State Beef Tour This

Kansas, the fourth largest beef producing state in the nation and ranking sixth in comparison with other states in numbers of cattle on grain feed for slaughter, will focus attention on the cattle feeding industry, August 29. when northwest Kansas will be the scene of the Fourth Annual Governor's Beef Tour.

Sponsored by the Kansas Livestock Association, the tour will be in the Hays and Oakley areas and will begin at 8:45 a.m. at the Hays Land and Cattle Company, north of Hays, and will include stops during the day at commercial feedlots, farmerfeeder operations, a backgrounding operation and a progressive livestock sales market. Morning events will include a portion of the Panorama at the Fort Hays Experiment Station concerning recent beef cattle tests. Other scheduled stops on the tour will be the Hays Livestock Commission Company, Hays, and the

following feedlot operations located in the Missouri Flats area, southwest of Quinter; John Sutcliffe, Quinter; Glenn Coberly, Gove; Roscoe Coberly, Gove; Jim Evans, Gove; and the Pioneer Feed Yards, Inc., Oakley.

The tour and all events are open to the public - local, area and state wide, and invited to join Governor Docking and other state officials to attend the tour which will show the tremendous potential of this industry.

The Governor's Beef Luncheon will be served at 12:00 noon at the Livestock Arena at the Fort Hays Experiment Station following the Beef Cattle Panorama and remarks by Governor Robert B. Docking and Robert Schmidt, Hays, President of the Kansas State Chamber of Commerce.

The final event of the tour will be a Steak Fry at Annie Oakley Park, Oakley, and presentations by Robert Pohlman, Mayor of Oakley; Raymond Roemer, Grainfield, President of the Kansas Livestock Association; Governor Robert B. Docking, and an address by Corwin Spencer, attorney-at-law of Oakley.

many NFO members across the state are doing something about it. Tired of what they see as intolerably low wheat prices at the elevator, they are shipping their grain directly to the mills, cutting out the middleman.

Vincent Koestel of Abbyville, national NFO director representing Kansas, said this is the second year some NFO members have stored their wheat in their own grain bins and later sold it directly to the miller when the price was right.

"We've had three times the response on this last effort as we had last year," Koestel said.

But a Hutchinson man, J. H. Dean, executive vice president and general-manager of FAR-MAR-Co. Inc., predicted that the number of such farmers doing so will never reach large propor-

ping directly to the mill not only pense but also results in a premium price on high protein wheat which is greater than most elevators pay.

Dean said he believes the premiums that elevators pay are about the same as what mills

"The last two years we've had the highest premiums for protein we've ever experienced in this country," he said. "We're paying a premium right now of 50 cents a bushel for certain premium wheat. But we've had a relatively low wheat protein crop this year."

Koestel said more and more farmers are shipping direct to mills and "the fellows I'm working with closest tell me we've got more than 200 per cent more wheat in private storage by farmers this year than last."

One man included in that NFO statistic is Kenneth Birket, an NFO member from Abbyville. Birket built a set of steel storage bins this spring that will hold 30,000 bushels of wheat. This year's harvest is now waiting in those bins until the price is favorable and then it will go to the mill.

"All we're trying to do is get a decent price," Birket said. "Actually we want to work with the elevators, not against them."

Birket and others claim they can get up to 50 cents more a bushel at the mills than at the grain elevators.

Clifford Moore of Nickerson. an NFO area marketing chief, said he sold his wheat at a net price of \$1.33 a bushel at the Kansas Mills in Wichita. At that time the elevator price was \$1.07,

"I think we shipped 30 cars of wheat out of Reno County this year," Moore said.

Some area farmers ship to Kelly Milling Co. in Hutchinson.

Leonard Valenta, Ellsworth, County farmer and head of his county's NFO, is spearheading a similar effort in his area.

"I want every penny I can get," According to the NFO, ship- Valenta said. "I'm not a bit sorry I did it (sold to the mills). I cuts out the middleman's ex- will do it next year if things don't improve.

He added that "We don't want to hurd anybody - we just want a little more for our wheat. When vou can't make a dollar one place you look somewhere else."

Valenta said one reason he shipped to a Wichita mill was that "the middleman won't pay you for extra protein."

He said four mills have to have a certain amount of 13 per cent protein wheat, and that the more protein a farmer's crop has the more money he gets.

But when a farmer sells his grain to an elevator, it gets mixed in with everybody else's and the elevator pays only a station average for high protein.

"I believe the farmer is entitled to that premium," he said.

Valenta figures he made 16 cents a bushel net price by shipping two carloads to Wichita, with the help of eight other farmers.

Many NFO farmers also point out that by shipping direct they avoid so-called "in and out" handling charges at the elevators. In Valenta's case the charge would have been 11 cents a bushel he

But Koestel said there are drawbacks to shipping direct, toa. One drawback is the expense of loading grain onto railroad cars by auger. Another is the inconvenience of the whole process of shipping direct, rather than going to a nearby eleva-

FAR-MAR-CO executive Dean said there's also one other problem to be considered.

"It takes a tremendous amount of space to handle a crop like we just had," he said. "If they didn't have elevators to store it in they'd have grain piled on the ground everywhere."

For this and other reasons, Dean said, "I don't anticipate this (shipping direct) will ever get to be a very high percentage of the farmers.'



Since the season started July 1, U. S. wheat exports totaled 55 million bushels, or 10 million less than were shipped in the yearearlier period. The lag in shipments was primarily due to "hard feelings" in Japan and Brazil, because the U.S. Government didn't offer the two importers the same cut-rate prices extended to Western European buyers July 18.

Last week, however, the Agriculture Department adjusted selling prices to South American and Far Eastern buyers. This immediately resulted in wheat sales. Japan bought close to 5 million bushels of wheat, of which U.S. exporters sold 2.6 million. The balance was bought from Canada, Australia and France.

Buyers in Brazil also re-entered the world market for wheat. While offers to sell were made by all the large sellers, U. S. exporters came up with an order for 3.7 million bushels. No other wheat was bought.

Shipments of the wheat bought by Japan and Brazil will start this month and finish in September.

Both nations, after the orders

were placed last week, notified wheat sellers they will again be in the market this week for additional supplies.

India is another "bright hope" in the export market for the U.S. India's home crop production has improved and this had lead to speculation that India, which in recent years bought more than 200 million bushels of wheat annually from the U.S., may not have to buy wheat this season. Last week, however, grain sources heard a mission from India was talking to U. S. officials

about another wheat agreement. India for a number of years has obtained U.S. farm products under the P.L. program and paid for them in rupees.

The latest pact, involving 84.5 million bushels of wheat, was signed with India on Dec. 23, 1968 and expired June 30.

Traders heard the current talks are aimed at trying to arrange another P.L. 480 accord for close to 94 million bushels.

Commenting on the expected 'extreme competition" that lies ahead, another grain man called attention to the price cutting that has been going on since early this year.

France sold soft wheat last February to the Far East at less than \$1 a bushel, or far below the minimum of \$150 a bushel called for in the International Grains Agreement. Subsequently. Australia made sales at the stipulated minimum price, but it was claimed that lower ocean freight rates, were made available for shipment of the grain, which in effect cut the actual sales prices of the wheat.

The U.S. retaliated by cutting export prices to some areas by 12 cents a bushel in its first move. This was followed by Canada. Further price reductions were made by all leading export ers and at present the question

ting is now at hand. Grain merchants hesitate to speculate on this matter although some wouldn't be surprised to see further price reductions.

CABBAGE-SPAGHETTI & CHEESE

4 cups shredded cabbage

2 cups cooked spaghetti

2 cups milk 4 tablespoons flour

4 tablespoons butter

1/2 pound cream cheese 1 teaspoon salt

Cook the spaghetti in boiling salted water until tender. Make a sauce of the flour, butter, milk and salt. Shave up the cheese and add it to the hot sauce. Put the cabbage and spaghetti by layers into a baking dish, adding sauce over each layer and over top. Cover the top with buttered bread crumbs. "It is a good idea to butter your baking dish before you fill it." Bake for 20-30 minutes in moderate oven.



Gasoline, because of it's explosive nature, should be avoided along with any flaffable material not expressly designed for barbecuing. Electric charcoal lighters should be handled with care; their elements, if stored in dampness, may short out when used.

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

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

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

Food Costs Up? Not Really

Families are expected to spend about 16.5 cents of their takehome dollar on food this year, compared with the 1968 record low of 16.8 cents, says the Agriculture Department.

This has occurred because in comes have risen generally more rapidly than food costs, despite their record-high levels, say the experts. Last year retail food prices jumped about 3.5 per cent and are expected to gain around 4 per cent in 1969.

Department officials say the United States is not unique in the food-price spiral, that many countries last year experienced even sharper gains in costs and required much larger shares of the family dollar. Food price increases last year ranged from 7 to 13 per cent in Denmark, Finland, Yugoslavia, Ghana, Cambodia, Taiwan, Ceylon and Japan, a new department report said.

Only West Germany and the Philippines out of 50 countries studied had food price decreases in 1968, the report said. The largest gain in food prices last year - 34 per cent - was reported for South Vietnam. Other large gains were reported for Chile, 26 per cent; Brazil, 21 per cent; Argentina, 16 per cent, and Peru, 18 per cent.

Food expenditures related to family take-home for the foreign consumer were not available for 1968, but the report said that in 1966 when U.S. families spent 19.7 cents of their spending dollar for food expenditures it included: West Germany, 34 cents: United Kingdom, 25.1; Yugoslavia. 44.1; Poland, 47.6; Bulgaria, 56.2; Taiwan, 47.4; Japan, 37.8; Korea, 52; Thailand, 46.2; South Vietnam (1965), 51; Panama,



They also asked President Richard Nixon to call a meeting of the International Grains Arrangement member nations and other wheat-exporting nations to The National Farmers Union resolve price differences, avoid dumping wheat in world trade and prevail on exporting nations to make a cutback in wheat production comparable to that being made in the U.S.

"Only through the immediate action of the United States to take leadership in solving world wheat surplus over the conference table can the wheat farmers of the world be saved from financial disaster," the NFU Executive Committee said in a statement.

Wheat farmers were a little frightened by the international attitude toward wheat buying after the USDA announcement by Agriculture Secretary Clifford Hardin July 19 when the U.S. cut prices for wheat below the IGA level for the first time.

No wheat moved. This came primarily because the U.S. price to South America and the Orient remained the same.

Price cuts matching the first ones, however, came and immediately Brazil and Japan offered to buy U.S. wheat.

There were considerable facts to supply material for the farmers' worries. A compilation of figures from the National Association of Wheat Growers (NA WG) shows a man who had 500 acres of wheat alloted him in 1967, would get only 333.45 acres alloted under the 1970 acreage set by the USDA.

On an income basis, gross of \$28,050 for the 1967 crop, would be only \$20,006 for the 1970 allotment. This would be slightly more than a 25 per cent cut in gross income, not taking into acof gross income.

The figures presented by NA WG included the domestic certificate.

A man with 500 acres in 1967 had 435 in 1968, 378.45 in 1969, and the new decrease would allow him only the 333.45 acres.

Costs of raising wheat are inclined to differ with management, area considered, quality of the land and many other facets of operation — but one study done by the University of Nebraska showed wheat in their western areas costing from \$1.43 to \$1.83 per bushel, depending on the size farm involved.

Kansas' input for wheat is likely to be in that range too, maybe in some spots much higher. Wheat prices this year with a 31.5 bushel average in Kansas, means on this cost basis an acre of wheat would yield net income of from \$1.20 to \$12.00 an acre. The median might be about \$6

Based on that figure a man with a 100-acre wheat allotment would get only \$600 for his year's work. He'd have to farm 1,000 acres of wheat - meaning a land of about 4,000 acres - in order to have a net income of \$6,000.

Most farmers — as well as most laborers or anyone else declare this is pretty poor income for a year's work involving management of land and machinery that is worth \$750,000 to \$1

Soil Too Rich For Native Grass

Modern farming practices have come a long way from days when farmers were frequently criticized for depleting soil fertil-

Contrary to that old criticism, National Park Service personnel are complaining that the soil on the 400-acre Fort Larned National Historic Site is too rich.

"Our problem is that the ground is too rich from modern farming practices and alfalfa to grow native grasses," said Thomas A. Munson, National Park Service superintendent of Ft.

National Park Service experts have had little success in attempts to replace modern crops on the land with native grasses which were prevalent a century ago when Ft. Larned was an active military post, he said.

Restoration on the post of six varieties of native grasses is one project at the site. He said 150 acres had been reseeded, with success on only about 50 acres. Park Service horticultural experts believe the land must be leared of all legumes and allowed to deplete much of its rich nitrogen content before old native grasses can be re-established.

National Park Service hopes to re-establish stands of buffalo grass, big bluestem, Indian gras and side oats gramma on land surrounding the old fort, Munson

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Elaborate Checks On Cheating Anglers

Fishing contests are getting weight. more common in the G&G area, but so far promoters aren't admitting to some of the problems boats criss-crossing the waters that beset some of the big na- outside the harbor day and night. tional fishing extravaganzas.

Take the recent Salmon Derby at Vancouver, B. C. That contest attracts 12,000 anglers, and promoters have to spend as much energy to certifying the winner as they do to advertising the event.

The big problem is to make sure the winning fish were caught during the derby.

Anglers submitting fish had to sign affidavits in the presence of a Canadian Mounted Policeman, telling where and in what kind of weather and water they had made their catch. Captains of 19 patrol boats that policed the area during the derby can help decide whether the stories are likely.

The fish submitted for prizes are checked for signs of decay. Biologists study the skins of the fish to make sure that parasites they carry are the ones native to the area.

Then came the real test. The fish are sliced open to see if their stomach contents match the diet of your average Vancouver salmon. The dissection also will uncover any unsporting angler who might have filled his fish with sand or lead shot to boost its

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

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

Montgomery, Frizzell Agree On Road Law

TOPEKA - John D. Montgomery, Kansas highway director, said the favorable ruling by the attorney general's office relaxing some provisions of the freeways construction act of 1969 would return the major policy-making decisions to the highway commission and would speed road construction.

Kent Frizzell, attorney general, had ruled that a section of the act setting up a list of nine rigid points that had to be met to establish a priority rating for a section of freeways was inoperative and had no application to the general terms of the new highway act.

"The highway commission is quite happy with the attorney general's opinion, which liberalizes the interpretation of the legislation and returns authority for highway planning to the professional staff of the commission," Montgomery said.

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

Kansas Ranks 9th In Number Of Cooperatives

Kansas ranked ninth among the 50 states for the number of cooperatives with headquarters in the state, as of June 30, 1968, reports David W. Angevine, administrator of farmer cooperalive service in the United States Department of Agriculture.

Kansas had 299 such organiza-

Angevine supervised the annual survey covering the fiscal year

July 1, 1967, to June 30, 1968. Kansas dropped one rank, however, in the listing of memberships in the cooperatives in the state reporting 212,795 members, which gave it a tenth ranking

The state also ranked tenth in business volume excluding intercooperative business dealings.

among the 50 states,

Kansas cooperatives did approximately \$538.8 million worth of business in the fiscal year covered by the survey.

The 50 states had a total of 7,940 cooperatives, a decline of two per cent from the previous period. Still, it was the smallest decline in four years.

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Minnesota, Wisconsin and Texas ranked in that order in number of cooperatives with headquarters in the state.

Memberships totaled 6.4 million for the nation, 1 per cent fewer than the previous year. Minnesota, Iowa and Indiana led in memberships in that order.

The survey showed an annual business volume exceeding \$17 billion for the 50 states for marketing, purchasing and relatedservice cooperatives.

California, Minnesota and Iowa ranked in that order in total dollar volume of business.

Value of all farm products marketed cooperatively totaled \$13.3 billion, up 3 per cent over the previous year despite a 1 per cent decrease in farmers' cash receipts for all commodities.

Dairy, grain and livestock led in product value, in that order, with grain volume about \$2.9 billion being slightly under a year

Should grass be supplemented with grain or protein in late summer?

Kansas pastures normally provide an excellent diet for beef animals. Most nutrient needs energy, protein, vitamins and minerals - are provided by good pasture.

Dr. Keith Zoellner, Kansas State University Extension beef specialist, says a producer who feels he should be feeding additional supplement on pasture should consider several factors.

Additional supplementation of protein and/or energy may be desirable for steers on native pastures after mid-season, probably in August.

Steers on native short grass at the Fort Hays Branch Experiment Station responded to protein supplementation in years of high rainfall during July and August.

In years of average or below average precipitation, gain was increased when sorghum grain was fed to supplement grass.

These results indicate that during years of high rainfall and high forage production, forage quality is lower and cattle respond to additional protein toward the end of the grazing sea-

Zoellner points out that when grass production is limited by lack of moisture, forage quality is high but additional energy may be needed.

Yearling steers on native bluestem at the KSU experimental range unit at Manhattan increased their gain when supplemental grain or protein was fed during late summer.

In a three-year study, 141 pounds of protein supplement produced 28 pounds of additional gain, and 141 pounds of corn increased gains by 15 pounds.



An August 15 response by Finch, made available by congressional sources, is being interpreted as support for Ribicoff's view that the doctors are largely responsible for soaring costs.

"I am coming to believe," Finch wrote, "that a major factor is the degree to which physicians are involved in the program. Not simply as purveyors of medical care but also as watchdogs of costs and guardians of quality."

The Medicaid program operates in 44 states or territories. Policing against fraud is left largely to the states and recent inquiries have determined that 2,700 doctors collected \$25,000 or more each in Medicaid fees last year.





It added to the report that the "precipitation probability for the area is 20%, which does not include tobacco juice falling from the heavens."

IH Profits Off

Earnings for International Harvester were off sharply during the company's third quarter, ended July 31. Net profits for the period were down 29% to \$12 million on sales of \$688 million.

For the first nine months of

the fiscal year profits of \$42 million were earned on sales of \$1.91 billion. A year ago, for the same period, profits were \$46 million on sales of \$1.85 billion.

\$3.5 Billion To Bring Missouri River Water To Great Plains COLBY - A plan for diversion

of a portion of the Missouri River for irrigation on the High Plains could be accomplished for a cost of \$3.5 billion.

Jack Lacy, director of the Kansas Department of Economic Development, told a combined me eting of the Kansas Irrigation and Reclamation association and the Four State Irrigation Council while on a 2-day tour of Western Kansas irrigation operations.

He said the plan's cost would be less than one-sixth the cost of sending a man to Mars.

"There is no adequate source of surface water near the Great Plains; therefore a suplemental supply will have to be transported over a distance," Lacy said.

A plan advanced in 1967 by R. W. Beck and Associates, Denver, would divert a portion of the Missouri River across northern Nebraska, south through western Nebraska, eastern Colorado and western Kansas, and into the Oklahoma and Texas panhandles, terminating at Hobbs,

Kansas Highway Commission officials, however, say the Nebraska action will have little if any immediate effect on Kansas' program.

72-Year Old Refinery To Close At Neodesha

The American Oil company announced it will halt operations at its 72-year-old Neodesha refinery, a producer of gasoline and distillate fuels.

It appears "that the operation must be discontinued and we would expect this to take place on or about April 1, 1970," Peeler

Wheatfarmers Study New Allotments — and Future

to get their wheat acreage allotments, according to word from the state Agricultural Stabilization and Conservation service office in Manhattan.

They want to know, of course, just exactly how many acres they can harvest next year and still stay within the government limits under the price support program.

The national allotment for the 1970 crop was cut 12 per cent under the 1969 total — from 51.6 million acres to 45.5 million. Because of indecision on just what size the allotment should be, the government was late this year in making the announcement.

In Western Kansas, farmers will be planting wheat in a couple of weeks. They have been gram will get a direct payment plowing since this year's crop was harvested.

Wendell Becraft, manager of the state ASCS office in Manhattan, said county offices already have received their allotment figures and they should be able to what would be about a normal start sending individual farm figures out this week.

The wheat program itself is virtually unchanged from this year and last. In fact, farmers have been operating under government programs so long that they're experienced hands. Still, they'd like to have the official figures before they start their

Kansas farmers are clamoring 1970, the national average pricesupport loan level will remain at \$1.25 a bushel. This means that any farmer who signs up in the government program and stays within his allotment, will be entitled at harvest time next year to get a loan on his total yield at the loan rate. The loan rate varies a little from county to county, but, as stated, the national average is \$1.25. In effect, the farmer can "sell" his wheat to the government at the loan price. However, if the market price should rise before the next harvest, he could redeem his loan and take advantage of the price increase.

The parity index is a complicated computation showing the relationship between prices an things farmers sell and those that they buy. As prices on everything else go up, the parity value of wheat also rises.

This year, the certificates were Under the wheat program for worth \$1.52 a bushel; last year

they were worth \$1.38. No one knows for sure what they'll be worth next year, but the figure will be based on the parity value of wheat as of July 1. It's a good guess that wheat parity will be as high next year as now and probably a little higher.

The certificate program is supposed to give wheat farmers full parity on that part of their crop which is used in this country for food. Food usage doesn't vary much and runs about 500 million bushels a year. The amount of wheat on which the farmer gets the certificate varies with the estimated size of the nation's total crop.

Kansas' allotment for the 1970 crop is 8,526,307 acres, and, as Becraft contends, the harvest next year probably will be on about that many acres.

The Kansas crop this year has been placed at 304 million bushels, second only to the record established in 1952 of 307 million. The acreage allotment for 1969 was 9,670,690. In 1952, the harvest was from 14,649,000 acres.

In 1937, Kansas farmers seeded 17 million acres to wheat, but harvested only 13 million. In 1935, they seeded 13,456,00, but harvested only 6,888,000. However, prior to 1918, it was common to harvest less than 5 or 6 million acres. In 1957, a drought year, the harvest was from only 5,269,000 acres. That year the yield was only barely over 100

million bushels, just a third of 104,750 tons, is forecast for the 1969 harvest.

The statistics are proof of a wide variation in seeded acreages and in wheat yields in Kansas. But when yields are good, no state even comes close to Kansas in production.

U. S. Vegetable **Output Down**

Sharply lower production of most major vegetables grown for processing is the prospect for this year, and the government also expects a smaller output for the fresh market.

The Agriculture department estimates 1969 total production of 8,301,460 tons of snap bean, cabbage for kraut, sweet corn, green peas, early spinach and tomatoes. This would be a 24 per cent drop from last year and 6 per cent under the 1967 harvest.

Only kraut cabbage indicates any increase this year - 1 per cent, to 202,920 tons - largely due to a slight rise in expected acres to be harvested. Despite the liklihood of fractional higher yields, the snap bean crop is expected to drop 6 per cent below last year's, to 589,080 tons.

The estimate for sweet corn is a little over 2 million tons, down 19 per cent from last year and 4 per cent below 1967 output. A similar percentage drop, to

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

Start Grub Treatment Yet This Month

Kansas livestock producers are urged to launch their grub treatment program before the end of August.

That's the recommendation of Dr. Homer Caley, Kansas State University Extension veterinar-

"Rapid movement and importation of cattle into Kansas added confusion to the calendar dates of recommended treatment," Caley said.

"The schedule lists Kansas as the area requiring treatment before August 31. However, treatment as soon after the heel flyseason as possible is ideal."

It has been estimated that Kansas livestock producers have an annual loss of more than \$2 million from grubs. Some people closely associated with the livestock industry in Kansas feel the loss figure is much higher.

"Hide and carcass damage may account for an actual loss of \$8 to \$15 per head," Caley remarked. "Trimming of affected areas and down-grading of the entire careass accounts for a major portion of the loss. However, per-

forated hides have little value." Losses of trimming, down-grad-

ing and perforated hides can be calculated with some degree of accuracy, Caley said, but it is difficult to project the estimated loss due to irritation caused by the heel fly.

Research in California indicates that cattle may spend up to 11/2 hours daily attempting to evade the heel fly. The distances traveled varied from 2,524 to 4,037 feet. Evasion (gadding) will result in decreased milk production, lower weight gains and

increased injuries. "Improved grubicides are effective and reasonable in cost and should be used as recom-

mended," Caley suggested.

"It is estimated that \$1 spent for treatment will provide an \$8 savings.

"Chemical treatments are now available to be used as feed additives, dips, sprays or pour or grubicides. In addition to proper control of grubs, lice control can be expected from some of the compounds. In all cases, follow the manufacturer's directions."

Caley warned that late treatment may result in a severe reaction on the treated animals. This reaction may be influenced by the number of grubs present and their stage of development.

No Welfare Shift As Feared

When the Supreme Court struck down state residence requirements for persons receiving welfare, there was apprehension in capitols of states that are most generous to their poor.

Some officials plainly feared they would be engulfed by waves of out-of-staters coming to where the welfare was greener. But so far there is little evidence this is

There is a major difference across the land in the payments for the 10 million persons receiving some form of assistance.

New Jersey pays an average \$65.30 a month a person in its aid to families with dependent children. Mississippi pays \$9.70. A family of four receiving welfare

month. The same family would get \$38.75 in Mississippi.

Those are the extremes. The rest of the 50 states fall in be-Nearly three months after the

Supreme Court's ruling became effective it appears the fears of mass migration of people on the whole were largely groundless. A wire service survey found that states barely felt a change. "We expected something to hap-

pen," said George Miller, administrator of the Nevada Welfare division, "but we have had practically no change. We have not had numbers go up. We have not had a great exodus."

In its 6-3 decision April 21, the Supreme Court ruled it unconstiin New Jersey averages \$263 a tutional for a state to require a

waiting period for welfare grants for "the purpose of inhibiting migration by needy persons into the state." Such a requirement, the court said, inhibited a citizen's freedom to travel and made an inviduous distinction between needy persons who had lived in a state for a year and those who had not.

Delaware, Guam, Hawaii, Kentucky, Maine, New York, Puerto Rico, Vermont, the Virgin Islands and Massachusetts had no residency requirements in any welfare program. Alaska, Georgia and New Jersey had no requirements in aid to families with dependent children, commonly called AFDC, but had some in other aid programs.

Seven states and the District of Columbia had residence requirements but had not enforced them for more than a year because the rules were being challenged in court. The states are California, Connecticut, Illinois, Louisiana,

Maryland, Pennsylvania and Wisconsin.

A state legislator in Pennsylvania, Republican Eugene R. Geesey, attempted to ease possible effects of the Supreme Court ruling by introducing legislation that would have given a newcomer only the benefits of his home state. Geesey's move fail-

"We need a national standard of payments," Geesey said, "but until every state fulfills its responsibility we have the right to protect Pennsylvania taxpayers."
