## Finance Mark By Iowa Beef Packers

DAKOTA CITY, NEBR. — A 7-year-old meat packing firm which had revenues last year of more than \$500 million is one of the financial world's big success stories.

Iowa Beef Packers Inc., with headquarters in this community of 1,000 acres across the Missouri River from Sioux City, Iowa, was organized in 1961. Its stock was listed on the New York stock exchange for the first time in May.

The stock today hovers about \$60 a share, compared with an equivalent 83 1/2 cents a share paid by original investors.

A fortune magazine survey of the 500 largest U.S. industrial corporations listed Iowa Beef 173rd and sixth in return on invested capital—26.8 per cent.

It also reported Iowa Beef had the highest sales per employe—\$290,222—among the 500.

Iowa Beef had its start in Denison, Iowa, where its initial employment was 150 persons

and killed about 5,400 cattle a week.

It now has the nation's largest beef slaughter plant, opened in 1966. A second automated beef processing plant opened in 1967 here. Iowa Beef also owns plants in West Point, Nebr., Luverne, Minn., Emporia, Kans., and Denison and Fort Dodge, Iowa.

Company officials say Iowa Beef's slaughter figure will exceed 47,000 weekly when the West Point and Emporia plants, acquired in an exchange with Armour & Co. for a pork processing plant in Sioux City, get into operation. They are being remodeled. The West Point plant should start operation late this year, the Emporia plant in 1969.

The company has an option to buy 465 acres along Interstate 29 south of Sioux City for a breaking plant.

Iowa Beef vice president Conny Bodine said the plant will


employ about 500 persons at first and "substantially more" later.

## Seek Tractor Entries For Abilene Fair

ABILENE, KANS. — A tractor pulling contest will be a feature of Central Kansas Free fair at the afternoon show Aug. 21. Entries are being solicited from the nearby counties as well as Dickinson, Marion, Morris, Geary, Clay, Ottawa, Saline and McPherson.

The requirement is that the tractors used must be farmer owned and farmer operated, commercially manufactured rubber tired tractors only.

A total of \$200 in prize money will be awarded in four classes, \$25 first prize in each class; \$15 second and \$10 third prize.



## De-Horning Man

Matt Davis, who has been selling a de-horning device in the G&G area for 30 years, here works on the Galen Nelson farm northwest of Delphos. ## Poultry Honors For K-State's Loyal Payne

A Kansan, Loyal Frederick Payne of Manhattan, has been named to the Poultry Hall of Fame.

Payne, a member of the Kansas State University poultry faculty for 40 years and head of the KSU department of poultry husbandry from 1923 to 1954, was one of six elected to the Hall of Fame this year by a special panel of 50 from the American Poultry Historical Society. Selections are made only every three years, and to date only 21 have been chosen.

As a result of this honor, Payne's portrait will be hung in the Poultry Hall of Fame in Jull Hall on the University of Maryland campus.

A native of Nebraska, Payne




Loyal Payne

was reared at Shawnee, Okla., and was graduated from Oklahoma State University in 1921. He served as superintendent of the OSU poultry farm for two years and then spent seven years on the faculty at Massachusetts University before joining the K-State poultry staff in 1921. He became head of the poultry department in 1923 and served in this capacity until 1954. He retired in 1960.

Although his major interests in poultry were in administration and teaching, Payne did some important early research on reproduction and nesting habits of domestic fowl. He is author or co-author of three books and numerous bulletins, circulars and technical articles.

Payne organized the first baby chick show held in America, and took the initiative in organizing the Kansas Poultry Improvement Association in 1924 and the Kansas Poultry Industry Council in 1939. Under his leadership, KSU developed one of the highly respected poultry departments in the nation. His interest in books on poultry husbandry and science led to the establishment of one of the outstanding libraries on the subject at KSU.

## Proposed Pool With Roof

A bond election will be watched with extra interest in the G&G area in August will be in Riley county, which will consider spending \$400,000 for bonds to build this proposed swimming pool.

The proposed pool would have a movable roof, and the bond issue is noteworthy because it is county-wide. Counties in Kansas have not normally been in the swimming pool business, with municipalities operating nearly all the public pools. The Kansas League of Municipalities said the only county swimming pool it could confirm in the state was in Greeley county (Leoti).

The reaction to county-wide bonds for a pool located in Manhattan is expected to be a severe test for rural voters who, at least in other parts of the G&G area, have become increasingly resistant to local government spending and are often critical of facilities which normally are constructed in larger population centers.

County authorities are hopeful, however, that rural voters will judge the bond issue without prejudice. There is some precedent for this hope in Riley county. There is a county-wide park committee representing each town in the county plus rural areas, organized three years ago. Park development plans for 17 locations in the county have been studied, and the county has title to park areas in Riley, Leonardville and Ogden. The county has constructed tennis courts at Ogden and built restrooms in Riley, Leonardville and Randolph.

The major county role in recreation, has been at Ci-Co Park in Manhattan, a complex jointly owned by Riley county, the city

of Manhattan, and the Manhattan school district. The 97-acre area contains a football field, multi-diamond baseball complex, and fairgrounds and buildings. The park has been developed in the past six years and is often cited as a model of recreational planning and cooperation between governmental units. The county owns about 60% of the land area, the three units have been equally sharing costs on roads, grading, sewers, walkways, water, lights and parking.

Proposed use of the pool includes blocking time for Riley county and Blue Valley school districts as well as both public and Catholic schools in Manhattan. The Manhattan district includes the Ogden schools as well as several rural elementary schools.

The proposed pool is designed to function basically as an outdoor pool but the movable roof can be used to provide an indoor pool in winter, as well as wind and rain protection in the summer.

Cost of the pool is estimated at \$600,000, but federal funds of \$200,000 will be available from the Bureau of Outdoor Recreation. The \$400,000 in county bonds would cost the taxpayer 75 cents per 1000 in valuation annually for 10 years. Backers of the bond issue have interpreted this rate to mean a \$3 per year cost on an average house and 4c per acre on typical farm ground.

Observers have developed few opinions as to the reaction to the bonds in Manhattan as well as the rest of Riley county. The movable roof feature, of course, has attracted attention, and Ci-Co Park itself appears to draw favor from Riley countyans who admire its general organization. Riley county's population is 35,000 and Manhattan's is 25,000.

**Dissatisfied With Look At Ourselves**

Someone said, "I would rather be able to appreciate the things I cannot have, than to have things I cannot appreciate."

This statement deserves serious thought today. We have the highest employment ever in the United States — 75 million — the highest wages ever — yet, the whole emphasis seems to be on the percent who are unemployed.

We have a poverty program to help the unskilled, the untrained, the uneducated — then we raise minimum wages, set maximum hours, specify working conditions in such a manner that you can't afford to hire the

ones who most need your help. We don't allow children to work — so we have a delinquent generation — we made it so.

At Davis Memorial Goodwill Industries in Washington, D.C., an increase in the minimum wage led to the lay off of 38 handicapped workers. Even a charitable organization, if it wants to stay alive to help anyone, has to keep its outgo in line with income.

We have a boom — the greatest period of prosperity ever — except for farmers, but we're spending money at the national level to prime the pump. We insist on having some inflation — fooling people into thinking they are prosperous, destroying the equities of the elderly who saved for their old days.

Inflation is the curse of all the developing nations we are trying to help. Yet, we insist on it here.

Let me read you a quote and I dare you to tell me who said it. "If the nation is living within its income its credit is good. If in some crisis it lives beyond its income for a year or two it can usually borrow temporarily on reasonable terms. But if, like the spendthrift, it throws discretion to the winds, is willing to make no sacrifice at all in spending, extends its taxing up

to the limit of the people's power to pay, and continues to pile up deficits, it is on the road to bankruptcy." That statement was made by Franklin Delano Roosevelt. Today the White House approves of wage increases but frowns on increases in costs of products made by higher wages.

We've spent the next several years' earning power already for cars, television sets, and luxuries that won't last that long. I read a notice recently that one mail order firm has more than \$2½ billion in accounts receivable.

Each year we get new television shows for the season after a super build-up. Most, now, not only have sight and sound, but they smell. Very few are wholesome and inspiring — many are violent, vulgar, immoral, emphasizing the worst of human nature.

In 1903 Teddy Roosevelt, in a Labor Day Address said "No man needs sympathy because he had to work. Far and away the best prize that life offers is the chance to work hard at work worth doing." What is the government attitude toward work today? Turn on your television and you hear:

Did you get your unemployment check?

Are your Social Security checks reaching you?

Are you receiving medicare benefits you are entitled to?

Now I am not opposed to any of these programs, but I am concerned about the emphasis

they receive. Just once I'd like to hear the President of the United States say on a nation-wide telecast that hard work, thrift, sacrifice, discipline, respect for others, and a belief in our Creator helped make this nation great.

We're so concerned about rights — and not much about responsibilities. The same government asks you to repeal right to work laws. During the transportation strike in New York City, the leader of the strike, on television tore up a court order and ridiculed the judge. What was done about it? It used to be that when you wanted something, you worked to earn it; now you stage a riot to get it given to you at someone else's expense.

We oppose raising local taxes but we accept increasing Federal taxes, only part of which can ever come back, and with it may come government control on our institutions.

We change our laws to protect the criminal. We handicap our law enforcement people.

When an officer shoots a thief robbing a store — we howl about the shooting instead of praising the officer for doing his duty.

We tolerate hate mongers who would destroy the one nation on earth that is trying to help all the others find peace and prosperity.

We permit the same Anti-American to destroy property worth millions of dollars and tax the good citizens to repair the damages.

Unruly students and a revolt against discipline are making it difficult to hire school teachers.

This nation is great because it has hybrid vigor. It is made up of minorities who worked and saved to pull themselves up the economic and social ladders.

There is no free lunch and it is time our leaders said so. It is time we stopped paying bonuses for illegitimate children, close our college doors to the hippies and LSD travelers, enforce our laws and punish the

Of course, we haven't treated everyone fairly. What nation has? But we came nearer to it during the last half century

than any other nation on earth. Men, their wives, and families of yesterday, made great sacrifices to build and encourage institutions that serve today's generation. They didn't figure the world owed them a living — they earned their way — and much of it was tough going.

How much of that spirit is left?

Miles Standish commanded that he who did not work would not eat. Perhaps a return to that philosophy might be good for all of us.

We tell people today that their income is under \$3000, they are in the poverty class — and something must be done about it. Suppose you and I passed a beggar on the street each day and you gave him a dollar, but I never gave him anything. One day we pass, you don't give him the dollar he expects. Who would he be angry with — you or me?

Someone once said "No one would ever have crossed the ocean in a sailing ship if he'd have gotten off it during a storm."

Yet, we tolerate draft card burning, so-called religious leaders who are saying you don't have to obey the laws of the land, screwballs who urge their followers to burn, kill and destroy.

Today's need is for men — "God, give us men. A time like this demands strong minds, great hearts, true faith and steady hands."

Men whom the lust of office does not kill,

Men whom the spoils of office cannot buy,


Men who possess opinions and the will,

Men who love honor, men who cannot lie."

Will there be a tomorrow? Only if we become men of today.





## Add To Funds For Additional Non-Farm Income

Expansion of a loan program to help low-income farmers develop revenue-producing non-farm enterprises on their lands was approved last week by the House Agriculture Committee.

The committee-approved bill, which has been sought by the Johnson administration, would make it possible for a farmer to convert his entire farm to recreation.

Under provisions of the existing program, the FHA has made loans for such things as nine-hole golf courses, cutting and hauling of timber, farm machinery repair shops, small stores and boating facilities.

## Amish Town Gets An Industry

YODER, KANS. — Plans have been announced here for a major new industry in this Amish community of 500 persons.

Liberty Homes of Kansas plans construction of a mobile home plant northwest of here off K96. The plant is expected to employ 75 to 125 persons in full production and have a capacity of up to 35 mobile homes a week.

The facility will be the fifth plant built by Liberty Coach Co. of Indiana. With ground acquisition, the expenditure is expected to approach \$250,000.

Ed Hussey, Goshen, Ind., Liberty Homes president, was said to have chosen Yoder because of the Amish settlement. All Liberty plants have been develop-

ed near Amish or Mennonite areas because Hussey feels the people are skilled hand craftsmen.

Work on the 64-acre site is expected to begin this month.

The announcement was made by Farmer's State Bank of Yoder, financial agent.



### Counties With Ballot Voids

JUNCTION CITY, KANS. — County clerks in Scott, Geary, Harper and Chautauqua Counties report no candidates have filed for the posts of county attorney.

State law does not require a side in the county from which county attorney candidate to reside in the county from which he is elected, but he must move there at the time he takes office.

Election officials said a candidate could get his name on the general election ballot by securing write-in votes equal to 10 percent of the votes cast for his party's gubernatorial nominee in the 1966 general election.

There is no minimum required in the general election and the

candidate receiving the most write-in votes is declared to take winner. He can decline to take the oath of office.

In the event no one is elected by write-in, the district judges in the four counties would fill the vacancies by appointment, if they could find someone willing to serve.

Incumbent county attorneys who have declined to run for re-election are Richard Medley, Junction City, Geary County; Robert Mulch, Scott City, Scott County; Wood Runyan, Harper, Harper County, and Dean Matthews, Sedan, Chautauqua County.


The Harper, Scott and Chautauqua County posts pay \$5,050 a year. The Geary County post pays \$7,038.

County officials said lawyers have declined to run for county attorney because of the low salaries, which are fixed by state law according to the county's population.

Scott County also has one county commission position for which no candidate has filed.

# Why Wheat Fell

Prices of wheat recently fell to the lowest level in several years. This development stirred much discussion and many questions concerning the reasons for the price decline, and the prospects for price improvement.

Several things have contributed to the price weakness. Only a few of them can be discussed here. Some of them have been developing for several years.

**Wheat Program Changed.** Beginning in 1963, the government's wheat program was changed: Over a period of three years, the price-support level was cut from \$2.00 a bushel to \$1.25. The price reduction was offset by direct payments to wheat producers. These payments averaged 68 cents a bushel on the 1966 crop, and about 53 cents for the 1967 crop.

**World Crops Bigger.** World wheat production has increased greatly since 1965, when Russia, China, India, and many other countries had poor crops. In Russia, for example, wheat production jumped from 1.7 billion bushels in 1965 to 2.8 billion bushels in 1966. World wheat production climbed 11 percent. The production of wheat, rice, and other food grains reached a new high in 1967. Prospects for 1968 are generally good. India, our principal export market, has a big wheat crop this year. Consequently, space and the need for U.S. wheat are correspondingly reduced.

**U.S. Supplies Increase.** The United States has more wheat. Stocks on hand July 1 were around 545 million bushels — up from 425 million a year ago. The winter wheat crop was estimated in June at 1,230 million bushels — 2 percent more than last year and 27 percent more than the 5-year 1962-66 average.

Exports of wheat have been slow lately, mostly because of the larger supplies available in other countries. The strike of workers on the St. Lawrence Seaway has blocked that export route, holding up wheat that had been moved into position to go out by the Seaway.

Total exports during the year ending June 30 apparently were around 750 million bushels (wheat plus flour equivalent). This amount is 2 percent more than the exports of the previous year, but 13 percent less than the record exports two years before.

**U.S. Use Holds Steady.** The amount of wheat used in the United States is about the same each year, except for variations in the amount fed to livestock and poultry. We use around 510 million bushels for food, 60 to 70 million bushels for seed. With the lower wheat prices of recent years, the amount used for feed has ranged from about 75 to 150 million bushels.

**1968-69 Outlook.** The U.S. wheat supply for this year may

total about 2.1 billion bushels (old and new) — up 14 percent from a year ago. Total disappearance in this marketing year may decrease from the 1967-68 level because of smaller exports. The carryover a year hence may be near 650 million bushels — up one-fifth from the 1968 figure.

With this supply prospect, some strong new bullish market factors will be required to lift prices much above the price-support loan level of \$1.25 a bushel, the national average.

Orville L. Freeman says.

Freeman said livestock can be fed many foods that cannot be eaten by man, including forage, wastes, and cereal by-products, such as bran from rice.







Bean Screen

Hyacinth beans are natives of the tropics where they are perennials, living from year to year.

In climates that are more rigorous, the plants become annuals — that is, they bloom from seeds sown when soil warms but die when frost arrives.

Even with this change in their habits, hyacinth beans will climb ten feet in a single season.

The leaves are large and three-parted. Flowers usually are reddish-purple but there is a white-flowered variety, rarely seen. The blooms are borne in stiff spikes and are shaped much smaller.

They are followed by edible beans, best picked to eat when

they are young and tender. These beans are widely sold on markets in many tropical countries but most American gardeners have never tasted them.

Because hyacinth beans is such a fast grower, and because the foliage is large; because the bean is not particular as to soil and looks well, it is a good choice for a screen.

While a trellis is best provided for the vine to climb, a temporary screen may be made using stout cord, installed from ground to some support above. This may be placed wherever quick screen is needed.

## Do-It-Yourselfers Can Build Fence

Building a fence is a practical do-it-yourself project. A simple framework of lumber can be built then covered with sturdy tempered hardboard panels or with hardboard siding.

For durability and low-maintenance, treat the lumber framework with a wood preservative and use rust-proof nails.





# K-State Livestock Research Facilities About Rebuilt

In less than ten minutes a disastrous June 8, 1966, storm virtually wiped out animal husbandry research facilities at Kansas State University, Manhattan.

Now more than two years and \$885,000 later, the research program is just beginning to get back on its feet.

Units for swine and sheep research are nearing completion and should be in use by September 1. Bids on the beef nutrition complex were called for July 18, however it will be yet another year before these facilities are built and put into use.

The three complexes — swine, sheep and beef — all are located about two miles northwest of the main campus.

With minor exceptions all facilities incorporated in the complexes merely replace facilities lost in the storm. But the disaster has had one bright spot — the animal science and industry

research program has been started from scratch with the result that the swine, sheep and beef plants are all 1968 models incorporating the latest in convenience, flexibility and labor saving devices.

For instance, all pens in the beef nutrition complex are made of gates so that any rearrangement of space is possible. Further, the gate arrangement will make it possible to clean all lots, using a tractor, without moving the cattle.

All three units incorporate the latest in watering equipment, feed handling and mixing equipment and modern dipping vats.

In the case of the sheep unit, all facilities are incorporated under one roof, consolidating activities which formerly were carried on in several locations.

It was a disheartening inventory that Dr. Ron Good, head of K-State's department of animal science and industry, took the

morning after the June 8, 1966, storm. While the university's livestock was virtually unscathed, there was almost nothing left of facilities for caring for the animals. Losses included the entire sheep unit and most of the beef cattle and swine units. Also lost was the farm superintendent's house, all hay storage units, the top off the purebred beef cattle barn, the farm shop, plus five windmills and five miles of fence. The grain handling and mixing unit was seriously damaged.

"For nearly two months after the disaster our staff was pressed just to feed and water the livestock daily. We hauled 4,500 gallons of water a day for weeks," recalls Good.

Because of the lack of facilities for caring for the animals, much of the livestock was sold off and research program in animal science cut back sharply. Now that new facilities are be-

coming available, animal numbers are being built back up and the discontinued research resumed.

Working closely with animal scientists on the planning and design of the swine, sheep and beef cattle facilities have been staff members in the department of agricultural engineering. The ag engineers have planned for latest waste disposal methods and have designed some of the facilities for extensive tests of waste disposal on concrete, dirt and slatted floors.

The new sheep facilities are all under one roof — a move expected to be a major labor saver. There are quarters for four students, an environmental room where temperature and humidity can be controlled and a laboratory for general use. The one lack is space for hay storage. At present what is left of an old barn will be used. Eventually a hay shed probably will have to be built.

The new swine unit consists, basically of three buildings, a headquarters, a farrowing and

nursery unit and a finishing unit. The headquarters building contains an office, quarters for four students and a laboratory for general use. The finishing and farrowing and nursery units each are built in a box with feed storage areas separating the wings of the building. Slatted floors are used throughout the wastes falling into circulating aerobic pits. K-State plans its first annual swine sale September 26 at which time new facilities will be dedicated and opened to public inspection.

The new beef complex incorporates seven barns and 14 stalls. Among the barns is a handling unit for preparing groups of 50; an environmental barn containing four rooms which temperature and humidity can be controlled; and a headquarters building containing an office, student quarters and a laboratory. The silos will make possible much more intensive research into ensiling forages.





## Disputes Low Insurance Profits

Automobile insurance companies are making exceptional profits, a University of Southern California professor of business administration contended today.

Citing his study of 641 corporations, 18 automobile insurance companies and seven multiple-line insurance companies, Dr. Richard Norgaard of U.S.C. told a Senate antitrust and monopoly subcommittee that the "insurance companies are earning greater risk adjusted rates of profit than 90 percent of all companies in the sample."

"The automobile companies appear to be doing slightly better than the multiple-line companies," he continued.

Norgaard said these findings "are diametrically opposed to those recently reported by the American Insurance Association although the same basic data were used.

"The difference in results came about because of the techniques used to measure and interpret the data," he said.

Norgaard defined rate of profit "as the average annual return including interest, dividends, and security appreciation that the suppliers of capital receive divided by the initial market value of all the firm's securities.

# Demo Candidate Logan Says Phase Out Farm Programs

A plan to phase out government farm programs and increase markets for farm productivity "at no additional cost to the government or consumers" was unveiled by Democrat James K. Logan, Lawrence, in Wichita.

Logan, running for the U.S. Senate nomination, outlined the program before an audience of 60, mostly attorneys.

His plan for wheat and feed grains calls for withdrawal from the International Grains Agreement "as soon as we can be free of it and that we enter no similar price agreement in the future.

"That we eliminate all acreage and production controls.

"That the free market be allowed to set price levels.

"To ease the transition and to prevent losses to farmers from precipitous land value and price declines, direct subsidy payments on a per acre basis should be paid to all owners of cropland devoted to these and competing crops," Logan added.

"The subsidies would be based upon the production histories of the land as determined from existing Agricultural Stabilization and Conservation Service office records, supplemented as necessary to obtain a basis for comparison of land values for agricultural use.

"The level of the subsidies would be determined by the amounts freed from current agricultural appropriation by the change, possibly supplemented by a certificate system," Logan said.

Logan said the intent of his plan is for subsidies to be phased out over a period of years, coinciding with estimated increases in farm productivity.

Subsidy payments would "go to all landowners whose property had a history of grain production" because all such land has been affected by the artificial values created by past pro-

grams, Logan declared.

Farmers not receiving enough help to remain in the farming business should receive additional assistance based upon individual situations "similar to those developed for the urban poor.

"One question in such cases," he adds, "would be whether to assist the individual to drop full time farming.

"These are the marginal producers who must either expand, sell out, or go to part time farming."

Logan contends overall benefits through his plan may be in different proportions, "but should be roughly the same as now realized prices since they are based on production history of the land."

Even though it would appear that market prices may be lower under his plan, Logan maintains that without acreage restrictions the farmer can expand output.

"In fact, only an expanded output can drive prices down."

Logan added that export demand is responsive to price changes and this should provide a net gain almost immediately.

He also said that if the U.S. would not reduce current tariff

barriers and import restrictions "we could use a certificate system similar to the payments now being made by American processors of grain, to put revenue into government's hands to use to pay subsidies to hold up farm income."

"These payments could be variable, and increase if farm prices drop below present levels.

"These costs would be passed on to the consumer, as is now done in the certificate system. Eventually this certificate system of raising funds should be dropped, as world prices come up."

# Pig Crop Up 7%

The number of hogs and pigs on Kansas farms continued to remain well above last year with June 1 numbers totaling 1,737,000 head, 7 percent more than a year earlier, according to the Kansas Livestock Reporting service.

The pig crop for the March-May quarter was 807,000 head compared with 747,000 head last year. Sows farrowing during the quarter totaled 104,000 head, 6 percent more than last year and 8 percent above the 1962-66 average.

A record 7.76 pigs per litter were saved during the March-May quarter compared with 7.62 during the same period a year ago.

Farrowing intentions for the June-August quarter are forecast at 74,000 head, 1 percent above the same period last year.

Prospective farrowings for the September-November quarter are 86,000 head, the same as last year and 23 percent above the 5-year average. With pigs per litter projected on the basis of recent trends, the fall (June-Nov.) pig crop would be 1,224,000 head compared with 1,198,000 in 1967. The 1968 yearly pig crop, including both the spring and fall farrowings in prospect, is 2.6 million head, 4 percent above 1967.

Farmers indicated that 243,000 head of the 1,737,000 hogs and pigs on farms June 1 were being kept for breeding purposes, 7 percent more than a year earlier. The remaining 1,494,000 head on hand were being raised for market purposes, 7 percent more than the previous year.

Market hog numbers in all weight groups were above last year with the exception of those 220 pounds and over which showed a slight decline.

### United States

The nation's pig crop, including both spring and fall litters, is expected to total 91,812,000 head this year, some 319,000 more than in 1967. The spring pig crop of 47,712,000 was down 1 percent from a year ago, but the expected fall crop forecast of 44,100,000 is up 2 percent from a year ago.

### MARION COUNTY LEADS LOSS IN HEAD COUNT

MARION — Marion County has a population loss for the second straight year, altho there seems to be some dispute over the accuracy of the self-enumeration thru countywide assessment systems. The current Marion County population is 15,064 — down 104 from a year ago. Hillsboro, which had a slight gain, is the county's largest town with 2638. Marion's population is 2267 and Peabody has 1419.

### Fishing Records By The Minute

Kansas fishermen keep finding bigger northern pike. The record for the largest pike landed by a state fisherman changed four times in four months, most recently twice in 1 1/2 hours.

The current record is 16 pounds, 9 1/2 ounces, held by Wayne McCabe of Manhattan, fishing at Council Grove reservoir in the Richey Cove. McCabe broke a record held for 1 1/2 hours by Fred Bammes, also of Manhattan, who caught a larger one than Kenneth Brown, Manhattan again, had caught on June 18. At that time Brown broke his own record from February 15.

# Feds Good At The Money Business

Critics of the Postoffice Department and other areas of the federal budget may not think the national government is run much like a good business, but there's one business Washington is rather good at. It's the money business.

Since it replaced silver with copper and nickel in hard currency, the federal government has been raking in huge profits in making coins.

This profit, called seigniorage, shot into the hundreds of millions of dollars the last three

years. It is expected to exceed \$200 million in the current year.

Seigniorage is the difference between the face value of a coin and the cost of the metal from which it is made.

Metal in a quarter, for example, now costs the Treasury de-

partment about one cent but the coin goes on the books as 25 cents, thus yielding a 24-cent profit.

When the Treasury was working overtime to produce coins during a shortage a year ago, the profit ran to \$334 million. The coin shortage has since eased, but the profits are still considerable, even on smaller production.

The windfall profits began with the coinage act of 1965, which took all silver from dimes and quarters and reduced the silver content of the half dollar from 90 percent to 40 percent.

Here's how the profits are credited to the government:

The Treasury turns the coins over to the Federal Reserve System to place in general circulation thru the banking system.

The Federal Reserve credits the Treasury's bank accounts

## Washington Co. Resigns Itself To Revalue Program

WASHINGTON, Ks. — Washington County has apparently resigned itself to a countywide property reappraisal. The county commissioners had not ordered a reevaluation program in line with the state-required program that all property must be reappraised at 30 percent of actual value, but had hoped that a reassessment program in the early 1950's could be meshed with current state requirements.

Officials of the Kansas Property Valuation department have turned that premise down, saying that formulas used and required figures were not down on paper as required by law.

# 2¢ More For Certificates

A two-cent increase per bushel for about 40 percent of a farmer's allotted wheat crop has been announced by the Department of Agriculture.

Wheat certificate payments of \$1.38 a bushel, compared to \$1.36 last year, will be made to farmer's on the basis of their share

of the total wheat used domestically. The payments are in addition to the average price support of \$1.25 a bushel.

The program is designed to raise the price the farmer receives for wheat used domestically to full parity. The two-cent increase reflects a boost in this

year's wheat parity, \$2.63 a bushel on July 1, compared with \$2.61 a year earlier.

The payments are financed by flour millers and other users of wheat who buy certificates at 75 cents a bushel to cover grain processed for domestic food.



# Land Values Up 37% In Five Years

Want to buy some farmland at \$7750 an acre? No, that's not land adjacent to a city bought for suburban development but real cropland. It's a typical price paid in California for avocado orchard land and must be about as valuable as land can be in the agricultural line.

That's one of the small facts gathered from "Farm Real Estate Market Developments," a recent publication of USDA.

The report says that from 1962 to 1967 the average dollar value of farm real estate rose 37%, with Kansas up 34% in that time.

Farmland values increased last year, despite the fact that credit was tighter and interest rates higher.

The report says that farmers themselves are the major buyers of farms, mostly for expansion. Only 7% of all farms sold in 1967 went to absentee owners.

The government data shows that turnover in land is slow. Less than 3% of the farmland is on the market in a given year. And, since most land is purchased by farmers, one explanation for the increase in price is that farmers bid up prices on the rare occasion when nearby land is available.

In the study for the year ended in March 1967, there were 110,700 voluntary and estate sales of farmland in the U.S. Of these, 43% were in tracts smaller than 100 acres while only 6% were of tracts of 500 acres or more.

Farm foreclosures are almost non-existent. Only two out of 2500 farms moved were foreclosed. In the depression the rate figured 95 farms out of 2500. Now, of course, with land prices rising, most farms will be worth more than the mort-

gage. Therefore, if the owner has found he can't make it, he can sell, pay off the mortgage and usually have a little left of his original investment.

Land values vary by region, by types, such as bottom cornland or pasture, and whether it is irrigated or not.

In Nebraska, for instance, the market value on irrigated land was roughly twice that of non-irrigated and increasing in value at twice the rate of pastureland.

On the other hand, pastureland in Texas has gone up in value about 27% since 1964, while irrigated farms have changed only slightly. The reason given is that water is getting harder to get in Texas, wells must be dug deeper and larger power units installed. These added costs plus water uncertainty have tended to limit the increase in value on irrigated land.

One agricultural economist who has commented in the government's land price report is L. H. Simerl at the University of Illinois, Urbana.

"Some people 'blame' the rise in land prices on farmers' efforts to get more land to increase their income," Simerl said. "While there is some truth in this argument, a more fundamental factor is that rising prices for land reflect its competitive value as an investment.

"For many years," he continued, "returns on farmland have been comparable to those realized from corporation stocks, considering both yearly return and increase in market value. Farmland has been a far, far better investment than bonds of any kind or savings accounts.

"We do not expect prices for farmland to rise continuously. There surely will be periods of

decline when the stock market goes down. But the long-time trend surely will be upward.

"The increase in the value of farmland usually is ignored when farm income is calculated and published. The increase in U.S. land value in 1967 was \$17,700,000,000, according to USDA calculations. Realized net income for the year was reported at \$14,500,000,000.

"A dollar increase in land value is better for many people than a dollar of cash income. The increase in land values will be taxable as capital gains — taxed at no more than half the rates applying to current operating income. No tax is paid if the land is transferred to heirs."

On the question, "Will farmland pay for itself at these high prices?" Simerl made the following comment:

"Why should farmland pay for itself, when the buyer borrows to buy it? We don't expect to be able to borrow money to buy a bond and have the interest pay for the bond. Nor do we expect to borrow from a bank, buy corporate stocks, and wait for the dividends to pay the interest and principal on the bank loans."

## Farm Points In Undelivered Talk By Humphrey

Vice-President Hubert H. Humphrey has promised that the American farmer would play a vital new role in his administration if he is elected President in November.

The vice-president outlined his program to give America's farmers "the same economic chance that others in our econo-

my enjoy."

Expanding on his "open presidency" idea, he suggested that "people with a specific agriculture background" be located at "critical points throughout the government."

The vice-president's proposals were prepared for delivery at Rural America Day in Salina. The text of his major farm pronouncement was released as a campaign policy statement when the trip, which was to take him to Kansas and Missouri, was canceled at the direction of his personal physician, Dr. Edgar Berman.

Among other steps the vice-president outlined "in order to take the case for agriculture to the American people," was a "sizeable increase in the lending authority of the Farmers Home administration to ease the farm credit situation.

He promised that he would "fight for federal tax reform to remove artificial incentives for the movement of non-farmers into agriculture," who he said now enjoy an unfair tax write-off which gives them an advantage compared to independent farmers.

The vice-president promised that he would push for basic legislation calling for strategic reserves of major farm commodities, stronger farm cooperatives, and new export markets for our farm commodities.

"America has an obligation to escalate the war on hunger," the vice-president said, urging food stamp and commodity distribution programs in "every county where severe problems of hunger exist."

The vice-president urged "new concepts in farm bargaining power" which 4,447,943 farmers need and "they should have the right and opportunity to use it," he said.

# Bigger Crop Year Despite Acreage Cut

The nation's farmers may set a crop production record this year, despite the fact that they planted 4% fewer acres than in 1967.

Because of generally favorable weather to date, crop yields could offset the planting cuts. But the prospects of bumper harvests are pushing prices of the various grain crops down. Wheat price, for example, is the lowest in 26 years.

The government's first estimate of total crop production will be issued in August.

A consensus of experts is that farm production could at least match and possibly top last year's record of 116% of the 1957-59 average.

The weather during the balance of the growing and harvesting seasons will determine the size of the crops. But the experts agree that weather so far has given farmers a good

chance of reaping record production.

This year, 305 million acres were seeded to the nation's 59 leading crops, down from 316 million in 1967. The main acreage cuts came in wheat (down 8% from 1967), where the government slashed farm program allotments, and in corn (down 8%) and sorghums (off 12%), where the Government encouraged idling of feed grain acreage by sweetening its diversion program incentives.

Wheat, oats, and soybeans, however, promise to give this year's crop total its biggest boost. The three grains probably will exceed their 1967 totals by enough to match anticipated declines in corn and sorghum production. Two other major acreage crops, cotton and hay, are expected to register gains from last year.


Estimates of fruit and vegetable production vary widely. The citrus crop harvested this year is off sharply from 1967, while peaches, pears, and some spring vegetables are higher.

## Kansas FLBA Loans Hit \$55.9 Million

WICHITA — The 24 Federal Land Bank Associations in Kansas completed the fiscal year, June 30, lending over \$55.9 million in long-term Federal Land Bank loans to farmers and ranchers of the state. This represented 2310 loans made by Kansas associations.

William G. Plested Jr., president of The Federal Land Bank of Wichita, stated that these 24 associations and 36 additional associations in Colorado, Oklahoma and New Mexico had increased their volume of lending in the four-state district during the past fiscal year over \$24 million.

The Land Bank president said

that 4629 loans were made in the district totaling \$124,380,000. This lending and prior loans represent an unpaid balance of \$523.8 million for the borrowers in the four states.

Federal land bank associations are local farmer-owned cooperative lending organizations which Federal Land Bank loans are made and serviced.

The nationwide Land Bank system of 12 banks and over 100 associations has chosen for its second half-century theme — "Providing America's Farmers with the Services of a Land Bank."

The 60 Federal land bank associations are serving approximately 33,000 farmers and ranchers in the four-state district.



## Salt Creek Watershed Project Still In Congressional Waiting Line

Full realization of the Upper and Lower Salt Creek watershed project in Lincoln, Mitchell and Ottawa counties hopefully isn't far off.

The Public Works committee of the U.S. House of Representatives has given the green light to the Upper work plan.

The Lower work plan has been approved by the Agriculture committee of the House, but must yet be voted upon.

The watershed district, though divided Upper and Lower, actually is a single district.

Public Law 566 provides that single watershed projects may not exceed 250,000 acres in size.

The Upper and Lower combined represent 293,945 acres — hence the district was divided to meet legal requirements.

"Although the Upper and Lower watershed projects have been approved by Congressional committee action, authorization of funds and technical assistance by the Administration is not expected for at least the remainder of the present administration," said Leslie Johnson, assistant state conservationist.

Johnson said this is due to Ad-

ministration-Congressional disagreement over the provision of the Watershed Protection and Flood Prevention Act of 1954 (Public Law 566), that each project must be approved by the House Committee on agriculture.

Part of the hurdle has been cleared.

Johnson said, in addition, that if a project plan includes a single structure (dam) costing more than \$250,000, or has a capacity of more than 4000 acre-feet, it must be approved by the House and Senate committee on Public Works.

The Upper watershed plan calls for one floodwater retarding reservoir with a capacity of 5176 acre-feet.

The total work plan calls for 44 flood control structures, which includes the aforementioned sizable reservoir.

Proponents of the proposed flood control measures contend flood losses in the Salt Creek area average about \$276,400 annually.

Congressman Bob Dole, who supports the watershed project, said: "Without federal assistance the full potential of the Salt Creek croplands cannot be realized."

Federal funds for the Upper

project are estimated at \$3,691,000, with the local cost \$1,786,400 for a total expenditure of \$5,477,400.

In the Lower project, federal funds will amount to \$618,800, with \$457,500 local for a total of \$1,076,300.

There would be 39 dams in the Upper project and five in the Lower.

Watershed acreage above the dams in the Upper district is 201,990, while it is estimated there would be 91,955 acres above dams in the Lower district.

Total reservoir capacity in the Upper District would be 32,938 acre-feet. There would be 5588 acre-feet of water in reservoirs in the Lower district.

About 354 farmers are involved in the Upper district, and an estimated 160 in the Lower.

Officers of the joint watershed district are: W. Harland Coover, Barnard, president; C. N. Bacon, Minneapolis, vice-president; and Hary Gabelmann, Lincoln, treasurer.

Other officials are Elmer F. Gaddis and Carl Cunningham, Barnard; Cliff Campbell, Beloit; A. L. VanAmburg, Hunter; Clyde E. Kelly, Ada; Jack Shaffer and Evan Corman, Minneapolis; and Cyril McBride, Beverly.




## Green Bean Crop

When Carl Compton talks about his bean crop, he doesn't mean soybeans. He means green beans. Compton of Lamar, Mo., between Kansas City and Joplin, so far is satisfied with acreage conversion he started three years ago which has seen him put 140 acres into green bean production.

Compton figures the beans are a high-risk crop, but his return per acre is about \$200. Seed cost is about \$40 per acre.

Moreover, Compton had no sooner had 400 tons of beans harvested off his acreage than he replanted it to a fall crop of green beans. They'll be ripe about the middle of September. The crop is harvested by mechanical pickers operated by a crew of the Stilwell Canning Co. of Stilwell, Okla., which handles Compton's crop.


