concentration and dispersal.

"It has been estimated that more than 1 million tons of fixed nitrogen

in the form of ammonia and nitrates are annually deposited from the atmosphere to the earth as part of a natural precipitation process," the scientist said.

"In the United States alone, more than 4 million tons of table salt, 2.5 million tons of sodium sulfate and 36 million tons of calcium compounds fall upon the land surface, all in rainwater."

Dr. Hambleton pointed to the continuing dispersion of particulate matter and natural gases from volcanoes.

"From three eruptions alone, the Krakatau in Java in 1883, the Mount Katmai eruption in Alaska in 1912 and the Hekla eruption in Iceland in 1947, more dust, ash and combined gases were ejected into the atmosphere than from all of man's activities," he said.

"Springs issuing into the Arkansas and Red Rivers carry 17 tons of salt per minute," Dr. Hambleton said. "The Lemonade Springs in New Mexico carry 900 pounds of sulfuric acid per million pounds of water, which is 10 times the acid concentration of most acid mine streams in the nation."

"The Azure Yampa spring in Colorado contains eight times the

radium concentration that the Public Health Service sets as a limit."

For those concerned about the slicks in the Santa Barbara channel in the Pacific off the California coast, Dr. Hambleton cites a diary log of Vancouver, famed sea navigator, from the same area in 1792.

"The surface of the sea which was perfectly smooth and tranquil, was covered with a slimy substance which when separated or disturbed by a little agitation, became very luminous, whilst the light breeze which came principally from the shore, brought with it a strong odor of tar or some other such resinous substance. The next morning the sea had the appearance of dissolved floating on its surface, which covered the sea in all directions within the limits of our view."

Dr. Hambleton mentioned certain plants on the Colorado plateau which concentrate selenium, a substance toxic to cattle.

"The smoke of the Great Smoky mountains is caused by the emission of turpines from the forests," Dr. Hambleton said.

"Natural landslides... and like, scar the face of the earth just as certainly as do disfiguring mines. The excrement of any animal certainly pollutes the environment for his neighbors."

Dr. Hambleton points out that the earth will reconcentrate energy sources since none of the materials that man uses are lost from the envelope of the earth.

"The carbon compounds from burning from coal and oil will be reconcentrated in the oceans as new coal and oil will be formed by organisms," the scientist said. "Our garbage and even plastics will be degraded in the earth. The question is will man survive earth goes about its usual business."

# Price Index Drops Below Year Ago

Prices received by Kansas farmers at mid-September 1971 were down moderately from August this year and a shade below September 1970, according to the Kansas Crop and Livestock Reporting Service.

The index of prices received for all farm products was 251 percent of the 1910-14 base period, compared with 259 the previous month and 253 the previous year.

Price decreases from August were sharp for fall harvested feed grains and moderate for most livestock and eggs.

Only a few commodities showed price increases from August. Compared with a year ago prices for beef cattle, calves, milk, milk cows, soybeans, barley and rye were up while prices for wheat, corn, sorghum grain, hogs, sheep and eggs were down.

## Crop Prices

The crop price index was 153 percent of the 1910-14 base period at mid-September, 7 points below August this year and 11 points below September 1970.

Wheat at mid-September averaged \$1.26 per bushel, 2 cents below the previous month and 7 cents below a year ago.

Corn was worth \$1.11 per bushel,

17 cents below a month ago and 19 cents below last year.

Barley at 96 cents per bushel was 1 cent above August 1971 and 9 cents above September 1970.

Sorghum grain brought \$1.76 per cwt. compared with \$2.18 a month earlier and \$1.95 a year earlier. Soybeans brought \$2.82 per bushel, 15 cents below a month ago, but 27 cents above a year ago.

## Livestock Prices

The livestock and livestock products price index at mid-September was 363 percent of the 1910-14 base period, compared with 372 the previous month and 355 in September a year ago.

The meat animal price index was 436 percent in September, 13 points below August this year but 17 points above September last year.

Hog prices averaged \$18.10 per cwt., 60 cents below a month earlier and \$2.00 below a year earlier.

Beef cattle brought \$28.90 per cwt., 80 cents below the previous month but \$1.90 above September the previous year.

The dairy price index was 344 in September, compared with 337 last month and a year earlier.

A preliminary wholesale milk price of \$5.75 was 25 cents above a

month ago and 10 cents above a year ago.

Eggs averaged 23 cents per dozen, 1 cent below August 1971 and 5 cents below September 1970.

## Prices Paid

Prices paid by farmers for protein supplements were slightly lower than a year earlier, but mixed feed prices were up from September 1970.

## United States

The index of prices received by the Nation's farmers for farm products at mid-September was 282 percent of the 1910-14 base period, down 5 points from mid-August but up 2 points from September 1970.

Prices were higher than in August for milk, oats, barley and rye. Price decreases from August were noted for wheat, corn, sorghum grain, soybeans, beef cattle, hogs and eggs.

The index of prices paid by farmers for commodities and services (including interest, taxes, and wage rates) was 413, up 1 point from mid-August and 20 points above a year ago.

The parity ratio in September was 68, down 2 points from August and down 3 points from September 1970.

## Middleman Gets Less Of Food Buck

The Agriculture Department says middleman costs of getting food from farms to consumers slowed to a virtual standstill in August.

The annual retail price rate for a "market basket" list of food was \$1264 in August, up \$1 from July. The gain in July was \$9. Of the total bill, farmers received \$485 compared with \$484 in July, meaning the \$1 gain in the retail price went to consumers.

Middlemen costs were put at \$779, unchanged from July, the depart-

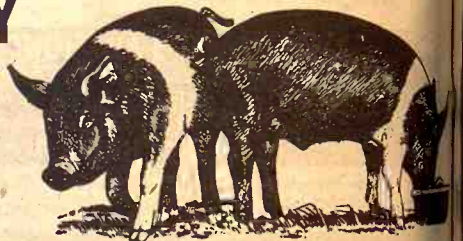

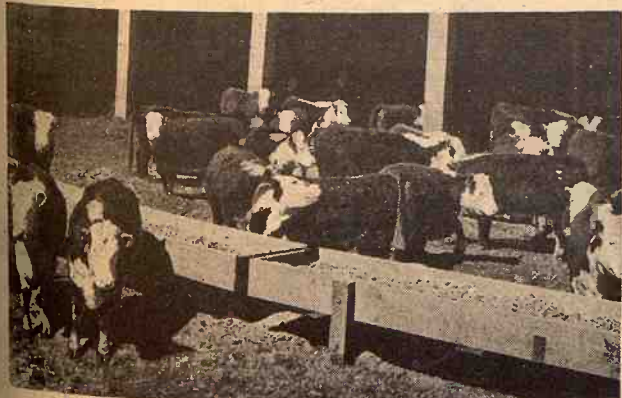

# May Be Most Corn Since 1932

Fall harvests in Kansas are well under way and the out-pouring of corn and grain sorghum gives substance to earlier official estimates of one of the bounteous crop years on record.

Corn yields, as indicated by the 25 per cent harvested, appear to assure the best crop since 1932. Dryland fields in northeastern and north central counties are running as high as 150 bushels an acre in some instances. A similarly excellent crop is coming in from this year's increased irrigated acreage.

The big corn and milo crops follow a mammoth wheat crop. Soybeans, becoming of major crop proportions will produce above the yields of the past two years.

The bounteous harvests of fall crops, especially corn, come in the face of a late summer drought and threats of corn leaf blight. However, just enough moisture came to help corn as it matured and blight, although cutting some yields, proved little deterrent to overall

production.

The highest corn yields from dryland areas are coming from Doniphan County where one bottomland field produced 190 bushels an acre when harvested last week. The farm of 1,000 acres is expected to average 150 bushels an acre.

"One more rain in July and another in August would have produced 200-bushel yields in Doniphan County," Ed Levalle, farm agent, said.

Last year Doniphan ranked second in corn production in Kansas with 4.5 million bushels. Only Wichita County with its heavily irrigated acreage outranked Doniphan with a production of 4.8 million bushels.

Brown County, historically the No. 1 corn county in the state until increasing irrigated acreage in the west took over, will produce a better crop this year than last despite only half its normal rainfall.

Some yields are reaching 150 bushels an acre while others, par-

ticularly in western sections of the county, will be as low as 40 bushels. On the whole, the county average will be above the 42-bushel average of last year, Glen R. Gottlob, Brown County agent, says.

In the Kaw valley, similar reports of high corn yields are coming in. The farmers Union elevator at St. Marys had its biggest business days on record last Tuesday and Wednesday.

Receipts of grain reached 72,000 bushels Tuesday and 75,000 Wednesday. Previous high receipts for a day were 64,000 bushels, Al Fox, assistant manager, said.

Corn from irrigated fields is running as high as 180 bushels per acre in the area while one yield of 144.5 bushels has come in from a dryland field. The area from Wamego to Lawrence in the valley is the state's heavy white corn production section.

In view of the current supply and demand situation and the apparent size of the 1971 crop, the Dept. of Agriculture is extending loans on the 1969 and 1970 crops put under farm-stored loan. That part of this year's crop put under farm-stored loan will be extended beyond the next July 31 maturity date.

The quantity of reseed farm-stored loans outstanding on the 1969 crop is about 75 million bushels and for the 1970 crop, 125 million bushels. It is

expected that from 300 to 400 million bushels of this year's crop will be put under farm-stored loan.

Corn prices have been falling as harvesting has begun. The generous supply picture has prompted caution in the markets. Yellow corn was selling at \$1.01 in St. Marys last week while white is 93 cents. Both prices are well below the average loan rate of \$1.05.

As evidence of the sharp drop in price, a year ago the elevator price for white grain was \$2.60 a bushel.

Corn and milo producers must be in the government's feed-grain program to be eligible for loans.

## Nasal Spray For Cattle May Save Stockmen Dollars

Scientists at the Jensen-Salsbery Laboratories at Kansas City have announced the development of a nose spray that will give improved protection against respiratory infections in cattle. Such diseases cost the beef and dairy industries millions of dollars a year in losses.

Dr. Iain M. Paton, president of the laboratory, said the intra-nasally administered vaccine was safer, more effective, and quicker acting than existing vaccines given intramuscularly.

Dr. Paton said vaccines given intramuscularly to protect cattle against two viruses (bovine rhinotracheitis and parainfluenza-3) that cause "shipping fever" require about eight days to produce protection, whereas the intranasal vaccine can produce protection in 40 to 72 hours.

This earlier protection from the nasal spray is thought to be caused by the stimulation of production in the nasal cells of a substance called interferon, Dr. Paton said.

The vaccine is composed of the two viruses treated so they will not cause the disease. Thus treated they activate the body's immunological system to protect the animal against the disease.

Interferon is a substance produced naturally by the body to protect it against virus invasion. Researchers

have been trying since 1957, when interferon's unique properties were identified, to devise a means to use on its production when needed to combat infection. Interferon has the spread of infection but does not prevent it.

It has been theorized that humans, interferon stimulators may be useful in curing the common cold which is caused by a variety of viruses, some cancers thought to be caused by viruses, and other virus-linked diseases.

Dr. Paton emphasized that the nasal spray developed by Jensen-Salsbery has no human application.

He explained that his excitement about its development was that "The first practical application of using a biological substance to produce the interferon protection."

A synthetic interferon stimulator called pyran, has been used experimentally in humans at Stanford University, but it has caused undesirable side effects.

Besides offering quicker protection against the "shipping fever" viruses, experimental evidence indicates the intranasal vaccine will not cause abortions in pregnant cows and will not cause adverse effects in newborn calves, Dr. Paton said.

## Soybean Carryover

The USDA has estimated stocks of old soybeans on hand September 1 at 98 million bushels. This figure compares with 230 million carried over last year, and with the record 324 million bushels carried over two years ago.

The soybean carryover, at 98 million bushels, was just about what was expected. The old beans plus the new crop, estimated at 1,186 million bushels in early September, won't be enough to provide for the normal increase in domestic use and exports. Price trends seem likely to depend upon the world supplies of substitutes for soybean oil and meal.

## Fewer Hogs In All Weight Groups

An estimated 6.1 million market hogs weighing over 180 pounds were on farms September 1. This number was 1 percent lower than a year ago. Most of these hogs were marketed during September.

The number of market hogs weighing over 180 pounds was listed at 8.9 million, down 6 percent from a year earlier. We expect a somewhat similar reduction in market receipts during October and early November.

The September 1 inventory also included 10.2 million hogs weighing 60 to 120 pounds, 9 percent less than last year, and 15.3 million pigs under 60 pounds, 8 percent less than a year before. These hogs and pigs will reach market weights from late November to about April 1.

## Corporate Farms Account For 8 Percent of Sales

Corporations operated about 1 percent of the commercial farms in 1968, operated 7 percent of the farmland, and collected 8 percent of total cash receipts, according to a report just issued by the U.S. Department of Agriculture.

USDA's Economic Research Service sought to identify every incorporated business in the United States producing one or more farm products in 1968. Such firms—13,300 in all—ranged from small, one-man corporations to large, publicly held firms with many business interests in addition to farming. One-third of the farming corporations were in Florida and California.

By far the most common—two-thirds of the national total—were incorporated family businesses. Typically these had evolved from sole proprietorships or from family partnerships.

Farming was the only business activity for nearly two-thirds of the farming corporations. Another 15 percent were associated with farm-related business—farm supply, marketing or processing firms.

Nonfarm business interests of the remaining 18 percent usually consisted of such local enterprises as automobile dealerships, grocery stores, or real estate firms. A few were huge public corporations with widespread business interests.

Sales of farm products by corporations were estimated at \$3.3 billion or 8 percent of the U.S. total at the time of the survey. Nearly a fifth of the farming corporations had farm sales of less than \$20,000. A fourth sold \$20,000 to \$99,999 worth of farm products, while slightly over a tenth sold \$500,000-plus.

Farming corporations were more prevalent in crop than in livestock production. Hay was the crop most frequently reported by corporate farms and occupied the largest share of harvested cropland. Beef cow herds were the livestock enterprise most frequently reported, with an average of 452 cows per corporation.

# How Dangerous Is Turnpike?

Among the nation's toll roads the Kansas Turnpike is a death trap, says a Kansas City man who is organizing to do something about it. William C. Lunt, who drives six states regularly as a regional sales manager for a restaurant supply firm, said safety improvements being made elsewhere across the nation are happening slowly or not at all on the Kansas Turnpike.

L. W. Newcomer, chief engineer for the Kansas Turnpike Authority, argued in return that the authority is making all the progress it can within reasonable limits of expense. Lunt disagrees sharply. "Most of the guard barriers are those ineffectual cables, and you usually go right through," Lunt said. "Often they are placed so that if they do hold they direct your car right into the bridge abutment."

Where they do have real guard rails, the ends are not buried. If you hit them right, they spear straight through your car.

"The medial strip is substandard, and there is no barrier to stop cars from crossing. That's why you get all those head-on crashes. Nearly all the signs are the old-fashioned steel kind which don't break away. If you go off the road, they cut your car in two."

In 1970 it all added up to a traffic death toll that made the Kansas Turnpike the second most deadly among the nation's 29 major toll roads, Lunt said.

Accident Facts, a publication of the National Safety Council, states persons were killed in 1970 on the Kansas Turnpike. The rate was 6.4 deaths for each 100 million vehicle miles traveled on the turnpike.

The average death toll on all 29 turnpikes was 2.2 for each 100 million vehicle miles. The only turnpike in the nation with a death rate higher than the Kansas Turnpike was the West Virginia Turnpike.

In 1969 the Kansas route was the fourth deadliest turnpike in the nation, with a death rate of 5.6. Lunt said Accident Facts lists the average death rate for the nation's toll roads at 6.8 for each 100 million vehicle miles.

"The Kansas Turnpike is almost as dangerous, mile for mile of driving, as rural roads," Lunt commented.

Lunt said driving hundreds of miles a week in his job has made him realize that highway builders are designed danger into many roads. A widespread national program of installing median barriers, guardrail and breakaway posts is lessening the danger in many cases. But there is great need for faster work.

He said the Kansas Turnpike is the most dangerous superhighway he drives regularly. Lunt placed a classified ad in a newspaper last week and said he is organizing a small group of supporters to carry the message to the Kansas Turnpike Authority.

Lunt said he believes continued delays by the Kansas Highway Commission in completing I-35 between Ottawa, Kan., and a link with the turnpike at Emporia have increased crowding and the death toll on the eastern end of the turnpike.

He said completion of I-35 to Emporia would open a new route to Kansas City and divert some turnpike users off the toll road. But the highway commission, which has permitted I-35 to end at Ottawa for many years, is still only creeping ahead on the project, Lunt said.

Newcomer said the Turnpike authority is slowly replacing its rigid signs with ones that break away. He said it would cost way up in the hundreds of thousands of dollars to install breakaway features on all the signs.

He said he agreed with Lunt's assertions concerning cable guardrails.

"But replacing them costs lots of money," he said. "And many times they work very well."

Newcomer said fatalities often occur "...when drivers get out into the median and hit a bridge."

"We can't have break-away bridges," he remarked.

He was asked whether a median barrier curved outward at bridges to direct the car back onto the pavement would save lives in such a situation.

He said a median barrier the full length of the Kansas Turnpike "would cost a terrible amount." The problem therefore is to decide where the need is most vital, and that is yet to be decided for the Kansas Turnpike, Newcomer explained.

Newcomer said one reason why the Kansas Turnpike death rate appears to be so high is that it is relatively less heavily traveled than Eastern turnpikes, so even a few deaths sharply raise the death rate for 100 million vehicle miles.

Accident Facts indicates, however, that only five of the 29 turnpikes in the nation exceeded the Kansas Turnpike death toll of 31 even in absolute numbers. The New York State Thruway, with 95 actual deaths and a rate of 1.6, had the most deaths in absolute numbers.

Last February Frank McDonald, Turnpike Authority chairman, and Newcomer issued a capsule summary of the authority's financial condition.

It indicated the authority's net income from tolls is sufficient to pay off the interest on its bonds nearly 2½ times over. The authority

redeemed nearly \$9 million of its bonds ahead of schedule in 1970 and is 10 years ahead of schedule in retiring the bonds that financed the highway.

Newcomer said if the Turnpike Authority chose, it could allocate money for the safety work from the extra payments being made on bonds.

"But we couldn't go out and do all these things the safety council thinks would do a good job," he said.

"There's no rhyme or reason to these accidents. If I had \$7 billion, I wouldn't be able to stop all the accidents."

## Charge Four In Area Corn Theft

OSKALOOSA—Jefferson County sheriff's officers arrested three men and a woman from Tonganoxie last week on suspicion of stealing corn from a farmer's bin.

Sheriff Carl Eisenhower said the four were arrested near Tonganoxie. They range in age from 18 to 32 years. They were not expected to be charged until early this week.

He said Theodore Lang, a farmer near McLouth, reported to his office someone had stolen 85-100 bushels of corn from his bin during the night. "It's not as uncommon as you might think," Eisenhower said.

# Sterling Dairy Farm Another To Switch To Dry Operation

A new \$70,000 dairy facility has just gone into operation in the southern part of Rice County.

This operation, owned by the Eugene Colle family of rural Sterling, is one of four similar operations in the state of Kansas. The Colles have switched to a total dry operation for their 80 head registered Holstein herd. This seems to be a coming trend for dairy production in Kansas, similar to that of the northern states.

An automatic feeding system is connected to a new 24 by 70 foot silo and grain bin to a double feed bunk running through the center of two concrete dry lots.

silage ration. This is weighed on an overhead scale and added to the silage as it is augered to the feed bunk under a new push bottom system.

Rations vary according to the seasonal crops. Presently, the cattle are receiving chopped sudan, other times it is chopped alfalfa. During the winter they are fed sorghum silage. All this is raised on the farm.

Two barns are equipped with individual loafing stalls, one off the feed area. Barns are insulated and have canvas sides which can be let down during inclement weather.

The two way approach to his herd caused Colle to divide his herd into two parts, high and low producers, and he feeds according to the cows' production.

High producers get 22 pounds of grain with silage each day and the low producers get 15 pounds per head per day.

Probably the most unique feature of the whole operation is the manure handling system. Manure is contained in two 10 by 30 foot underground manure tanks which will be cleaned periodically. Wastes are spread out on the farm land.

At milking time the cattle are brought into the milk barn by electric crowding gate operated within the milk barn. Cows are milked eight at a time and stand sideways in the stall. But they are not fed during the milking time. This speeds up the milking time and they are fed outside several times each day in groups of high producers and low producing cows.

Each milking stall is equipped with a teat cup sanitizer to disinfect cups before another cow is milked. Spray nozzles hanging from the ceiling in the milk pit are used to wash each cow's udder before milking.

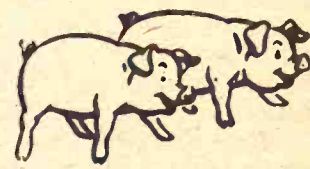

# Some Lost, Some Strayed — Many Stolen

Cattle rustling is no joke to Kansas livestock producers who lose an estimated \$500,000 to \$1 million a year to thieves.

Kansas Brand Commissioner Doyle Heft, Topeka, said this year 670 head of cattle had been reported lost, strayed or stolen—which is hard to tell.

With cattle coming off pasture season, a flood of new losses is expected to raise the figure from \$350,000 to at least \$500,000 of known losses.

The total could run much higher considering losses not reported, Heft said.

But Kansas has not been as hard hit as nearby Iowa and Oklahoma. Losses in Iowa have been estimated at \$5 million annually, he said. Reports have been made of 100 head lost recently in Oklahoma by a single rancher.

Methods of operation of cattle thieves are well known to the commissioner. They sometimes use

corrals and loading chutes in pastures or cattle yards when ranchers are away from home. Low hung so-called horse trailers pulled by pickups that haul as much as trucks often are used. Good roads enable thieves to be several hundred miles away within 24 hours.

Vigilance of sheriffs and peace officers who keep a strayed or stolen book facilitates return of about 600 stolen cattle to owners each year, Heft said.

Kansas' needs to prevent cattle rustling include "a tough law like Colorado requiring branding all cattle by registered insignia and requiring inspection of brands at points of sale," says a Butler County rancher. He has lost in three years 12 registered calves valued at \$8,000.

Such inspection now is optional by the market at point of sale, but 18 Kansas markets have requested such services, Heft added.

What is needed is legislation that empowers the brand commissioner to inspect all cattle going through sales rings in Kansas, he said.

Such legislation was introduced at the last legislative session to the House Livestock and Agriculture Committee. It has been carried over to the coming session, Heft said.

Such inspection has enabled return of three head per month to rightful owners, he added.

To prevent cattle thievery, ranchers, according to Heft can have a good legible registered brand. Count cattle regularly and report any losses immediately to the sheriff who will notify the commissioner's office or the Kansas Bureau of Investigation.

Loss of feeder pigs and hogs has presented a problem to farmers in Iowa, Missouri and Minnesota.

A University of Minnesota professor has perfected a technique of tattooing a number of hogs which immediately identifies the point of origin to the producer who may

register the number with the brand commissioner.

"Kansas has good laws, but it is a matter of assessing the penalty when stock thieves are caught," Heft said. Under \$100 is considered a misdemeanor and more than \$100 a felony.

In 1970, the office assisted in 34 convictions on livestock theft. Of these only three served time and the rest were paroled or given probation. The sentence may be strong enough if it is assessed, he said.

"If a rancher shoots a cattle thief, he might be charged with manslaughter," Heft said.

"Required brand inspection at the point of sale is a solution," he believes. "Getting a number from rustler's truck is another."

## Sonar To Check Lamb Count On Pregnant Ewes

High frequency sound waves, similar to World War II sonar used for locating enemy submarines, are being bounced off the bellies of pregnant ewes to determine if they are carrying twins or triplets.

The Agriculture Department says the scanning device emits a high frequency sound that echoes when it strikes a lamb fetus. The echoes are recorded on film which reveals if the ewe is carrying one, two or three lambs.

Studies at Cornell University, Ithaca, N.Y., have shown the scanning method to be fast, economical and accurate, the report said. Previously the only accurate method was x-ray, a costly, time consuming and potentially hazardous process, officials said.

"Estimation of the number of fetuses before lambing is extremely important to the sheep producer," the report, by the Agricultural Research Service, said. "Ewes carrying more than one lamb require a high level of nutrition during the last four to six weeks

before lambing to prevent pregnancy disease, or ketosis." The disease is rare in ewes bearing only a single lamb.

Those with multiple pregnancies also require more help during birth, the report said.

"Separation of ewes carrying multiple lambs from those with only a single lamb can save sheep producers millions of dollars annually through reductions in feed costs and losses of lambs and ewes," the report said.

## Dwarf Wheats Working Well In Ag-Poor Nations

The semi-dwarf wheat varieties are a great success in developing countries, the Agriculture Department says.

In the eight nations that are major wheat producers—India, Pakistan, Mexico, Turkey, Afghanistan, Tunisia, Iran and Morocco—farmers planted the high-yielding, semi-dwarf varieties last year on 10.6 million hectares (26.2 million acres) compared with 0.6 million hectares (1.5 million acres) in 1966. Output has expanded from 1.6 million tons to 22.7 million.

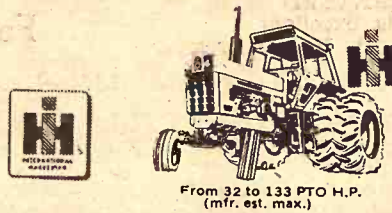
The semi dwarfs were developed in Mexico through co-operative efforts of that government and the Rockefeller Foundation.

The new wheats have strong short stems that reduce fallow, make

better use of fertilizer and water, mature early to allow multiple cropping, have greater resistance to diseases and have higher yields.

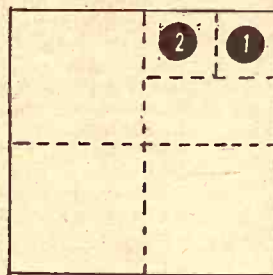

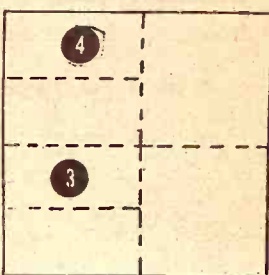

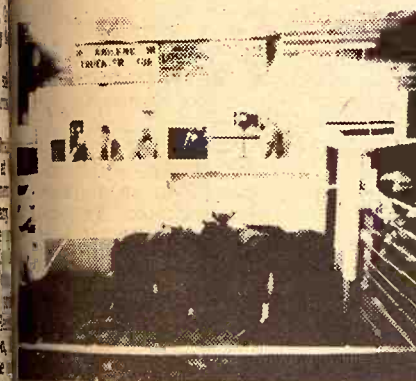

## New Nebraska Wheat Variety Yields Well

Centurk, a new wheat variety released by the University of Nebraska, Lincoln and the U.S. Department of Agriculture last year, yielded nearly 84 bushels per acre in a 22-acre field near Mead, Nebraska, this summer.

The 1,846 bushels harvested is available to farmers for planting this fall on a first-come, first-served basis, according to Richard N. Mills, manager of the foundation seed division.

The new variety, developed in the College of Agriculture-USDA wheat breeding program, yielded 10 percent better than Scout during three years of testing.

It is adapted to the entire hard red winter wheat region.
