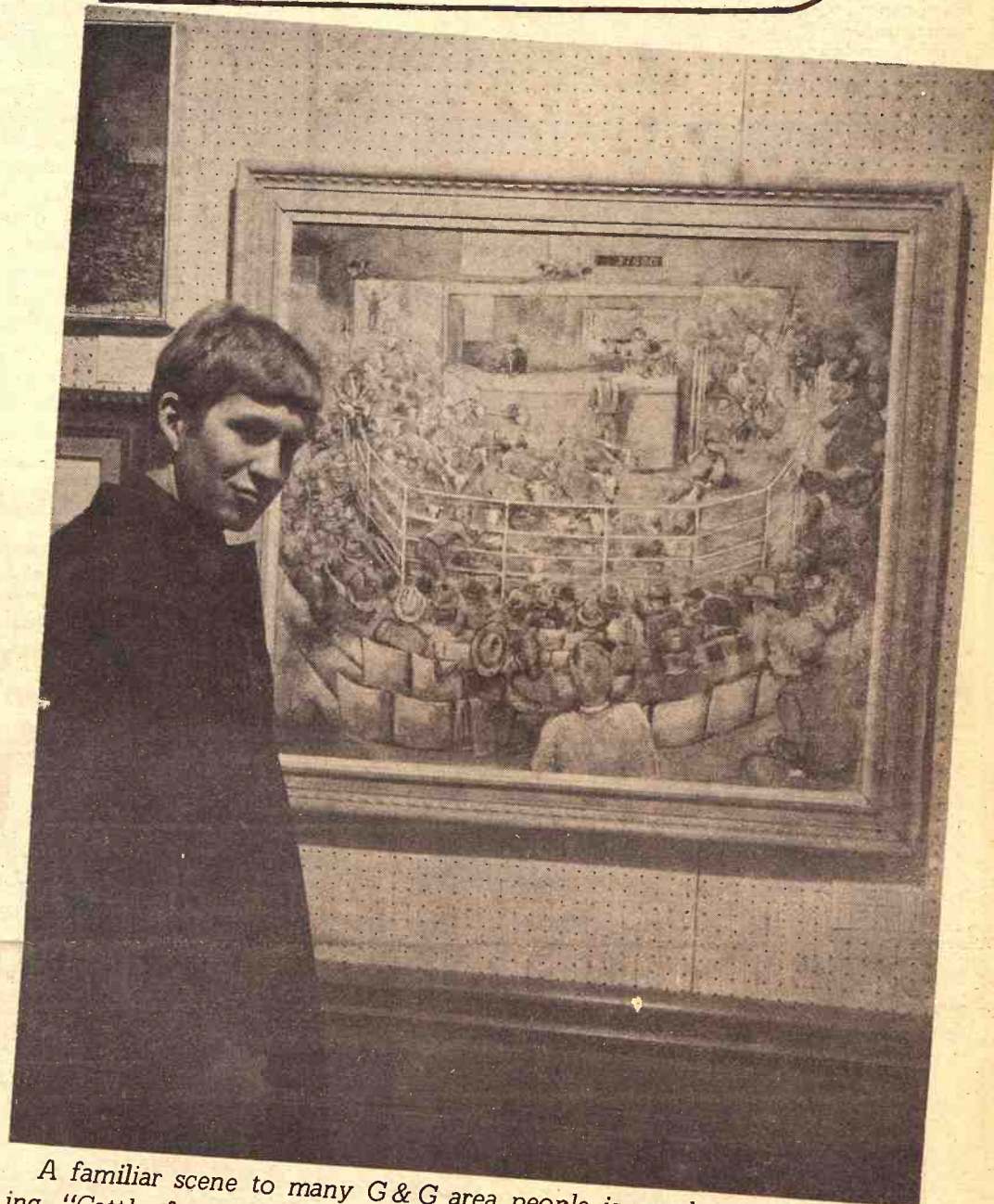
The 16th annual exhibition of amateur art on display at Kansas State University represents the best from seven district exhibits, and includes work from many G & G area men and women.

# Corn Rootworm May Be Problem For '69 Crop

Since 1967 and 1968 were both considered rather heavy corn rootworm years in Kansas, there likely will be problems with this insect pest again in 1969, predicts Dr. H. Leroy

All corn producing areas in the state are subject to the problem with the possible exceptions of extreme southeast Kansas, extreme southwest areas where the Western corn rootworm is just getting started, and irrigated sections in the south-central portion of the state.

Rootworms cause the greatest problem in areas where continuous corn prevails as the cropping system. This means that north-central and northeast sections of Kansas usually ex-

perience the most serious problems.

Irrigation has also encouraged continuous corn production for forage and grain. However, having available moisture when needed can sometimes offset rootworm injury because of the rapid root regeneration, Brooks points out.

The corn rootworm overwinters in the soil as eggs which are invisible to the eye. So the only sure way to determine the presence of this pest is to observe the beetles while they feed on the corn plants during the previous summer growing season.

Producers in areas where there are known infestations of the corn rootworm often apply chemicals as a preventive measure. The K-State entomologist believes that as much as 75 to 80 percent of the continuous corn land in Kansas is given such treatment at planting time. Material costs for such a precaution will run from \$2.25 to \$3 per acre, Brooks estimates.

Western corn rootworm damage was first identified in Kansas in 1945, and became an economic threat in the early 1950's. There was a serious outbreak in the early 1960's, but the problem subsided in 1964 and 1965.

The rootworm threat has been on a general upward trend since that time.

In the early 1960's rootworm had economic implications in about 26 north central and northeast Kansas counties. Now a threat exists in 75 to 80 counties. On a statewide basis, rootworm damage probably does not exceed 5 percent, Brooks says, but in heavily infested areas the loss can run as high as complete destruction.

Rotation is still a very effective method of preventing rootworm infestation, since the majority of the adult beetles deposit their eggs in corn fields. When another crop, such as soybeans or grain sorghum, is substituted the following year, infestations will not materialize since the larvae only survive on corn roots.

If continuous corn is considered a necessary practice, then chemicals must be used as a control measure. Only granular materials are recommended in Kansas, and placement of the insecticide is very important. The most effective technique is to place a 5-7 inch band of insecticide in front of the corn planter press wheel so that the granules are lightly incorporated in the top 1/4" of soil.

"One hundred percent control is never obtained and unsatisfactory control even with the best chemicals and under the best of application conditions can, and sometimes does occur," Brooks points out. "These are the reasons why methods of application, rates, and choice of materials are very important."

Resistance to the chlorinated hydrocarbons — aldrin and heptachlor — has now spread over most areas of the state. Producers should not use these materials where this insect is a problem in continuous corn.

Aldrin and heptachlor still have a place in control of other first year corn and in fields with soil insects, particularly with a chronic history of worm or cutworm problems. In some "rare" cases, both a chlorinated hydrocarbon insecticide and a rootworm insecticide may be needed.

Recent K-State tests also show that diazinon may not prove effective in fields with recent history of heavy rootworm populations. Chemicals that do show varying degrees of control include Bux Ten, fonate, Phorate (Thimet), and Dasanit. County Extension and cultural agents have detailed information about application rates.

Kansas research indicates that planting time applications are still more reliable than applications after the corn plants have emerged. Post planting applications usually give excellent control if moisture is abundant during and immediately after the time application is expected if the soil is dry are made. But poor control is this time.

## Buzzing At Sawmill

More than a half-million board feet of lumber are sold each year from one of the few full-time sawmill operations in the G&G area, near Westphalia in Anderson County.

Owner Delphus Eichmann supervises a 3-employee operation that saws elm, sycamore, hackberry and oak, much of it for use in building barns. Other lumber goes for crating, some is taken by a wood products company in Topeka, a minor bit of walnut and cedar is used by a trophy-making firm in Osawatomie.

Eichmann is the son of a German immigrant who started a small sawmill operation on 140 acres near Westphalia at the turn of the century.

# Uncertain Future For Soybeans

Soybeans have been the miracle crop of mid-century U.S. agriculture. Fifty years ago, very few farmers had even

heard of soybeans. Today, soybeans rank a close second to corn as a cash crop for U.S. farmers. Soybean sales now bring farmers about \$2.5 billion a year.

At the present time, Government programs affect soybean prices in three ways: (1) There are price-support loans at \$2.50 a bushel. (2) Some exports of soybean oil are heavily subsidized. (3) There are indirect acreage restrictions on soybeans (soil-depleting crops) in the wheat and feed-grain programs.

On September 1, 1968, there were 127 million bushels of soybeans under price support — five times as much as two years before. By next September, the amount under support will be around 275 million bushels. The Government will then have public funds totaling around \$750 million tied in excess stocks of soybeans. Many people believe that this money could be used to better advantage in other public programs.

Proposals. Two changes have been suggested: (1) The price-support level could be reduced, or (2) acreage restrictions could be imposed. Either or both might be adopted.

There is no easy solution to the soybean problem. Reducing the price-support level would help to increase the sales of soybeans and products made from them will not bring a large and rapid increase in sales. Thus, there may be pressure to impose acreage restrictions as well as to reduce the price-support level. By contrast with all major crops, soybeans have had a price-support program without any acreage restrictions. It

now appears that this situation is about to be changed.

Uses. Most soybeans grown in the United States are processed for oil and meal, either here or in foreign countries. The meal is the most valuable product. During the marketing year that ended last September 1, soybean meal provided two-thirds of the total product value; oil, one third.

The meal is used mostly for animal feed, to provide protein — or more especially, certain amino acids — in the rations of cattle, swine, and poultry. There are several other sources of these amino acids: cottonseed, linseed, peanut, and copra meal, mill feeds, alfalfa, and tankage and fishmeal. Protein substitutes, such as urea, are also available. Farmers who use high-protein feeds should benefit from lower soybean prices.

Most soybean oil is used to make food products — shortening and margarine, as well as cooking and salad oils. Only 8 percent goes into paints, plastics, and other nonfood uses. The many competitive edible

products include lard, butter, tallow, and cottonseed, corn, peanut and olive oil. Competitive inedible materials include linseed, tung, and coconut oil, as well as tallow and many synthetic products.

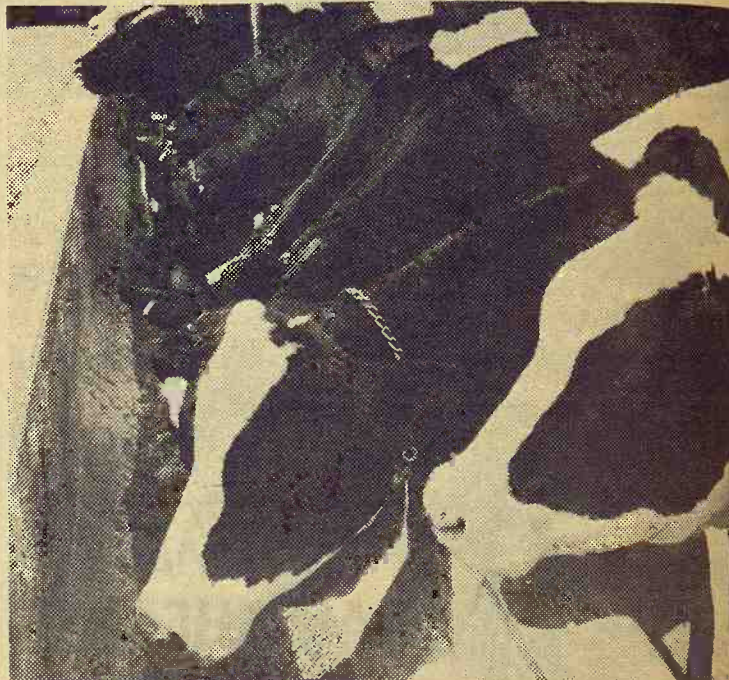
Since the soybean situation is so complex, there is much uncertainty about the future — the volume of production, domestic and foreign demand, government programs, and prices.

## OUR DAILY BREAD

— by G&G Area Cooks

#### NO-BAKE CHOCOLATE HAYSTACKS

1 3-ounce package Philadelphia cream cheese  
2 tablespoons milk  
2 cups powdered sugar  
2 1-ounce squares unsweetened melted chocolate  
1/4 teaspoon vanilla  
1/4 teaspoon coconut  
3 cups miniature marshmallows  
Blend milk and cream cheese; add sugar, salt and vanilla. Mix together. Stir in melted chocolate. Add marshmallows. Drop by teaspoonsful of mixture into flaked coconut. Toss until well covered. Place on cookie sheet. Chill until firm. Makes four dozen.

ple Cake as easy to make and

#### SUPERIOR APPLE CAKE

2 heaping cups chopped raw  
apples, don't chop too fine and  
leave peelings on. Place the ap-  
ples in a bowl and add 1 cup  
sugar and let stand awhile to  
form juice. In a larger bowl sift  
together 1 1/2 cups sifted flour,  
1/2 teaspoon salt, 1 teaspoon so-  
da. Combine 1/2 cup cooking oil,  
1 beaten egg, 1 teaspoon vanilla,  
1/2 teaspoon coconut flavoring  
and 1/2 cup chopped nuts (if de-  
sired.) Add to dry ingredients  
and then mix in the apple sugar  
mixture and nuts, lastly, stirring  
gently. Bake in greased & flour-  
ed 8x10 inch pan in 350 degree  
oven for 50 minutes. Cool before  
cutting. "I usually double the  
recipe and freeze half of it."

Mrs. Del Leiszler of Linn ad-

vises that all the directions for  
making this pie should be read  
before starting:

#### MILE HIGH PIE

Mix in large bowl, 1 package  
(10-ounce) frozen strawberries,  
1 cup sugar, 2 egg whites.  
Beat for 15 minutes on high  
speed, then fold in 1 package of  
Dream Whip (already whipped).  
Pour this over the following  
crust and freeze. Cookie crust:  
1 cup flour, 1/4 cup melted but-  
ter, 1/2 cup chopped nuts. Mix  
and spread in shallow pan. Bake  
20 minutes in 350-degree oven.  
Stir two or three times during  
the baking process to make  
crumbs. Pat crumbs into 9x12-  
inch pan. Save 1/4 cup for the

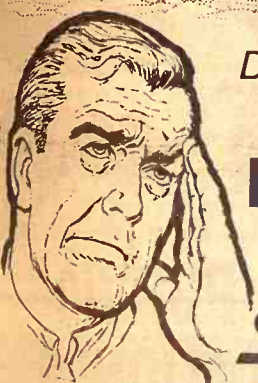

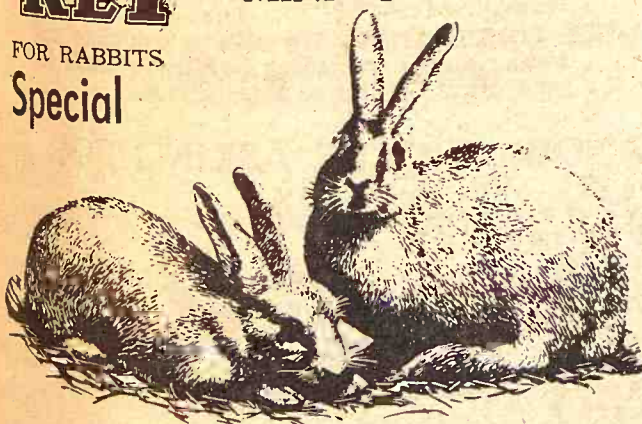

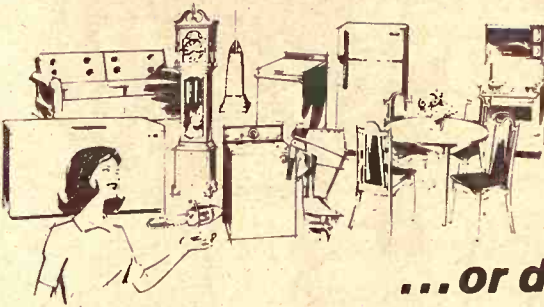

## Cotton Decoupage: New Version Of Old Craft

If you haven't tried decoupage yet, now's the time. Decoupage is just a big word for a simple handicraft that has taken the fancy of millions of women.

The word itself means the art of decorating surfaces with applied paper cutouts. However, there's more to it than that. The cutout design and the surface to which it is glued must be covered with coats of a special varnish. This gives the item — which might be a decorative wall box, wall plaque, or piece of furniture — a distinctive finish that resembles lacquer.

Several years ago, do-it-yourself versions of this age-old craft sprang up with the "old board" school of art. Materials were found by scavenging lumber yards for odd pieces of wood suitable for making into wall

plaques. Magazines and art periodicals yielded prints for pasted-on-designs.

To make the wood look even more antique and weather-beaten, devotees burned it, hammered it, even sawed off edges.

Today, arts and crafts shops offer unfinished wooden items for decoupage purposes. And now, there's a rich new source for decoupage designs. Motifs cut from cotton cloth, either decorator or piecegoods fabrics, provide imaginative cutouts. The fabric motifs give finished items a three-dimensional look and are easier to work with than paper cutouts. They also enable you to coordinate decoupage items with the rest of the room decor. For fabric decoupage, choose a closely woven cotton print with large, clearly

designed motifs.

Look for unfinished wooden items at an arts and crafts shop. Sand down the items and, if you like the weather-beaten look, hammer dents in it and burn edges. Stain with any wood stain you like until you get the shade desired, or give it an antique colored finish with spray

paint. After paint dries, paste on fabric cutout with white household glue. When this is dry, give entire item several coats of special decoupage varnish, available at hardware and paint stores. You can get flat, semigloss or high gloss varnish in liquid or spray form. Sand lightly between coats.

## Dried Buttermilk Now Available Eliminates Waste

To ask you to describe the flavor of buttermilk would be a difficult request, states Mrs. Nancy Hjetland, County Extension Home Economist. You might say it is delicious. That's true. To be more specific, you might say buttermilk has a tangy flavor and a smooth, heavy body.

The tangy flavor of buttermilk comes from a special bacterial culture. A bit of salt helps bring out the natural flavor. Citric acid or its equivalent, as sodium citrate, sometimes enhances the flavor.

The smooth, heavy body of buttermilk is caused by the bacterial culture and by pasteurizing the milk at a specific temperature for a period of time.

What is it made of? The main

ingredient is milk, but the kind of milk varies. It is always Grade A quality. It is probably fresh fluid milk or reconstituted nonfat dry milk. Those little flakes of butter you sometimes see really are butter. They lend flavor to your glass of buttermilk.

Today you can buy a package of dried buttermilk that keeps well on the cupboard shelf. Use it for chocolate cake, biscuits or griddle cakes. Just sift it in the flour and add water for the liquid. It eliminates waste of any leftover fresh buttermilk.

Liquid fertilizers have some advantages and some disadvantages. Because they are liquid they might have a slight advantage over solid fertilizers in dry soils. However, many liquid fertilizers cannot be applied in cold weather, 0-20 degrees, because they tend to jell out.

Care should also be taken to find out their effect on equipment before putting liquid fertilizers through spray or irrigation equipment.

Application of liquid fertilizers in small amounts as a spray on plant foliage is not recommended unless a micro-nutrient like zinc or iron is emulsified. This is because very small amounts of these micro-nutrients are needed and they tend to become insoluble when applied to the soil.

"When you buy fertilizer," Dr. Jones concludes, "consider the cost per pound of nitrogen, phosphate, and potash. If the price is the same, liquid or solid fertilizer is equally good."

## OK Planning On Walnut Creek Watershed Project

LA CROSSE — Planning authorization for a west-central Kansas watershed project that is likely to cost millions of dollars has been announced by the U.S. Soil Conservation Service.

The project will provide flood control and, hopefully, city water for some communities, irrigation, outdoor education programs for unified school districts in the area and a boom in outdoor recreation.

January 28, 1969

Sen. James Pearson, R-Kansas, notified officials of the West Walnut Watershed District, headquartered at La Crosse, that final planning can now get underway.

Warren Stone, secretary-manager of the district, said long range plans call for building 34 water retention or dam sites along Walnut Creek and its tributaries.

"It really is a large undertaking," he said. "It will run into millions of dollars, but it will make millions of dollars also."

The watershed district extends from near Great Bend to a point two miles inside the Scott County line. It averages 15 to 20 miles wide and covers 1,020,520 acres, Stone reported.

He said officials are hoping the project will supply city water for Ness City and Ransom and possibly for McCracken and Utica.

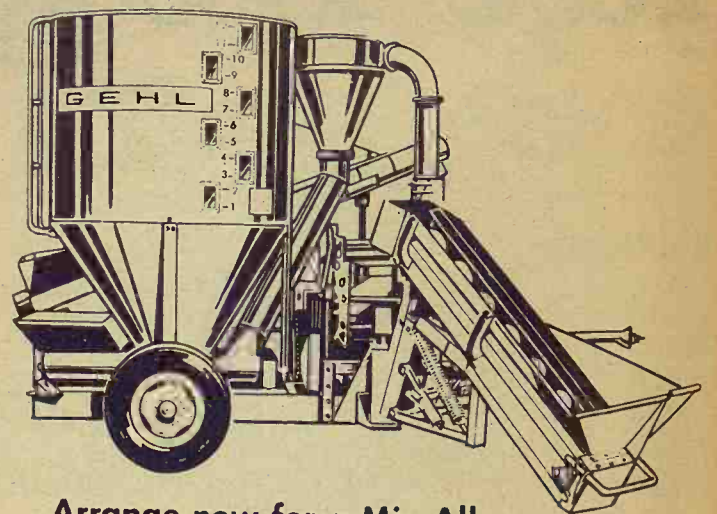
Stone said he has no idea what SCS planning authorization amounts to in terms of money.

## Totals On Wheat, Sorghum Payments

Federal support payments for Kansas wheat in 1960 were \$145 million and support for feed grains was \$28 million. The wheat support figured about 60 cents a bushel and the feed grain payments figured about 17 cents per bushel.

## Europe Faces Its Own Farm Woes

A bitter battle to rationalize Western Europe's farm economy faces the European Common Market in 1969.

Symbolized by a mountainous surplus of 400,000 tons of butter and an annual bill of 4.5 billion dollars for farm aid of different kinds, the market's failure to deal with its agricultural problems requires correction without delay.

In practical importance, these problems far outweigh the other major problems facing the community — the chronic fight with President Charles de Gaulle over the question of supernationality, which caused a French walkout from the common market council between July 1965 and February 1966, and the issue of Britain's admission to the market.

These issues are still very much alive in the minds of the five non-French members of the Common Market — West Germany, Italy, Holland, Belgium and Luxembourg. But they are less urgent than the prospect

that the community's farm bill may rise to a fantastic 10 billion or 12 billion dollars in a few years unless drastic action is taken.

The 1969 battle between the community and farming interests will involve both strategic and tactical action.

On the front as a whole the 14-man common market commission will launch a 10-year campaign to cut the farming population, human and non-human, and to reduce production.

This campaign, mapped out in a plan presented last December by Sicco Mansholt, former Dutch minister of agriculture and now vice-president of the commission, provides for:

- A massive reduction in the farming population to bring it down to 6 per cent of the total population compared to 15.7 per cent in 1965. In the United States only 5 percent of the population lives on the land.

Five million people are expected to abandon farming between 1970 and 1980, compared to a re-

duction of 4.7 million between 1960 and 1970. Half of those leaving the land the coming decade will retire because of age; the other half will go into industry, the planners say.

- Alleging that at least four-fifths of the farms in the European community are too small to provide work for one man on a rational basis and that with modern facilities one man can easily handle 75 to 100 acres or 40 cows, Mansholt has proposed that no new land should be opened to agricultural production and that marginal ground should be abandoned.

This he calculates would cut the community's area from 175 million acres to 163 million between 1970 and 1980.

Production units in the future should consist of no less than 200 acres, 40 head of dairy cattle or 10,000 laying hens, he suggests.

The community's total population of dairy cows would be cut from 22 to 19 million in a 4-year period. The loss in farmer income would be offset by a slaughter subsidy in the first two years.

On the immediate tactical front, Mansholt and his helpers have suggested a drastic cut in guaranteed prices during the 1969-70 period to discourage the overproduction that has plagued the market in recent years.

A major target would be butter, with a drop in the price from \$1735 a ton to \$1110. Support prices for oil seeds and sugar would also be slashed.

Leo Paulsen, Concordia, Kansas, was elected vice chairman. Isleib served as vice chairman during 1968 and succeeds Lyle L. Hague of Cherokee, Oklahoma. Isleib has previously held the chairman position during his Board tenure.

Isleib is presently serving his 12th year on the Board, elected by the Federal Land Bank Associations (FLBAs) in the four-state district of Kansas, Oklahoma, Colorado and New Mexico.

# Parochial Schools May Close

Kansas public schools may get a big surge in enrollment in the next five to 10 years that has not shown on student projection charts.

Some 40,000 students may be absorbed into the public schools if Catholic parochial schools call it quits. There are a number of signs that they will.

The four Catholic dioceses in Kansas — Salina, Wichita, Dodge City and Kansas City — all showed marked reductions in enrollment over the past four years.

The Kansas City diocese schools have dropped from 23,300 students to 20,800 since 1965. The Salina parochial schools have declined from 6400 to 5400 in the same period. At Dodge City, the enrollment is down from 4000 to 3400, and at Wichita from 12,300 to 10,500.

The Dodge City diocese has already announced that it will close St. Mary of the Plains High School next year.

The superintendent there, Rev. J. A. Stremel, cited rising costs of tuition as a prime factor. Many parents have decided the financial burden of tuition was too much to bear and decided to enroll their students in public schools, he said.

The Kansas City, Mo. - St. Joseph diocese has voted to close its schools next fall. Those diocese schools were bankrupt, more than \$14 million in debt.

None of the four Kansas dioceses report substantial annual deficits. But all, at least indirectly, agree that their schools are not likely to operate more than 10 more years unless they get state and federal aid.

There are numerous moves to allow funding of private schools by the state for transportation,

lunch, textbook and other auxiliary aids on a per student basis. Most Catholic school officials say that such action would be helpful but most seem to feel that the parochial schools could be saved only by aid on the same basis as received by public schools.

There are five reasons officials cite as responsible for the tight financial squeeze and enrollment loss:

- Cost of equipment and construction is soaring rapidly.

- Catholic schools face the peculiar situation of suddenly having to pay marked increases in teachers salaries as more and more lay teachers are added to the payroll. For decades, the majority of parochial teachers were religious who receive much lower pay.

- Unlike the state system, Catholic schools are not structured to shift funds from "rich" to "poor" districts. Almost all funding comes from tuition and subsidies by the local parish. As a result, smaller schools are being closed as their operation becomes economically unfeasible.

- Because of the extra burden in paying textbook, lunch and transportation programs,

The Wall Street Journal has reported that feed grain price advances in the next few months could run up to more than a dime a bushel with heavy demand and tightening supplies.

There are indications for lower farm prices this year for hogs, beef and eggs.

The farrowing quarters were constructed by the two brothers, and include controlled environment.

The Anderson farm, equipped with manufactured facilities, is considered another of the highly

efficient operations in this area.

At noon the livestock men will meet at the Clay Center armory for a ham dinner to be served by the host, the Union State Bank of Clay Center. This will be followed by a program of speakers from Kansas State University and representatives of hog marketing companies.

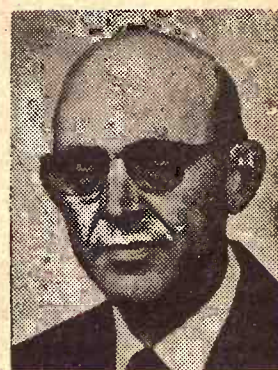

## Ahead With Fee Hike On Federal Grazing Land

Livestock grazing fees for public land will be raised by two government departments this year, according to the Budget

Bureau, despite bitter opposition from some Western cattlemen.

This decision will apparently stand unless there is a reversal by the new administration.

The fees are paid by livestock producers who graze cattle and sheep on lands administered by the Interior Department's Bureau of Land Management and the Agriculture Department's Forest Service.

In comparison with 33 cents in 1968, fees on BLM land this year will be 44 cents per animal unit month — one cow or five sheep grazing for a month.

Fees on Western National Forest Lands in 1969 will range from 31 cents to \$1.25 per month for cows and 6 to 25 cents for sheep. In 1968, cow fees ranged from 21 cents to a few isolated \$1.80 rates, but averaged below the 1969 level.

Last Nov. 15 the Agriculture and Interior Departments proposed the new fee schedules. The decision to adopt the rates, according to Budget Bureau officials, was made after a study of comments and after "careful consideration" of its impact on the livestock industry and the public.

The American National Cattlemen's Association has denounced the fees as a "threat to the very existence of the Western beef industry," and has called for Congressional hearings. The Budget Bureau said grazing fees would be increased in 10 annual installments until they reach a "fair market value" level.

Officials claim that if the "full value" were being charged this year, fees would average \$1.25 — the \$1.23 base plus a two-cent adjustment for current forage prices.

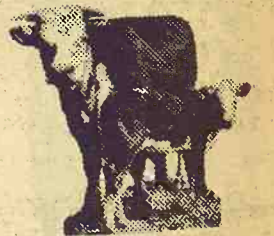

## Two Large State Farm Developers Agree On Merger

WICHITA — A merger agreement has been announced this week between Agricultural and Industrial Development Inc. and American Beef Inc., in a joint statement by officers of the two Kansas-based public corpora-

Wayne J. Madill of Wichita and Warren W. Spikes of Hugo announced the boards of directors of each corporation

had unanimously approved the proposed merger. Madill is president of Agricultural and Industrial Development Inc. (AID). Spikes is president of American Beef.

The agreement will be submitted to stockholders of the two corporations for approval at a meeting in Wichita Feb. 21.

Agricultural and Industrial Development Inc. will be the surviving corporation. Stockholders of American Beef will receive two shares of AID common stock for each share of American Beef common stock.

Both corporations recently have completed a public stock

offering. AID's offering of 500,000 shares of common stock was concluded last November and American Beef finalized a public issue of 250,000 shares of common stock last December.

At the conclusion of the merger, AID assets will exceed \$2 million. The firm will have 1,435,000 shares outstanding which are owned by individuals throughout Kansas.

American Beef was organized in October, 1966, to develop cattle feeding operations in Southwest Kansas. The firm recently completed construction and has started operation of a 12,000 head cattle feeding lot near Ulysses.

Agricultural and Industrial Development Inc. was organized in January 1966. It is a diversified holding company with substantial interests in both agricultural and livestock operations.

Subsidiaries include AID Cattle Co., Mid-State Cattle Feeders Inc., AID Cube Products, AID Feeders Inc., and Key Securities Inc.

Construction of a new alfalfa cubing plant has been completed on a 40-acre site near Kinsley.

Construction of a 12,000-head cattle feed lot is to begin soon in the Kinsley area.

## Beet Acreage Adds To Sheep Numbers On Feed

Sheep and old crop lambs on feed in Kansas for the slaughter market totaled 100,000 January 1, 1969, 45 percent more than a year ago, according to the Kansas Crop and Livestock Reporting Service.

The substantial increase in lambs on feed over last year resulted from the additional grazing available. Increased 1968 sugar beet acreage.

Large operators were feeding 76,000 head in lots, on beet tops, sorghum stubble, or wheat pasture.

Smaller operations had 24,000 sheep and lambs on feed, down 8 percent from a year ago.

Grazing has been fairly good in western areas where opera-

tors estimate some beet tops will be available until the end of January. There has been virtually no snow cover in western areas to limit grazing, though cool temperatures have caused some problems.

The light snow cover in central and southern areas near the first of the year limited grazing on wheat and sorghum stubble with some lambs going into feedlots a bit earlier than expected.

Sheep and lamb placements totaled 13,000 during November and December, less than half the number for this same period last year. Marketings of fed sheep and lambs during the last two months of 1968 were an estimated 15,000, well below the 34,000 marketed during those months a year ago.

Reduced marketings in late 1968 are indicative of generally favorable grazing conditions and adequate feed supplies for sheep and lambs on feed.

### United States

Sheep and lambs on feed for slaughter market in the 26 states on January 1, 1969, totaled 2,927,000 head, 4 percent less than a year earlier.

## Break Salina Labor Dispute

After six months of no work because of labor disputes, work has started again on a \$2.5 mil-

lion governmental complex at Salina.

The National Labor Relations Board has issued a back-to-work order to Johnson Builders, Inc., Salina, which holds a \$1.1 million contract.

The NLRB decision upheld the validity of an election last month in which two Johnson employees chose not to join the Teamsters Union. Union officials had protested the election.

Several months ago, the Teamsters Union had placed an "informational" picket at the construction site to represent truck drivers. Members of other unions employed in the project refused to cross the picket line,

shutting down all construction on the site.

Johnson Builders had only two men employed as truck drivers and an election was held in an effort to settle the situation. When the men decided not to join the union, the Teamsters appealed to the NLRB.

About three-fourths of the work had been completed when construction was shut down. Work was to have been finished in February. Now the estimate is for June.

## Report Confirms Poor Phone Service In Area

Complaints of poor service  
from the Kansas Telephone Co.

Circleville, Corning, Delia, Deni-  
son, Easton, Effingham, Em-  
mett, Hoyt, Lancaster, Mayetta,  
Meriden, Nortonville, Ozawkie,  
Perry, Rock Creek, Rossville, St.  
Marys, Silver Lake and Win-  
chester.

Complaints against the com-  
pany centered around lengthy  
periods when phones are dead,  
deficiencies in repair service,

and a proposed \$1 monthly rate  
increase.

The report is the culmination  
of a five-month push for better  
service by the company's pat-  
rons in Perry, Silver Lake,  
Wellsville, Meriden, Ozawkie,  
Alta Vista, and the Potter-East-  
on areas. Formal complaints  
were lodged by area residents  
with the KCC, which launched  
an investigation.

Vernon R. Chesbro, head of

## Some Thorns In Rapid Growth

Wilbur J. Cohen, ending his tenure as secretary of health, education and welfare, sent to the White House over the weekend a report which attempts for the first time to evaluate the social state of the nation.

The report, one of a flurry Cohen sent to President Johnson in the closing hours of the outgoing administration, urged that future presidents submit an annual social report to Congress.

"This social report is really a landmark," the outgoing HEW secretary said.

Based on studies by prominent educators and experts, the report notes, for example, that crime is concentrated in the nation's poverty areas and that Negroes have higher rates of crime victimization than whites in any income group.

But the report does not attempt to draw any over-all conclusion on the social well-being of the nation — or lack of it.

The report points out that personal income in the nation has increased to an extraordinary extent but that distribution of income has remained practically unchanged over the last two decades.

More detailed study of the need many people apparently have for close group relationships was urged in the report, which cites data showing that married persons have lower death rates, and lower rates of suicide, mental illness and alcoholism than people who are widowed, divorced, or single. Some other findings in the re-

port:

- Life expectancy, just under 68 years in the '50's, has not increased significantly since then.

- Negro Americans have on the average about seven years less expectancy of healthy life than whites.

- Life expectancy in Holland, Sweden and Norway is about 3.5 years longer than it is in the United States.

- At the present rate of growth, industrial production will increase 12-fold by the year

2020 and air and water pollution aggravated by the growth of the population and economic activity, will be even more of a severe problem than it is today.

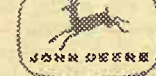

## Less U.S. Meat Goes To Europe

Protective tariffs and increased livestock production in Common Market countries have reduced sharply U.S. meat exports to Europe, and an Agriculture department official sees little chance for improvement in the near future.

Harlan J. Dirks, foreign agricultural service analyst, reported that the Common Market's use of subsidies and import restrictions "has insulated European producers from outside producing areas that are more efficient."

Europe traditionally has been the largest market for U.S. meat and livestock products. But, Dirks said, this has been cut from 198 million dollars in 1966 to an estimated 143 million last year.

Livestock production in Europe jumped 30 per cent from 1956-60 to 1967, and probably rose another 2 or 3 percent last year, Dirks said.

"Some leveling off may occur in 1969," he said, "but the long-run trend is upward. Pig meat and poultry production can probably be expanded enough to total demand by 1975, but it will be more difficult to expand beef output to meet demand."

Dirks said European livestock expansion has been difficult for U.S. red meat exports but even harder on sales of animal by-products which make up the bulk of U.S. meat shipments overseas.

These by-products generally have been victims of Europe's "affluent society," Dirks said. While demand for red meat has grown "at a phenomenal rate" the market for by-products has "only inched upward" in some cases, leaving surpluses and lower prices.

An example is the U.S. lard export situation, Dirks said. The value of lard exports to Europe dropped from 60 million dollars in 1946 to 13 million in 1967 and to an estimated 8 million last year.

Where once the Common Market was a minor exporter of lard, it now is a major supplier largely because of its export subsidy program. The U.S. share of the United Kingdom market has fallen from 80 per cent to about 30 per cent.

Consequently, Dirks noted, the United States "has also been forced to resort" to a lard ex-

port subsidy program in an attempt to regain part of the British market.

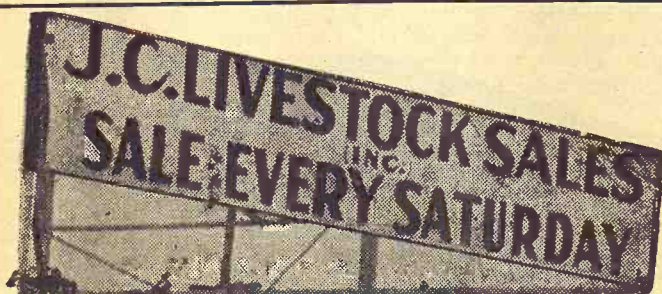



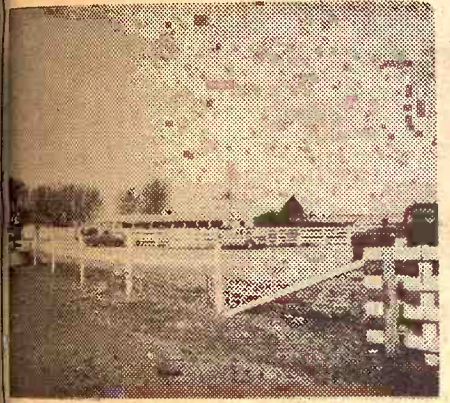
