

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



- 1. There are 211 departments of vocational agriculture in Kansas, with a total enrollment of 6,584.
- 2. Two hundred ten chapters have paid state and national dues. One chapter was maintained in two departments.
- 3. The Kansas Association has an active FFA membership of 7,245 members. This is 110 per cent on the basis of enrollment.
- 4. Seven Kansas FFA members were awarded the American Farmer Degree at the 30th National FFA Convention.
- 5. The Arkansas City chapter won the gold emblem classification and the Ellsworth chapter won the silver emblem classification in the 1957 national emblem awards program.
- 6. Dean Edson, Washburn chapter, represented Kansas in the regional speech contest at Columbus, Ohio.
- 7. Hiawatha chapter placed first in the booth exhibits and the Highland chapter placed first in farm mechanics at the Topeka fair. Hillsboro chapter won first in the farm mechanics exhibits at the State fair at Hutchinson. First places in county booth exhibits, prepared by FFA chapters at the Hutchinson fair, were won for their respective areas by the Minneapolis chapter and the Coldwater chapter. The grand championship in this event was won by the Minneapolis chapter.
- 8. Kansas teams participating in national FFA judging contests won two gold, two silver, and one bronze emblem classifications.
- 9. The Altamont chapter won the Agricultural Education Club award plaque in in 1958.
- 10. One hundred forty-four chapter farmers from 80 chapters were raised to the state farmer degree at the 30th annual convention of the Kansas Association of FFA.
- 11. Eight honorary state farmer degrees were awarded.

- 12. The Kansas Association was honored by having the national FFA president, Howard Downing, Nicholasville, Kentucky, present to assist with the state convention.
- 13. One hundred twenty-three, three-man teams, entered the 1958 annual high school judging contest in agriculture, and 93 two-man teams entered the farm mechanics contests.
- 14. The house of delegates heard Bill French of Pretty Prairie present a trombone solo. Jerry and Larry Cundiff, students at Kansas State College and former members of the Chapman chapter, presented two vocal duets.

CORRECTION IN FFA MEMBERSHIP

Due to an omission and a change in a report which was submitted to the State Office, the April issue of the Kansas Future Farmer was in error by not listing the Oberlin chapter in the 151 to 175 per cent membership group. Also the Manhattan chapter should have been listed in the 126 to 150 per cent group.

1958 CHAPTER AWARDS

The Kansas Association used the State gold emblem, superior, and standard chapter awards in recognizing the merit of chapter programs. The first State chapter contest was held in Kansas in 1932, and these contests have been held annually since that date.

The Kansas gold emblem chapters were selected from superior chapters, and were awarded superior seals and Kansas gold emblem certificates.

1958 STATE FFA CONVENTION


Approximately 160 of the 211 FFA chapters in Kansas sent representatives to the thirtieth annual state convention. There were 30 contestants in the state FFA public speaking contest and 106 chapters entered the chapter award contest. One hundred fifty-eight schools seated delegates at the annual FFA meeting. The tour groups, under the direction of Professor Frank Orazem, were comprised of approximately 200 alternates. A lunch was served on the campus to contestants in the agricultural and farm mechanics contests. Professor Milton Manuel and Joe Koudele, of the Department of Economics, were in charge of compiling statistics in the various judging events. Many departments of the college cooperated in making the thirtieth annual state FFA convention a success.

1958 CHAMBER OF COMMERCE BANQUET
