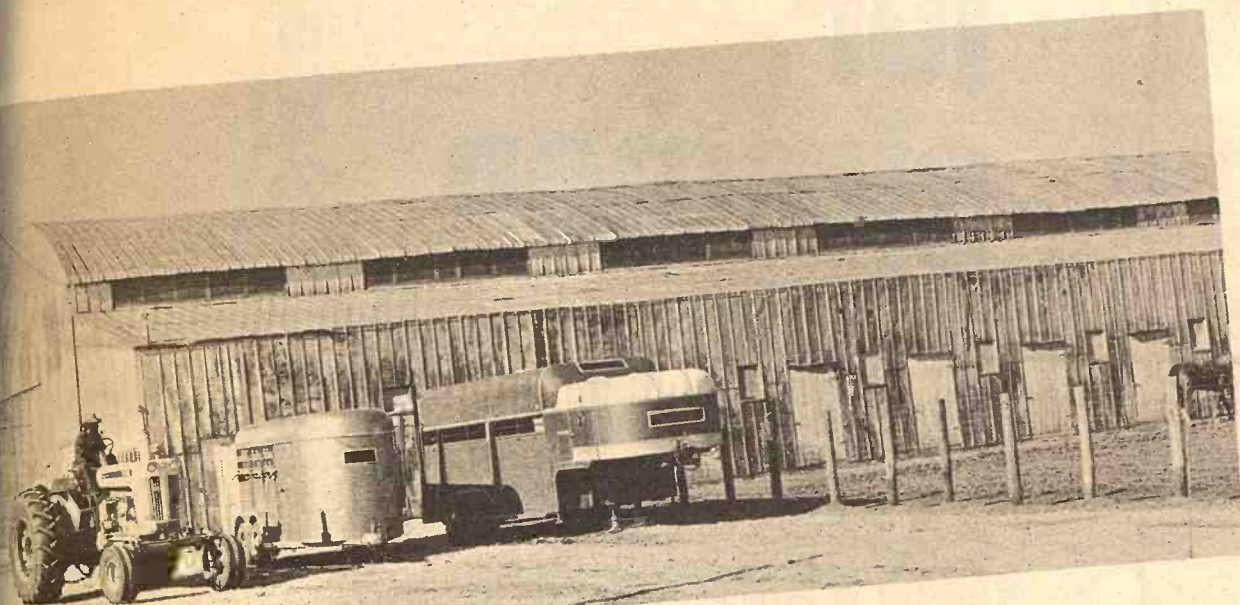

A huge old aircraft hanger setting on an isolated dusty hill west of Wakefield hasn't seen a plane in several years. Instead, it's become a landmark signifying the Lardeau Horse Ranch. To Larry Patterson it's a dream come true because as he puts it, "I'm a self-made man." For most people starting in agriculture today that's an impossible claim.

The road to the Lardeau ranch has been rough. Patterson was raised in Abilene and trained horses during his high school years. After

graduating he left for California, looking for greener pastures.

There he met his wife, Glenda, and began his school of hard knocks. With his interest in horses Patterson became a stunt rider for western movies. "I haven't broken anything yet but I've had my share of aches and bruises stunt riding."

"The roughest day I've had in the stunt business was 30 saddle-jerk-offs." This is the method used to simulate a rider being shot while riding a horse at full gallop. A spring loaded cable is attached to the rider and a stationary object, then the

rider takes off only to be jerked off. But, \$500 to \$1,500 isn't bad pay for each fall.

There are only six Negro stuntmen in the United States and there will be one less when Patterson gets his horse ranch established. "Your odds of staying healthy don't get any better after four years as a stunt actor."

Patterson declined to name any movies he has played in because, "Movie actors tend to get upset when a stuntman claims part of their role."

Plowing his money back into the ranch is part of Patterson's plan. He

has owned the ranch for three years and still has a lot of work to do. Building stalls in the hanger for his top stock and his house have been top priorities. Other improvements will come with time and money.

Being a stunt actor has added even another dimension to Patterson's life. Now he has a football star living on his back forty. Ray May, linebacker for the Baltimore Colts, bought a horse from Patterson. But the relationship didn't end there because May had always wanted to start a boys ranch. Patterson offered to sell May some of his land to start the ranch and now

they are neighbors.

May's idea of a boys ranch teaching the members to be self-sufficient. "I can't be around looking after them all the time. Besides most of them will have known the rough side of life and I treat them like men. The boys will work for Patterson to help pay part of their expenses and the rest they

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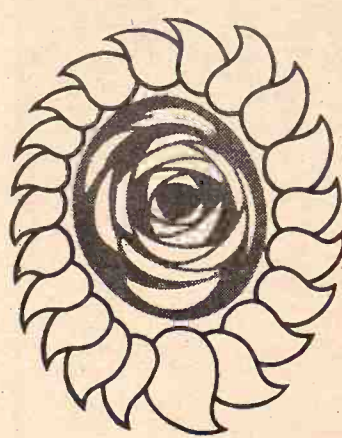
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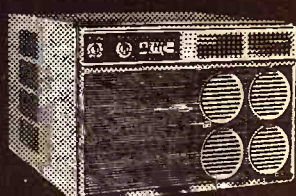

Farm Groups Protest Rail Ads, Ask Equal Time

Democrats and Republicans aren't the only people crying for equal time on television.

Three farm groups are demanding that the National Broadcasting Company grant them free time on television to reply to a rail industry advertising campaign promoting the controversial Surface Transportation Bill.

Protesting the TV commercials, featuring Wally Schirra, as "highly propagandistic," were the National Council of Farm Co-operatives, National Farmers Unions and National Federation of Grain Co-operatives.

They said the commercials have

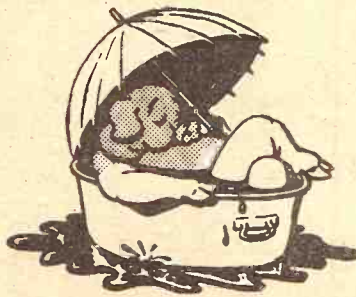
been broadcast as many as 100 times by NBC stations in the last three months and said spot announcements presenting the opposing view should be "scheduled with comparable frequency."

The advertisements, "Outer Space" and "Toy Train," advocate passage by Congress of a bill to authorize loans for railroad improvements and to give railroads more freedom to adjust rates.

A letter to NBC said "the farmers believe that the act would subsidize inefficiency, drive up prices, and allow the railroads to abandon routes which are important to farmers in remote areas."

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can save for things I can't give them," May said.

Both, Patterson and May agree that this will give the boys a taste of responsibility, money management, and—most important—teach them how to work with people.

May has owned his share of the ranch for two years and hopes to have boys living there in the near future.

Actually, the Lardeau Ranch will raise boys as well as horses. With 400 acres, 60 mares and 5 studs it should keep several boys busy all

year round especially at haying time.

With expensive stock Patterson finds that a sanitation program is important. He keeps a large supply of medicine in the tack room. Each stall is cleaned regularly and a disinfectant is applied as an extra precaution. The open area in the hanger is used as a training area and provides protection for the horses in bad weather.

Besides his love for the Flint Hills region, Patterson has a central location and can travel east or west

to horse sales.

The operation is centered around breeding and training with a public stud service being incorporated gradually. "My First Trip" is one of his best studs. In 1967 this horse won over \$11,000 on the quarter-mile track, winning at least one of every three races.

On the move constantly, Patterson was leaving to do some stunt work in a movie with Sidney Poitier in either California or Spain.

Oscar Mayer Not Yet At Point Of Site Choice

Talk that the Oscar Mayer company has already picked Wamego rather than a site closer to Manhattan for a new plant in the G&G area apparently is unfounded.

Dennis Gaydon, executive vice president for Oscar Mayer, told people in Wamego last week that the company hadn't made any land purchases but was continuing to hold onto options at two sites, one near Wamego and the other east of Manhattan near Zeandale.

Moreover, Gaydon made it clear that a decision wasn't likely for a couple of weeks yet.

He said, "The decision of where to locate has not been made. There are things of an engineering nature involved in choosing the site. We are several weeks away from resolving the question."

Hearings on zoning must be held in both Pottawatomie and Riley counties before the company could go ahead with its plans in either locations. The hearing on locating the plant on land east of Wamego was held at the county courthouse last week.

The Manhattan meeting isn't scheduled until April 25.

Byron Jacobson, Wamego, who has handled land transactions for the company there, said Oscar Mayer still hasn't acquired options on all the land it needs in Wamego. Two land owners have not yet agreed to options, he said.

The company has apparently completed soil tests and labor supply surveys in the Wamego area but have made no public analysis of results.

Lud Fiser, secretary of the Manhattan Chamber of Commerce, said as far as he knows "the Oscar Mayer people are continuing to evaluate both sites for soil content, water and so forth."

He said the April 25 for a zoning hearing in Riley county was the earliest possible because of a waiting period specified by the county.

Oscar Mayer has said that the plant in the G&G area might slaughter 5000 hogs daily and have 700 persons on the payroll. The killing capacity is considerably more than the G&G area can presently supply, not even allowing for demand from other sources.

The Association's annual meeting was held March 22 at the Deshler Legion Club.

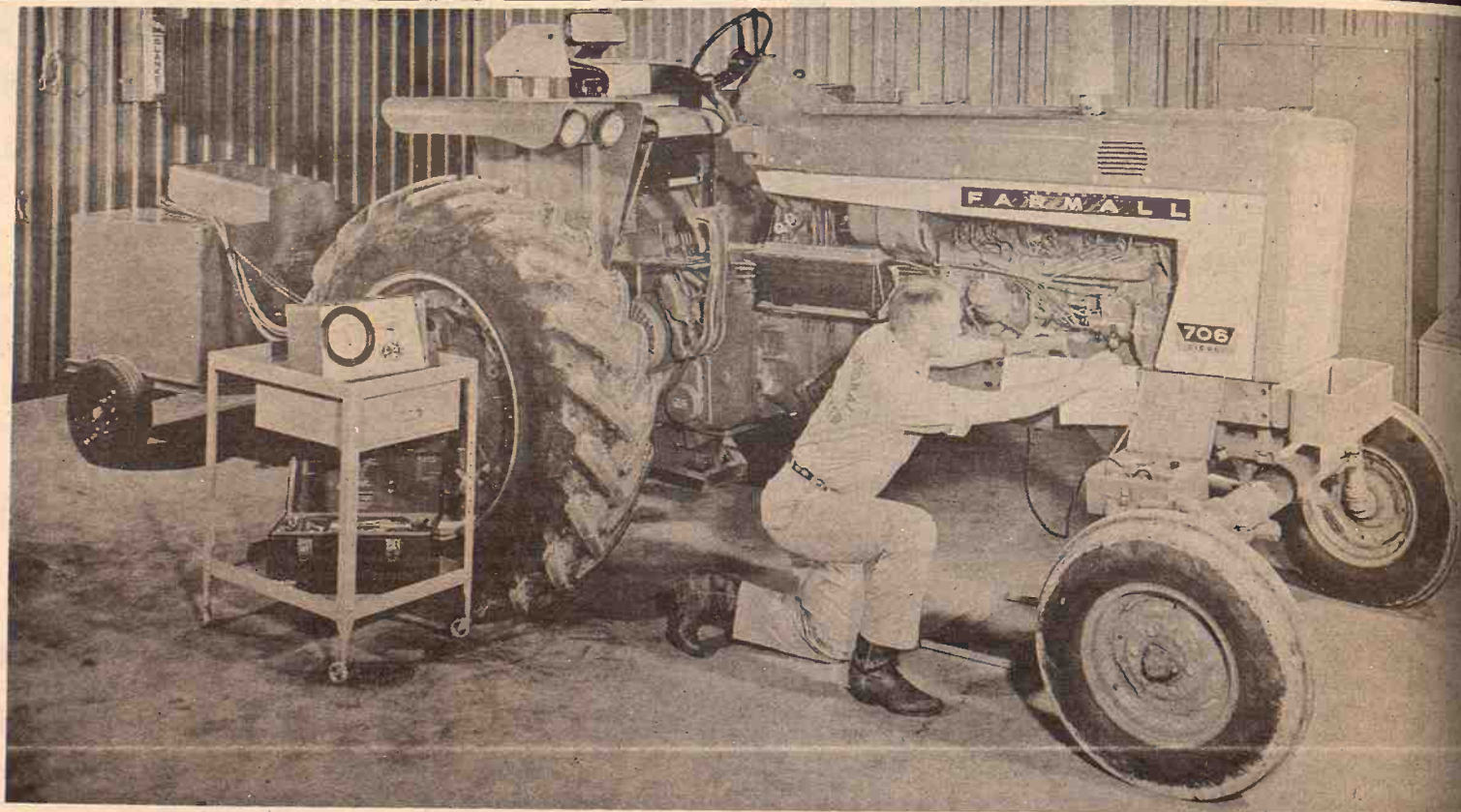
Ernie Kuhlman of North Platte

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OUR DAILY BREAD

Winner, Mrs. Ernest Boyle, Axtell: "I submit this tested recipe. A good way to make use of those extra eggs. We enjoy your paper."

CARAMEL CUSTARD

1 1/2 cups sugar
1 quart milk
6 eggs
1/2 teaspoon salt
1 teaspoon vanilla
Preheat oven to 325 degrees. Place 1 cup sugar in heavy skillet. Cook over low heat, without stirring, until the sugar forms a light brown syrup. Stir to blend. Use hot syrup to coat bottom and sides of a 1 1/2-quart casserole, by turning casserole as you pour in hot syrup. Beat eggs slightly in large bowl, pour in hot milk, 1/2 cup sugar, salt and vanilla, stirring constantly. Pour into casserole which is set in pan containing 1/2-inch hot water. Bake one hour and 35 minutes, or until a silver knife inserted in center comes out clean. Cool custard and refrigerate overnight. To serve, run small spatula around edge of casserole to loosen. Invert on shallow serving dish, shake gently to release. The caramel acts as sauce. Eight servings.

CHEESE SALAD

1 quart creamed cottage cheese
1 package flavored gelatin (red preferred) use dry, as is
1 small can crushed pineapple, drained
1 package whipped topping, prepared as to package directions
Fold all together and refrigerate until ready to use. This can be made

ahead of serving time.

STUFFED BEEF ROLLS

Combine 2 beaten eggs, 2 pounds ground beef and 1/2 teaspoon salt. Combine 1/2 cup fine, dry bread crumbs, 2 tablespoons chopped onions, 1/2 teaspoon sage, 1/4 teaspoon salt, 1/8 teaspoon pepper. Add one-third cup water. Divide meat into 8 portions. On a wax paper pat each to 4-inch square; top with 2 tablespoons of your favorite dressing (oyster or sausage dressing). Roll up and seal. Makes 8 rolls. Roll each roll in flour. Brown in hot bacon fat. Remove and drain off fat. Place rolls in baking dish. Pour 1 or 2 cans condensed mushroom soup over rolls. Bake for 20 minutes at 325 degrees. Makes eight servings. "This is very good."

FRESH ORANGE CHIFFON CAKE

Step 1:

Measure Together:
2 1/4 cups cake flour
1 1/2 cups sugar
3 teaspoons baking powder
1 teaspoon salt
Make a well and add in order:
1/2 cup cooking oil
5 unbeaten egg yolks (medium size)

Juice of 2 medium-size oranges, plus water to make 3/4 cup
Grated rind of 2 oranges (about 2 tablespoons)
Beat with spoon until smooth.

Step II:

Measure into large bowl:
1 cup egg whites (7 or 8)
1/2 teaspoon cream of tartar
Whip until whites form stiff peaks. They should be stiffer than for angel food or meringue. Do not underbeat.

Pour egg yolk mixture gradually over whipped egg whites, gently folding with rubber scraper just until blended. DO NOT STIR. Pour into ungreased 10-inch tube pan. Bake in 325-degree oven for 65-70 minutes or until top springs back when lightly touched. Immediately turn pan upside down, placing tube part over the neck of a bottle and let

hang until cold. Loosen from sides and tube with knife and remove from pan.

ORANGE CREAM ICING

Melt in saucepan 1/2 cup shortening (part butter adds flavor). Remove from heat. Blend in 4 tablespoons cake flour, 1/4 teaspoon salt. Stir in slowly 1/2 cup orange juice. Bring to a boil, stirring constantly. Boil one minute. (If mixture curdles, do not be alarmed.) Remove from heat. Stir in 3 cups sifted confectioner's sugar. Set saucepan in bowl of cold water. Beat until spreading consistency. Stir in 1 tablespoon grated orange rind.

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Most Refrigerators Could Be Better Organized

If you're like most busy housewives your refrigerator could be a little better organized. How often have you cleaned the refrigerator and discovered last week's leftovers tucked away behind the catsup or hunted for ten minutes for a jar of olives?

Even with the help of systematic storage bins and drawers in new refrigerators, they usually call for a bit of organizational know-how. One way to organize bottles and jars in the refrigerator is with a turntable that puts the item you want in front of you quickly and easily.

If you do keep leftovers, make certain they'll stay fresh for a few days in lock-tight containers. Leftovers may have more appeal if frozen for several weeks then served in a different way.

If the family loves cheese and you keep several kinds on hand, wrap each kind separately, then put them in a food keeper.

Extra jars, bottles and cans of unopened food should go on the

kitchen shelf to prevent clutter in the refrigerator. Items like mayonnaise and salad dressings must be kept in the refrigerator once they're opened. Foods need ample space for cold air to circulate, so do not pack them too tightly on shelves.

Raw meats and poultry should be stored in the coldest part of your refrigerator at a temperature near freezing. If your refrigerator has a meat-storage compartment be sure to use it. Fish should be stored in a food keeper to prevent the transfer of odors to other foods in the refrigerator.

Bread should be stored in the bread box or frozen. Put bread in the refrigerator only to prevent molding in warm, damp weather.

If your refrigerator doesn't have an individual egg holder on the door, place eggs in an uncovered bowl or leave them in their own carton. Butter stored in refrigerator should be tightly covered at all times because it picks up odors from other foods very easily.

Facial Care Should Be Daily Routine

Fashions come and go but such basics of beauty as daily, disciplined routines for facial care remain unchanged.

A good routine is based on moisture, as necessary to the skin as rain to earth. Dipping fingers into water before working quality skin care products into the skin contributes even more moisture.

A good trio for facial care includes a cleanser, a toner and a moisturizer. These beauty aids give complete care to the normal-to-dry skin when used in a three-minute skin care ritual.

For the program, begin with a cleanser that is massaged lightly upward and outward with the fingertips moistened in lukewarm water. Remove with a damp washcloth.

Then use a clear toner, one that contains no drying alcohol yet removes any surface soil residue, leaving the clean skin fresh, tingling and radiant.

Adding a moisturizer is the final

step. Use a delicate, creamy lotion that is neither sticky nor greasy yet lubricates the skin. The result will be skin that is soft and supple, lets makeup base glide on in a smooth veil and helps it to stay on.

One company provides the cleanser, toner and moisturizer packaged in a trio to make the three-minute routine a pleasure and a simple task to keep you beautiful and soft.

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A swinging door that is used often collects fingerprints and smudges. To avoid constant cleaning, apply spray on starch to the most used areas. This will keep the door clean, glossy and free of fingerprints.

Prevents Yellowing

Scrub wicker furniture with warm salt water to clean it. The salt water also keeps the wicker from yellowing.

Use Food Color To Touch Up Rug

If you accidentally take out a small patch of coloring from a good cotton scatter rug or bedspread by spilling bleach on it, use the appropriate shade of food coloring to touch it up each time you launder the piece.

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Discolored Buttons

If shirt buttons become discolored from being laundered, remove the discoloration with an ink eraser.

Prevents Tarnish

Keep a piece of chalk in your jewelry box and it will keep your jewelry from tarnishing.

Drier Removes Lint

Students Deadbeat on School Loans

Have you ever borrowed money under the student loan program and then allowed the loan to go into default? If you did, the government paid off your lender. But now the government wants its money back—and is prepared to get tough to get it. Since the program started a little more than six years ago, 3.5 million students have borrowed \$4.4 billion from 20,000 lenders under the government-insured program.

In the fiscal year ended June 30, 1971, government-insured loans topped the \$1 billion mark for the first time and in the first eight months of this fiscal year the total is already over \$1 billion.

But roughly 4 per cent of the loans that were due for payment — starting nine months after graduation — went into default and had to be paid off by the government. The total: nearly \$50 million, although some of it has been recovered.

In a rare display of government muscle, William Simmons, Jr., insured loans director of the Office of Education, told credit officers at an American Bankers Association conference, "We intend to collect every dime that's been paid in claims."

Later, in an interview, Simmons said that collection men — armed with the resources of the Post Office, Internal Revenue Service, Civil Service, credit bureaus and "skip tracing" — were writing letters,

of college with a diploma in one hand a bankruptcy petition in the other."

Another banker asserted that students on some campuses were instructed in "How to rip off the federal government" and avoid payment of student loans and other obligations.

A third banker, who said he was "very nervous" over Simmon's caution to lenders to strengthen collection efforts, declared that he was "not prepared to pound on doors" to collect on delinquent student loans. His argument was that the low interest rate on these loans — 7 per cent now — was insufficient. Simmons responded that the law called for "due diligence" on collections.

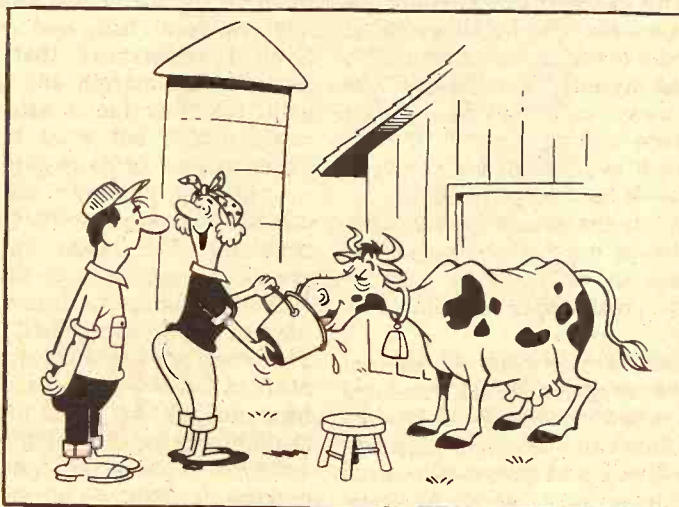

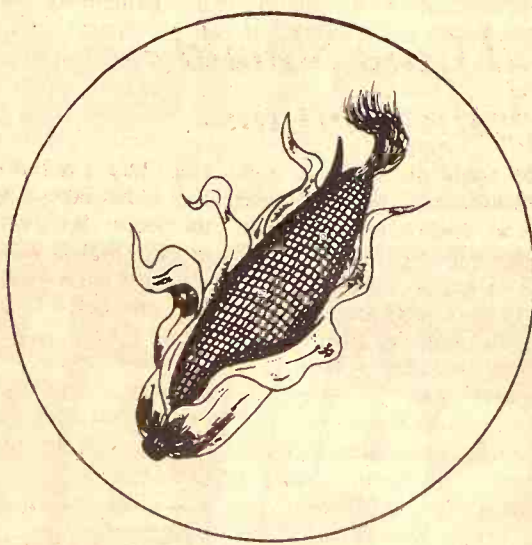
SMALLPOX NOT ELIMINATED GERMANY CONFIRMS CASE

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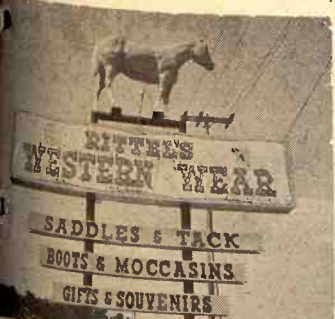
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Performance Evaluation, Slow Change To Profit

When a fellow wrote sometime ago and asked me to write about "what happened to performance testing?", I asked myself, "does he think its gone away or something?" Performance testing or call it performance evaluation has not gone away — it has just arrived!

Concepts change slowly. The mini-skirt swept the world in 6 months, the maxi, the twist and the frug took only 3 and disappeared almost as fast.

Yet its taken 40 years of research to prove the scales can help breeders make wiser selections for productivity than can eyeballing alone. Its taken 40 years to prove that cattle engineering can be done scientifically. Over the last 40 years by eyeballing, the cow has been compacted, compressed, middle-of-the-roaded and stretched and she's still producing a 7 month calf averaging only 400 pounds that can make only 1.9 pounds per to pay if slapped right onto feed. This is not good enough and cow-calf men are trying to change it. Some want change, some don't.

Performance means several things. It must mean profit or its

meaningless. Then what makes for profit in beef cattle? A sure-fire way to make a profit in beef cattle is to buy low, feed cheap and sell high. Even I understand that! Profit results from margin and or daily gain. No other factor affects beef cattle profits but what it affects either margin or daily gain.

Assuming you are marketing correctly, growth is profit. Growth is profitable. The faster an animal grows, the less days of time costs (yardage, interest, labor, maintenance feed, etc.) he'll accrue. Therefore, growth is performance. Margin has some cattle performance in it too which most of us seldom acknowledge — that is the ability to produce the right kind of carcass. Right now that means one that will grade. Tomorrow it will mean cutability and gradability. So, producing the right carcass is performance. Performance is gainability and gradability.

There are really two kinds of growth for practical purposes — genetic growth and "come-back" growth. Both are good and both are useful. We are used to the latter and don't yet understand the former. Let's take a look at them as they both have some big plus values.

We've been used to cattle that "have to be grown out" or they'd get fat too early. These were the shorties of the 40's and 50's. You didn't dare take them from tit to full feed, so they were roughed along to "get some frame." Their cousins being mismanaged all over the South were "just a' growing too and durned slow." So-along comes a feeder who buys them along with "good weighing conditions" — they were green, long tailed and ready to pop.

They make good gain in the feedlot — "come-back" gain or compensatory gain. It's great for the feeder and can be real cheap gain. Who wins? The feeder! Who loses? The grower! Why? Because of cost of gain. The feeder capitalized on the grower's mistakes. The net energy system tells us that with the following rates of gain the corresponding amounts of ratio energy go for maintenance. Maintenance from an economic point of view is like pouring down a rat hole. It has to be there but there's no return to it.

So the grower put over 50 percent of his feed into maintenance so that the big feeder could get his maintenance feed under 40 percent. This is part of the hole in the background idea that giant feeders are trying to promote. "You grow them out and I'll take the gravy!"

Now, I am not against this gravy concept and I like to feed that kind myself but some cattle feeders are

just now acknowledging that genetic growth has a place in the future. The beef industry can't survive solely by scavenging against itself and besides that we're running out of yearlings. Compensatory growth was a fact of life. It is what the feeding giants built their plans on.

Turnover is a must with the feeding giants. It will be tough on them to have to feed calves in this time of "the great yearling shortage." They need "comeback" gaining cattle. Quite possible genetic growth, high moisture corn and corn silage are the "three aces in the hole" that the Corn Belt has in waiting.

What is genetic growth? It has to be bred-in. It is bred-in ability of cattle to convert feed rapidly making fast gain from birth without having to be held "to grow frame." Genetic growth is not the motive of the man looking for "green yearlings with good buying conditions." He's after "come-back" growth. Generally speaking "genetic growth" cattle are not 120 day feeders. They will take 180 to 240 days pay to pay depending on in weight. They are 7 to 8 months old when they come to the lot weighing 550 to 600 pounds, go on full feed and are 13 to 15 months old when they leave the lot weighing 1100 to 1200 pounds. They are not cattle to be "grown out" for they might not be finished until they weigh 1300 or up. Who then are "genetic growth" cattle for?

Performance-bred or genetic growth cattle are for the calf feeder. Preconditioned when they come in and given some tender, loving care, calves from performance breeding background have come into Iowa lots, made 2.75 pay to pay daily gain and graded 95 percent Choice and 2 cutability with an all-cost of less

than 16 cents per pound of gain (corn at \$1.05 per bushel). Their gaining counterparts with similar in-weights cost up to 7 cents more per pound of gain. These fast gain require less maintenance, megacalories, less yardage, interest, less labor and less day death loss risk than conventional cattle of the same class and weight. They return up to 24 cents more profit per head per day than slow gainers.

If they are so spectacular why can I buy a trainload? We are overrun with performance-bred cattle but we're on the move toward having more. Performance testing is over 30 years old in some herds. The Bell Ranch in New Mexico started at least in 1947.

I said that the giant yards by their plans around green from short term cattle and that genetic growth cattle were for the feeder. Is there a conflict? Yes, it has many implications and opportunities. We have tended to that there was one way to breed cattle — and that was straightbred and the same way from Denmark New Mexico to Dutchess County, New York. We're coming to realization that cattle need to be bred to fit their own ecology. I keep straightbred commercial herds. In the more intensive areas such as Iowa, where we will see to 5 million cows, only the specialists should keep replacements. We need a different cow than the west south does. General cow owners in the Corn Belt will first-cross females (probably dairy) and breed them to top performance bulls. Net result: 600 pound weaners to market at 5 months. Who will feed them? Of the owner himself! Many of

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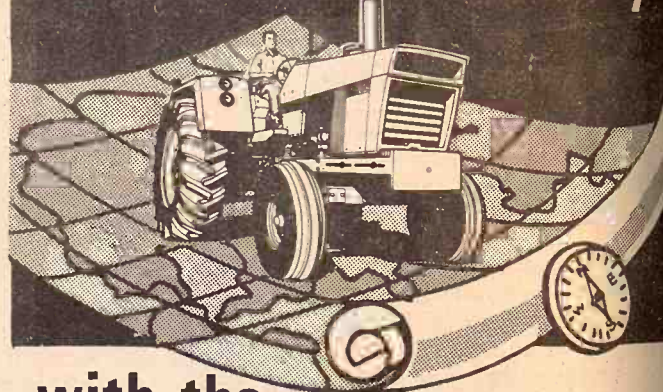
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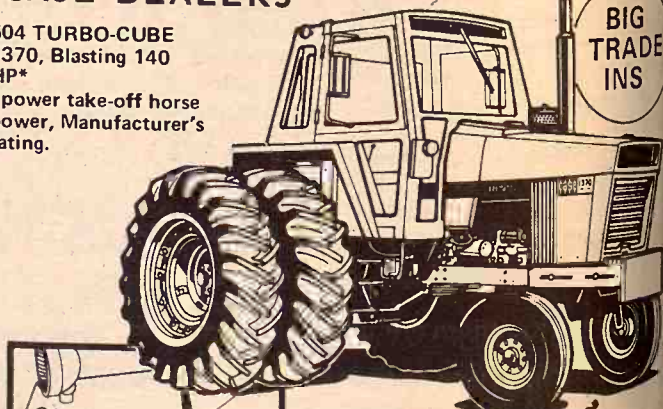
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performance will probably own it all
the way to the rail — let the buyer
beware on the other stuff and hope
for lots of mismanagement and
"comeback" gain! With the
feedyard space being built its going
to take lots of "come-back" cattle to
fill them. Only the man who doesn't
understand time-costs will continue
to produce them.

The job will be done like seed corn
is developed. Through testing
potential parents and allowing some
to breed and some not to breed. It
will be done by measuring rather
than by guessing. It will be done
through progeny testing, carcass
evaluation, cow selection. It will be
done with sane, sound
crossbreeding. It will be done using
outstanding purebreds and seed-
stock bred for specific crossing. It
will be done with a scientifically
thought out plan.

So performance testing didn't go
away. It just came of age. Some of
the doubters are now having
"original performance ideas" that
were researched 40 years ago. This
is good. The days of crusading for
performance testing are relatively
over. The day has come for the
crusaders to lead performance
evaluation correctly — to avoid
zipper-sided calves, to keep judges
from placing up the pencil-gutted
cattle, to keep crossbreeding from
becoming a hodge-podge, to keep

perspective on mature size of cattle
that will stay efficient and will grade
at a reasonable weight and to keep
cattlemen aware that no matter
what the fal-de-rat, it is MARGIN

End Of Railroad Service To Two Flint Hills Towns

ESKRIDGE — The Santa Fe
Railroad ended 100 years of service
to the communities of Eskridge and
Harveyville last week.

The closing of terminals in the
two towns climaxed several years of
struggle. Santa Fe strived to close
the Alma-Burlingame branch line
and persons in the communities and
state officials tried to keep it open.

The branch line from Eskridge
north to Alma was abandoned in
1970.

Burlingame will continue
receiving rail service from the main
Santa Fe line.

The Interstate Commerce Com-
mission gave the railroad per-
mission to abandon the branch line
after listening to Santa Fe reports
which contended that maintenance
and updating of the line would be too
costly. Even so, there may still be a
railroad if plans to create a
historical tourist railway come
through.

Fred Schmidt, a representative of
Flinthills Railway, Inc., which
would run a steam engine on the

April 11, 1972

branch line upon purchase, will open
negotiations with Santa Fe officials
on the subject Friday in Chicago.
Local businessmen who depend on
the railroad would use the steam
train to haul some freight and
produce.

Ed Foose, stationmaster at
Eskridge and Harveyville, said
Monday was a final cleanup day for
Santa Fe. All the surplus supplies
and records were taken from the two
railroad stations. Two boxcars at
Harveyville and one at Eskridge
were towed away.

Foose came to the station-master
job at Eskridge in 1947. He said that
the railroad did a big business in
Eskridge then, often sending as
many as 100 boxcars at a time for
cattle. But cattle numbers shipped
by rail gradually decreased with
competition from truck trans-
portation and a switch to selling
animals at local sales barns instead
of shipping them to big city ter-
minals, Foose said.

He added that the biggest business
in recent years was at grain harvest
time. Santa Fe took 43 boxcars of
milo out of Harveyville alone, this
year. He said the two towns did more
rail business than many small towns
on main lines.

Foose is nine months short of
retirement age, so he will use his
seniority to get another job with
Santa Fe. He is considering positions
at Wellsville and Leavenworth.

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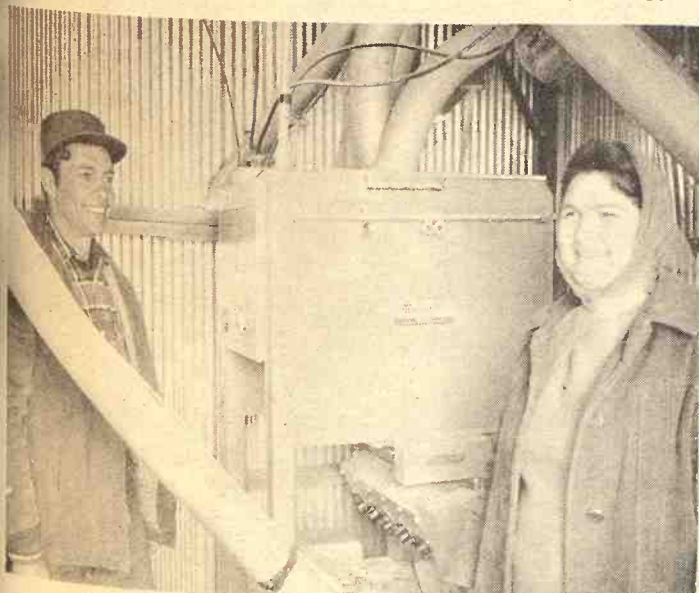

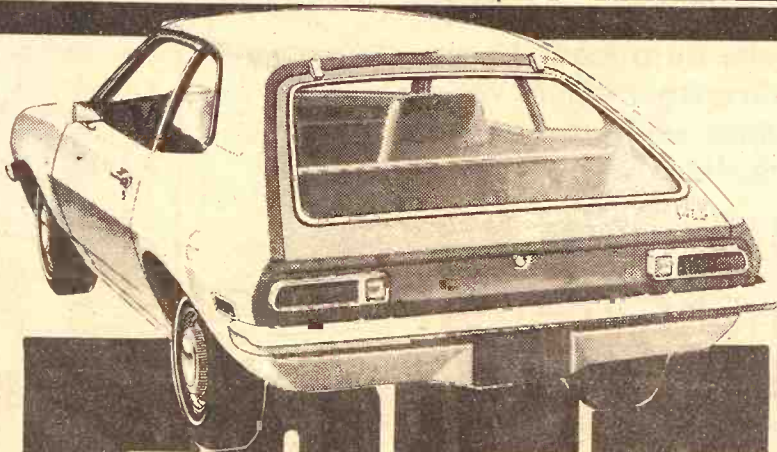

More Hogs, Good Prices

There will be an abundance of pork during the remainder of this year. At the same time, farmers will receive good prices for their hogs. These are our conclusions after studying the recent USDA quarterly report, Hogs and Pigs.

This publication, popularly known as the pig crop report, was based on a survey of farmers in ten leading hog-producing states. These states provide about three-fourths of all hogs raised in the United States. The survey was made by mail, telephone, and some personal visits. The resulting report provides estimates of the number of hogs and pigs on farms March 1, and the number of sows that farmers planned to farrow during the six months March through August.

Prospective Pork Supplies

After analyzing the figures obtained by the survey, USDA statisticians made the following estimates: The number of hogs and pigs on hand March 1 totaled 41,792,000 — 6 percent below last year's figure. The number kept for breeding was 6,449,000 — down 8 percent. And the number for market was 35,343,000 — 6 percent fewer than last year.

Most of the 35.3 million hogs and pigs being kept for market will be converted to pork during the seven months of March through September. While the number of hogs available for market in this period is about 6 percent smaller than the exceptionally large number available a year ago, it is 8 percent greater than the number reported two years ago; also, almost 10 percent more than the average number available for the four years 1967 through 1970. Thus, the number of hogs available for slaughter during the next six months is well above normal.

Hog Price Outlook For This Year

For this year as a whole, commercial hog slaughter now seems likely to fall 5 to 7 percent short of

last year's record volume. On previous occasions, such a reduction in the supply has often lifted prices by about 20 percent.

The prices for barrows and gilts at the seven Midwest central markets averaged \$18.45 last year. Adding 20 percent to that figure would make a little more than \$22.

The outlook for hog prices is less bullish now than it was three months ago. The principal reason is that the number of pigs saved per litter this past winter was 4 percent more than in 1971.

Prospects For Next Year

Hog prices slumped \$4 to \$5 in February and March. This has been a big disappointment to many hog producers. The price drop, however, will have one good result: It will probably delay the next overexpansion of hog production.

If hog prices remain at profitable levels — say \$22 to \$25 — for another six months, some hog producers will have the money and the incentive to expand. After that, it will take about twelve months to get the extra sows bred and farrowed and the hogs to market. It will then be late next year, the fall of 1973. At least until that time we expect hog prices to continue at profitable levels.

About 1000 persons attended the annual meeting, the 47th for the co-op.

Members voted not to consider a name change. The subject had come up because of the impending 50th anniversary of the association. Rechartering is scheduled for a year from now, and some members had suggested that a new name might be in order. The proposal did not win enough supporters, however, losing 173-124.

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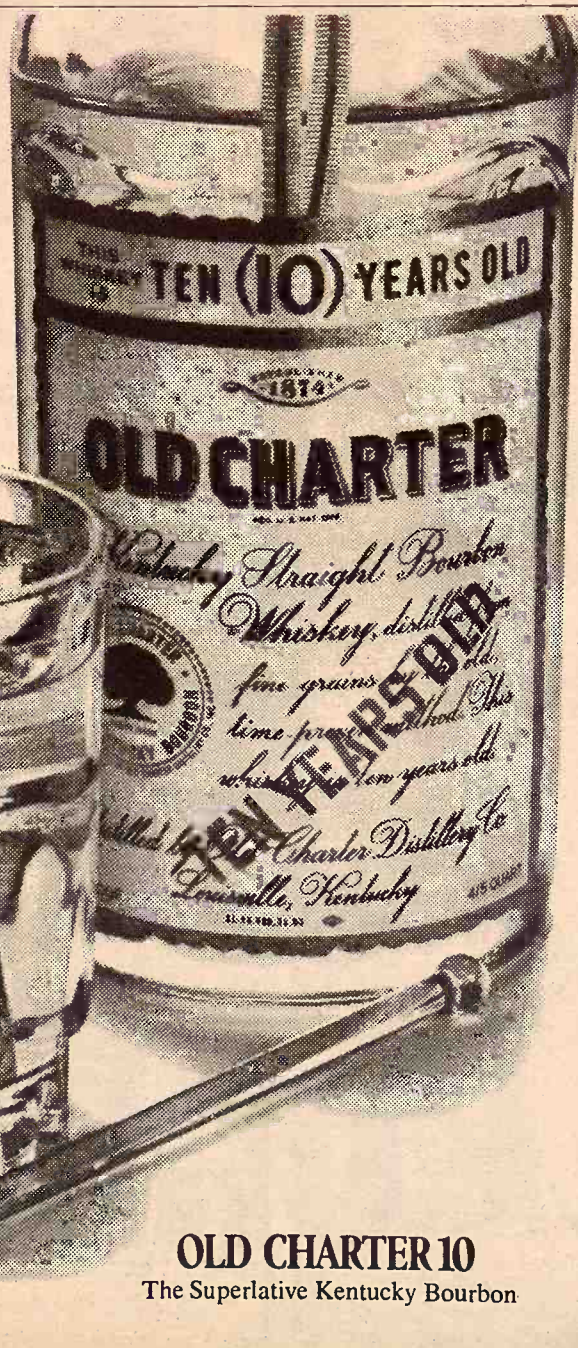

Livestock Decline Cuts Price Index

Prices received by Kansas farmers at mid-March 1972 were down a little from the previous month but moderately above the previous year, according to the Kansas Crop and Livestock Reporting Service.

The index of prices received for all farm products in March was 279 percent of the 1910-14 base period compared with 283 in February 1972 and 257 in March 1971.

Decreases from last month were recorded for hogs, beef cattle, hay and milk, while moderate increases were noted for soybeans, seeds, lambs and eggs.

Compared with a year ago, prices were up for most meat animals, wheat and soybeans, while prices were down for most feed grains, hay and wool.

Crop Prices
The crop price index was 160 percent of the 1910-14 base period at mid-March, 1 point above a month ago but 3 points below a year ago.

Wheat at mid-March averaged \$1.31 per bushel, up 1 cent from both a month and a year earlier.

Corn was worth \$1.17 per bushel, 12 cents above last month but 17 cents below a year ago.

Barley brought 97 cents per bushel, unchanged from both a month and a year earlier.

Sorghum grain at \$1.77 per cwt. was 1 cent below a month ago and 29

cents below a year ago.
Soybeans were \$3.13 per bushel 16 cents above last month and 28 cents above last year.

Meat Prices
The livestock and livestock products price index at mid-March was 415 percent of the 1910-14 base period, a decline of 9 points from February 1972 but 50 points above March 1971.

The meat animal price index was 513 percent in March, 15 points below the previous month but 75 points above March of last year.

Beef cattle brought \$33.70 per cwt., 50 cents below a month earlier but \$4.20 above a year earlier.

Hog prices averaged \$22.80 per cwt., \$2.80 below the previous month but \$5.90 above the same month a year earlier.

The dairy price index was 344 percent in March, down 10 points from February this year but unchanged from March 1971.

A preliminary wholesale milk price of \$5.80 was 20 cents below a month ago and 5 cents below a year ago.

Eggs averaged 23 cents per

dozen, 3 cents above a month earlier but unchanged from March a year ago.

Prices Paid
Prices paid by farmers for protein supplements and mixed feeds ranged from unchanged to mostly slightly higher than a month ago.

United States
The index of prices received by the Nation's farmers for farm products at mid-March was 304 percent of the 1910-14 base period, down 6 points from February 1972 but 22 points above March 1971.

Price decreases were noted for hogs, beef cattle, hay, barley, milk and butterfat. Prices were higher than in February for sorghum grain, corn, soybeans, sheep, lambs, wool, chickens and eggs.

The index of prices paid by farmers for commodities and services (including interest, taxes and wage rates) was 423, unchanged from mid-February but 18 points above a year ago.

The parity ratio in March was 72, down 1 point from February 1972 but 2 points above March 1971.

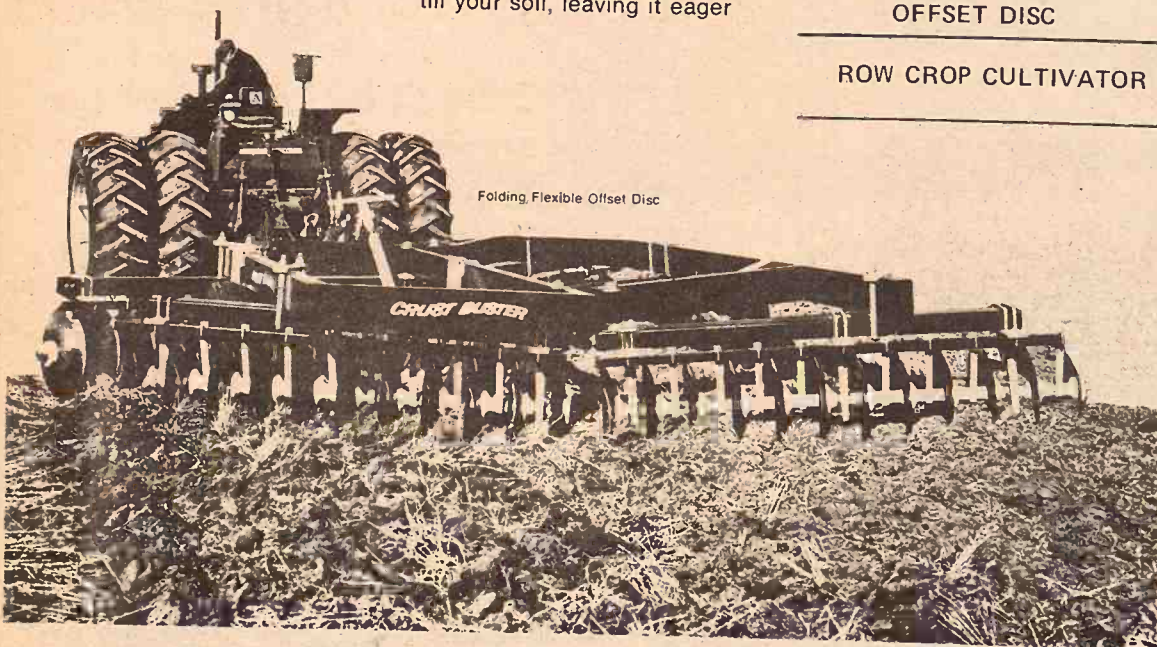

Feedlot Gains Key To Proposed New Young Bull Label

The United States Department of Agriculture has proposed grading standards for beef bull meat that for the first time would distinguish between young bulls, whose meat yield is as tasty and tender as that from steers, and old bulls, used mostly in hamburger, soups and other precooked and canned products.

According to the USDA most bull beef historically has come from older animals, whose breeding value has been exhausted. Thus they have lost the race with the hamburger grinder.

However, a growing number of ranchers and feeders believe they have learned that young bulls have a higher rate of grain and better feed conversion ratio than steers, which, of course, are former bulls. Consequently more and more bulls are being finished as slaughter animals.

But at present, the meat from young bulls must carry the designation as bull meat. The new proposal would cause such products

to carry to the supermarket shelves a grading label of bullock.

The carcasses of older bulls would continue to be used for manufacturing beef, USDA officials said. The age dividing point would be around two years, USDA officials added.

The proposal will be open 90 days for public comment in Congress, among consumer groups and within the livestock industry.

Charles B. Jennings, vice-president of the Kansas City Stock Yards Company, said the new designation "bullock" probably "would hurt" the market at first — at least until the completion of a public education program for housewives and consumers.

"Neither you, nor I, nor anyone else could tell the difference between bullock and steer meat when eating a steak or a roast," Jennings added. "But such a designation would be bound to cause some confusion. The big hurdle to overcome would be that of public education."

The problem is arising in part, Jennings and other experts say, because farmers and ranchers are able to raise and wean bigger calves when the bull calves are allowed to remain as such. That means extra money when the hard-pressed stockman brings his calves to market.

Most of those calves then go into cattle backgrounding programs to

prepare them for feedlot fattening. All segments of the industry appear to be satisfied with the performance of bulls versus steers. The only minor problem encountered is certain amount of fighting among the more aggressive young bulls.

The USDA explained the change being considered because "there has been increasing interest in feeding young bulls, specifically for the production of beef for sale at retail meat by the housewife probably will be the key to whether the technique expands, adding that in many cases she already is confused by present grading such as the difference between prime, choice and good grades of meat found on the supermarket shelves.

The proposed standards were published in the March 17 issue of the Federal Register, and copies of the proposal may be obtained from the Livestock Division, Consumer and Marketing Service, USDA, Washington. Comments from interested groups must be submitted to the hearing clerk of the USDA by June 15.

Rainfall Factor Could Influence Range Burning

Ranchers who plan to burn range as a management practice this spring should take extra precautions unless the bluestem grazing region of Kansas gets adequate rainfall.

That advice comes from Dr. Robert Hyde, range management specialist at Kansas State, who says plant crowns and old growth should be moist when the grass is burned.

In most years this isn't a big problem in the Flint Hills region because Kansas generally gets some rainfall in early spring. And a lack of moisture may not be a problem this year because there's still sufficient time for some good spring rains.

The best burning date is just when the bluestems start greening up in the spring, which is normally April 20 in the southern portion of the bluestem grazing area and May 1 in the northern area.

Hyde said ranchers who burn rangeland under dry conditions should do so cautiously and follow guidelines issued last year by the State Department of Health.

Wind velocity is also a key factor in range burning. It should be brisk

enough to move the fire along but not so strong that it will be difficult to control.

Hyde discourages grassland burning west of the bluestem region, with U.S. 77 as the approximate western boundary.

Burning is practiced by cattlemen who graze summer yearling cattle and usually results in increased livestock gains and in improved grazing distribution.

Research at Kansas State University during the last 20 years shows that yearling steers and heifers grazed at a moderate rate on non-burned range near Manhattan averaged 233 pounds gain per head compared to 259 pounds gain on late spring burned range.

This increased livestock performance has been achieved without damage to the range; in fact, moderately grazed, late spring burned range is in better conditions than other KSU experimental range.

The districts include Saline, Cloud, Ellsworth, Jewell, Lincoln, Mitchell, Ottawa, Republic, Chase, Dickinson, Geary, Lyon, McPherson, Marion, Morris and Wabaunsee counties.

A panel on tax and legal problems of stockmen will be comprised of Virg Huseman, Topeka, a KLA staff member; Frank Norton, Salina attorney, and Jim Berglund, trust officer for the First National Bank and Trust Co., Salina.

Kalo Hineman, Dighton, KLA president, also will speak. A concurrent meeting of the CowBelles will examine promotion and public relations problems.

The meeting is set for 2:30 p.m. with adjournment expected at 8 p.m.

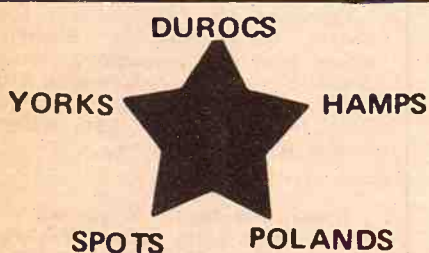

Smoking Back On Increase

In a reversal of earlier forecasts, government economists now see a chance that the average American smoker will be lighting up more cigarettes per day by 1980 than he is now.

One year ago, following three straight years of declining per capita cigarette use, experts predicted consumption would drop from the current rate of near 200 packs a year to about 150 packs by 1980 — a 25 per cent decline.

But in 1971, use recovered to 203 packs per capita and that figure now is expected to hold steady in 1972, as a result, an Agriculture Department report said today, new projections hold out the possibility that 1980 per capita consumption "may fall only slightly from the current level, or even increase slightly, depending on the health issue, prices and the makeup of the population."

The report, based on an earlier speech to an industry meeting by economist Robert H. Miller, said the biggest gaining population age-group during the 1970's probably will be the 25-34-year-old.

Since the 25 to 44 age group has the highest per capita smoking rate of all age groups over 18, Miller said, current population forecasts indicate a possible 2 per cent gain in overall per capita smoking in 1980, compared with 1971.

This would be an added 4 packs per person per year, lifting the total to 207 packs.

The report said last year's upturn in per capita consumption came despite the fact that millions of Americans quit smoking. Many new smokers in younger age groups apparently took their places, Miller said.

The expert said however, that in spite of the new projections of steady or increasing per capita cigarette use, there still is a possibility of a steep decline in smoking because of steady price increases and continued health concerns.

Pork Producers Hire Fieldman

K.R. (Pat) Boyer, a graduate of Kansas State University and native of Formoso in Jewell county, has been employed as the first secretary-fieldman of the Kansas Pork Producers Council.

For the past two years Boyer has been supervisor of market service programs of the state Board of Agriculture's marketing division. He reports to his new post May 1.

Boyer and his wife, Luann, indicated they may move to St. Mary's.

Floyd Meyer, new president of the KPPC said Boyer's new job will include coordinating the organization's activities with the National Pork Producers Council and working with Extension specialists and county Extension agricultural agents in promoting pork production.

KPPC has 11,000 members and hopes to double that figure. Kansas is one of approximately 28 states with producer organizations affiliated with the NPPC in promoting pork.

Woo Soviets For More Farm Sales

Agriculture Secretary Earl L. Butz, with a mountain of U.S. surplus grain to back him up, is going to the Soviet Union to offer the Moscow housewife a hand with her meat budget.

The trip is the result of a growing demand in the Soviet Union for more beef, pork, poultry and dairy products, according to government analysts.

Butz and a team of U.S. negotiators arrived in the Soviet Union over the weekend.

Discussions will follow to see if the Soviets want to buy some of the U.S. grain surplus.

American farmers have produced far too much corn and other grain in recent years. Exports are vital to the U.S. farm economy and a new pact with the Soviet Union would

mean large benefits to American producers.

Such an agreement also would improve the outlook for President Nixon in the farm belt this election year.

Butz will be in the Soviet Union this week, his office said. The trade team, headed by Assistant Secretary of Agriculture Clarence D. Palmby, began talks on Monday and will remain an unspecified time.

Nixon will visit Moscow in late May to discuss a variety of subjects.

Horace J. Davis, an assistant administrator of the Foreign Agricultural Service in USDA, said rising consumer demand in the Soviet Union for more livestock products, particularly beef, is the main reason for thinking Moscow might want U.S. grain.

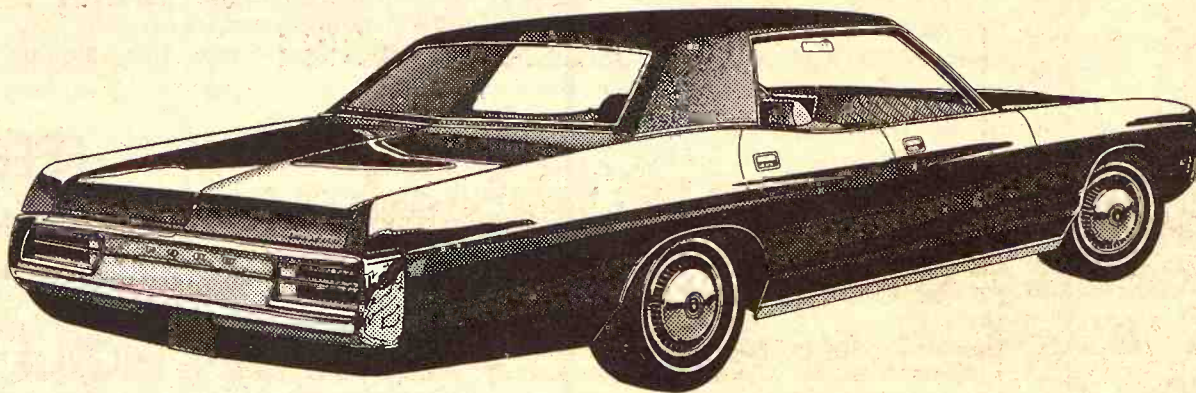

Greenleaf Trying To Help Itself

GREENLEAF — This Washington county city of 500 has a housing shortage, no unemployment and no crime. But it has PRIDE, the name given to a movement to improve the image of the town.

Organizers of the Greenleaf Development Co., Inc., expect to have \$25,000 subscribed as soon as

the state securities commission gives OK to the corporation. More than half of the stock at \$25 the share has been spoken for. The corporation expects to make a profit.

With the \$25,000, the corporation intends to promote elimination of the scars of depopulation caused by the closing of the Missouri Pacific round

house nearly 25 years ago. Then the replacing of unsightly residences with new pre-fabs or other inexpensive residential buildings.

The movement of beautification has started. A bond issue voted last fall enabled the city to buy 15 acres at the south edge of the city to establish a recreational center. A municipal swimming pool should be ready in June. New houses on old sites are now occupied.

Unlike most small towns striving for growth through industry seeking organizations, Greenleaf expects to make the town so attractive and desirable that industry would seek it out.

Biggest employer in the community is the Co-op with headquarter offices for Washington and Linn branches in Greenleaf. There are 18 employees in the co-op. The only other employer is the Greenleaf Grain & Feed Co., managed by Delmar Cox. Most other employment is on farms.

PRIDE committee is formed by Matt Uhlik, Tim McVean, Dr. N.G. McGrath, Greg Koppes and the Rev. D.F. Thalmann, Lutheran minister. But the whole town participates in the enthusiasm to make Greenleaf a more desirable place to live

vehicles be equipped with turn signals.

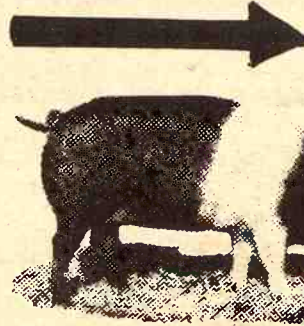

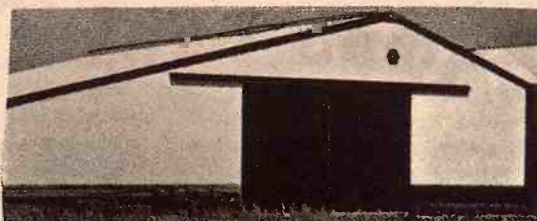

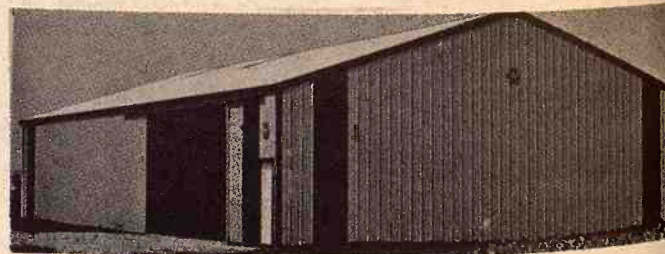

NEW JOBS WITH CREDIT BANKS

Resistance To Warning Lights On Seat Belts

The Insurance Institute for Highway Safety has reported that in a survey car dealers, salesmen at many of them were willing to help a prospective buyer bypass federally required seat-belt warning devices. The institute, funded by the insurance industry, noted that the

government has called the new systems "harder to ignore, harder to forget, harder to avoid using." A variation of this year's system is due for next year and was offered by the government to compensate for moving back by two years the deadline for installing air bags.

The institute advocates the earliest possible installation of air bags, which would inflate automatically to cushion a passenger thrown forward in a collision. This year's cars are required to be equipped with a warning light and a buzzer

which remain on for at least one minute when the front seat of a car is occupied but the belts are not fastened. The ignitions will lock on next year's car if the seat belts aren't fastened.

But the insurance institute said its survey showed auto salesmen willing to offer a variety of means for drivers wanting to avoid using seat belts. One salesman reportedly noted "it's against the law for us to disconnect them" but said at a service station "they can cut the wire in about five minutes, no sweat."

Another salesman was quoted as saying that bypassing the system on the car was a simple matter of removing a fuse. Still other were said to have recommended leaving the belt buckled behind the seat or unrolling one end and wedging it under the carpet to keep it from retracting, the insurance institute

said.

A spokesman for the National Automobile Dealers Association said N.A.D.A. keeps its dealers advised of federal laws but hadn't dispensed any special information on the seat-belt warning devices. "Maybe we better," he said. "Somebody can throw them in jail

for that." A dealer who disconnects the warning device on a car is liable to a \$1,000 fine for each violation.

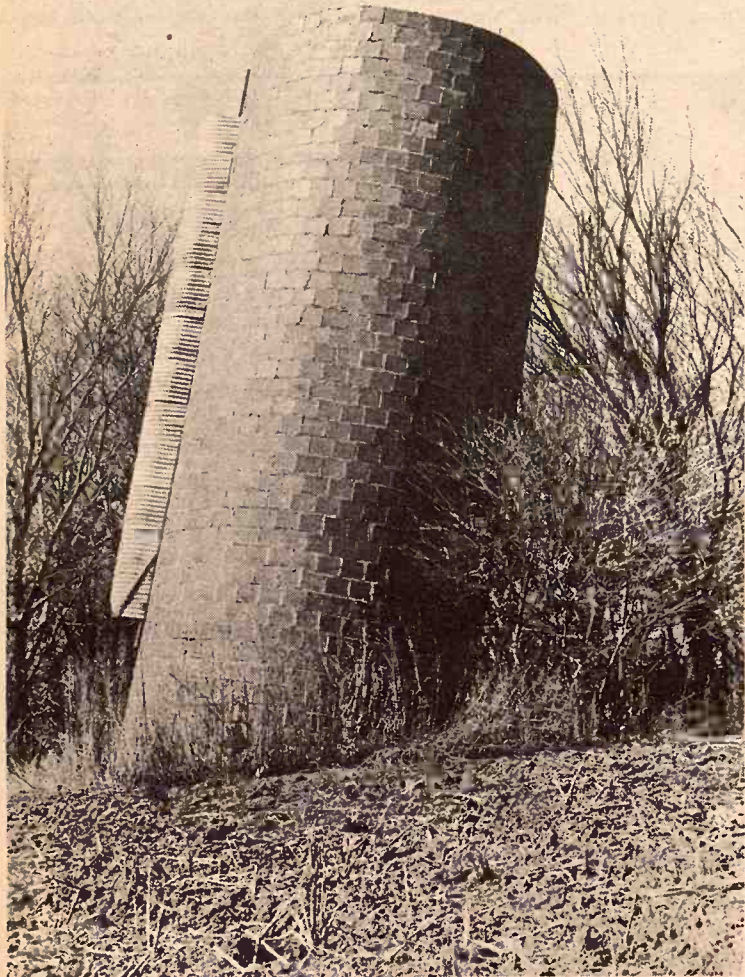

Rock City Opens Doors April 29

Rock City, Kansas, population 200 rocks, located in Ottawa county, southwest of Minneapolis will open for tourists April 29.

Last year over 37,000 people from 47 states and 17 foreign countries visited the unusual rock formations.

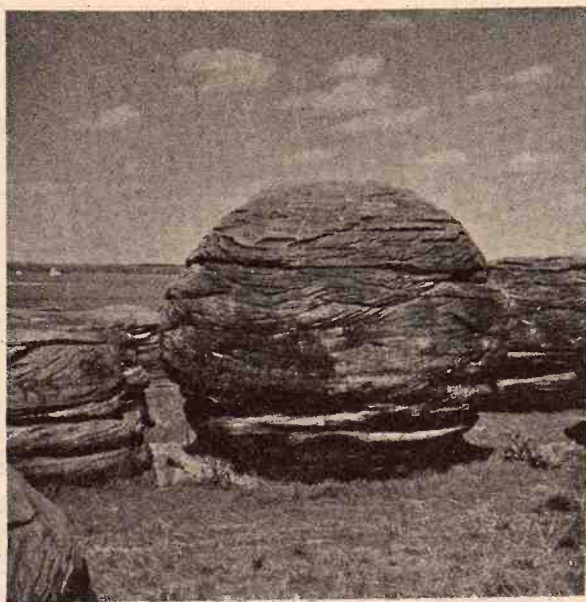
Lying two and one-half miles southwest of Minneapolis, the outstanding feature at Rock City is a group of Dakota sandstone concretions. These occur in three distinct groups confined to an East-West elongated strip about 125 feet wide and 1700 feet long. At least 200 individual concretions occur in three groups.

Some are twenty-seven feet in diameter and they are remarkable, not only for their giant size and great number but also for the many different shapes which they possess and for the splendid cross-bedding

which they contain.

Some are in the shape of perfect spheres, other are loaf shaped and still others are partly imbedded in

the Dakota sandstone, and in some, only a small portion of the upper surface of the concretion protrudes above the ground.

Meat Production In Kansas Down, Up Nationally

Red meat production in Kansas slaughter plants during February 1972 totaled 148 million pounds, down 5 percent from January 1972 but 15 percent more than in February 1971, according to the Kansas Crop and Livestock Reporting Service. Cumulative production for the first two months in 1972 totaled 303 million pounds, up 8 percent from the same period in 1971.

Beef production in Kansas during February 1972 was 122 million pounds, down 5 percent from January 1972 but 17 percent above February last year. The number of cattle slaughtered totaled 190,000 head, 5 percent below January 1972 but 14 percent above February 1971.

Average liveweight per head at 1,081 pounds was down slightly from January but 30 pounds more than in February 1971. Beef production during the January-February period was 250 million pounds, compared with 227 million pounds a year earlier.

Veal production in Kansas during February 1972 totaled 194,000 pounds, compared with 42,000 in February a year ago.

Pork production in Kansas during February 1972 was 26 million pounds, down 4 percent from January 1972 but 5 percent above February 1971. The number of hogs slaughtered totaled 164,000 head, 3,000 head more than in February 1971.

The average liveweight per head was 248 pounds, 7 pounds above the previous February. Cumulative production of pork during the first two months in 1972 totaled 53 million pounds, 4 percent less than in 1971.

Lamb and mutton production in Kansas during February 1962

totalled 16,000 pounds, with 45,000 pounds during February 1971. Lamb and mutton production for the first two months of 1972 totaled 32,000 pounds, 43 percent less than in the January-February period of 1971.

Commercial production of red meat in the 48 States totaled 2,877 million pounds in February, up 1 percent from a year earlier. Commercial meat production included slaughter in federally inspected and other slaughter plants, but excludes animals slaughtered on farms.

US Beef production in February was 1,715 million pounds, up 1 percent from the 1,616 million pounds produced in February 1971. The number of cattle slaughtered was up 6 percent. Average liveweight per head was 1,048 pounds, 3 pounds more than a year earlier.

There was 37 million pounds of veal produced in February 1972, down 10 percent from February 1971. Calves slaughtered during February were down 10 percent while the average liveweight increased slightly.

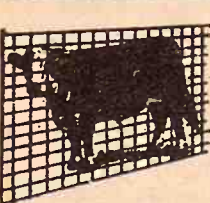
Pork production in February totaled 1,081 million pounds, up 1 percent from a year ago in the U.S. The number of hogs slaughtered was down 3 percent. Liveweight per head at 234 pounds was unchanged from a year earlier. Lard rendered per 100 pounds of liveweight was 6.3 pounds compared with 8.4 pounds in February 1971.

There were 44 million pounds of lamb and mutton produced in February 1972, down 2 percent from a year earlier. Sheep and lamb slaughter totaled 830,900 head, down slightly from February 1971. Average liveweight at 108 pounds was 1 pound below a year ago but pound above last month.

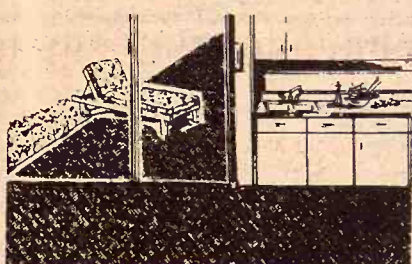

Grass & Park People Looking For Resort

April 11, 1972

Kansas Park people still have hope for a resort area near one of the Kansas federal reservoirs.

In fact the Kansas Park and Resources authority is willing to spend upwards of \$35,000 for the study.

The 1972 Legislature overrode Gov. Robert Docking's veto of a bill which will allow the authority to conduct a feasibility study of a potential site for a resort complex adjacent to a federal reservoir.

Before the authority could issue bonds up to \$10 million in bonds authorized in the bill, legislative approval would be required.

Top contenders for such a complex are Cheney Reservoir near Wichita and Perry Reservoir near Topeka.

"There are quite a few questions the park authority has to have answered," Burris said.

He said a feasibility study should take into consideration a number of factors such as the number of rooms which should be constructed, the level of concession services provided and the types of recreation facilities needed for year-around operation if such operation proves to be economically feasible.

The only site that has been considered because of the possibility of federal funding is Cheney — it could be the only feasible site because of these federal funds," Burris said.

Last December, the park authority attempted to secure federal funding for such a project at Cheney through the Economic Development Administration, but that request was denied because of the lack of money.

Burris said the No. 1 contender still is Cheney with Perry in second place, primarily because of Cheney's location in a high-population area.

He said Milford reservoir and "three or four others" will be involved in the first phase of the study.

So far, state and Sedgwick County officials have been unable to corral federal funds for the proposed resort at Cheney.

Lester Rosen, an aide to Rep. Garner Shriver, R-Kan., said the last development was an unsuccessful attempt by Sedgwick County Commission to secure funds to conduct a feasibility study on area tourism, which would have included Cheney. That application was to the Economic Development Administration.

The Economic Development Administration does not appear to be able to fund such a project as the proposed resort complex "under current funding," Rosen said.

Butz At KSU In Early May

MANHATTAN — Earl L. Butz, Secretary of Agriculture, will be a Landon Lecturer at Kansas State University, Manhattan, May 4, KSU

President James A. McCain has announced.

McCain said that Butz would speak at 10:30 a.m. in the KSU Auditorium as the 21st speaker in the famed series which honors Alf M. Landon, one-time Republican Party nominee for the presidency.

Butz will be the fourth Landon Lecturer of the school year at KSU and will be the second at K-State this spring. Appearing on the series last fall were Leonard Woodcock, president of the United Auto Workers, and Elliot Richardson, secretary of the Department of Health, Education, and Welfare.

The third speaker for the "Landon Lectures on Public Issues" series this year will be William D. Ruckelshaus, administrator for the Environmental Protection Agency (EPA), who lectures this Wednesday, April 12, at 10:30 a.m., in KSU Auditorium. His topic is "The Crisis of Trust in the Environmental Movement."

McCain said Ruckelshaus would fly to Manhattan from Washington, D.C., late Tuesday. He will leave the campus early Wednesday afternoon for Kansas City where he will visit EPA offices before returning to Washington.

As EPA administrator, Ruckelshaus is the nation's chief enforcer of federal laws on air and water pollution. In his Landon Lecture at K-State he is expected to discuss the rise of expectations in American society with regard to environmental conditions and how EPA combats the disillusionment which often follows initial efforts to curb pollution.

Both Ruckelshaus and Butz occupy sensitive posts in the federal government. Butz was a controversial appointee as Secretary of Agriculture early last winter and since then has stumped the country in behalf of better prices for agricultural products. Prior to becoming Secretary of Agriculture he was on the faculty of Purdue University.

Texas Longhorns Getting Respect

There was a joke among 19th century cattlemen that even the cowboy from Longhorn meat was too tough to chew.

Perhaps the reputation of the legendary Texas Longhorn as a lean-rumped source of leathery, stringy meat was undeserved.

At least, Darol Dickinson thinks so. Dickinson, a Texan, is best known throughout the country as a livestock photographer and painter, especially of horses.

About five years ago Dickinson bought a load of Longhorns as background material for some of his paintings. The animals lived as free boarders on the ranch, and Dickinson noted that there were fairly regular demands to buy calves.

Now he has started on a project aimed at public sale of semen for breeding purposes.

Dickinson felt that there was some market for Longhorns as animal reserve subjects, as roping stock, or as producers of the mighty horns. Soon he saw some possibilities in an interest in crossbreeding from stockmen who might want to experiment with the genetic possibilities of the Longhorn.

Might the Longhorn become another of the "exotics" sought out for breeding new or improved characteristics in cattle?

Some oldtime cattlemen have insisted that the Longhorn reached his high-hipped, lean-shanked appearance from a practice before the turn of the century of a cowman castrating all Texas Longhorn bull calves that looked as if they would make good steers. Poorer animals were retained as herd sires.

When Galloways, Durhams, Shorthorns and other English beef breeds replaced the Spanish-derived Longhorn, it promised to find oblivion. It almost disappeared as a breed, found only on the ranches of a few sentimental Texans.

The federal government established a herd to be preserved on a wildlife refuge at Lawton in the mid-1920s.

Another herd was established later on a refuge near Valentine, Nebr. There were thought to be only about 1500 genuine Texas Longhorns

in existence in 1964, when a Texas Longhorn Breeders Association was formed.

An animal scientist at Mississippi State, Stewart Fowler, is one who thinks the Longhorn may have unusual crossbreeding potential. He reasons that only the hardiest of the Longhorns survived and reproduced.

"Thereby, the Longhorn became relatively pure in many of its gene pairs related to survival, reproduction and production under harsh environmental conditions," Fowler says.

Fowler reasons from there that

cattle that perform well under harsh conditions will do well under optimum conditions. And more important, "cattle with a high concentration of unique, pure gene pairs impart maximum of hybrid vigor when crossed with cattle from a different genetic base."

Like the rugged mustang, the Longhorn is descended from breeding stock introduced by the Spanish. With no breeding program for several hundred years but the simple and harshly effective law of

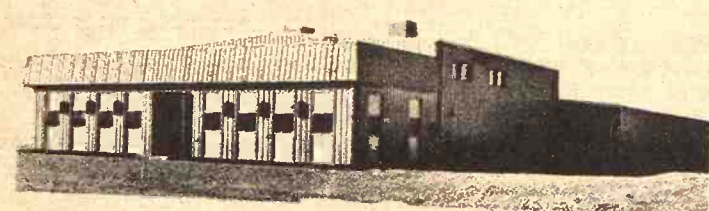

Steps Toward Getting Boxcars For Harvest Rush

In 3 months the combines will be starting their sweeps across the great wheat country of the USA, to be followed by the fall harvest of the soybean, corn and milo crops.

At the moment, all indications point to big crops on every one of the grains. Thus the nation's transportation system and its warehouse (elevator) industry face

the inevitable task of moving billions of bushels of grain and getting it under cover.

The stage is set for a boxcar shortage, but movements already are under way to avoid it, if possible. The government, which plays a major role in the grain handling and marketing system through its price support program, has machinery in operation to "make room" in the country for the new harvests.

Representatives of several major railroads and the Interstate Commerce commission will meet Wednesday with the Kansas City Board of Trade to make plans for efficient boxcar utilization. Similar meetings in recent years have been

fruitful.

Because of the record 1971 crops, more than the normal amount of grain is in storage now. Also, because of the dock strikes, some grain that would have moved overseas still is in this country.

A huge amount of grain has been put into storage under the government loan program. But the government does not actually own excessive quantities. The government agency which handles surplus grains is the Commodity Office of the Agricultural Stabilization and Conservation service of the U.S. Department of Agriculture in Kansas City. The acting director of this office is George L. Eastling.

Eastling revealed that the government owns only a little milo, no soybeans, and no barley. As of March 10, the government owned approximately 150 million bushels of corn, 172 million bushels of oats, and 361 million bushels of wheat.

The government gets title to grain when it takes it over under the loan program. As long as grain is still under the loan and the farmer has the opportunity to redeem his note, the government does not actually have control. This is the situation on most of the grain now in storage.

The transportation and storage problems vary by areas. In the Pacific Northwest, Eastling

said very little storage room exists either on farms or in port elevators. This area was hit hard by the West Coast dock strike. The principal relief in prospect for the storage problem is in exports. Fortunately, the wheat harvest does not start as early in that area as in the Southwest.

The spring wheat area of the North Central or Northwestern part of the country has little storage space available on farms, in country elevators, or at major terminals such as in Minneapolis and St. Paul. On a recent day, the Minneapolis-St. Paul elevators were filled to 78 percent of capacity including 44 million bushels of oats, which is a problem in itself.

Because market prices were low relative to government loan values, spring wheat farmers put a large part of their 1971 crop under the loan, and fewer of these loans have been redeemed than in the hard winter wheat area.

The government recently has been moving and will continue to move wheat from this spring wheat area to port elevators on the Gulf, to the Pacific Coast, and to elevators in line with export routes. These include Kansas City; Wichita; Enid, Okla., and Fort Worth, Tex.

The main corn and soybean area has a tight storage situation on farms, country elevators and at many terminals. Harvest does not take place until fall, but the government expects to move corn before that time to elevators in line with trade routes.

In contrast, the hard winter wheat and milo area of the Southwest does have storage space available in country and major interior elevators, and at the terminal markets.

Eastling has sent letters to the elevator operators in every state where grain is stored in appreciable quantities, advising them to survey their space requirements for the 1972 crops. If it is going to be necessary to move either government-owned or grain under loan before harvests, the letters urge that the government agency be notified promptly. Loading orders will be issued as soon as possible, the letters stated.

The letters emphasize that the Secretary of Agriculture is gravely concerned about the grain transportation problem this year. The government hopes to "reconcentrate" 300 million bushels of all grains before corn harvest start this fall.

Unfortunately, in many instances the elevator operators are not as anxious to empty their bins as the

government. They are earning storage fees and they want to earn them as long as possible. In addition, they want to be as certain as possible that the harvest will be good in their local areas. Thus there is a natural tendency to delay asking the government for load-out orders.

This creates a potential for the last minute rush and carries the threat of boxcar shortage.

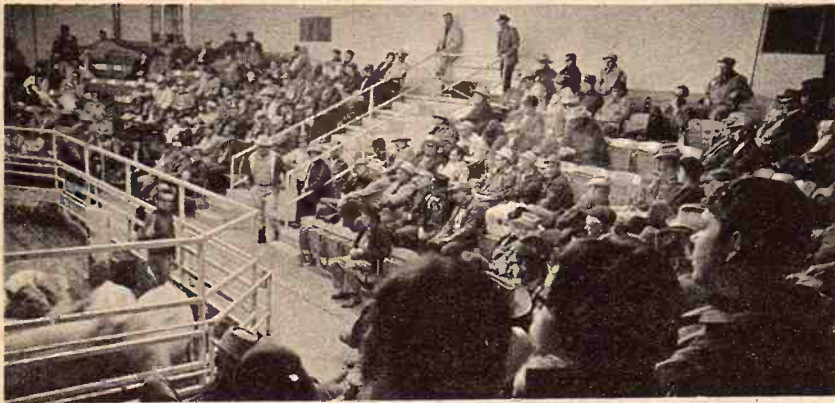

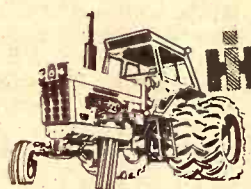

Restored Funds Add Million To Month's Welfare

The State Dept. of Social Welfare last week mailed out the first public assistance checks to reflect the increase in welfare grants voted by the 1972 Legislature.

A spokesman said the April mailing totaled \$5,281,223, which is \$1,022,455 more than the total of public assistance checks mailed last year.

The 1972 session voted the necessary funds to restore the general 20 per cent cut in welfare benefits made by the 1971 Legislature and Gov. Robert Bell.

The lawmakers voted the money to become effective for all categories of public assistance recipients during the final quarter of the present fiscal year — April, May and June of 1972. In addition, the Legislature voted sufficient funds to restore budget cuts for all of fiscal 1973 which begins on July 1.

The State Welfare Dept. spokesman said the amount of the monthly payments is slightly below the level for August, 1971, which is the first month before the budget cuts are applied to individual public assistance grants.

He said 39,001 public assistance checks were mailed, as contrasted with 43,012 checks which were mailed out in August, 1971.

The \$5.28 million sum does not include payments to doctors, dentists, hospitals and other vendors under the state's Medicaid program which includes any nursing home payments.

Welfare may be good for your bones and good for your heart, a doctor has suggested as an old argument flared.

Forrest H. Adams told an American Heart Association symposium that the butterfat content of whole milk may present a danger of heart disease to people

who drink a lot of it.

"If we're going to continue to use milk, it should be skim milk," said Adams, a pediatrician from the University of California at Los Angeles.

Dr. David Boyd of Boston, president of the American College of Chest Physicians, agreed with Adams that the widespread use of whole milk beyond infancy poses a threat.

The danger is more marked in the United States, they said, because milk is more widely used here than in most other countries.

But Dr. Michael DeBakey, the

noted Texas heart surgeon, countered, "The evidence is not clear that milk, for example, or foods that have high-fat content are causes of atherosclerosis."

That's the medical name for what happens when fatty deposits form sort of a sludge in the arteries. It's a leading cause of heart disease.

"We do know from statistical studies," DeBakey added, "that (high-fat foods) seem to contribute to atherosclerosis. But it's one thing to say they may contribute and another thing to say they cause the disease. We do not know the cause." Adams did not say he thinks milk

is a direct cause of heart disease, but said low-fat foods should be stressed instead.

"There should be created amongst children a greater consciousness of a good diet," Adams said. "They should be offered, at home and in the school-lunch program, a greater availability of meats and dairy products and baked goods with reduced saturated fats."

Saturated fats are the kinds present in fatty meats, milk and other dairy products. Unsaturated fats are those in vegetable oils.

"The 'holy' value of milk should be

Miller Eyes Corporate Farming

Attorney General Vern Miller has turned his attention from the drug trade to corporate farming. His office confirmed that they will be looking on two out-of-state corporations about their use of land

holdings in Kansas to determine whether they are violating the state's corporation farm laws. If the attorney general decides to bring legal action against the two foreign corporations it could bring the state's two-year-old law on corporation farming into play for the first time.

The attorney general revealed in a speech at Salina on March 16 that several farming operations were

under investigation by his office because of complaints which had been received accusing the firms of violating state laws on corporate farming.

The attorney general also said that some in-state farm operations still are under investigation for possible violation of Kansas corporation farm laws.

The law prohibits foreign corporations from engaging in the business of managing, owning or controlling large tracts of land for the purpose of engaging in agricultural or horticultural enterprises.

The Kansas law permits corporate farms, but restricts the size of such operations to 5,000 acres. It also requires that stockholders in the farm corporation be Kansas residents.

Miller said the two out-of-state companies will be advised that his office has received complaints about possible violation of Kansas

corporation farming statutes in regard to their operations.

He said the letters basically will ask the two companies for an explanation of specifically how they are using their land holdings in the state, and their basis for concluding that the usage complies with state laws on corporate farming.

"After we get their replies we'll make the decision whether or not they are in violation," Miller said, "and if we think they are we'll take

the appropriate legal action."

In his speech at Salina, Miller said his office has the authority to bring civil actions against such firms to oust, dissolve and enjoin their operations.

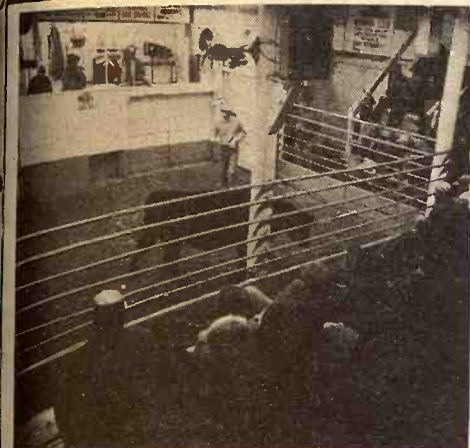

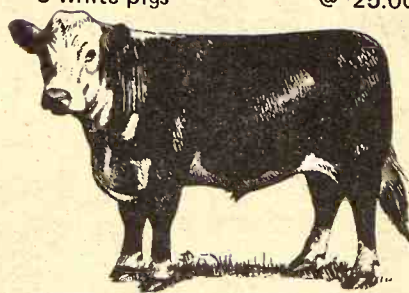
