

Disguise In Population Growth

Kansas' population went up for the 15th consecutive year, newspapers of the state have dutifully noted, and the gain in one year was 28,000 people.

What the newsgatherers of the state missed was that a gain of 28,000 out of a total population of 2.265 million is very little more than one percent, and the rest of the U.S. is outpacing that by considerable.

In fact the increase in the U.S. since the 1960 census is 115 percent. Kansas has increased by only 5% since that time.

At the present pace of Kansas growth it will take the state until 2005 before the state hits the three million mark. It took the state 72 years - from 1883 until 1955 — to move from one million to two million.

While the U.S. as a whole has grown over 11% since the 1960 census, several states have doubled that pace. California, now the country's most populous state with 19.2 million persons, has gained at a 22% rate since 1960.

The fastest growing state has been Nevada, adding nearly 60% in eight years for a current count of 453,000.

Arizona, Florida, Hawaii, Alaska and Maryland have each had gains of 20% or more.

New York, which lost its longheld title as the country's largest state to California in 1965, has grown at an 8% rate.

Kansas has had only five counties out of 105 that have grown at a 20% rate or faster since 1960. In fact 65 of the state's counties show losses since 1960.

The biggest gains, of course, have been made in Johnson county, the mushrooming residential area southwest of Kansas City which is now the state's second largest county with 212, 1960.

The other Kansas counties with larger gains were Shawnee, 20%; Douglas (Lawrence), 22%; Finney (Garden City), 25%; and Haskell (Sublette), 27%

Counties which had significant gains of more than 10% were Sherman (Goodland), Grant (Ulysses), Wichita (Leoti), Wallace (Sharon Springs), Ford (Dodge City), Morton (Elkhart), Leavenworth, Scott (Scott City), and Riley (Manhattan).

The larger cities in the state, for the most part, show gains. Of the 20 largest cities in the state, all had gains except Salina, not yet fully recovering the loss of the Schilling Air Base population; Coffeyville; and Independence.

The fastest growing city in the state is Overland Park, now ranked 4th with 73,600. Of the state's 33 cities with populations of 10,000 or more, seven of them are in Johnson county - Overland Park, Prairie Village, Shawnee, Olathe, Leawood, Merriam, and Roeland Park.

Aside from Johnson county, the towns with the greatest

growth rate since 1960 are Garden City, Manhattan, Emporia, Lawrence, Hays and Goodland.

It is not uncommon in the 65 counties which have losses in population since 1960 that the county seat has grown. For example, Clay Center has gained 400 in this period but that was 000 people, 58% more than in not enough to offset a 1000 loss in the rest of the county, resulting in a net loss of 600 in Clay

But even that sociological change, which disguises the population loss to many local boosters, has not uniformly been felt. Such towns as Coffeyville, Independence, Iola, Eureka, Junction City, Ark City, Chan-

ute, Winfield, Wellington, Russell, Pratt, Marysville, and Liberal are smaller than they were eight years ago.

Parsons, Atchison, Council Grove, and Marion have barely held their population steady.

The only area of the state which largely escaped population losses was the southwest. Most of the counties in this area are ones which were the last


to have sod broken when the frontier moved west, and severa! have populations of little more than 3000.

But they have grown. Partly responsible has been the Hugoton gas field, a powerful economic factor in several counties. A huge boom in irrigation in the Scott City-Leoti-Ulysses-Sublette area has also primed growth.

Further north, irrigation and sugar beet growth has spurred Goodland and its neighbor Sharon Springs.

Small manufacturing has been promoted diligently in this area also, and the sum of gas fields, irrigation, industrial pro-

Little Volunteer Wheat Pasture

Only scattered fields of volunteer wheat in the western two-thirds of Kansas had made sufficient growth by mid-September to provide pasture for livestock, according to the Kansas Crop and Livestock Reporting Service.

The mid-September wheat pasture survey indicated that less than 12 percent of the 1968 harvested wheat acreage in the western two-thirds of the State

showed adequate volunteer growth for grazing.

Dry topsoil conditions over parts of western and central Kansas during August limited the growth of volunteer wheat; however, most of the western area received beneficial rains the latter part of August and again in early September. Many farmers and ranchers in the volunteer wheat pasture area have been or will be destroying volunteer wheat pasture in order to control woods and the spread of mosaic and Hessian

Greenbugs had been active in volunteer wheat and reduced the amount of forage available for grazing.

Volunteer Acreage Growth Above Last Year

By September 15, some 11.6 percent of the acreage harvested in 1968 had sufficient growth c.f volunteer wheat to use for pasture.

This compares with 4.2 percent a year earlier. Supplies of forage available on existing volunteer wheat acreage by mid-September were rated as fair. Livestockmen were grazing on a very small part of the available wheat pasture as most stockmen were awaiting further growth and development.



Water Into Perry Lake By January

Construction on the Perry Dam and Reservoir project is 73 per cent complete with 97 per cent of the work on the dam finished, according to Col. W. G. Kratz, Kansas City district Engineer with the Army Corps of Engineers.

Kratz said engineers plan to start letting the reservoir fill early next January. Based on past records, he said, there is a 30 per cent chance of the multipurpose pool being filled by July 1969; a 50 per cent chance by January 1970; a 75 per cent chance by June 1970 and a 90 per cent chance by September, 1971.

Kratz says the Corps of Engineers plans to advertise for concessionaires after sufficient water has been impounded for public use. He said the first concession site, on the east side of the reservoir near the dam, will probably be advertised after July 1, 1969.

The \$48 million project was initiated in 1964 and is expected to be completed in 1970. The project is credited with preventing flood damages in excess of \$10 million in June, 1967, during construction.



How Soybean, Corn Crops Stand

The corn and soybean crops are maturing rapidly. Some areas have been hurt by drouth, but yields per acre in most states will average higher than last year.

The soybean harvest has begun in most parts of Illinois; corn harvesting has begun in some areas. Quality and yields per acre are reported better than a year ago, though there are a few places where yields will be lower.

At the first of September, the USDA made a survey of farm. ers' views on the crops - also going into many fields to count and measure pods and ears. The findings were shown in the regular monthly crop report issued on September 10. Here are the high points from that report.

Soybeans: The soybean crop is estimated at 1080 million bushels — up 11 percent from last year. Most of this increased production is the result of larger yields per acre. The U.S. average yield is estimated at 26.4 bushels per acre. Such a yield would be 1.9 bushels more than last year, and 1 bushel more than the previous, record yield of two years ago.

Illinois, as usual, is the leading state in yield per acre and in the total production of soybeans. The average yield is estimated at 32 bushels per acre — 1 more than last year. Iowa is estimated at 30 bushels per acre — 3 more than a year ago; Missouri, 27 bushels per acre — 5 more than in 1967; Indiana, 29 bushels up 4.5 bushels; Minnesota, 24 bushels — also up 4.5 bushels; and Ohio, 29 bushels per acre -6.5 bushels more than last year. These higher yields in the Midwest more than offset reduced yields in Arkansas and other states.

According to the estimates in

the report, the 10 leading states in soybean production this year will be: (millions of bushels) 1. Illinois

2. Iowa 3. Missouri 4. Indiana
5. Arkansas
6. Minnesota 7. Ohio 8. Mississippi 9. Louisiana .

10. Tennessee The soybean crop now being harvested exceeds prospective use and exports by at least 10 percent — some market analysis say 15 percent.

Corn: In Early September, the USDA estimated the corn crop. at 4,636 million bushels - only 2 percent less than last year. More nitrogen and favorable weather offset most of the cuts in acreage under the government's Feed-Grain Program.

The average U.S. corn yield was estimated at 83 bushels per acre — 4.8 bushels more than the previous record high set just a year ago.

Illinois again leads in both yield per acre and in total pro duction of corn, with an estimated, state average yield of 103 bushels — 3 bushels more than a year ago. Total estimated production for Illinois is listed at 1057 million bushels - just 3 million bushels (3 percent) less than last year.

Iowa crop reporters show that state's average corn yield at \$ bushels — 10 bushels more than in 1967; Indiana, 97 bushels up 13 bushels; Minnesota, 83 bushels - up 11: and Ohio, 9 bushels — also up 11 bushels an acre. Of the "big five" com states, only Nebraska reports estimates of a poorer corn yield than last year. That state shows 71 bushels per acre — 2 bushels less than in 1967



General Election Pursuant to Article 14, Section 1 of the Constitution and in compliance with House Concurrent Resolution No. 1063, adopted by the legislature on March 7, 1968, a proposition will be submitted to the voters at the November 5, 1968, General Election for their approval or rejection to amend Section 2 of Article 4 of the Constitution as follows:

"Sec. 2. General elections and township elections shall be held biennially on the Tuesday succeeding the first Monday in November in the years bearing even numbers. All county and township officers shall hold their offices for a term of two years and until their successors are qualified: Provided, One county commissioner of three districts, numbered 1, 2, and 3, by the voters of the district, and the legislature shall fix the turn of election and the term of office of such commissioners; such election to be at a general election, and no term of eral election, and no term of office to exceed six years."







Twenty-one miles of the interstate route, from Brewster west to Goodland, is expected to open late next month. The final 18.6 miles to the Colorado border is now being graded, and surfacing is to be put down next summer.

When the 423-mile route is open all the way between Missouri and Kansas, the commission said it will apply a threeinch asphalt concrete overlay between Salina and Colby, and older concrete sections west of

A commission spokesman said this work will be accomplished between 1970 and 1974 without closing down the highway

The I70 route across Kansas includes a section which was built under the first contract in the nation let under funds authorized by the Interstate Highway Act.

This is an eight-mile section of two-lane concrete between Valencia and Maple Hill interchanges.







Originally, the House had approved a one-year extension of the basic program that does not expire until the end of next year, but added for the first time the payment limitation on a 230-160 vote.

The Senate had passed a 4year extension with no such restriction. There are no limitations on farm subsidy payments in the present law, which is designed to control production of wheat, feed grains, cotton and wool.

Rep. Page Belcher (R-Okla.) said the conference produced a good compromise in that the House had two amendments including the payment limitation — while the Senate had 17 changes in the basic program.

"That's like trading two Thoroughbred race horses for 17 mangy rats," snapped Rep. Silvio O. Conte (R-Mass.) author of the original House-imposed restriction on payments.

Conte argued that the American public was fed up with farm subsidies.



The cows haven't taken to grazing on mesquite, but they can survive on a hammer-knifed grind of mesquite trees and produce acceptable calves on that diet.

The test at Texas Tech, now in its eighth month, has been conducted by Ralph Durham.

The daily ration is 11/2 pounds of supplement, 1 pound of molasses, and 14 pounds of the mesquite - the entire tree chopped to sawdust-fine, hay-like feed.

The Holgus (Holstein-Angus) cross) cows used in the experiment were put on mesquite last spring. They were taken off the diet and put on range forage for four months and now are back on the mesquite feed.

The cows maintained their weight on the diet for two to three months before they calved. After calving they showed a sharp decline in flesh and weight.

At this time the grain concentrate in the diet was brought up to five pounds. On this diet they supported their calves for a minimum of 50 days before being put on the range forage.

No appreciable difference is apparent between the calves produced form these cows and those from cows on other diets, Durham said.

Of the five cows with which Durham started his study, two died, on aes a result of an abnormal calving. The other was found to have a high concentration of wood in the true stom-

The three survivors now are 30 days into their second 4month stint on the diet and "look good." They show vitality, a good coat and no appreciable weight loss.

Five steers, Angus-Hereford crosses, also are on the mesquite diet in Texas Tech pens.

Durham's goal in the investigation is to determine eventually if a rancher could break even on a program which would clear his land of brush and maintain his dry cows with the chopped growth.

The research is projected to the discovery of a type of bacteria which might be identified in the rumen of deer and goats to be implanted in the rumen of cattle to aid digestion.

"Since deer and goats consume brouse, the idea is perhaps that these animals may have some organisms which already are adapted to digesting fibrous material," Durham explained.

Durham said that some rumens from deer have been obtained and material from them de-







Hayes Beck, president of the district, said the federal portion of the plan includes 21 flood water retarding structures and a reservoir for water supply and recreation at Herington.



At the same time, one problem remained unresolved. This was whether French wheats were being offered below the I.G.A. minimums as has been charged in the U.S. and elsewhere. Schnittker said that he hoped this would be established and resolved at a meeting of the I.G.A.'s price review committee which will meet in London on Oct. 7.

He also said that the U.S. will hold meetings with the common market in Brussels on Oct. 9. These bi-lateral talks, he said, would cover a variety of topics but including France's wheat sales. The U.S. concern, he said, was over prices at which F.C.C. wheat, mainly French wheat, was being offered in Latin American and Asian markets.

Since freight rates have a big bearing on wheat prices, he said that the exporting countries also had agreed to provide the International Wheat Council, governing body for the I.G.A., with detailed data on freight rates. Concern has been expressed here, he noted, that the pricing of wheat "in some countries might be a little soft because of the problem of estimating freight rates."

Soybean Supplies Ballooning, But Not In Kansas

Soybeans stored in the State's farm and commercial storage facilities on September 1 totaled 973,000 bushels, according to the Kansas Crop and Livestock Reporting Service.

Of the soybeans on hand September 1 some 93,000 bushels were held in farm storages and 80,000 bushels were in off-farm storage facilities such as elevators and oilseed crushers.

The September 1 stocks of soybeans in Kansas were only about one-third the 2,897,000 bushels held in the combined on and off-farm grain storage positions on July 1 this year.

The July 1 stocks of soybeans included some 742,000 bushels stored on Kansas farms and 2,155,000 bushels held by elevators and crushers. The total soybean stocks on September 1 this year were less than half the 2,147,000 bushels held in all positions a year earlier.

Show New Facilities at Swine Industry Day

Industry Day at Kansas State University served as dedication for new swine research facilities on the campus in Manhattan. The new complex includes a farrowing and nursery building, finishing building, headquarters, and outside pens.

The hog facilities include some of the newest in laborsaving conveniences and management techniques, according to Dr. Berl A. Koch, swine researcher at KSU.

All hog areas are slatted concrete, poured in place, over liquid manure pits circulated and aerated by paddle wheels. The nursery is heated and the farrowing houses heated and air conditioned.

Those attending the event heard about swine research underway at K-State and listened to results of completed projects. Projects reported includ-

Heat Synchronization in Swine An experimental drug, Aimax, was effective in synchronizing estrus in a study of gilts. The drug suppressed estrus when fed for 20 days at the rate of 100 to 125 milligrams per head daily, and the animals returned to estrus 7 to 11 days after removal of Aimax from the feed. The gilts were slaughtered 25 to 30 days after mating, and researchers concluded that conception rate, number of ovulations, and number of live embryos present at slaughter were not different from that normally

dicated that 2,2-dichlorovinyl dimethyl phosphate (DDVP -Shell Dichlorvos) fed to pregnant sows late in gestation may have a favorable effect on new born pigs. This study was conducted in a commercial Kansas herd to attempt to measure any effect of the compound in terms of increased production or improved efficiency. Researchers concluded that feeding low levels of DDVP to pregnant sows for approximately the last 21 days of pregnancy did not have any apparent effect on pigs farrowed in the commercial herd.

Swine Ration Tests 1 One test examined effects of varying sorghum grain-soybean meal ratios and added methionine on swine gains, feed efficiency, and carcass composition and quality. Protein level tested had no effect on daily gain and feed efficiency; however, feed to gain ratio was most satisfactory on the 16 per cent and 13 percent protein rations. Ration did not strongly alter carcass composition.

2. Effect of protein level and added amino acids in sorghum grain - soybean meal rations were studied and results show that slowest gains were by pigs receiving 12 percent protein plus lysine and methionine, and most rapid gains were found for pigs receiving 16 percent protein. Carcass or backfat was not altered by ration, but loin eye area was improved by higher protein rations and by addition of lysine and methionine to the 13 percent protein ration.

3. In studies comparing corn and sorghum grain for growing finishing pigs, differences in either performance or carcass measurements were minor.

4. Progress was reported on a study of effects of heat and pressure processing of sorghum grain on performance of swine in growing and finishing phases. Average daily gains were greater for pigs receiving rations containing 40 and 60 percent levels of processed sorghum grain. Levels of up to 80 percent of the processed grain were used to replace sorghum grain portions of the rations.

5. The need for zinc in swine rations has been firmly established. In one study, growing-



Wheat Seeded From Plane

A Manhattan man who owns Comanche County farm near Protection, Kans., doesn't think the 150 acres he had sown from an airplane will qualify for federal crop support payments.

Merton Otto employed Clark Flying Service, Macksville, to perform the experiment, believed to be the first time a flying wheat drill has been used in the ccunty.

Approximately 150 acres of sorghum, being grown for silage, was seeded with the wheat. The theory is that when the corghum is harvested, the early wheat pasture will be ready for cattle to graze.

Otto's son, Dr. Louis K. Otto, an Arlington, Nebr. veterinarian, promoted the idea. Dr. Otto had seen the idea tried successfully in South Dakota while on a cattle buying trip there.

"I don't think the government will allow ASCS payments by cause it requires such crops to be seeded in a workmanlike manner'," Otto said. "Broadcas ing seed from the air doesn't lab in that classification."

The wheat was irrigated by sprinkler system as soon as was seeded.





'Soybean Honeymoon Over

Free trade policies in the world oil-seed market would solve many nutritional problems and allow the United States to compete more favorably in selling its huge production of soybeans, John A. Schnittker, undersecretary of agriculture,

"We do not support the view that the world is oversupplied with fats and oils and that therefore it should impose production or trade restraints," Schnittker said.

"When we look at the low levels of consumption in many areas of the world, we can see that oilseeds and products have a tremendous potential for solving some of the world's serious nutritional problems."

Schnittker's comments were made at a meeting of the International Association of Seed Crushers.

seed crop in the United States and play a major role in world production of meal and oil used both for livestock and human consumption.

"Clearly, the honeymoon is over for soybeans in the United States," Schnittker said, despite indications that the crop's supply and demand "will continue on a sound basis for many, many years to come."

But, he added, the United States seems to be at the end of a period during which soybeans could be used and exported without much difficulty.

Schnittker said there has been much talk about the need for an international arrangement for oilseeds. But, he said, fewer restraints on trade, rather than more, appear to be in

"Further, the United States could hardly subscribe to any

Soybeans are the leading oil. larrangement or agree to any action which would limit its export opportunities," Schnittker said.

Soybean production in the United States has increased tremendously in recent years, while some markets for its products have shrunk. This year's production is estimated at a record 1.1 billion bushels.

The department estimated this week that the September 1 carryover was 166.6 million bushels, compared with about 90 million bushels a year earlier.

Schnittker said a year from now the United States could have a carryover of about 300 million bushels, which would be "much larger than we like."

He said soybeans are a twopart crop of meal and oil and that each has its own supply and demand relationships, with each contributing to the bean price situation.

Domestic and foreign demand for soybean meal is strong, Schnittker said, but markets for oil are weak.

"Oil, to put it bluntly," is in deep trouble. Total world output of fats and oils last year set a new record of 39.3 million met-

"U.S. soybean oil prices, reflecting these generally heavy supplies, have been the lowest in five years."

Competition for soybean oil in the world market has come from other oil seeds, such as sunflower, rapeseed, safflower and flaxseed, Schnittker said.

But soybeans in the United States outrank all these as a farm crop. The government offers price supports to growers corrently an average of \$2.50 a





This year's number of all hogs and pigs on Kansas farms on September 1 and the pig crop for the June-August summer quarter were the highest in 14 years, according to the Kansas Livestock Reporting Service. Numbers of all hogs and pigs

on Kansas farms are estimated at 1,669,000 head, a gain of 7 percent from 1967.

The pig crop in Kansas for the past quarter totaled 569,000 head, 4 percent above 1967 and 19 percent above average. Sows farrowed during the past quarter totaled 74,000 head and pigs saved per litter averaged a record high 7.69.

Sows to farrow during the September-November quarter are forecast at 91,000 head, 6 percent above the same period last year and 30 percent above average.

For the December 1968-February 1969 quarter, prospective farrowings are 84,000 head, a 14 percent increase over a year earlier and 33 percent above the 5-year average.

Inventory numbers of 1,669,000

hogs and pigs on Kansas farms on September 1 include 242,000 head of breeding hogs and 1,427,000 head kept for market purposes.

The number of market hogs is 8 percent more than on the same date last year. The weight distribution for market hogs was as follows: 485,000 under 60 pounds; 343,000 in the 60-119 pound range; 328,000 weighed 120-179 pounds; 228,000 in the 180-219 pound group; and 43,000 weighed 220 pounds and over.

Corn Belt States

There were 47.1 million hogs and pigs on farms in the 10 Corn Belt States on September 1, 1 percent above a year ago but 1 percent less than the 5year average.

Inventory numbers on September 1 were larger than a year earlier in 6 of the 10 states.

The number of hogs and pigs kept for breeding on September 1 for the 10 states totaled 6,607,-

000 head, 5 percent above the 6,314,000 head a year earlier. Market hogs and pigs totaled 40,528,000 head, 1 percent higher than the 40,148,000 head on September 1, 1967. All of the increase in market hogs and pigs was in the under-60 pound group.

The June-August 1968 pig crop in the 10 states is estimated at 17,408,000 head, 5 percent above a year earlier. Sows farrowing in the 10 states during June-August 1968 totaled 2,355,-000 — also 5 percent above a year earlier.



not as profitable as 1966. However, cash receipts from farming including government payments of \$212 million amounted to \$1,711, million, second only to 1966. This resulted in an average realized gross income per farm of \$18,681 and a realized net of \$5,259.

This compares with a gross of \$18,772 and a net of \$6,036 in 1966. Thus while realized gross income per farm was only one percent less in 1967 than in 1966, realized net was 13 percent less. This reflects the substantial increase in production costs which in 1967 reached an all time high. Even then, however, the 1967

During the seven-year period 1961-67 the total investment in farming increased from \$7,010 and eggs to more beef cattle. At million to \$9350 million. This averages \$101,000 per farm. For the same period farm mortgage debt increased from \$338 million to \$615 million. Real estate taxes paid by farmers were \$88 million in 1967 compared with \$65 million in 1961.

The most substantial change which has taken place in Kansas agriculture in recent years has been the increasing importance of beef cattle. In 1940 they accounted for 31.8 percent of cash receipts from marketings. By 1966 this figure had risen to 49.3 percent. Hogs accounted for 8.7 percent in 1940 and 7.1 percent in 1966. During most of the interim period the percentage was lower than either fig-

Dairy products slumped from 12.4 percent in 1940 to 4.6 percent in 1966. Poultry and eggs declined even more. From 8.6 percent in 1940 they went to 1.7 percent in 1966. At present the number of beef cattle exceeds the number of chickens. However, the percentage of cash re-


