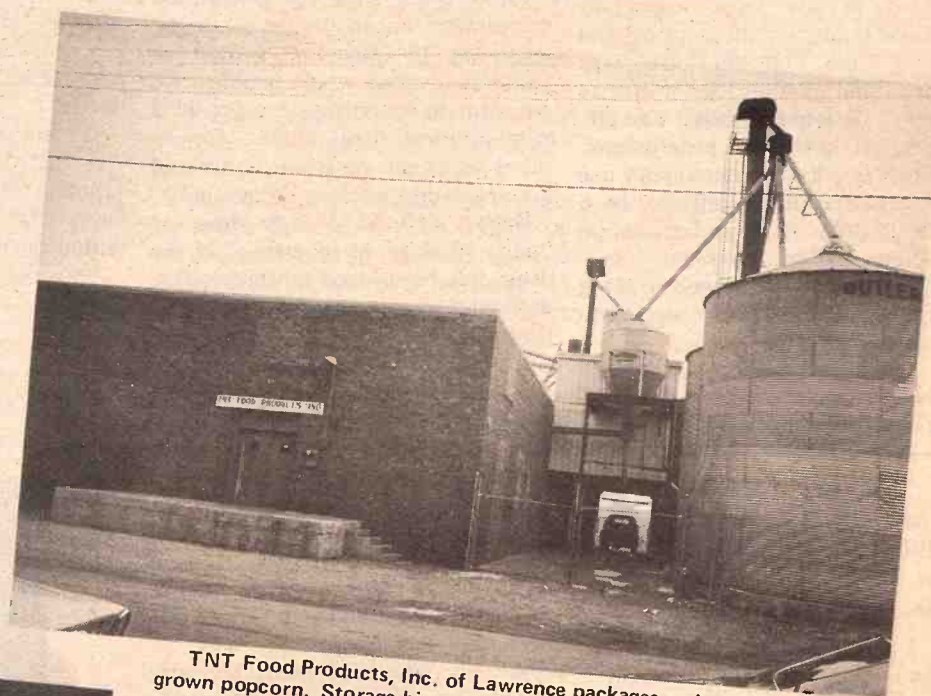

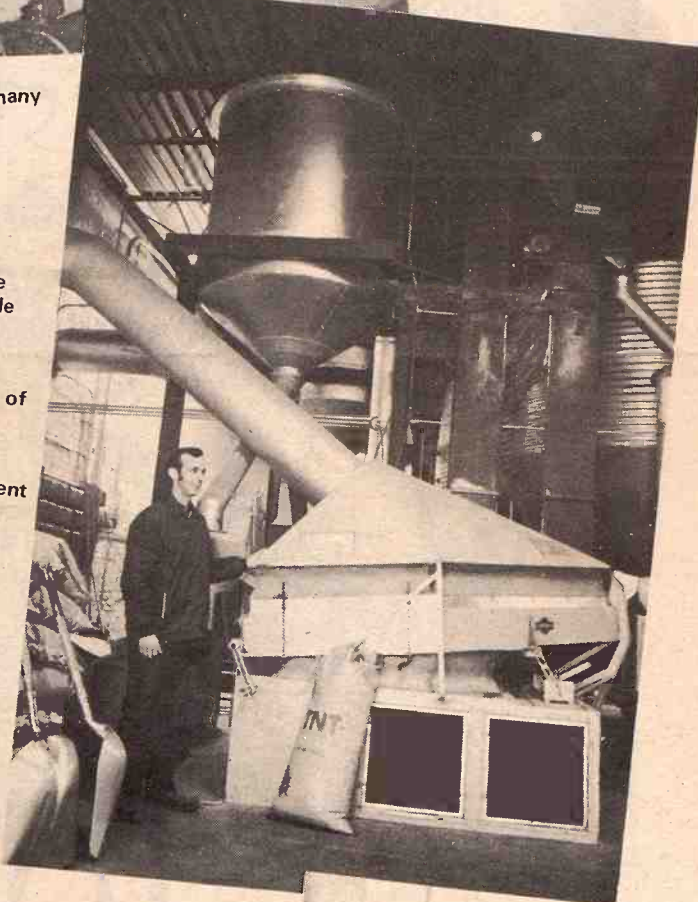
Bob Moran operates fork-lift loaded with boxes ready for shipment. TNT popcorn is marketed in many foreign countries as well as throughout the United States.

The Popcorn Place

Clarence Pobjoy here stands beside some of the cleaning machinery. Several steps of cleaning and grading are employed to assure consistent high quality.



That box of popcorn you were munching on the other night during the movie or TV show may have originated in Kansas. Popcorn is a specialty crop from the Grass & Grain area which is marketed world-wide. TNT Popcorn is raised in a 40 mile radius of Lawrence. It is processed, packaged and marketed by TNT Food Products, Inc. in Lawrence. Ben A. Barteldes is president.

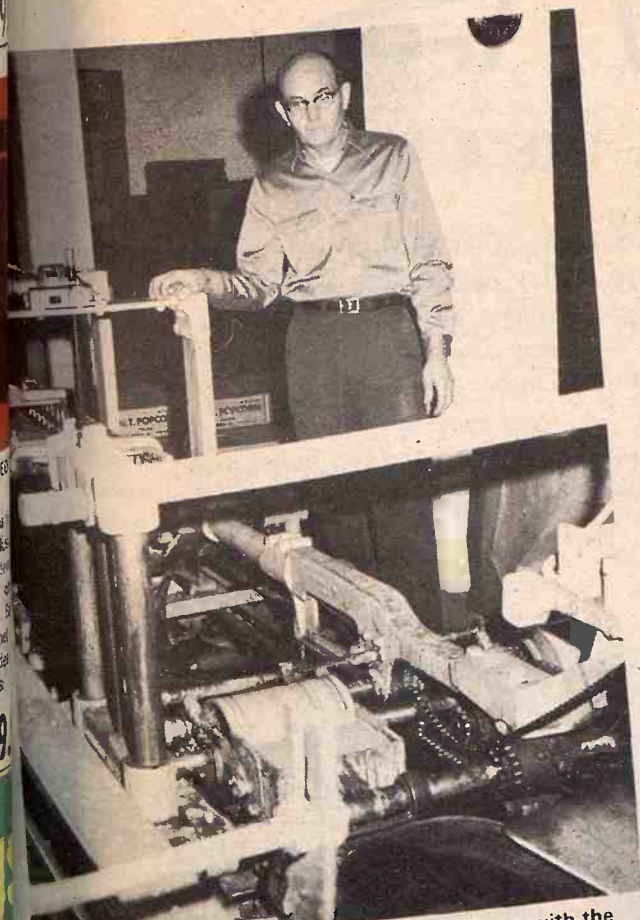
This company was established as the Barteldes Seed Co. in 1867. They started handling popcorn around 1930. The regular seed business was closed down in Lawrence five years ago. The company now is in full-time production of popcorn. The TNT brand was started in 1952. In October 1965 the plant was burned out. Since then it has been completely rebuilt with all new automated machinery installed. Twelve people are employed here.

Popcorn is harvested usually in mid-September by combines equipped with corn heads. Only yellow popcorn is raised here. The yield average is about two-thirds of regular field corn, but the price is about double. TNT Inc. provides the seed assuring consistent quality. Seventeen hundred acres were contracted in 1970. The popcorn is trucked to Lawrence, dumped into the receiving pit, elevated to a scalper where it is "rough cleaned" and then to a storage bin. These bins have perforated floors through which air is driven to maintain proper moisture content.

When the popcorn reaches optimum moisture range it is augured into the processing and packaging building. The first step is the "screen air" which screens out the over-size and under-size kernels and blows out light material.

The popcorn is then run through a polisher which removes chaffy material from the tip of the kernel and then over gravity separators which are highly sophisticated machines which select the finished product by specific gravity.

After the final cleaning and processing steps the popcorn is placed in a large bin which supplies the various packaging machines on the floor below. It is packaged in containers of different shapes and sizes. It is then shipped out to popcorn lovers the world over.

National Health Report On Marijuana Is 'Fragmentary, Incomplete'

New federal research indicates most young people will not experience dangerous effects from short-term experimenting with marijuana, but lack of evidence makes it impossible to give the drug a clean bill of health.

"The health picture with respect to marijuana must at present be regarded as fragmentary and clearly incomplete," the National Institute of Mental Health said in its first detailed report to Congress on results of a 3 million-dollar-a-year study of pot.

"Many of the most important questions regarding the implications of long-term, chronic use will require significant periods of time to answer," the report stated. The 176-page report drew these conclusions:

- Consequences of marijuana use "can range from no effects to a psychotic experience, and cannot be predicted for any individual."

- There is no evidence linking marijuana with cancer or birth defects.

- Additional research is needed "before we can ascertain how much of a threat marijuana would pose to

the general populace if it were commonly used."

The report yesterday reached virtually the same conclusions as preliminary findings issued last September.

Dr. Bertram S. Brown, director of the National Institute of Mental Health, told a news conference:

"The bulk of healthy young people, with short-term use of the drug, will have no deleterious effects — although a few of them will have such effects...and in high enough doses, a psychotic episode can occur in everybody..."

"And even if it is eventually established that moderate use is not injurious to physical health, a nagging question would remain: Do we want to encourage the use of a mind-altering drug which, for so many, is an escape from reality and a retreat into passive enjoyment?"

Brown defined a high dose as "daily smoking or ingesting" of the drug, but he offered no figures. He defined moderate use as two or three times a week.

Pressed by newsmen to estimate the incidence of "psychotic episodes," Brown guessed that one out of every 100 first-time users among college freshmen experiences a "serious panic episode...a 'bad trip'...lasting a day or so."

He said he estimates that one out of every 1,000 moderate users experiences such episodes had. In relatively rare instances, he said, marijuana users may experience psychotic episodes bad enough to keep them in the hospital a couple of weeks.

Oklahoma Gives Feds Some Of Own Medicine

Oklahoma is giving federal authorities six months to comply with Washington's own guidelines on pollution.

The state Pollution Control Board, made up of representatives of six state agencies, voted Monday to notify U.S. officials they have 180 days in which to reduce pollution of waste water from Tinker Air Force Base and other federal installations in Oklahoma to a level complying with federal water quality standards.

The state attorney general's office was instructed to seek a court injunction to halt such pollution of compliance does not come within the stated period.

The resolution was offered by

state Corporation Commission Chairman Charles Nesbitt.

Nesbitt said a Tinker representative who appeared before the Corporation Commission admitted that effluent from the base's metal replating operations do not meet federal water quality standards.

The waste, which Nesbitt said contains toxic residue, flows into the North Canadian River.

Nesbitt said Tinker officials pleaded that there were no funds to improve waste treatment before the water is discharged into the river.

That is "not an acceptable excuse" from private industry, Nesbitt said, adding that he saw no reason why it should be accepted from the federal government.

He said the 180-day limit had been imposed in federal antipollution actions and "I think it is a nice one...they ought to follow it."

RESEARCH ON PACKER WASTE INTO FISH FOOD

MANHATTAN — A \$10,000 grant will finance study at Kansas State University to see whether more by-products and wastes from the meat packing industry can't be used in

commercial fish food. Tests will be made on channel catfish in test ponds near Tuttle Lake. The organization funding the program is called the Fats and Proteins Research Foundation Inc., composed of various meat industry companies.

Lowly Corncob Gets Glamour

At a highly automated mill in Maumee, Ohio, a million-dollar plant processes a key industrial raw material. Without it, you couldn't clean your mink coat, powder your nose, polish your ball bearings or poison your fire ants.

It's called the corn cob. Once scorned by farmers, the lowly cob has become a flourishing business for a dozen or so corn cob mills scattered around the Corn Belt.

The millers buy, dry, grain, mill and bag perhaps 200,000 tons of cobs a year for a cornucopia of users. Their sales, now a \$4 million a year, have doubled in the past five or six years.

"I wish I was 15 or 20 years younger," enthuses John Vander Hooven, 69, president of Anderson Mills Inc. here, which last year processed about 35,000 tons of cobs. "The potential is fantastic."

Anderson says he's continually approached by other companies to build cob mills, and he's considering setting up mills in Canada or France where cob grit is in great demand. That's heady status for a product at farmers and grain processors once had trouble getting rid of.

Until a few years ago, corn cobs stacked up in huge unsightly mounds across the Midwest. They often caught fire from spontaneous combustion and, when wet, they produced a noxious, sweet smell. A three-block long cob stack once smoldered for three months, producing a pall of smoke over Maumee and a bushel of illution complaints.

"Folks were ready to run us out of town," says John D. Anderson, chief executive of The Andersons, a vast

grain partnership which last year had \$150 million in sales.

Until 1957, The Andersons had no convenient way to dispose of the cobs. But that year, Mr. Vander Hooven sold his water-driven mill in Brinkhaven, Ohio, and came looking for a job. In an afternoon, he convinced the Anderson partners to build the mill, acquired a 40 per cent interest in it himself, and began grinding away at the mountains of cobs.

But that's not as simple as it sounds. Indeed, the corn cob business is rife with hazards for the neophyte.

"A cob is an ornery rascal," says Vander Hooven. "I've seen at least a dozen mills go broke" in recent years.

Neophyte millers, he says, thought farmers would give away corn cobs — and they did, until they realized the cobs were valuable — and many of the millers weren't aware of risks of the business.

Risks there are. Cob dust can be explosive, and wet or rotted cobs can spoil. Corn cob grit is so abrasive that it constantly wears down the rollers and plates in milling machinery and even grinds away at the stainless steel wire mesh screens that millers use to sift various parts of the cob.

A corn cob is a complex item even after the corn is removed. On the outside is a light, fluffy material called beeswing, which holds the kernels.

Underneath is a hard woody ring and in the middle, a soft, white pith. Dried, the woody material is four times harder than maple. Bob Steinfert, a cob miller in Mount Pulaski, Ill., claims it costs more to

grind a ton of cobs than a ton of taconite, a particularly hard iron-bearing rock.

The woody cob material is used in tumbling machines to clean and polish such items as ball bearings, costume jewelry, bullets and fish hooks.

Blown through blasting equipment, it removes grease and paint and cleans machinery. Louisiana Power & Light Co., of New Orleans, recently ordered 30 tons of cob grit that, mixed with limestone powder, is used to clean huge insulators in power substations without cutting off the power. Previously, the utility had to shut down the stations and wipe at the insulators with rags.

Screening and grading the material is crucial, however. To polish buttons, the grit must be small enough to pass through the buttonhole and to avoid jamming automatic sewing systems. Dry cleaners use finely ground cobs, mixed with solvent, to clean mink coats in tumbling machines.

Chemical companies, too, are major cob customers. Quaker Oats Co., which enjoys the distinction of being the nation's biggest user of cobs, processes the cobs and other ingredients into "furfural," a basic chemical used in producing resins, plastics, tires and even auto engine parts and household appliances.

Cob grit is also an ideal carrier for fertilizer and weed killers. In the Southeast, it is dropped from airplanes to poison fire ants.

Diamond Shamrock Corp. uses corn cob granules in its lawn care products and tells customers that "once in the ground, the granules decompose, forming humus, a highly desirable soil conditioner."

Some folks use corn cobs to grow mushrooms and one company uses them to mulch rose plants.

Even the dust produced in corn cob mills is put to use. Mills collect the fine powder in dust filters and sell it to cosmetics firms, which make face powder from it. Shulton Inc., of Clifton, N.J., says its "corn silk" line of cosmetics "has enjoyed substantial sales increases since its introduction."

But cob millers have their headaches — chief among them the belief still held by many farmers that corn cobs are worthless. Many Corn Belt farmers have turned to using the pickersheller, a machine that gathers and shells corn in the field, and discards the cobs, leaving them to rot.

To stop that sort of thing, millers have raised the prices they offer for cobs. Six times a day on local radio, Vander Hooven and The Andersons advertise that they'll pay more for ear corn — that is, corn still on the cob — than for shelled corn.

Currently, the premium is 7 cents a bushel of shelled corn (based on the quantity after the ear corn is shelled, but it has been as high as 14 cents. The mill paid out \$400,000 in such premiums last year.

Such costs, of course, keep

refiners busy searching for still more profitable uses for cob products.

The lighter part of a corn cob, the beeswing and pith, absorbs up to five times its weight in oil, and Vander Hooven hopes the product will catch on as an oil slick remedy. A Connecticut firm is marketing the material under the name "Slikwik."

There is, of course, one use for the corn cob that is not new, but even it is modernizing — and flourishing.

In Missouri, a group of farmers raise a particular strain of corn just for the cob it grows on.

One of their customers is Hitschl & Hirschl & Bendheim, a Washington, Mo., company that has been making corn cob pipes for 100 years. A company official says 1970 was "the biggest year in our history." The current best seller: A line of \$1.98 "color cob" pipes that come in six colors, including pink.

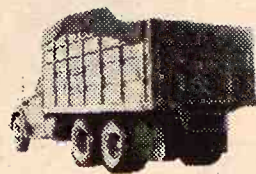

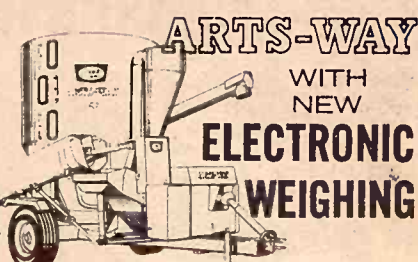

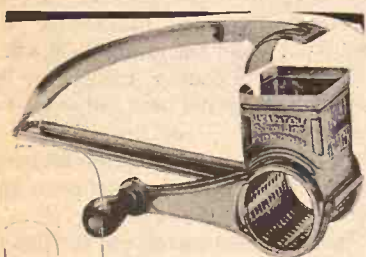

STRAWBERRY CAKE

Use a 13x9-inch pan and grease the bottom. Then line with miniature marshmallows (about 1 1/4 cups). Next, mix 2 cups strawberries, thawed and 1 package strawberry gelatin, dry, and set aside.

2 1/4 cups flour
1 1/2 cups sugar
1/2 cup shortening
3 teaspoons baking powder
1/2 teaspoon salt
1 cup milk
1 teaspoon vanilla
3 eggs

Mix above until smooth, pour over the marshmallows then put the strawberries and gelatin mixture on top. Bake at 350 degrees, 45-50 minutes.

foamy. Spread light coating on crust. Bake in 350-degree oven for about one hour. May be frosted with a powdered sugar icing, if desired. Cut into squares.

3/4 cups snipped gumdrops

Sift together flour, sugar, baking powder and salt. Combine egg, milk, cooking oil, gumdrops and nuts; add to dry ingredients, mixing just till combined. Pour into greased and floured 9x5x3-inch baking pan. Bake in 350-degree oven for one hour or till done. Remove from pan; cool on rack.

Store Silver, China In Plastic Bags Between Use

Tarnish proof your silverware and dust proof your good china and crystal before returning it to its accustomed storage place after that special dinner. Your table things will then emerge all set for instant use the next time they are needed. There will be none of that frantic last minute polishing and shining which you've never allotted time for in your party preparation schedule.

Your best dust and tarnish proofing tools are double wall quilted plastic bags. The lack of static cling and expanding side gussets eliminates the traditional tussle so that coffee pot, plates or whatever, slip easily into the bags. The double layer of plastic with air bubble insulation in between means that air, your chief tarnish causing culprit, cannot gain entrance once the bags are sealed with a twist-closure. And this extra thickness together with the quilting provides a cushioning effect which protects china against chipping.

You'll find large gallon-sized bags neatly accommodate your larger items such as coffee pot, vegetable dish or a stack of three dinner plates, a stack of bread and butter plates, dessert plates or saucers. The quart sized bag is suited to the smaller pieces.

And here's a tip well worth adopting. Treat fragile bric-a-brac that you're intending to store in the bags to a good break-proof washing first by shaking each piece up in a double wall quilted bag filled with soapy water. Rinse in the same way.

This method eliminates the chance of delicate pieces slipping from soapy fingers.

Trim Sparingly

Trim sparingly the various kinds of lettuce that come into your kitchen. The reason? Because the darker green outer leaves often contain considerably more nutrition than the inner leaves. Discard as little of the outer leaves of lettuce as possible to get the most Vitamin A, Vitamin C and minerals for your money. Iceberg, Romaine and other types of lettuce are in good supply at your market now.

Children With Leukemia Are Living Longer

The number of children with leukemia who live five years or more, with the disease has increased 25 per cent in the last decade, but that survival rate is far from equaling a cure rate," a Texas pediatrician says.

Approximately 28 per cent of children with bone marrow leukemia live five years or more, reports Dr. Margaret Sullivan, associate pediatrician and associate professor of pediatrics at the

University of Texas, M.D. Anderson Hospital and Tumor Institute in Houston.

However, about half of these are developing meningeal leukemia — cancer of the brain covering. Dr. Sullivan said meningeal leukemia is not fatal, but is a constant source of ill health which can continue indefinitely.

About 7,000 children in the U.S. contract leukemia each year and more children die of leukemia than all infectious diseases combined, the pediatrician said in an interview. Only accidents cause more childhood deaths.

Dr. Sullivan said that pallor and repeated infections most commonly lead to the detection of leukemia. When the disease is in remission (under control), children can lead relatively normal lives, attending school and participating in athletics, but they must avoid immunizations because their maintenance medication makes them highly susceptible to viruses.

Meningeal leukemia affects victims much like a brain tumor, causing headaches, stiff necks and stiff backs, she said. Expensive drug treatments are necessary every six weeks.

Drug and radiation therapy are the principle treatments for leukemia and Hodgkins disease, one of several malignant disorders of lymphatic and other tissues which play a part in an individual's ability to fight infection.

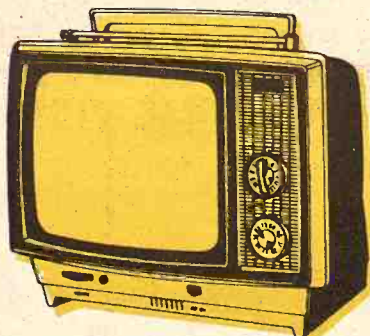

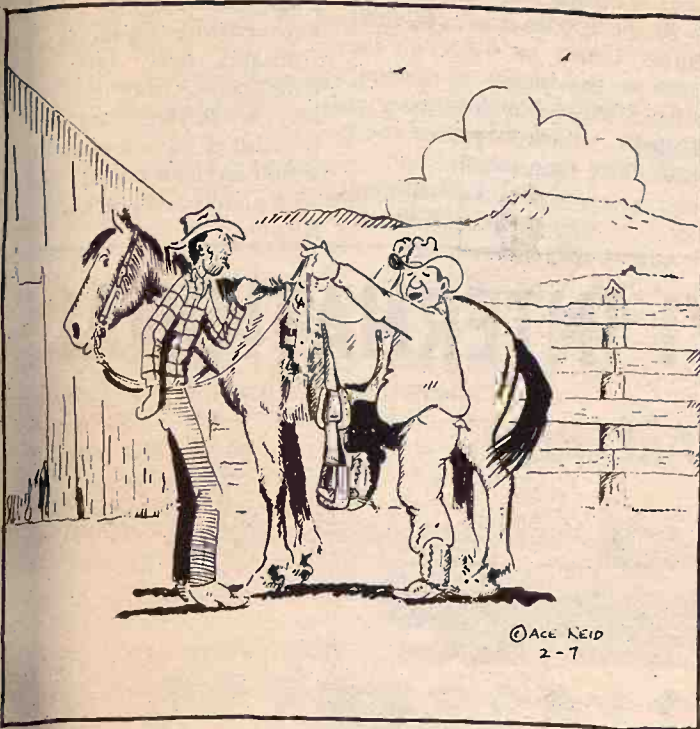

High Interest Cut Into Farm Equity Gain

Farmers increased their ownership equity in what they estimate only 3.5 billion dollars in 1970, the least in a decade, a new agriculture department report says.

High interest rates, tight credit, rising expenses and the general inflation in the economy last year were the big factors.

The Outlook and Situation Board says some relief may be on the way this year. "Interest rates on farm loans made in 1971 are expected to average about 1 percentage point lower than last year," the report says. "Both long and short-term farm loans will carry lower interest rates."

Total assets of farmers were estimated as of January 1 at another record high of 317.2 billion dollars, up 2 per cent more than a year earlier. But proprietor's equities — what farmers actually own among their assets — totaled 256.8 billion dollars, a gain of only 1.4 per cent or 3.6 billion dollars from the 253.3 billion-dollar equity held on January 1, 1970.

The equity gain has been less in recent years. It was 8.8 billion dollars or a 3.6 per cent gain from 1969 to 1970. But the latest figure is the smallest, according to USDA records, farmer-owned equity declined from 178.8 billion dollars in 1961 to 177.8 billion dollars in 1961. Farm debt on January 1 put at 58.6

billion dollars, a 6 per cent increase from a year earlier. "Three-fourths of the increase," the report said, "was in non-real estate loans. Growth of farm mortgage loans was restrained by the reluctance of farmers to seek long-term loans at prevailing interest rates."

As a result of pressures, net farm income last year dipped 2.5 per cent from 16.2 billion dollars in 1969. This would mean a net farm income of about 15.8 billion dollars, the lowest since 1968. Despite some improvement this year, farm expenses are expected to keep rising. Thus, the report said, 1971 net income will undergo "further decline" but cited high interest rates.

Catholics Close Last School In Concordia

CONCORDIA — The Catholic grade school in Concordia will close after the spring term, marking the

end of parochial schools in this north-central Kansas community since before the turn of the century. Father Loren Werth said the move was being forced by "rising costs and the lack of available nuns to help teach."

The Catholic junior-senior high school was closed here last spring. There are 206 pupils enrolled in

grades 1-6 at the Catholic school. They will be absorbed into the public school system. Harold Clark, superintendent of Unified District 333, said the additional students would mean hiring three more teachers next year than was planned. Clark said he foresees no other problems.

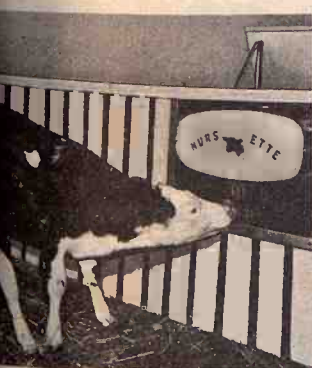

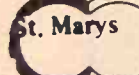

Feed Grain Prices May Fluctuate

The USDA Quarterly Report on stocks of grains on hand January 1 turned out about as expected. The estimate for corn was 3,742 million bushels — down 13 per cent from a year earlier. The soybean figure was 949 million bushels — down 10 per cent.

These estimates are based on nearly complete reports from elevators, mills, warehouses, the CCC, and a representative group of farmers. While the resulting figures are not precise measurements, they are accurate enough to be very useful to farmers who have grain to sell or buy.

The quarterly reports themselves only show estimates of the stocks on hand at the first of the quarter. From these figures, we can calculate the amount used during the past quarter and make forecasts about use during the months ahead. In addition, the supplies reported on hand as of January 1 provide a good check on the estimates of crop production that were made last fall.

Corn Use Down 1 Per Cent
The total supply of corn for this marketing year was 5,109 million bushels. Subtracting the January 1 stocks of 3,742 million leaves a figure of 1,367 million bushels, the apparent disappearance during the October-December quarter. This rate of use and exports was 1 per cent less than one year before.

Exports were around 146 million bushels — down about 20 per cent from a year before. The amount

used for food and industrial products was around 100 million bushels, about the same as a year earlier. The remainder of the disappearance was mostly in corn fed to livestock — about 1,122 million bushels, 1 per cent less than a year before.

The reduction in corn exports has been largely offset by increased shipments of sorghum grain, oats, and barley. These grains have also been substituted for corn in the rations fed to animals here in the United States. In addition, more wheat is probably being used for feed than last year.

Several market analysts have forecast a corn carryover next October 1 of about 600 million bushels. This would be possible if the use of corn during the remainder of this marketing year is 4 to 6 per cent less than it was a year ago.

Soybean Use Up 4 Per Cent
The amount of soybeans reported on hand January 1 was 949 million bushels — 10 per cent below last year's figure. The apparent disappearance during the four months of September through December was 416 million bushels — 4 per cent more than a year before. Domestic processors used about 253 million bushels, some 8 per cent more than a year earlier. Exports were about 1 per cent above the 159 million bushels shipped-out in the same period of 1969.

It now appears that the carryover of soybeans next September 1 may be 75 to 100 million bushels; last fall, it was 229 million. A minimum of around 50 million probably is essential for pipeline supplies. Hence, the usable reserves may be reduced to 25 to 50 million bushels. Domestic use and exports now require about 24 million bushels per

week, so the usable reserves next September 1 may be sufficient for only one or two weeks of normal operation. With such a short reserve in prospect, market prices will fluctuate more than usual.

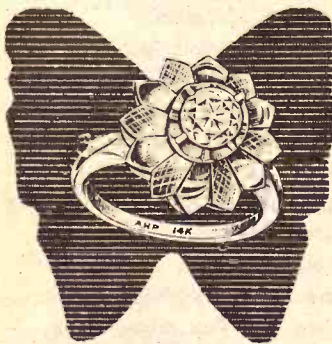

Delay Word On Meat Import Quota

The Nixon administration's plan to hold down meat imports within "voluntary restraint" levels negotiated with supplying countries succeeded last year after missing the mark in 1969.

The Agriculture Department said imports of meat covered by quota restrictions totaled 1.17 billion pounds in 1970. When deductions are made for rejections the net was 1.153 billion pounds, or well within the agreed level of 1.16 billion.

Still in doubt, however, is what the administration intends to do about meat imports this year. Agriculture Secretary Clifford M. Hardin was required by the 1964 meat quota law to announce his estimate of 1971 imports by Jan. 1.

After more than a month's delay,

there still has been no official word. Originally the 1970 voluntary level was 1.062 billion pounds. The maximum under the formula last year before triggering quotas was 1.098 billion pounds.

But by mid-year it was apparent that foreign meat, particularly from Australia, New Zealand and Canada, was coming in faster than anticipated. So the administration triggered quotas, then suspended them and set a new "voluntary" level which eventually was raised to 1.16 billion.

In 1969, the first full year for using voluntary agreements to avoid quota actions imports actually totaled 35 million pounds more than supplying nations had agreed upon. But last year, largely because of

demands from American livestock producers, the U.S. kept closer watch on arrivals, thus holding

imports to within the revised 1.16 billion pounds limit.

Some sources say the department is willing to keep 1971 imports at the 1.16 billion pound level but is being challenged by some of the major suppliers, including Australia, New Zealand and Latin American nations.

Charges Against Chicago Brokers Of Pork Bellies

The Agriculture department has announced that 22 brokers on the Chicago Mercantile exchange have admitted violating federal rules a year ago concerning the trading of pork belly futures.

Officials said no formal charges were brought against the traders and the each has signed a "stipulation of compliance" with the department agreeing not to engage in such practices again.

The Chicago brokers were identified as: Arnold A. Brin, Walter E. Cahill, Gerald H. Elvin, Leonard B. Feldman, Alan L. Freeman, Stuart N. Gimbel, Irwin Goldman, Michael F. Winner, Paul R. Hinton, Joseph E. Krautkramer, John J. McGuire, Eugene T. Mueller, Robert J. Murphy, Robert E. O'Grady, Charles M. Ponoroff, Aaron J. Robinson, Laurence Rosenberg, Harvey Schiller, Ronald M. Schiller, Laurence S. Shepard, Harold Vision and Abraham Horn.

The crackdown grew out of a Commodity Exchange Authority investigation of trading in pork bellies on the Chicago exchange in February last year, the department said.

Officials said practices included taking the opposite side of customers' orders without first receiving consent, offsetting customers' orders and making false records.

But although the investigation disclosed these practices were widespread, officials said, no instances were found of customers losing money because of them.

Make Bar Exam Easier For Blacks?

Vice-President Spiro T. Agnew has criticized suggestions that bar examination standards should be eased to admit more Negroes to the practice of law.

In a speech before a meeting of the state attorneys general Agnew commented on developments in

Pennsylvania, where some public officials and lawyers were calling for abolition of the bar examination. They have charged the tests were "culturally biased" against Negroes and that a high percentage of them did not pass, and had suggested that all persons who gain law degrees should be licensed to practice.

Agnew compared this to the open enrollment plan at the City College of New York, which he had criticized before. He said that such efforts "tear down standards" and "unqualified people are put into positions of responsibility that they can't handle. I think that's wrong."

He said he saw "no humane or benign reasons" to justify steps that might "lower our standards of justice," and insisted that the best solution was not to lower testing standards but to improve educational standards. Agnew declared that competitive disadvantage of blacks was not due to racial differences and could be cured by hard academic work.

Cottonwood Pulp Gaining As State Economic Factor

HUTCHINSON — Updated statistics show that cottonwood pulpwood production in Kansas during 1970 exceeded by nearly 50 per cent all previous estimates.

Central Kansas Extension District Forester Hank Deutsch said he

contacted railroads operating in the prime cottonwood area in central Kansas this month and received the first accurate statistics on the number of carloads shipped to southern pulp mills.

He said 1,032 carloads of cottonwood pulpwood were shipped to the mills in 1970 on three railroad lines. He estimated the cordage at about 15,000, as compared with earlier estimates of up to 10,000. The cars have a capacity of from 12 to 20 cords each.

Deutsch said Frisco Railroad reported an average of 31 carloads shipped monthly for a total of 362 carloads, Atchison, Topeka and Santa Fe reported 286 carloads in 1970 and 66 in 1969, and Missouri Pacific reported 374 carloads were shipped in 1970.

Mix Comics With Molasses In Cattle Feed

Agriculture Department scientists are finding out that cows don't mind chewing over old news — comic strips and all — as long as it's served up in a sweet salad of molasses, hay and grain.

Up to 8 per cent of an animal's roughage can be old newspapers, the scientists found during feeding tests. The results were published in the department's Agricultural Research magazine.

Newspapers were ground up and blended into rations ranging up to 24 per cent paper. Additional molasses was needed at the higher levels to make the food acceptable to stock. The rations also included ground timothy hay, soybean meal, cracked corn and minerals.

Steers fed a wintering mixture gained 1.9 pounds per day at the 8 per cent level or less, but only 1.2 pounds at 16 per cent and 0.5 pounds at 24 per cent.

"Over-all, newsprint did not appear to have any adverse effects on the animals studied," the ARS said, "and up to at least 8 per cent can serve as a roughage substitute."



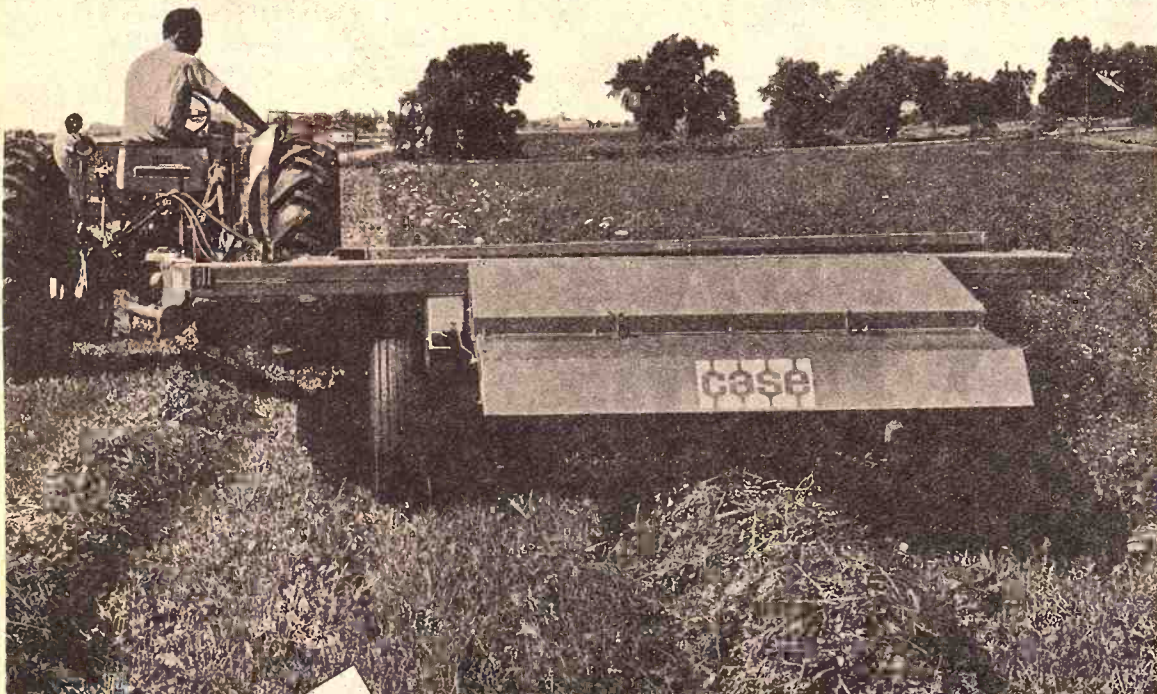

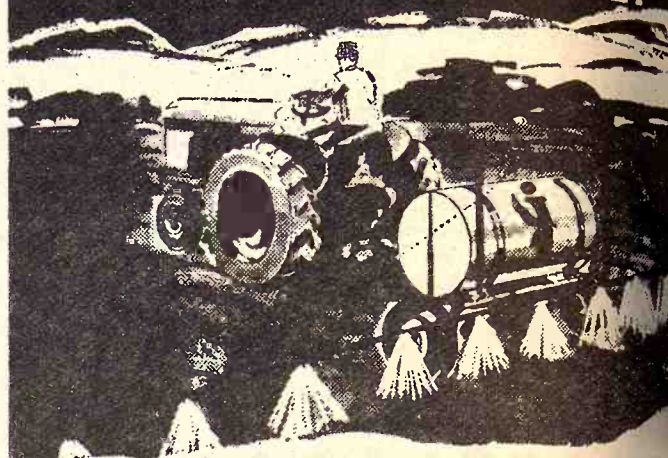

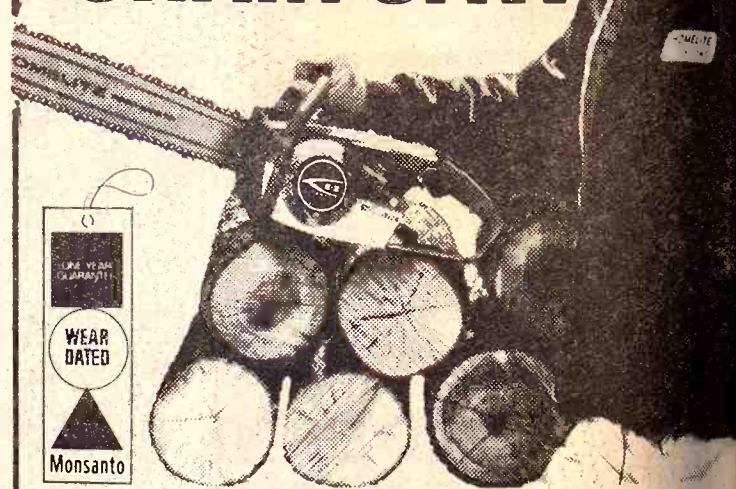

2500 Jobs For Kids In Corn Fields

HUTCHINSON — Jobs for youngsters may be scarce this summer, but there is a prospect that some 2500 boys and girls may find short-term work this summer in Reno and nearby counties for corn detasseling operations for Garst & Thomas Seed Co. which has contracted with many farmers in the area to develop hybrid seed corn.

Young workers will get \$1.30 an hour and the work day will be 6 to 8 hours, from the middle of June to early in July. About 100 adult supervisors will also be hired.

Divorce Rate Climbed In 60's

The divorce rate in the United States climbed sharply in the 1960's, the Census Bureau says.

Divorced men remarry faster than women, the study said.

According to the survey, based on interviews with 50,000 households, there were 47 divorced persons for every 1,000 married couples last year.

The increase was 33 per cent over 1960, when there were 35 divorced persons for each 1,000 married couples.

There were 35 divorced men and 60 divorced women for every 1,000 married couples.

"The difference in these ratios for men and women probably reflects a high propensity and ability for

divorced men than divorced women to remarry," the study said. The study did not include divorced persons who had remarried.

The report also showed a higher percentage of divorced persons among nonwhites than whites.

The number of divorced persons per 1,000 married couples for nonwhites was 78 last year, an increase of 38 per cent over the 63 in 1960.

For whites, the number was 45 divorced persons per 1,000 married couples, a step-up of 32 per cent over the 1960 census.

The divorce rate was also higher in metropolitan areas. On the farm, there were 20 divorced persons per 1,000 married couples compared with 49 in nonfarm areas.

The survey also showed that 86 per cent of all family members between ages 10 and 13 were living with both parents last year.

Low Prices Don't Result In More Egg Sales

Kansas egg producers are suffering through a period of low egg prices and rising production costs. They'll probably sell eggs at prices below the cost of production for the next few months.

So, if egg producers are in such a bind profit-wise, consumers must be benefitting from it. No so — egg prices at the supermarket don't fluctuate that much, explains Marion E. Jackson, Extension economist in poultry marketing and production at Kansas State University.

"For example, housewives don't seem to purchase more eggs when the prices go to, say, 39 cents a dozen," says Jackson. "And eggs won't sell at 79 cents per dozen, either."

In 1964, annual egg consumption per person in the U.S. was 318. It was 314 in 1965, 313 in 1966, 324 in 1967, 318 in 1968 and about the same the last two years as in 1968.

Jackson said prices did decline for a longer period of time in 1967, which would account for the small increase in consumption. But over a long period it has been established that retail prices don't affect consumption to a great degree.

Meanwhile, what about the producers — the persons who sees to it that fresh eggs are on the supermarket shelves each day?

"He must continue to increase his efficiency," says Jackson. "Less wasted feed, fewer cracked and broken eggs and other efforts to minimize losses over the long haul will help keep him in business."

Florida Doesn't Want More Migrant Citizens

State officials, hard pressed to keep up with citizen service demands, have taken themselves out of the business of encouraging retirees of limited income to move to Florida.

"Florida no longer desires to be known as the fastest growing state in the union," state Senate President Jerry Thomas said.

"We have our hands full taking care of over 6.8 million permanent residents without encouraging more."

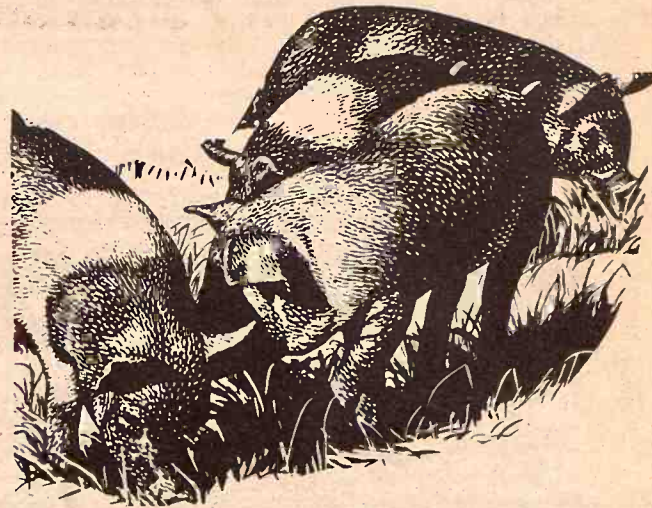

Tax Protests Tie Up \$2 Million In 83 Counties

Eight state-assessed companies which have paid 1969 and 1970 property taxes under protest have tied up more than \$2 million in 83 Kansas counties, Assistant Atty. Gen. Matt Dowd, head of the tax division, has revealed.

Dowd said 353 industrial tax protest cases are pending disposition in district courts.

Included are 157 filed in 1970 for 1969 taxes, impounding \$1.8 million in 56 counties, and 196 cases filed in 83 counties this year for 1970 taxes, for which no estimate is available.

The protested tax payments were impounded by the county treasurer and cannot be distributed to local taxing districts until a Kansas Supreme Court ruling is made.

Some districts had to issue no fund warrants to obtain sufficient funds to meet budgeted expenses.

Dowd said the Supreme Court, "recognizing the emergency," has agreed to hear two protest cases from Reno and Johnson counties in April "in a move that could clear up the matter with a comprehensive decision."

The companies contend they are being discriminated against because they are taxed at 30 per cent of the assessed value of their property, while other properties in the respective counties are assessed at a lower rate.

Properties of the protesting companies were assessed by the State Property Valuation Department, while other property was assessed by county assessors.

The protestors are seeking to pay taxes at the average assessed valuation in each county, rather than the state assessed 30 per cent.

Dowd said counties where the suits were filed appear to assess property at rates ranging from 15 to 25 per cent.

If the decision does not come before June 20, the deadline for paying the final half of 1970 taxes, Dowd expects a flood of new protest cases to be filed.

Companies which have filed protest are Panhandle Eastern, Northern Natural Gas, Natural Gas of America, Plateau, Cities Service Pipeline, Mobile Oil Pipeline, Kaw Pipeline and Kansas Telephone Co.

Concordia Plans Celebration

CONCORDIA — Plans are under way for Concordia's centennial celebration, Aug. 6 to 14.

A committee has been formed to raise funds and compile a commemorative book, to include stories of early days in Concordia and of modern activities.

Beards are already sprouting for the event said Leon Gennette, Chamber of Commerce manager and centennial general chairman. Women will wear long dresses, bonnets and bows.

A pageant showing the early days of Concordia history will be presented under direction of the nationally known Rogers Co.

The Dale Easton Players of Topeka will present "The Drunkard" as part of the centennial activities. The Moose Club will aid in staging the play.

Livestock Values Up 1% In '70

The value of all livestock and poultry on the nation's farms Jan. 1 was a record \$23.8 billion, one per cent more than the previous high of a year earlier, the Agriculture Department reported.

Cattle and calves, with a total value of \$21.1 billion, showed the largest gain, up 5 per cent from Jan. 1, 1970.

Hog values, reported as of last Dec. 1 and reflecting lower market prices, were estimated at less than \$1.58 billion, compared with \$2.2 billion a year earlier.

The estimates were included in the department's annual inventory of livestock and poultry.

Sheep and lambs were valued at \$462.9 million, down 9 per cent from a year earlier. Chickens were valued at \$537.4 million, a drop of 8 per cent, but turkeys increased 6 per cent to a value of \$39.6 million.

On a head-count basis, increases were shown for cattle, calves, hogs, chickens and turkeys, while numbers of sheep and lambs were down from last year.

There were 14.6 million head of all types of cattle and calves on farms and ranches Jan. 1, 2 per cent more than a year earlier, the report said.

Mature cows and heifers, those that had calves, increased 2 per cent during the year, including a 3 per cent gain for beef cows but a 1 per cent cutback in the number of milk animals.

Sheep and lambs totaled 19.6 million head, 4 per cent fewer than a year earlier.

Hogs and pigs on farms, based on the Dec. 1 report, were put at 67.5 million head, up 19 per cent from the year before.

Fewer Need To File Tax Returns

An estimated six million people will not be required to file income tax returns this year because of liberalized rules cited in the Tax Reform Act of 1969.

Harry F. Scribner, IRS district director for Kansas, said a single person is not required to file a return unless he has income of \$1,700 or more. Previously persons making \$600 or over had to file.

In addition, those 65 or over do not have to file a return unless they have \$2,300 annual income or more, instead of \$1,200 as in the past.

The increased filing requirements apply also to married couples, but only if they live together and file a joint return. Neither can be a dependent of another taxpayer. Couples under 65 do not have to file until their combined income reaches \$2,300. If they are over 65, no return is due in income under \$3,500 or under \$2,900 if only one is 65 or over.

Scribner said, however, that married persons filing separately still are required to file returns on incomes of \$600 or more.

Persons with net profit of \$400 or more from self-employment must file and pay the self-employment tax, even though no income tax may be due, he said.

Anyone not required to file, but eligible for an income tax refund, must file to get it, Scribner added.

FARMING FRONTIERS '71

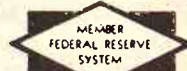

Combines Disappear At Assessing Time

The case of "disappearing combines" in the Buhler area was discussed here Saturday at a meeting of Reno County commissioners and local legislators. To solve the tax problem appears to be sticky.

Rep. Kellogg, Reno County assessor, said his office has been concerned about the annual pattern of some farmers in the Buhler area taking their combines "about Dec. 1" and a new mortgage appearing on them.

"We get a lot of complaints about this under the present law, in which taxable personal property is assessed based on Jan. 1 possession, but it doesn't appear to be anything that can be done," Kellogg said.

County Commissioner Jack Hodge said there were indications that 44 combines were escaping taxation in the Buhler area because of maneuvering.

"It's not fair because the loss of valuation and taxes is something everyone else must eventually pick up," Kellogg said.

Rep. Bert Chaney, D-Hutchinson, said he agreed but that in discussing the problem last year with Sen. Frank Hodge, R-Hutchinson, chairman of the Senate Assessment and Taxation Committee, Hodge saw "no way we can get to them."

Rep. Harold Dyck, R-Hesston, saw as a possible solution making combines subject to having a state tag so that a record would be available on personal property.

Dyck, who represents the Buhler area, said he was certain the problem goes far beyond combine owners, with the practice common among some airplane owners and others interested in maneuvering around assessment laws.

Sometimes Even A Tree Can Be Repaired

Kansas trees have escaped the wrath of a severe ice storm thus far in 1971. If such a storm should strike, remember that most damaged trees can be repaired quite easily.

A couple of human procedures — plus the restorative powers of Mother Nature — will do the trick, says Gary Naughton, area Extension forester at Kansas State University.

If a large tree is severely damaged by ice or snow, you may want to contact a professional arborist, says Naughton. But in many cases, you can do the job.

One important procedure is to cut broken limbs back to the nearest larger limb or trunk — smoothly and flush with the larger limb or trunk.

Then treat the smooth cut with a tree wound dressing, which can be purchased at most feed supply or lumber yards.

An important point to remember: never leave a break that is jagged and exposed. It may injure a person climbing the tree. It also may serve as a haven for insects or disease.

Branches left dangling by a storm are also dangerous and should be removed.

Naughton explained that only a particular type of ice storm will damage trees. "The conditions must be right — stable air, low tem-

peratures and high humidity or precipitation — for ice to cling to tree limbs and do much damage," he said.

"Usually we don't have too much trouble if the storm is accompanied by high winds. Trees will give with the wind and ice tends to crack and fall off as it forms."

An ice storm in the dead of winter may not do as much damage as a fall snow storm, when leaves are on the trees, the Extension forester noted. Central Kansas had a freak snow

storm during the early fall that caused considerable damage.

Among Kansas trees least susceptible to ice or snow damage are osage orange, bur oak and hackberry.

Among those most susceptible are Chinese elm, silver maple and box elder. "These are brittle and won't bend as much," Naughton said.

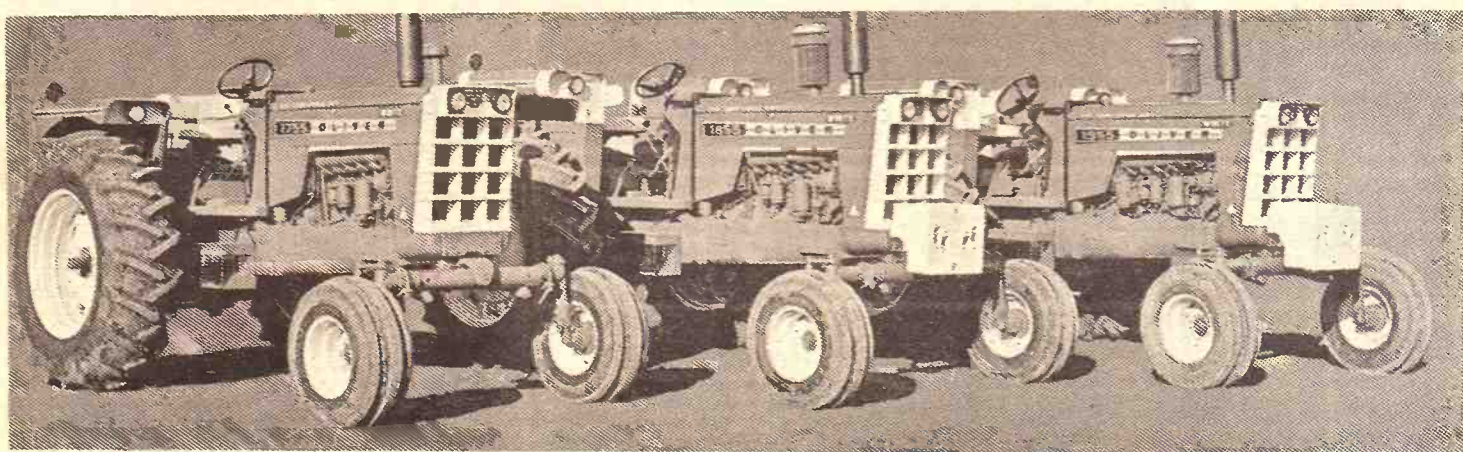

The Census Bureau says Americans are better able to vote than counterparts of a decade ago are less likely to go to the polls. The youth also are more mobile, prone to marry, make up a large chunk of the nation's civilian force, and have rising incomes, the bureau said. A 10-year profile of the nation's population between ages 14 and 24, the bureau said, shows that young people will have a harder job in getting young Americans to the polls despite the voting age of 18. In the November 1968 presidential election, the bureau said, only 33 per cent of the 18-to-20-year-olds voted in the nation's leaders. "For all states," the report said, "51 per cent of the persons 21 to 24 years old reported that they voted as compared with 70 per cent of persons 25 years and older." The bureau said youth between 14 and 24 now comprise 20 per cent of the population, compared with 15 per cent a decade ago. The median age of the nation's population now is 26.7 years, the report said, compared with 26.1 in 1960.

All Kansas motorists given traffic tickets in Geary County will have to make personal appearances in county court here starting Feb. 22. Judge William O'Keefe said he will conduct traffic court each Monday when alleged violators will either enter a plea of guilty and be fined or sentenced, or plead innocent and have their cases set for trial.

In the past, many cases were disposed of by mail or telephone. O'Keefe said it is his intention to focus more attention on the traffic violator to impress him with the seriousness of the offense and thus encourage drivers to be more careful.

Court appearances will not be required for cross-country travelers. They will be allowed to post bond, which would be forfeited if they continue on their way.

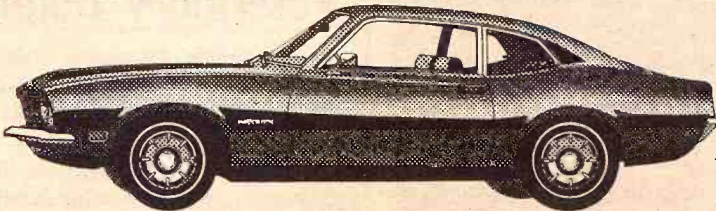

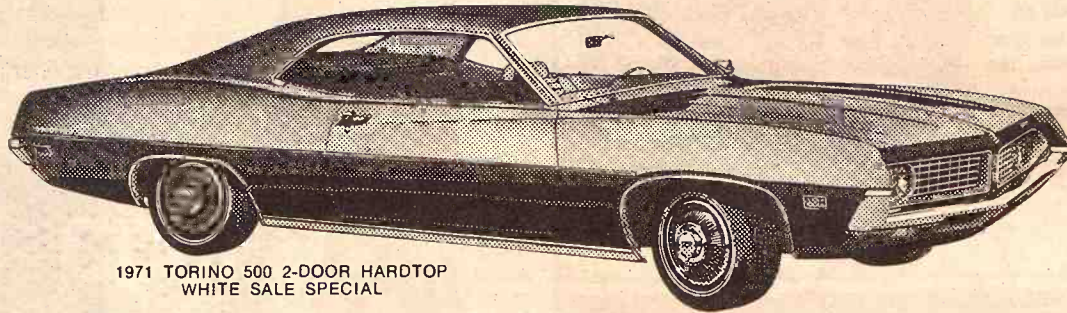

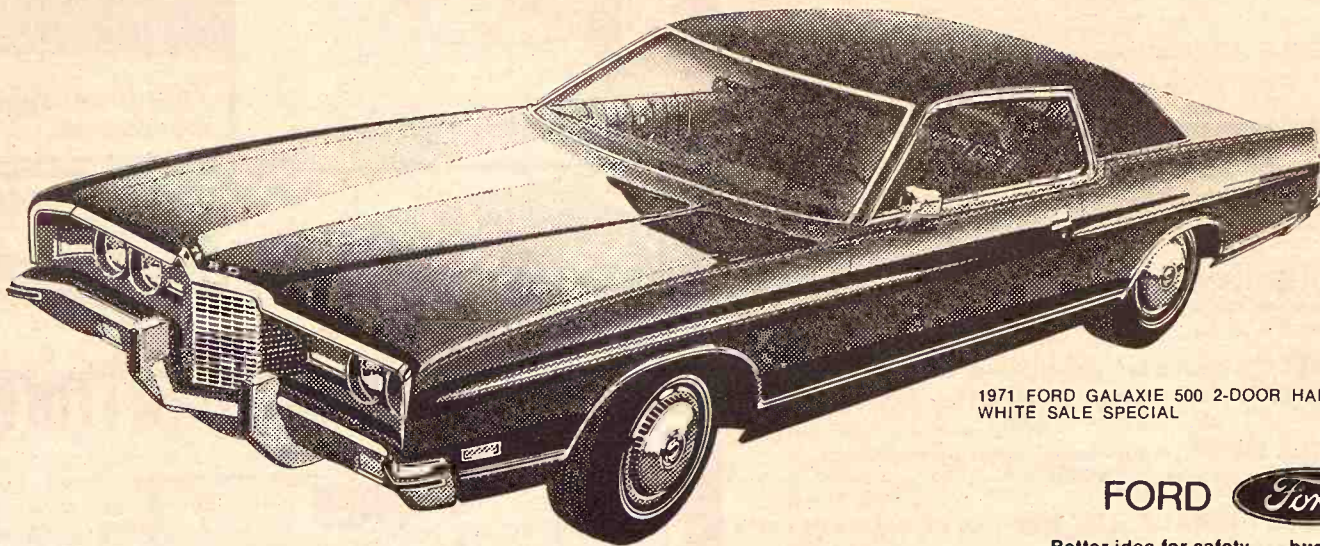

NFO Says Its Hog Lift Worked

The president of the National Farmers Organization said the organization was temporarily suspending a "hog lift" which he called "the greatest market action victory we have ever achieved."

The organization has been transporting hogs from saturated market areas to under-supplied areas in an effort to boost hog prices.

NFO President Orlen Lee Staley said the organization "has successfully reached its initial goal in the hog lift by proving that it had the strength through its collective bargaining program to substantially

raise the price of hogs in the face of record supplies."

According to U.S. Department of Agriculture figures, he said, 1,612,000 more hogs were slaughtered last month than in January of 1970 — an increase of 27 per cent.

The operation was being suspended, he said, to devote more time to increasing farmers' participation in the NFO effort.

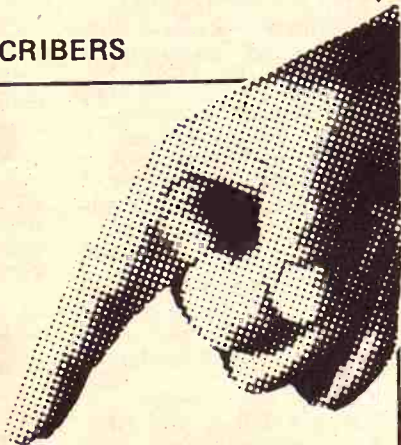

Towns May Not Know Costs Of Meeting Water Standards

LAWRENCE — A University of Kansas professor and member of the Water Quality Control Council indicate the state's new water quality standards were adopted out of a fear of losing thousands of dollars in federal grants.

Ross McKinney, professor of environmental health engineering at KU, said the standards were approved by the State Board of Health with a gun at their heads. He called the federal pressure "blackmail."

The standards apparently were adopted in late December, but the action became known only recently. Cities across the state which may be affected severely have yet to receive official notification.

Mel Gray, director of environmental health services for the

state, said most people have yet to feel the full impact of the standards adopted on an emergency basis. He estimated at least 300 cities and industries will face installation of additional treatment facilities.

Gray said at least 30 cities with primary sewage treatment facilities will have to install secondary treatment systems. He also said several hundred cities will have to provide chlorination treatment and several industries will have to provide better waste treatment systems.

Depending on how the standards are enforced, the new regulations could have a major impact on Kansas sportsmen. It waters designated for "recreation including sport fishing," the new regulation

calls for a maximum bacteria (fecal coliform) content not to exceed 2,000 per 100 milliter sample.

Last summer, following heavy rains in Cottonwood-Neosho river system, counts taken by federal authorities at John Redmond Reservoir near Burlington exceeded 30,000 per 100 ml sample.

Asked if this meant a wholesale closure of Kansas impoundments, McKinney said:

"It's up to the state to enforce the standards. Gray has said at one point he'll turn all the water pollution control enforcement to the federal boys and he has also said he intends to enforce them strictly."

"I don't know what he's going to do. I'm curious."

McKinney objected to the new standards. He said the criteria proposed by his council was supported by documentation. But he said the federal criteria was presented without documentation.

He said he pressure fell "indirectly onto the governor's office. It cannot be documented specifically. It was all done vocally, so it could not appear on paper — which made it all the more interesting."

Federal officials apparently told state authorities they faced a loss of federal funds at the first on the year if the regulations weren't approved at the board's December meeting.

McKinney said the loss of grants would include those related to the State Board of Health and environmental projects as well as other federally funded programs not related to pollution control.

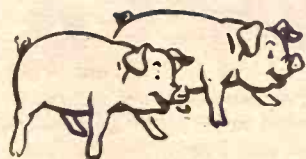
"It was strictly a political issue," the professor said.

At the time the standards were adopted, the State Board of Health said "several of the requirements of the standards are believed to be inappropriate and inequitable in Kansas."

Degree For \$607 Produces Quarter-Million Gift To KSU

MANHATTAN — Lawrence V. Sanford was a thrifty young man during his four years at Kansas State Agricultural College in Manhattan at the turn of the century. His thrift never left him through 60 years of farming, and when he died recently he bequeathed his alma mater, through the Kansas State University Endowment Association, a quarter million dollars in cash and property so that others might have an opportunity to receive an education.

As a student at K-State Sanford kept records of his expenses and it is interesting to note not only the difference in financial outlay between 1900 and 1970, but also the different needs.

Today a Kansas resident entering the University must figure on paying \$476 in enrollment fees for one year and about \$100 for books and supplies for the same period. Fees 70 years ago were for individual lecture courses and cost from \$2 to \$4 a semester. For books and school

supplies, Sanford spent \$12.88 during the 1901-1902 school year.

A student today will pay between \$900 and \$1,000 for room and board, depending upon his accommodations and diet. A year's room and board for Lawrence Sanford cost \$100.15. There was an additional expenditure of \$4.98 for kerosene for his lamp and coal for his room heater. Since electricity was still considered an expensive luxury, many homes in Manhattan did without at that time. Such was the case at his rooming house at 10th and Laramie. Some rooming houses for students did boast of electricity, and even baths and brick sidewalks.

For miscellaneous expenses such as laundry, travel, clothing, and social activities, today's student should plan on spending a minimum of \$400 for the year. Sanford's needs were apparently meager. Of course, Sanford didn't have the worry of an automobile or even a horse at that time, and though he lived his life as a bachelor he oftentimes escorted the ladies without either means of conveyance. Picnics, ball games, strolls through the park, or school functions served 70 years ago as entertainment for couples.

His miscellaneous expenditures for one year amounted to \$13.82. Included were such items as 20 cents for hair cuts, \$2.95 for railroad fares from his home at Oneida, 10 cents to have his trunk transferred from the depot to his rooming house, 25 cents for a rubber collar, 20 cents for a concert, and 6 cents for "chewing."

At the present rate of expenses, a student's four-year college career as an undergraduate will run between seven and eight thousand dollars if he is a Kansas resident attending a state-supported college or university. Times have changed from 70 years ago when Lawrence Sanford went through four years of college at a total cost of \$607.57.

Of course, prices have risen in all areas since the turn of the century. Sanford paid 30 cents to have his shoes half soled in 1903. Prior to his graduation in 1904, he bought a shirt for \$1, a pair of cuffs for 25 cents, and a necktie for 15 cents. He fitted himself with a new pair of shoes for \$3.50, and bought a group photograph of the class for 40 cents. Apparently he did a little traveling while in school. He went to Kansas City at least once each school year, and one entry is for railroad fare at \$3.45, followed by the next entry of 35 cents for bed and lunch.

Lawrence Sanford's parents were great believers in education and, like many parents today, did what they could to give their son the opportunity to obtain a college degree. Their desires and hopes were well founded because he proved to be a good student with a strong scholastic inclination. No doubt they, also like today's parents, complained of the high costs involved.

Extol Merits Of Dairy Associations

Kansas dairymen who are not members of the Dairy Herd Improvement Association are missing a golden opportunity to increase profits.

That's the opinion of one of DHIA's leading advocates, Ralph Bonewitz, Extension dairy specialist at Kansas State University.

"Do you want to invest some money with a high return?" and "Do you need a map to show you where you are going in the dairy business?" are a couple of questions Bonewitz likes to ask milk producers.

Then he explains that DHIA has official and unofficial programs tailored to meet the needs of any dairyman.

"Kansas leads all surrounding states in percentage of cows on a production testing program," says Bonewitz. Even at that, production records are available on only about one in four cows in the state.

Bonewitz explains that the "new look" in DHIA puts greater emphasis on providing tools for dairymen to make management

decisions more quickly and accurately.

"The program today is much more than milk weights and butterfat tests," says the Extension specialist. "Differences in herdmate production are given each testing period for use in culling. A persistency figure is given to show how well each cow is holding up in milk production."

In addition the DHIA program tells the dairyman what percent protein is needed in rations, offers the choice of three feeding programs for cows at different production levels, provides a feeding index to determine if cows are fed enough, gives net energy in the total dry matter, provides checks on bulls used by the dairyman and determines if he is culling the right cows.

DHIA programs also let the milk producer know his culling percentage, lactation averages, calving intervals, and the increases or decreases in producing and transmitting ability of his cows. These facts are compared with state averages of his breed.

What is the amount of the dairyman's monthly investment? Bonewitz explains that it varies with the county, size of herd, and programs selected. He suggests that dairymen contact their county Extension agricultural agent for additional details.

The DHIA program is for grade or registered cows, including herds

producing manufacturing milk as well as those producing Grade A milk.

Social Climbing A Hog Stress

Hog producers worry about low prices for their animals, housewives worry about retail costs of meat, and — according to the Agriculture department — pigs themselves worry about a lot of things.

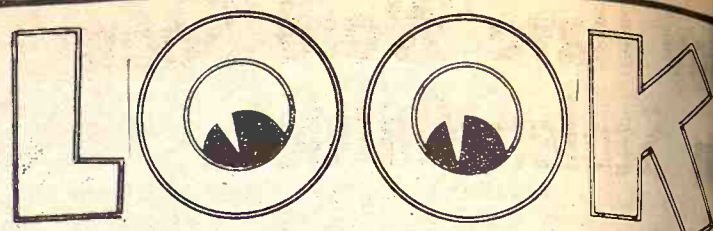
Take fighting, one of the main causes of the "porcine stress syndrome" as defined by USDA experts. Militant pigs get that way because they are social climbers.

"Whenever strange hogs are mixed," says the latest Agricultural situation report, "there's a struggle to establish the social order of the pen."

Stress-prone hogs, says USDA, have been known to die within two minutes of being put in a militant social-conscious pen.

Other death causes include the movement of pigs from close confinement into new quarters, transporting them from farm to market and sudden shifts in temperature.

"The best bet," says the department, "is to handle carefully any animals that are easily excited and have either muscle or tail tremors. Researchers have come to recognize these as classical signs of stress."

A New Guide For Farm Tax Management

Concern over income taxes
reaches a high point this time of
year, but most Kansas farmers
realize the importance of year-
around tax management.

"The farm business manager
doesn't need to be a tax expert,"
says Dr. John Schlender, Extension
economist at Kansas State
University. "But he must know
enough about taxes to recognize the
tax consequences of farm decisions
and know when to call a consultant."

To assist Kansas farmers in
developing a program of good tax
management, the Cooperative
Extension Service at K-State has
made the publication "Income Tax
Management For Farmers"
available through county Extension
offices.

"This bulletin has been revised to
include changes brought about by the
1969 Tax Reform Act," explains
Schlender. "It discusses changes
directly affecting farmers."

Also discussed are major tax
planning decisions and tax items
often overlooked.

Farmers contemplating a change
in their reporting method will be
interested in a comparison of each
and accrual methods.

A income tax estimate worksheet
is included in the bulletin. "Use of
the sheet will enable a farmer to see
where he stands tax wise at any time
during the year," Schlender points
out.

Osage Orange Still A Favorite In Program

The osage orange is a real friend
of the conservationist in parts of
Kansas.

Planted in single rows, the osage

orange has probably done more than
any other tree in reducing wind
erosion on sandy soils in central
Kansas, say state and Extension
foresters at Kansas State Univer-
sity.

Commonly called "hedge" or "bois
d'arc," it originated in a small
region of the Red River valley in
southeastern Oklahoma, south-
western Arkansas and northeastern
Texas.

But really Kansas settlers
discovered that it was hardy and
could be grown in thick rows as
hedge fences. Where native trees
were scarce and fence posts were
hewn from stone, the osage orange
was a welcome and valuable tree to

farmers.

It has strong, durable wood. As a
member of the mulberry family, it is
the only species within its genus. Fig
and rubber trees are remotely
related species.

One-year-old osage orange
seedlings are available again this
year through the tree distribution
program of state and Extension

Extension office.

Move Local Museum From Lucas To Hays

LUCAS — This Russell County town is losing one longtime tourist attraction, but an older one, the Garden of Eden, will remain.

Harry Bates, Downs outdoor advertising man, born in the Lucas area, will move Miller's Rock Garden and Museum from here to Hays. He bought it from the estate of Roy Miller, Lucas well-driller, who collected rocks from all over the world.

The rocks will be laid out near the Hays Holiday Inn on I-70 in a duplication of the Miller Garden, and antiques in the Miller Museum will be housed in a building nearby.

Wayne Naegele, who for the last three years has owned Lucas' 68-year-old Garden of Eden, isn't moving it. The Garden, built by the late Samuel P. Dinsmoor, a civil war veteran, in 1907, included a large yard full of concrete statues of Adam, Eve, the serpent and other figures, and a lifelike concrete American flag on a staff. In the large rock house were samples of Dinsmoor's woodworking.

For years before Dinsmoor's death in 1931, the Garden drew many

visitors each weekend. Since Naegele acquired and restored it three years ago, it has been drawing an increasing number of tourists. Naegele said 9,000 signed the guest book last year.

ONE SECOND TO JUMP FROM UPSET TRACTOR

How long does the operator of a farm tractor have to leap off the seat to safety when the machine upsets?

Less than one second is the conclusion of Clarence Stevens, University of Missouri-Columbia extension engineer.

Stevens said that unless the tractor can be dethrottled within less than a second there is no stopping the rearing and upset. The operator, unless thrown clear, is in danger of being pinned or crushed by the machine.

Stevens suggests sensible driving practices, avoiding steep slopes, ditches, holes and embankments, and advises use of safety aids. Some protection can be obtained from a frame such as roll bar or a protective cab, he said.

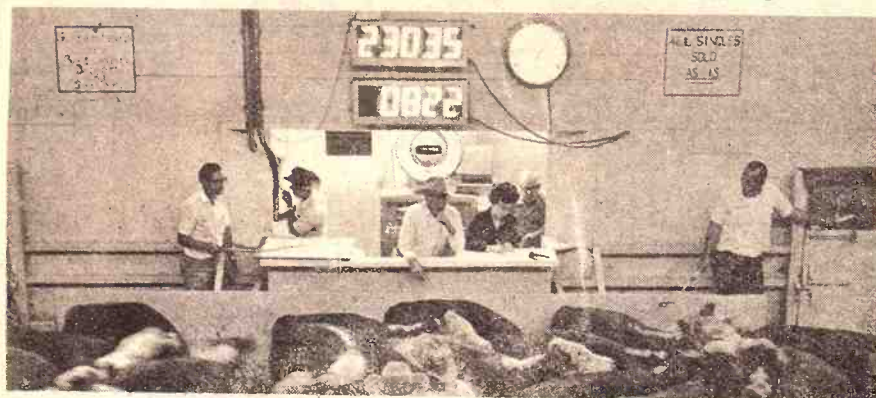
