## Dairying Shows Best Net In Area Management Report

CLAY CENTER — The 21-county Farm Management Association No. 1, which includes the northern tier of counties from Phillipsburg to Marysville and goes as far south as Marion showed decreased income, lowered expenses, and markedly less net profit in its 1967 report just released.

Average for the 401 farms who keep books as part of a K-State management study was \$32,948 gross income and \$4312 net income. The total dollar income was down about 8 percent from the year before and the net slipped 19 percent from the record of 1966.

Slumping wheat and livestock prices were primarily responsible for the decline in net income.

The net figure basically is a "salary" figure, after an allowance of interest credit on the farm investment.

"This figure is the closest we can come to calculating a farm-

er's salary," says C. E. Bartlett, association fieldman. "It measures a return to the farmer for his labor and management."

Dairying showed up better than it had in the past, with dairy-crop combination farms having the highest profit. Crop-hog combinations and irrigation-livestock operations did better than average too.

Farms in Saline county had the highest average incomes, followed by those in Riley, Mitchell, Geary, and Ellsworth counties. Other counties in this association are Cloud, Jewell, Osborne, Republic, Clay, Marshall, Washington, Ellis, Rooks, Russell, Smith, Dickinson, Lincoln, Marion, Ottawa and Phillips.

The top one-fourth of the farms in this association averaged about \$32 net profit for every \$100 in income, while the bottom fourth netted only 47 cents out of every \$100 gross.

Fieldmen in the association are C. E. Bartlett of Clay Center and Laurenz Greene and Ross Olson of Concordia. There are management associations covering all areas of Kansas, comprising some 3500 farms.

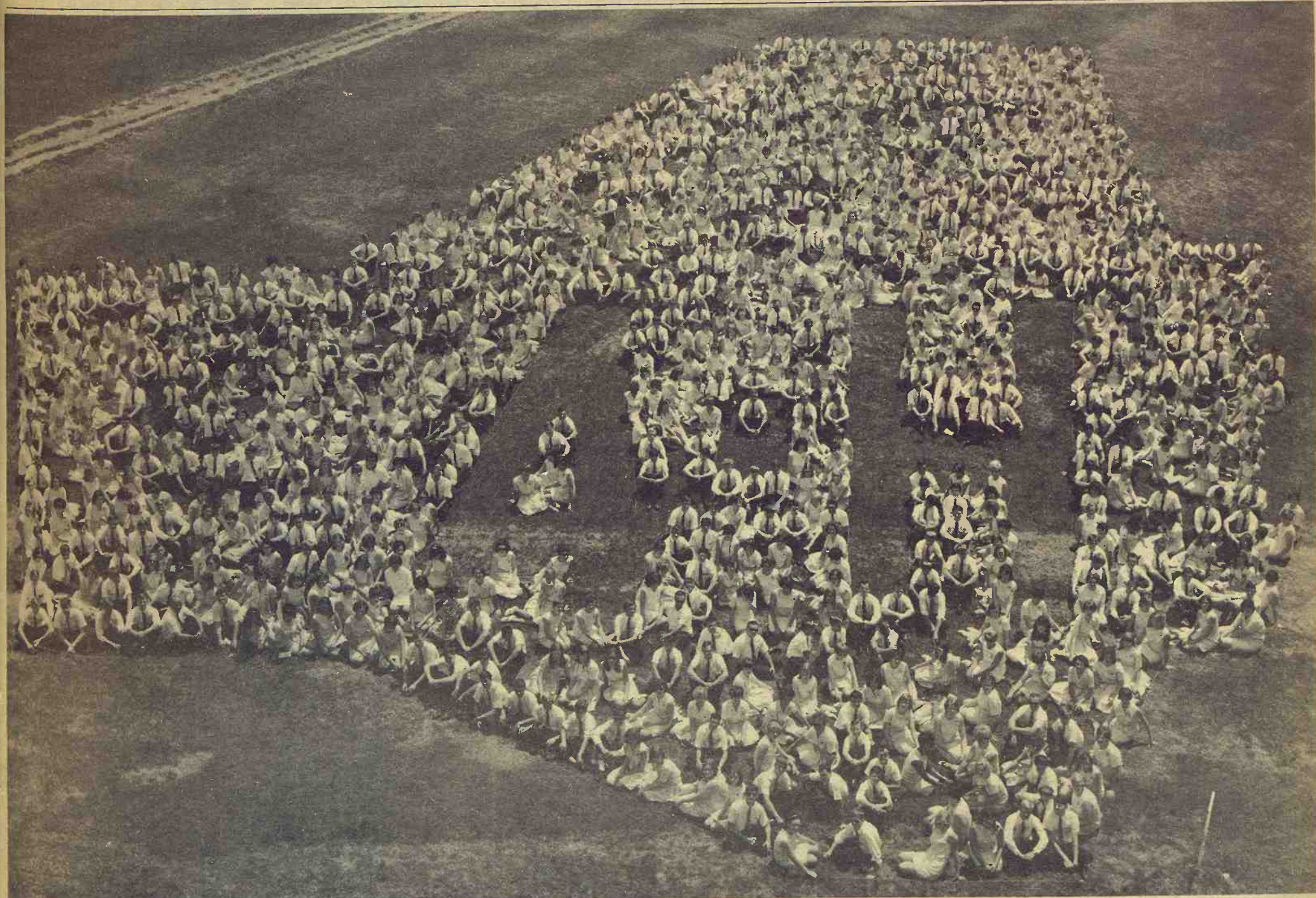
Presumably the sampling is large enough to serve as a broad criterion for all Kansas farms, altho there are some farmers who dispute that management association records have general application.

Some contend that association farms are likely to be more orderly — and perhaps more profitable — than the average, altho others note that many profitable farms do not choose to join or continue to belong to the groups because of the trouble of maintaining the particular records and a satisfaction that they already know their financial situation without disclosing them.

## And End To Dental Cavities?

The director of the National Institute of Dental Research predicts it may be possible to prevent cavities and tooth decay within the next 10 years.

At a briefing for reporters, Dr. Seymour J. Kreshover said he believes there is substance to such hopes because "we now believe that we have acquired sufficient knowledge and an adequate base of scientific manpower."

He said one main direction of research toward the goal will be work on microbes that cause tooth decay. And he said scientists will evaluate and press for early use of such techniques as plastic mouthpieces containing a fluoride gel.

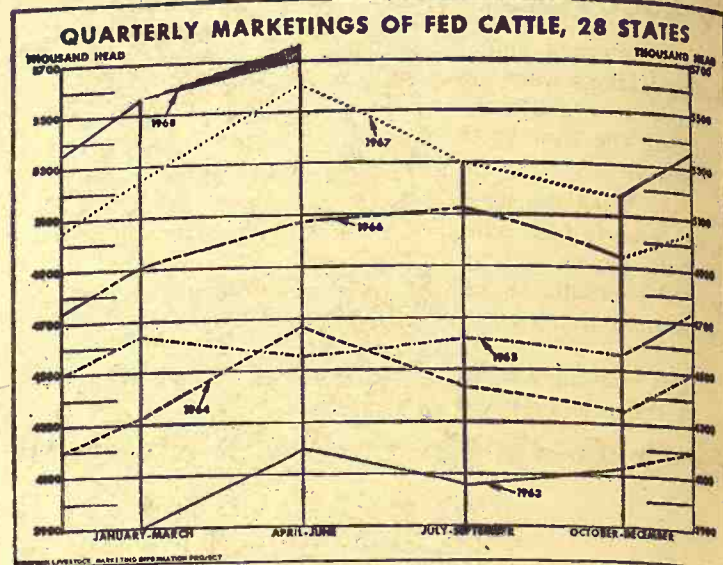
Dr. Kreshover also said he sees a trend toward greater acceptance of fluoridation of drinking water, which he said reduces tooth decay by about 60 per cent.

He noted that about one-third of the people in the country now live in areas with fluoridated water supplies.

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## Five Percent More

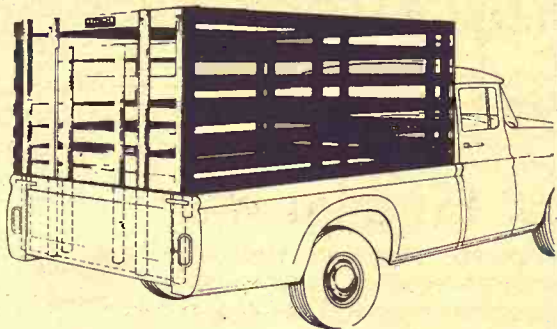
Marketings of fed cattle in January-March were 5 percent more than a year earlier, even tho January 1 numbers of cattle in heavier weight groups were down. The increased marketings in January-March were anticipated on the basis of lighter slaughter weights. Marketings of fed cattle in the July-September quarter probably will continue above 1967, says Western Live-Stock Roundup.

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## Farm Groups Among Most Active Lobbyists

Labor, farm, veterans and financial organizations were the heaviest spenders on lobbying activities during the first three months of this year.

At least, they listed the largest outlays in reports filed with the clerk of the House and the secretary of the Senate, as required by the lobby regulation act.

Other groups may have spent more, but if they did they did

not report their expenditures under the loosely enforced law.

Reports are supposed to be filed every three months, listing, among other things, the amount of money received by the reporting groups and the total spent "in connection with legislative interests" during each three-month period.

Of those who complied with the requirements, the United Federation of Postal Clerks listed the biggest outlay, \$52,976, for the January-March period of this year.

### Two Large Cattle Co-ops Set A Merger

National Stockyards, Ill. — Directors of St. Louis Producers Live Stock Marketing association of National Stockyards and Interstate Producers Live-stock association of Chicago announced they have approved a merger of the marketing co-

operatives.

The announcement was made by John F. Rundquist of Butler, Ill., president of St. Louis Producers, and Robert Armstrong of Monmouth, Ill., president of Interstate.

Rundquist said the merger is subject to the approval of his co-operative membership. The proposal will be voted on July 19.

The two organizations handled more than 3 million head of livestock worth more than 208 million dollars last year.

J. Gordon Gillespie manager of St. Louis Producers said a merger would mean improved earnings for members, more bargaining power, greater financial strength and greater efficiency.

Gillespie said the resulting organization would be the largest live stock marketing co-operative in the nation.

St. Louis Producers is the leading selling agency at National Stockyards. It has branches at Marshal Junction and Richland, Mo., and Milton and Griggsville, Ill.

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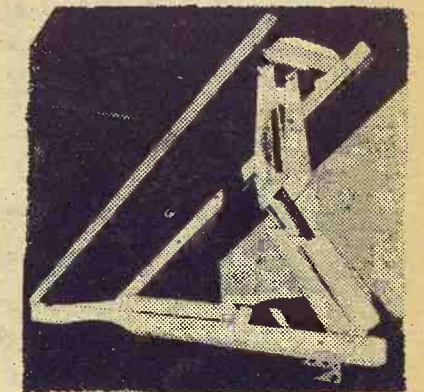
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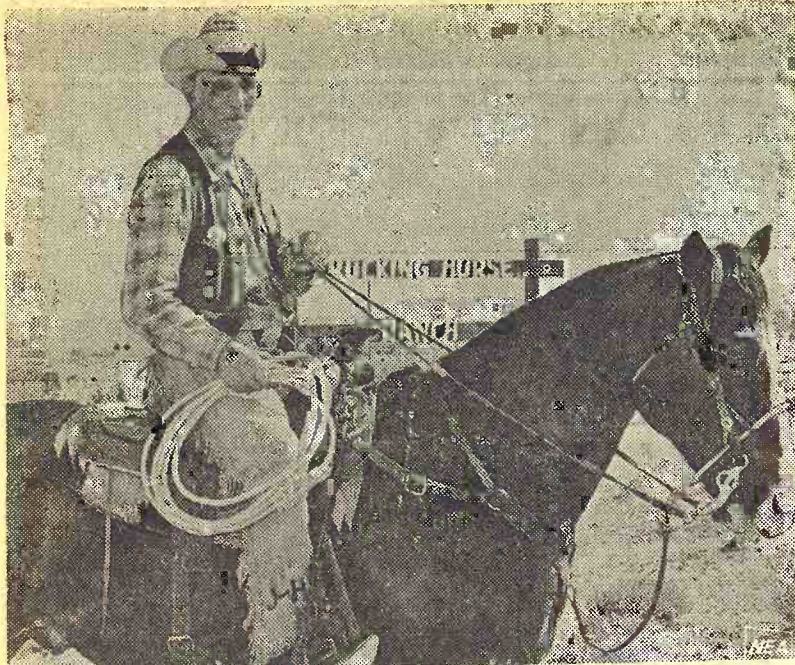
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## 97-Year Old Cowboy

## Freeman Knocks 'Hunger' Telecast

Secretary of Agriculture Orville L. Freeman has charged that the Columbia Broadcasting System aired a "biased, one-sided and dishonest presentation of hunger in America and he formally demanded equal time on the network to refute it.

The secretary summoned newsmen to a second-floor conference room at the Agriculture Department building to denounce for the better part of 45 angry minutes the CBS television documentary, "Hunger in America," shown on the network.

In a letter expressing "my disappointment and indignation" to Dr. Frank Stanton, the CBS president, Freeman requested "equal network time to refute

the errors of fact, the misinterpretations and the misinformation that were dispersed through 'Hunger in America' and to assure the hungry of this nation that the United States Department of Agriculture does care — that it is doing what it can for them — and that it wants to do a great deal more."

To reporters, Freeman declared that the broadcast had "created disillusionment and restlessness and the general feeling that there is indifference and no one cares."

"The tube can get pretty careless," he said. "It can be a pretty miserable piece of business, and this program . . . was a pretty bad job, as bad as anything that I have ever seen in the time I have been in public life."

Broadcasting industry officials said they believed it was the

first time a Cabinet member had publicly demanded "equal time" to challenge a radio or television documentary.

In a statement read on "The CBS Evening News With Walter Cronkite," Richard S. Salant,

the network's president in charge of news, said:

"We have only heard of, and have not yet seen, Secretary Freeman's letter and so-called bill of particulars. They will obviously receive careful consid-

eration when they arrive. While, I have every confidence in the accuracy and responsibility of the CBS news personnel who worked over many months on 'Hunger in America,' which we are all very proud

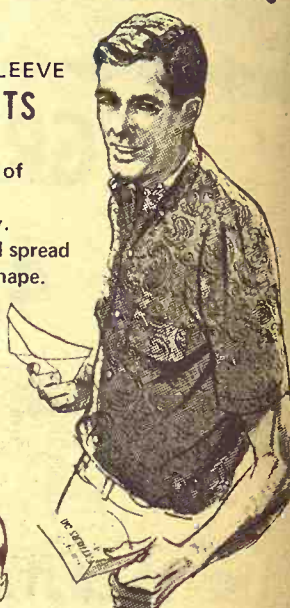
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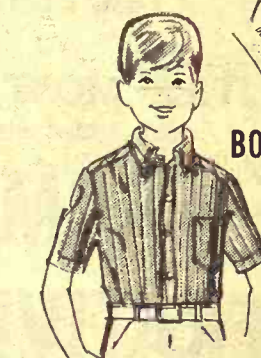

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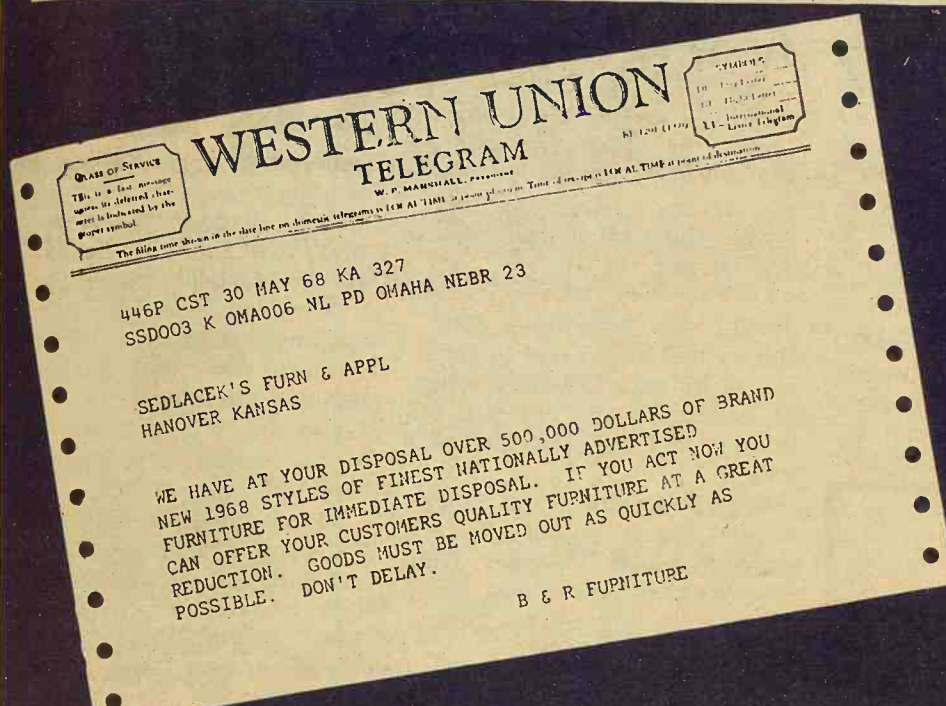
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## Way To Cut Dehydrator Air Pollution

Air pollution from alfalfa dehydrating plants in Kansas and other Midwest states can be reduced simply and cheaply.

So say three Kansas State University researchers who have just completed research which reveals that the addition of small quantities of liquid animal fat can almost eliminate dust losses at the primary source of pollution.

Dehydrating plants release into the atmosphere extremely fine alfalfa particles, more than half of which come from the "cyclone" collector following the grinding operation.

Injection of animal fat at the grinder eliminates nearly all of

the dust loss at this point at a fraction of the cost of conventional means, say Dr. Verl E. Headley of the Food and Feed Grain Institute, Jason C. Annis of the Institute for Environmental Research and Sylvio L. Lima, graduate research assistant in mechanical engineering.

The cost of adding the animal fat is largely returned by the reclaimed alfalfa dust, which has a protein content nearly half again that of normal alfalfa meal; by decreased energy requirements for pelleting; and by improvement in the quality of the end feed product. The fat not only is a good energy source, but it also retards

deterioration of carotene (provitamin A) in the alfalfa during storage.

Conventional means of solving the dehydrator air pollution problem involves the use of an elaborate bag filter arrangement at the cyclone collector. By comparison, injecting liquid fat is extremely simple and inexpensive.

Support for the K-State research was provided by the Fats and Proteins Research Foundation, an organization which sponsors research through university, government and private laboratories.

The experimental work was done in the pilot feed manufacturing facilities of the department of grain science and industry and the fine particle lab-

oratory of mechanical engineering.

## Saves Aerial Sprayer After Area Accident

LINCOLN, Ks. — Quick action last week by Roger Crawford of Lincoln apparently saved the life of Don DeLaney, 37, manager of the Lincoln Airport, whose plane hit a tree, crashed and burned.

Officers said DeLaney, a crop duster, was spraying a farm three miles northwest of here owned by Max Crawford when he apparently did not pull up in time and his plane struck a tree.

Crawford, son of the farm owner and a witness to the accident, pulled DeLaney from the wreckage and ripped DeLaney's burning clothes from him.

DeLaney was taken to St. John's Hospital at Salina. He received second- and third-degree burns, broken ankle, cuts and bruises. Crawford sustained first and second-degree burns in the rescue.

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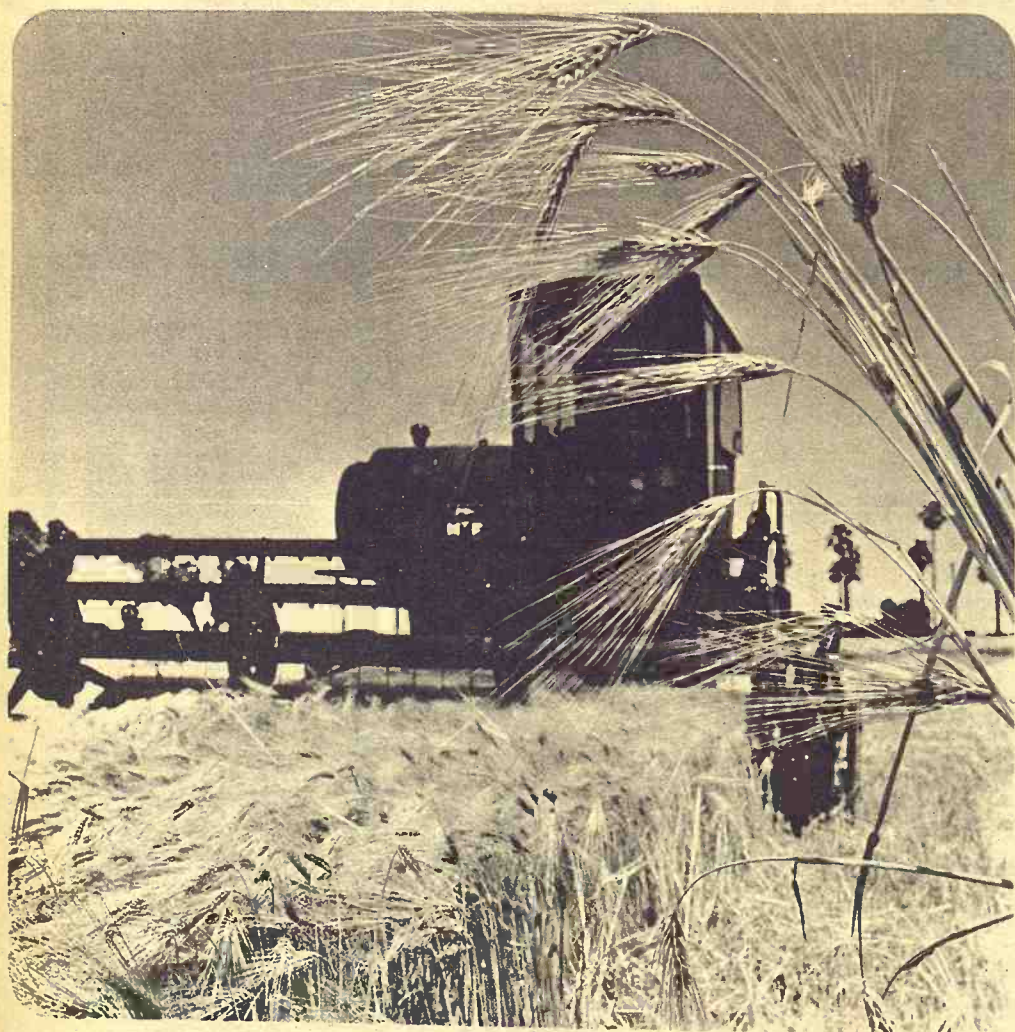

# Here's Hog Outlook

So far this year, hog prices have held around \$19 most of the time. The average this year has been about the same as in 1967, but there was a much wider range of prices last year.

Looking ahead, we expect a seasonal shrinkage in market supplies during June and early July. Price trends should be steady to higher during June and July.

Market supplies will begin to increase seasonally about mid-July, and continue to increase for about three months (or until mid-October). Prices will probably weaken during the late summer and early fall. We would guess that prices will average a little above \$20 during the summer, and a little below \$20 during the fall.

**Market Supplies.** The big uncertainty in the outlook is market supplies. We expect market receipts to be slightly larger than last year — but would not give big odds.

Back around March 1, farmers reporting to the USDA indicated that they had 1 or 2 percent more pigs for market during the June-July-August quarter than they had a year earlier. But some private hog-market analysts think that market receipts will be up by more than 2 percent — maybe 5 or 6 percent.

From March 1 through mid-May, market receipts were practically the same as a year before — closely in line with the USDA summary of reports received from farmers.

**Good prices the past 37 months.** Those who expect market supplies to be greater than the USDA figures point to the favorable hog prices during the past 37 months. Prices (for barrows and gilts at central markets) did average \$21.65 during this period. No doubt this price level has given many hog producers the money and the confidence to expand their hog business.

We should note that hog slaughter recently was substantially larger than a year earlier. This may be a temporary situation, or it may be the first proof that hog production has been increased.

Some farmers think that they can get better prices for hogs if they deliver more than packers and retailers have been expecting. It usually works the other way: hog prices slump when the markets, packing houses, and retail stores are swamped with more hogs and pork than they have made plans to slaughter, process, and sell to consumers.

**Late Fall and Winter.** Back around March 1, farmers reporting to the USDA said that they planned to have 3 percent fewer sows to farrow during this spring (March-May) than they had a year ago. They also reported plans to have 3 percent fewer sows to farrow during the summer (June-August) than last year. But prices may have

been good enough to prevent any cut in farrowings.

The next important report for hog producers will be the report

on Hogs and Pigs, to be released by the USDA on June 21.

### RHUBARB UPSIDE-DOWN CAKE

**Topping:**  
4 cups sliced rhubarb  
1 cup sugar  
Sprinkle of Cinnamon  
2 tablespoons melted butter

**Batter:**  
1½ cups flour  
¼ teaspoon salt  
1½ teaspoons baking powder  
2 eggs, well beaten  
1 cup sugar  
½ cup hot water  
1 teaspoon vanilla

Into a well-buttered 9x9-inch cake pan place sliced rhubarb. Sprinkle with 1 cup sugar, cinnamon and melted butter. To make the batter, sift flour, salt and baking powder together. Beat eggs very well and add 1 cup sugar a little at a time. Stir in hot water and vanilla. Combine with sifted dry ingredients. Bake at 350 degrees about 50 minutes. Remove from oven; let stand a few minutes longer before removing from pan. Serve warm. Note: "I might add it is real good when eaten cold, too!"

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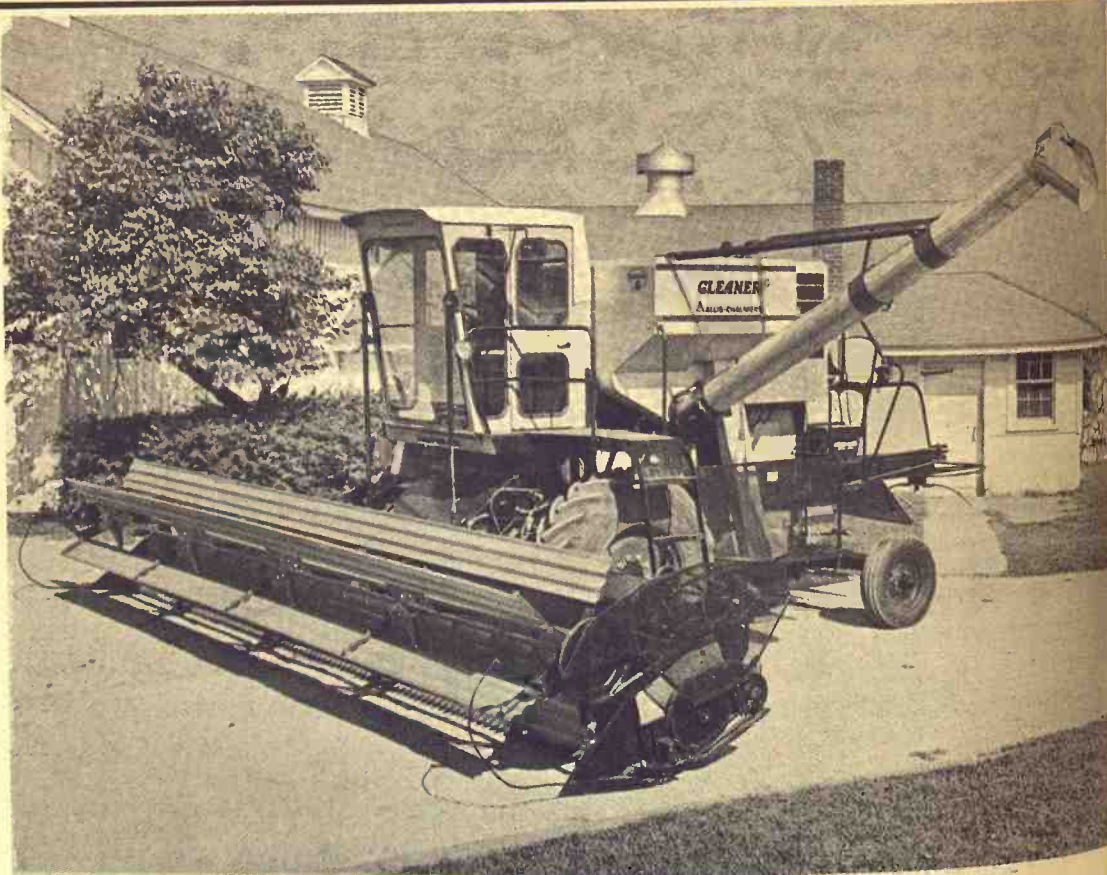

Keep a day-by-day budget and when you have reached the day's quota, taper off. Then you won't run short.

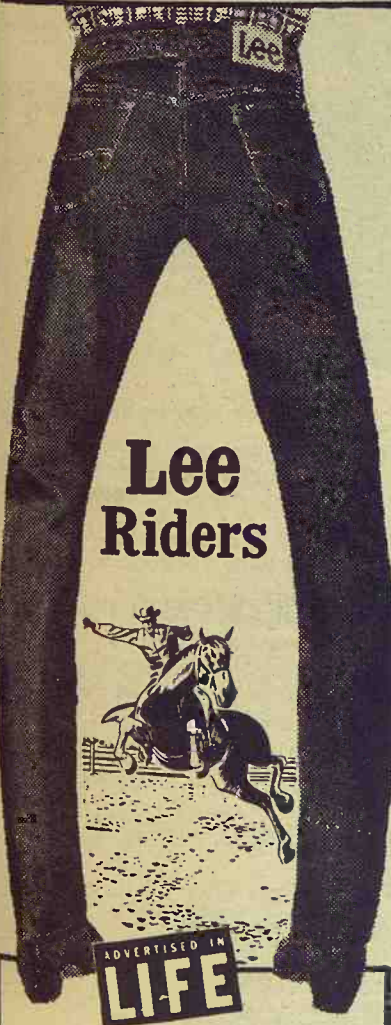

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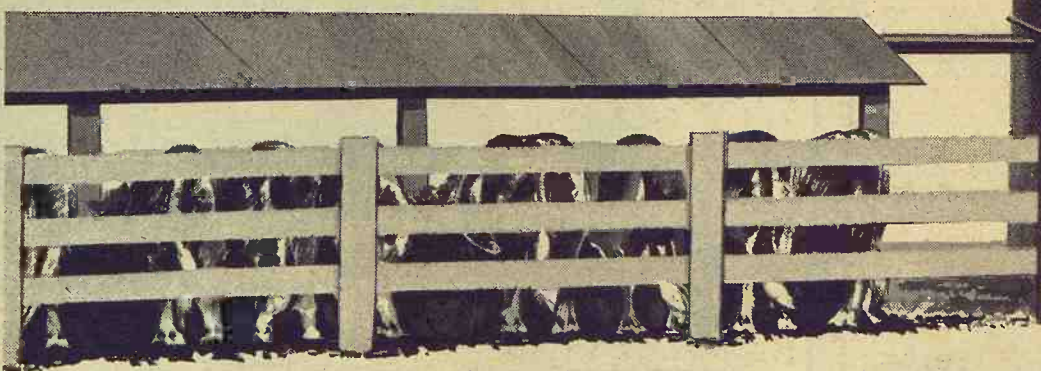
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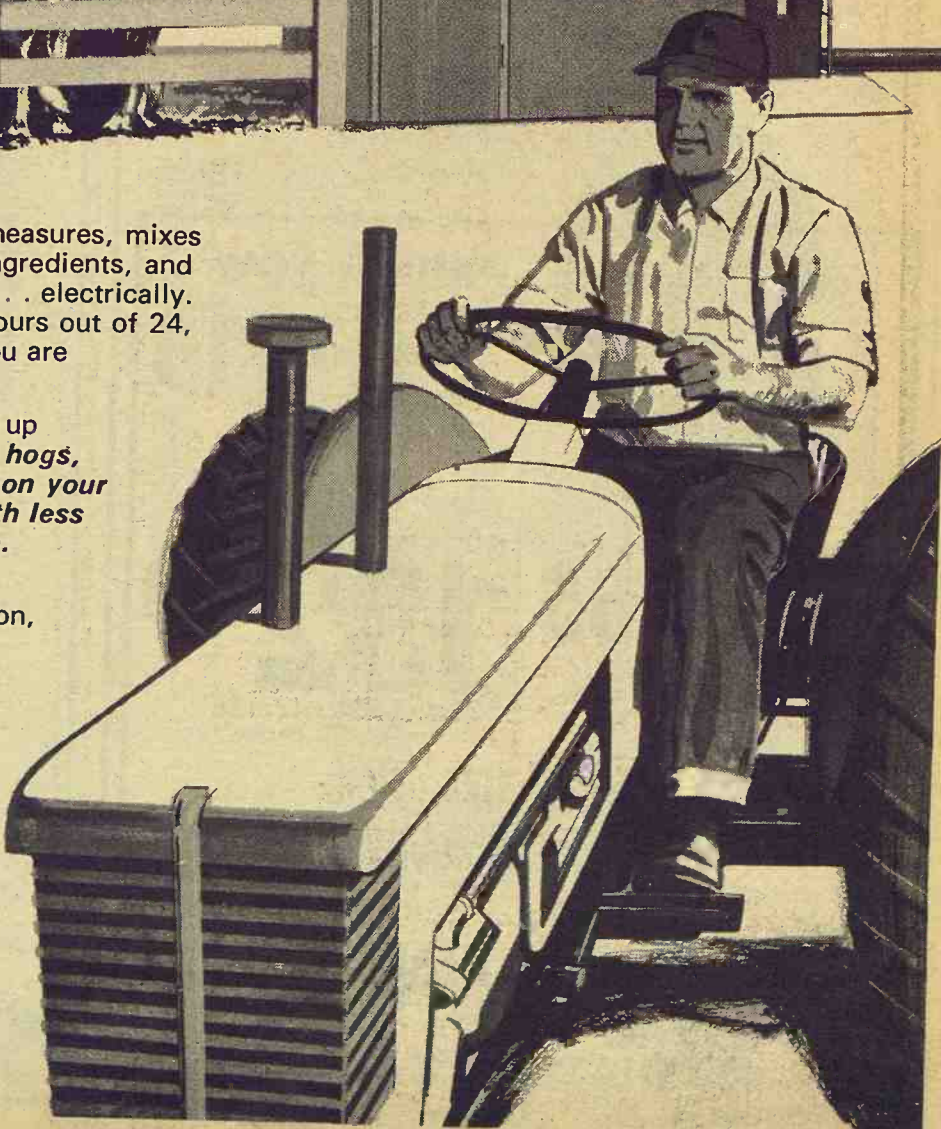

The soil that you put into window boxes should be rich. Remember that it will have to

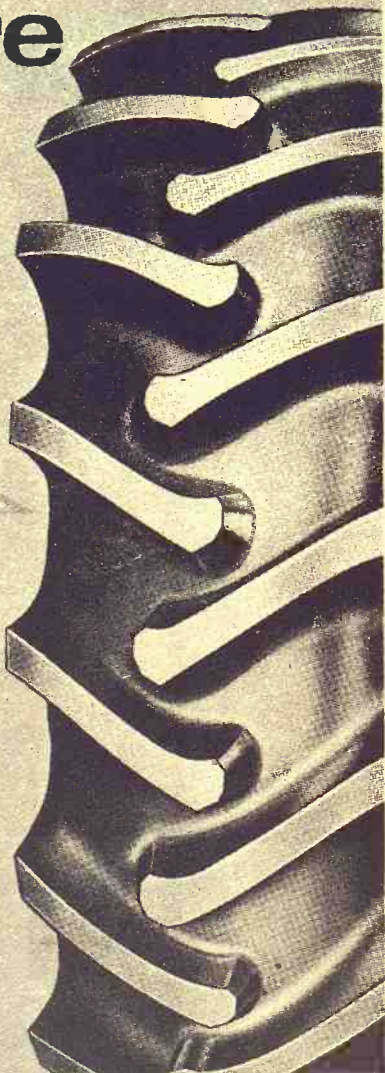
nourish plants all season.

Be sure to use several inches depth of coarse material at the bottom of the box, underneath the soil, so the soil does not become waterlogged — a sure way to kill the plants in it.

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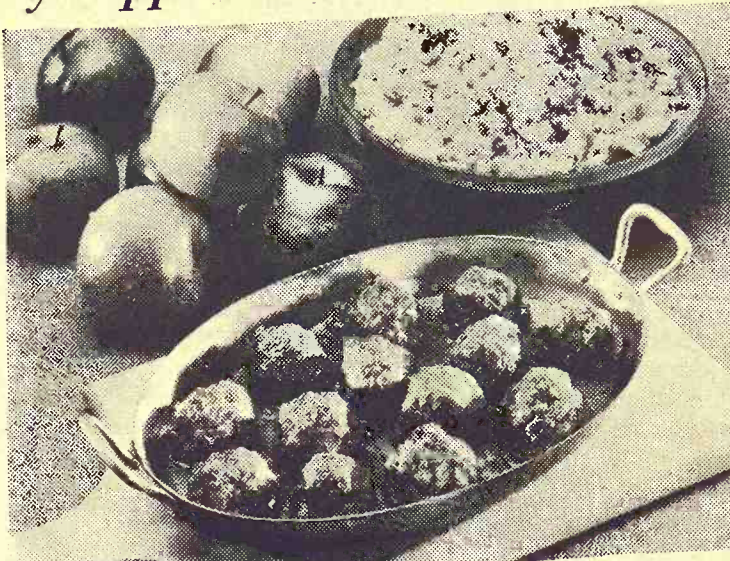
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## For Something Novel Try Apple Meatballs

### APPLE MEATBALLS

12 double soda crackers  
¾ teaspoon salt

1 cup peeled and coarsely grated tart apple  
2 eggs, beaten  
1 cup tomato juice  
Crush crackers into very fine crumbs between two sheets of waxed paper; there should be about 1 cup. Stir well with salt and pepper and gently work in to the meat already mixed with apple and eggs. Roll into balls about 1½ inches in diameter and place in a shallow baking dish in one layer. Cover with tomato juice. Bake in preheated moderately hot oven (375 degrees) for about one-half hour or until done all the way through. If tomato juice evaporates too rapidly before cooking is complete, add a bit more. Serve on parsleyed saffron rice. Yield: six servings.

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# Area Milk Mergers Extend To St. Louis

The circle of dairy marketing organization mergers continues to widen.

Another major dairy co-op merger has been worked out to take effect July 1.

Mid-America Dairymen Inc. which has its headquarters in Kansas City will consolidate with Producers Creamery, Springfield, Mo.; Producers

Creamery, Chillicothe, Mo.; Sanitary Milk Producers and Square Deal Milk association of St. Louis.

The surviving name is Mid-America Dairymen, which will continue to headquarter in Kansas City. Mid-America was formed a year ago by Pure Milk of Kansas City, the Sabetha co-op, a dairy at Ottawa, and several

other producer groups.

P. D. Turner of Sabetha became general manager of Mid-America and he will be named executive vice president of the Kansas City division of the new merged group.

The expansion of Mid-America is similar to the merger of dairy co-ops at Wichita, Hillsboro, with others in Oklahoma and Texas to create Milk Producers Inc.

The production area of the new milk marketing co-op includes all of Missouri, Iowa, Southern Illinois, Southeast Nebraska, and half of Kansas. The new association will have 14,000 dairy farmers as members and will have an annual production of more than 3 billion pounds of milk.

Co-op officials said that grouping of the local organizations into larger entities permits a better distribution of milk supplies and a much improved position for the handling of surpluses.

It is planned that most of the milk not needed for bottling requirements will be processed in one of 10 milk manufacturing plants owned by Mid-America. These are strategically located throughout the production area.

These plants, the officials explained, not only will handle surplus milk, but will return any operating margins to mem-

bers supplying the milk.

Twenty dairymen were elected as incorporating directors of the new organization at a meeting held in Topeka. Five of these are present directors of Mid-America. They are William Powell, Princeton, Mo.; Harry Burger, Seneca; Ambrose Dempsey, Leavenworth; Harold Pur-

vis, Pleasant Hill, Mo.; and Ivan Conley, Centralia, Kansas.

Included in the Kansas City division will be manufacturing plants at Chillicothe, Mo.; Ottawa; Sabetha; and the sales operation in Kansas City.

Gene Marti will continue as manager of the Sabetha operation.

# May Prices Edge Upwards

Mid-May prices received by Kansas farmers were a shade higher than a month earlier, with a small increase in crop prices offsetting slightly lower prices for livestock and livestock products, according to the Kansas Crop and Livestock Reporting Service.

The all-farm products price index stood at 229 percent of the 1910-14 base period average, up 1 point from last month but 12 points below a year earlier.

Prices for wheat, corn, soybeans, calves and milk cows were a little higher than in mid-April, beef cattle and hay were unchanged while sheep and lambs, milk, chickens and eggs were down slightly.

#### Crop Prices

The all-crop price index was 156 percent, up 2 points from last month but 29 points below May a year ago. The price of wheat, at \$1.29 per bushel, was up 2 cents from last month but 26 cents less than May of last year. Corn averaged \$1.14 per bushel, 2 cents above April but 12 cents less than mid-May 1967. Sorghum grain, at \$1.81 per cwt., was unchanged from last month

and 14 cents below May last year. Soybeans averaged \$2.53 per bushel, 3 cents more than last month but 10 cents less than a year earlier. Oats, at 77 cents per bushel, were up 1 cent from April but 3 cents less than May last year. Barley averaged \$1.00 per bushel, down 1 cent from April but the same as May a year ago. Alfalfa and prairie hay were unchanged from last month at \$22.00 and \$17.00 per ton, respectively.

#### Livestock Prices

The livestock and livestock products price index was 312 percent of the 1910-14 base at mid-May compared with 314 percent in April and 306 percent last year. Hogs averaged \$18.20 per cwt., down 10 cents from a month earlier and \$3.70 less than May 1967. Beef cattle prices, at \$23.70 per cwt., were unchanged from last month but \$1.40 above May a year ago. Calf prices averaged \$27.20 per cwt., 50 cents above April and \$2.30 more than May last year. Lambs averaged \$27.00 per cwt., 30 cents less than last month

## Surcharge May Not Affect State Withholding

Kansas officials aren't certain what they will do if and when a proposed federal income tax surcharge is imposed. "We may do nothing," said James T. McDonald, state revenue director. He estimates the charge in the federal tax would make relatively little difference in the state income tax liability of Kansans. As the federal tax increases, the state tax liability is reduced. This is because federal income tax paid is a deduction in computing the state income tax

owed.

"We estimate a federal income tax surcharge of 10 per cent would decrease the state tax liability of the 803,000 Kansas income taxpayers by about 1.5 million," said McDonald.

With the average change in state tax liability so small, McDonald questions whether it would be advisable to upset the ease with which employers can now figure state withholding. The arithmetic is simple in figuring the state withholding tax — it's 10 per cent of the amount withheld for the federal tax.

"If we want to keep state withholding at the same dollar amount in the event a 10 per cent federal surcharge is added, we would have to change the state withholding rate to 9.0909 per cent of the amount withheld for the federal government," McDonald said.

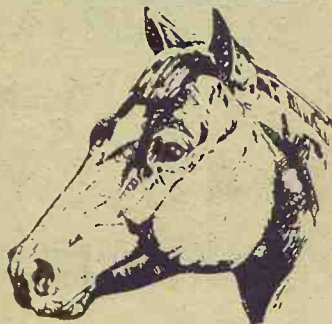

## Danes At Wheat Field

Eleven visitors from Denmark look over hybrid wheat on an experimental plot of the Rudy-Patrick Research Center at Hutchinson. The Danes said they were impressed with the hybrid progress, and Midwestern friendliness overcame an initial impression of American rudeness gathered in New York.

But the potential yield on the hybrid wheat, which Dr. Elmer Heine, K-State expert, and Walt Morre, field supervisor for Rudy-Patrick, thought would hit about 40 bushels per acre, didn't make a big impression on the Danes. They grow wheat — enough for their own needs — on lush Danish soil as typical 70 to 80-bushel yields. They said such land averages about \$1000 an acre in price.

## Most Crop Risk Claims In Western Kansas

Tho losses have been minimal east of US81, the Federal Crop Insurance program in Kansas will have its fifth highest year for claims on drought-damaged crops since the program began in 1939.

Nearly off claims thus far have been from 40 counties in far western Kansas.

Russell Bowling, state director for FCIC, says initial claims for drought, disease, and insect damage have totaled \$2.9 million, and further deterioration is likely.

Only in 1940, 1953, 1955, and 1967 were claims higher. The 1967 claims against the all-risk insurance arm of the Department of Agriculture in Kansas were over \$5.5 million.

Largest claims have come from the counties along the Colorado line and in the next row. No claims of consequence have come from east of US81 except in Butler county.

Claims in the past have averaged \$1.6 million per year in Kansas.

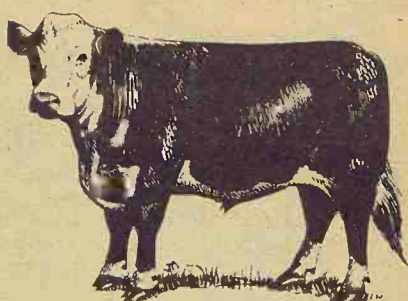

## Incumbent Race For Senate Won't Come Off

One political race that figured to pit two Kansas state senators against each other in a newly formed district apparently won't come off.

Senator William H. Ward of Marion said last week that he will not seek a fourth term, bowing out of a race in the new 12th Senatorial District that includes Marion, Chase, Morris and Lyon counties.

Had Ward run he would have had to defeat Mrs. Louise Porter of Reading, Lyon county, another incumbent. Mrs. Porter and Ward were thrown into the

same district by a reapportioning of Senate districts.

In his announcement that he would not run, Ward was critical of the reapportionment. "A recent decision was handed down by three federal judges, who are appointed for life and not elected by popular vote as is done in other positions in our form of government. In so doing they encroached into the legislative branch of the government and proceeded to reapportion the Kansas Senate as they saw fit.

"Percentage-wise the variation of population is greater under their plan than the one passed by the legislature. They reapportioned the rural areas of Kansas into 24 Senatorial districts. Then, adding insult to injury, they ordered the other 16 senators located in four heavily

populated urban areas to run at large.

"When they concluded the ridiculous reapportionment, Senator Louise Porter of Lyon county and I were placed together in the new 12th district.

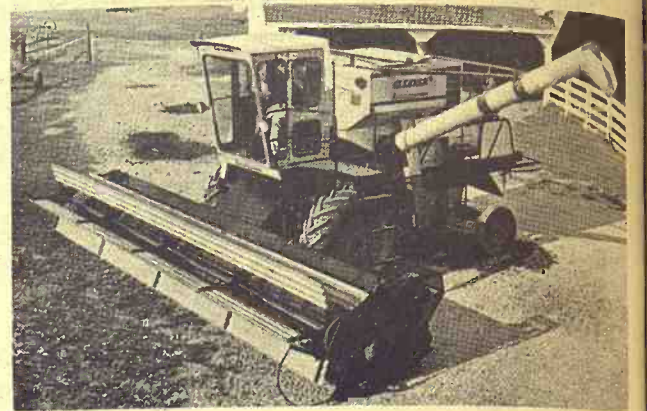
"Senator Porter and I have discussed this situation and have decided that it would be

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## Geary County Asks For Volunteer Guidance On Welfare Use

JUNCTION CITY — Kansas' protective payment law to insure that welfare recipients manage their monthly grants properly will be adopted by the Geary County Board of County Commissioners if enough volunteer workers can be found.

Keith Devenney, commission chairman, said relatives of welfare clients, members of the clergy, church members and members of women's organizations can be utilized in the program. County commissioners, landlords and welfare department case workers are not eligible.

### Aid To Client

A volunteer would be assigned to each welfare client deemed in need of the program. Advice and assistance would be given on a day-to-day basis.

"We are willing to implement the program in Geary County, but the citizens must show they are interested by volunteering to help," Devenney said.

Mr. and Mrs. Lenard Price, Junction City, who own extensive rental property occupied by welfare recipients, have charged many of the welfare clients are: committing fraud, purchasing nonessential items with welfare funds, have not paid textbook rental fees which were included in their grants, or are not paying rent and other bills.

The Prices met several times with commissioners and Claude Frese, county social welfare director, in regard to their allegations. They were told to submit names and actual incidents, which they did last week.

### Thorough Probe

Devenney said the commissioners, who serve as the County Social Welfare Board, will make a thorough investigation of each case submitted by the Prices.

Mrs. Price told of a welfare client who purchased a riding lawn mower, TV set and sewing machine from her monthly grant and then pawned the mower by the 10th of the month.

"She got a \$60 food order from the welfare department on the 15th," Mrs. Price said. "Then, her relatives moved in and now there are 13 people living in three rooms."

The Prices said they think there should be more counseling given by the case workers, especially to foreign born women. She cited a welfare client who had a \$59 per month bill for lights and gas.

"I talked to her and her kids and asked them why they didn't turn off the lights and heaters when they left the house," Mrs. Price said. "The woman said

juice. They think you just plug it into the cable and it runs," she said.

Devenney said the commissioners have discussed 30 hard core cases they feel need additional help from the case workers.

"We have implemented a program whereby visits will be made oftener than the required once - every - 90 - days. They'll be made weekly, if necessary," he said.

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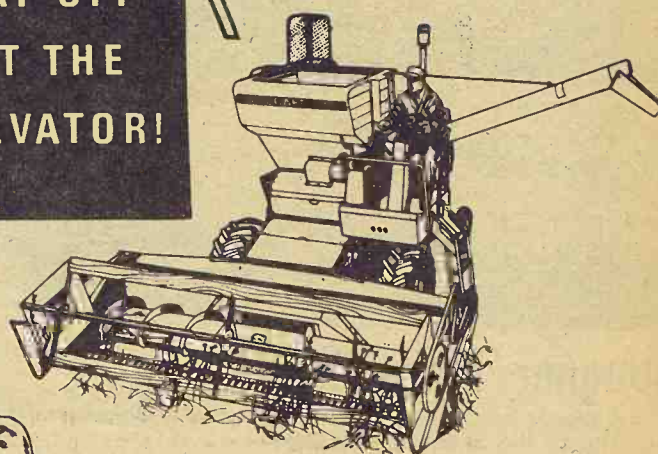
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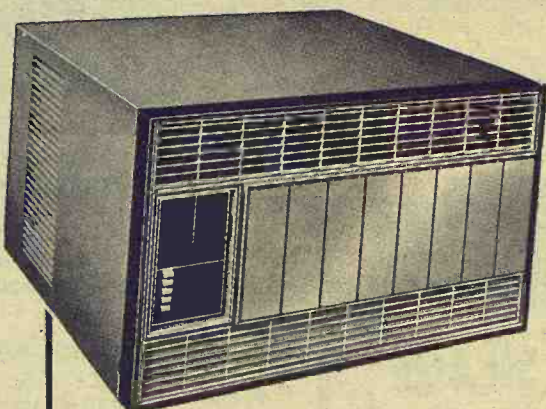
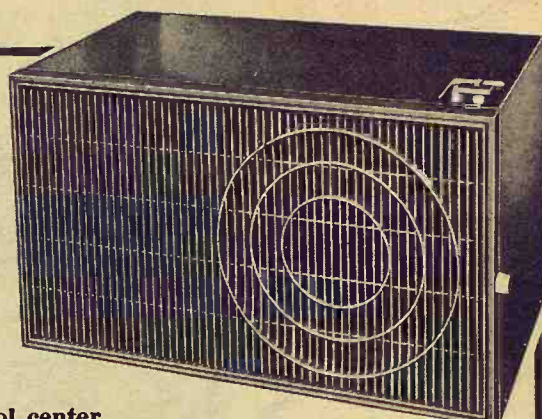

# Will Tax Increase Slow Economy?

A compromise tax increase and spending cut seems quite

possible now in order to reduce the threat of inflation. But will a tax increase now be effective, and how will it influence your

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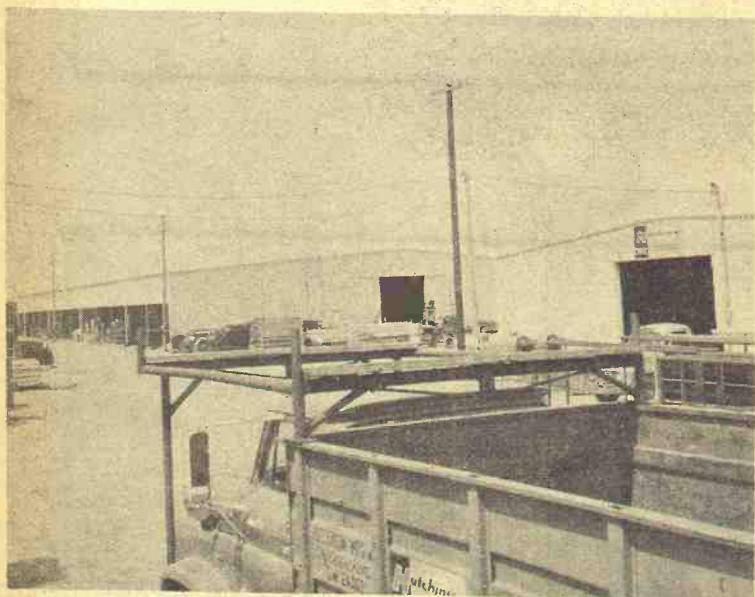
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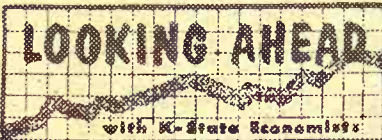
future?

Inflation has been called the cruelest tax because it often hits hardest those persons with relatively fixed incomes. Unless your income has increased nearly 4 percent in 1968 and almost 10 percent since 1966, you have not escaped the effects of inflation.

Inflation imposes the burden of more government spending by reducing the purchasing power of those who cannot respond with wage or price increases. A tax increase of the correct size and at the right time could spread this cost of additional government spending over the income earning group. But some economists question whether a tax increase now will be in time to hold inflation in check.

Controlling inflation is somewhat like observing a threatening rainstorm when you're some distance from shelter. If you wait until you're positive it's going to rain before you start for cover, you're sure to get drenched.

A tax increase now will not immediately eliminate the inflation present in the economy. Action was needed last fall to begin slowing today's inflationary trends.



You can expect a delay of 6 to 18 months before the full effect of fiscal or monetary action will be felt in the economy. So a tax increase and spending cut now would likely begin to slow the economy late this year, with most of the effect coming in 1969. Wisdom of a tax increase, therefore, depends less on present conditions than on the anticipated state of the economy in 1969.

Unless the need to rebuild cities and reduce poverty displaces the space race, farm, or other present programs, government spending is likely to be high in 1969 even if defense spending levels off.

In addition, the need to replace armament and develop new weapons will likely be heavy even if the present international situation cools. Planned spending by government may be matched by strong demand from business and consumers next year. In this case, reduced inflation would encourage a healthy economy.

Cooling of the international situation, a change in desires about government spending, and a saving attitude among consumers, however, may also mean that a tax increase now could lead to a downturn in the economy at least in terms of high unemployment.

It's possible that a tax increase now might prove to be an excessive restraint on unemployment. The economy is presently

in its longest expansionary period in history and may be overdue for a slowdown.

We need to remember, however, that while much of the present concern is due to existing inflation, the effects of a tax increase now will be felt primarily in 1969. Only if the economy is expected to continue to boom in 1969 will a tax increase now provide the basis for a continuing healthy economy.

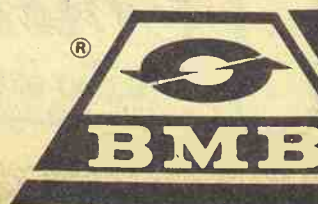

## Two New Record Fish

Two new state record fish have been confirmed by the Kansas Fish and Game Commission.

A 10-pound, nine-ounce walleye taken from Lovewell Reservoir June 1 by Floyd Stone, Belleville, and a 27-pound, 8-ounce carp caught by Milford Whitney, Paola, from Lake Miami near Paola on May 18, are the pacesetters.

Stone, trolling with rod and reel, and using a minnow-baited spinner, took his big walleye off the Cabin Point area at Lovewell. He was fishing with his wife and Dr. Raymond Galvin of Concordia. Dr. Galvin netted the big fish when Stone played it to the boat.

Thayne Smith, Pratt, chief of Information-Education for the commission, was at nearby Hankato at the time, and weighed, measured and confirmed the record for Stone. The fish measured 29 inches in length, and had a girth of 17 inches.

It was one of 12 the group caught for the day. They had others weighing six and five pounds. Mrs. Stone caught a nine-pound walleye from the same spot a week previous.

Stone's record-breaker replaced a 10-pound, 8-ounce walleye taken by Roy Laster, Hutchinson, from the outlet at Kanopolis Reservoir on April 2, 1961.

Whitney landed his big carp on rod and reel, using worms for bait. The fish measured 37 inches, and had a girth of 24 inches.

The previous carp record was 4-pound, nine-ounces, and was taken by Harvey W. Haas of Junction City from Clark's Creek near Skiddy on June 18, 1963.

## 12 Tons Of Fish Out Of Milford

JUNCTION CITY — Twelve tons of fish were seined from the stilling basin below the Milford Dam outlet tube this week, according to Rush Lang, Kansas Forestry, Fish and Game Commission game protector.

Included was a ton of game fish — catfish, bass, walleye, northern pike, crappie and bluegill; and 11 tons of rough fish — carp, buffalo, shad and gar.

Water in the stilling basin was pumped out to allow inspection of the structure by engineers of the U.S. Army Corps of Engineers. The fish were removed when the water level was at three feet.

The game fish were placed in Milford Reservoir, Geary County State Lake here, Pottawatomie County State Lake and a children's fishing pond in Clay Center.

The rough fish were given to persons wanting them and the remainder were buried.

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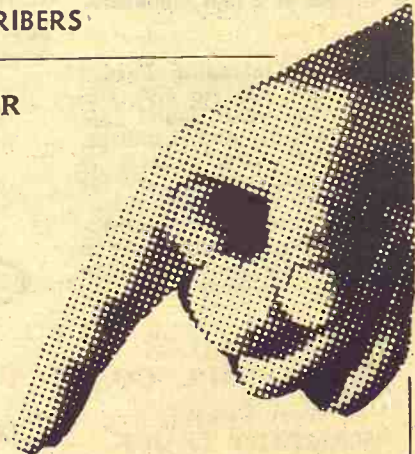

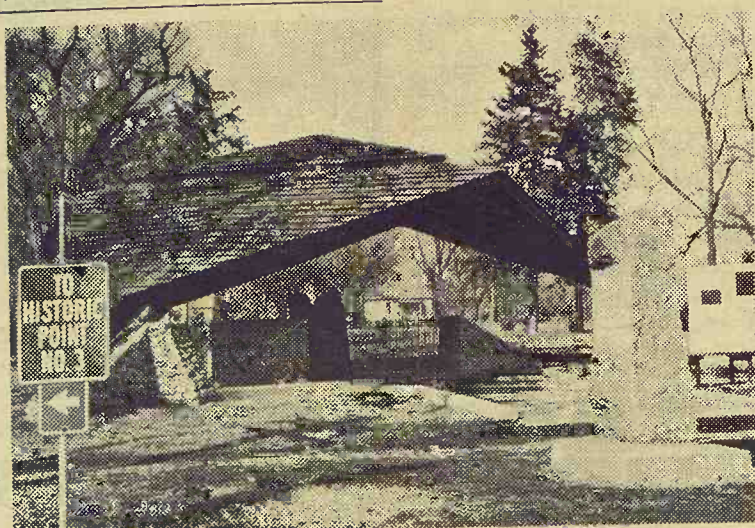

### Sterling Co-op Adds Dry Bulk Fertilizer Plant

Dr. Draytford Richardson, professor of animal husbandry at Kansas State University, will head the Agency for International Development project at

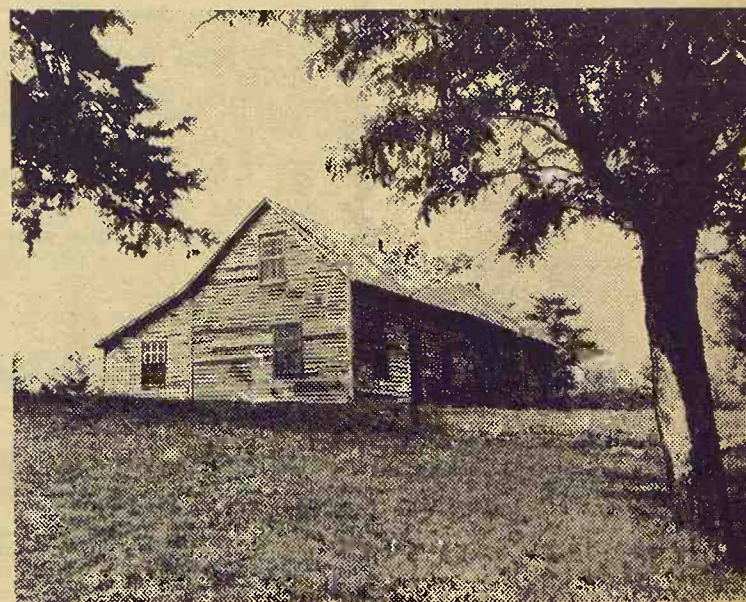

PONY EXPRESS STATION — The only original unaltered Pony Express station left standing today in its original location is one mile northeast of Hanover, Kansas. The Hollenberg Station was built originally as a ranch house in 1857. The Pony Express, which delivered mail from St. Joseph, Mo., to Sacramento, Calif., by fast pony, was first opened in 1860 and had a total of 80 riders averaging 135 pounds each. Kansas stations were at Johnson's Ranch, Troy, Cold Springs Ranch, Syracuse, Kennekuk, Kickapoo, Granada, Log Chain, Seneca, Laramie Creek, Ash Point, Guittard's Station, Marysville, and finally Hollenberg, the last stop before Nebraska. 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## Hay Leases Available At Olathe Navy

## Ease Youth Ban On Tractors

More than 3,600 Kansas youths in 85 counties have been cleared for work on Kansas farms under a revised ruling by the U.S. Department of Labor.

They are 14 and 15-year-old boys who recently completed 10-hour tractor-driving courses conducted by the Kansas Extension Service staff.

The ruling by the Labor Department Thursday alters legislation that went into effect Jan. 1, and which declared certain agricultural work hazardous for those under 16.

This included operating tractors, combines, balers, cornpickers, forage harvesters and other farm machinery.

The revised ruling of Thursday permits hiring 14 and 15-year-olds after they have com-

pleted formal training in tractor driving and where employers provide constant supervision on the job, said Fred Bergsrud, extension agricultural engineer at Kansas State University.

The youths must have completed a second 10-hour course to operate other than two-wheeled implements behind a tractor. This prohibits them from operating self-propelled machines such as combines, cornpickers and other four-wheeled implements, said John Hanna, extension specialist in 4-H at KSU.

The employer is required under the revised ruling to have a copy of the youth's certificate of training before work begins and must keep the copy on file.

"The employing farmer must be familiar with the occupations the youth is qualified to perform and with his (the farm-

er's) obligations in fulfilling the law," Bergsrud said.

An employer must maintain close supervision of the youth's work and where constant supervision is not practical, the farmer or his representative must check on the youth's safety at least at mid-morning, noon and mid-afternoon.

The 10-hour training course included written examinations on safe tractor and machinery operation and demonstration of ability to operate a tractor safely.

The training program does not relieve the employer of responsibility for instructing any employed youth on the safe and proper operation of specific equipment the youngster will operate, Bergsrud said.

## Role Changing For County Agent

Half a century ago a new breed of agricultural missionary—the county agent—was spreading the word that farmers could grow more crops, produce better cattle, and live more fruitful lives.

Since Congress created the Federal Extension Service in 1914, the county agent has become a familiar apostle of scientific agriculture.

Lloyd H. Davis, Extension Service administrator, says farming today is so complex and intertwined with the rest of society that the county agent has become one of the most rapidly changing teachers in the world.

"Farming requires more specialization and education than ever," Davis said, "and therefore it requires more knowledge and specialization among our agents."

The Extension Service involves federal, state and local cooperation.

Land grant universities serve as state administrative and re-

search centers, with the county agent as the grassroots outlet for the latest information gleaned from sources throughout the world.

"When Congress was discussing the bill to create the Extension Service," Davis said, "they talked about boys leaving the farm, about ways to improve the income and cultural lives of farm families."

"Today, despite the advances, we still are concerned about similar problems."

Only six percent of the nation's population today is on farms. The Extension Service, despite dwindling numbers, is directed primarily to agriculture.

But, Davis says, this function is continually being modified, molded and adjusted to current needs.

Use of specialists, or agents, in a number of counties instead of just one is rapidly developing in many states. In areas of greatly different types of farming it is almost impossible for one person to perform well in

all fields, Davis said.

As farms and investments have grown, the need for management, marketing and economic counsel has spiraled.

More and more the Extension Service is involved in the social and economic patterns of rural life, Davis said.

Collective bargaining and marketing are frontiers to which the county agent is turning. He is probing the social factors of a community—the causes and effects of emigration, the areas of poverty and what remedies are available.

The Extension Service includes three basic areas of activity—agriculture, home economics and youth programs.

"We have considerably reoriented home economics programs toward the disadvantaged," Davis said. "And when you do this, you become more aware of the low income and disadvantaged wherever they are, in the cities as well as in rural areas."

There are pilot Extension programs in about 40 of the nation's 50 largest cities, Davis said.

"Some of the techniques we have found successful on the farms don't work in the cities," he said. "Some of the people who need them most don't or can't come to meetings. Others can't read the literature. You have to go to their homes."

Most of the pilot programs are in conjunction with local community actions programs, Davis said.

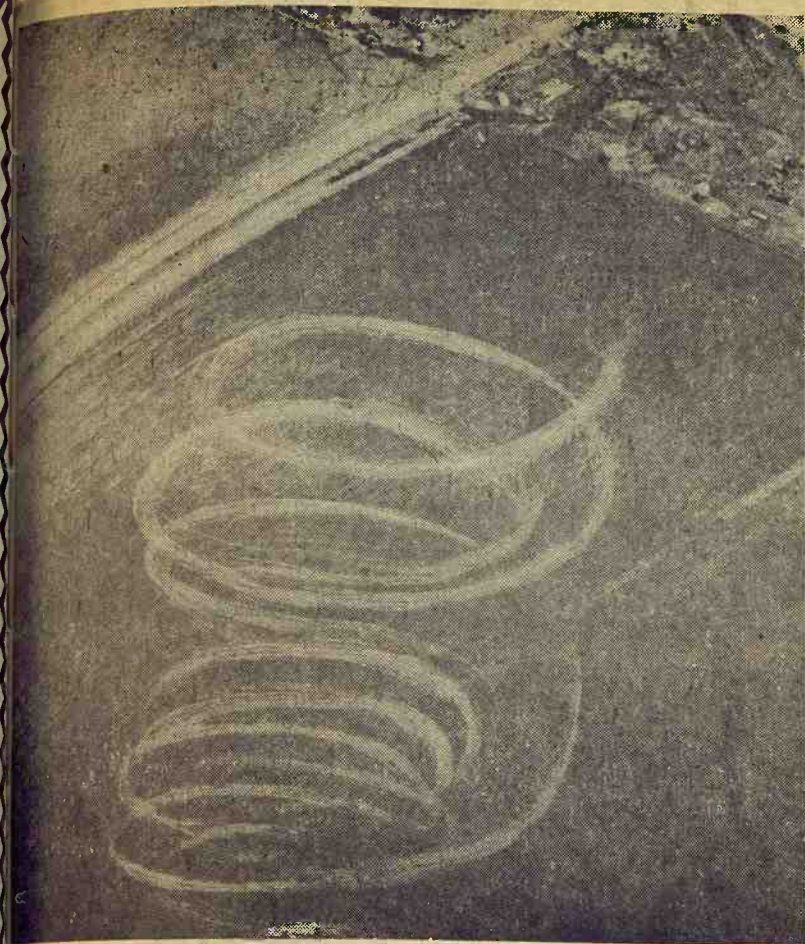

## U.S. Losing Honey Market

The United States is far and away the world's largest honey producer but has only a dwindling share of the natural sweet moving in international trade.

Even in an unusually short crop year, such as 1967, American output was 223 million pounds, or more than one-fourth of world production. The closest rival, the Soviet Union, had estimated output of 220 million pounds of honey.

The United States consumed all but five per cent of domestic honey. Ten years ago, 20 mil-

lion pounds were shipped abroad. Last year's exports dropped to 12 million, about 7 per cent of the world honey trade.

Mexico is the largest exporter of honey, followed by Argentina, Communist China and Australia. West Germany is the largest importer by far, taking 46 per cent of all honey sold internationally.

American honey is favored for quality and flavor, but lower grade, cheaper honey, particularly those for industrial processing, are taking the market. Germany bought U.S. honey last year at 17 cents a pound. Mexico and Argentina sold theirs for 11 cents and Communist China made sales for 10 cents a pound.

## Leslie Report Adds To Kansas Wheat Forecast

A Kansas wheat crop of 202,440,000 bushels is estimated by Conrad Leslie of Lamson Bros. & Co., of Chicago under June 1 conditions. This compares with the May 1 estimate of 192,800,000 made by the Department of Agriculture.

Leslie said that yield prospects had improved moderately in Kansas in May.

The Leslie estimate is a private report that is watched in the grain trade. Leslie puts the entire wheat crop in the United States this year at 1,517,850,000 bushels. The harvest last year was estimated by the Agriculture department at 1,524,349,000 bushels, which was a record. The average for the last three years has been 1,383,888,000 bushels.

## Gain In World Cattle Hog Count

The Agriculture department says world hog and cattle numbers are increasing.

The world hog population early this year was estimated at 510,000,000 head, an increase of 2 percent from a year earlier. This also is an increase of 15 percent above the 1961-65 average.

The major swine increases occurred in Asia and Western Europe, the department said.

Cattle numbers set a new high of 1,153,000,000 head at the beginning of 1968, the department said. However, the annual rate of growth shows signs of slowing, it added.

The increase was less than one percent, compared to 1.4 percent for 1967 and 2.8 percent for 1966, the department said.

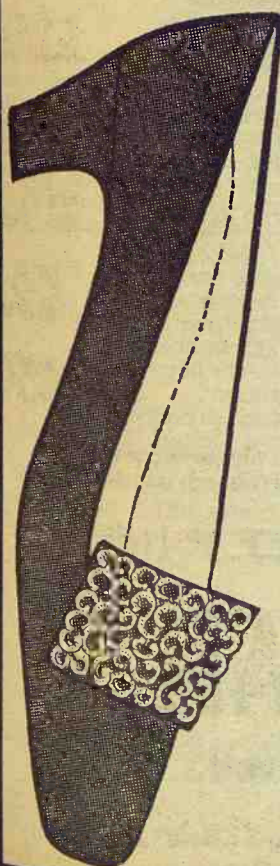

Robert, 14, the son of an automotive supply store operator, defeated 74 other contestants in the contest, finishing up with "myasin" and "abalone." That's the runnerup, Ann Johnson of Richfield, Minn., behind Robert.

## To Retain Carcass Tags

The U.S. Department of Agriculture has proposed a system to better identify animals and parts of animals until after slaughter inspection is completed.

The proposed amendment to the meat inspection regulations provides for retaining ear tags, and all other man-made identifying devices so they can be attached or related to the carcass after the animal is slaughtered and until inspection is completed.

USDA's Consumer and Marketing Service — which administers the Federal Meat Inspection Program — explained that the amendment would give inspectors all available information about the animal. This will be used to trace the origin of animals whose meat is found to be unwholesome.

Retaining all the information about the animal would also serve as an early warning to inspectors when animals come from locations known to have disease or biological residue problems, officials explained.

To assure consumers a wholesome meat supply, federal inspection requires before-and-after slaughter inspection of all animals processed in plants which ship meat or meat products across State lines or in foreign commerce.

## COUNTY PROGRAM TO DESTROY MARIJUANA

WESTMORELAND — Pottawatomie county is going to rid itself of wild-growing marijuana, if a campaign by county attorney John Lang is effective. Lang has asked the county weed department to locate the weed where it grows in the county and Lang will order property owners to destroy it. He said the weed grows in abundance in Kansas and in Pottawatomie county.

## Workers Insurance Rate Down Except For Contracting

Workmen's compensation rates in Kansas will go up one-tenth of one percent effective July 1, but the modest increase approved by Frank Sullivan, state insurance commissioner, is only an average.

The rate on industry-paid insurance to cover injuries to workmen will go down in several categories of employment, altho there will be a sizable 4.8 percent increase in the contracting industry.

Rates for manufacturing, however, will go down by 1.2 percent and all other categories will average a 2.9 percent decline.

Insurance officials say the contracting industry is trying to determine which specific jobs are most hazardous so its members can conduct safety programs in these lines.

## BIG JUMP IN COST OF PIPELINE LAND

The cost of acquiring land for oil pipelines has risen by nearly a third in five years, says Lee White, chairman of the Federal Power Commission. White said that between 1960-63 and 1964-67 the average cost per mile of land for laying pipe rose from \$2659 to \$3511.

# Senate Committee Approves World Wheat Pact

The Senate foreign relations committee last week approved without fanfare the new international grains agreement that will raise the price of wheat in world trade.

The agreement is vigorously opposed by the U.S. grain trade groups and by the Department of Agriculture. One provision will commit other nations to share in food and for underfed countries.

A two-thirds vote of the Senate will be required for approval because the agreement is being handled as a treaty. There was no report on the opposition (if any) within the committee, but some floor opposition is possible.

The treaty is expected to be taken up for floor debate and action this week.

The new grains agreement was negotiated as part of last year's Kennedy Round trade negotiations. The U.S. accepted it as the best available substitute for assured access to the European Common Market, which has a potentially protectionist agricultural policy.

At present there is an oversupply of wheat — at least commercial wheat — and prices are well below the new minimums. If the agreement takes effect July 1 as expected, assuming the Senate approves, the Agriculture department will probably put a form of export tax on wheat to bring prices up to the minimums.

There would thus be little or no immediate benefit for the farmers. The grain trade opposes the agreement on two main counts.

It is feared that the higher prices will lead to additional production in other countries, such as Australia, thus adding to world oversupply.

Also the trade is worried that the U.S., in living up to the minimum prices, will lose ex-

ports to other countries that shave prices. The administration has insisted that the U.S. will remain competitive, even if this means violating the minimum price.

At issue eventually may be the mechanics of interpreting the new treaty in case of sales made below the new minimums. The grains agreement replaces the 20-year-old international wheat agreement, which had lower minimum prices.

# Corn Depressed By Large Supplies

The corn market has been disappointing to many farmers. Recent prices for cash corn were very little above those offered last December. And they were 15 to 20 cents lower than one year before. Recent prices for corn futures contracts were at or near their season's lows — down 10 to 15 cents from their earlier high points.

The principal reason for lower corn prices this year is that the 1967 corn crop was much larger than that of the previous

year. The 1967 crop is estimated at 4,722 million bushels — 15 percent larger than the previous crop.

Another reason for the lower prices this year is that the crop now being marketed is of comparatively poor quality. Much of it failed to mature and dry out properly.

The poorer quality of our corn is indicated by its lower price in relation to prices of competitive feeds grains. Thus, recent prices of corn at Kansas City

were down about 5 cents a bushel in relation to prices of sorghum grain. At Rotterdam (the big market in Europe), our corn was down about 10 cents a bushel compared to that of corn from Argentina and South Africa.

**Exports of Corn.** From October 1 to June 1, exports of corn totaled around 410 million bushels. This amount was 27 percent more than a year before, but still 14 percent less than the record exports of two years ago.

Our exports of corn are strongly influenced by the supply of feed grains in other countries. We sell more when supplies are short elsewhere.

The 1968 Argentine corn crop is estimated at about 260 million bushels. This is about an average crop for that country, but it is about one-fifth less than the big crop harvested just a year ago.

Exports of corn from Argentina during the year ended with March totaled about 150 million bushels. Exports are expected to be one-fourth to one third less this year. Export prices for Argentine corn have been reduced about 20 percent since last December.

The need for corn as feed in our own country does not appear to be increasing much this year. During the first half of this marketing year, that use apparently totaled about 1.9 billion bushels — up 2 or 3 percent from a year before.

Total supplies of corn on hand April 1 were estimated at 3,163 million bushels — 17 percent more than a year earlier. Of this total, the amount under price-support loans at the first of May was 622 million bushels — nearly twice as much as a year earlier. Near the end of May, the CCC held about 136 million bushels — practically the same as a year earlier.

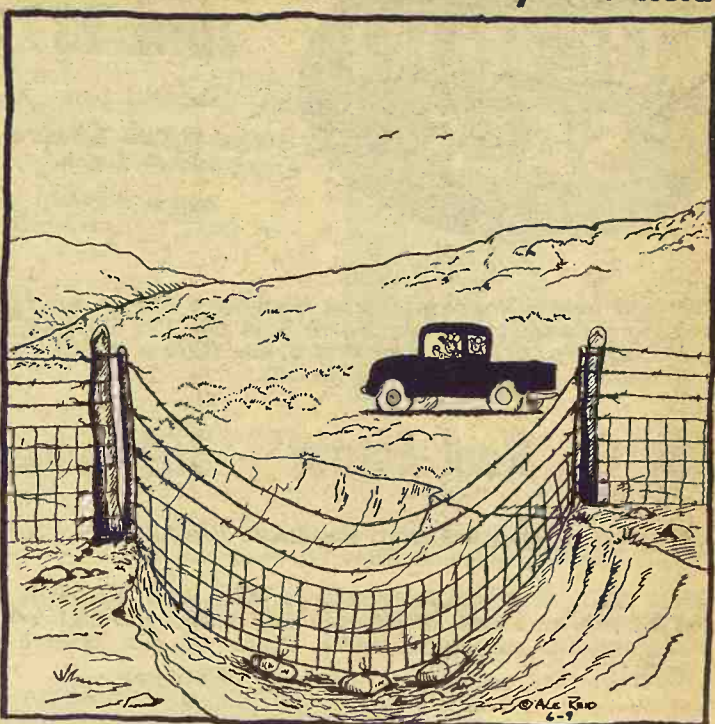
USDA statisticians now expect the carryover of corn next October 1 to be between 1.1 and 1.2 billion bushels, compared with only 823 million bushels carried over last fall. The amount of "free" corn in the carryover is expected to be around 400 million bushels, about the same as in 1967 and 1966. ("Free" corn means corn that is neither under price support loans nor owned by the CCC.)

Any major changes in corn prices will depend on new crop developments.

## **Wheat Tour Hears More Hybrid Talk**

Talk of hybrid wheat has been a little premature up to now but it is getting closer to becoming a commercial reality, visitors in the 24th annual field day sponsored by the Kansas Wheat Improvement Association were told last week.

Fifty millers, bakers and a few bankers were in the group which travelled by bus from Wichita to Hutchinson, seeing a growing crop in one of the important wheat areas of the state.

The area had a poor crop last year, but the current prospect looked much better to the visitors and most predicted some harvesting in the Hutch-Wichita area late this week or early next.

A feature of this year's field was a tour of the Rudy-Patrick hybrid wheat research center just outside Hutchinson. Here the visitors were impressed with the intricate and sophisticated procedure necessary to produce hybrids.

The wheat plant produces a "perfect" flower; that is, the flower is both male and female and pollinates itself. In order to produce hybrids, male sterile plants must be produced or discovered so that inbred crosses may be accomplished.

The experimental wheat is grown in greenhouses under controlled temperatures. By vernalization (putting wheat seed in a room with cold temperatures for several weeks), duplicating putting seed in the ground in winter months, it is possible to get two crops a year in the greenhouse.

A tremendous amount of hand work is necessary in cross pollinating each wheat bud in a head of growing wheat. The goal, of course, is a hybrid wheat which will yield better than the usual varieties.

Dr. Charles Hayward, who is in charge of the Rudy-Patrick center, told the visitors there still were many problems to be solved in producing a high yielding, quality hybrid wheat. He suggested that some of the predictions on hybrids a few years ago had turned out to be a little premature.

"However," he added, "we're optimistic and we do feel that hybrid wheats will be a commercial reality."

"Some day, maybe half the wheat used will be hybrid and that will mean utilizing about 30 million bushels of seed annually. That's why we are in this business."

Other seed companies and state experiment stations are in the process of developing hybrids.

The visitors also were impressed

## **'Protection' Would Harm Farm Exports**

The United States runs the risk of "a disastrous decline in its sale of farm products abroad if protectionist policies are adopted at home," Orville L. Freeman, Secretary of Agriculture, said.

"We cannot have our cake and eat it too," he said. "We cannot keep on exporting more and more farm products while cutting down on imports."

Freeman spoke at a conference on U.S. trade policy.

He said the value of U.S. farm exports gained 60 per cent, from \$4,500,000,000 in 1960 to \$6,800,000,000 in 1967 and that the United States is the world's largest agricultural exporter.

sed by a field in which 4000 strains of wheat from all over the world are being grown. Actually, Dr. Hayward said, there are 16,000 different strains, or lines, of wheat in the world.

Each variety being grown here is being studied for yield, disease resistance, length of straw, and many other qualities.

"If any one of them should

show some outstanding characteristic that we could incorporate into our hybrid breeding program, then all this would be worthwhile," Dr. Hayward said.

One thing they are looking for is short, stiff stem varieties that will take a lot of fertilizer. Such wheats have the potential for high yields without falling down.

## Don't Let Fungicide Names And Uses Confuse You

If you get confused when buying chemical fungicides for treating your plants, the labels on the containers will answer most of your questions, says Claude L. King, Extension plant pathologist at Kansas State University. Usually fungicide recommendations are made by type or common name, such as maneb, captan, and ferbam, and each of these has several trade names on the market. For example, "maneb 80 percent" may be found under Manzate, Dithane M-22, Manzate D, Dithane M-22 Special, and others. By examining the label under the ingredients section, you'll see that any one of these can be used for maneb. A brief description of common fungicides used on plants and several examples of their trade

names and uses are listed below:  
**Captan** — is sold as Orthocide 50 Wettable, Captan 50W, Orthocide Garden Fungicide 50 percent, and Acme Garden Fungicide. Captan is a general purpose fungicide for leaf spot diseases on fruits, vegetables, ornamentals, and turf.  
**Ferbam** — is sold as Fermate Ferbam Fungicide, Carbamate, Karbam Black, and Ortho Ferbam Fungicide. Generally this material is used to control fruit diseases, leaf spots, and rusts on ornamental plants. This fungicide is black and may leave objectionable black deposits on light-colored flowers. Some people may be allergic to this material, but it will cause only temporary discomfort.  
**Fixed Copper** — is sold as Tri-basic Copper Sulfate, Ortho

Copper Fungicide, C-O-C-S, and Miller 658 Fungicide. This material is generally used on ornamental plants to control anthracnose and leaf spots on shade trees and Juniper and Willow blights. Because of occasional injury on new growth and with the advent of newer organic fungicides, this material has limited use on vegetable crops other than for the control of some bacterial diseases.

**Folpet** — sold as Ortho Phaltan 50 Wettable, Ortho Rose and Garden Fungicide, Stauffer Phaltan 75-W. This is an effective fungicide for ornamental plants and some fruit diseases. It gives good control of powdery mildew of roses and grapes when used on a protective schedule.

**Maneb** — is sold as Manzate and Dithane M-22, also as Manzate D or Dithane M-22 Special, both of which contain additional amounts of zinc. Maneb is a very useful fungicide for the control of vegetable diseases. Also, it can be used on ornamentals and turf for leaf spot control.

**Zineb** — is sold as Parzate C, Dithane Z-78, Ortho Zineb Wettable. This material is used primarily on vegetable, ornamental, and turf diseases.

Fungicides are materials that protect plants from diseases rather than eradicating the disease once infection has occurred. They must be applied at regular intervals to give the best protection. Remember, too, that they do not control insects. At times you may need to use both a fungicide and an insecticide to give proper plant protection, King says.

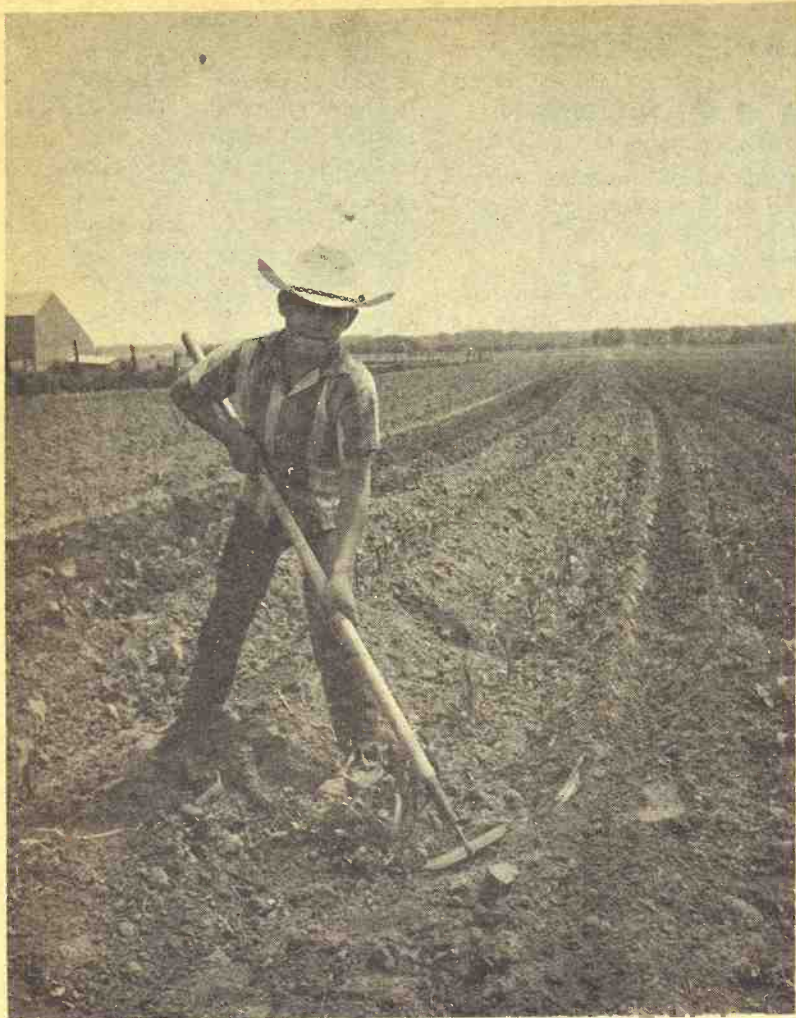

## \$495 Each To Horton Indians

HORTON, Kans. — More than 2,000 members of the Prairie Band Potawatomi Tribe of Kansas will receive \$495.50 each as their share of an award by the Indian Claims Commission for inadequate compensation for lands ceded by treaties.

Ty Burnett, acting superintendent of the Horton agency of the Department of the Interior's Bureau of Indian Affairs, said the remaining 28 percent of the judgment award was approved by the tribal governing body for other tribal programs and purposes.

The lands were ceded under three treaties in 1861 and 1862.

Each adult tribal member will receive a check for direct payment while the shares of persons under 21 years, incompetents, welfare recipients and the shares of persons for whom addresses are unknown will be deposited in individual accounts with the Bureau of Indian Affairs Horton agency here.

# Two Big Counties Eye Welfare Improvements

TOPEKA — Next month two large Kansas counties are scheduled to become involved in a new program aimed at removing a controversial class of welfare recipients from the rolls.

On July 1, Sedgwick and Wyandotte counties are to begin an effort to place recipients of Aid to Dependent Children (ADC) payments in full and part-time jobs.

Called the Work Incentive Program (WIN), the plan is a

joint venture involving the U.S. Department of Labor and the Department of Health, Education and Welfare, working through state and local welfare agencies.

The idea is to provide training and eventual employment or immediate employment for ADC mothers, unemployed fathers and older children who are not in school.

State and local welfare officials have suggested that the new federal program may be

aimed at curtailing criticism of the huge ADC program which requires the greatest welfare financing.

The ADC program often is the target of welfare opponents who point an accusing finger at illegitimate children in some families.

In Kansas, the ADC program cost an estimated \$18.8 million in fiscal 1968 and \$20.5 million is budgeted for fiscal 1969.

Across the state, there are about 42,000 ADC recipients included in nearly 10,000 cases.

In Sedgwick County, there were 2,675 ADC cases as of Jan. 1. Wyandotte county had 1,610 on the same date.

Miss Ruth Laing, director of public assistance for the State Department of Social Welfare, is organizing the program on the state level. She said that while participation of the two counties was requested initially, others may be added.

Under the WIN program, ADC recipients still will receive welfare payments even though they might be employed if their pay fails to meet their requirements as outlined by law and regulation, she said.

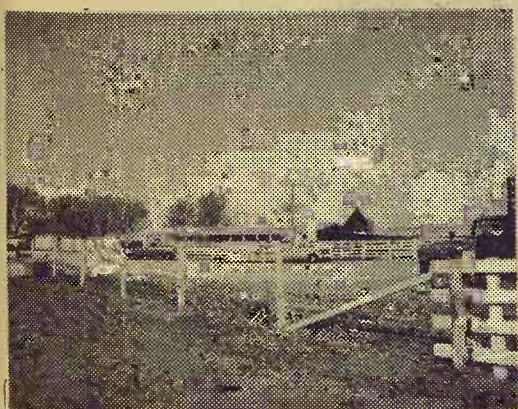

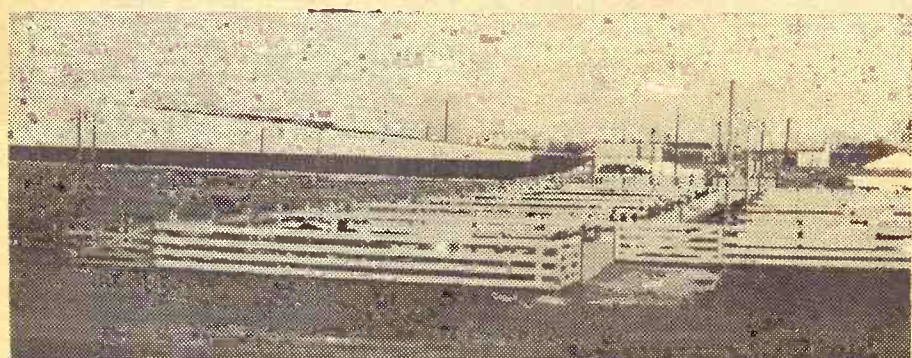
