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
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
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RAELENE AND 12,000 TURKEYS READY FOR THANKSGIVING

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
Councils of Nebraska, Kansas, Misouri, Oklahoma, and Arkansas.

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

in the Goodland area was 4 weeks behind schedule.

Spokesmen at the Great Western plant said the sugar content is "way below" normal this year.

Growers in the Goodland area meanwhile are delivering freezedamaged beets to the company on a pro-rata allocation which will be based on the slicing capacity of the Kemp factory west of Goodland.

Actual extraction of sugar will determine the payment for the beets. The grower will receive 60 percent of the returns and the company, 40 percent, according to Harvey Hatcher, president of the Tri-County Beet Growers Association.

In the Garden City area, the harvest is about 20 percent com-

Lynn Holstein, American Sugden City area, said tonnage of the harvest this year is up but the average sugar content is hovering at only 9 percent.

And because rotting is also a problem at Garden City, American Crystal is not stockpiling the beets either.

The ban on stockpiling has

brought threats of legal action lambs on feed November 1 were against the company from growers in the southwest part of the state. Harold Purdy, Deerfield, representing the Ark Valley Beet Growers Association, says the crop is "pretty close to being a disaster."

Company personnel point out that the producers are not the only losers, because the sugar firms are facing unusually high costs of processing beets with extremely low sugar contents.

More Lambs In Feedlots

Sheep and lambs on feed for the slaughter market in Kansas totaled 118,000 head on November 1, an increase of 16 percent from last year, according to the Kansas Livestock Reporting Service.

Included in the total sheep & ar Crystal manager for the Gar- lambs on feed were those being grazed on volunteer and seeded wheat pasture, grain sorghum stubble and sugar beet tops as well as those in farm and other commercial-sized feedlots.

As of November 1 the bulk of the lambs in western Kansas were grazing on volunteer wheat fields as relatively few fields of grain sorghum had been harvested and only a limited acreage of sugar beets had been dug because of the extended wet weather conditions.

Volunteer wheat fields were providing excellent grazing and were the best since the fall of 1965. Most lambs in south central Kansas were feeding on wheat pasture, grain sorghum stubble and alfalfa.

Most of the sheep and lambs on feed November 1 were placed on feed during September and October. By weight the sheep &

grouped in the following categories: under 70 pounds, 47,000; 70-79 pounds, 44,000; 80-89 pounds, 19,000, and those weighing 90 pounds and over, 8000. Replacement feeder lambs from Texas and New Mexico were reported in plentiful supply.

Sheep And Lambs On Feed In 7 States

Sheep and lambs on feed in 7 major feeding states on November 1, 1969 are estimated at 1,551,000 head, 4 percent less than a year earlier.

Iowa, Nebraska, Kansas and California had more sheep and lambs on feed on November 1 while Colorado, South Dakota and Texas had less.

Of the November 1 total on feed, an estimated 1,350,000 head were placed during September and October and 201,000 were placed before Septmber 1.

The number of sheep and lambs in each weight group on November 1 and change from a year earlier are as follows: Under 70 pounds - 330,000 head, up 34,000; 70-79 pounds - 469. 000 head, down 36,000; 80-89 pounds - 390,000 head, down 63,000; 90-99 pounds — 290,000 head, up 12,000; 100 pounds and over - 72,000 head, down 8000.



The population of Kansas was 2,287,302 as of January 1, 1969, the State Department of Agriculture states in its annual report, noting that "growth has been steady and almost continuous since earliest days of statehood."

Steady it is. But large it is not. The increase in the past year is less than 1% - about in line with the 8% growth accumulated over the past 10 years.

In fact, 64 of the state's 105 counties have had a decrease in population in the past 10 years. The big gainers have been Johnson, Shawnee, Sedgwick, Douglas and Reno counties. Removing these five counties from the Scott Leoti Ulysses Sublette totals, Kansas would show a net loss in population in the past decade.

Besides the five counties, 13 other counties have increases of more than 10% since 1959. These include Riley (Manhattan) and Leavenworth in northeast Kansas; El'is (Hays) and Sherman (Goodland) in northwest Kansas; Wichita (Leoti) and Scott (Scott City) in the irrigation

belt in west central Kansas; and Finney (Garden City), Ford (Dodge City), Haskell (Sublette), Grant (Ulysses), Morton (Elkhart), and Stanton (Johnson) in Southwest Kansas.

Most of southwest Kansas has escaped population loss. Many of these counties are ones which were the last to have sod broken when the frontier moved west, and several have populations of little more than 3000.

But they have grown. Partly responsible has been the Hugoton gas field, a powerful economic factor in several counties. A huge boom in irrigation in the area has also primed growth.

Further north, irrigation and sugar beet growth has spurred Goodland and its neighbor Sharon Springs.

Small manufacturing has been promoted diligently in the area also, and the sum of gas fields, irrigation, industrial promotion, and livestock have made Garden City and Dodge City important retail centers in the southwest.

Growth has subsided in the area around Wichita, altho there have been modest gains around

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
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

In Nevada, the gain has been wer 60% - making it the fastgrowing state. There is some larity of the smallest States - growing and the smallest counties in Kansas growing.

But the growth is not all on the small end of the population ranked 4th with 75,000 populascale. New York, which lost its tion. Of the state's 34 cities with long-held title as the country's largest state to California in 1965, has grown at a rate faster County - Overland Park, Praithan Kansas. The rate in California has been over 25% in 10 years.

Kansas' fastest growing area by far has been Johnson County, the mushrooming residential area southwest of Kansas City, which is now the state's second largest county with 216,700 people - 68% more than 10 years

The fastest growing city in the state is Overland Park, now populations of 10,000 or more. seven of them are in Johnson rie Village, Shawnee, Olathe, Leawood, Merriam and Roeland

Aside from Johnson County, the towns with the greatest growth rate in the past decade are Garden City, Manhattan, Emporia, Lawrence, Hays and Goodland.

It is not uncommon in the 64 counties which have losses in population since 1959 that the county seat has grown. For ex-


ample, Clay Center has gained 400 in this period but that was not enough to offset a loss of more than 1000 in the rest of the county, resulting in a net

loss of 700 in Clay County. But even that sociological change, which disguises the population loss to many local boosters, has not been uniformly felt. Such towns as Coffeyville, Atchison, Eureka, Fort Scott, Iola, Larned, Marion, Pratt, Russell, Wellington and Winfield are smaller than they were 10 years

The shifts in population are not in themselves calamitous. They merely declare the changes that are going on. When Provi-

dence shrunk, Chicago emerged. Boston and Baltimore did not grow, while Los Angeles and Houston skyrocketed. As these changes occur on the national scale, so they happen on a lesser plane. But in sum the changes in population are important. Within that view, Kansas is growing but not rapidly.

When Kansas was still a territory, in 1860, the population was first recorded as 107,000. By 1883 the count hit one million. It then took 72 years to hit the two million mark, in 1955. At the pace since then, it will be well past the year 2000 before the three million mark is reach-





The facility will be designed to prepare one million hogs each year on a "chill and kill" basis, with sales of carcasses or a breakup to customer orders offered.


"The plant will be a speed operation for efficiency," Ortleb said. "We will stress quality and will be willing to pay the market price for such hogs."

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



Company To Buy Freeze-Damaged Sugar Beets

GOODLAND - The Great Western Sugar company has agreed to accept delivery of freeze-damaged sugar beets at its Goodland factory.

Unseasonable 6- and 8-inch snows, freezing temperatures and rainy weather in October prevented growers from digging their beets. They faced almost a total crop loss until the company agreed to buy the damaged

Harvey Hatcher, president of the Tri-County Growers association, said the agreement offers chance for the growers to get he crop out of the ground, weather permitting.

Hatcher said similar agreenents have been made for growers in Colorado, Wyoming, Montana and Nebraska.

Robert R. Owen, president of he company, said the season's initial payment to beet growers was down more than one half from last year, primarily berause of delays in the "sugar campaign" after inclement wea-

Sugar beet farmers use the word "campaign" instead of "harvest."

Owen said the crop was somewhat higher than average in tonnage, but lower in sugar content. An initial payment of \$25,772,-000 was made Wednesday by Great Western to growers in Kansas, Colorado, Nebraska,

Wyoming and Montana. In addition, a payment of 5 million dollars under the federal sugar act or Christmas shopping will be made for beets delivered through November 4.

The government payment is aid for by a tax levied on the ugar industry.

Only once since White has been at the Fair's helm has the state's show event paid its own way, he says. The Fair is not considered or expected to be a profitmaking venture for the

Actually opponents of the nineday fair can't really say the expansion of the Fair has cost taxpayers, he said.

Controversy has surrounded the decision to extend the Kansas State Fair to a nine-day event from its traditional six-

"We figure it has probably cost about \$44,000 for the extra three days of the Fair," White

In the 1968 show, the Fair fig-

ures it about broke even for the gave more time for livestock first time in several years of operation. In 1968, the Fair had a total of \$484,880 in receipts. This separate days. year they are anticipating receipts to run about \$522,062.

This means the extra three days resulted in an approximate \$37,182 increase in receipts and \$44,000 in additional expenses, to put the Kansas State Fair into the red for about \$6818 for its first big nine-day extravaganza.

"As I told the legislators, I'd say the first nine-day Kansas State Fair should be termed a great success. And there are three major reasons behind my opinion," White said.

Dr. Lyman said the program, which began in Kansas during the fall of 1942, will be phased out by June 30, 1970 - the end of the current fiscal year.

The Dept. of Health had requested \$52,500 for the mobile chest X-ray program for next fiscal year. Dr. Lyman decided to appeal only \$9000, just enough to pay for handling the X-ray films for physicians needing them for comparison purposes.

"There are other devices in operation today that are really more satisfactory to meet the need, such as the tuberculin skin test," Dr. Lyman said.

That test is being used more, he said, especially in testing school children.

Cockfighting is legal in Kansas, except on Sundays. The sport technically is not covered by cruelty to animals regulations, since chickens are fowl.



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

Mixed Response To Hearing On Licensing Of Auto Mechanics

Detroit is taking a cool-to-hostile view of the proposed licens-

ing of automobile mechanics, which advocates contend would go far toward easing what they call a crisis in auto repair ser-

But the largest importer of foreign cars, Volkswagen of America, Inc., favors the proposal.

Licensing "would improve the attitude of the public toward the mechanic and encourage more young men to enter the field," according to J. Stuart Perkins, president of the American subsidiary of the popular car's German manufacturer.

His views and those of the leading American manufacturers were aired before the antitrust and monopoly subcommittee of the Senate Judiciary Committee. The panel, headed by Sen. Philip A. Hart, D-Mich., is investigating evidence of the high cost and low quality of auto repairs.

Hart is a leading proponent of licensing - for repair shops as well as their mechanics. He asks

"If a barber must be licensed to after repairs had been perf cut my hair, why shouldn't the man who fixes the brakes on my car be licensed?"

Anybody can be an auto mechanic today simply by calling himself one. Few of the country's 800,000 auto mechanics have undergone apprentice training and many lack even basic vocational education in the trade. Dealer shops and reputable independent garages have cornered most of the limited supply of competent repairmen. All must rely to some extent. however, on relatively unskilled labor. Service stations, with some notab'e exceptions, employ low-grade mechanics.

The Senate subcommittee, in hearings last year, developed evidence that repair work frequently was performed poorly, if at all. The National Automobile Dealers Association reported, on the basis of a survey of 10,000 car owners, that 64 percent of the respondents were satisfied with dealers' repair service. But Hart noted that 36 percent were dissatisfied, and suggested that the dealers' pride was misplaced.

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
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

Nothing Sweet In Sugar Beet Fracas

GARDEN CITY — Finney County District Court Judge Bert J. Vance last Thursday issued a temporary restraining order against American Crystal Sugar Co., Denver.

The order instructed American Crystal to begin honoring at once its 1969 contract with beet producers in five southwest Kansas counties.

Ark Valley Beet Growers Association initiated the action, saying producers would suffer irreparable injury unless American Crystal began accepting beets at its six dumps in southwest Kansas.

Farmers ordinarily leave beets at dumps to await shipment to the company plant.

Involved are 116 farmers with 22,000 acres of beets in Finney, Kearney, Haskell, Grant and Stanton counties.

The action was the latest in a series of events in which the 1969 sugar beet harvest is becoming the worst on record. The main reason is excessive moisture in the region this year, which reduced sugar content and increased spoilage.

Sugar content of beets has dipped from an average of 14 to 16 percent to less than 3 percent. While tonnage is up, beets have



Japan Wants More Beef

Production of beef in Japan has jumped 15 percent this year but consumer demand still is outstripping the rise in domestic output, says the Agriculture de partment.

Therefore, Japanese meat in ports are expected to increase about 18 percent this year from 1968 to meet the demand surge, the Foreign Agricultural Service said in a report.

Japan continues to ban red meat imports from Communist China for health reasons, but has lifted restrictions on other sources, including Ireland and Malagasy. Other suppliers in clude the United States, Canada Australia, New Zealand, Formosa and the Republic of Korea



ANDALE - "You dairy farmers have always been able to change with the times," Dillon Morrow told a group of dairymen at Andale this week.

"You have changed from can shippers or cream shippers to the tank truck, and you have adapted to state and federal health regulations," Morrow, seven-state fieldman for the AMPI, told the farmers.

The Andale meeting was the third of four meetings in the area called to familiarize dairymen with Milk Producers, Inc., AMPI, and problems of the industries.

Meetings have also been held at Abilene, Hillsboro and Pretty Prairie.

Morrow said the government really meant what it said when it demanded clean milk.

"The man who could ban cyclamates in one day has the power to do almost anything," he said, telling the group that manufacturing milk producers would have to make some alterations in barns and equipment

Saying that the milk producing industry is one of the few 51 percent interest in Transbranches of farming that is ac- Ocean Oil Inc., officers of the tually receiving more for its product over the years, Morrow called attention to an increase in was 83 million dollars and dethe price of Grade B or manufacturing milk, from \$4.13 per hundredweight to \$4.71 per hundredweight during the past three years.

"But we need more money for our industry and the only way to do it is to provide a consistent, high quality product to build up a steady dairy product using clientele."

Morrow then explained the purpose of the American Milk Producers Inc., which is in the process of formation. It is composed of Milk Producers, Inc., including members in Kansas, Missouri and Colorado south; the Tri-State Producers, and the Northern Milk Producers.

Milk Producers Inc. will have 11 of the 31 members on the board of American Milk Producers.

Congratulating the local group of dairymen on their enterprise Morrow told them they were among the best dairymen in the world.

"Actually milk producers in Kansas are ahead of dairyman in Minnesota and Wisconsin, both in physical equipment and in the price you receive for your product," Morrow said.







The Agriculture Department said it had changed its mind because a Nov. 19 announcement of its sorghum grain plans had brought an "unusually sharp drop in grain sorghum cash market prices."

The department had announced it would terminate on Jan. 15 an extended price support loan program on 1967 and 1968crop sorghum grain stored in commercial warehouses.

Officials said the grain was needed to help meet U.S. export commitments the rest of this year since current estimates of use are larger than this year's crop.

The department said the intention of the Wednesday announcement was "to give farmers ample time in Which to plan for redemption and marketing of the grain sorghum under loan prior to reseal loan call on Jan. 15, 1970 and not to reduce farm pri-

As a result of the latest action, the department said the grain sorghum loans will be permitted to continue through regular maturity dates of June 30, 1970, in Oklahoma and Texas., and July 31, 1970 in all other states.

The grain, totaling about 23 million bushels, which the department had planned to bring out of storage, is held in Texas, Kansas, Nebraska and New Mex-





Development of the form became necessary when use of the 1040A declined — only 18 million were used last year - because of rising income levels and more complex financial status of taxpayers, Scribner said.

The 1040A was introduced in 1954 and was designed as a simplified form to help the lower income wage earner. But those using it could not itemize deductions or take advantage of certain tax credits and exclusions.

"The new form was designed so that taxpayers in every bracket can use it," Scribner continued. "It has retained the simplicity of the old card-form 1040A and yet is adaptable to the tax needs of every income bracket through an add-a-page feature."

For example, a person who chose to itemize deductions rathtion would complete the Itemized Deductions Schedule and attach it to the basic form.

For those who have other tax situations, schedules provide for dividend and interest income. sales or exchanges of property, staffing, as well as actual insupplemental and miscellaneous income and retirement income

A tax computation schedule also is included, but it need not be returned with the basic form unless certain special credits were claimed, self-employment tax was paid or tax is due from recomputing prior-year investment credit.

When other type schedules are needed - for example, Form 2040 required for claiming sick pay exclusion — the instructions in the booklet point out which is required, Scribner said.

While some of these less-common type schedules are available from some banks and post offices, others are available only at IRS offices.

Two copies of each schedule are included in the booklet, Scribner said. The back of the second copy contains a continuation of instructions for completing the schedule. It may be retained for personal records. The second copy of the basic form also may be kept as a record.

Those who receive the form by mail may peel off the top layer of the "piggy back" name label and attach it to the 1040 as a record. The detachable label also may be used if completion of a second form is required for some

Booklets sent by mail will be printed in red and blue while over-the-counter Form 1040s and the more complex packages of tax returns and schedules for some taxpayers will be printed in black ink.

The red and blue format introduced last year is intended to direct attention to areas of the return where errors are most commonly made, Scribner said.

Have A Year To Meet Meat Inspection Specs

The Kansas meat inspection program, conducted by the Kansas Department of Agriculture, has been granted another year to meet requirements of the federal Wholsome Meat Act, according to the U.S. Department of Agriculture.

A joint federal-state survey of inspection programs in all states gives USDA reason to believe that Kansas and 44 other states er than use the standard deduc- will have a fully operational program by the new deadline, to cover all meat slaughtering and processing plants doing business wholly within the state.

The survey covered state laws, regulations, financing and spection.

The Wholesome Meat Act, signed Dec. 15, 1967, gave the states two years to establish meat inspection systems for packing plants operating wholly within states that are at least equal to the federal inspection system which covers plants operating in interstate or foreign commerce. The act authorizes the Secretary of Agriculture to grant a state an additional year if the state shows significant progress toward meeting the requirements.

Less Milk, Eggs Used-But Chicken Consumption Up

Consumers in 1969 drank less milk and ate fewer eggs, but they fried, fricasseed and barbecued more chicken than ever, according to preliminary estimates by the Agriculture Department.

Higher prices for beef and pork may have contributed to the boost in poultry products, but department officials have not fully analyzed the factors.

Despite peak retail beef and veal prices this year, the experts say per capita consumption will average 113 pounds, the same as in 1968. The only appreciable shrink in the red meat category was for pork, reported at 64.7 pounds per capita compared with 66 pounds last year.

Lamb and mutton, on a downward trend since World War II, accounted for 3.4 pounds per capita this year, compared with 3.8 in 1968.

Per capita consumption of eggs was forecast at 313 for 1969,

compared with 321 last year, and the fewest since 313 reported in 1966. Ten years ago, Americans averaged 352 eggs each, and in 1945 per capita use was

Chicken-eating has more than doubled since 1946-49 and this year is expected to average 47.1 pounds per capita, two pounds more than in 1968 and nearly 12 pounds more than a decade ear-

Turkey consumption for 1969 was forecast at 8.2 pounds per capita, exceeded only by 8.6 pounds in 1967, the department

Milk production has declined steadily the past five years, reflecting a long-term reduction in milk cow numbers and fewer herds. Output this year is indicated at 116.2 billion pounds, down about one billion from

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





Cyclamate Ban Not So Tough As First Outlined

Stepping back from what was widely interpreted as a near total ban on cyclamates, the government now says the artificial sweetener may be used in clearly labeled foods and as a sugar substitute in liquid or tablet

Robert H. Finch, secretary of health, education and welfare, said the sale of foods and sugar substitutes containing the sweetener will be allowed as long as the label shows the cyclamate content in an average serving.

A ban against cyclamates in diet soft drinks and other beverages effective January 1 remains in effect.

HEW spokesmen said the new order is not a reversal of Finch's October 18 decision which ordered a phased-out removal of cyclamate-sweetened products from the market.

Although the secretary emphasized cyclamates should be consumed only upon the advice of a doctor, his decision will allow its sale in foods and concentrates on a nonprescription basis.

The practical effect is to keep the sweetener on the market in the food area.

HEW spokesmen said the ban

on cyclamate-sweetened beve es has been "strengthened" They said Finch had made clear October 18 cyclamates would continue to be available to those who may need them

Details Coming On Firing Of Jerry Fowler?

There may or may not be more details this week from the Kansas Wheat Commission on the firing of Gerald C. Fowler, who has been administrator for 10 years.

Myron Krenzin, assistant administrator, has been named acting head of the commission, a semi-government agency supported by a check-off of wheat sales. The agency's primary duty is to promote wheat sales.

Fowler was relieved of his duties last week, after Lawrence Brennan of Dodge City, commission chairman, said that discrepancies had been found in the commission's financial records.

Brennan said restitution of \$540 has been made to the commission's account. He said there would be an audit of the commission's financial records.

State Auditor Clay Hedrick said everything appeared to be in order when the post-audit department audited the records of the Wheat Commission in September

Fowler told news media that he first heard of his dismissal on a radio report, and that Brennan had not mentioned anything about the affair in a conversation just a few hours before the dismissal was made public.
