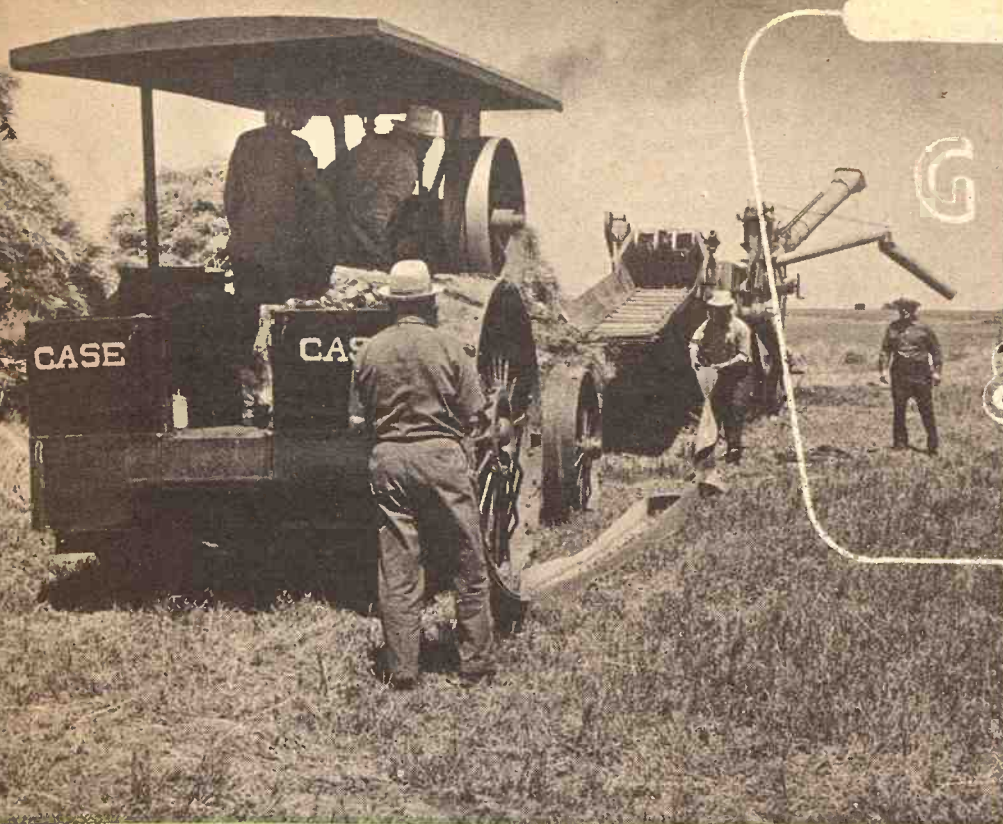

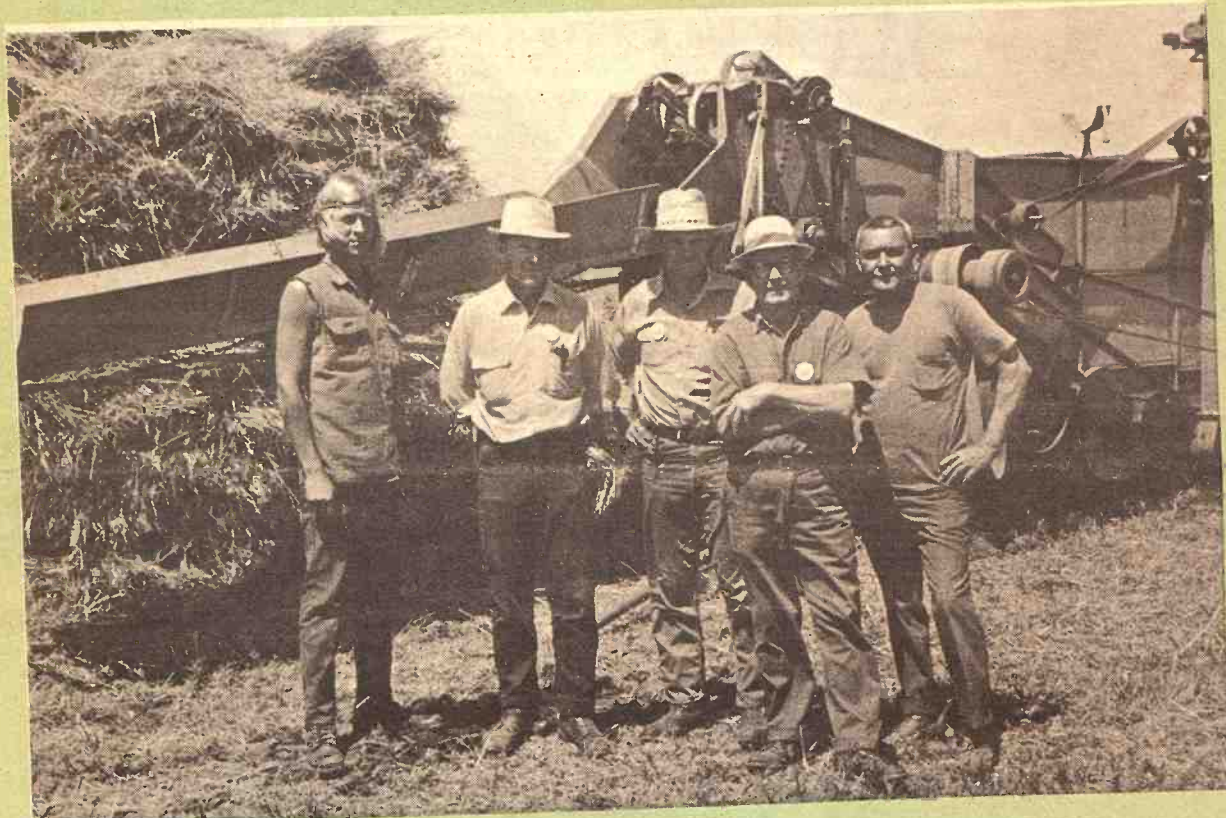

Festivities at the 11th annual Czech Festival in Wilson this year included an old fashioned threshing bee. A separator or "threshing machine" was pulled to beside a stack of wheat bundles; an old-time team powered tractor was belted up to it and the work began. The threshing began Friday afternoon at the Sibraba field on the north side of town and resumed again Saturday afternoon. This annual festival at Wilson was doubly noteworthy this year since Wilson is 100 years old in 1971. An estimated 5000 visitors were on hand to help the town keep alive its Bohemian heritage. Authentic Bohemian food was served Saturday at several locations in town. A parade through the streets of Wilson Saturday morning was the highlight of the festival. Over 100 entries including a live cattle auction made this year's parade the longest in the festival's history.



## What Happened To The Convertible?

No more will the girl driver cross the golden prairie, her hair blowing wildly in the wind. No more will young lovers lean back in the car and gaze up at the stars.

The convertibles, the rag tops, the prettiest cars the trade ever built, are finished. A few still are being turned out, but the end is in sight.

There doesn't seem to be room in the modern world for that special car that every boy once wanted. Twentieth century reality keeps butting in for the man in a convertible.

Manufacturers in Detroit say the convertible died of cultural shock. It couldn't adapt to the last half of the 20th century. The car makers have a long list of reasons for the death.

- In the age of air-conditioning, real air has lost its value.

- In the age of the freeway, the 70-mile-an-hour speed turns a breeze into a hurricane, and the soot and fumes don't help.

- In the age of imitation the hardtop and the vinyl-covered roof have stolen the sharp look of the convertible. Even the word hardtop derives from the expression "hardtop convertible."

- In the age of Ralph Nader the dangers of the convertible in a rollover have become an issue, and in the age of consumerism the rattles and leaks that are part of life in a convertible have become unacceptable.

- In the age of bored workers and efficiency-minded managers the convertible has become the great nuisance on the assembly line.

- In the age of untrained mechanics, service is a headache, and repairmen have been known to throw their tools in anger, trying to

replace a top.

- In the age of crime, protection of the soft top is impossible and tops have been slashed just for the fun of it.

So the convertible assembly lines have died: From 507,000 cars built in the 1965 model year down to 130,000 last year and 76,000 for 1971.

American Motors Corporation stopped building them after 1968.

The General Motors Corporation and the Ford Motor Company still are in the business, but it is reported that Ford will stop making convertibles after the 1973 model year.

The convertible was a stylist's and engineer's nightmare, too.

"After you designed a car you tried to fit a convertible onto it," said one designer, and as the rear panels began flowing into the roof in modern car design this became a tougher job. Without the steel roof the convertible needed tougher sides and floors to hold the car together, which meant extra design in manufacturing and then greater repair costs.

The rear seating was tight because of space needed for the top.

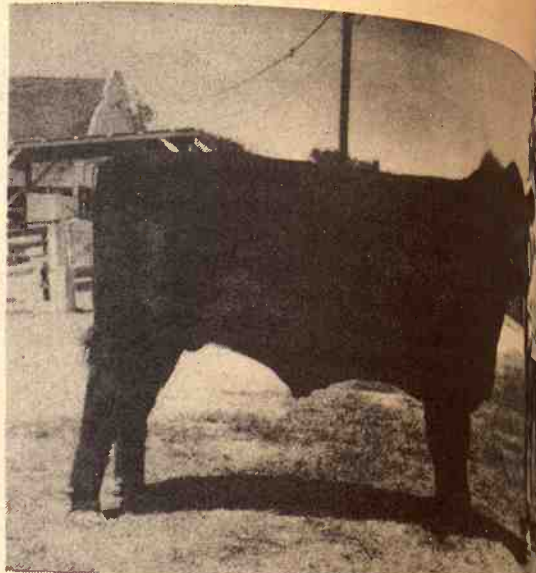

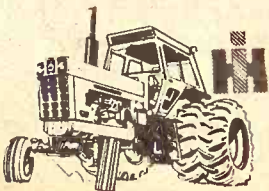

# Cattle, Wheat Declines Cut Farm Price Index

Prices received by Kansas farmers at mid-July, 1971 were down moderately from June this year but slightly above July last year, according to the Kansas Crop and Livestock Reporting Service.

The index of prices received for all farm products was 253 percent of the 1910-14 base period, compared with 262 in June and 247 in July 1970.

Principal declines from June were in wheat, beef cattle and lambs.

On the other hand, prices of soybeans and hogs were up moderately from the previous month.

Compared with a year ago, prices for grain and soybeans were up considerably and those for hay and lambs up moderately, but hog prices and egg prices were down sharply.

### Crop Prices

The crop price index was 163 percent of the 1910-14 base period at mid-July, 10 points below June this year but 22 points above July 1970.

Wheat at mid-July averaged \$1.29 per bushel, 10 cents below June but 15 cents above July 1970.

Corn was worth \$1.41 per bushel, 1 cent above a month earlier and 23 cents above a year ago.

Barley at 96 cents per bushel was 1 cent below June but 22 cents above a year earlier.

Sorghum grain brought \$2.32 per cwt., compared with \$2.30 the previous month and \$1.76 the previous year.

Soybeans averaged \$3.10 per bushel, 22 cents above June this year and 52 cents above July 1970.

### Livestock Prices

The livestock and livestock products price index at mid-July was 356 percent of the 1910-14 base period, compared with 363 a month ago and 368 a year ago.

The meat animal price index was 430 percent in July, down 10 points from June and 11 points below July last year.

Hog prices averaged 19.20 per cwt., \$1.70 above a month earlier but \$4.80 above July 1970.

Beef cattle brought \$28.00 per cwt., \$1.20 below a month ago but 20 cents above a year ago.

The dairy price index was 334 in July compared with 331 in June and 326 last year.

A preliminary wholesale milk price of \$5.45 was 5 cents above the previous month and 15 cents above the previous year.

Eggs averaged 21 cents per dozen, 1 cent below a month ago and 6 cents below a year ago.

### Prices Paid

Prices paid by farmers for protein supplements and mixed feeds were up from July 1970.

### United States

The index of prices received by the Nation's farmers for farm products at mid-July was 286 percent of the 1910-14 base period, down 2 points

from mid-June and up 1 point from July 1970.

Price decreases from June were noted for most grains, most meat animals, hay and eggs.

Prices were higher for hogs, soybeans milk and milk cows.

The index of prices paid by far-

mers for commodities and services (including interest, taxes and wage rates) was 410, down 2 points from mid-June but 21 points above a year ago.

The parity ratio in July was 70, unchanged from June, but down 3 points from July 1970.

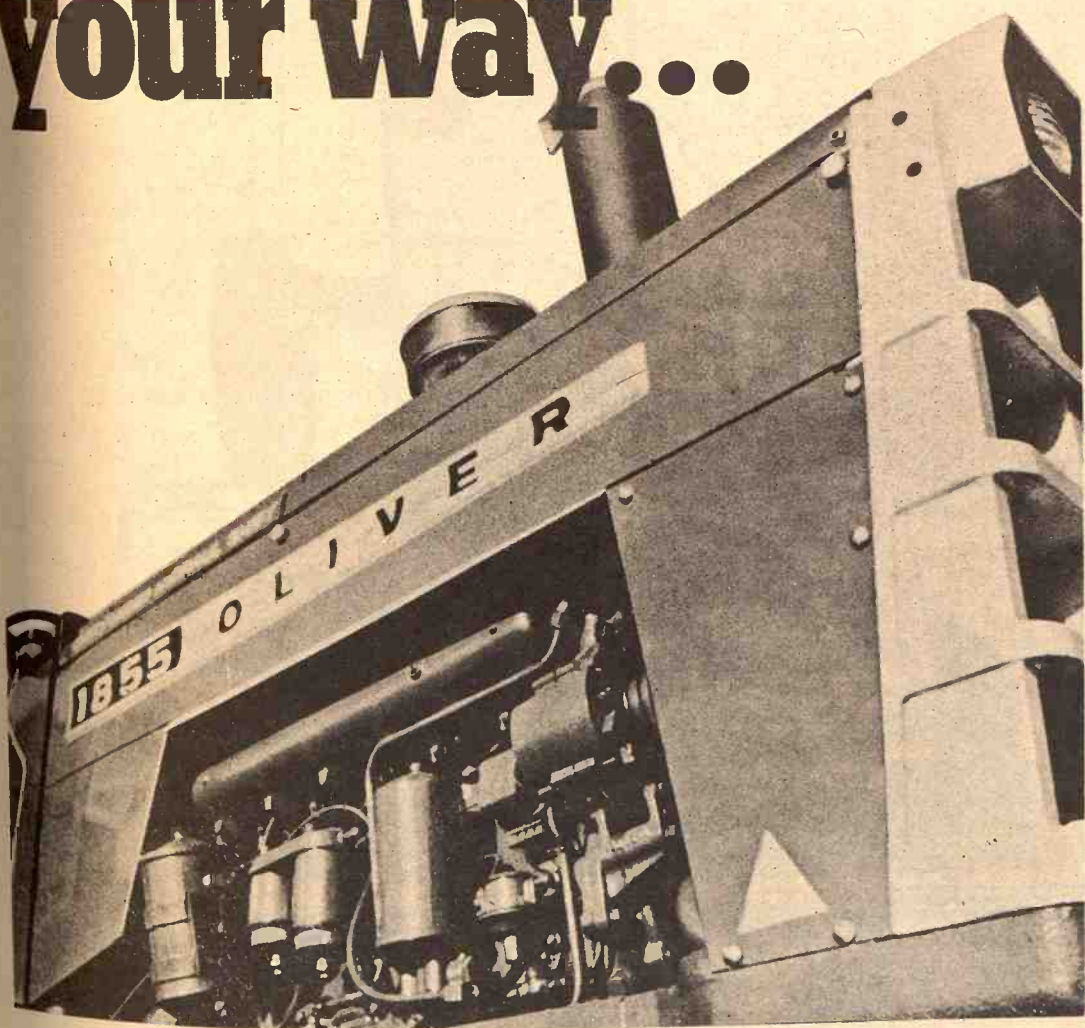

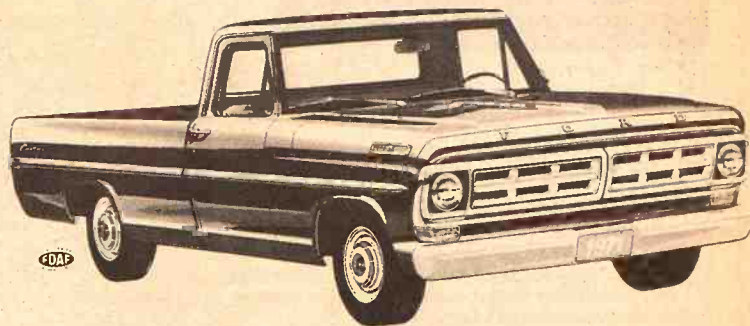

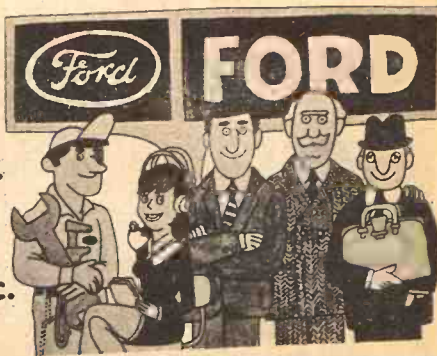

## OUR DAILY BREAD

— by G&G Area Cooks

### Mrs. Harry Niedfeldt Of Paxico To Receive Prize

Mrs. Harry Niedfeldt, Paxico: "I am enclosing a recipe for Fresh Corn off the Cob in Cream."

#### FRESH CORN IN CREAM

- 4 tablespoons butter or margarine
- 4 cups fresh corn cut off the cob
- 1½ teaspoons salt
- ½ teaspoon sugar
- ½ cup sweet cream
- ¼ teaspoon black pepper

Melt butter or margarine in a skillet or saucepan. Add corn, salt and sugar. Cover and cook 10 minutes. Add cream and cook 5 minutes longer. Stir in black pepper and serve.

Mrs. Howard Truelove, R 3, Burlington: "This is the best Bread & Butter Pickle recipe I have ever used."

#### BREAD & BUTTER PICKLES

- 4 quarts sliced cucumbers
- 6 white onions
- 2 green peppers
- 3 cloves garlic
- one-third cup salt
- 5 cups sugar
- 1½ teaspoons celery seed
- 1½ teaspoons turmeric
- 1½ teaspoons mustard seed
- 3 cups cider vinegar

Slice cucumbers very thin; slice onions and cut peppers into small pieces. Mix together and add salt. Cover with chopped ice, replacing often, for three hours. Combine remaining ingredients and after draining cucumbers thoroughly, pour vinegar mixture over cucumber mixture and bring to a boil. Pour into sterilized jars and seal while hot.

Mrs. Rex Linder, R 2, Sterling, sent the following recipe:

#### BASIC CREAM PIE

- 1½ cups sugar
- two-thirds cup flour
- ¼ teaspoon salt
- 4 cups milk
- 1 teaspoon vanilla

- ¼ cup butter
- 4 egg yolks

Mix sugar, flour and salt well. Add 1 cup of milk and beaten egg yolks. Stir into 3 cups of hot milk and cook until thickened. Add vanilla and butter. Fill 4 baked pie shells.

#### Variations:

Pineapple—Add 2 cups drained crushed pineapple after the pudding is cooked.

Coconut—Add 2 cups shredded coconut after pudding is cooked.

Banana—Cover bottom of pie shell with bananas before filling with pudding.

Chocolate—Stir 2 cups chocolate chips into hot pudding until melted. Top pies with whipped cream or any whipped topping.

The next recipe is from Mrs. Lyman Richter of Barnes:

#### BLUEBERRY SALAD

##### Part I:

- 1 box red raspberry gelatin
- 2 cups hot water

Chill till set.

##### Part II:

- 1 cup half & half
- 1 cup sugar

Heat but do not boil. Dissolve 1 package unflavored gelatin in ½ cup cold water. Add to above mixture.

Add 1 8-ounce package Philadelphia

cream cheese, 1 teaspoon vanilla and ½ cup nuts. Cool and put on raspberry gelatin.

##### Part III:

1 box red raspberry gelatin and 1 cup water. Then add 1 can blueberries (1 pound). Cool and put on top.

The next recipe was sent by Mrs. William A. Harris, 917 North 9th, Marysville:

#### ORANGE SALAD

- 1 package orange gelatin
- 1 cup hot water
- 1 small can crushed pineapple
- ½ cup coconut
- ½ cup grated cheese

Dissolve gelatin in hot water and when jelly-like add pineapple, coconut and grated cheese. Fold in a package of prepared Dream Whip. Chill.

Mrs. Edna Harding, Waterville: "Choke cherries are ripe and this makes a soft delicious jelly."

#### CHOKO CHERRY JELLY

- 3½ cups juice
- 4½ cups sugar
- 3 ounces frozen concentrate for lemonade

##### 1 box Sure-Jell

Wash choke cherries and put into a large kettle, then cover with water. Heat gently until juice starts to flow, then mash the berries. Cover and simmer for 15 minutes. Place in jelly bag and squeeze out juice. Measure juice into kettle, bring to a boil and stir in Sure-Jell. Bring this to a full rolling boil and add sugar; then again boil hard for two minutes, stirring constantly. Remove from heat, skim and pour into glasses.

1 box lemon gelatin  
2 cups boiling water  
1 cup ground cornmeal  
1 cup salad dressing  
1 tablespoon onion

## Tougher Rules For Packers On Additives, Color

The State Board of Agriculture has adopted changes in the Kansas mandatory meat inspection regulations.

Jim Petr, chief of the Meat and Poultry Inspection Division, said the new rules would go into effect Jan. 1, 1972.

He said the board eliminated provisions in the present regulations which permitted packers and processors to use cyclamates as sweeteners.

The new rules will also forbid the use of paprika by processors and packers to give fresh meat a more attractive red color, and will restrict the fat content in sausage to no more than 30 per cent.

The revised regulations will also

require the destruction of an entire animal carcass if a malignant cancer is found. Under the present rules, if a malignancy is found, the affected portion can be cut out, and the remainder of the carcass can be processed and sold.

One major change applies to retail meat outlets.

It will subject their meat processing operation to state inspection if they wholesale more than \$10,000 per year in meat to hotels, restaurants and similar establishments.

Under the present state rules, retailers are exempt from all but sanitary inspection of their facilities provided they sell 75 per cent or

more of their products to household consumers. Petr said it is unlikely that the estimated 2,500 meat outlets in Kansas affected by this part of the regulations

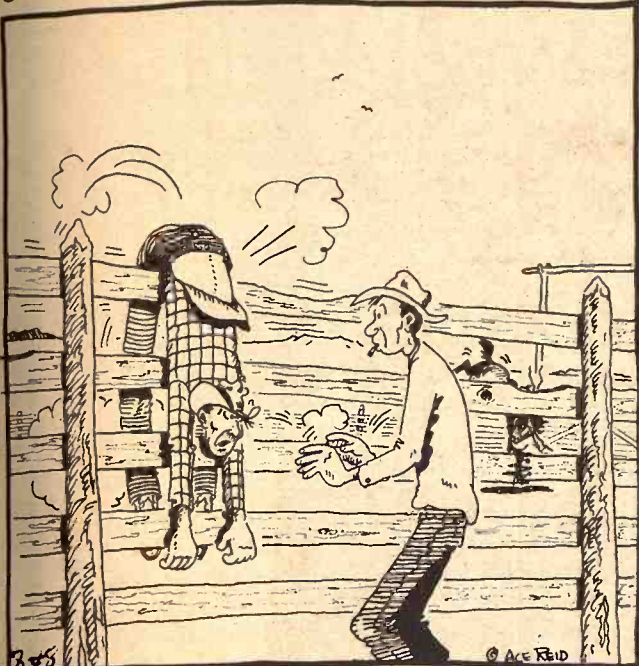

## Despite Blight Spread, Corn Crop Doing Well

In spite of the appearance of eastern corn leaf blight (SCLB) in the eastern Kansas fields, the 1971 corn crop in the state is generally in excellent condition.

This word comes from Claude H. King, Extension plant pathologist at Kansas State University, who has just returned from the field. He has noted that the humid weather has fostered the occurrence of SCLB, but also created ideal growing conditions for corn.

These ideal growing conditions have Kansas headed toward an excellent corn crop in spite of any damage caused by blight.

SCLB has been identified in 38 counties, but only nine of them have severely affected fields. In most counties the blight is still confined to the lower leaves of the corn stalks and will be of little consequence unless it makes a rapid spread to the upper leaves and developing ears.

King points out that this pattern of blight infestation seems prevalent throughout the corn producing states this year. Spread of SCLB by wind—which was widespread last year in the Corn Belt—has not occurred significantly in Kansas this year. Also, rains at night seem to have washed the blight spores from the corn leaves.

These factors, in addition to the dry days that dry the leaves off, have combined to make the corn prospects much brighter than they appeared when the blight was first discovered early in June.

King cautions farmers with blight not to get unduly alarmed and decide prematurely to put their crop in the silo. He advises them to keep abreast of blight spread in their fields and wait until the actual grain damage can be determined before deciding what to do with their crop.

If the damage is severe, there is still plenty of time to put the crop in the silo.

He reminds that last year the Kansas corn crop was reduced about 25 percent because of drought, whereas the Corn Belt states hit hardest by blight suffered a yield reduction of about 15 percent.

"It's highly unlikely that our blight damage this year will in any way approach the damage done last year by drought," he concludes.

development project, with the city putting up the land and plant to get the plum.

But it's no plum to nearby residents, 54 of whom have signed a petition demanding that the place be closed. They want payment of "rental value" for their property from February through July, or as an alternative, payment of difference between existing value of their property and what it was worth before Aristo started operation.

It's the smell of the plant that the Holton residents are complaining about.

Holton city officials will hear the communication at the regular meeting August 4.

The city of Holton holds the title to the land and plant until the industrial revenue bonds are paid off.

The city, however, isn't responsible, says city manager Joe Whitehead, citing a lease agreement

with Aristo.

Said Aristo attorney William Haney: "At this time, we are not involved."

Whitehead said he doesn't want the plant shut down. "You can't put that much money in an area like this without it doing some good." He feels no one "short of the federal government" will shut Aristo down.

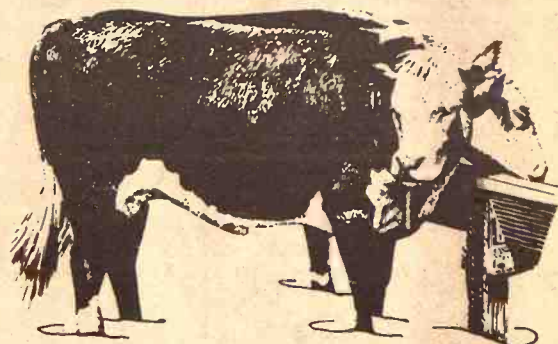

spokesmen said car-building programs were complete and repair work on damaged cars was caught up.

The layoff coincided with the settlement of labor contracts by 10 other railroads with some 190,000 trainmen. 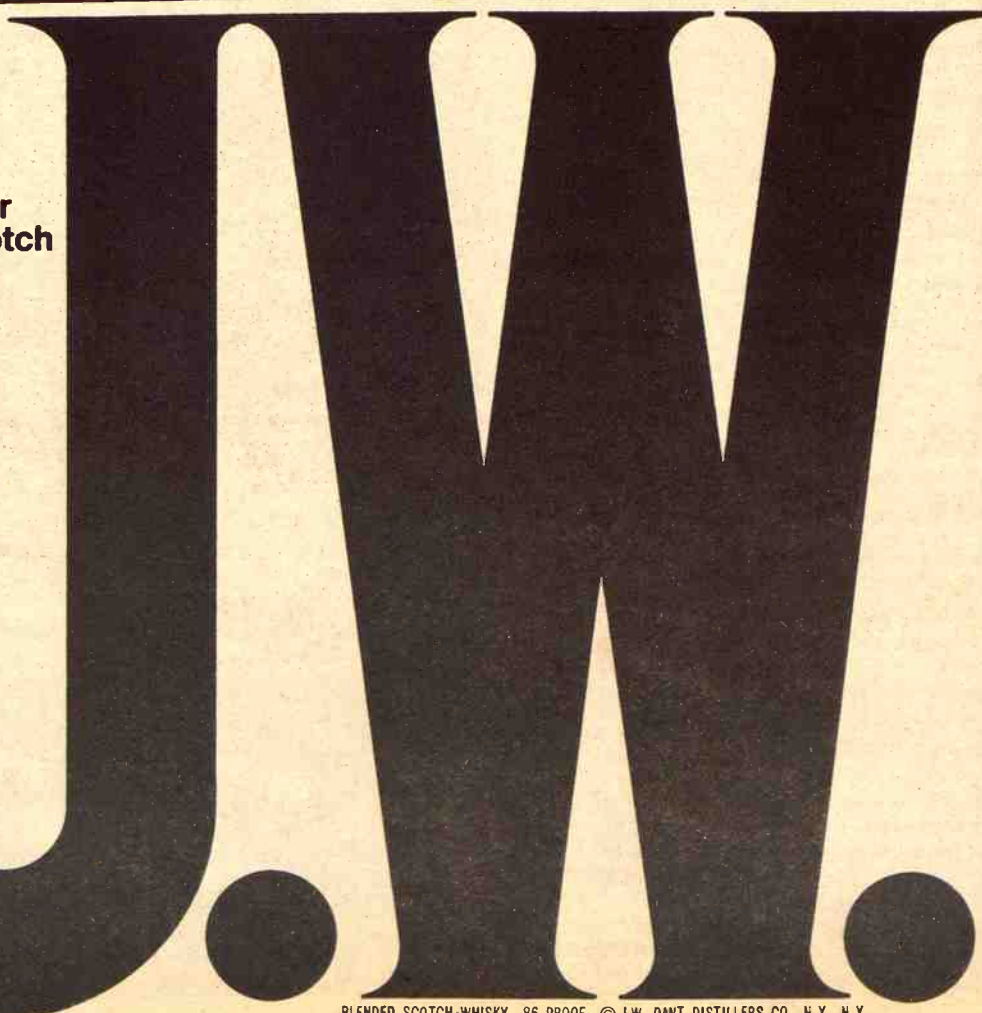

## CATTLEMEN'S BARBECUE AT ALMA AUGUST 13

ALMA—The Wabaunsee Co. Cattlemen's Association will hold its annual barbecue in conjunction with the county fair. The barbecue will be Friday, August 13, 4:30 to 6:30 p.m.

Wool, the stuff that lined the pockets of Australian sheepmen while it kept the world warm is in a bad way. In some places the sheepmen are working at any jobs they can get.

For half a century Australia rode on the sheep's back, for wool was the biggest export. Stories were told of affluent sheepmen who abandoned imported automobiles because of a puncture.

In the year ended June 30 Australia sheared 188 million animals for 1.74 billion pounds of wool. It brought an average of 33 cents a pound. Twenty years ago wool sold for \$1.34.

Graziers say they must have at least 45 cents a pound to produce wool. The government has agreed to subsidize the price up to 40 cents for

a year. This will cost taxpayers \$112 million or more.

High wool prices in the '50s helped boost synthetics. Increased use of those yarns is the sheepman's worry.

The collapse of prices has caused some of the world's best merino flocks to be broken up. Stately homesteads have been closed as graziers moved to the towns and cities for other work.

Banks and wool-selling firms seem likely to lose some of the money loaned to graziers. The properties mortgaged are valued at less than the debt.

One of Australia's most famous merino studs, Hatton Rig, sold 2,500 flock rams at \$1.35 each for pet food. A year ago they would have brought \$90 each. In areas where there is

winter drought, wool sold for as little as 10 cents. Sydney reports that the story of the rig is a 43,728-acre property today has a 100-acre street of Bourke, and owes almost \$100,000. ## Wheat Stores On Rise Again

Agriculture Department officials concede that wheat surpluses are rising again after dipping during the last 12 months because of thriving exports and heavy demand for the grain by livestock feeders.

The carryover into the new marketing year which began July 1 was 730 million bushels, a little more than the department had estimated several months earlier but still the smallest stockpile in two years.

Now, because of a near-record crop being harvested this summer and prospects for a sharp drop in exports, the carryover next July 1 may surge to at least 849 million bushels.

A summary of a wheat situation report, to be issued in full tomorrow, says the estimated output this year of 1.548 billion bushels, added to the July 1 carryover, will mean a supply for 1971-72 of nearly 2.3 billion bushels. That is slightly more than was available last marketing year, but the prospects for use are not nearly so bright at this time.

Last year wheat exports totaled 735 million bushels, one of the best years on record. The report said exports in 1971-72 will be about 650 million bushels. Some say privately that this may be optimistic.

Some of the reasons for the expected drop in exports were cited in the summary report: A lower import demand in Europe because of bumper harvests there; a work stoppage at West Coast docks and the possibility of longshoremen striking Gulf ports later this year.

## Americans Spending Less, Saving More

Americans are saving more and spending less for cars, appliances and other major consumer goods, a Commerce Department report shows.

The report comes as the Nixon administration is trying to boost the slackening economy by stepped up consumer spending. But the figures suggest an even further slowing of business activity.

Based on a Census Bureau survey made early in July, the report shows consumers expect to buy 10 per cent fewer cars than they did in April. And they say they will buy 4 per cent less furniture and carpets. A small

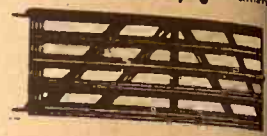

## Lawsuit Against Size Of Associated Milk Producers

Two dairymen have filed a \$1.5 million anti-trust suit against an interstate marketing group based in Kansas, Associated Milk Producers, Inc.

James Simons and Harlan Irvin, along with Marketing Assistance Plan Inc., filed the class action for 280 MAP members in federal court in Houston.

They asked that Judge Woodrow Seals stop Associated Milk Producers from acquiring additional members and force it to release those obtained through alleged monopolistic practices.

The suit alleges that Associated has cut out the independent milk hauler and forced independent producers to join it so that it controls 90 per cent of all milk in the territory it covers.

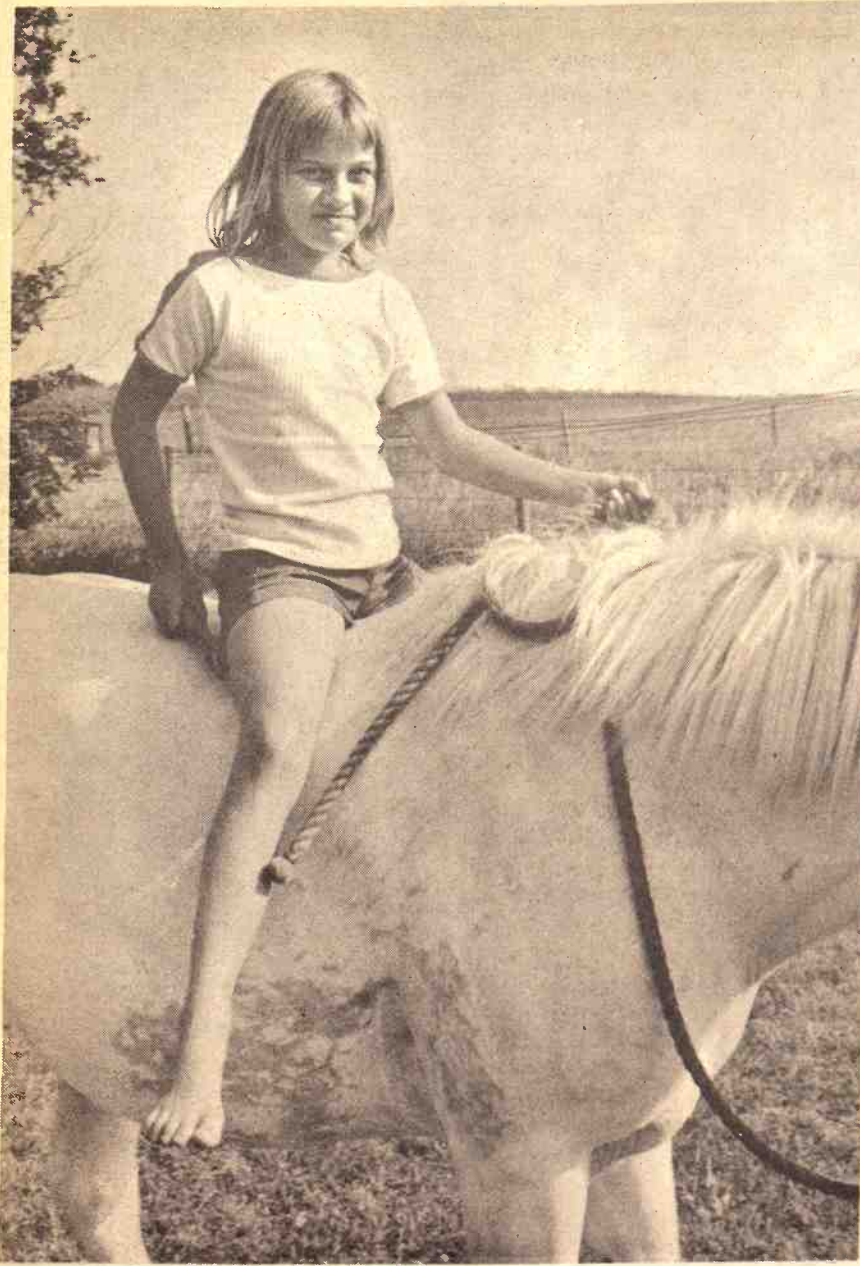

### Seek Milk Order Change To Even Out Production

The U.S. Department of Agriculture will hold a public hearing Aug. 12 in Kansas City, Mo., on amending the Greater Kansas City federal milk marketing order.

USDA's Consumer and Marketing Service said the hearing will begin at 9:30 a.m., in the Aztec Room, Hotel President, 14th and Baltimore, Kansas City.

The hearing will be limited to consideration of a proposal from Mid-America Dairymen, Inc., to amend the base and excess plan for paying dairy farmers.

Under the plan each farmer has a base reflecting his average daily deliveries of milk to the market in September through December. In spring and summer months when more milk is produced, each farmer is paid a base price for milk deliveries up to his base amount, and a lower price for any excess over the base. Purpose of the plan is to encourage a more even production of milk throughout the year.

It is being proposed that the base-forming period be changed to compute an individual producer's daily base on the four months of lower milk production during the

year, rather than for the present period of September through December.

After evaluating evidence, USDA will recommend changes.

## No Deposit For Dissolving Bottle

In an effort to check litter from empty bottles, a Natick, Mass. bottle

firm says it has developed one that can be dissolved in water—or even eaten.

The bottle is not yet in production, but Dr. Ole Sandven, director of research for Ilikon Corp., said “quite a number of bottling firms

have expressed interest in our development and we will produce the bottle, probably within six to nine months.”

Ilikon's bottle consists of a core of water soluble, cellulose-based protein. The core is coated by a thin

layer of plastic so the bottle won't dissolve when it is filled with liquid or gets wet on the outside.

When the bottle is emptied, the plastic coating is peeled away and the bottle can be safely dissolved in water with no resulting pollution.

# Chances Good That Area To Avoid Horse Disease

The chances seem good that Kansas horses will avoid widespread exposure to Venezuelan equine encephalomyelitis (VEE), the deadly horse disease that has moved into southern Texas from Mexico during the past month.

This word comes from Dr. Homer Caley, Extension veterinarian at Kansas State University. Caley recently returned from a series of discussions about the disease held during the annual meeting of the American Veterinary Medicine Association in Detroit, Mich.

Caley says officials seem cautiously optimistic that the disease will be contained in Texas through an intensive vaccination program and a widespread mosquito spraying effort. Mosquitoes may be carriers of the VEE organism.

During VEE discussions in Detroit, Caley learned the following things about the disease and its control that Kansans should be aware of:

(1) The capabilities of the VEE vaccine being used on horses in Texas in states that border Texas, and in all the Gulf Coast states has never been tested in a situation where 100 percent of horses were vaccinated.

When the vaccine was used in Mexico, only 50 percent of the horse population was vaccinated which left 50 percent susceptible to the disease, more than enough to continue transmitting the disease elsewhere.

The massive vaccination effort underway in the U.S. is the first time the vaccine has been used when 100 percent of the horse population has been vaccinated. U. S. Department of Agriculture officials are watching carefully to see if the vaccine is successful in establishing a buffer zone against the spread of VEE.

If the vaccine proves effective in preventing VEE, officials are relatively certain the disease can be contained in Texas. More than 6 million acres are being sprayed for mosquito control as an additional precaution.

(2) The vaccine used on horses is

the same used to protect humans against the disease. Therefore, it is still an experimental vaccine for horses. There are many unanswered questions about the VEE vaccine and its effect on both humans and horses. That is why officials are being so extremely careful with the vaccine use.

In the emergency program underway—financed by special funds released by Secretary of Agriculture Clifford Hardin—horses are vaccinated at no cost to the owner. The government is paying for the vaccine and hiring veterinarians to do the work.

(3) At present there is no recommendation being made for mass human vaccinations against VEE. Only high-risk persons such as laboratory technicians and veterinarians are being vaccinated.

However, in Texas there has been considerable human involvement with the disease. The number of clinical cases of VEE in humans has surpassed the number of confirmed cases, but officials believe a time lag in confirmation of cases may be involved.

At any rate, VEE is not nearly so deadly for humans as it is for horses. In humans, VEE appears with nearly the same symptoms as the flu. Early reports show 80 percent death losses in horses with the disease.

(4) Unvaccinated horses are entirely susceptible to VEE. The vaccine used for protection against the eastern and western strains of encephalomyelitis—diseases which have been in the U.S. for years—provides no protection against VEE.

Caley says the VEE vaccine is not available for use in Kansas under the current government program nor is it likely to be unless the disease spreads from its present

area.

However, he does suggest that Kansas horse owners do two things. First, they should vaccinate all their horses immediately for the eastern and western strains of encephalomyelitis because these diseases are occurring in Kansas now and their symptoms are closely related to those of VEE.

Second, horse owners should report any sickness or strange actions in their horses to a local veterinarian as quickly as possible. All Kansas veterinarians have been alerted to keep a sharp lookout for cases of VEE.

Within a few months, VEE vaccine may be available for general use. The USDA has announced licensing of one commercial com-

pany to manufacture the vaccine. It will take approximately six weeks after licensing before the vaccine is generally available.

If the Texas vaccine program proves effective, Kansans will likely

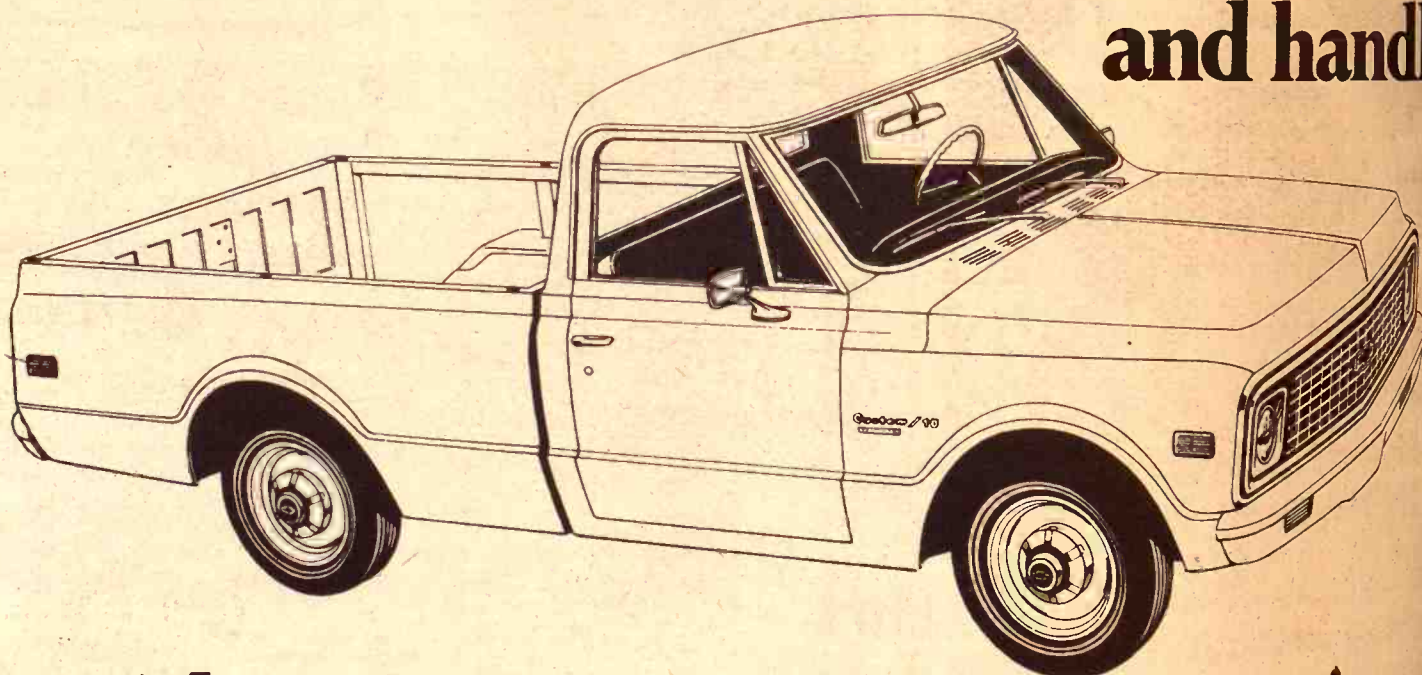

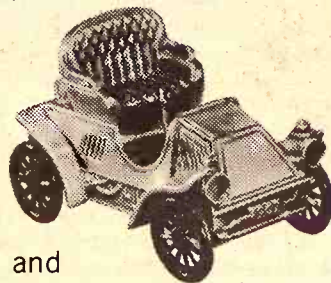

# What Happend To U.S. As Great Trade Power?

The U.S. may see its traditional trade surplus vanish this year, but an examination of strengths and weaknesses in the over-all trade outlook indicates that gloom at this prospect may be premature.

The latest figures, of course, show the hard fact that the nation's trade balance ran a deficit—an excess of imports over exports—through three consecutive months, April to June, for the first time in 21 years.

As a result, an earlier surplus has been replaced by a deficit for the first half of the year of \$372.3 million and as secretary Maurice H. Stans of the Commerce department warned in connection with the figures: "in 1971 the trade surplus may disappear altogether for the first time since 1893."

Among this country's important trade strengths is the export of "high-technology" products—jumbo jets, computers, business machines, electric and electronic apparatus and sophisticated industrial controls systems and instruments. And while warning of deficit, Stans also urged more incentives for research and effort to maintain technological leadership, which many experts fear is being threatened by countries such as Japan and West Germany.

In addition, the U.S. is unique in its trading versatility, in being able to export large quantities of machinery and manufactured goods as well as raw materials and agricultural produce.

But the U.S. is also the biggest importer of raw materials and semi-finished goods, items such as ores, oil, metals, chemicals and in recent years, of a rising volume of consumer products—autos, appliances, textiles, leather goods—and industrial machinery.

The problem is that imports have been growing more than twice as fast as exports, although last year

exports picked up sharply to a surplus of \$2.7 billion. The race between exports and imports has grown steadily closer and there has been a question of whether the U.S. was really trying harder, especially in export financing and credit.

One answer has been the pending bill to increase the Export-Import Bank's funding authority from \$13.5 billion to \$20 billion and to finance exports to Communist countries, including Communist China. It has been estimated that such an increase could eventually add nearly \$5 billion to exports.

At the same time, the rise in imports, particularly of consumer products combining low price and quality, has aroused fears of an import "flood," especially from Japan, and increased demand for import restriction.

The shift to trade deficit this year has demonstrated that the trade balance in still very close and could swing either way. It is clear that much of the recent import rise has resulted from special circumstances—the expanding domestic economy, continued high consumer purchasing, threats of steel and dock strikes—all of which spur imports and stockpiling. At the same time, exports have been slowed by reduced economic activity in such major markets as Western Europe and Japan.

Trade figures and a recent analysis of the trade outlook by the Commerce Department show there are still many strong areas of American exports. Exports of aircraft, which rose sharply to \$2.7 billion last year, are continuing to gain with delivery of jumbo jets and, according to the Commerce forecast, will show a substantial increase this year.

Agricultural exports, which rose by 20 per cent last year to \$7.3 billion, are continuing to rise. The Commerce report forecasts a sharp increase for cotton and higher tobacco sales.

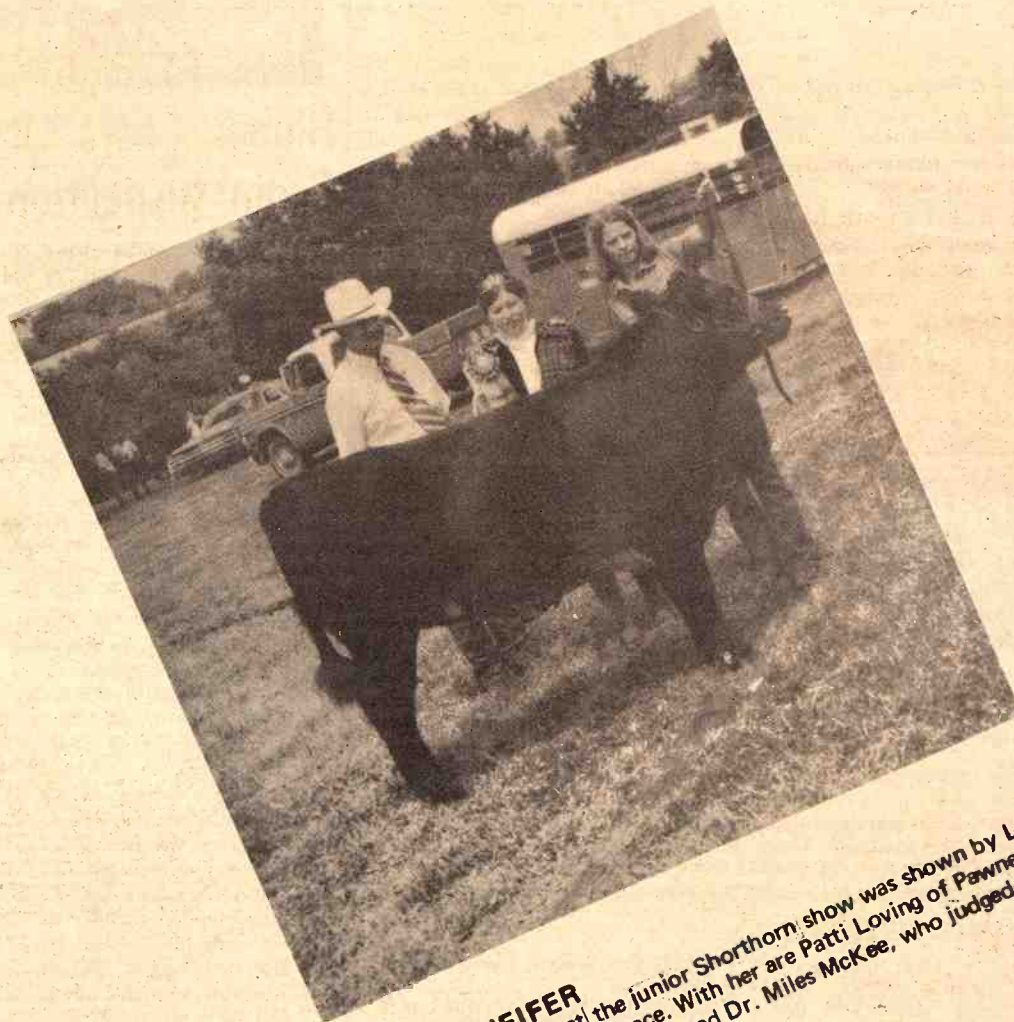
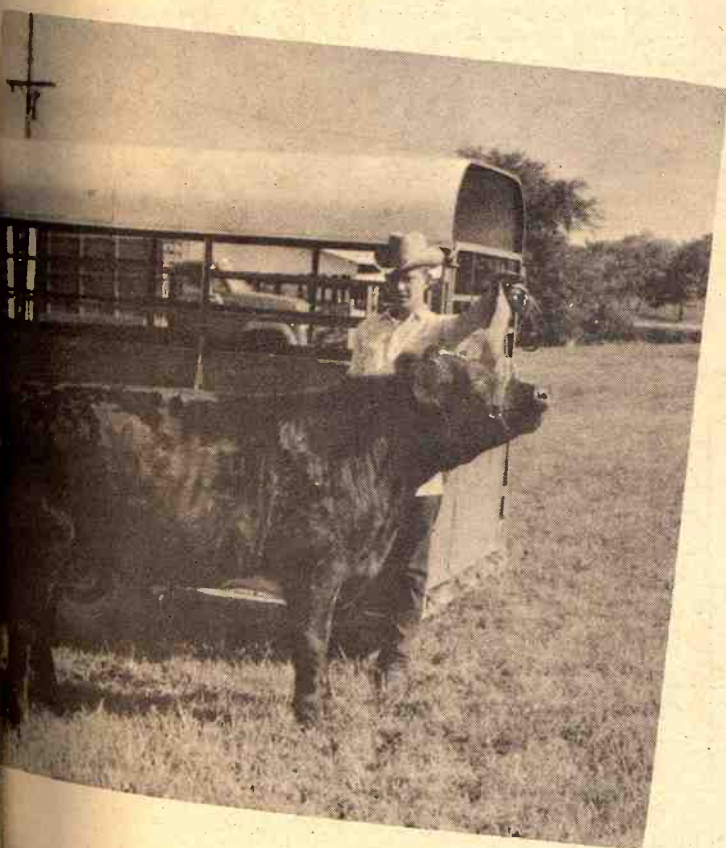

## Milk Output When Milking Goes Faster

Some dairymen are able to produce milk more efficiently than others. They do this by milking faster.

They train heifers to milk out rapidly, take machines off as soon as the cow or quarters are milked out, and stimulate the cows just ahead of milking by washing and massaging the udder and taking a couple of streams of milk from the backquarter.

Ralph Bonewitz, Extension dairyman at Kansas State

University, explains that stimulation causes milk let down hormone to be released from the pituitary gland at the base of the brain into the blood stream.

This hormone causes the alveoli (milk secreting cells) to contract and force the milk into the milk-collecting ducts. With the milk into the ducts, it is easily removed by proper milking procedures.

Milking should begin within one minute after stimulation or let down, suggests Bonewitz. The hormone (oxytocin) is effective for only a short time. It is diluted by one half each minute after it is released.

"Get the milk from the cow under 4½ minutes if possible," urges Bonewitz. "You can't take milk away from the cow. She has to give it

to you."

Dairymen must consider that unusual noise or pain causes adrenalin to be released into the blood stream. When this happens the cow can't let down her milk and harvest of milk is incomplete.

It doesn't take a big udder to have a profitable cow. Many large udders are "meaty" or contain scar tissue. Udder size and attachments are inherited qualities, and recent studies indicate that the tendency for hard milking may also be inherited.

Hard milking may be due to constrictions at the top of teat or may be caused by the sphincter muscle which closes the teat canal at the end of the teat, explains Bonewitz.

"Dairymen should make certain their bulls sire daughters with good udders that are firmly attached and milk out reasonable fast," says Bonewitz. "The checking must be done before mating is made. After the heifer is fresh, it's too late. Dairymen should think of milking as harvesting the crop."

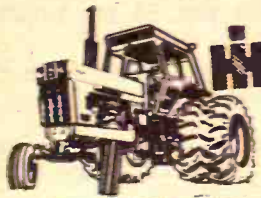

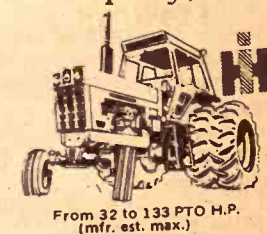

## Carmakers Peg New Prices On 4%-5% Rise

General Motors is increasing car prices an average of \$152 or 4.1 per cent.

But GM said that when the usual optional equipment is added to the cars, the new models will be going up an average of \$76 or 3.9 per cent.

The percentage figure is lower on the "completely equipped" car because optional equipment is being increased 3.2 per cent and so many options are ordered by customers.

GM announced the figures last week and said the prices were tentative, that is, subject to change before the cars go on sale Sept. 23. But it is considered doubtful there will be any major changes.

The GM prices appeared slightly lower than the tentative increases averaging 5.2 per cent announced by Ford Motor Co. Those were about \$200. Ford's optional equipment is going up 5 per cent, also higher than GM's.

Chrysler has also sent tentative prices to its dealers but would only say they are "in the same ball park" as Ford's.

The tentative retail price of two GM cars is being reduced because the dealer discount (the markup from the wholesale price) is being cut from 21 to 17 per cent. The

Chevrolet Camaro is being cut \$35 or 1.2 per cent and the Pontiac Firebird \$39 or 1.3 per cent. The compact and subcompact cars now carry a 17 per cent discount.

GM said truck prices are being increased \$205 or 5.4 per cent.

This is about the same as the 5.7 per cent or \$201 increase announced by Ford for its trucks last week. Chrysler has said Dodge trucks are going up \$117 or 4 per cent.

The prices are all for "comparably equipped" models. In cases where formerly optional equipment is made standard, the 1971 price is recalculated for comparison purposes. Thus, the "real" increase in basic prices will be higher. But how much won't be determined until there is a detailed comparison of 1971 and 1972 price lists.

GM is considered the price leader in the auto industry. Thus, Ford and Chrysler may make some adjustments in their prices after getting a look at GM's price lists. Ford, for example, has a 21 per cent markup on its sporty cars, the Mustang and Cougar, which compete with the Camaro and Firebird, so an adjustment is likely.

GM said the new prices include provision for the 7 per cent excise tax and dealer preparation work.

The corporation said product improvements for the 1972 models include improved bumper reinforcements on all regular size cars.

There is likely to be another round of price adjustments in January

because of new federal safety regulations. GM said:

"The tentative prices being announced do not include provision for the new seat belt warning system. This system will be added as required by the Dept. of Transportation on all GM cars manufactured after Jan. 1, 1972, and prices will be announced at that time."

### PAROLE GIVEN TO HOTEL'S MONTE PARRISH

C. C. Monte Parrish, onetime Army general and owner of hotels in the western end of the G&G area, has been given a parole from the Kansas State penitentiary. Parrish, 62, has been in prison since November 1970 after being sentenced to terms up to five years in connection with a fire in 1967 that destroyed his Parrish hotel and two other buildings in Great Bend.

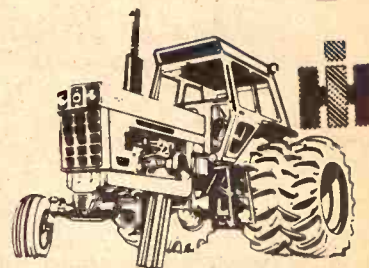

## New Auto Accident Forms Get Mixed Favor From Lawmen

Whether it be fender-benders of more than \$100 damage, or serious injury accidents, motor vehicle accidents now mean Kansas law enforcement officers will have to fill out more lists of questions, reports and narratives.

Since a new accident report form issued by the safety division of the Kansas Motor Vehicle Department became effective this month, accident paperwork has nearly doubled, in the estimation of some officers.

Some lawmen hail the new forms as a means of eventually preventing more accidents. Others grumble that many of the questions on the forms are unnecessary and time-consuming.

First in a series of reforms to comply with the National Highway Safety Program standards, the report form was revised by Harold Deens of Lockheed Corp., Los Angeles, Calif., under a federal grant. Deens visited Highway Patrol offices, police departments, county sheriffs' offices, the State Highway

Commission and the Motor Vehicle Division before compiling the revision, according to Harold Pellegrino, Topeka, assistant director of safety.

"The new form will be more complete in its protection of both the investigating officer and the individuals involved in the accident," Pellegrino said. "The old form was all right, but this new form will be much better."

Some lawmen are not so sure. They refer to questions concerning the position of cars' seats, headrests, safety belts, shoulder harnesses and debris left on the road as "unnecessary."

Pellegrino agrees that the form is more time-consuming but added, "Much of the information not included on the old form and added in the new one will gather data for both the government and private industry to make cars and driving safer."

"If every investigating officer fills out these new forms as he should, we will have some material proof about what happens and what we can do to prevent the worst from happening in car accidents," Pellegrino said.

About 250 men have attended workshop which began June 21 to learn how to complete the new detailed forms, which contain nearly 80 more questions than the old ones. Circumstances of the accident will determine how many of the additional 80 questions concerning road conditions, pedestrians involved and weather officers will have to answer.

Claud McCammet, Highway Commission safety director, motor vehicle officials and Highway Patrol officers have conducted workshops in Salina, Topeka, Wichita, Chanute, Hays and Great Bend.

McPherson County Sheriff Ellis Mussellwhite, who sent two of his officers to the Salina workshop, said the forms "weren't that much more work and not really complicated at all."

The McPherson department began using the new forms during the last week of July and has had "no problems or trouble in getting used to them," according to Mussellwhite.

McPherson County deputy Roger Wilson has worked 10 accidents using the new forms. "I think they're great," he said. "All the details and questions will really be of help in preventing more accidents. They don't take that much longer to fill out, either."

Tour participants should take I-70 to the Maple Hill exit, then go one mile north of Maple Hill to the ranch headquarters. Activities will officially begin with a welcome at 9:00 by Pete Gehrt, Manhattan, tour chairman.

### Stop 1. Adams Ranch

8:30 a.m.—Coffee and doughnuts. The Adams Ranch, owned and managed by Raymond Adams, Jr., was founded in the 1880's by Raymond's great-grandfather. The ranch maintains 2,000 cows on a separate unit in Southwest Kansas in Meade and Seward Counties. The Maple Hill operation consists of a farming, grazing and feeding program using the calves produced on the Southwest Kansas ranch. The

calves are moved to the Maple Hill ranch where they are started on brome grass pastures, summered on native grass and then finished at the ranch. They have pen capacity to hold about 2,500 cattle.

The Adams family has been breeding cows artificially since 1949 and they raise their own bulls for use on the commercial cows. They have been using a bull called Return Silver 1220 for several years in their AI program. W Beau Intense 0157, a son of Beau Intense 324 from the Weise and Sons herd at Manning, Iowa, will be used AI to raise herd bulls in the future. The ranch is also doing some crossbreeding with Hereford bulls on Angus cows.

The feeding pens will have several pens of Holsteins on feed getting whole shelled corn and supplement. No hay is fed to these cattle. They arrive at the ranch weighing 200-250 pounds and are placed on this all concentrate ration until they are finished.

Hired Hands Rey, the the Adams Ranch Quarter Horse stud, along with some of the brood mares and colts will also be on display for the tour participants.

### Stop 2. Landon Pastures. 10:25 a.m.

(Located two miles west of the 177 and I-70 Junction on I-70.)

The Landon pastures are owned by Mrs. Alf Landon of Topeka. Her husband was the Republican presidential candidate in 1936 and Governor of Kansas from 1932-1936. Mrs. Landon's mother purchased these pastures in the last 1930's. At that time they were a part of the Providence Ranch owned by the Dewey family. These pastures comprise a little over 1,200 acres.

This operation is typical of many grazing operations in the Flint Hills where one person owns the grass, a second party manages the grass and looks after the cattle, and a third party owns the cattle.

Buck Gehrt, Manhattan, is the man who looks after the grass. Mr. Gehrt actually leases the grass from Mrs. Landon and in turn subleases it to the cattle owner. He manages the grass and guarantees the count of the cattle to the owner. The grass season runs from May 1 through late October. Buck Gehrt said that his is a family operation and he manages around 10,000 acres of grass. This number of acres carries about 2,500 cattle.

In the Landon pastures the group will see a set of choice steers that is a common site in the Flint Hills.

### Stop 3. C. L. Stienfort and Son. 11:25 a.m.

(Located approximately three miles north on Humboldt Creek Road from the Junction of 177 and Humboldt Creek Road.)

The C. L. Stienfort operation is a family program with 180 commercial Hereford cows. The tour will also see a Charolais bull that was used in the program with their cow herd. Hereford cows. ## Switch Job From Eureka To Marysville FLBA

A G&G area Federal Land Bank manager will switch jobs soon. Jim Cannon who has managed the Eureka FLBA will move to Marysville to manage that FLBA after September 1.

Cannon is a graduate of Oklahoma State University and was associated with a Land Bank at Broken Arrow, Okla., before going to Eureka in 1967.

At Marysville Cannon will succeed Allen Holeman, who has become associated with a commercial bank at Seneca.

The new treatment for the research program will include observations on the effect of nitrogen fertilization at three rates with and without burning for weed control. Intensive early-season stocking with animal removal in mid July will be studied.

Two pastures which were in the original study on these pastures have been maintained as they were in the previous study to provide information on long term effects of non-burning and annual burning.

The cow-calf research on the unit has centered around winter supplementation studies. In the new pasture system research will be conducted on the effects of burning and nitrogen fertilization on cow-calf performance.

Stop 8. Ci-Co Park, Manhattan. 6: p.m.  
(Located on the northwest edge of Manhattan.)

At 6:00 p.m. a social hour and at 7:00 p.m. a beef barbeque is scheduled to climax the day's activities. Manhattan businessmen will sponsor the evening meal. Dr. A. D. Weber will serve as master of ceremonies and Governor Robert Docking will address the group at this time.

Good pasture management is strongly supported by Earl Moyer and he says they follow the practice of taking half and leaving half of their grass.

Stop 7. Kansas State University Experimental Range Unit. 4:35 p.m.  
This experimental range unit of

1,135 acres was purchased in 1946 as one large pasture. It was subsequently divided into smaller units for experimental work. The unit serves as a research station for cattle operations in the bluestem region of Eastern Kansas.

In 1950 studies concerning the effect of stocking rate, deferred-rotation grazing, and effects of date of range burning on yearling steers were initiated and they were terminated in 1967. Since that time the pastures have been grazed at the same rate and burned annually in order to equalize these pastures for a new research program to begin in the spring of 1972.

Stop 6. Earl and Rod Moyer. 3:15 p.m.  
(Pasture stop located about seven miles north of Tuttle Creek Dam on Highway 13.)

The Moyers' operation is owned and managed by Earl and his son Rod. The operation consists of 5,000 acres carrying 300 registered Hereford cows. Earl Moyer started putting together this operation in the late 1940's. The Moyers have been on a production testing program for several years, working with Charles White, Riley County Agricultural Agent.

The Moyer cow herd is made up of Double Real Prince, Husker, Mixer, Crustman Domino and Lamplighter breeding. Main herd sires in use are sons and grandsons of Royal Husker 3. The Moyers sell volume numbers of bulls into the Southwest United States and Mexico every year. Their bulls are sold at approximately 16-18 months-of-age.

The Moyer farming program consists of 500 acres that produce crops to be marketed through their cattle and hog programs. The spring calving cows are left on grass year-round while the fall calving cows are taken to the headquarters and wintered.

Stop 5. Dewey Ranch. 2:00 p.m.  
(Located approximately five miles north of I-70 on McDowell Creek Road.)

The Dewey Ranch is one of the oldest and most colorful ranches in the area. The ranch house, built in 1913, and the barn which was built in 1911 are of native stone.

Frank McDermid of the Pullman Cattle Company purchased the Dewey Ranch in 1956. At the present time it consists of 7,500 acres. Five hundred acres are productive bottom ground used for producing feed for the yearling operation and the rest is native grass.

## Council Hearing On Milk Order

The U.S. Department of Agriculture has cancelled a planned Aug. 12 hearing on amending the Greater Kansas City federal milk marketing order.

Officials of USDA's Consumer and Marketing Service said that Mid-America Dairymen, a cooperative that had originally proposed amendments to the base and excess plan provisions of the order, had withdrawn its proposals. Therefore, a hearing will not be needed, C&MS said.

The termination notice will appear in the Federal Register Aug. 7.

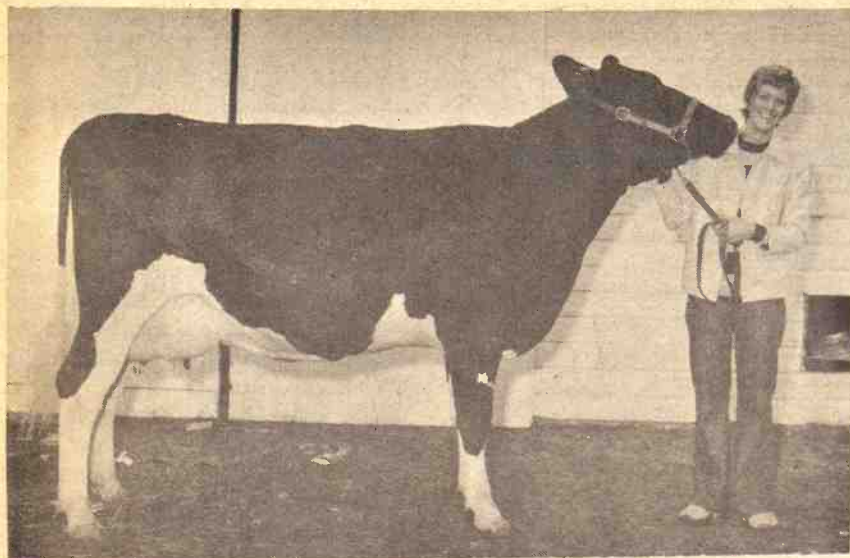

# Corn Forecasts To Be Misunderstood

There will be various crop and blight reports during the next few weeks. The information in these reports can be useful if it is properly interpreted, but it can be dangerous if it is misunderstood.

The USDA will make its first forecast of corn production this year on August 11. When you see this report, remember that it will be based on conditions as they were on August 1. It will not reflect any developments, bad or good, between August 1 and August 11.

Two kinds of information will be considered by the USDA in making their forecasts of yields per acre: (1) reports, or questionnaires, completed by thousands of farmers; (2) samples of the number and size of ears in hundreds of fields throughout the Corn Belt.

### Farmers To Doubt Forecasts

Some farmers will be sure that the forecasts of yields and production are too high, and they may be right.

But here are some facts to keep in mind. From 1955 to 1969, just fourteen years, the average corn yield doubled, increasing from 42 to 84 bushels per acre. During that period, the average rate of increase was 3 bushels per year.

This upward trend in yields was interrupted last year—by the blight, by too much rain in the eastern Corn Belt early in the growing season, and by severe drouth especially in the western edge of the Corn Belt.

Corn-growing experts disagree on whether the upward trend in yields will continue. Compared to last year, however, the corn crop is in much better condition in most areas. It is better in the western edge of the Corn Belt, in the eastern Corn Belt, and in the South and Southeast.

### Blight Threatens Some Corn

Even so, the blight is present all over the country and is building-up for a final attack. We expect to see reports of severe damage in many

fields. In some places, the destruction may be worse than last year.

Overall, however, it appears that more than two-thirds of the corn plants now growing are in no serious danger from the blight. This corn consists of (1) resistant varieties; (2) corn in the northern areas, where the growing season is too short for the blight to develop to destructive levels; and (3) corn in the western areas, where the humidity is too low for rapid growth of the blight fungus.

Less than a third of this year's corn crop seems to be in any great danger. This would include corn of susceptible varieties (mostly T corn) growing in Iowa, Illinois, and states to the South and East. Last year, the average loss from blight on such corn seems to have been no more than 20 percent.

### Larger Acreage This Year

In appraising estimates of total production of corn, remember that the acreage planted this year was 12 percent greater than in 1970. Although some Illinois farmers may doubt this figure, one cannot judge the whole country by Illinois. The acreage planted in Illinois increased only 2 percent. In some other areas, farmers seem to have planted corn everywhere but in the cemeteries. The biggest increases were in Iowa, 18 percent; Minnesota, 23 percent; Nebraska, 14 percent; Ohio, 17 percent; Indiana, 9 percent; South Dakota, 15 percent, and Wisconsin, 16 percent.

## Wheat Increased Feed Efficiency In Hays Trial

Feed intake decreased and feed efficiency increased when wheat was used in cattle finishing rations in a study at Kansas State University's Fort Hays Branch Experiment Station.

Five rations were used. They were rolled milo, rolled wheat and milo in equal parts, rolled milo and reconstituted wheat in equal parts, all wheat, and all wheat plus one-half pound of sodium bentonite per animal each day.

Five pounds of silage were fed after the steers reached full feed. Urea was used to balance crude protein content in the rations.

Feed intake was reduced 17 percent when half wheat was fed and 23 percent when all wheat was fed. However, gain was not decreased in either case so feed efficiency was improved and wheat was worth more per pound than milo.

KSU scientists reported no advantage in reconstituting wheat. Adding sodium bentonite depressed performance although the reason was unclear. Carcasses from animals in the lot that got sodium bentonite graded the highest. Wheat-

# Pork Producers Fear African Swine Fever

Concerned about the threat of African Swine Fever reaching the U.S., the National Pork Producers Council last week spelled out to USDA Secretary Hardin some steps the council thought should be taken.

The letter: "We have noticed with alarm the recent news concerning the presence of African Swine Fever off our Southern shores. After some thought and discussion in our Executive Committee meeting last week, we would like to encourage you to take steps to see that the planes carrying loads of refugees from Cuba into Florida each week have all refuse and garbage burned at comes in on those planes.

"We also think that these people should come under very, very close scrutiny as well as any packages or items that they might be carrying. This week we get word that a veterinarian in a college in Texas says that half cooked hams are being sold from Cuba into Mexico and that it is just a matter of time until these or parts of them will get across into this country.

"We cannot believe that this can be in any great volume, but in view of the problems that could arise, would it be possible to ask the Mexico authorities to embargo shipments from Cuba in respect to that threat that is at hand?

"If not, can we step up port of entry inspections to eliminate the possibility of any of these products coming into this country? Also, can we seek greater inspection on any planes coming into this country and refuse from them that depart from Mexico?

With Mexico the greatest importer of United States breeding hogs, we feel it is to their advantage to help us keep free of this disease. It concerns us that a disease spread the expanse of the Atlantic and now resides a short

# Research Difference Between '52 and '71 Wheat Crops

**RUSSELL**—Research at Kansas State University was a major factor in the production of the all-time, record-breaking 1971 Kansas wheat crop, the president of Great Plains Wheat says.

The president, Kansas Carl Dumlum, said increased production efficiency brought about research will be responsible for and bred better wheat than would have been possible in 1952—the previous record year for Kansas wheat production.

The State Board of Agriculture placed the total value of this year's crop at \$406 million.

The 1971 crop is expected to boost the Kansas economy more than the crop did in several ways, Dumlum said. Manufacture, storage, and application of fertilizers, for example, appear to have been six times greater this year at a higher cost of around \$30 million.

Essentially none of the 1952 crop fed to livestock or poultry. On the other hand, some of the 1971 crop raised exclusively as livestock feed.

It is expected that this will lead economic effects to other segments of the economy in addition to creating another market for wheat.

Dumlum pointed out that the

research contributed by K-State's Agricultural Experiment Station increased not only the quantity of the crop but improved its quality as well. The 1971 crop had an average of 12 per cent protein content compared to last year's 11.4 per cent.

The 1971 crop of slightly more than 308 million bushels was harvested from nine million acres compared with 14.6 million acres required to produce 307,600,000 harvested bushels in 1952.

"It is obvious," Dumlum said, "that the 1971 crop was produced much more efficiently than in any previous record crop. In fact, Dr. Floyd Smith at K-State tells me that the 1971 crop had 62 per cent more efficiency than 20 years ago."

Smith, director of the Kansas Agricultural Experiment Station, was contacted at Manhattan where he explained the reasons for the big difference in production efficiency of the two top-ranked wheat harvesting years, 1971 and 1952.

According to Smith, an arbitrary breakdown of the 62 per cent efficiency increase would give 25 per cent (worth \$62 million) to improved varieties, 20 per cent (worth \$49.4 million) to more effective application of fertilizer, and 17 per cent (worth \$42 million) to improved

production and harvesting practices.

Variety improvements include earlier maturing, better insect and disease resistance, resistance to lodging (the failure of crops to stand firm) and shattering, and greater potential yielding ability.

Very little of the 1971 crop was of varieties used just 10 years ago, Smith reminded. Farmers take new varieties as rapidly as researchers develop and release them, he said.

Foundation seed of Eagle, a new variety released last fall by K-State and U.S.D.A., already is exhausted more than two months before planting time.

Eagle is superior to Scout, by far the most popular wheat in Kansas now. Eagle lodges less and has superior baking qualities as flour.

Other improvements can be expected soon, Smith informed. Kansas is joining seven other states and U.S.D.A. in releasing Centurk wheat, a highly productive rust resistant variety selected from a complex cross having Parker wheat, a popular Kansas variety, as one parent.

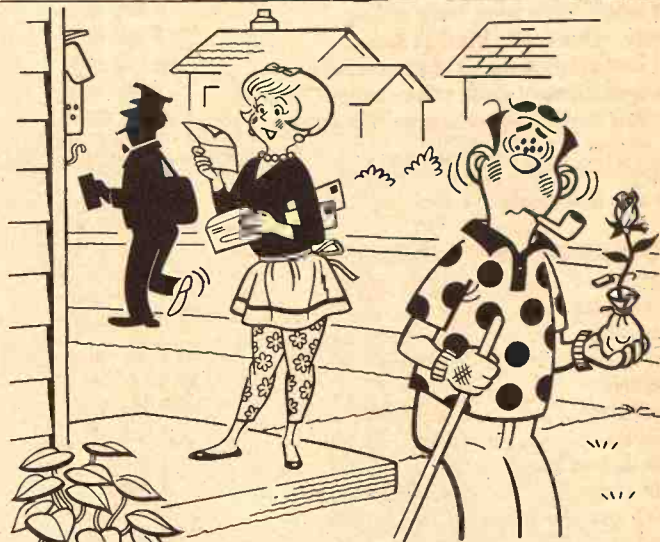
"This excellent variety, combining excellent quality, productivity, and with resistance to leaf and stem rust, can be expected to achieve great popularity by 1974, the

100th anniversary of introduction of Turkey wheat to Kansas," Smith predicts. It is appropriate that the new variety is named "Centurk."

Improved production and harvesting practices include more timely seedbed preparation, more effective weed control, greater conservation of water, and improved harvesting techniques.

Smith points out that continued

research is needed to maintain progress and to keep Kansas competitive with other agricultural states. Research is needed on high yielding dwarf wheats, varieties for livestock feed, and on programs to breed resistance to soil-borne mosaic, streak mosaic, rusts, and other diseases and resistance to greenbugs as well as hessian flies and other insects.
