












#### Introducing ....

#### K-State's College Union

A dream of 25 years will be realized when the K-State College Union is completed in Mid-October of 1955. 4-H'ers especially will be proud, because a room in that Union which they furnished will be completed exclusively for them as their central and official headquarters.

Ground-breaking ceremonies on April 30, 1953, officially began the construction of the massive structure with limestone and glass exterior, but the Union's life story began long before this. In 1936 the first Union Planning Commission was organized, two years after which the students approved a fee to finance the proposed Union. Students since 1941 have paid \$5.00, later raised to \$7.50, per semester as student union fees. The name "Union" implies the unity with which students have helped toward their common goal.

Bids were taken in 1953, and \$1,650,000 by O.D. Milligan Construction Company was approved. Construction began shortly afterward.

Located in the basement will be a recreation and game room with craft rooms, bowling alley, table tennis, and billiards. The "heart of the Union" on first floor will include a general lounge, snack bar, cafeteria, browsing library, and lecture hall. The second floor will be the activities floor with rooms for meetings and will contain the ballroom and banquet room.

The southeast wing in particular will be the student activities area and will contain office and work space for student organizations. It is in this section that 4-H'ers, then, will have a personal interest.

Collegiate members, along with all past, present, future K-Staters, eagerly await the Union's grand opening!


#### Round-up!

Since its beginning in 1948, the program has expanded until 116 U.S. delegates went abroad this last year while nearly 151 exchangees from other countries came to the U.S. Making a total of 510 I.F. Y.E. from the U.S. and 497 exchangees coming here since 1948. Returned delegates share their experiences with clubs and organizations in their own county and state. Approximately 25,000 talks have been given to a total audience of two and a half million people.

Rock Springs Ranch is the favorite camp site for 4-H'ers from all over Kansas. Located near Junction City, the camp provides facilities for swimming, horseback riding, hiking, handicraft classes and many other recreational and educational activities. The Ranch is used by church groups and other organizations when 4-H'ers are not there for health, junior leadership, conservation, music, and county camps.



Instructions in various sports, such as swimming and target shooting, is offered. The spirit of fellowship prevails as club members exchange ideas and discuss their problems with each other and with the visiting I. F. Y. E. delegates.





# Off To Chicago---National 4-H Congress

On November 28th of last year, thirty-five excited 4-H Club members and eight adult leaders met at the Union Station in Kansas City to travel together to Chicago to be Kansas' delegates at the annual National 4-H Club Congress. Delegates to the Congress included the state and national champions, Rock Island and Santa Fe trip winners.

They attended banquets, luncheons, and breakfasts with tops in entertainment. At group meetings they had opportunities of meeting with more than 2,000 individuals from over the United States as well as people from foreign countries. These meetings gave the young people new ideas and inspiration for helping their own communities.











#### National

SHIRLEY SUDERMAN of French Creek Valley 4-H Club, Marion County, is state individual recreation champion. Shirley is 19 years old, has been a club member for II years. Shirley has been state leadership champion and has an outstanding project program in all phases of projects. She was a trip winner to National 4-H Camp in Washington, D.C. in 1954. She has done a great deal of recreational activity, along with working at showers and private parties at school, church socials and retreats, 4-H club meetings, orphanage, country 4-H camp, county Who's Who and for the Farm Bureau.

TED PATTERSON, a winner of community relations activity, has been a member of the Richland Rustlers 4-H club for 8 years. Ted's activity in community relations has included promotional talks which have been given 36 times to a variety of groups. He has worked on the citizenship committee by helping get out the vote in his township, worked on community grounds, on county buildings, and worked as a junior leader.

BARBARA WENGER, frozen foods champion, lives in Brown county. Barbara has been a club member for 7 years in the Modern Sunflower Club. She has carried food preservation for the past 3 years, doing all the processing and packing of meats, vegetables, fruits, and frozen meals. Barbara made 79 exhibits plus information about freezing by giving 30 demonstrations on frozen foods, freezing sandwiches, "Quicke" freezer meals, packaging meat for locker, and dairy product freezer meals. One of her demonstrations was given on a television show.

DAVID REIDA of the Zenda Zoomers 4-H club in Kingman county is home grounds beautification champion. He has been in 4-H club work for 9 years is now 17 years old. He has completed a total of 50 projects. Two years ago, the Reida family moved to a rundown farm, he put up new gates, tore down old chicken house, corral fences, repaired and painted the barn, planted buffalo grass, planted some blue grass and made a picnic table and planted shrubs to replace those killed by winter.

CAROLINE KANNING of Everest, Kansas is clothing champion. She is 18 years old, has been a member of the Old Huron Busy Bees 4-H club for 8 years. Caroline has made a total of 123 garments. Discussing the clothing project, she said, "After planning my ward-robe for one year, Irealized why mother had refused getting me some clothes I once wanted. Mother gave me help and advice on my clothing plan but I did most of it myself. I picked my dress patterns and bought material like the pattern pictured.

ROBERT LEWIS of Larned, Pawnee county, is 4-H poultry champion. Robert has been in 4-H club work 7 years as a member of the Tiny Tiolers club. He has had 5 years of poultry, his projects totaling I, 47I chickens and 649 laying hens during that time. Robert has shown pens of poultry and his baby beef at the State Fair since 1950. He has been active in demonstrations and judging teams, but his major interest has been poultry. He has made poultry pay as well as being an interesting project.

JOAN EUBANK of Pratt county is public speaking winner. Joan is 17 years old and has been a member of the Richland Rustlers 4-H club for 8 years. In 1953, she was state champion in citizenship and in 1954, received a trip to the State 4-H camp in Georgia. Her club has been very active in the citizenship program, and Joan has given a total of 34 talks locally and made 6 radio appearances, given three promotional talks in three years of work in the promotional activity.







#### Champions

ROBERT REES of Montgomery county, winner in the farm and home electric program said "When we moved to the farm, we had only a very small, poor electric lighting installation. I had heard about farm and home electric activities so I thought it would be good for me to learn something because we had to start all over from the beginning. Robert helped to plan and prepare an electrical booth at the county fair, nine public presentation to the county farm and home electric meetings, led discussions and gave demonstrations on electric motors, and was awarded a trip to Danforth Camp in 1953.

GERALDINE FRITZ, Jefferson county, health individual champion. She is 17 years old, has been a member of the Grantville 4-H club for 7 years. One of the bigest projects that Geraldine and her club undertook was to contribute to a nurse's scholarship. She worked as a committee chairman to help complete this \$300 scholarship for a girl in the community. The other big project was a milk survey and questionnaire emphaizing the use and importance of pasteurizing milk.

DAVID NUTTLE, ElDorado, Kansas, is the general crop champion. He is 18 years old and lived on a farm in Butler county. He has been a member of the Vanora Vigils 4-H club for 8 years. He found it necessary to increase his crop acreage to take care of his rapidly growing livestock program. David paid one-half of his crop as rent but was still able to make a fair profit on all his crops except corn.

LEDA FAYE VERNON, 18 years old, fron Lyon county, is achievement winner, Leda has been a club member for 12 years belonging to the 20th Centry 4-H club. She has given 36 demonstrations, and participated in 7 county judging contests and 7 state contests. She showed the grand champion sheep at the Topeka Free Fair in 1954. She has given 62 talks before local and county groups and 16 before other groups. She has also made four radio appearances and written 44 stories concerning 4-H club work.

JAMES SMITH, soil conservation winner, says of his project "I have been farming on a farm where I have lived all my life. This farm was bought by my grandfather in 1918. In future years, I intend to get the whole farm under soil conservation practices and increase its size. James is 19 years old, has been a member of the Burlingame 4-H club in Osage county for 8 years. He is a member of the watershed committee of the Switzler Creek pilot watershed, and sole operator of the 440 acre farm.

LOUISE OTTAWAY is entomology champion. Louise is 17 years old, from Sedgwick county, and a member of the Goddard 4-H club for 8 years. She has been enrolled for 6 years in the entomology activity. She has given five demonstrations on entomology such as collecting, mounting, and identification of beneficial and harmful insects. Louise has a large and extensive collection of the insects she has found and mounted. She has served as assistant entomology leader for her club.

ROY JONS is the boys project achievement winner for 1954. Roy has been a member of the Glenwood 4-H club in Leavenworth county for ten years. Roy's club work has had a significant effect on farm and home practices in the Jons family. In his wood work and dairy project, he built a milkhouse and remodeled a horse barn into a grade A dairy barn. He also built a complete set of cabinets in the kitchen and built furniture. He took charge of the mechanical work on the farm as a result of his tractor maintenance and farm and home electric experience.



#### Camp Miniwanca

MICHIGAN CAMP TRAINS YOUTH IN FOUR-FOLD DEVELOPMENT

Six 4-H Club members of Kansas were awarded scholarships for a two week camping session at Camp Miniwanca near Shelby, Michigan. Located on the sand dunes of Lake Michigan, this American Youth Foundation leadership camp stresses the importance of a wellbalanced development -- physical, mental, social, and religious, in attaining leadership.

Miniwanca, meaning Many Waters, is a camp of action! Campers greet the new day at 6:30 in the morning with flag raising, limbering-up exercises and a dip in the lake, all in rapid succession. 




## Award Winners








#### Barber






#### Butler


#### Chase






# Chautauqua


#### Cloud




























# Douglas





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




### Finney




































### Johnson




















#### Morris














### Pottawatomie







Their projects. This year Riley County 4-H Clubs sponsored Alan Phillips as an














#### Saline














# Trego


#### Thomas



contest. Schools held during the year were a demonstration school and a fitting and showing school for the livestock projects. The achievement party was attended by 500 4-H'ers and parents.








# Washington









Denton and Joe Armstrong, and home demonstration agent, Mary Meek, directed the 4-H program.




## Wyandotte
