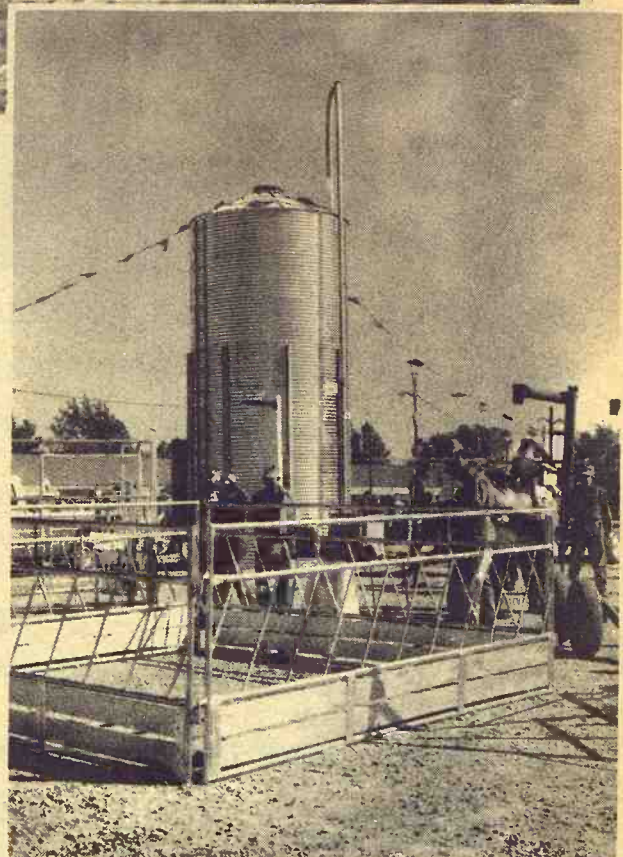
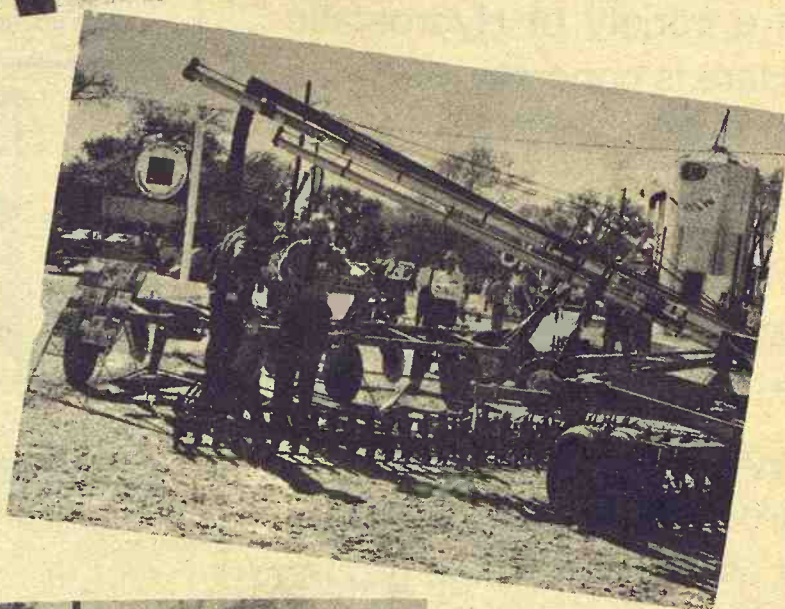
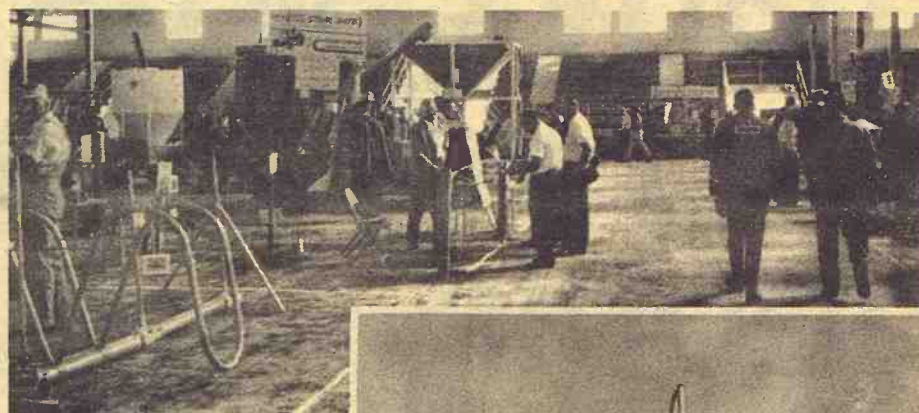

# An Optimistic Look At '68 Farm Income

Prospects point to continued improvement in farm prices and incomes from last fall's levels, according to Rex F. Daly, chairman of USDA's Outlook and Situation Board.

Speaking at a department of economics seminar at Kansas State University, Manhattan, Daly noted that substantial increases in output of livestock

products and crops resulted in declining prices and incomes during 1967.

Looking to 1968, Daly sees some increases in average prices for crop and livestock products if production gains are small. Prospects for slightly larger marketings and higher average prices point to larger cash receipts.

However, a continued rise in production expenses would absorb most of this increase, the economist said. But he noted that some gain in net farm income now appears likely for 1968.

"It's still too early to tell much about 1968 crops," Daly said.

"A further small gain in total crop output appears likely this year if growing conditions are average, even though production of food and feed crops is expected to run below the record 1967 output.

"With production of livestock products indicated the same to slightly larger, a small gain in overall farm output appears likely for 1968."

The economist looks for domestic use of livestock products and crops to increase slightly

this year, with most of the small overall gain coming in the grains. Exports are also expected to increase in calendar 1968, perhaps back to near the record volume of 1966.

"Available indicators suggest supplies of pork and fed beef in the first half of 1968 will continue slightly above the large volume of a year earlier," he said. "Although prospects for the last half of 1968 are less certain, continued large supplies of beef and pork are likely.

"Broiler supplies are expected to continue around year-earlier

levels in the coming months. Turkey supplies probably will remain large because of big stocks; big production cutbacks are indicated for the main turkey key crop this season.

"Egg production continues a little above year-earlier rates, but will likely drop later this year and run below the last half of 1967."

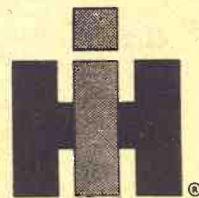

# 10 Million Fewer Acres Planted

## Bulk Of Decrease In Wheat And Corn Predicted

U.S. farmers this year will plant at least 10 million fewer acres in crops than last year, a reduction equivalent to plowing up a five-mile swath across the width of Iowa.

Indications are that 305 million to 306 million acres will be seeded to the nation's 59 major crops this year, according to a national survey of farm economists, Government officials, agronomists, farmers and commodity dealers. Last year's 316 million acres were the biggest plantings in seven years.

The smaller plantings are reflected in a Government report covering farmers' March 1 planting intentions on 17 crops with some indication of prospects on total seedings.

These early intentions can differ sharply from the final plan-

ted acreage because of weather at planting time, price changes and even the government report itself, which is intended to help farmers make acreage decisions. Spring planting already has started in the South, but will reach a peak in late April and May.

Even with the expected acreage reduction, 1968 U.S. agricultural production may not drop correspondingly. Roby L. Sloan, agricultural economist for the Federal Reserve Bank in Chicago, figures this year's output could approach last year's record with a slight possibility of hitting a new peak.

Indeed, heavier fertilizer applications (which farmers are ordering), favorable spring weather and timely summer rains could nudge the U.S. all-

crop production index to around last year's record of 116% of the 1957-59 base of 100. The crop index for 1966 was 112% the third largest on record, and 18% higher than in 1956.

As always, weather is the key factor. Moisture has diminished in the southwest Great Plains wheat country in the past several weeks, and although no material damage has been done, there is always worry about possible drought.

And it could rain too much this spring in the corn belt, delaying plantings and even switching planting intentions. Adverse weather during the growing season not only reduces yields, but increases the acreage loss between plantings and harvest. Last year 301 million acres were harvested of the 316

million planted; about 10.2 million acres were lost the year before.

The likelihood of less acreage and possibly bumper production shows up most clearly in wheat and corn, which alone account for nearly all the expected planting reductions. The Government slashed 1968 wheat acreage allotments 13% and switched its corn price-support program to encourage idling of more corn acres.

Last fall, winter wheat farmers planted 49,700,000 acres, down 8%, or 4,600,000 acres, from a year earlier. Nonetheless, the Government predicts a winter wheat crop this summer of 1,203,619,000 bushels, only 8,500,000 bushels less than the harvest last year on the much larger acreage.

In northern spring wheat areas, where the crop will be planted mostly in April, indications are for reductions slightly less than the allotment cutback. This could result in a total 1968 wheat acreage reduction of nearly 6,000,000 acres.

Estimates on corn acreage reduction range widely from 3.5 million acres to 7 million acres.

Some analysts have scaled down their original estimates to around 5 million acres.

Grain sorghum seedings also will be reduced, in part because of Government encouragement through its feed-grain program.

D. G. Nelson of the Grain Sorghum Producers Association in Amarillo, Texas, says sign-ups of sorghum acreage under the government program have been greater than expected in heavy producing areas of Texas, a few counties in New Mexico and the Oklahoma Panhandle. The reduction reflects good winter wheat prospects. Sorghums are interchangeable with wheat; when wheat prospects are unfavorable the fields are plowed up and replanted

with sorghums.

Analysts note that farmers may be using the Government program as a hedge against bad spring weather. If planting weather is favorable, they can withdraw some of their idle land and plant it without a penalty.

The biggest acreage increase will come in cotton. Analysts figure plantings will cover between 11,000,000 and 12,000,000 acres, up from 9,433,000 acres planted last year.

The Government wants larger plantings now that surplus stocks have been whittled to about normal levels, thanks partly to last year's extremely bad growing conditions that cut the crop to the smallest since 1895. Some analysts think that even 12,000,000-acre plantings will need excellent weather to grow a crop that will meet prospective demand of about 13,500,000 bales in the 1968-69 season beginning Aug. 1.

Planting changes among other crops will be small. Observers think the eight-year growth in soybean acres may be slowed or halted.

Howard Grow, administrative assistant of the American Soybean Association in Hudson, Iowa, says, "We expect soybean seedings to be in the neighborhood" of last year's record 40,680,000 acres. Other analysts are divided on a slight decrease or small increase.

Some southern acreage will be taken from soybeans and put into cotton, while some Midwest farmers will try other crops because soybean demand has slackened.

## Farm Interest At K-State Engineer Show

Prevention of water and air pollution, water pumping and the effects of snow on various windbreak and building arrangements will be three of the major projects being created by Kansas State University agricultural engineers for the 44th annual Engineers' and Architects' Open House, to be held at the University March 29-30.

"One of the major problems in rural areas is pollution of rivers and streams by feedlot run-off," explained Uniontown junior John George, director of the sanitation research project. "Different methods have been tried to reduce the pollution potential of various animal wastes. Two of the methods that we will be dealing with are the use of aerobic and anaerobic bacteria to decompose the wastes so that they will not be such a threat to nearby bodies of water."

The anaerobic digester seals air out of the wastes and allows them to decompose without polluting the air. The aerobic digestion method uses some mechanical means of incorporating sufficient oxygen into the wastes so that they decompose aerobically with little or no odor."

Don Scott, Highland senior, is in charge of the well draw down and performance exhibit. "The subject of this demonstration will be to show the effect

that continuous pumping can have on the water table level and the paths the water takes as it travels through the aquifer. This will be accomplished by using a transparent tank filled with sand to simulate the performance of a well in use in an irrigated field. Dye will be introduced into the sides of the tank at various levels to show the draw down curves of the water."

The third major exhibit will involve a windtunnel, model buildings and windbreaks, according to creator Rodney Horn, McPherson junior. "Model buildings and windbreaks

will be placed in a windtunnel and artificial snow will be introduced into the air stream. The buildings will be placed in different arrangements so that the drifting and snow loading can be observed in each. The windbreaks will also be placed in different positions to determine the best placement for each building arrangement."

Theme for the 1968 Open House is "Engineering, Architecture and Your Future." Glenn Alpert, Paola senior, is over-all student chairman.

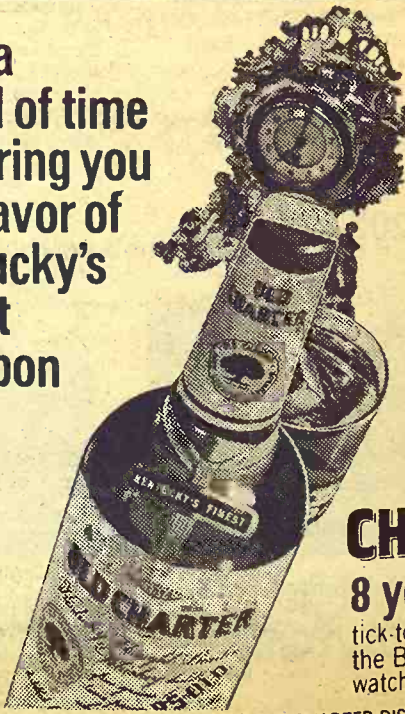

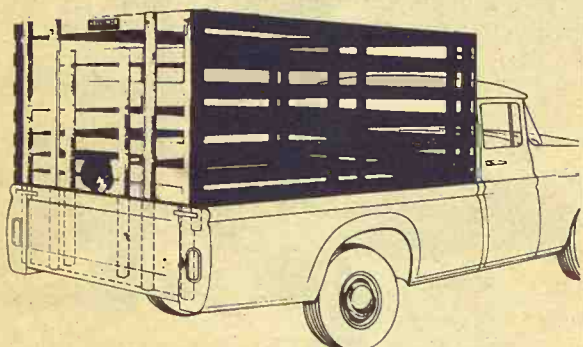

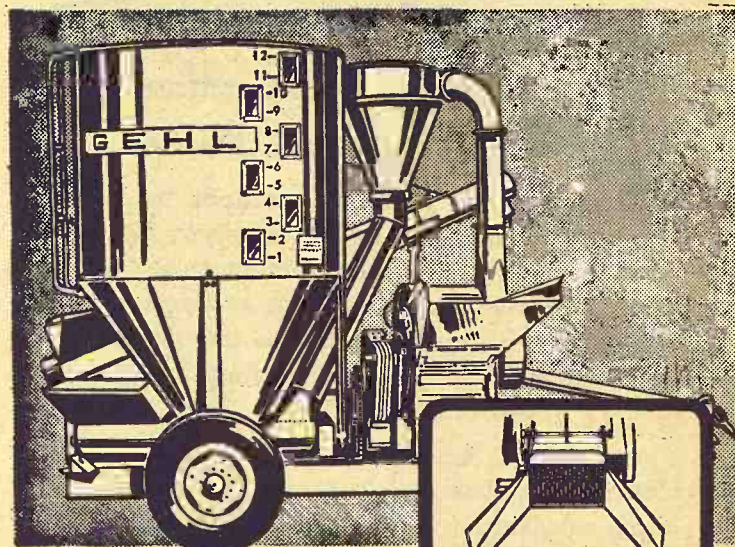
The facility, owned by the Kansas City Stock Yards company, has been used in recent years for feeding cattle instead of sheep. Jay Dillingham, company president, said continued operation of the stock yards was no longer economically feasible.

Dillingham said the property was for sale or lease and that several inquiries had been received from prospective operators.

On the main line of the Santa Fe railroad near the south bank of the Kaw river, the feed yard first was owned by the railroad and operated by the Patterson and Hill Sheep Company. It once was destroyed by fire, and was heavily damaged in the 1951 flood.

After the flood, the stock yards company purchased 40 acres of the property and rebuilt many of the barns and pens. Only cattle have been fed there in the last two years. There is capacity for 7000 head.

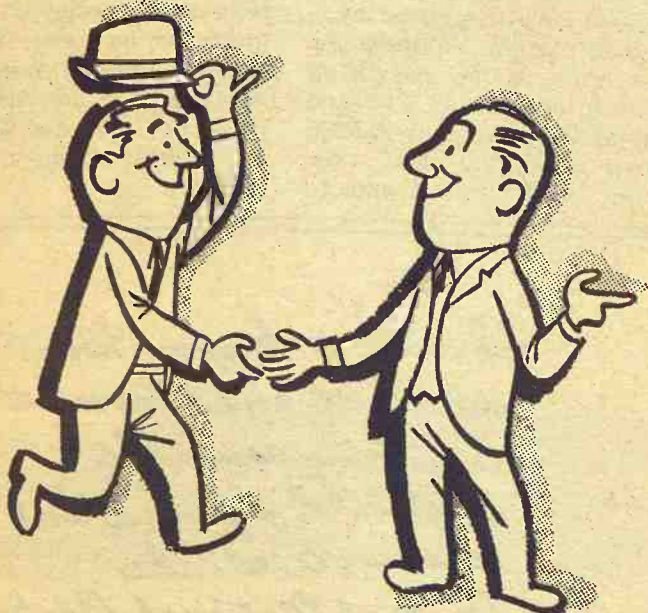
The new contract is effective April 1. Union News Co., managed the restaurants under the old contract.

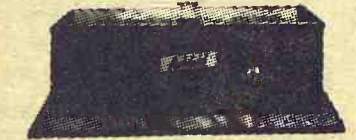

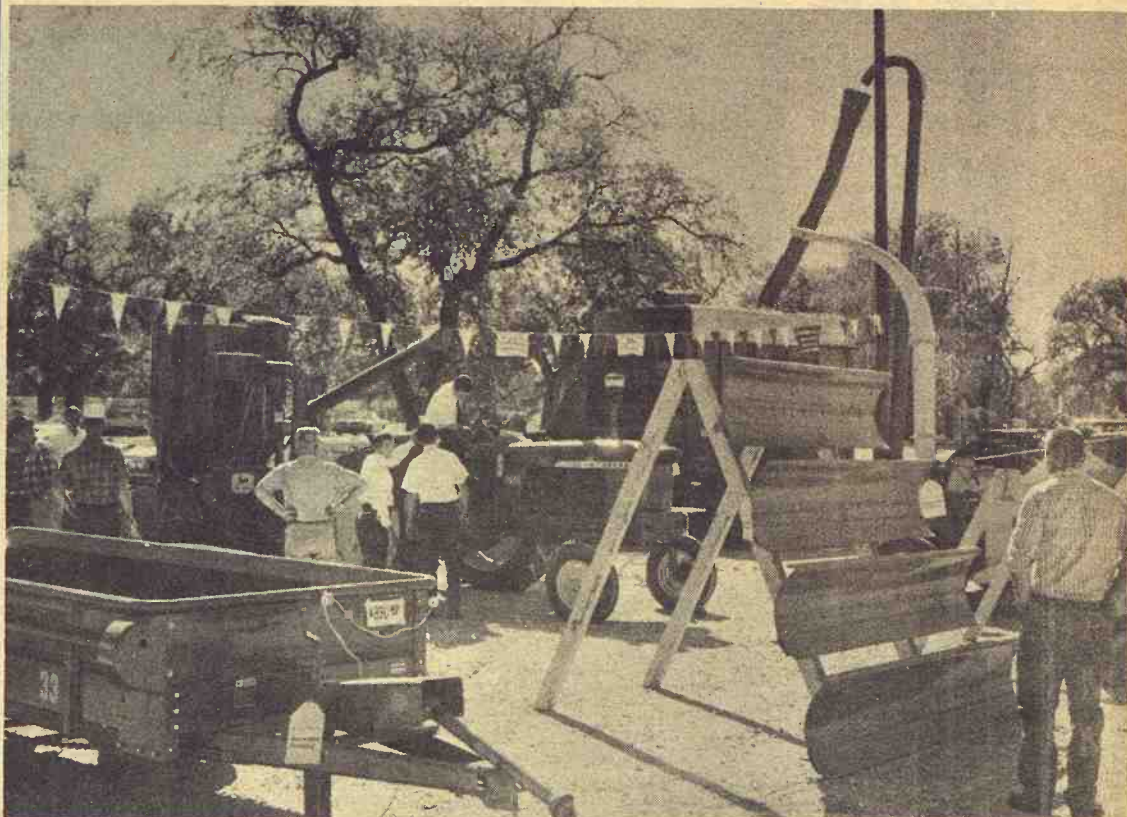

# So You Want To Play In The Futures Market?

Want to buy pork bellies or live cattle on the futures market? Do soybean and wheat contracts give you the itch to make some big money in the futures market?

The first step, says economist

Sylvia Porter, in one of her columns is simple: have \$10,000 in pure risk capital. By that, she means money which you can afford to lose if you guess wrong on your commodity choices or on timing.

If you are still determined to speculate in the commodity markets, and are aware of the risks involved, here are basic ground rules as presented by Merrill Lynch, Pierce, Fenner & Smith:

1. Before you put down a dollar in commodities, choose a category of commodities which interests you — wheat, frozen orange juice, silver, beef — and find out everything you can about the product. Areas you should study include price trends in recent years and months and current forces acting on the price of the product (weather, crop forecasts, government policies, inflation, cur-

rency changes, international politics). Possible sources of information are financial publications, trade publications, up-to-date books on commodity speculation, research from your brokerage firm, and lectures (often unadvertised) offered by firms.

2. Choose a brokerage firm which has had extensive experience in commodity futures trading, and which can provide you with facts on the commodities which interest you.

3. Also, before you invest, decide exactly how much money you can afford to risk. And decide how high is your goal for profits. In essence, make a plan, in advance, designed to limit your losses and to achieve profits which will be great enough to cover the series of small losses which you, as a commodity speculator, must expect to sustain over a period of time. As a general rule, aim for profits at least twice as high as the losses you are willing to take.

4. Avoid taking big losses by placing a stop order, to sell if your losses exceed a certain predetermined level. Consult a qualified broker on where the stop order should realistically be placed, and don't shrink from taking small losses frequently.

5. Don't sell out at small profits. Virtually the only way to make long-range profits in this market is to hold out for a few very substantial price rises among your speculations.

6. Don't risk the bulk of your capital on any single trade, even if you're convinced there is overwhelming evidence of a

price rise in the commodity you choose. Unforeseen events of many kinds, from politics to weather, could drastically change the price outlook for your chosen commodity.

7. Risk only an amount of capital which is a fraction of the profits you believe you can anticipate.

8. Trade only on the basis of solid information. Don't plunge in on tips or rumors which might be solely aimed at tricking you into buying or selling.

9. Don't be mesmerised by the small margin requirements. For example, if the margin on a soybean contract is \$600 and the total value of your \$18,500 contract rises \$100, don't take this tiny profit. This is akin to

selling a stock priced at \$18.50 to net \$1 a share after commissions.

10. Approach commodity trading as an avocation rather than as a one-shot deal. Expect the first two to three years to be "education," very possibly costing you some of your capital.

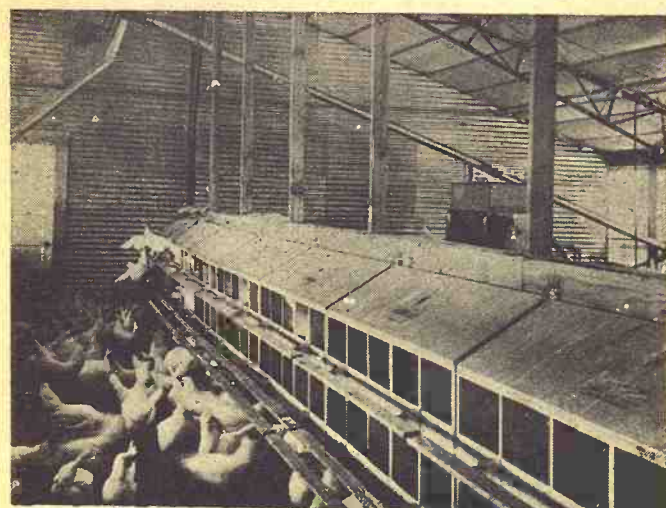
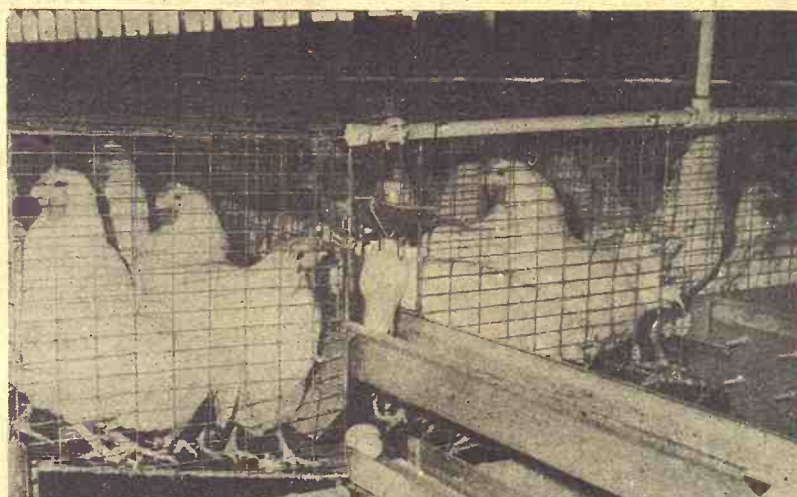

## Appliance Makers Aim To Simplify Product Guarantee

Appliance makers, stung by recent criticism of their warranties, are working to make their warranty statements more intelligible to the average housewife. Whirlpool Corp., a Benton Harbor, Mich., appliance maker, says it's doing away with its warranty certificate com-

pletely and substituting a warranty letter "in the simplest possible language" for all its own brand appliances.

The Frigidaire division of General Motors Corp. says it has simplified its warranty provisions considerably within the past two years and plans further action. A spokesman for Admiral Corp. claims it also plans to make its warranties more intelligible.

In the past, the warranties, which state what free parts and services companies will provide

if the appliance proves defective, were often filled with legal "gobbledygook," an appliance executive concedes.

"The warranty is usually written by lawyers and it looks as if they're being paid by the word," he adds.

Appliance warranties came under fire recently when Betty Furness, President Johnson's special assistant on consumer affairs, complained that warranties were often confusing.

In simplifying the language in its warranty, Whirlpool wrote an open letter to Miss Furness and noted she "had some pretty strong words to say about warranties". Whirlpool conceded it couldn't "completely disagree" with her.

The new Whirlpool warranty program involves no change in the basic protection, which includes payment of parts (except light bulbs) and labor on any appliance found "defective in materials or workmanship" during the first year of ownership.

In the second year, Whirlpool pays for defective parts but doesn't cover labor costs, under the warranty.

Certain essential parts in some appliances, such as the gear case assembly in the automatic washer, have longer warranties. Other manufacturers offer similar warranty protection.

The Whirlpool letter for its automatic dryer contains about 300 words, including the actual warranty, which totals approximately 120 words.

Previously, the Whirlpool warranty on home laundry equipment totaled almost 300 words. The old warranty began:

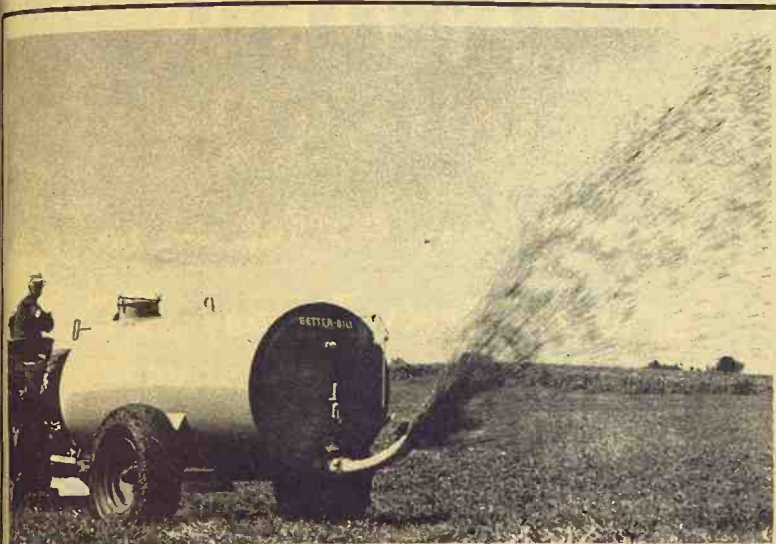
"Whirlpool Corp. warrants to the original retail purchaser of a Whirlpool brand automatic washer, wringer washer or clothes dryer (herein called 'appliance') that it will, free of charge, repair or exchange, at its option, the following parts specified below by a service organization authorized by either Whirlpool or its distributor and found by Whirlpool to be defective in material or workmanship . . ." The entire first sentence contains 120 words.

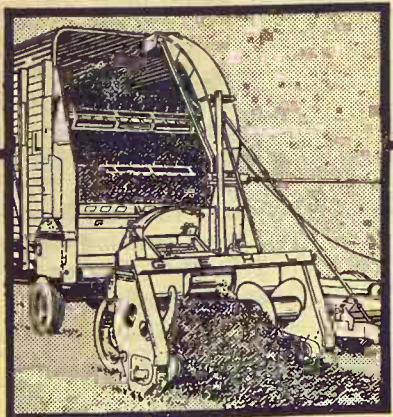

- 2 eggs, beaten

Butter a 9x5x2 1/4-inch loaf pan. In a large bowl combine the biscuit mix, cornmeal, sugar and cheese. Mix buttermilk and eggs. Add to dry ingredients, stirring until blended. Turn into the prepared pan, spreading evenly to edges. Bake at 350 degrees 40-50 minutes, or until a cake tester comes out clean inserted in center of loaf. Remove from pan and set on a wire rack to cool completely.

#### ITALIAN GNOCCHI WITH PUMPKIN

1 pound potatoes  
Cook with jackets on until tender. Peel and mash, then add:

- 1 teaspoon salt
  - 1 egg
  - 1/2 cup canned pumpkin
  - 1 cup all purpose flour
- Work dough until it is of medium consistency. Roll out to form rope 1-inch thick. Cut into 3/4-inch pieces and drop into boiling salted water. When they all float to top, simmer for about three minutes. Lift out with perforated ladle and drain well. Serve with a meat spaghetti sauce or melted butter and grated cheese.

Cite Shortage  
Of Vet Doctors

Animal doctors grow scarce, hindering recruiters for state agencies.

The American Veterinary Medical Association calls the need for vets "fantastic"; it estimates 7000 more are currently required.

An official of Kansas State's veterinary college says there are "at least five times as many job openings as students to fill them." The University of Georgia searches unsuccessfully for a qualified vet to fill a \$17,500-a-year teaching post.

The tough new Federal meat inspection law adds to needs. Illinois' meat inspection division has openings for 15 vets. To get vets to check horses at Illinois race tracks, the state pays \$85 daily, up from \$50 four years ago.

Major reasons for the states' shortages: Insufficient capacity of veterinary schools and an increasing flow of graduates into private practice.

Still, an Atlanta attorney complains he was unable to find a vet to make a house call when his horse took sick.

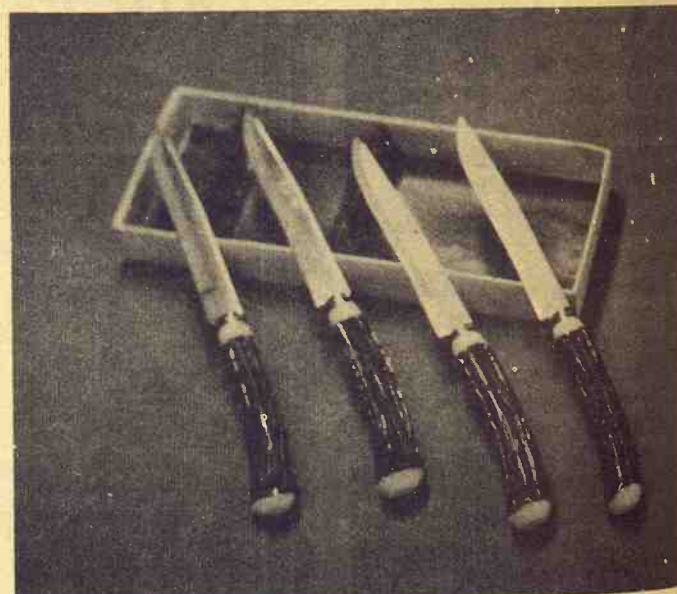

## Shearing School Set In April

The Kansas sheep shearing in-  
dustry is worth about \$190,000  
a year, figuring the going rate  
of 50 cents per head for 380,000  
head of sheep in the state. Most  
shearing is done by about a  
hundred custom shearers in  
Kansas; however, a few produc-  
ers do their own shearing, ac-  
cording to V. E. McAdams, Ex-  
tension livestock specialist at  
Kansas State University.

In support of this industry,  
KSU conducts an annual school  
for shearers and this year's ev-  
ent is scheduled for April 22, 23  
and 24 at Hutchinson on the  
State Fair grounds. Bob Welsh,  
Mt. Vernon, Ohio, 1963 national  
shearing champion, will be the  
instructor.

Wool sales are about a third  
of the income from a sheep op-  
eration. Last year Kansas sheep  
produced more than 3 1/2 million  
pounds of wool valued at about  
\$1 1/2 million. An above average  
shearer can shear 100 to 125  
head in a 10-hour day.

## Federal Park Permits Put Back In Effect

Federal public-use areas at 68  
reservoirs in 18 states will re-  
quire entrance permits from  
April 1 until March 31, 1969, un-  
der a directive issued by Col.  
James B. Meanor, Jr., executive  
director of civil works for the  
Army Engineers.

The order implements a deter-  
mination by Stanley R. Resor,  
secretary of the Army, which  
rescinded an order of April 11,  
1967, which removed the per-  
mits.

A \$7 permit will be good for  
entrance to all areas for a one-  
year period. A \$3 permit will  
be good for six months and per-  
mits costing a maximum of a  
dollar will be good for one day  
at a specified area.

Designated areas in Kansas in-  
clude:

Council Grove — Richey Cove,  
Neosho Park.

Milford — Rolling Hills,  
School Creek, Timber Creek,  
Farnum Creek.

Pomona — Wolf Creek.  
Tuttle Creek — Stockdale.

Designated areas in Nebraska  
include:

Harlan County — Gremlin  
Cove, Hunters Cove.

Other states affected include  
Arkansas, California, Georgia,  
Kentucky, Mississippi, Montana,  
North Carolina, North Dakota,  
Ohio, Oklahoma, Pennsylvania,  
South Dakota, Tennessee, Tex-  
as and Virginia.

Meanor has ordered the pla-  
cing of signs by April 1 at each  
designated area. One will give  
advance warning of an entrance  
fee and a second will be posted  
near the entrance.

A notice of violation will be  
placed by park rangers under  
the windshield of all vehicles  
found without a permit. If pay-  
ment of the fee is not received  
within 20 days, prosecution will  
be recommended to a U.S. attor-  
ney.

## No Interest In Milford' Marina

JUNCTION CITY — Plans for  
opening a marina in the Pleas-  
ant View State Park at Milford  
Reservoir near here have re-  
ceived a setback as no bids on  
the project were received from  
private operators by the extend-  
ed Feb. 28 deadline.

Lynn Burris Jr., Topeka, di-  
rector of the Kansas Park Au-  
thority, said private develop-  
ment of the facility is neces-  
sary because the legislature pro-  
vided no authority for state de-  
velopment and operation of ma-  
rinas.

Burris said the original Feb.  
20 bid-opening date had been ex-  
tended to Feb. 28.

"I was deeply disappointed in  
the lack of bids because I felt  
a marina would be a highly de-  
sirable phase of the Pleasant  
View development," Burris said.

"Because of the relatively  
short time remaining before  
the opening of the season, it  
will be difficult now to consider  
a bid that would permit a de-  
veloper and operator to go  
ahead with operations in this  
summer season."

Burris said the KPA is still  
interested and talking with peo-  
ple who may want to bid on the  
concession.

The operaor will be required  
to install floating covered boat  
docks, a fuel dock, boat repair  
and sale area, refreshment fa-  
cility and other accommodations  
required by boaters, skiers and  
fishermen.

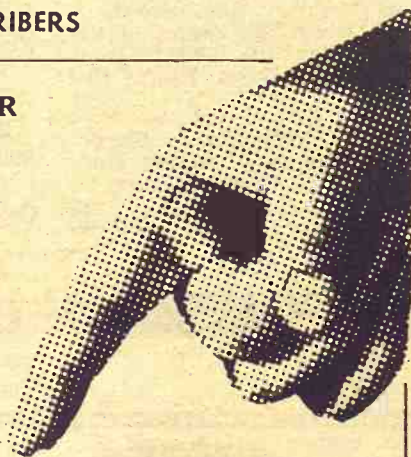

## Weed Supervisors See New Problems

Kansas faces increased problems with weeds not only in crop production but in dangers to recreation facilities, the state weed control directors said at a conference at Wichita.

"Many farmers are asking help with their water weed problems," said Freeman E. Biery, Kansas director of noxious weeds. "And weeds pose a \$30 million threat to the state's agricultural land production."

An army of 240 county weed directors, county and state officials here to attack Kansas' weed problems heard a battery of speakers.

"Weeds in farm ponds rob fish of both nutrients and space," said Dr. Robert C. Hiltibran, biochemist, Illinois Natural History Survey, Urbana. "They also interfere with recreational fishing and water skiing and should be eradicated."

Hiltibran said to deal adequately with the problem, the weeds first must be identified and the proper aquatic herbicide applied.

Dangers of dealing with herbicides and pesticides were explained by Dr. William Eckert, M.D., associate director of laboratories at St. Francis Hospital and deputy Sedgwick County coroner.

"Most potent of insecticides needing the greatest care in handling is parathion," he said. He cited deaths occurring from accidental mixture of parathion with flour at Bogota, Colombia, and Tijuana, Mexico.

"The public should be alerted to the fact that pesticides and herbicides to a smaller extent are very potent," he said.

Dr. Curtis C. Drevets, allergy specialist at the Wichita Clinic, said 10 percent of the people in Kansas have weed allergies.

Other speakers included Dr. Loren Robison, extension weed specialist, University of Nebraska, Lincoln; Fred Clark, Macksville, president of Kansas Aerial Applicators Association; Dr. Glenn Cunningham, Augusta; Dr. Wilber Ringler; and Franklin T. Rose, retired landscape architect for the Kansas Highway Commission.

The session opened Thursday with an address by Dr. Howard Greer, weed control specialist, Oklahoma State University, Stillwater, on the use of herbicides in controlling sagebrush.

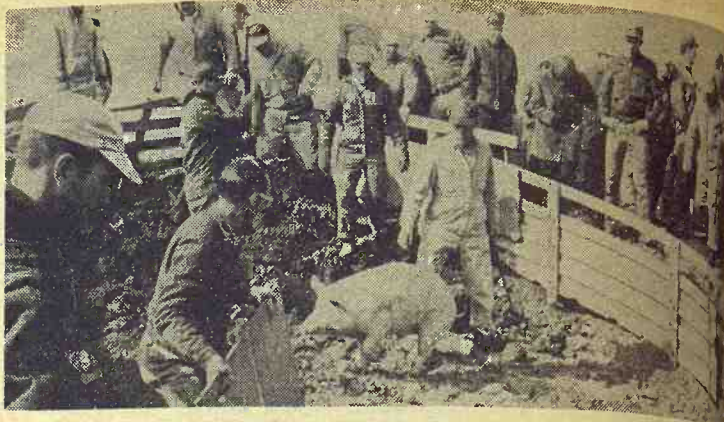

## Dole: 'Farm Crisis Concern Of Everybody'

Rep. Robert Dole, R-Kan., said

the crisis in rural America should be the concern "of every citizen whether he lives in urban America or on the farm." Dole, speaking in the House, said agriculture still is one of this country's basic industries and "our agricultural economy is in trouble."

"This should be of concern to each citizen whether he lives in urban America or on a farm," Dole said. He urged all citizens — urban and rural —

"to take a look at the crisis in rural America."

The Kansan, a ranking Republican on the House Agriculture committee said Department of Agriculture statistics issued March 8 show a drop of \$1.9 billion in 1967 farm net income.

"Per farm, this means income dropped from an average of \$5,049 in 1966 to \$4,573," he said.

In Kansas, the picture looks even worse, the House was told.

"Caught in the vicious spiral of rising costs and falling commodity prices," Dole added, "net farm income in Kansas in 1967 was \$777 under 1966."

USDA statistics for last year show 3 per cent fewer farms than in 1966 in the United States, he added.

To improve farm income, Dole said the administration and Congress should:

- Provide advance payments to growers who take part in the wheat program.

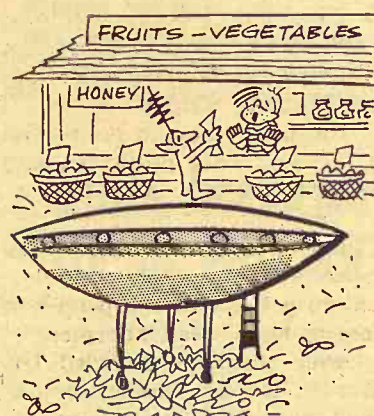
- Have Commodity Credit Corp. pay first-year storage costs for wheat under government loan as is done for other commodities.

- Assure that no wheat stocks owned by the CCC will be sold at less than parity in the next two years.

- Endorse the Agricultural fair practices legislation.

- Expand farm exports under the Food for Peace Act.

## Indiana NFOers Kill Hogs Despite Staley Advice

UNION CITY, Ind. — Farmers, contending hogs weren't worth taking to market at current prices, shot and buried 59 porkers last week in a muddy field near this Indiana-Ohio border line city.

The area members of the National Farmers Organization destroyed the estimated \$2,360 worth of swine against the advice of their national president, Oren Lee Staley of Corning, Iowa.

Staley said in Corning that he finally told the Hoosier and Ohio farmers that it was their decision.

He added that representatives from NFO headquarters in Corning were sent to the scene to prevent "emotional actions" reflecting on the organization.

Destroying the porkers was a slow business, complicated by the fact that many trucks mirrored down and had to be pulled out of the swine graveyard by a bulldozer.

A long deep pit had been bulldozed in advance, with a ramp for livestock trucks to back down. The loads, mostly single hogs, were unloaded into the pit and shot there.

The NFO has been sponsoring a campaign to withhold hogs from market until the price reaches 23 cents a pound. It has been running several cents below that target. The withholding campaign also includes other livestock and grain.

## Increased State Fire Loss In '67

Losses from Kansas fires last year exceeded the previous year by over 1 1/2 million dollars, Arthur R. Ramey, state fire marshal reports.

Ramey blamed the increase on several "large loss" fires, but said a bright spot was a decrease in fatalities.

Ramey said a recapitulation losses in fires in 1967 showed a cost of a little over 8 1/2 million dollars, compared with less than 7 million the previous year. He said part of the increase last year could be attributed to better reporting service and more complete assessment of damages.

There were 77 deaths from fires last year, compared with 96 deaths in 1966, Ramey said.

# See Wheat Export Goal In Reach

Assurance that wheat exports will reach 750 million bushels this marketing year was given in Kansas City by C. G. Pulvermacher, director of procurement and sales for the Agriculture department in Washington.

Pulvermacher spoke at the 54th annual meeting of the Farmers Union Cooperative Marketing Association. Last summer after harvest, Orville L. Freeman, agriculture secretary, said the export goal for this June 30 was 750 million bushels. At the time, there was doubt the total could be reached because of more than ample world wheat supplies.

Pulvermacher said he was certain the target would be reached and might even be surpassed.

Wheat exports through February totaled 486 million bushels, Pulvermacher said. An additional 110 million bushels have been registered for shipments before June 30. About 75 million to 80 million bushels will be exported as flour, bulgur, rolled wheat and other products, he said, which will increase the total to about 675 million bushels.

"This leaves only 75 million bushels of new business to be accomplished for export by June 30," Pulvermacher said.

"At the rate we are currently going, I believe we will exceed this."

Of the total, about 325 million to 350 million bushels will be dollar exports, Pulvermacher said. The rest will be concessional sales. Dollar sales have been increasing gradually, he said, and within the next five years possibly could reach 500 million bushels.

Pulvermacher has headed two Agriculture Department wheat trade missions in recent months, one to Europe and the other to Asia. The object was to promote the sale of bread grain.

The trips convinced Pulvermacher the United States could continue to maintain and expand its share of world wheat markets, but that to do so would take aggressive salesmanship, marketing, competitive prices and quality products.

Much of the increase in U.S. exports to such countries as Japan, Taiwan and the Philippines was the result of work done by market teams from this country, Pulvermacher said. The teams showed governments and peoples of the other countries how to use wheat. Rice is the traditional food in Asia.

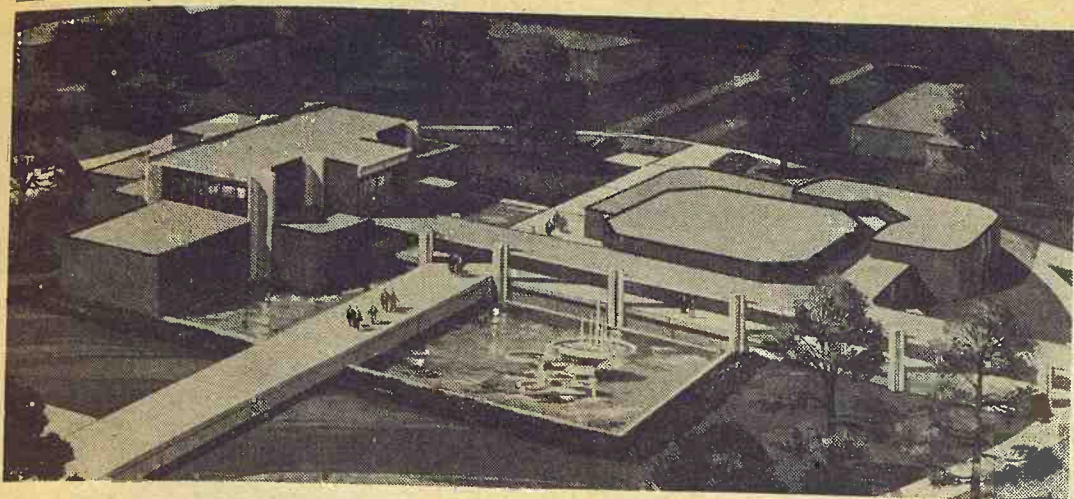

## How Bethany Will Spend Its Gift

A half-million-dollar gift has sparked the Lutheran-endowed school at Lindsborg, Bethany College, to a building program which will include a library at left and a social services center at right.

The donor of the gift is A. G. Wallerstedt, a Bethany graduate and a retired Pittsburg industrialist. The gift, which is to be matched by other donations and government grants, presumably will end talk that Lindsborg would lose its college.

A \$215,000 deficit against the Bethany endowment fund has been eliminated, thru a \$50,000 grant from the Selvig and Selma Nelson Fund, an \$82,500 gift from the Ford Foundation, and matching funds. The latter gift was to have been matched by other donations, a goal which has been surpassed in a campaign in Lindsborg which raised \$115,000. Jack Carlin, Lindsborg dairyman, headed the Lindsborg campaign for funds.

The House education and labor Committee last week approved a bill that would permit workers on large farms to join labor unions under the protection of the national labor relations act.

While the controversial bill, approved by a 16-12 party-line vote, would apply to only one per cent of the nation's farms, it would cover about 50 per cent of the nation's one million farm workers.

The measure, supported by Democrats and opposed by Republicans, is expected to run into heavy opposition when and if it reaches the House floor.

Coverage under the bill would be limited to farms employing more than 12 workers yearly and having total labor costs during that period of more than \$10,000.

Rep. James G. O'Hara (D-Mich.) author of the bill, said farmers as well as farm workers would benefit if they were brought under the NLRA.

Restrictions in the Taft-Hartley act against secondary boycotts, jurisdictional disputes and organizational picketing would apply to any farm unions organized under the law, he said.

The chief benefit for the farm workers would be a guarantee of their right to join a union and once a majority of the workers have signed up, to engage in collective bargaining with their employer.

Farm workers were brought under the fair labor standards act for the first time in 1966, guaranteeing them a minimum wage of \$1.15 an hour, due to go up to \$1.30 next year.

## SWINE SHOW SET AT OTTAWA MARCH 27

OTTAWA — A swine and carcass show will be held here Wednesday, March 27, at the Franklin County Sales Barn. There will be two weight divisions with classes for purebred and commercial breeders. Each exhibitor will be limited to two head. Carcass data on the hogs will be provided by the Wilson Packing Co.

## Record Shipment Of Corn Thru G&G Area

What some railroad men consider to be the largest single shipment of corn ever made in

the United States recently was made up in Omaha and Kansas City, bound for European sale.

The shipment was noteworthy also for going at a special freight rate which railroads hope will allow them to compete with trucks and barges in shipments to gulf ports from inland points.

The total cargo was around 500,000 bushels and required 120 hopper cars. About half the cars were loaded in Kansas City at the Cargill elevator and the other half came from Omaha.

The lower rate applies to single cars with no transit privileges from Iowa and Missouri

to the Gulf, or multiple cars with transit privileges at Kansas City but the multiple car shipments must then proceed as one train.

The latter procedure is what was followed in this case. Iowa corn was assembled at Cargill's Kansas City and Omaha elevators, dried to the proper moisture percentage point, and loaded in cars to form the single train that traveled to Houston thru Herington, Kansas.

At Houston, the grain was put aboard a ship for Antwerp, Belgium. There, it will be unloaded into another Cargill elevator. It will be marketed in Europe.

## Lack Of Restraint By Doctors Is Factor In High Medical Costs

Doctors who exercise no restraint in sending patients to hospitals are contributing to rising hospital costs, a medical panel has been told at a workshop meeting at Chicago.

Panelists participating at the 2-day "Doctor and His Hospital" workshop agreed that hospital costs will continue to rise — spurred by rising costs and increased admissions.

Dr. C. Wesley Eisele, of the

University of Colorado School of Medicine, estimated that "25 per cent of the patients in some hospitals shouldn't be there at all."

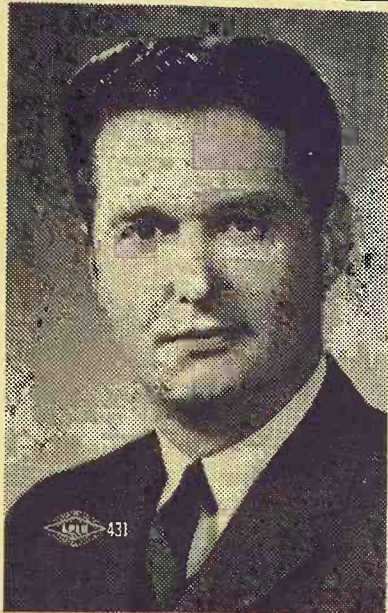
"Physicians have a great deal of responsibility in controlling hospital costs," he added.

The statistics on admissions were presented by Dr. Madison B. Brown, associate director of the American Hospital Association. He noted that hospital ad-

missions have grown 39 per cent in the last 20 years, while out-patient care has grown an even more startling 160 percent.

The growth of private health insurance and government-supported Medicare programs have prompted more doctors to send patients to hospitals.

Other factors leading to hospital costs are higher salaries and pressure for better health.

## 'Just Like Salad Dressing' Western Corn Worms Like Pesticides

There's no doubt about it! Insects that consume pesticides like so much dressing on their field crop salad just have to go!

That's how Kansas corn growers feel about the western corn rootworm that has built up a "resistance" to chemicals that once were so effective in silencing this destructive pest.

Since these sneaky underground root-chewing insects first burrowed their way into northwestern Kansas in 1948, they have steadily expanded their territory each season until now they can be found in most counties in the northern half of the state and in some irrigated sections of southwest Kansas.

That is why Dell E. Gates, Extension entomologist at Kansas State University, thinks that many farmers should give serious thought to controlling corn rootworms during this coming season. Under severe conditions in the past, rootworms have reduced yields by as much as one-half in a given field.

Aldrin and heptachlor have been effective control chemicals in newly-infected areas. But in areas where these pesticides have been used continuously for 4 or 5 years, or where rootworm damage has been noticed following the use of these chemicals, the resistance problem has set in.

There are two ways to combat the corn rootworm menace, Gates notes. Rotate the field out of corn production for one or more years, or try other chemicals for rootworm control.

Planting another crop in the field breaks the rootworm life cycle since eggs are laid only in cornfield soil in the fall. When cereals, sorghum, alfalfa, or other crop is planted, the rootworm larvae are left without a food supply. And rootworms are not a problem the first year a field is again planted to corn.

"If your cropping plan calls

for continuous corn, consider the use of a planting time application of Bux-ten, phorate (Thimet), diazinon, or parathion at K-State recommended rates," Gates suggests. "Avoid using parathion on early planted corn or when heavy populations are expected." Apply granules in a 5- to 7-inch band in front of the planter press wheels, but do not apply with the seed.

Additional information about pesticide rates is given in K-State Extension publication MF-171, "1968 Kansas Insect Control Recommendation," available at local county Extension offices.

The publication also contains advice on the use of post-planting time applications, especially

# Can Foot And Mouth Be Imported Again?

What are the chances for a foot-and-mouth disease outbreak in this country? There have been nine outbreaks in the U.S. since 1870, the most recent was in 1929.

Most recent outbreaks on this continent occurred in 1951 in Canada and 1953 in Mexico. Volume of traffic — people, animals, and material — from foot-and-mouth affected areas has never been greater; the challenge to port authorities never more demanding.

Losses from six outbreaks

between 1902 and 1929 are estimated at \$253 million. The largest outbreak, occurring in 1914, affected more than 3,500 herds in 22 states and the District of Columbia. Altogether, about 77,000 cattle, 85,000 swine, 10,000 sheep, 100 goats and nine deer were destroyed to eradicate the disease.

Two questions most often asked by livestock producers are: 1) Why slaughter animals with foot-and-mouth disease? and 2) Why aren't vaccines used?

Slaughter of all affected and

exposed animals, along with other time-tested procedures, is the only effective and economical means of eradicating the disease from this country. The disease has never been eradicated through use of vaccines.

From a cost standpoint, it is much less expensive to eradicate the disease through an effective slaughter program than to enter into a foot-and-mouth vaccination program and live with the disease. Use of vaccines permits survival of a constant source of virus in livestock populations.

Some vaccinated and/or recovered animals can be expected to shed the virus which can become virulent in non-immune livestock. In addition, a vaccine for one type of virus does not protect against other types. All susceptible animal species would have to be vaccinated every four months to maintain immunity; and there is some question of the effectiveness of vaccine in young animals, swine, sheep and goats.

The cost advantage of "slaughter" over "continued vaccination" has been well documented in Western Europe, where, for the most part, vaccination, quarantines, and other sanitary measures are employed to keep foot-and-mouth under control.

In 1952, with a European livestock population comparable to that of the United States, losses

from foot-and-mouth disease in livestock and livestock products were almost \$900 million.

Foot-and-mouth disease is caused by one of the smallest viruses known and is primarily a disease of cloven-footed animals, including cattle, sheep, swine, goats, deer, antelope and buffalo. The disease is highly contagious. Seven different types of the virus are known. The virus survives for long periods and spreads when an animal is in contact with affected animals or with contaminated materials.

Symptoms of the disease include high fever; listlessness; drop in milk supply of dairy animals; mastitis and abortion associated with blisters in the mouth, causing excessive salivation; and blisters between the toes, which often cause severe lameness.

ation; and blisters between the toes, which often cause severe lameness.

Mortality rate for mature animals is low. However, some animals never do well after exposure to the disease. Also, weakness caused by the disease predisposes them to other conditions that take over. Losses of very young or fat animals may be high. In some cases, death losses of more than 50 per cent have been reported.

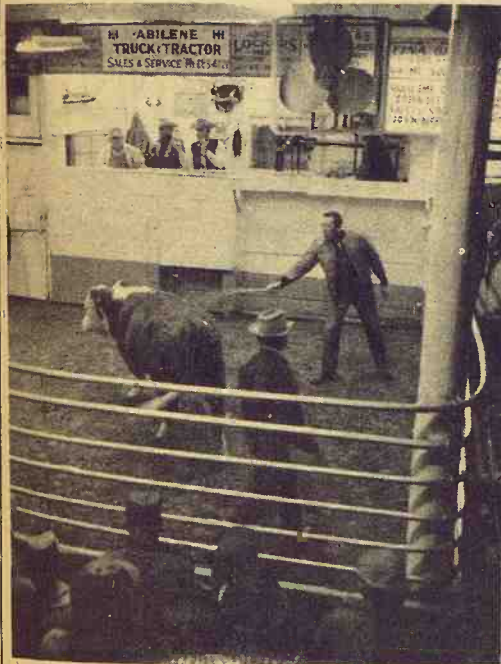

## See Another Shoe Price Hike

Shoe prices probably will increase by about \$1 at the retail level next fall, report trade papers which say manufacturers are figuring on a 2 to 3% rise, following a 3 to 4% increase on the spring lines.

Retail prices are normally pegged at \$1 intervals, with merchants passing on higher overhead costs at the same time they take a supplier price hike. The industry cited higher costs of materials and overhead for the projected increase, altho lower-grade hides have not had an increase and synthetic materials like DuPont's Corfam have had substantial price declines.

Retailers have pressured manufacturers to keep prices competitive, say trade writers, holding spring hikes lower than predicted.

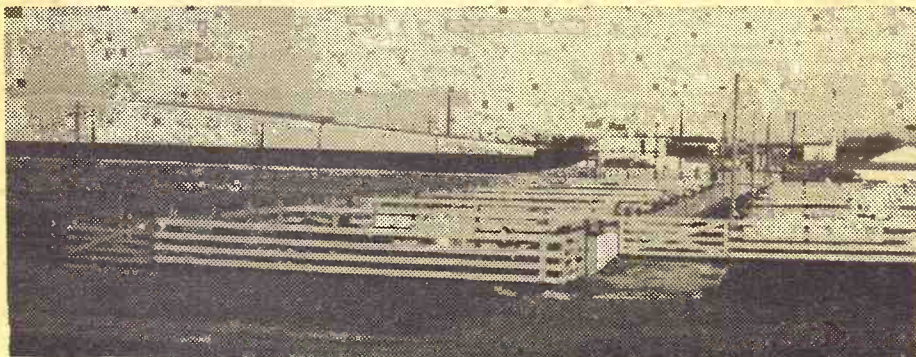
