World Weather Watch Boon To Farm Planning

The first world weather watch was officially launched last week.

More than 300 international experts began the biggest-ever study of the elements with satellites, rockets, high-speed telecommunications and a network of weather-watching ships and planes.

The "watch" was organized by the World Meteorological Organization, comprising 100 nations.

Farmers will be the main beneficiaries. One goal is accurate and detailed long-range weather forecasts which would assist farm planning.

The United States and the Soviet Union will play leading roles in the operation. The two nations established in 1964 direct exchange of satellite cloud photographs and other meteorological information from the U.S. Tyros satellite system and the Soviet Cosmos 122 system.

Key weather information, mainly that gathered from

space, will be flashed around the world by a new main trunk telecommunications circuit at a speed of 3600 words a minute.

It will link the three main world meteorological centers at Moscow, Washington and Melbourne, Australia, and pass on data to new regional centers which are being planned.

The World Meteorological Organization is seeking approval for budget of 13 million dollars for the next four years. But this is for all its various activities and will not be nearly enough to pay for the ambitious world weather watch.

All participating nations will be expected to share in the cost, estimated about 75 million dollars a year once the watch becomes fully operational in 1968.

Computers will process data from all corners of the earth within a few hours and will be able to produce weather maps for up to three days ahead.

Five Area Towns Nix Liquor Stores

Five G&G area towns turned down proposals to allow packaged liquor stores at city elections last week.

The towns were Wakefield, Oskaloosa, Haddam, Wetmore, and Waverly. Two western Kansas towns, Meade and Satanta, also turned liquor store referendum.

Four towns favored similar proposals: The largest was Fort Scott, which voted to continue to allow package stores to operate. Other towns which voted for local sale were Hugoton, Walnut and Goff.

A Nudge Up For Farm Index

Prices received by Kansas farmers at mid-March were higher than last month but slightly below March a year ago, according to the Kansas Crop and Livestock Reporting Service.

The index of prices received for all farm products at mid-March were higher than last

month but slightly below March a year ago, according to the Kansas Crop and Livestock Reporting Service.

The index of prices received for all farm products at mid-March was 241 percent of its 1910-14 base period average, up 8 points from mid-February, but 7 points below March 1966.

Prices received for wheat advanced sharply from last month. Feed grain prices were higher while most livestock items remained steady to lower. Hay prices declined slightly from last month.

Meat Animal Prices

The livestock and livestock product index as of mid-March stood at 294 percent, down 2 points from mid-February and 44 points below March last year.

The meat animal price index, at 342 percent, was down 4 points from last month and 60 points below March 1966.

Hog prices, at \$17.80 per cwt., were down \$1.00 from February and \$6.30 per cwt. less than March 1966.

Beef cattle prices, at \$21.70 per cwt., were down 10 cents from a month earlier and were \$3.00 below March last year.

Calf prices averaged \$25.00, \$1.00 below last month and \$1.60 less than March a year ago.

Lambs averaged \$21.30 per cwt., up \$1.50 from last month but \$4.10 per cwt. below March last year.

Crop Prices

The all-crop price index at 193 percent, was up 15 points from February and 24 points above March a year ago.

The price of wheat, at \$1.63 per bushel, was up 16 cents from last month and 21 cents more than March a year earlier. This is the highest average wheat price since last December when the average was \$1.65.

Corn averaged \$1.30 per bushel, up 1 cent from February and

8 cents more than March 1966.

Sorghum grain, at \$1.91 per cwt., was 4 cents above last month and 16 cents above this date last year. Soybeans averaged \$2.68 per bushel, a 1 cent increase from last month and a 10 cent increase over March a year ago.

Oats, at 80 cents per bushel, were 2 cents above last month and 4 cents higher than March 1966.

Barley, at \$1.04 per bushel was up 1 cent from last month and 8 cents above a year ago, while rye, at 98 cents per bushel, was 4 cents above last month average and 6 cents higher than March 1966.

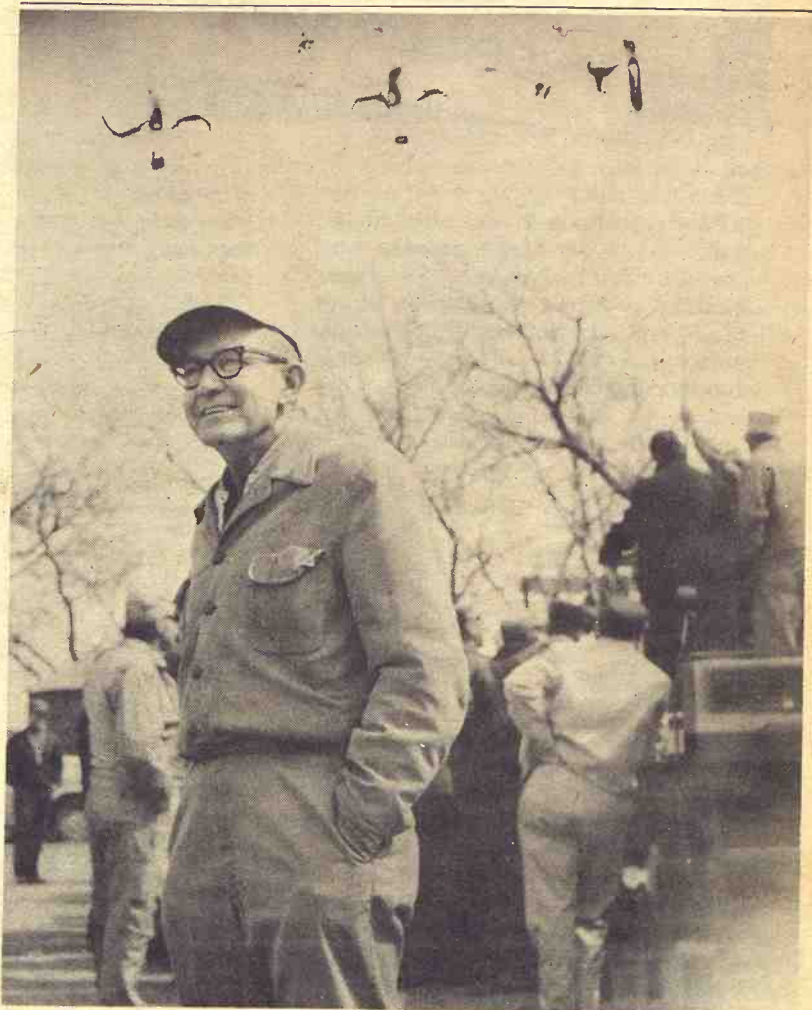
Alfalfa hay averaged \$27.50 per ton, down 50 cents from last month but \$8.00 per ton above March last year. Prairie hay, at \$20.50 per ton was also down 50 cents from a month ago but \$450 per ton above a year ago.

Dairy and Poultry

The dairy products price index for mid-March this year was 295, down 6 points from a month earlier but 21 points above a year earlier. The preliminary March wholesale milk price, at \$4.95 per cwt., was down 10 cents from last month but 50 cents above March a year ago. The poultry and egg price index, at 124 percent, was up 8 points from last month but 37 point less than March a year earlier. Chicken prices, at 6.9 cents per pound, were down .1 cent from last month and down 1.2 cents from a year ago. Egg prices, at 24.4 cents per dozen, were down .5 cent per dozen from last month and 7.5 cents below a year ago.

Prices Paid

Prices paid for feed at mid-March were generally lower than last month but well above a year ago.



Selling Out

Hog Price Outlook Improves

The quarterly Pig Crop report issued by the USDA in March brought good news for hog producers. It showed that farmers plan to cut spring and summer farrowings. But it also showed that farmers have more hogs and pigs on hand now than they had a year ago.

Based on replies from thousands of farmers, the report covered ten Corn-Belt states. The farmers in these states had 30.5 million market hogs and pigs on hand March 1. This number was 5 percent more than the year-earlier total. The number of hogs kept for breeding was 7 million, down 4 percent from a year earlier.

More Market Hogs in Each Weight Group

On March 1, the number of market hogs weighing over 180 pounds was estimated at 5.3 million, 9 percent more than a year before. Most of these hogs were marketed in March.

Hogs weighing 120 to 180 pounds numbered 7.4 million, up

3 percent. They will be marketed mostly in April and May.

On March 1, the number weighing 60 to 120 pounds was 6.5 million, 5 percent more than last year. They will be marketed from late May to mid-July.

The number of pigs weighing under 60 pounds was estimated at 11.3 million, or 4 percent more than a year earlier. These pigs will reach market weights beginning about the middle of July. Most of them will be pork by the end of September.

While market receipts of hogs seem likely to be around 5 percent larger this spring and summer (versus a year ago), the demand for pork will not increase that much. The demand for pork seems to increase about as fast as population growth — that growth is only a little more than 1 percent a year.

Price Prospects

Some unfavorable factors can be seen in the prospective demand for pork: There are some signs of a business recession — slipping auto sales and layoffs of workers. Supplies of poultry will be considerably larger than last year, probably by as much as 5 to 10 percent. Supplies of beef may — or may not — be larger than in 1966. We will know more about that when the next quarterly report of cattle on feed is released on April 18.

From April through September last year, prices for hogs averaged about \$24. That was for barrows and gilts at central markets. It was the highest average for the six-month period since 1954.

While we do not believe that prices will equal 1966 levels this year, a substantial rise is possible: Market supplies will be shrinking during the next three months, and supplies in pros-

pect for next fall and winter are smaller than last year.

Farrowings To Decrease?

Reports from farmers received by the USDA indicate that sow farrowings during March-April-May will be about 3 percent less than a year ago. Farmers also reported plans to cut June-July-August farrowings by 5 percent from the 1966 level. If farrowings are trimmed as planned, prices for hogs could average better than \$20 next fall and winter.

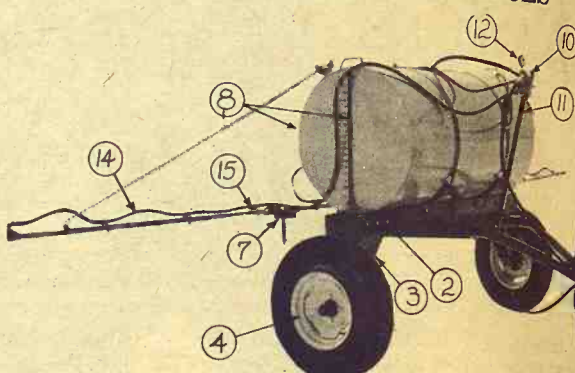

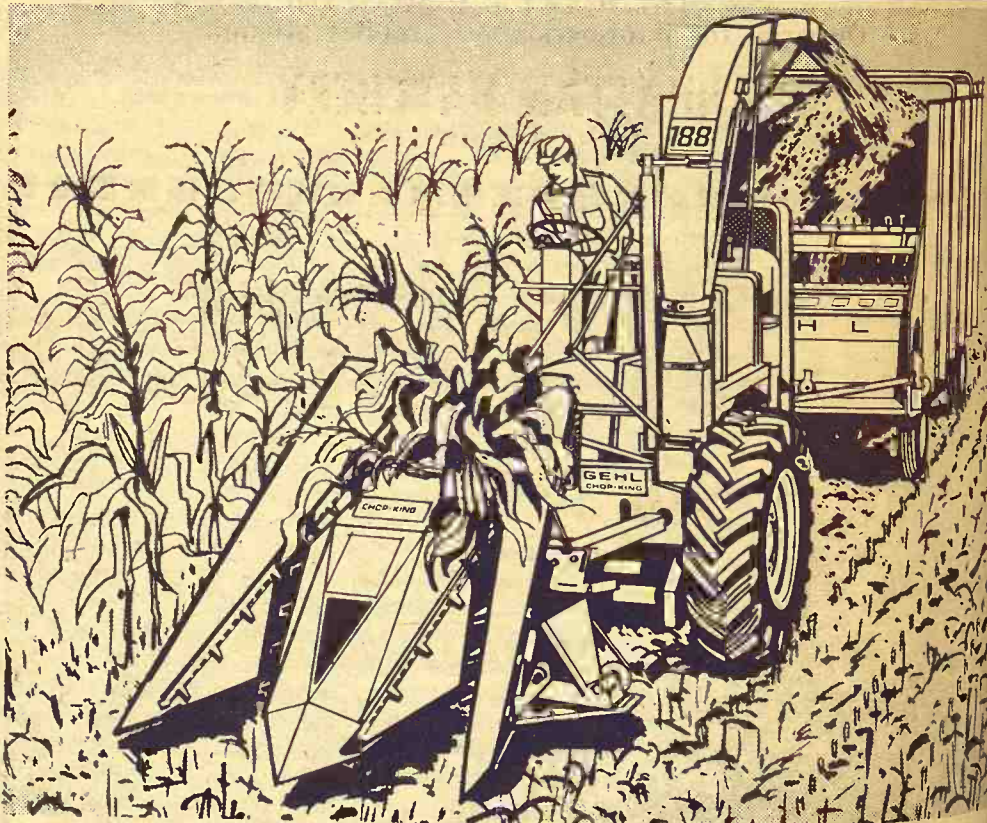

Honor Five Couples With Master Farmer Title

MANHATTAN — Names of the five Kansas farm couples chosen for Master Farmer. Master Farmer Homemaker recognition this year have been announced by Dr. Harold E. Jones, Director of Extension at Kansas State University. The couples will be honored April 14 at a banquet at the K-State Union in Manhattan. Plaques will be presented to them by the Kansas State Chamber of Commerce, which cooperates with the Extension service in recognizing outstanding farm couples.

Chosen for the 1966 class are: Mr. and Mrs. Elmer A. Bryant, Dighton; Mr. and Mrs. Dale S. Galle, Moundridge; Mr. and Mrs. Harvey E. Gfeller, Junction City; Mr. and Mrs. Kasper J. Heinz, Claflin; and Mr. and Mrs. George H. Works, Humboldt. Selections are made on the basis of excellence in farming, homemaking, farm living, and rural citizenship. Main speaker for the banquet will be Dr. Carroll Hess, dean of agriculture at K-State. His subject is "Educational Needs of Future Agricultural Leaders."

The Bryants have seen their operation grow steadily since they started farming in 1936. The barn is the only building remaining from their early days. Their farmstead is one of the most modern and attractive in western Kansas. The couple have extensive crop and livestock production on their 3,200 acres. Wheat and grain sorghums are produced on 2,100 acres of cropland. The remainder is pasture. They have had a large cow herd for many years and have fed an average of 160 steers and heifers the past 4 years. Mr. and Mrs. Bryant are active in church, Farm Bureau, 4-H, and other activities in Lane County. One of their daughters and her husband are farming in partnership with her parents. The couple has another daughter who lives in California. The Galles are lifelong residents of McPherson County. Wheat and grain sorghums are the principal crop on their 240-acre farm. But their major enterprise is raising feeder pigs in a controlled-environment system. Galle housed his multiple farrowing operation in a quonset building for several years, then later in an old henhouse. In 1967, he erected an 18 by 36 foot aluminum building with a slatted floor over a lagoon for waste disposal. During the last 4 years, 263 litters have been farrowed with an average of 9.25 pigs weaned per litter. In their free time, Mr. and Mrs. Galle participate in a number of community, church, and school activities. They have been host to IFYE's from New Zealand and India. The Galles have four children. Three are college graduates and the youngest is a senior in high school. The Gfellers operate a 714-acre farm in Geary County as partners with their son. Their farm includes 433 acres under cultivation and 260 acres in pasture. Their soil conservation program is complete with 350 acres terraced and farmed on the contour. Wheat has averaged 36 bushels and grain sorghums 60 bushels an acre the past 4 years. Their deferred feeding program has averaged 107 head.

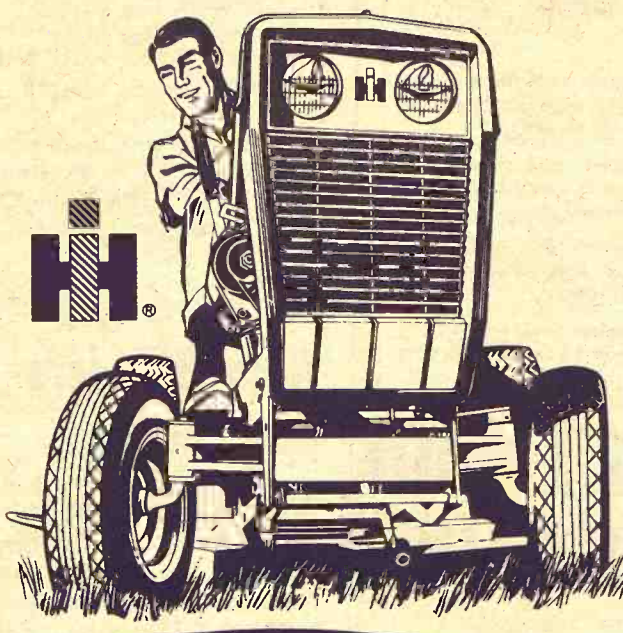

Sees \$22 Hogs By July

Things are looking up for the hog producer, according to a Kansas State University livestock marketing specialist. Robert L. Coppersmith looks for the hog market to show improvement during the coming months. He expects hog prices to be higher than \$22 by July, dropping to the \$18 level by fall.

The number of hogs and pigs on farms in 10 Corn Belt states on March 1 was 3 per cent higher than a year earlier, he says. With the growth in population and income, per capita pork supplies will be no higher than a year ago.

The December-February pig crop is 5 per cent higher than year earlier levels. The average number of pigs per litter was down slightly. The late spring pig crop, March through May, is forecast to be 3 percent

higher than a year earlier.

Prices will not reach last summer's high of \$27, says Coppersmith. But he thinks they could easily top out at the \$24 level before fall.

He points out that prices have

been under pressure from increasing slaughter during the past few months. Commercial hog slaughter for December 1966 was 28 per cent higher than a year earlier. The January and February kills were up

33 per cent and 22 per cent, respectively, from year earlier levels. A large beef supply during this period provided competition which helped depress pork prices.

All in all, we can expect a

good year in the hog business, Coppersmith says. But he warns that hog producers will have to continue to stress efficiency in production.

The winner this week is Mrs. Dorsey Gibbs, R1, Clay Center. She writes, "Imagine having crusty, hot cornbread made right on the table while one is enjoying good old ham and beans."

CORNBREAD WAFFLES

1/4 cup cooking oil
1/4 cup sour milk or buttermilk
1 egg
1/2 cup flour
1 cup cornmeal
1/2 teaspoon salt
1/2 teaspoon soda
1 teaspoon baking powder

Mix all ingredients lightly and spread in heated waffle iron and bake.

Mrs. Carl Frehse, Lorraine: "I am enclosing a recipe which is a favorite at our house."

ROUND STEAK ROLLS

Divide a round steak into 6 pieces about the size of your hand. In the center of each piece lay a slice of sweet pickle and a slice of onion. Sprinkle a little salt over it all. Roll up, fold in ends. Tie securely with string in several places so pickle or onion will not slip out. Roll in flour, brown in hot fat. Place

browned rolls in roaster. Add 1/2 cup catsup to 1 cup water and pour over rolls. Cover tightly and bake in moderate oven (350 degrees) about one hour. When done, meat should be fork tender. Remove string before serving. These rolls may also be placed in the freezer for an unlimited time and baked when needed. They are even better that way because the flavor of the pickle and onion penetrates into the meat.

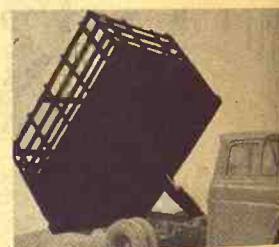

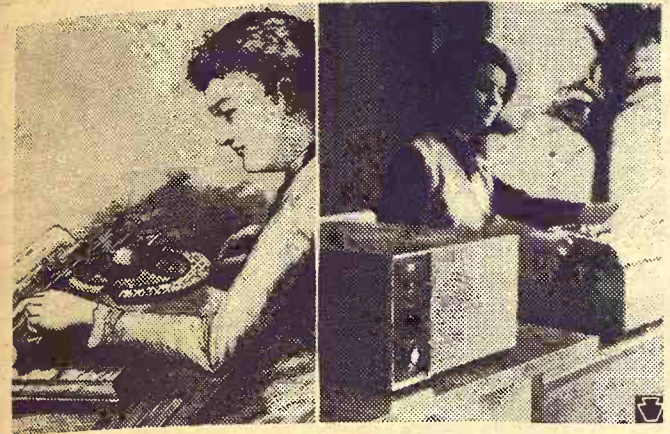

Business Becoming Aware Of Value Of Background Music



Evolution of the secretary is still taking place in the business world of the 1960's, with background music joining the electric typewriter, good lighting and air conditioning.

In the 1880's secretaries were called "typewriters." Their work areas were dark, drafty and cluttered.

The ideal modern office is bright, clean, quiet and efficient. However, somewhere between these two extremes is the place where most office workers toil. Telephones ringing, typewriters clacking, people talking, file drawers closing, elevator doors opening, all contribute to an unhealthy, harsh noise level. Background music provides pleasant sound to replace irritating noise that creates fatigue and employee distraction.

While there is nothing new about the marriage of work and music, background music avoids attention-getting vocals,

loud passages and peaks and valleys of stimulation, concentrating instead on uniform, flowing sounds.

A large insurance company in one of the major cities, for example, replaced the background noise of twelve girls working in one large office with background music of a pleasing tempo.

Banks, restaurants, hotels and even hospitals and schools are becoming major users of background music, apparently convinced that the benefits of music are also the benefits of business.

A correction in the directions for making the bread follows:

Scald the cream and blend into the flour. Cool to lukewarm and then stir the yeast into the flour-cream mixture. Beat 1/2 cup sugar and the salt into the egg yolks, etc.

Future Trends?

Larger and more mechanized farmer feedlot facilities are springing up throughout the area. During our Cattlemen's Roundup, two area feedlots were toured and a great deal of interest was generated by these mechanized enterprises.

Our first stop was the Don Martin facility south-east of Clay Center. His automatic set-up can feed 300 head of cattle in 20 minutes. By adding another 130 feet of auger and bunk space he can double his feeding capacity to 600 head. With profit margins narrowing, Martin feels you can't make ends meet with a hundred feeders anymore.

The Haake & McMahan feedlot near Clay Center features an efficient grain handling system which greatly reduces labor and speeds up their feeding operations. A series of augers has been arranged to fill or empty grain storage bins. The feed wagon is filled from an overhead delivery tube and then unloaded into fenceline feed bunks.

Both systems emphasized cutting down on labor which would enable them

to handle a greater number of cattle. If this indicates a trend, feeders will be expanding their facilities and feeding larger numbers in the future to combat the "cost price squeeze."

No Summer Cut In Milk Price

If the milk holding action wasn't quite the smashing success NFO supporters hoped, at least Kansas dairymen can take note of cheer. There apparently will be no reduction in the price of class I milk this summer.

The price to farmers will be \$5.54 a hundred pounds, the same as for March, said William Rankin, president of a Topeka milk cooperative which represents eight producer associations and about 5000 dairy farmers in Northeast Kansas.

The rest of Kansas is sure to be similarly affected.

Under federal milk marketing procedure there would have been a seasonal decline of 40 cents a hundred. Under the new agreement, the current price will be in effect at least until March 31, 1968.

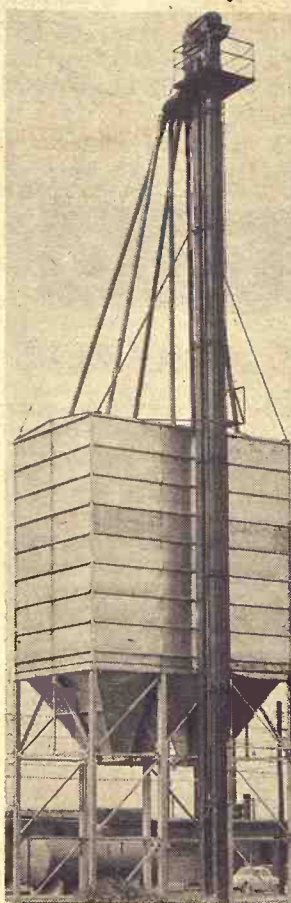
Rankin said the action had nothing to do with the milk withholding action by the NFO. He said that farmers needed the current prices and could not stand a cut in income that would result from the seasonal

reduction in price.

affect the retail price of milk.

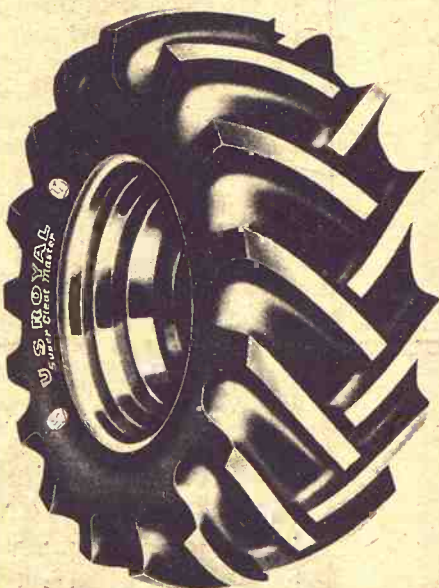

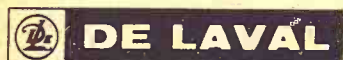

\$1.65 billion, up about 6% from the year before and the 23rd consecutive yearly increase. The tax a decade ago totalled only \$931 million.

The average tax per acre across the U.S. was \$1.02, actually lower than in the 1926-41 period, when it ranged from \$1.12 to \$1.52.

Greatest increases in 1965 were in Florida and Nebraska, where taxes on farm land rose 19% in one year. California, Georgia and West Virginia also had large increases.

Idaho, New Mexico, Arizona, Oregon, as well as Kansas, had the decreases.

New Jersey continued to have the highest tax per acre — \$12.62. New Mexico had the lowest, 17 cents.

Rock Island Hopes To Cut Grain Shipping Costs

The Rock Island Lines has announced a proposal to introduce incentive rates that will reduce shipping costs of export grain as much as 25 per cent.

Albert F. Hatcher, vice president of traffic, said the proposed rates will benefit exporters of wheat and milo in Texas, Oklahoma, Kansas, Colorado and Nebraska.

The new rates are expected to become effective about June 1.

Under the Rock Island proposal, Hatcher said, incentive rates averaging 20 to 25 percent under existing rates will apply when single cars are coupled with multiple car movements averaging 1000 tons from a specific transit point to Chicago or Gulf ports.

Hatcher said the block movements and faster loading and unloading times envisioned in the proposal will achieve better car utilization.

Time At Record Book, Not Plow, Brings Farmer Greatest Profit

A farmer's time is worth \$25 an hour when used in keeping records and making management decisions, in the opinion of a University of Nebraska agricultural economist.

Dr. Glen Vollmar, chairman of the NU Department of Agricultural Economics, presented the opinion at the annual meeting of the Northeast Nebraska Experimental Farm Association, a group which includes 1,930 members in 14 counties.

Decisions made in operating a farm require up-to-the-minute knowledge in these times when farming is undergoing continuous changes, he explained.

The trend to larger farms and larger capital investment requires a businesslike farm management approach, Vollmar said. "You no longer can afford to waste time digging postholes by hand."

To back up his statements, he presented an analysis of 75 medium-size dryland farms in eastern Nebraska that are entered in the University's Electronic Farm Records Project.

These show that the high third of the farms returned \$33,100 for labor, capital and management. This represented a 14.3 per cent return on capital and \$19,200 for management.

Returns on the low third of the farms were \$7,065 for labor, capital and management, which represented a .6 per cent return on capital and minus \$6,300 to management.

Average farm size and average cropland was the same for both the high and low thirds, yet capital investment was \$141,000 for the high third and \$125,000 for the low.

Sales was \$62,074 for the high third and \$33,148 for the low.

A correlation can be found between the capital invested, the manpower needed, and production per man. The high third required 1.5 men and the low third two men. Production per man was \$41,000 for the high third and \$16,500 for the low.

Significant indications of differences in management, Voll-

mar said, also include the difference in investment per acre in machinery, fertilizer, and chemicals.

Machinery investment in the high third averaged \$50 per acre — in the low third \$32. Fer-

tilizer and chemicals investment in the high third averaged \$9.70 per acre — in the low third \$6.60.

Obviously, Vollmar said, the farmers in the high third were better aware of their machinery and fertilizer needs for top production with lowest manpower than were those in the lower third.

"This was reflected in the dollars their farms earned for them," he said.

WICHITA — The Balthrop Farms Hampshire hog production sale grossed around \$6750, with a top of \$175 for a bred registered gilt.

Allen Pankratz and Rodger Koop of Hillsboro paid the top price. Nine bred registered gilts averaged \$136.

Top boar price was \$150, paid by M. N. Hiebert and Rodney Vogts, Canton, with 16 boars averaging \$125.

Thirty open registered gilts averaged \$98 with Jim Yearout of Emporia paying a top of \$170.



Barges Back On The Mo

The barge season opened at Kansas City last week, with thousands of bushels being loaded on barges for the trip down the Missouri River to St. Louis. Some grain will go to millers along the Tennessee River, some to New York millers, and fine milling houses on the Illinois River.

Last year 34 million bushels of grain were barged out of Kansas City, some 28 million bushels of it wheat. In comparison, railroads shipped 125 million bushels of wheat out of Kansas City.

Controversial Parsons College in Fairfield, Iowa, has lost its accreditation. The North Central Association of Colleges and Secondary Schools took the action for "persistent failure" to correct "serious weaknesses."

The loss of accreditation generally means that Parsons students who transfer to other schools will lose credits, that students taking professional training there might not be able to practice, and that some of the lustre has been rubbed from the school that detractors had scorned as "Flunk Out U."

Parsons President Millard Roberts took the position in 1955 when the school had 212 students and was bankrupt. Now it has 4700 students and a multi-million dollar plant.

Insisting that higher education should show a profit, Roberts said that Parsons would accept any high school graduate, regardless of grades, but insisted that tuition costs should be high enough to meet expenses. Tuition at Parsons this year is \$3480. Dormitories and cafeterias are operated at a profit too.

Roberts slashed the curriculum, offering fewer courses, and used preceptors and tutors freely for much of the teaching, thus keeping the ranked faculty of well-paid lecturers small. But the top faculty was highly paid, as much as \$39000, with Parsons ranking behind Harvard and Chicago only, in average salary for ranked teachers.

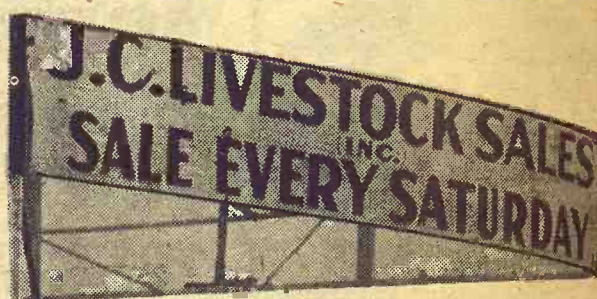

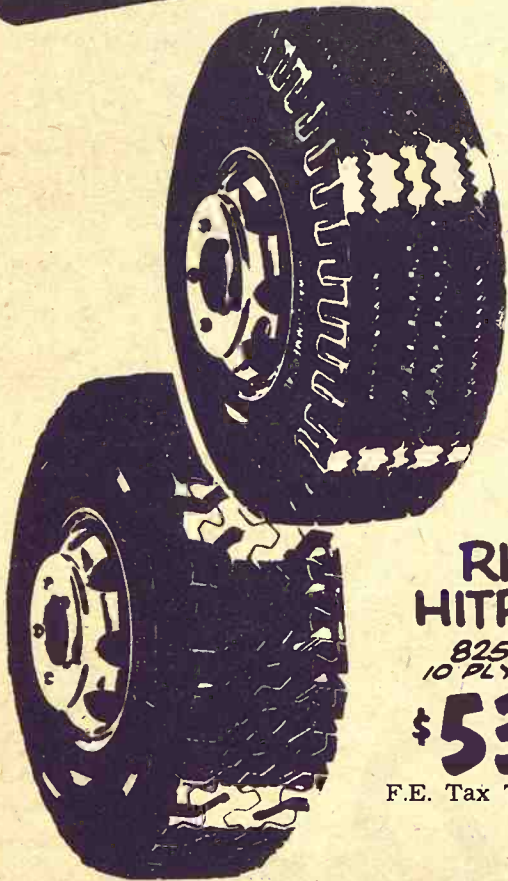
Volume buyer of females was Dugdale Hereford Farm of Plattsburg Mo., purchasing 25 heifers averaging \$500.
