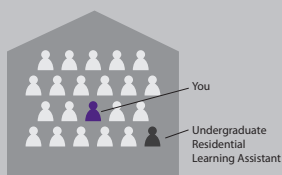
# Residential CAT Communities

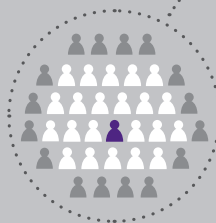
Live in a popular, on-campus residence hall with your CAT Community classmates, an Undergraduate Residential Learning Assistant, and other K-State students.

#### In a Residential CAT Community, you will:

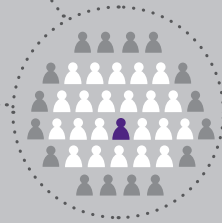
- Take two general education courses and a one-hour connections course.
