



### FFA Accepts the President's Challenge

"I set before you this extraordinary challenge, asking every FFA chapter in this country to get involved in this basic question of energy conservation . . . ". That was President Carter's "unique call" to FFA chapters all across the country.

Carter, a former FFA secretary at Plains, Georgia, was speaking to the 1979 State President's Conference. The previous Sunday, he told the nation about his plan for energy conservation and allocation. Then, on July 19, he told the 96 state FFA officers gathered in the Rose Garden, "I will give recognition . . . to the one FFA chapter in the nation . . . who does the most outstanding job in carrying out this response to the energy crisis. I'm going to depend upon the FFA to take the lead in energy conservation . . . . I know you will do this, and it's a solemn commitment between me and you."

National FFA President Mark Sanborn immediately accepted the challenge on behalf of the FFA and enthusiastic applause ran through the crowd of blue and gold jackets.

Implementation of this challenge has followed with the FFA putting into motion a project, "The President's Challenge."

Six days after Carter issued his challenge, the National FFA Board of Directors approved a resolution outlining and providing for the funding of the project. Plans are now being made to distribute information about the challenge, including "commitment cards" and "action information," giving FFA chapters and members energy conservation ideas.

The program will run from August, 1979, through June 15, 1980. Individual FFA chapters are encouraged to accept the President's challenge, and include energy conservation projects in their ongoing programs such as Building Our American Communities (BOAC), and local Public Speaking Contests. In addition, it is hoped that chapters will see fit to aim new thrusts directly at what President Carter called "our war for energy security."

At the 1980 State President's Conference, recognition will be given to the one FFA chapter which has answered the President's call for conservation most effectively.

Plans are also being made to recognize outstanding energy conservation measures on the state level. Both levels of judging will utilize a panel of individuals from the

White House, U.S. Department of Energy, U.S. Department of Agriculture, U.S. Office of Education and others to determine the best efforts of chapters in energy conservation.

Included in the "action information" packet, mailed to FFA chapter upon request, will be ideas for chapter action, through programs to: increase energy efficiency in crop production, reduce home energy consumption, reduce highway fuel consumption, increase energy conservation awareness, increase energy efficiency in livestock production, and reduce school, business, factory and community building energy consumption.

A mailing including the commitment card and request form for "action information" on energy conservation will be made in late August to all FFA chapters, states, and teacher education institutions.

# Thirteen Kansas FFA Members to Receive American Farmer Degree

Thirteen Kansas members of the Future Farmers of America have been recommended to receive the American Farmer degree.

The 13 were recommended by the National FFA Board of Directors. They will be approved by the voting delegates and receive the award at the National FFA Convention, Nov. 7 to 9, in Kansas City, Mo.

The American Farmer degree is presented to about one member in 700 of the half-million member organization. This year 788 FFA members from across the nation will receive the cash award, gold key and certificate.

The American Farmers must have already earned the State Farmer degree, been active FFA members continuously for at least the past three years and have a record of participation in local chapter and state association activities. They must have earned at least \$1,000 by their own efforts from a supervised farming or agribusiness program and productively invested the money. The degree is presented only to those who have demonstrated their leadership and scholarship ability and who show evidence of becoming successfully established in an agricultural occupation.

# Kansas FFA Chapters to Receive Awards

Three Kansas Future Farmers of America chapters will be among 27 from across the nation that receive Gold Emblem awards in the FFA "Building Our American Communities" project this year.

The Columbus, South Barber (Kiowa) and Wamego chapters will receive their plaques at the National FFA Convention, Nov. 7 to 9, in Kansas City, Mo.

It is quite an accomplishment for oneninth of the national Gold Emblem winners to be from Kansas.

In addition to these three winners, the Plainville chapter will receive a Silver Emblem award, and the Arkansas City, Hill City and Norton chapters will receive Bronze Emblem awards.

The BOAC award winners are selected for outstanding efforts by the chapters to make their communities better places to live and work.

The Farmers Home Administration of the U.S. Department of Agriculture develops materials about rural development for chapter use, and Lilly Endowment Inc., provides awards and funds to develop additional program materials.

# "Preparing For Progress"

### **Announce Theme For National Convention**

The National convention of the Future Farmers of America (FFA) will be held in Kansas City, Missouri, on November 7-9, 1979, FFA officals have announced. This year's theme will be "FFA — Preparing For Progress."

FFA's convention, held consecutively for over 50 years in Kansas City, draws over 20,000 members, adults, advisors and guests each year to that city. National Contests testing agricultural skills and abilities, final judging for the National Agricultural Proficiency Awards and National Public Speaking Contests are major parts of the convention, as is the awarding of numerous honors and the appearance of several well-known speakers.

Dr. Rober H. Schuller, a positive thinker whose ministry is nationally televised on the "Hour of Power" television series will offer a keynote address. Charles Stenholm, a former vo-ag teacher, who is now a Texas congressman, will also speak to the convention audience, as well as Cotton Ivy, a country humorist often billed as the "new Will Rogers." Country singer Stella Parton will also appear at the FFA convention.

Midway through the convention, two top FFA individuals will be selected as Star Farmer and Star Agribusinessman of America, the FFA's highest awards recognizing ability in agricultural occupations. The election of six new National FFA Of-

Roe Bartle building Over 175 exhibitors are expected to be on hand to give FFA members and guests an insight into various agricultural careers. Universities, trade organizations, professional societies, government agencies, publishers, National FFA Foundation sponsors and advertisers in *The National FUTURE FARMER* Magazine are groups that will exhibit.

### Kansas FFA Chapters Win Safety Awards

Four Kansas Future Farmers of America chapters will be honored for outstanding safety projects at the National FFA Convention, Nov. 7 to 9, in Kansas City, Mo.

The Cherryvale and Marion chapters will receive Silver Emblem awards. Only 35 other chapters from across the nation will receive this second place group award.

The Plainville and Wamego chapters will be among 62 chapters that will receive the Bronze Emblem awards.

The Farm and Industrial Equipment Institute of Chicago and Dow Chemical U.S.A. of Midland, Mich., through the National FFA Foundation, sponsor the plaques and spurs that will be presented to the 119 chapters. Each chapter receives a plaque the first year it is recognized on the national level for outstanding safety projects, then receives a spur to attach to that plaque in following years.

The FFA safety program is designed to make students aware of the causes of accidents and how they can be prevented. Some of the year's national winners took surveys of farm and home safety, inspected auto and farm equipment, promoted and sold slow moving vehicle signs, established rural fire districts and illustrated farm chemical safety.

### Six Kansans To Be Named FFA Honorary American Farmers

Four Kansas State University faculty members and two high school vocational agriculture teachers will receive the highest award that can be presented to friends and supporters of Future Farmers of America, the Honorary American Farmer degree.

The gold keys and certificates signifying the degree will be presented to the six Kansans and 157 others from across the nation at the National FFA Convention, Nov. 7 to 9, in Kansas City, Mo.

K-State faculty to be honored are Dr. James Albracht, associate professor of adult and occupational education. Dr. Charles Norton, professor of animal sciences and industry; Paul Stevenson, associate professor of agricultural engineering; and Bob Broeckelman, instructor of adult and occupational education who serves as the Kansas FFA executive secretary.

T.D. Fanning, Mission Valley (Eskridge), and Powell Heide, Clifton, will be among 73 high school vocational agriculture instructors-FFA chapter advisers who will receive the award.

### Nine Kansas FFA Chapters to Receive National Awards

The Wamego and Plainville Future Farmers of America chapters are among 120 from across the nation that will receive Gold Emblem awards in the national chapter award program this year.

The Labette County (Altamont), Cherryvale, Erie, Hill City, Marion, Marysville and South Barber (Kiowa) chapters will receive Silver Emblem recognition. All awards will be presented at the National FFA Convention, Nov. 7 to 9, in Kansas City, Mo.

The applications were judged on a chapter's performance in 11 areas: supervised ag experience programs; cooperative buying, selling and assistance to members; community service; leadership development; sound programs of earnings, savings and investments; conduct of meetings; scholarships; recreation; public relations; state and national activites; and alumni relations.

### Name Rawls Head of Agriculture Education

Byron F. Rawls, of the U.S. Office of Education, has been named Program Specialist for Vocational Agriculture Education, a position which includes the responsibilities of National Future Farmers of America (FFA) Advisor, Chairman of the FFA Board of Directors, and President of the Board of Trustees for the FFA Foundation, Inc.

Rawls, a former member of the Pleasant Home, Alabama FFA Chapter, took over as Head of Vocational Agriculture, Agribusiness and Natural Resources Occupations when H.N. Hunsicker retired May 18. Rawls says his appointment is "just like going home," and is looking forward to getting back with the FFA.

"We are all looking forward to working with Byron Rawls," said C. Coleman Harris, National FFA Executive Secretary. "And I am pleased the Office of Education has moved to identify an experienced national leader in their program and agriculture to be the National FFA Advisor."

Rawls was a vocational agriculture teacher in Evergreen and Auburn, Alabama for ten years after receiving his Bachelor's Degree in Agriculture Education from Auburn University in 1949. While teaching in Auburn, Rawls also completed his Master's Degree in Agriculture Education.

From 1959 to 1964, Rawls was Alabama's FFA Executive Secretary. In 1964, he became Curriculum Development Specialist, a position he held until his appointment in 1966 to the U.S. Office of Education.

Rawls became Regional Program Officer of the U.S. Office of Education for seven midwestern states in 1966, head-quartered in Kansas City, Missouri. In 1968, he was named Regional Director of Vocational Education for the same area. While in Kansas City, Rawls worked closely with the FFA in planning its annual National Convention held in that city. Rawls moved to Washington, D.C., in 1978 when he became chief of the southern Branch for the Division of State Vocational Program Operations.

As Head of Vocational Agriculture Education, Rawls' responsibilities are providing national leadership in strengthening vocational agriculture instruction across the nation through workshops, conferences, and planning sessions. He will be involved in secondary, post-secondary and adult levels of agriculture instruction.

With his new responsibility as FFA Advisor, Rawls is concerned with working to increase membership in the FFA, which is an integral part of vocational agriculture instruction. Rawls is also interested in strengthening leadership training for state and local officers through stronger national and regional workshops. He is also concerned with maintaining close coordination between the National Organization and the individual state and local chapters.

Rawls is confident of the future of FFA, and foresees a very smooth transition period. He says, "the FFA is built on strong principles . . . we'll strive to strengthen those principles and carry on the tradition of FFA and vocational agriculture."

Rawls is also Chairman of the Board for the newly-formed National Postsecondary Agriculture Student Organization (NPASO), which recently held a very successful first Board of Directors meeting May 21-23.

The meeting at the White House was a highlight of a week-long State FFA Presidents' Conference in the Nation's Capital. The conference, sponsored by General Motors Corporation through the National FFA Foundation, Inc., is designed to help new state officers lead more effectively by expanding their knowledge of the FFA and the Nation.

Making a "unique call, especially tailored for the FFA," President Carter "challenged every FFA chapter in this country to get involved in this basic question of energy conservation and production tied intimately with food and conserving energy."

Carter then pledged to give "recognition to the one FFA chapter in the nation who does the most outstanding job in carrying out this response to the energy crisis." Carter completed his remarks by saying, "our nation desperately needs you, and I'm sure that our nation will not be disappointed in you."

Following the President's remarks, National FFA President, Mark Sanborn, thanked the President and speaking for all FFA members said: "We gladly accept your challenge."

The President was presented a plaque recognizing his membership in the FFA, and his office of Secretary of the Plains, Georgia, FFA Chapter, prior to his speech.

A breakfast with Congressmen preceded the White House visit. More than one hundred Senators and Representatives or their assistants attended this year's breakfast, to talk informally with the State Presidents about current and future national issues.

Representative Paul Findley, Illinois, responded for the members of Congress, saying, "whenever I'm with the FFA, I feel very reassured about the future of our nation. The FFA symbolizes achievement, efficiency in the production of food, and it symbolizes the commitment of our nation to education of farmers."

These newly-elected state officers began their week of leadership training and personal development Sunday, July 15, with registration and greetings from the National FFA Advisor, Byron F. Rawls, and the six National Officers.

Secretary of Agriculture Bob Bergland held an open question and answer period with the State Presidents, fielding questions about government energy plans, soil conservation thrusts and communication of the story of American agriculture. Bergland told the officers that: ". . . I've watched you perform both publicly and privately in many places . . . and I'm impressed, because you are straightforward, you are convincing . . . I'm not about to tell you how to do your thing. I know you do it well."

Each officer also individually visited his congressmen on Capitol Hill and two times

during the week Dr. Dan Dunham, Deputy Commissioner of the U.S. Office of Education spoke to the group about the important role they play in vocational agriculture education.

A number of informational and inspirational programs were held during the week with improvement of communication skills and cooperation as the goal.

On Friday a wreath-placing ceremony at the Tomb of the Unknown Soldiers at Arlington National Cemetery set a patriotic tone and the officers then visited many historical sites and museums around Washington, D.C.







### Kansas Executive Secretary Visits Paraguay

The idea of starting FFA in Paraguay was born in 1974 when Sam Brownback served as State FFA President. It became a reality in 1979 beginning August 13th when Bob Broeckelman flew to Asuncion, Paraguay, to share the FFA Concept with the Paraguayan officials. Over two weeks were involved sharing the American FFA Concept in Paraguay with students, instructors, Deans of Universities, Ag Extension Agents including 4-H even the Minister of Agriculture. Everyone seemed excited about the program and they are ready to move forward towards the establishment of a similar program in Paraguay.

Four very interesting days were spent at San Juan Bautista-Missions Agricultural school. A complete review of their school curriculum, programs and leadership activities was made. Following the four day review, a conference was held with the students and faculty at San Juan. Through the use of interpreter Señorita Laurel Easley; Agriculture extension supervisor in San Juan; Señor Juan Igmecio Torales and Señor Leopololo Rios, Director of the San Juan Agriculture School, the concept of FFA was explained in detail. After and during the conference, the San Juan students expressed extreme interest in starting FFA in Paraguay or FAP (Futuro Agriculturo de Paraguay). At the end of the conference, a student (Marcial Duarte) walked up before the group and gave an impromptu speech expressing San Juan's appreciation to the FFA and Kansas Paraguay Partners for taking their time and effort to try to help them start developing them to become future leaders of Paraguay. The San Juan students and faculty asked that their interest be expressed to the Minister of Agriculture and others in order to help start FAP in Paraguay as soon as was feasible. Furthermore, the students expressed strong interest in starting a student exchange program with Kansas as soon as possible. The students and faculty at San Juan are very special and friendly people and desire our help.

A concern I had was that it appeared Paraguay needed our technical help first before we continue sending American manufactured equipment with manuals written in English. It is far more important to have one less tractor, if they could have school books and technical manuals instead. Their library resources are very limited, even at the University level.

Time was also spent with the Director of Agriculture Extension in Paraguay, Señor Juan Molinas and Señor Andres Penayo, Director of 4-C.

With the assistance of Ing. Nelson de Barros, Secretary of Technical Education, I was given the opportunity to visit with Ing. Hernando Bertoni, Minister of Agriculture. This was a real highlight of my trip which gave me the opportunity to share the concept of FFA with him. He was somewhat familiar with the program already and concluded that he felt the program was excellent and important for Paraguay's future. Hopefully, the Minister will have the opportunity to visit Kansas in the near future.

My final visit was with Mr. David Alverson, Rural Development Officer for A.I.D. After sharing with Mr. Alverson along with one of the operational program grant (OPG) officers, they expressed an interest in receiving a proposal in regards to starting FFA or FAP in Paraguay.

On August 27, 1979 before my return to Kansas, I had a conference with Ing. Nelson de Barros concerning my findings and conclusions of the trip. We concluded that:

- 1. There is a need in Paraguay for a program similar to FFA in Kansas.
- There is a need to improve the overall capacity of the instructors at the agricultural schools.
- 3. There is a need for getting temporary instructors that speak Spanish who can train agricultural instructors in

- Paraguay in the areas of leadership development, curriculum development and the latest agricultural techniques.
- 4. We need to start a student exchange program as soon as possible, There is a real need to invest in the Paraguayan Youth for the future.

After returning to Kansas, I visited with Mr. Lennie Gamage, Director of FFA International Programs at the National FFA Center, concerning my visit to Paraguay. He was pleased to hear about the success of the trip and the enthusiasm of the Paraguayan people to start FFA. He suggested the writing of (OPG) Operational Program Grant Proposal, similar to the one they are presently completing in Panama. It involved sending a Spanish Speaking Instructor to Panama for several months to start the FFA program as well as the student exchanges and the training of an individual in the United States to develop curriculum and FFA materials in Spanish. He said the plan worked very efficiently and agreed to begin making the initial contacts in Paraguay to follow a similar pattern.

Kansas shares a partnership with Paraguay through the Partners of Americas program which was started by

In other words, they must have had physical examinations, be certified as eligible by the principal, meet scholastic standards for eligibility, age requirements, and all other general standards for eligibility.


Kansas FFA was extremely proud of all of those FFA members and chapters who exhibited at the Sunflower State Expo this year.



### Successful Food For America Effort

"Food For America" is an effort by FFA Chapters across the nation to tell the story of modern agriculture to elementary school children. Chapter members are being aided in their effort by a set of instructional resource material that includes a Farm Art Book and a film provided through the National FFA Organization. The Farm Art Book contains interesting illustration of agricultural facts that students can color or illustrate themselves. One of the pictures was used in a coloring contest among the four grades. The film -Food From Farm To You — explains in elementary terms how food is produced and ends up on supermarket shelves.

The entire "Food For America" project is co-sponsored through the National FFA Foundation, Inc., by four agricultural businesses: American Breeders Service, J.I. Case, Chemagro Agricultural Division, and DeKalb Ag Research, Inc. Funds from the sponsoring companies and from the FFA Foundation General Fund have been used to develop and distribute resource materials and to offset the costs of distributing the film.

Following the classroom instruction and film on agriculture, chapter members Jeff Brockhoff and Ronnie Hirsch had made arrangements to bring some farm animals and other agricultural displays to the school classroom so the children would have an opportunity to see and touch live farm animals and farm crops. In the Junior Division Steve Leary and Jon Larson exhibited their gates.


### Members Attend Washington Conference
