


An artist's sketch of Umberger Hall which will house the Division of Extension at Kansas State College. Construction of the three-story building, costing approximately \$695,000, is expected to begin this summer.

This fine building is a tribute to the late Harry Umberger who was Dean and Director of the Kansas Extension Service 28 years, 1919–1947. He developed the first county agricultural Extension service in Kansas in Leavenworth County in 1912. The Kansas Extension Service program in agriculture, home economics, and 4-H Club work that he organized and directed now operates in all 105 Kansas counties.

Collegiate 4-H Club

The Collegiate 4-H Club is the largest and one of the most popular and active organizations at Kansas State College. This club seeks as members all former 4-H Club members and others who are interested in the 4-H movement. Most of the Collegiate 4-H Club members are boys and girls who have made fine records in their respective counties.

The collegiate 4-H Club was organized in December, 1927, with about sixty members. The membership this past year totaled 350 members. The club had entered into many activities, including the publishing of the Who's Whoot, conducting radio programs at station KSAC, assisting at Round-up. They enter a float in the homecoming parade each year, have a Christmas party, two formals each year, and have a picnic at Rock Springs Ranch each spring. The Collegiate 4-H Club maintains equipment in its office which facilitates the work of the officers and members.

Officers are elected twice a year, with outstanding seniors being given recognition for rendering service to the club.

Honored Seniors

Congratulations to the 1954 outstanding seniors of the Collegiate 4-H Club.

During his four years at Kansas State College, Harold Reed has served as corresponding secretary, reporter, vice-president, and president of the Collegiate Club. He worked on the membership committee, the fall dinner-dance committee and helped with the blood drive. Harold has helped at Round-up and at Rural Life Conferences. He was the county representative for the Who's Whoot three years and worked on many radio programs.

Musical Nancy West has served as pianist of the Collegiate Club for the last three years. She has served on many committees, among them: Senior recognition, radio, membership, formal, Rural Life, and cherry pie contests. Nancy has assisted with the Who's Whoot by being county representative, Collegiate Editor and Art Editor. This summer Nancy will go to Denmark as an IFYE delegate.

4-H's busiest man is Warren Prawl, editor of this year's Who's Whoot. He has also served as assistant editor and advertising manager. Warren was vice-president of the Collegiate 4-H Club this year. He has helped with Round-up and with the Homecoming float in 1951. Warren was an IFYE delegate to Switzerland in 1951 and is now the IFYE Alumni chairman.

He has worked on dinner-dance programs and radio programs; and is a member of a quartette that has appeared several times as 4-H meetings. Neal has spent many Saturdays helping judge 4-H contests.




Each year a group picture of the 1200 4-H'ers is taken on the lawn east of Anderson Hall on the college campus.


Judgers




Facilities Increased at



A new gate and sign of welcome flanks the entrance to Rock Springs Ranch, State 4-H Camp. This gate is indicative of the progress being made in developing the camp. BIG DELEGATION ATTENDS NATIONAL CLUB CONGRESS

Competition is keen! And the championships go to those 4-H'ers with outstanding records, though many others have also excelled in their project and activity work.

Thirty-four of these top 4-H'ers were delegates to the 32nd National 4-H Club Congress in Chicago, the Windy City, November 29 through December 3. They were accompanied by members of the state extension staff and Mr. and Mrs. Fred D. Wilson of the Kansas 4-H Club Foundation.

Special programs, including a showing of cinerama and the appearance of such nationally known figures as Secretary of Agriculture Benson, Mrs. Charles Walgreen, and Fred Waring, plus the Shore of Fun Breakfast by 4-H talent, all contributed to an exciting week of activities.

The club members returned with happy memories and new zeal to continue their 4-H leadership and to put into practice the ideas they gained from Club Congress.

Kansas Acclaims

The highest awards go to those 4-H'ers who have excelled in various phases of project and activity work. This year, Kansas proudly boasts the largest number of national and sectional winners of any state.

DELMAR CONNER, Rice County topped his list of trips and awards in the dairy division by attending Club Congress as National Dairy winner. During his eight years as a club member, Delmar has made 169 dairy exhibits and developed a Holstein herd of which he can be justly proud.

Named as national winner of the meat animal project was LARRY COX, Franklin County. During his 10 years of club work he has carried nearly all of the phases of livestock projects and has repeated many projects two to seven years.

JOAN DAVID, Cowley County, was national winner in clothing. During her 10 years of club work she has completed 38 projects including 13 clothing projects and five years of junior leadership.

JACK VAN HORN, national winner in the soil conservation project, has carried the project for four years. In his record he mentions that one of the most important things he has learned is better conservation of soil and increasing the value and productivity of the land.

A total of 66 projects has been completed by the national home economics projects winner, CAROLYN MEYERS, Mc-Pherson County. Carolyn has kept complete, neat records of all her projects including the livestock and garden projects which supplement her work in home ecomonics.

A 10 year club member from Wilson County, ROY THOMAS, won the national field crops award. Roy has included small grains, row crops and grasses in his project work. He comments, "My experience with fertilizers and soil conservation in my field crops project has been very valuable."















National honors in community relations were awarded to LINDA RUNDLE, Clay County. By organizing a sale which netted \$1,400, she was instrumental in remodeling the community church which was about to be closed because of needed repairs. Linda also reorganized a 4-H Club which had disbanded in 1939.

14 National Winners

A Barton County 4-H'er, CLARK SCHARTS, winner in entomology, has collected and mounted 253 specimens. This collection includes a stydy of the insects development and control. Clark has kept records on 126 different insects.

An all around 4-H'er is ROSEMARY GLADHART, Doniphan County, who took national honors in the promotional activity. As an active junior leader she has given promotional talks, demonstrations, and participated in 30 judging contests.

FRED COX, JR., Saline County was named sectional winner in project achievement. Basis for the ward was the overall scope and quality of project work, junior leadership, and activities.

During the six years that GERALD COLEMAN, national garden winner from Reno County, has carried gardening as a project, he has studied and experimented with varieties, fertilizers, and the control of insects and diseases From his family garden, Gerald has introduced a wider variety of vegetables into the diet of his family, and last year realized a financial return from the sale of produce to local stores.

ARDELLA RUSK, winner in achievement, has a record of outstanding work in both activity and project work in all fields. This Sumner County girl has done quality work with major emphasis on beef projects and such activities as health, safety and newswriting.

Five years of continuous work in the tractor maintenance project qualified JIM HUNDLEY, Atchison County, as a national winner. During these years he has not only learned about and cared for the equipment on his father's farm, but encouraged the project through demonstrations, and a community check on farm tractors for safety.

The national poultry winner is EDWIN COTNER, Montgomery County. Brooding and laying projects have both been included in Edwin's work. He was a member of the judging team which was in competition at the International Livestock Show.
















Washington Trip Announced



Four outstanding 4-H'ers were selected as delegates to the National 4-H Camp at Washington, D.C. This is a top honor awarded to active club members who have been leaders in project and activity work.

GARY NEILAN, Cheyenne County, has completed 93 projects in his 8 years of club work. He has been outstanding in judging contests, health activities, and junior leadership. He has served as president and vice-president of the county council as well as holding major offices in his club.

MARILYN PENCE, Shawnee County, was county champion in clothing, junior leadership, project achievement, and style revue last year. She has been active in health and junior leadership. Marilyn has completed 40 projects during her 9 years of 4-H work. She has been secretary and reporter of her club and the county council as well as president of her club for 2 years.





Marion County 4-H'er, SHIRLEY SUDERMAN, is a member of the French Creek Valley 4-H Club. Projects she has completed include food preparation, clothing, food preservation, home improvement, poultry garden, farm and home electrification, meal service and junior leadership. In her 10 years in 4-H, Shirley has held the offices of vice-president of the county council and president of the County Who's Who Club.

DALE BANDY of McPherson County has completed 56 projects in his 7 years of 4-H Club work. During this time he has been active in conservation, marketing, health, music, safety, and junior leadership. Dale has held nearly every office in his local club and served as treasurer for the county Council. He is a member of the Live Wire 4-H Club.



4-H'ers Visit Georgia

Connie Griffin, Lyons; Rosemary Gladhart, Highland; Kenneth Morgan, Phillipsburg; and Eddie McCoy, Sabetha; were named state award winners in the 4-H promotional activity.

As an award for the state honor, the club members, accompanied by Mr. J. Harold Johnson, State 4-H Club Leader, made a 10-day educational trip to Philadelphia, Washington, D.C., and Athens, Georgia. In the nationals captiol they visited the national 4-H Club offices, and the National 4-H Club Center.

The Georgia State 4-H Foundation, the new Georgia State 4-H Club Camp, and club work in the Southern States were inspected by the Kansas 4-H'ers during their visit to Georgia. The promotional award trips were donated by the Sears--Roebuck Foundation.

During his seven years of club work, Edward McCoy's most outstanding achievements have been in giving talks and demonstrations. He has been county promotional talk winner for the last three years. Kenneth Morgan has 12 county championships and several other awards to his credit. Active participation in judging contests, in addition to writing over 100 news stories and giving 20 promotional talks, are outstanding features of Connie Griffin's record. Rosemary Gladhart was named a national winner for her outstanding accomplishments.

Each of the promotional activity award winners has completed seven or more years of club work and has served as junior leader in their clubs. They have helped organize new 4-H Clubs and enroll new members. The four club members were a part of the blue ribbon promotional talk group that participated in Round-up.


Scholarships



MICHIGAN CAMP TRAINS YOUTH
IN FOUR-FOLD DEVELOPMENT

Six 4-H Club members of Kansas were awarded scholarships for a two week camping session at Camp Miniwanca near Shelby, Michigan. Located on the sand dunes of Lake Michigan, this American Youth Foundation leadership camp stresses the importance of a well-balanced development--physical, mental, social, and religious, in attaining leadership.

Miniwanca, meaning Many Waters, is a camp of action! Campers greet the new day at 6:30 in the morning with flag raising, limbering-up exercises and a dip in the lake, all in rapid succession. The morning is spent in an informal program of self-analysis and training in leadership. Recreational activities, organized games, tournaments, swimming, canoeing, and sailing, fill the afternoons. The International Farm Youth Exchange program continued its two-way exchange of delegates with European and South American countries. In addition, India and Japan participated for the first time. As 12 4-H youths from this state each spent four months visiting in other countries, Kansas farm families were host to delegates from other countries.

As these delegates worked and played with their host families they developed an understanding of each others lives and problems - the over-all aim of the I.F.Y.E. program in building world peace.

Since its beginning in 1948, the program has expanded until 125 U.S. delegates went abroad this last year while nearly 150 exchangees from other countries came to the U.S.

Returned delegates share their experiences with clubs and organizations in their own county and state. Approximately 25,000 talks have been given to a total audience of two and a half million people.

ment. Many lead out in educational discussions, conduct party planning or games at special events both inside and outside their own group.







Play —

Allen






Barber











Chautauqua

































Gove








Other activities were the businessmen's picnic, livestock sale, and the achievement banquet. Several members attended state leadership camp and 65 members attended county camp.




Haskell






































































