



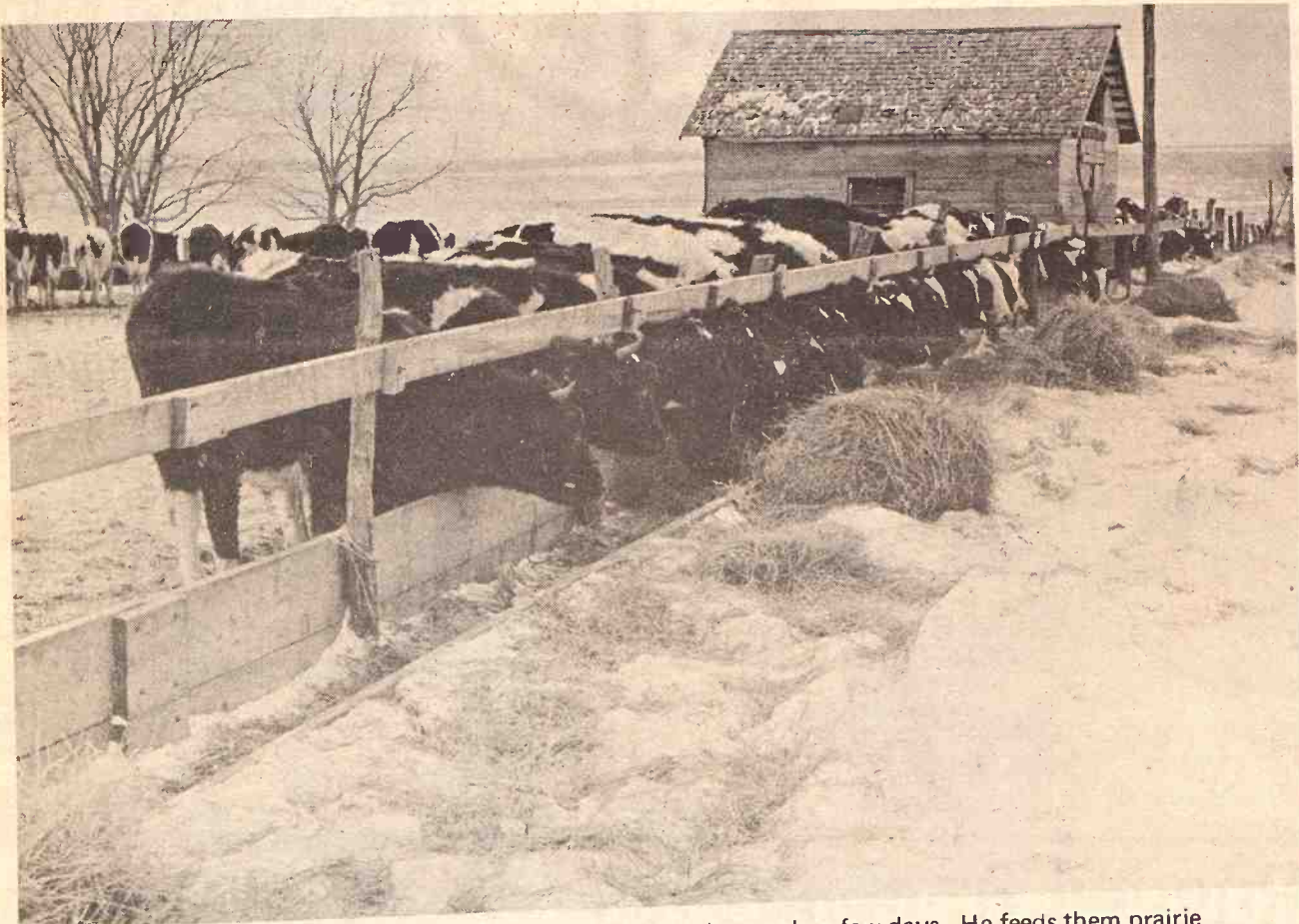

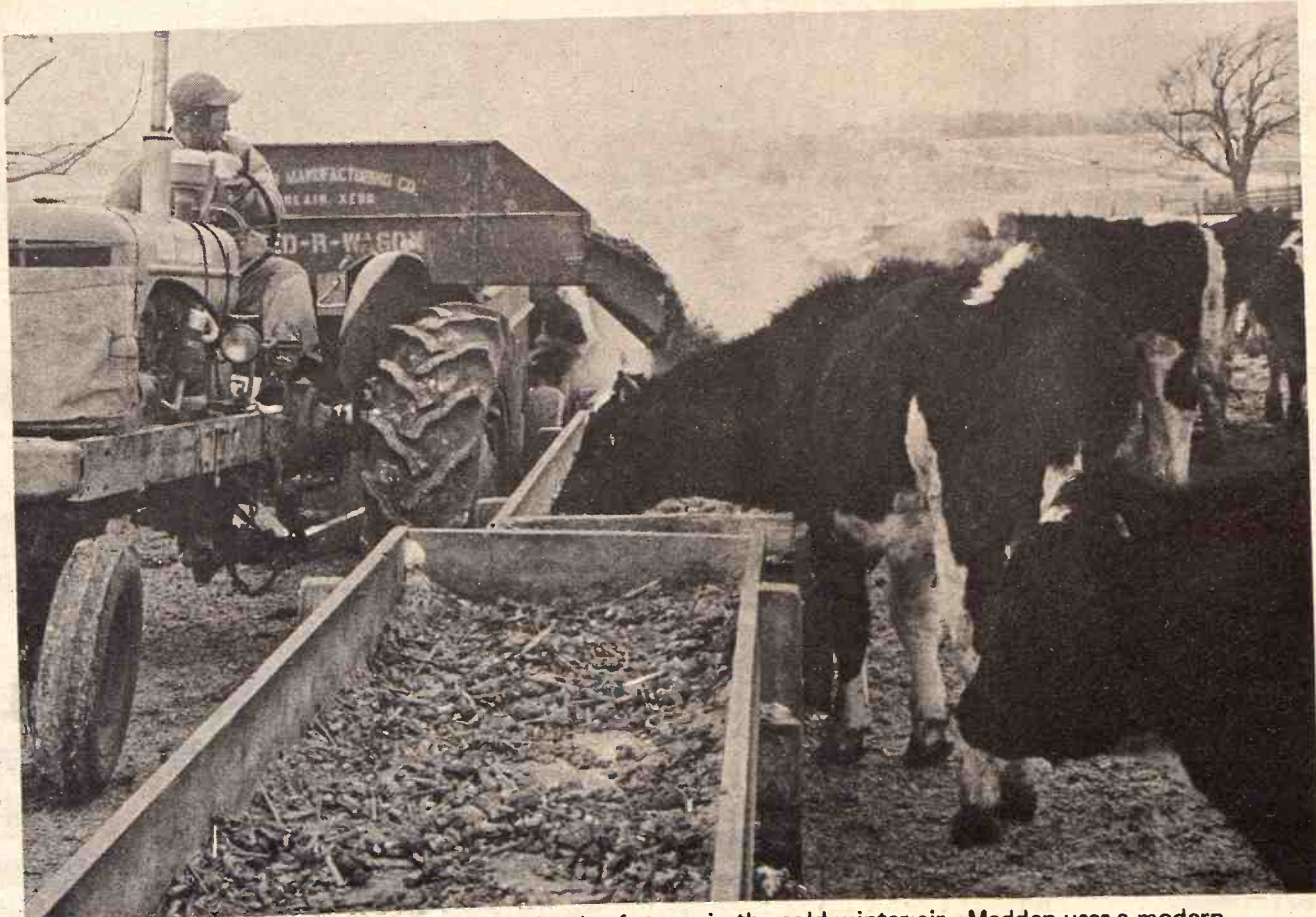

Absenteeism In Senate Reaching New High

United States Senate members, with Democratic presidential candidates leading the way, have run up an absentee record which has even upset the Senate's gentlemanly Democratic leader, Mike Mansfield.

The roll call taken this session shows that the five presidential candidates in the Senate are among the worst offenders, although they have several times interrupted their campaigns to return for critical votes.

In order of absenteeism on the first 30 roll call votes, Sen. Henry M. Jackson, Washington missed 27; Sen. Edmund Muskie, Maine, 26; Sen. Vance Hartke, Indiana, 23; and Sens. Hubert Humphrey, Minnesota, and George McGovern, South Dakota, 21 each.

All candidates except McGovern were absent when the Senate voted on legislation involving the West Coast dock strike.

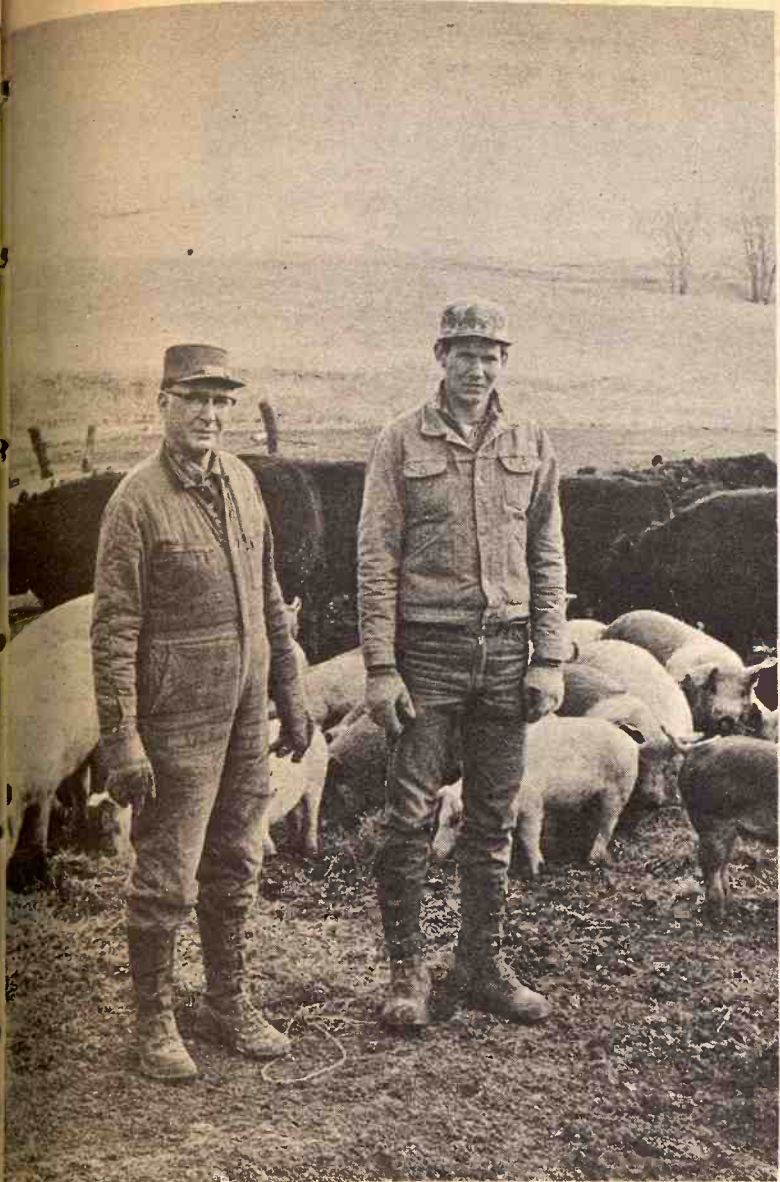

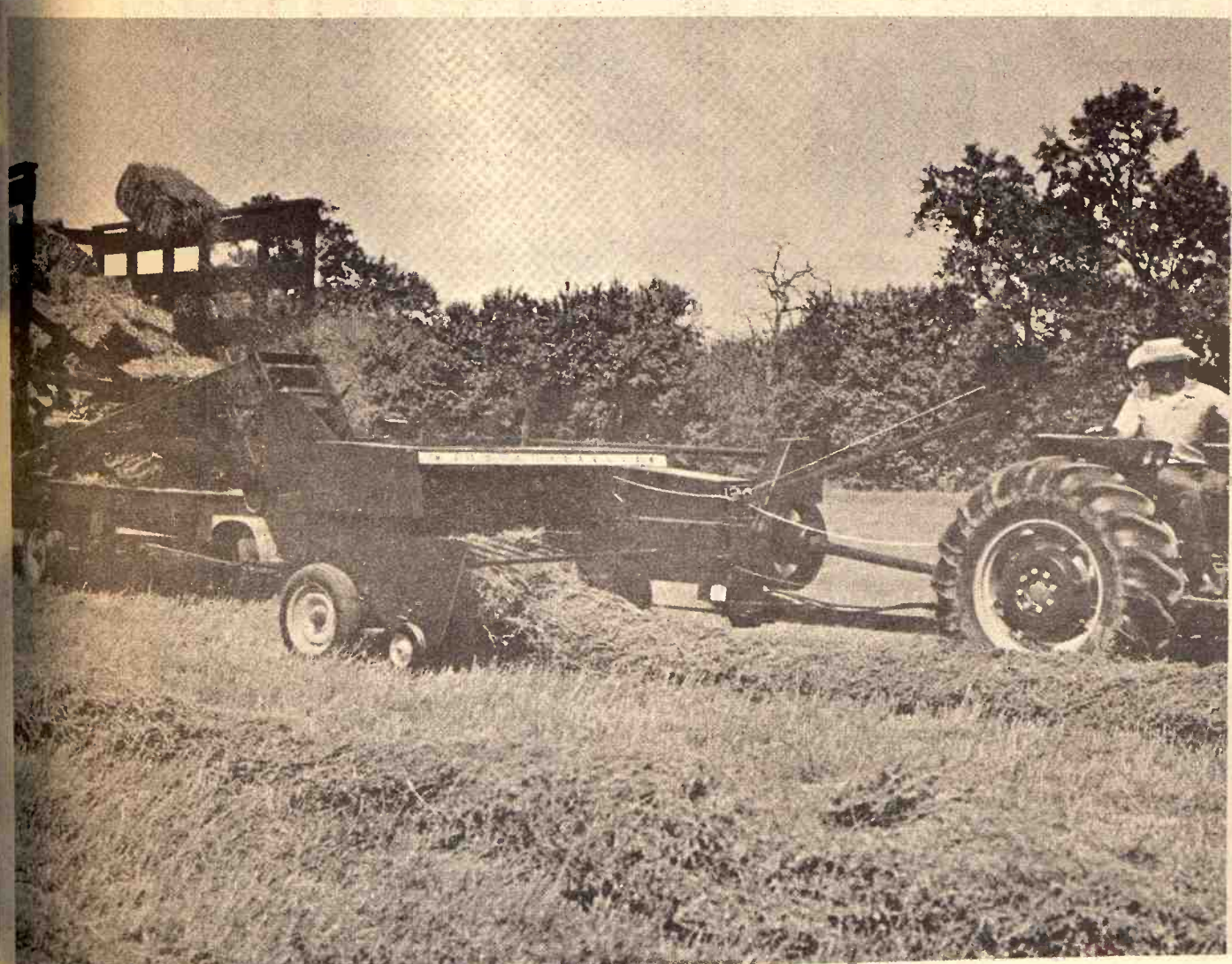

Kansas Crop Assn. Finds Protection In 1970 Plant Act

The 1970 Plant Variety Protection Act was one of the major topics of discussion during the annual meeting of the Kansas Crop Improvement Association in Manhattan.

The act allows plant breeders to protect their varieties, similar to the way a patent on a machine protects

the inventor.

It also provides that royalties can be charged on new or improved plant varieties. An example is the Centurk wheat variety, released in Nebraska and planted in Kansas.

Bob Bratcher, secretary-treasurer of KCIA, explained that under terms of the act Centurk variety wheat must be sold (1) by variety name, and (2) as a class of certified seed.

"Centurk wheat must have the certified seed tag to be sold in the U.S.," he added. Violators can be prosecuted.

New association officers, elected at the meeting, are John Neuschwander, Tribune, president; John Bunck, Everest, vice-president; and Bratcher was reappointed secretary-treasurer.

New directors are Cyril Habiger, Bavaria; Albert Kientz, Wamego; and Ted Friesen, Garden City.

John Hamon, a Valley Falls certified seed grower, discussed his two year stint in India under the KSU-AID program. He advised Indians on ways to increase crop production.

Cleve Cook, Emporia, was named

recipient of the Premier Seed Grower award, presented annually by the Kansas City Chamber of Commerce.

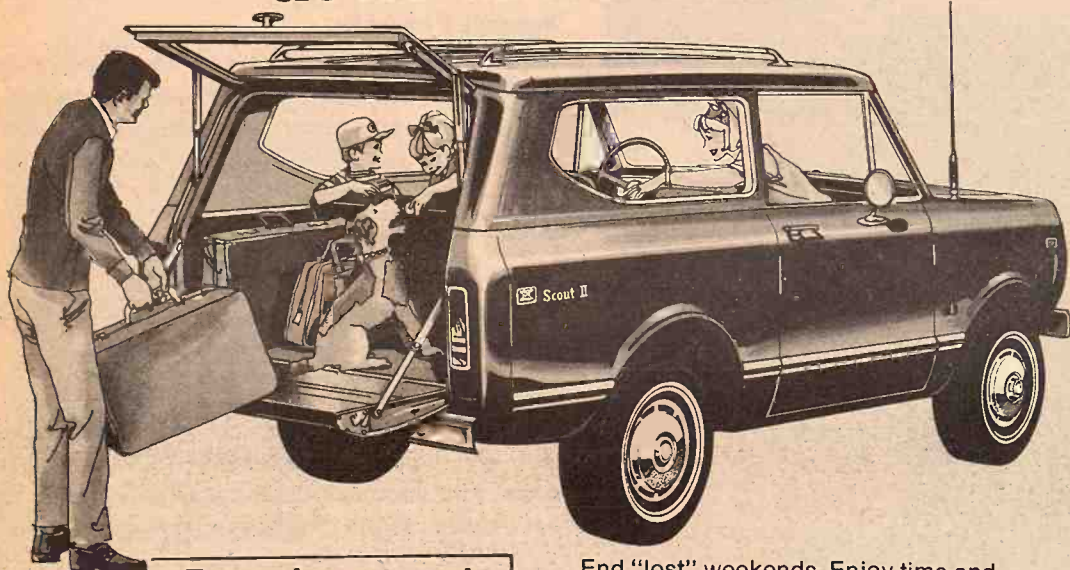

Fast Approaching Zero Growth In Population

The number of children American women expect to bear dropped so between 1967 and 1971, the census bureau has reported that the nation is fast approaching zero population growth rates among younger women.

The average number of children expected by wives aged 18 to 24 dropped from 2.9 to 2.4 in that period, a bureau report said. Applied to all women in that age group, married or not, this might well mean a fertility rate of 2.2 children.

This is not quite zero population growth, the ideal of the national movement for "ZPG". The rate needed simply to replace deaths is 2.1 children. Nor do the figures take immigration into account.

But the size and speed of the drop in the rates is nonetheless regarded as striking. The bureau noted, in its report, that it is by far the largest change since 1955, when birth expectation statistics were first published.

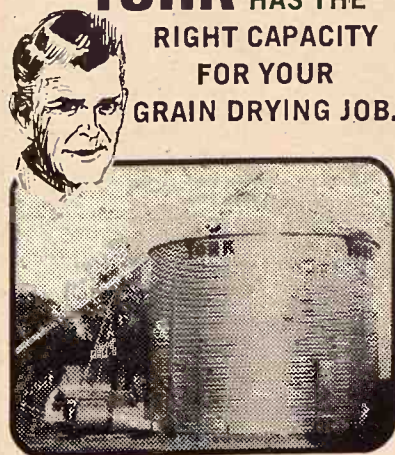
The new report has two important social implications. One concerns the future size of the population. If the rate of 2.4 children a wife continues, it would then be about 280 million, compared with a present population of about 208 million. Had the 2.9 rate continued, population would be more than 305 million by the year 2000.

Whether lower fertility rates will continue until the year 2000 obviously cannot be known, demographers say. They caution that a population "bomb" remains, since the trend could turn up again as quickly as it has now turned down.

The second implication of the report concerns the size of individual families. It shows a dramatic increase in the number of young wives who want two children or less. The figure jumped to 64 per cent.

The census report, based on interviews with 15,000 wives in some 50,000 households last June, gives authoritative new support to other recent showings of at least a short-term drop in the population growth rate.

1½ cups brown sugar
2 rounded tablespoons flour
2 eggs, well beaten
1½ cups milk
1 teaspoon cinnamon

When thick add butter size of walnut and 1 teaspoon vanilla and a pinch of salt. In 13x9x2-inch pan place layer of graham crackers (uncrushed) then layer of pudding, etc., leaving pudding the last layer. Chill overnight and serve with whipped cream or Dream Whip.

Organically Grown Foods Labeled "Gigantic Hoax"

Remarkable increases in sales of "organically grown" fruits and vegetables occurred in the past year even though they sold at 50 percent to 100 percent more than superior commercial products. Such gains are even more remarkable in view of the fact that "organically grown" produce is a gigantic hoax.

First, there is no benefit to the consumer as to nutrient content or safety if produce is grown with animal and plant manures only and without pesticides. Commercially grown fruits and vegetables are

equally nutritious and safe and of superior quality. Second, it is not possible to feed our 206 million people without use of agricultural chemicals, or farmers would be doing it. They use chemicals because they must in order to raise adequate, high quality crops. In primitive countries, where truly organic methods are used, people are under-nourished and often starve. Third, it is easy and tempting to rake in a huge profit by offering fruits and vegetables as "organic" when they are not.

"Look out for coming scandal in

surging organic foods," writes E. B. Weiss in Advertising Age of December 6, 1971. "The processor and the retailer who decide to market chemically-grown food as organic can take whopping profit margins. When the temptation is that powerful, the fast-buck boys are going to move in."

They have moved in, and most of the food alleged to be grown completely without chemicals is merely mislabeled.

The hoax goes beyond that. There is no such thing as an "organically grown" plant. Plants utilize water soluble inorganic ions, not organic compounds. They cannot use manure until soil organisms break it down to inorganic elements. Actually, plants can thrive on a solution of chemicals plus water, without any soil whatsoever.

The truth will sink in sometime, but it takes quite awhile for facts to catch up with the smooth and scientific sounding quackery of the pitchmen who now have even blended "organic" shampoos and face creams.

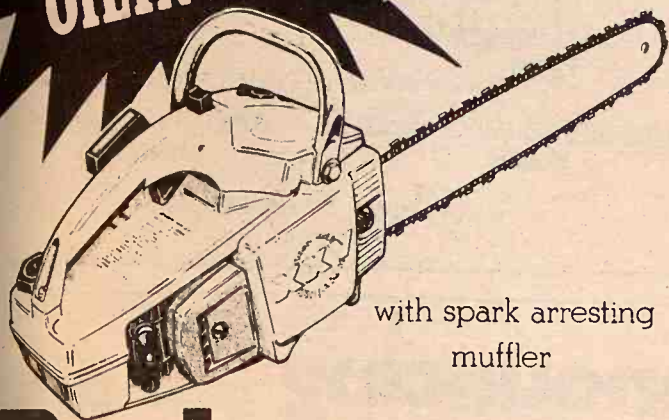

Freezer Meat

If you buy your beef by the quarter or side, you probably buy according to grade. But it would be well for you to also check theyield grade so that you will have some idea of how much meat will actually go into your freezer.

If you buy a yield grade of 1, you can expect to put 82 percent of the carcass weight into your freezer. It means only a 12 percent loss from the carcass to the freezer.

If you buy a yield grade 2, you can expect to put about 77 percent of that which you buy into the freezer.

A yield grade of 3 gives you almost 73 percent in the freezer.

A yield grade of 4 or 5 means less meat in the freezer, and you will have more waste.

On a 600 pound carcass, 4.6 percent difference in yields of cuts between yield grades means a difference of nearly 28 pounds of meat.

Install Acoustical Ceiling To Control Noise

Another benefit is that this type of ceiling helps keep the remaining sound in the room from spreading to quiet areas on an upper floor.

The installer begins by nailing the molding to the wall at the desired height to provide support for the panels at the perimeter of the room.

The hanger wires are attached to

the joists at four-foot intervals.

Then the handyman of the house fastens the main runners of the metal grid or framework to the hanger wires. The cross tees are then snapped into place.

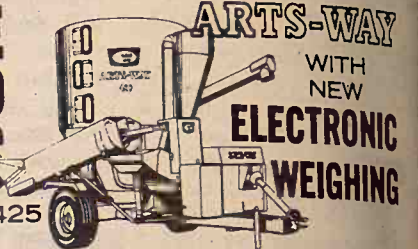
The final step is to lay the ceiling

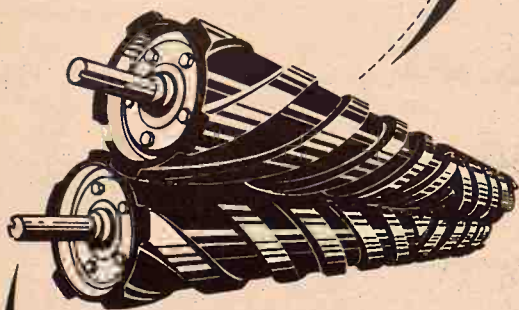

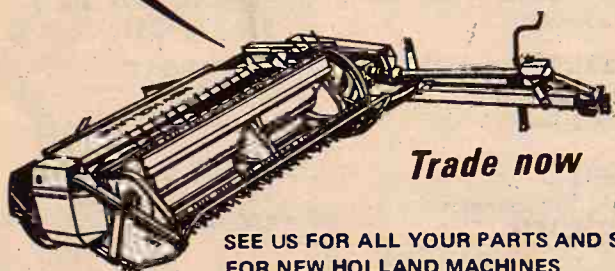

Soybean Growers Fear Overplant

The program of the Dept. of Agriculture to decrease corn acreage this spring and at the same increase soybean acreage has met with some dissent.

Harold Kuehn of Du Quoin, Ill., president of the American Soybean Assn., is afraid an increase of soybean acreage would put beans in the same situation that corn is in now. "I hope that soybean farmers will refrain from increasing soybean acreage more than 6 per cent," he said.

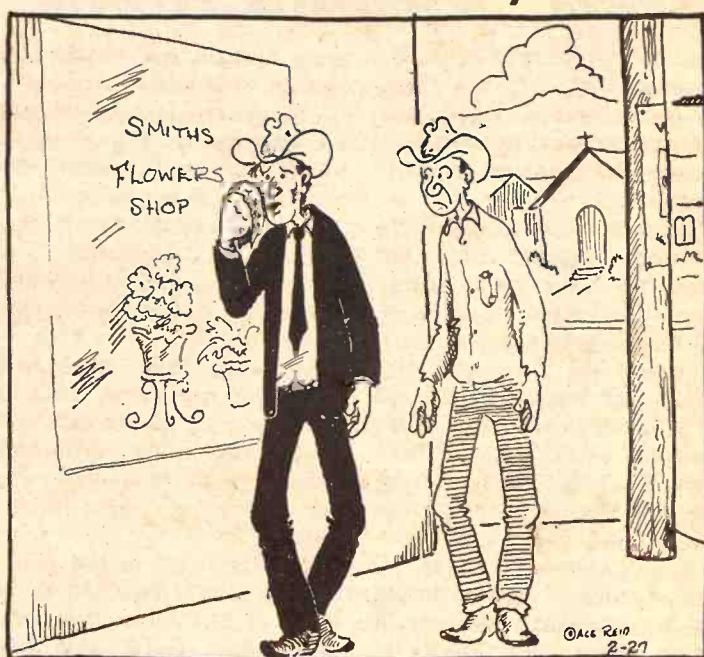
Kuehn points out that the increase in demand for soybeans is usually around 6 per cent a year. He notes

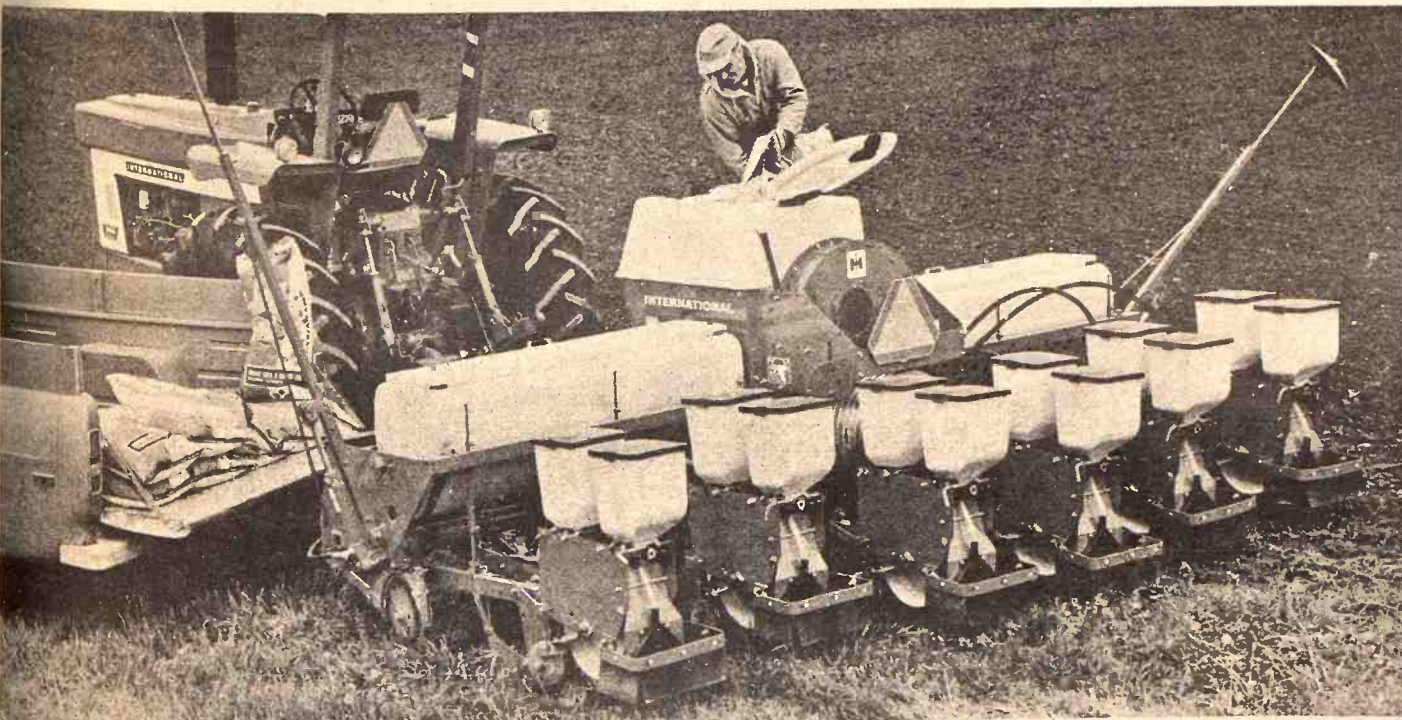

Revising Farm Income Guesses Upward

Agriculture Department officials, already predicting 1972 net farm income at a record high, are reportedly considering revising this year's income estimate upward even further.

The farm-income picture is looking even brighter than the estimated \$1.5 billion to \$2 billion gain already indicated.

At a boost of \$2 billion, net farm income would hit a record \$17.7 billion this year, surpassing the old mark of \$17.1 billion set in 1947. Now, the sources say, Agriculture Secretary Earl L. Butz is considering revising the estimate upward to as much as \$18.3 billion.

But there was no official indication of such a move during opening-day speeches at an annual outlook conference. Butz spoke at length, as he has before, on the Nixon administration's goal for higher farm income and how it would be a mistake for the government to put price curbs on raw agricultural products.

Butz also continued a barrage in support of currently high cattle prices and over ruled consumer contentions that "steak at \$1.99 a pound" is too high. Even at that

price, he said, housewives compete against each other to buy it.

"There's always a steak there in the supermarket when you go down to buy one, and it doesn't pile up, Butz said. "It moves out."

On farm income, Rex F. Daly, an Economics Research Service analyst, cited earlier estimates of \$1.5 billion to \$2 billion for gains this year.

However, Daly also told the conference net income "may total 10 to 15 per cent" above 1971 when the net was \$15.7 billion. At the higher 15 per cent range, that could mean 1972 net income of more than \$18.1 billion.

Exports, vital to the U.S. farm economy, are expected to total a value of \$7.4 billion for the fiscal year ending June 30, said Raymond A. Ioanes, administrator of the Foreign Agricultural Service. The previous record was \$7.8 billion in 1970-71.

Other estimates included:

—Feed grain exports, at 19.7 million tons last season, are expected to be about 1 million less this fiscal year, he said.

—Rice exports are expected to total about 37.5 million hun-

dredweight, milled basis, approximately unchanged. Oilseeds and their products, mostly soybeans, will set another fiscal year record at an estimated \$2.124 billion, up from \$2.065 billion last season, he said.

—Cotton sales overseas this fiscal year are estimated at slightly more than three million bales, down from 3.7 million in 1970-71, mainly because of scarcer supplies.

—Tobacco shipments are expected to drop to 550 million pounds from 584 million last fiscal year, but the export price currently is estimated to average slightly more than \$1 per pound, up three per cent.

—Fruit and vegetable exports, on the basis of value, will be up about 4 per cent this fiscal year.

—Livestock and meat products for export markets are estimated at a value of \$667 million, down 7 percent from last fiscal year. Reduced exports of tallow to Japan, lard to Britain and live slaughter cattle to Canada account for most.

—Dairy products for overseas will be up almost 65 per cent this fiscal year, mainly because of larger butter sales after shipments fell off from regular suppliers, Australia and New Zealand.

Following the Boone family performances will be a country western jamboree night show Sept. 19-20. Stars of that show will be

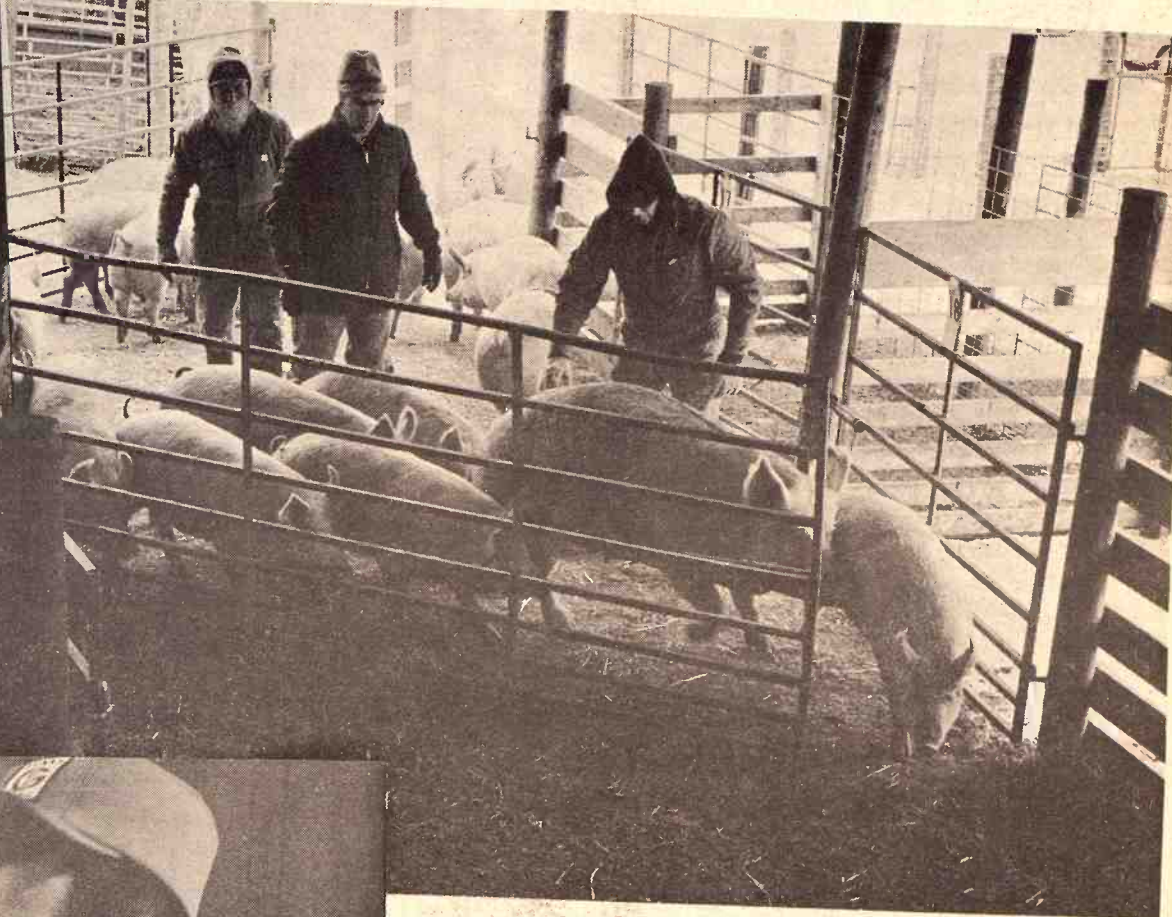

However, a university spokesman said, "evidence indicates that Monellin, unlike the other two products, is a soluble, biodegradable protein."

According to Dr. Robert H. Cagan, assistant professor of biochemistry and the principal investigator: "It is the first reported protein to elicit a sweet taste in man, and is the sweetest natural product known."

Dr. Cagan was introduced to the berry when he was beginning his biochemical studies of taste at the

Monell Center.

"I was immediately struck by the persistent quality of its sweetness," he said.

It's Demand That Boosts Meat Price

Meat prices are being widely discussed these days. Many housewives say that prices are too high. Some persons blame farmers, for creating scarcities to raise prices. Farmers object to this charge. What are the facts?

Farmers produced a record amount of meat last year, and they are planning to provide a similar total amount this year, with a little

more beef and a little less pork.

U.S. farmers produced 21.7 billion pounds of beef in 1971, 42 percent more than 10 years before. Imports added about 1.7 billion pounds, making a total of 23.4 billion pounds. That provided about 113.3 pounds per person—about the same as a year before, and 29 percent more than 10 years earlier.

In recent weeks beef output was 1

or 2 percent less than the very abundant supply turned out a year earlier, but farmers are preparing larger supplies. On January 1 they were fattening 13.8 million cattle for slaughter, 8 percent more than last year.

Pork Output Smashed Records

Farmers produced 14.6 billion pounds of pork in 1971, 10 percent more than the previous high set just a year before. This huge supply provided about 73 pounds for each consumer, 15 percent more than the average for the previous 10 years, and the greatest abundance since 1946.

While consumers were enjoying the bargains in pork, hog prices dropped to disaster levels. Farmers lost about 8 cents for each pound of pork produced over a nine-month period. Losses were so heavy that a substantial number of hog producers quit the business.

Consequently pork output so far this year has been about 15 percent less than the excessive supplies of a year ago. A recent survey by the USDA indicates that hog production for all of this year will be 7 to 9 percent less than in 1971. If so, there will be enough pork to provide about 67 pounds per person, or 3 to 4 pounds more than the ten-year 1961-70 average.

Stronger Demand For Meat

Consumer demand (buying power) increased substantially during the past year. Recent figures show nearly two million more persons employed than a year before—and wage rates up about 6 percent. As consumers spent more freely for meats, retailers bid more strongly for meats from packers, and packers bid more for cattle and hogs.

Retailers were slow to raise meat prices during the fall, for fear of violating some government price regulation or incurring the wrath of customers. Eventually, however, retail prices had to be raised to cover the increased cost of meat at wholesale. Prices of meat—and livestock—will come down if and when consumers restrain their spending for meat.

Little Increase In Imports

Imports of meat cannot be increased enough to have any large effect upon prices of meats. There just isn't any place to get a large amount of beef roasts and steaks, or ham, pork chops, and bacon. Most of the meat that is imported is beef that is suitable only for making ham-

burger. And the supply of that is limited.

Dairy Calves Pay For Property Tax

Would you like a tax free dairy farm?

"The herd of an average Kansas dairyman can provide enough extra income to pay his property taxes if each of his cows produces a calf every year," says Ralph Bonewitz, extension dairyman at Kansas State University. "With narrow profit margins, efficiency of production has become a necessity, meaning

that in many cases cows should calve during favorable seasons and that calving intervals should not exceed 12 months."

Of course, it's not always smooth sailing because breeding and other problems arise. Breeding problems include abortions, birth of dead or weak calves, repeat breeding animals, failure to show heat, and any other condition that interrupts the normal breeding cycle, explains Bonewitz.

Bonewitz says too many dairy farmers consider fertility only as a means to bring cows in milk and not as a means to improve the genetic worth of their future herd.

"It seems futile to waste nature's phenomenon of reproduction by mating worthy dairy matrons to nondescript bulls of assorted parentage," he concludes.

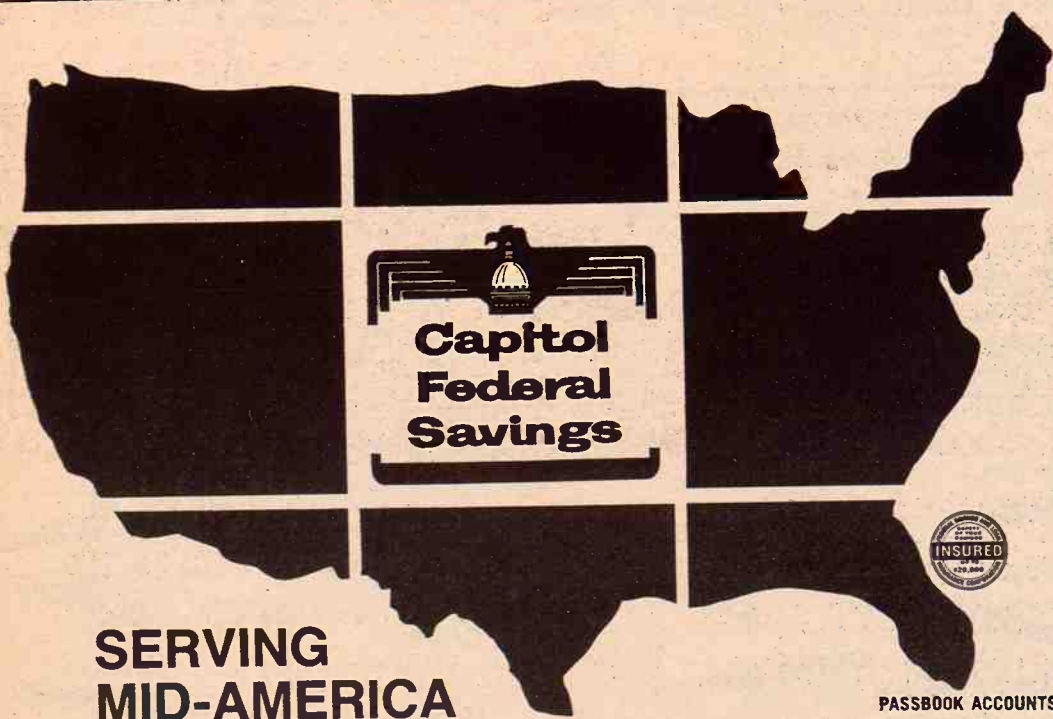

Trash Burning Biggest Cause of Farm Fires

Debris burning, which begins as a well meaning effort to clean up around the farmstead, caused more rural fires and inflicted more damage than any other type of fire in Kansas last year.

C.R. (Randy) Biswell, Extension forester at Kansas State University, reports that debris burning was responsible for 689 fires which burned 16,561 acres of forests and grassland during the year. Loss of improvements totaled \$2.8 million. "In each case the person who started the fire had good intentions," says Biswell. "But before long good intentions gave way to carelessness, and a wild fire was the result."

Biswell is in charge of Kansas State University's rural fire program. Rural fire districts make regular reports on fire calls, damage and causes. When reports are in, he comes up with some interesting tabulations each year.

For example, the largest rural fire in 1971 occurred March 30 in Chautauqua county about 10 miles west of Caney. Two fire districts battled the blaze for several hours, and succeeded in dousing it only after 3,800 acres of grass and timber had been burned. Cause of the fire: debris burning.

"Usually, a fire of this size will cause lots of property damage," says Biswell. "But in this case, the damage was only \$800, which indicated the fire districts did a tremendous job."

Elk county had the second largest rural fire. Starting with a spark from a train, the March 31 fire covered 1,500 acres before two fire districts put it out.

A March 3 Montgomery county fire was the year's third largest rural blaze. It destroyed 1,200 acres, while an April 18 fire in Riley county

burned off 1,100 acres. Next to debris burning, the largest single cause of rural fires last year was railroad sparks. A total of 542 fires caused by railroad operations burned off 10,022 acres of grass and timber.

Other fire causes, number reported, and acreage burned during 1971 in Kansas included: machine use (other than railroad), 295 fires and 3,247 acres; cigarette or cigar smoking, 112 fires and 933 acres; lightning, 84 fires and 1,065 acres; incendiary (malicious intent), 58 fires and 1,505 acres; children under 12, 41 fires and 141 acres; campfires, 20 fires and 474 acres; and miscellaneous, 770 fires and 7,983 acres.

Despite these figures, 1971 was a better year than 1970 by a wide margin, according to Biswell's figures.

For example, in 1970 rural fire districts reported 3,874 fires burned 135,000 acres with damage to improvements of \$3.4 million.

Weather is a major factor in rural fire losses, explained Biswell. "The more it rains over a wide area of the state, the fewer fires we are going to have; it is as simple as that," he said.

If Kansas experiences a hot, dry 1972, the number of fires will rise. In any event, 286 rural fire districts are protecting more than 40 million acres of grass and timberland in the state.

During the year the rural districts were using 1,400 excess military vehicles acquired through the Division of State and Extension Forestry at KSU. After alterations, they make excellent fire fighting equipment.

In addition to receiving the equipment through the university, fire districts look to KSU for rural training programs.

Last year, for example, 670 rural firemen took a basic firemanship course, 106 took a review course, and 710 took an advanced course. Extension forester Harry Gaylor, in charge of rural fire training, uses a

Mark II Fire Control Simulator in the educational program. The mobile classroom stimulates fire electronically and requires on the spot problem-solving and decision-making responses from the firemen. The unit is used primarily for advanced training.

Soybeans Could Become No. 1 1972 Cash Crop

Soybeans, at near-record prices, are expected to become the number one cash earner among farm crops this year, according to an Agriculture Department expert on oilseeds.

George W. Kromer, Economic Research Service analyst, told the National Agricultural Outlook Conference that cash receipts from soybeans sold by farmers are expected to surpass corn in 1972, making soybeans the top cash crop.

In 1971, Kromer said, farm sales of soybeans totaled \$3.4 billion, matching the value of corn sold by farmers. Higher soybean prices and lower marks for corn had much to do with it.

Soybeans are expected to average nearly \$3 per bushel for the entire 1971-72 marketing season, the most since they averaged \$3.33 in 1947-48.

Corn prices, on the other hand, are expected to average \$1.06 per bushel, down from \$1.33 during the 1970-71 season.

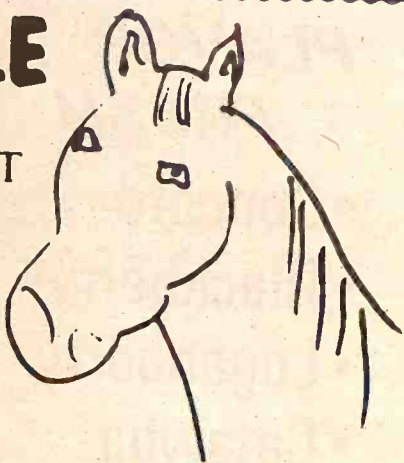

Success Treating Cancer Eye In Cattle

A Salt Lake City firm says it has found a successful treatment for cancer of the eye in cattle. But researchers said it would be preliminary and presumptive "to say if it might offer hope to human sufferers of eye cancer."

Dr. Kent Van Kampen, director of research for Intermountain Laboratories, Inc., said the treatment has been 75 per cent successful with more than 90 animals treated.

Eye cancer costs the cattle industry \$80 million annually. Van Kampen said more than 450,000 animals are affected yearly with

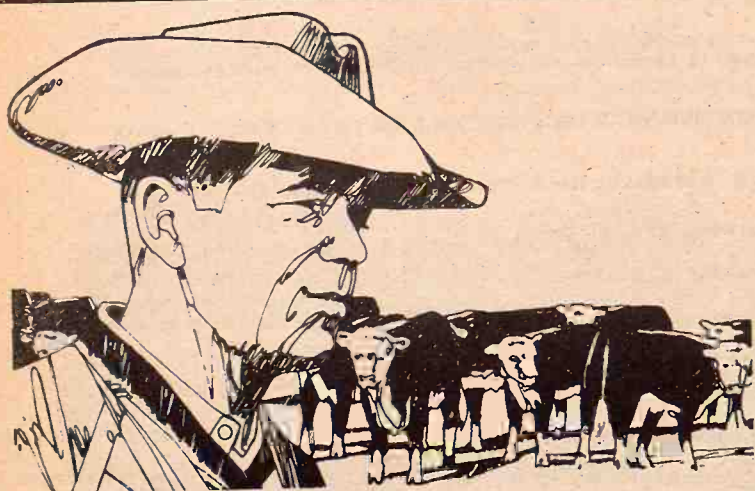
about 8,000 condemned outright last year.

Joe L. Budd, president of the American Hereford Association, called the treatment "a major breakthrough." He said the treatment should result in lower beef prices.

Van Kampen said cattle which are cured by the method could sell at full value.

The treatment consists of a single injection of an extract prepared from the tumorous tissue itself, he said. The firm has applied to the U.S. Department of Agriculture and says it could have the injection ready for marketing this fall.

Van Kampen said the treatment has not been verified by any government or independent testing agency but agriculture officials would check the firm's data before it is accepted.

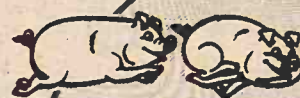

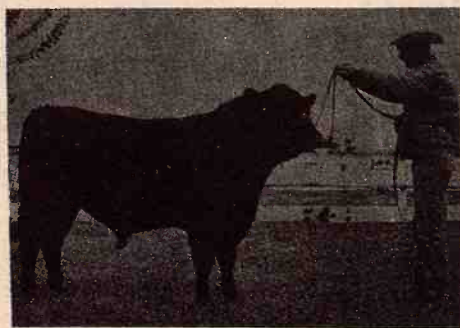

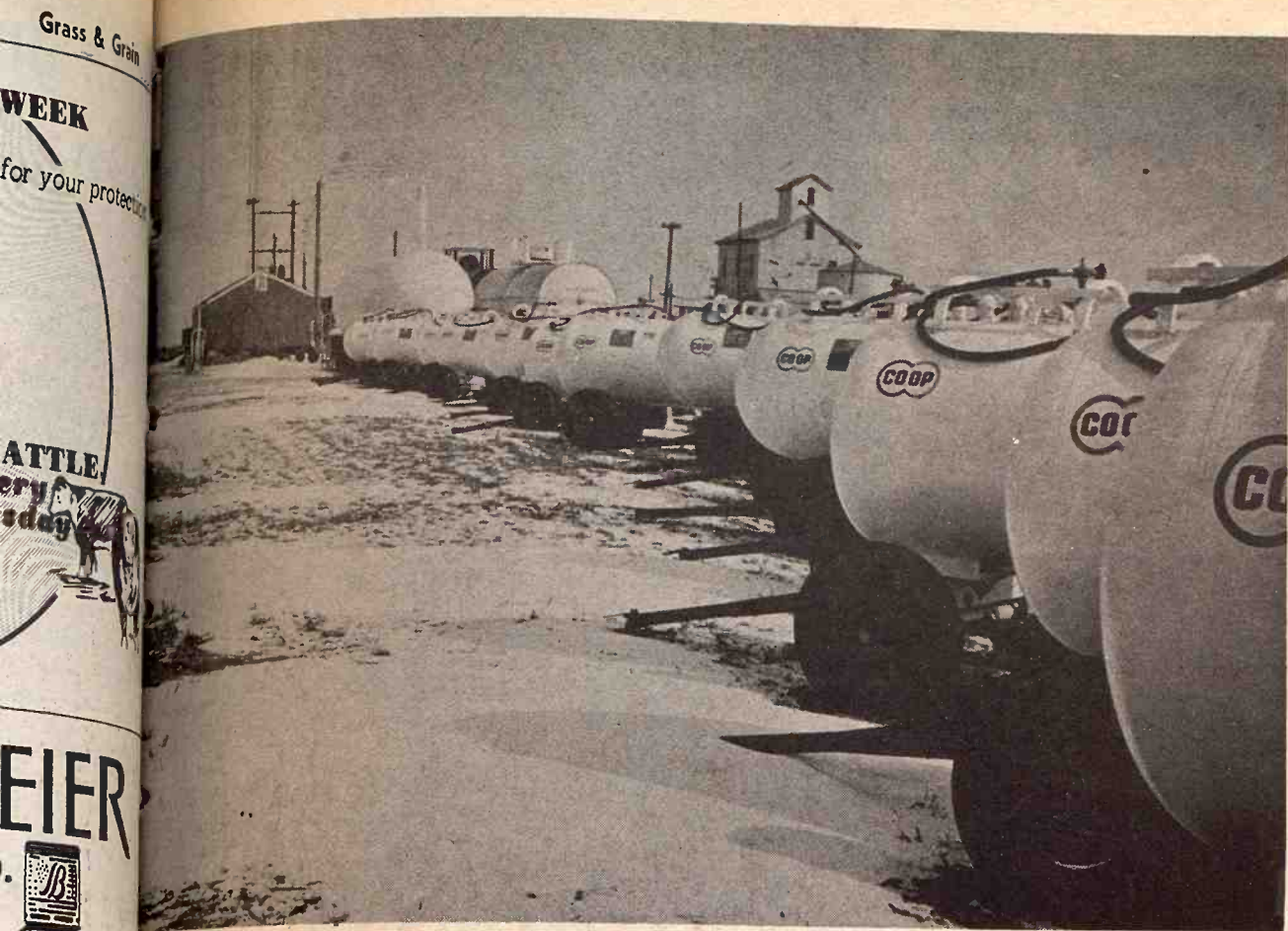

Tourist Railroad Thru Flint Hills?

ALMA—The whistle of a steam locomotive chugging through the Flint Hills will be heard once again if a \$300,000 project being dreamed by a group of railroad buffs becomes a reality.

Operating as Flint Hills Railroad, the state-chartered for-profit company has entered into negotiations with Santa Fe Railway for purchase of its 34-mile route from Alma to Burlingame, said Fred Schmidt, Mulvane, president and general manager.

Flint Hills Railroad would operate steam train as a tourist at-

traction along with hauling freight. It would use two steam locomotives and 12 cars leased from Smoky Hill Historical Society, a non-profit corporation founded in 1964 for collection of railroad artifacts.

Funds for the project would be raised through public sale of stock. "We have the first railroad charter issued by the state in 75 years," Schmidt said. "We really threw the secretary of state when we applied for it."

Santa Fe has asked the Interstate Commerce Commission for authority to abandon the Alma to

Burlingame route and Flint Hills Railroad has filed an application to operate as a common carrier between the two cities.

Schmidt said Santa Fe had agreed to sell the tracks and improvements to Flint Hills. No price has been agreed on.

Smoky Hill society owns two locomotives — vintage 1917 and 1926 — and 12 cars of various types. All of the equipment, with exception of two cars for which \$1,500 was paid, was donated. It is scattered at various locations throughout the state.

One of the locomotives will be sent to a shop within a month for overhaul and making ready for the first run scheduled for about June 1

if ICC approval is obtained.

A dining car will be refurbished and used either as a rolling restaurant or operated as a stationary eating establishment.

"The tracks are in good shape and we will have to make only minor improvements," Schmidt said. "There is enough freight business on the Santa Fe branch line to make a big factor in projected revenues of the project."

Plans call for the railroad to run every day during the summer tourist season and on weekends during slack periods.

The 12 original investors in Flint Hills Railroad reside in Mulvane, Junction City, Manhattan, Emporia and Shawnee Mission, Kan., North Kansas City, Kansas City, Mo., and Washington, D. C.

Schmidt is president of Flint Hills Railroad and Smoky Hill Historical Society.

Other officers and directors of the railroad are Hubert Caspar Jr., Junction City, vice president; Robert Morton, Emporia, vice president and general counsel; Robert Ingold, Shawnee Mission, secretary; and David Engles, North Kansas City, Vance Collins, Junction City, Alan Matey, Kansas City, and Dr. Harry Herzer, Washington, directors.

Engineering and planning for the railroad project is being done by a Junction firm headed by Caspar.

Eagle Picher Mining Co. and Wilson Carlgren, of Concordia, donated the two locomotives to the Smoky Hill group.

The cars were donated by Kansas City Southern, Missouri-Kansas and Texas, Union Pacific, Frisco and Kansas City Terminal railroads, Cook Paint Co., DX-Sunray Oil Co. and W. T. Cook Co., Kansas City.

March Signifies Peak Kansas Tornado Season

The tornado season is approaching.

Climatologist Merle Brown warned that the months ahead constitute the peak activity for vicious twisters in Kansas — although they can, and do, occur in every month of the year.

More than three-fourths of the 948 tornadoes which have struck Kansas in the past 19 years have occurred during the months of March, April, May, and June, says Brown, who works for the Commerce Department's National Weather Service.

Brown reported that in 1971 there were 39 tornadoes reported touching down in the Sunflower State. They caused a million dollars in property damage, but for the fourth consecutive year, there were no deaths from tornadoes in Kansas.

"Tornado activity in 1971 was light compared to the 19-year average of 50 tornadoes, 7 deaths, and \$9 million in damages," Brown added.

Twenty-nine of last year's tornadoes occurred during May and June, the usual months of peak activity, but Brown noted that there also were several out-of-season tornadoes in western Kansas on October 17. "In the Garden City area seven persons were injured when one of the twisters struck around 11:30 p.m."

Brown released the statistics on the 1971 tornadoes in Kansas in connection with SKYWARN, the annual campaign to save lives from torandos conducted by the National Weather Service.

The 1971 crop of Kansas tornadoes included one with a path of 20 miles. It touched down in Trego County about 10 miles northwest of Ransom at 9:30 p.m., May 17, then moved east-northeastward to the south shore of Cedar Bluff Reservoir. During its one hour lifetime, it roared through a group of cabins near the Reservoir, destroying 6 cabins and damaging 29 others.

"Last year was quiet in comparison with the devastating tornado season of 1955," Brown noted, "when Kansas was hit by 68 tornadoes in two months — May and June — with 80 deaths."

The greatest single disaster in Kansas occurred May 25, 1955, when a night-time tornado almost wiped the town of Udall off the map.

The Topeka storm of June 8, 1966, was by far the most costly — more than \$100 million in property damage.

"Tornadoes are among the most difficult of all natural disasters to forecast," said Brown, "because they are so erratic and abrupt in onset. Nevertheless," he adds, "something about our preparedness program appears to be working, because during the past 19 years fatalities for the United States have stayed about the same, while the population has increased considerably."

Brown reminded that when a tornado approaches, immediate action may save one's life, and he lists these safety rules:

A TORNADO WATCH means weather conditions are ripe for tornadoes. Stay tuned to radio or television and listen for weather bulletins. Occasionally scan horizon for approach of dark, threatening clouds. Stay alert for abrupt onset of violent wind, rain, hail, or a funnel-shaped cloud. Listen for a sudden increase in wind noise. When in doubt, take cover. Tornadoes are

often obscured by rain or dust. Some occur at night.

A TORNADO WARNING means a tornado actually has been sighted, or indicated by radar. If the twister is nearby, seek shelter inside immediately, preferably in a storm cellar, underground excavation, or steel-framed or concrete-reinforced building. Stay away from windows.

In office buildings, go to an interior hallway on the lowest floor, or to a designated area.

In homes, the basement offers the greatest safety. Seek shelter under heavy furniture, if possible. In homes without basements, take cover in the center part of the house on the lowest floor in a small room, such as a closet or bathroom, or under sturdy furniture. Keep some windows open, but stay away from them.

Mobile homes are particularly vulnerable to destructive winds. Proper tie downs to prevent overturning will minimize damage. A warden should be appointed in mobile-home parks to scan the skies and to listen to radio and TV warnings. There should be a designated community shelter. If not, do not stay in a mobile home but seek refuge in a sturdy building or, as last resort, in a ditch, culvert, or ravine.

In schools, follow advance plans to an interior hallway on the lowest floor. Avoid auditoriums and gymnasiums or other structures with wide free-span roofs.

In open country, lie face down in the nearest depression, such as a ditch or ravine, and protect your head with your arms.

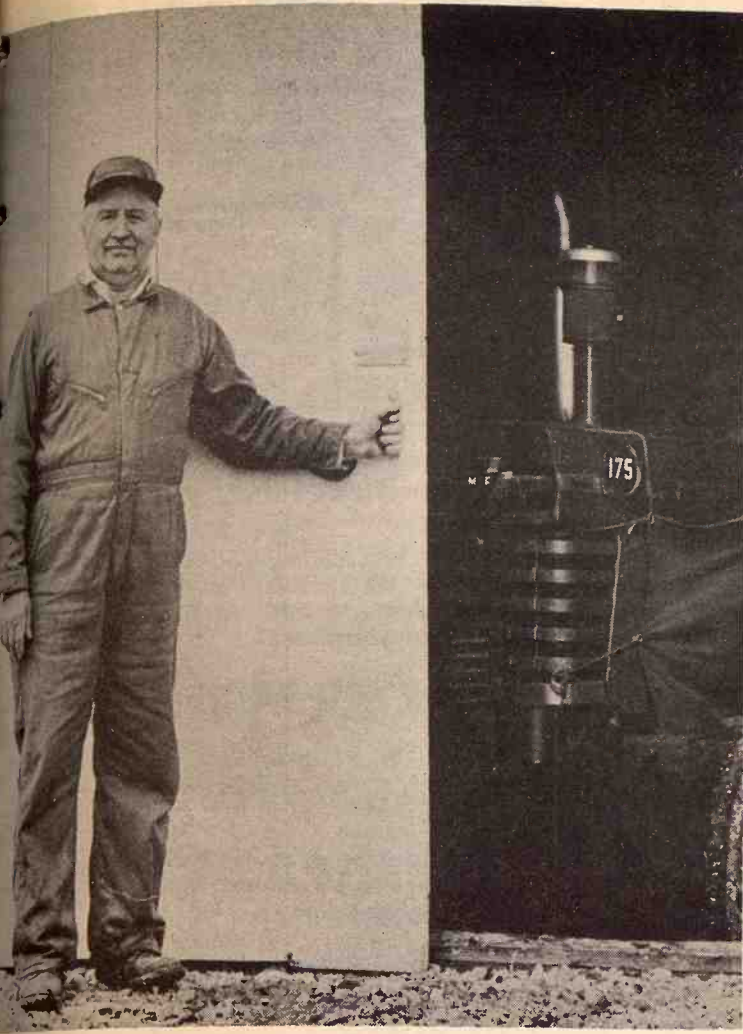

Lorenz Marten, Onaga, found that his loader wouldn't fit in one part of his barn. So he has been doing the job by hand. In addition to farming a section, Marten is a Star Route mail carrier.

Lateral Conveyor Renovates Terraces

An answer to simpler terracing, "Plural Lateral Conveyor," has been developed by two Russell brothers, Elmer and Raymond Funk.

The machine is designed to aid in terracing work. It's made from an old oil rig pumping unit and early-model V-8 Ford. The Funk brothers are working with Bernie Erbert at his welding shop in Russell.

The two production models will be more sophisticated than the first machine, but should be capable of the same work.

Faced with miles of terracing work, the brothers developed the earth mover installed on a road patrol. The self-powered unit hangs on the frame in place of the blade assembly.

A large metal disc cuts into the earth and dumps the dirt onto a conveyor belt. The belt sorts the dirt into a row which is adjusted to build soil conservation terraces.

A second conveyor and disc, moving in the opposite direction, allows the mover to be operated from either side of the cut at the option of the operator.

Hydraulic controls position the cutters and belts where they are wanted. Power to move the belts comes from an old automobile engine mounted above the front wheel.

One differential unit powers the front belt and another powers the

rear belt. The discs are hung on arms made of oilfield derrick steel, protected with a safety spring and large bolt which shears if the blade hits rock or material solid enough to damage it.

Elmer Funk has a patent on the lateral conveyor. The model has had more than five years of field testing. It has constructed over 400 miles of terracing and over 400 acres of waterways in all types of soil and terrain.

U.S. HAS WORLD WHEAT MARKET TO ITSELF

At the annual convention of the National Convention of Wheat Growers, held in Denver, Colo., representatives of wheat growers in Canada, Australia and Europe pleaded with the United States to stop driving down world wheat prices at the expense of producers. E.K. Turner, president of the Saskatchewan Wheat Pool told growers that the United States has nearly all the wheat left to be marketed in the world through next July.

"You have the market just about to yourselves for the balance of the year," he said. "It's the lowest price we've had in 20 years. Why continue to put downward pressure on it?"

Just who do you suppose is putting on that downward pressure? You guessed it, your own

government, your own USDA. They want more dollars to flow back into United States and the only way is cheap exports.

If you're tired of that you might try joining with those neighbors of yours that have tens of millions of bushels of wheat blocked in the Southwest and could in the next few weeks start pricing wheat and feed grains at cost of production plus a reasonable profit. They do need your grain. Whose side are you on?

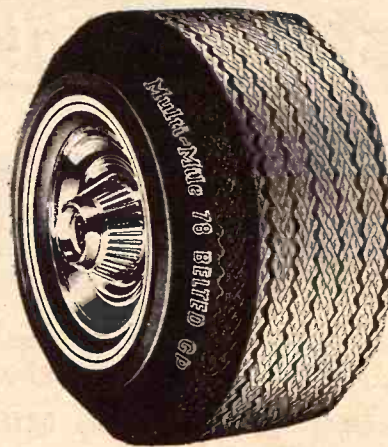
Egg-type chicks hatched during January totaled 39 million, 3 percent below the 40 million hatched the previous January. Egg-type eggs in incubators on February 1 were down 7 percent from February 1, 1971.

Production of poults of all breeds by commercial hatcheries during January totaled 8.3 million, a decrease of 2 percent from the 8.5 million produced a year ago. The heavy breed poult hatch of 7.4 million was slightly under last year,

and the light breed hatch at 925,000 was 16 percent below a year earlier. Total turkey eggs in incubators on

February 1 was 7 percent more than a year ago. Heavy breeds were up 7 percent and light breeds, 6 percent.

Butz Lining Up To Fight Consumer Food Prices

Secretary of Agriculture Earl Butz has told a group of Kansans that there is quite a hassle evolving as consumer advocates pressure congress and administrative agencies to put a ceiling on farm prices.

Fifty-two western Kansas farmers and agribusinessmen were in Washington on a trip arranged by the Agriculture Action Committee of the Dodge City Chamber of Commerce.

Persons from Dodge City, Meade, Fowler, Pratt, Hoxie, Garden City and other western Kansas towns met with the Kansas congressional delegation and Butz. The discussion was described as "frank and forthright."

The secretary said he had met half day with the Cost of Living Council to present the farmers' side of the food price picture. Donald

Rumsfeld, council director, gave notice that intense consumer pressure two weeks ago might bring food price ceilings.

Butz told the Kansans he believes it is "high time farmers make more than they did 20 years ago." Wages are doubled, general costs are up 60 per cent and production costs doubled in that period, he said.

During the meeting, Sen. James Pearson, R-Kan., told the Kansans he had reversed his position toward Butz' nomination. He had said he believed Butz to be "the wrong man for the wrong job at the wrong time."

Sen. Bob Dole, R-Kan., told the group Friday morning there appears to be three possible ways consumer pressure may effect the urban-oriented Congress:

- Price controls at all levels for farm products.

- A complete repeal of the quota system on red meat imports.

- A raise in the amount of quotas for import of red meat from other nations.

Rep. Keith Sebelius, R-Kan., said he admired the "frank and forthright" way in which Butz met the

Kansans and their questions and said he believed Butz will prevail in obtaining the best possible benefit for farm produce under the current consumer pressure.

Earlier in the week, Butz had told the Agricultural Outlook Conference in Washington that he opposes price controls on livestock and all other farm commodities because farmers haven't caused inflation and controls won't work.

He pointed to the Office of Price Administration days of World War II when black markets were the order of business.

"What good does a consumer get from a low price for beef if no beef is available at that price?" he asked.

Saying that he "would fight like a wounded steer on the issue," Butz noted that "price controls won't work on commodities as perishable, as seasonal and as varied in quality as food products.

"Some consumers, either too young to know or too forgetful to remember may think they want

controls. They should read history. It would be easier to learn the difficulties of price control for beef and pork by reading history than it would be to learn while standing in a queue at a half-empty meat counter," Butz said.

Ray Frisbie, Kansas Farm Bureau president, said an increase in beef imports to keep food prices down, or meat price controls, would be a grave mistake and an injustice to agricultural producers.

He said farmers and ranchers are

entitled to every cent they are receiving for their livestock.

Another farm leader, Tony Dechant, National Farmers Union president, scoffed at Butz' pledge to fight like a wounded steer to keep ceilings off farm products.

"To talk to ceilings on farm products when parity is 72 per cent is absurd," he said. It is a cynical attempt to erect a 'straw man' so he can be a hero when he knocks it down.

Dig Deeper Into Farm Debt

The nation's farmers took another deeper look into debt a February report on the farm mortgage loans for the first half of 1971 shows.

The U.S. Department of Agriculture report said a drop in interest rates produced a higher volume of new farm mortgage lending to a total of \$837 million more than in the same period a year earlier.

The report compiled from the USDA Economic Research Service (ERS) analyses farm loan information from federal land banks, life insurance companies and Farmers Home Administration (FmHA).

Farm Credit System loans to farmers and their cooperatives totaled a record \$14.4 billion for the year. The total was a 15.8 per cent increase from the \$12.4 billion loaned to farmers the preceding year.

Loans outstanding from the FCS on Dec. 31, 1971, were \$16.3 billion, up 10.2 per cent from the preceding year.

The federal land banks — handling long-term farm real estate loans had a 10.2 per cent increase for a total of \$2 billion. The large increase in loans made represents a willingness

by farmers to return to long term borrowings now that interest rates have receded from their exceptionally high levels of two years ago, FCS spokesmen said.

Production credit associations, which farmers use for short and intermediate term credit as in livestock production and farming operations, was up 13.8 per cent to \$9.4 billion.

The Farm Credit System obtains its funds by selling debentures and sales of bonds in money markets. The system is entirely farmer owned.

The total farm mortgage debt was \$30.7 billion Jan. 1, 1972, about \$1.2 billion more than the preceding year. The debt actually rose 4 per cent during 1971, compared with 4 per cent and 4.7 per cent during the preceding two years. The rate of increase in the debt has been declining since 1964 when it rose 12.4 per cent.

At the start of 1971, federal land debt, life insurance companies 19 per cent, commercial banks 15 per cent, FmHA 1 per cent and other lenders 41 per cent.

During the past decade, the share

held by FLB and commercial banks has increased, while the percentage of debt held by FmHA and life insurance companies has decreased.

Interest rates charged by life insurance companies on new farm mortgage loans averaged 8.6 per cent during the first half of 1971, compared with 9.3 per cent a year earlier. Rates charged by the 12 federal land banks averaged 8.01 per cent during the period compared with 8.69 per cent a year earlier.

Farm mortgage debt was higher in all production regions on Jan. 1, 1972, than a year earlier. The Corn Belt led with 19 per cent of the total, while the Pacific region had nearly 17 per cent. California led other states in amounts of outstanding loans with a total of \$3.5 billion.

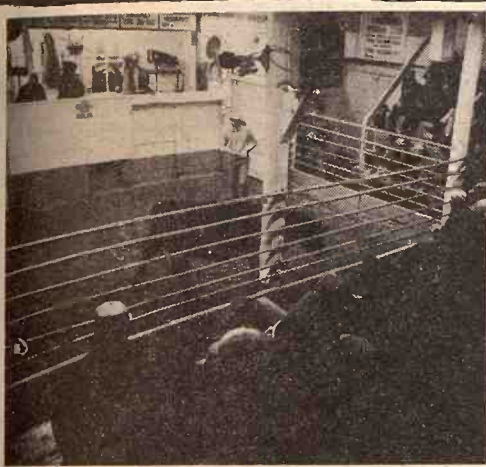

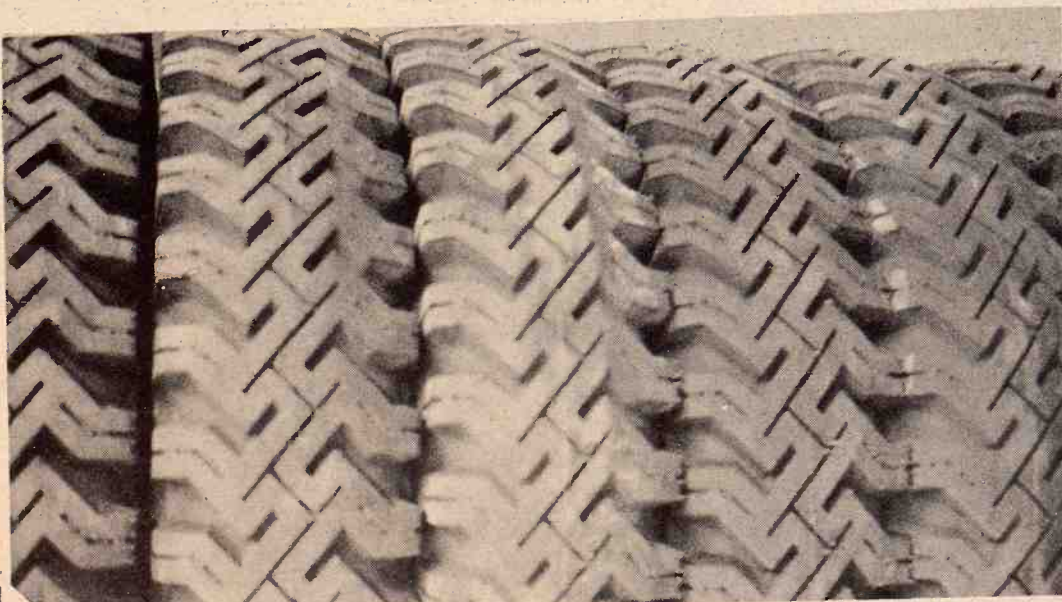

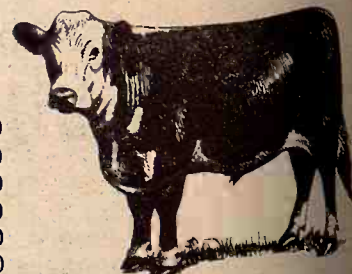
