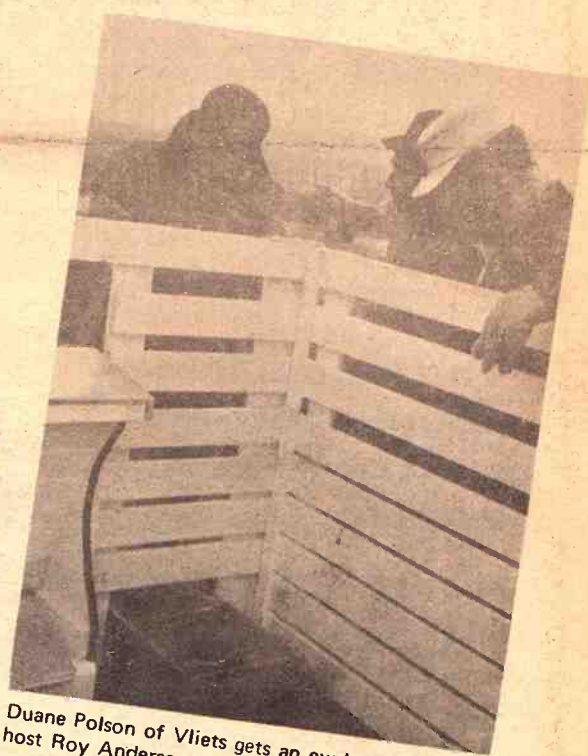

G&G area farm folk can't wait for the mud to dry out for activities to resume. Cattle found themselves belly-high in mud in the worst of the mudholes in feedlots, but still cattlemen had to feed them. Cattle were trucked in, and livestock auctions were held as usual.

The show must go on as well for other activities. One of several G&G area banks to promote ambitious farm tours is the Union State Bank at Clay Center. Its "livestock roundup" was held despite a rainy day and a winter's accumulation of thawed mud.

Set Seven Grain Schools

MANHATTAN — More than 1000 persons in the grain trade are expected to attend district grain grading schools at seven locations across Kansas next

month.

Now in their 20th year, the schools are designed to provide latest grading information to elevator managers and personnel, county ASCS bin inspectors, county Extension workers and interested producers.

Participants will have an opportunity to examine and grade grain samples during the workshop portion of each school. This year's program also will look at the new regulations under the U.S. Grain Standards Act which went into effect February 11.

Sponsors of the schools are the Kansas Extension Service, Kansas Wheat Improvement Association and the Kansas Grain and Feed Dealers Association.

Instructors include Haru Akiyama of USDA's Consumer & Marketing Service; Tom Roberts, Kansas Wheat Improvement Association; Howard Wilkins, K-State Extension agronomist; and Don D. Pretzer, K-State Extension economist.

Other representatives of the USDA and the Kansas Grain Inspection Department will help with the program.

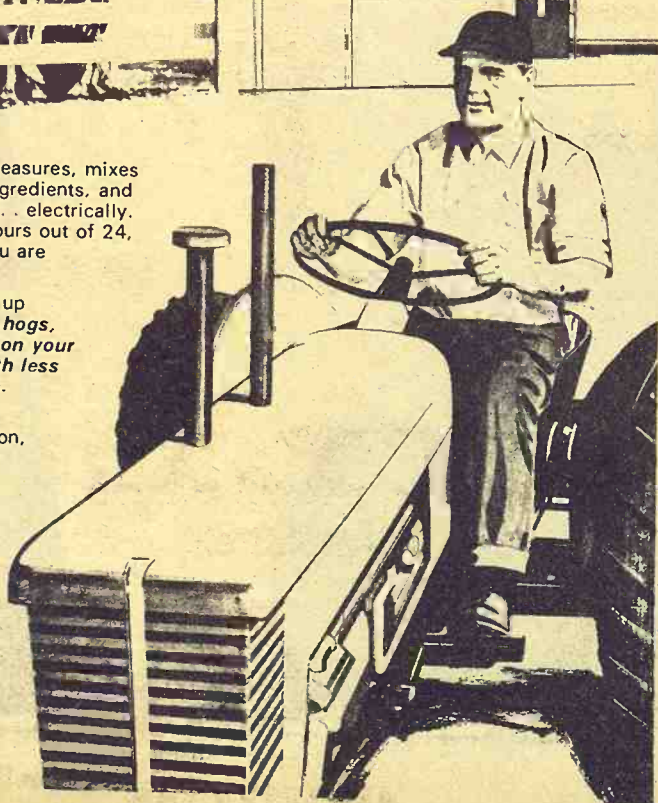

How far from the middle of a stream does the state own the land over which a stream runs?

The state doesn't own any of the land but by law it is considered to own the water. The land is owned by private individuals, who can use the water by application to the Chief Engineer of the Water Resources Board, State Board of Agriculture, Topeka.

The law on the subject is tricky and complicated. A book by Earl Shurtz, Professor of Law at the University, has been published by the Water Resources Board. It is called Kansas Water Law and covers the subject well.

Mixed Quarter
By Implements

The usually slow first quarter has produced mixed results for

three farm equipment makers.

Deere & Co. reported a profit of \$7 million on sales of \$204 million, up from first quarter sales of \$158 million a year ago, when a 6-week strike hit eight factories.

International Harvester had a net drop to \$6.3 million as sales dipped 6% from a year ago to \$520 million.

J. I. Case, controlled by Tenneco, Inc., posted a net loss of \$663,000, narrowed from the

year before's net loss of \$1.2 million. Sales climbed to \$78.3 million from \$70.8 million.

Deere said production of agricultural equipment was cut back, but dealers' inventories were still not reduced during the quarter.

International said one of its bright spots was a 6.3 percent increase in truck sales, which account for more than half of Harvester's annual volume.

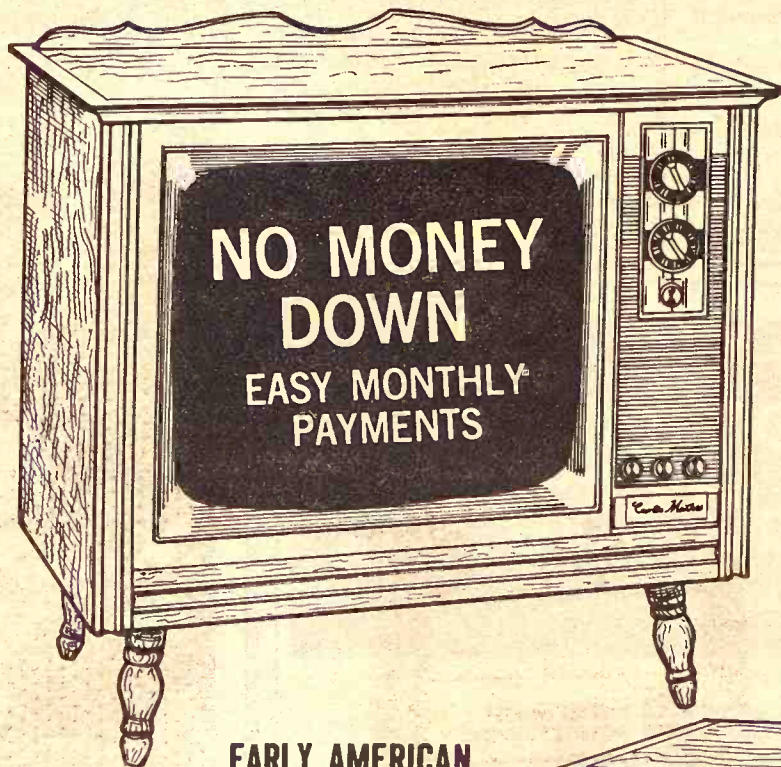

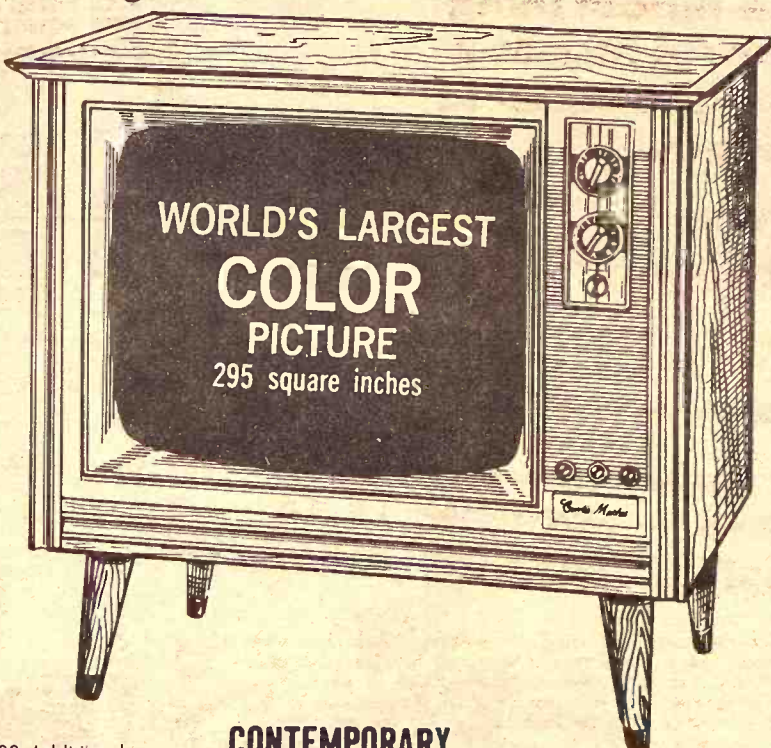

Church Rolls Waning

Church and synagogue membership in the United States reached a record high of 126,445,110 last year, according to the National Council of Churches, but it failed to keep pace with the population growth.

The council's 1969 Yearbook of American Churches reported that 64.4 per cent of the population was listed as belonging to a church or synagogue in 1967, but this fell off to 63.2 per cent in 1968, a decrease of 1.2 per cent.

Total church and synagogue

membership in 1967 was listed at 125,778,656. Thus, last year's gain of 666,454 represented an increase of less than 0.5 percent

Roman Catholic membership was placed at 47.5 million, a figure cited from the official Catholic directory for 1968. Synagogue membership was placed at 5.7 million, a figure from the American Jewish year book. The remaining 73.2 million church members were Protestant, Eastern Orthodox, and "other religious groups."

The Southern Baptist convention with slightly more than 11 million members and the United Methodist church with just under 11 million led all Protestant

denominations.

Following them, in descending order, were the National Baptist Convention, U.S.A., Inc., (Negro) with 5.5 million, the Episcopal church with 3.4 million, the United Presbyterian church with 3.3 million, the Lutheran church in America with 3.1 million and the Lutheran church-Missouri synod with 2.8 million.

Dr. Lauris B. Whitman, editor of the yearbook, said that while the statistics were the best available and came from official church records, they were far from infallible. Not all of the figures are current, he said, and many churches do not follow uniform procedures in collecting them.

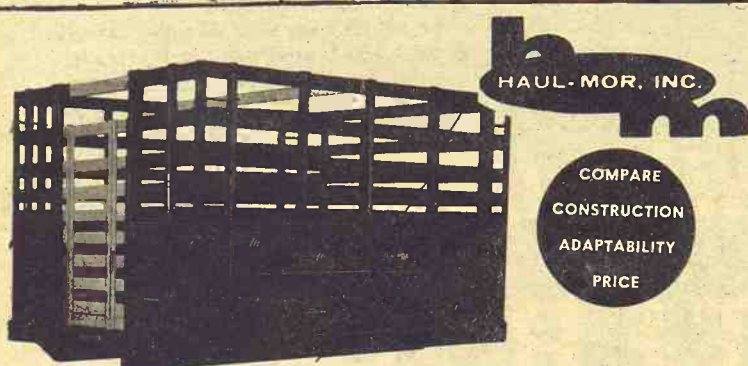

Nearly Buried In Dehy Pellets

Porter walked to an ambulance and was released after an examination at Lawrence Memorial hospital.

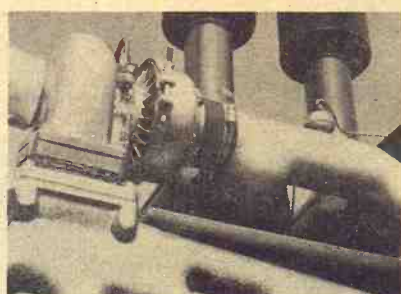

Are Beef Counts Accurate?

The question of how much beef farmers will produce this year is an important one for many farmers and ranchers, since they receive about \$10 billion a year from the sale of cattle and calves. Beef production in 1969 may be less than what seemed likely earlier, in view of figures recently compiled by the USDA.

The Department's report "Livestock and Poultry Inventory, January 1" shows only about 1 per cent more cattle on farms and ranches than at the beginning of 1968. Small increases in the number of beef cattle were nearly offset by reductions in the number of dairy cattle.

The total of all cattle and calves was listed at 109,661,000 — 0.5 per cent more than a year earlier. The number of beef cattle was 88,051,000 — 1 per cent more than last year. The number of dairy cattle was shown as 21,610,000 — about 3 per cent less than at the first of 1968.

Accuracy of the report. Farmers often ask about the accuracy of these figures. They are, of course, only estimates — not actual counts. But the estimates are made by experienced, conscientious statisticians using

scientific methods. The estimates are based largely on questionnaires mailed to and returned by farmer reporters.

We would plan on the estimates for cattle being accurate within 1 per cent. The actual figures might be off a little more than 1 per cent, but the change from the previous year, which is the most important thing, is probably accurate within 1 per cent.

Steers, heifers, and calves. The number of steers on hand January 1 was estimated at

12,823,000 — up not quite 1 per cent from a year before. The number of beef heifers was listed at 9,303,000 — the same as last year. The number of calves (not being kept for milking) was estimated at 27,920,000 — up a little more than 1 per cent.

The number of steers and beef heifers and calves combined totaled 50,046,000 — up 1 per cent from the previous year. At the same time (January 1), the number of cattle on feed was estimated at 12,579,000 — 10 per cent more than last year.

Supply for replacements. How many cattle did that leave outside of feedlots — to be put into feedlots later this year and in 1970? We can get one answer to this question by adding the number of steers and beef heifers and calves on hand, then subtracting the number of cattle in feedlots. Doing this shows that the number of steers, heifers, and calves not on feed

January 1 was around 37.5 million — 2 per cent less than a year earlier.

Conclusions. What useful conclusions can we draw from these figures? What can cattle feeders expect during the remainder of 1969 and in 1970?

1. Marketings of fed cattle may exceed 1968 levels by around 5 per cent during the first half of this year.

2. The number of cattle available for replacements probably is no greater than the figure for last year.

3. Since feedlot capacity is

considerably larger than it was a year ago, there will be a strong demand for the limited supply of cattle that is available for feeding. Prices will be higher than in 1968 — if the market for finished cattle holds up.

4. The next 90 days will be a critical testing time for the fat cattle market. If we get through this period without a large price decline, prices should hold fairly steady during the summer and fall.

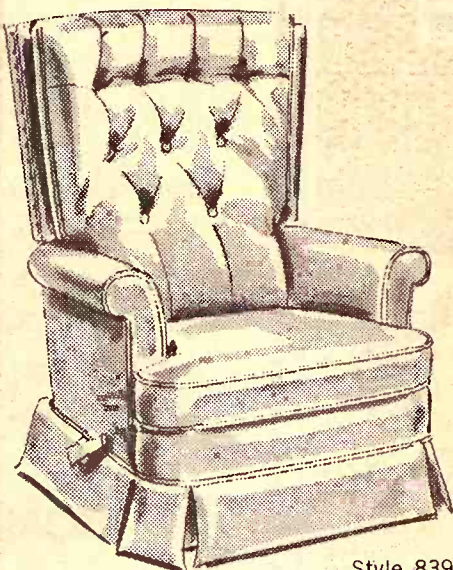

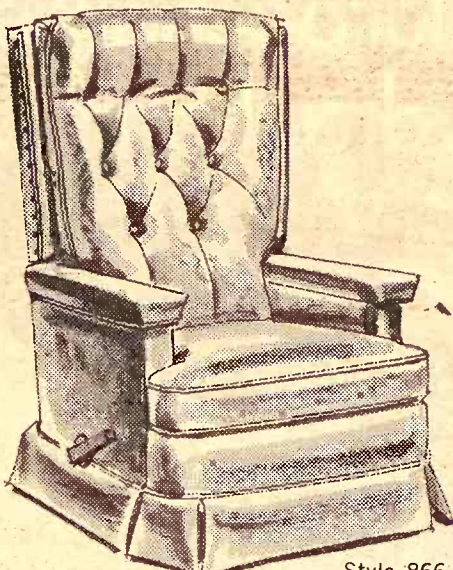

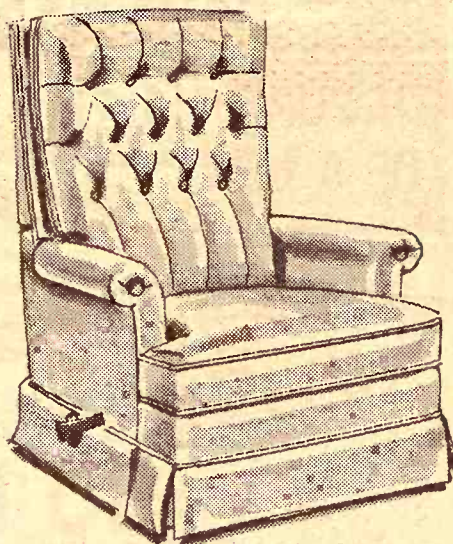

Smallest Milk Output On Record

Milk production in Kansas in 1968 decreased slightly from a year earlier and was the smallest in 45 years of record, according to the Kansas Crop and Livestock Reporting Service.

Milk production totaled 1,717 million pounds compared with the 1967 production of 1,724 million pounds and a range from 1,738 million pounds to 2,182 million pounds in the preceding decade.

Milk cow numbers continued the downward trend of the past

quarter century and averaged 212,000 head on farms in 1968 compared with 221,000 head in 1967.

Annual production per cow continued to increase and set a record high of 8,100 pounds for 1968 which was 4 per cent above the previous year and about 1½ times that a decade earlier.

The number of cows and heifers two years old and over kept for milk (including some heifers not yet fresh) on January 1, 1969 was 225,000 head

compared with 240,000 head a year earlier. The number of yearling heifers kept for milk cows decreased 4 per cent to 50,000 head on January 1, 1969. Heifer calves under one year old saved for dairy herd replacements totaled 52,000 head compared with 54,000 head a year earlier.

Manufactured Dairy Products

Preliminary estimates for 1968 indicate a decrease in the production of creamery butter in Kansas but an increase in American cheese and ice cream production.

Manufactured dairy production normally represents slightly less than half of the State's milk production.

Creamery butter production, at 19.2 million pounds in 1968, was 6 per cent below the 1967 output. American cheese production, at 22.6 million pounds, was up 12 per cent from 1967.

Ice cream production in 1968, at 7.2 million gallons, was up 26 per cent from the 5.7 million gallons in 1967.

National Grange Asks Soybean Acreage Cut

The National Grange has urged Agriculture Secretary Clifford M. Hardin to offer farmers a voluntary acreage-reduction program for soybeans instead of reducing government price supports as recommended by some.

John W. Scott, master of the Grange, said he wrote Hardin a letter outlining the plan, which included continuation of the price support loan level at \$2.50 a bushel, an acreage reduction of seven per cent based on 1967-68 plantings, and, where applica-

ble, participation in 1969 federal programs for wheat and feed grains.

Scott said that in the past any reduction in price support loan levels has caused an increase in crop production, not a decrease.

The Agriculture Department expects to announce the 1969 soybean price support loan rate about March 1.

RED ANGUS DIVISION IN NATL. BEEF SHOW

Red Angus will have their own division at the 1969 National Beef Show in July at Cedar Rapids, Iowa. This is the first steer and carcass show in the Midwest to offer a Red Angus division.

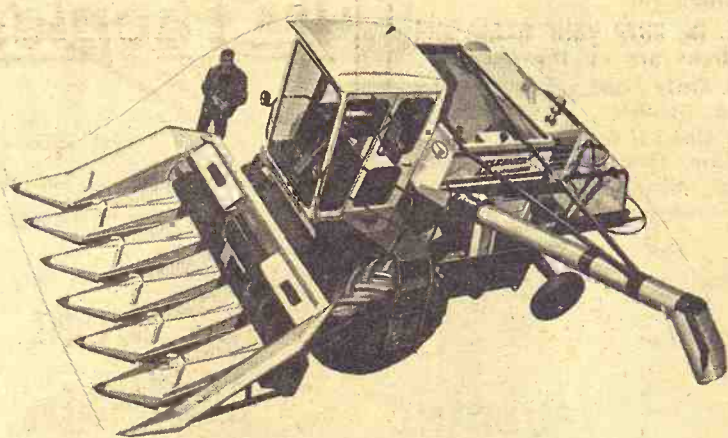

Lincolnvill Cook, Mrs. Ernest Bezdek, Is Winner

Mrs. Ernest W. Bezdek of Lincolnvill wins the prize with the following recipe:

SWIRLED CAKE

- 1 18 1/2-ounce package yellow cake mix
- 1 3/4-ounce package instant lemon pudding
- 1/2 cup soft margarine
- 1 cup dairy sour cream
- 4 eggs
- 1 teaspoon vanilla
- 1/2 cup brown sugar, packed
- 2 teaspoon cinnamon
- 1/4 teaspoon nutmeg
- 1/2 cup chopped nuts
- 1 greased tube pan

In a large mixing bowl combine cake and pudding mixes, margarine, sour cream, eggs and vanilla. Beat ten minutes, scraping the batter from the sides of the bowl frequently. Batter will be stiff like whipped cream. In small bowl combine brown sugar, cinnamon, nutmeg and nuts. Mix with fork or crumble with hands being sure the brown sugar is not lumpy. Pour half of batter into the greased tube pan. Sprinkle half the sugar, spice and nut mixture over the batter. Add the remaining batter, then the remaining sugar, spice and nut mixture. With a knife swirl the mixture through the batter. Bake at 350 degrees for one hour. Remove cake from oven and let stand in the pan 30 minutes. Remove from pan and finish cooling on rack. Requires no frosting. Freezes well. Ideal in lunch pails and for picnics. A good keeper, also.

The cooks who own blenders will enjoy the following recipe:

HAMBURGER SOUP

- 1 1-pound 12-ounce can (3 1/2 cups) tomatoes
- 2 cans condensed consommé
- 2 cups water
- 1 medium onion, quartered
- 4 carrots, cut up
- 4 celery tops
- 4 large sprigs parsley
- 10 peppercorns
- 1 1/2 pounds ground beef
- 3 tablespoons salad oil
- 1 bay leaf
- 2 teaspoons salt
- 1/4 teaspoon pepper
- 1/2 teaspoon sugar
- 1/2 teaspoon tabasco

Combine tomatoes, consommé, water, onion, carrots, celery tops, parsley and peppercorns

in a large saucepan; simmer, covered, for 25 minutes. Put half of mixture in blender container; cover and run on speed six or high for one minute or until vegetables are pureed. Empty into large saucepan. Repeat process with remaining soup. Meanwhile, brown meat in oil, breaking it apart as it cooks. Add to soup with remaining seasonings; cover and simmer 20 minutes. Makes 10-12 servings. Note: For more flavor, add 2 potatoes and more hamburger.

- 1 1/2 cups egg whites
- 1/4 cup cold water

- 1/4 teaspoon salt

Beat until foamy. Add 1 1/2 teaspoons cream of tartar. Beat until stiff but not dry. Beat in 1 cup sugar in 4 parts. Fold in 1 1/4 cups sifted cake flour, 1/4 cup cocoa and 1 cup sugar (these should be sifted together four times before adding). Bake 40 minutes at 350 degrees.

Strong Switch To Greater Anhydrous Usage

Fertilizer sales in Kansas continue to set records.

The fall fertilizing season produced commercial sales of 445,799 tons, about 7% more than the total in the last six months of 1967.

The increase can be principally attributed to gains in the sale of anhydrous ammonia, which increased by 65% to 81,470 tons. There were large rates of increase on smaller tonnage of liquid mixed fertilizer and potash. Sales were lower for the fall season on liquid nitrogen, urea, and dry mixed fertilizer. There were gains, but more modest ones, on ammonia nitrate.

Fertilizer grades with substantial increases included 8-32-

16, 16-48-0, and 13-52-0.

Slightly more than half of the tonnage was in actual plant nutrients, which totalled 243,860 tons. This was up 24,658 tons from the previous fall. Nitrogen sales totalled 139,477 tons, an increase of 23,480 tons; available phosphoric acid sales, at 91,831 tons, were down 858 tons.

Sumner county led the state in fertilizer sales with a total of 18,509 tons, followed by Sedgwick with 17,994; Reno, 16,499; McPherson 13,231; Harvey 10,889; and Crawford 10,689. Tonnage figures by counties repre-

sent reports of sales to dealers and others and do not necessarily imply actual usage in that county.

Management Expert John Coolidge Retires

John H. Coolidge of Kansas State University, Manhattan, has closed out a career of more than 41 years of service. He is best known as head of the Farm Management Association program and for his work in farm income tax education.

Coolidge joined the Kansas Cooperative Extension Service in 1926 as county agricultural agent in Gray county. He became fieldman with the Farm Management Association in 1932 at a time when the program included only two fieldmen and 300 farmer members.

He moved to the state staff in Manhattan in 1940 as Extension economist and head of the Associational program. Under his leadership, the program expanded to include 20 fieldmen who provide farm record service, business analysis and management counseling for more than 3,400 farmers across the state.

Coolidge is recognized as one of the nation's foremost authorities on farm income tax reporting. He is one of four economists who annually advise the Internal Revenue Service in Washington, D. C., on farm income tax regulations and procedures.

For the past 20 years he has directed tax institutes at several locations across the state. These workshops train more than 1,500 tax practitioners in tax laws, counseling and tax reporting each year.

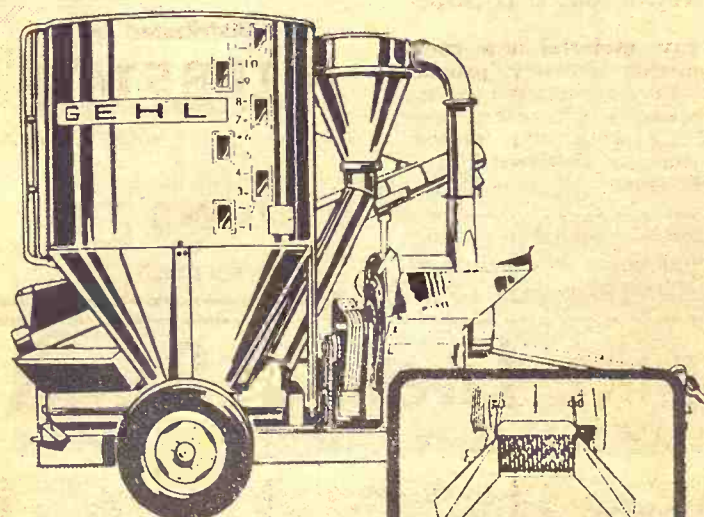

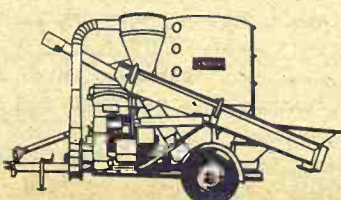

White Corn Hits \$2

A farmer who has some white corn is in a rare spot. He can sell it for \$2.

At Kansas City and buying points in the G&G area, white corn passed the \$2 mark during the last two weeks of February.

Not a great deal has been sold at that price, but it is clear there is a substantial premium

on white corn, used mainly for food products such as hominy, meal or grits. Yellow corn, used mainly as hog feed, has been selling for around \$1.20 or less.

There are no specific crop reports on white corn, so the grain trade has no measure of the supply except as to the price it takes to get the grain to terminal markets.

Some grain trade sources say there are efforts to import white corn from Mexico or even as far away as South Africa. If such a source were opened up, or if there were a sudden appearance of domestic stores, the price presumably could drop abruptly.

Woodmen Touting Own Growth

READY FOR INDUSTRY — Kansas can now compete strongly for industries related to forestry, thanks to a recent inventory that pinpoints the commercial potential of the state's woodlands. A just-published report of the statewide inventory shows that Kansas has the forestry resources needed to provide a continual supply of raw materials for a sizeable number of wood processing and manufacturing plants and other forest-related industries seeking sites for location, relocation or expansion.

John Strickler (left), associate state extension forester at Kansas State University, Manhattan, who supervised the inventory and co-authored the report, shows K-State President James A. McCain a method used by foresters to determine a tree's wood volume. The tree shown here is a hackberry which produces a high grade lumber used in the manufacture of furniture. Hackberry is only one of a number of Kansas species desired by forestry-related industries. Among others are black walnut (Kansas ranks second in the nation in the production of walnut logs used by domestic veneer mills), ash, bur oak, pecan, soft maple and cottonwood.

Except for cottonwood, these trees are among the most highly-valued and sought-after hardwood species in the United States. Strickler points out, however, that the cottonwood is recognized nationally as the hardwood with the greatest future economic potential because of its fast growth rate. It is particularly useful in pulpmill operations.

Industries using wood as a basic raw material now comprise the state's ninth largest manufacturing industry, providing nearly 6,000 jobs. McCain and State Forester Harold Gallaher, two of many Kansans who helped launch a forestry program for the state in the 1950's, predict a rapid growth for the Kansas wood products industry now that its resources have been scientifically evaluated for the first time.

ALON SUCCESSOR NOW BANKRUPT ALSO

Holders of stock in the former Alon, Inc., which had a factory which produced 2-place air-coupees at McPherson before the company was absorbed by Mooney Corporation, another manufacturer of small aircraft, settled for about 15 cents for every dollar invested. Last week they noted the bankruptcy proceedings filed by Mooney.

More Local Taxes For Conservation?

TOPEKA — The House last week passed a bill which would raise from \$3000 to \$5000 the amount a county can raise by taxes for support of a soil conservation district.

The bill has had some opposition, passing by 77-36. The Senate must pass upon the bill before it becomes law.

Lid On Market Value Cost

The Agriculture department says a "market basket" list of food which cost consumers \$1080 in 1967 and \$983 a decade earlier rose to a record retail price of \$1,118 last year and will continue to rise in 1969.

But department economists say this year's increase probably won't be as large as the 3.5 percent boost in 1968. The outlook was contained in a report on the costs of marketing food.

The department said the market basket increase last year — \$38 — included a \$20 boost in farm value and \$18 more in the processing, transportation and other marketing costs involved in moving food from farms to grocers' shelves. The farmer's share of the consumer food dollar last year edged up slightly to 39 cents from 38 in 1967. The 1957-59 average is 39 cents, and since 1960 has been more in only one year — 40 cents in 1966.

Officials said the farm value of market basket food is not expected to change much this year, but that costs of marketing will be higher, accounting for another over-all gain in price to consumers.

The market basket guide is based on a year's purchases of farm-produced food items for an average household. It does not include all food consumed, such as at restaurants, seafood and imported items. On a yearly total basis, market basket food in 1968 had a farm value of \$434, compared with \$14 in 1967, while

other costs involved in getting it to consumers was \$684, compared with \$666 a year earlier.

Climate Twist Possible If Arctic Ice Melts

March 4, 1969

Is the Arctic pack ice thinning so that the ocean at the North Pole may become an open sea in a decade or two?

One who thinks so is Col. Bernt Balchen, polar explorer and flier, who thinks that the progressive shrinkage of the Arctic pack ice over the last century will continue. There are other polar experts who think that the situation has now reversed itself, at least temporarily.

If the Arctic would become open sea, many experts predict catastrophic climate changes. Storm paths could change; food-producing area of the central U. S. and Eurasia could become deserts.

Many specialists believe that

an ice-free Arctic ocean would not freeze again. If the ocean were free of ice, storm paths, some think, would move further north, depriving the plains of North America and Central Eurasia of rainfall. Winds blowing off the Arctic ocean would become moist, and snowfall on mountains in the paths of those winds would be almost continuous.

This would start the formation of ice sheets such as those that several times have flowed south across North America and Eurasia.

The Arctic pack is a thick crust of ice over a deep ocean. Thus, it differs basically from the Antarctic ice sheet, which rests on a lofty continent. Whereas melting of the Antarctic ice — or slippage of part of it into the seas — would raise sea levels throughout the world by many feet, the melting of the floating ice of the Arctic would have no such effect.

This is because floating ice displaces just as much water as the water produced when the ice melts. When ice cubes in a glass melt, for example, the water level does not rise. Warm Gulf Stream water flows into the Arctic ocean from the Atlantic and a lesser amount of heat is also carried in from the Pacific thru the Bering strait.

At depths below 500 feet, the Arctic ocean is underlain by a layer of warm water, 2500 feet thick. Its surface would also be

warmer, were it not for its covering of ice, which on the average is a few yards thick. The North Pole region receives more solar heat in summer months than do the tropics, since the sun shines on it day and night.

The brilliant white surface of the pack reflects almost all of this energy back into space, but if the pack were gone, the water would absorb much of it. Thus, some scientists believe the ocean would not freeze again, even in winter, once the pack had disappeared.

Those who think the pack is thinning rapidly cite a report by Fridtjof Nansen from 1893 that the pack was 43 feet thick. Balchen cites a succession of reports indicating a steady thinning of the pack that, the data suggest, could vanish by 1990 or sooner.

The weakness in drawing conclusions from old ice thickness, say some scientists, is the pack varies widely in thickness in terms of season and location. Newly frozen leads, or channels, between the floes may be only a few inches thick.

Yet, in the Central Arctic, particularly where the circular

drift of the ice has subjected it to great compression, the floes become rugged conglomerations many yards in thickness.

Soviet scientists reportedly agree with their American colleagues that the warming trend in the Arctic has shifted to a slow cooling.

The Russians, because of their dependence on sea routes to ports along their Arctic coastline keep the closest watch of anyone on weather trends and the drifting pack ice of the Arctic ocean.

Nevertheless, many Russian and American scientists agree with Balchen, a retired air force officer who flew Admiral Byrd

to the South Pole in the 1920s, that the ice cover of that ocean is "vulnerable."

A moderate increase in solar heat production or a change in transparency of the atmosphere (man-made or natural) could remove the ice.

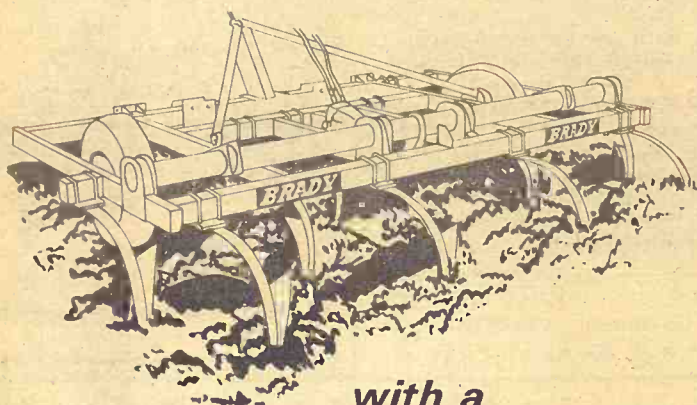

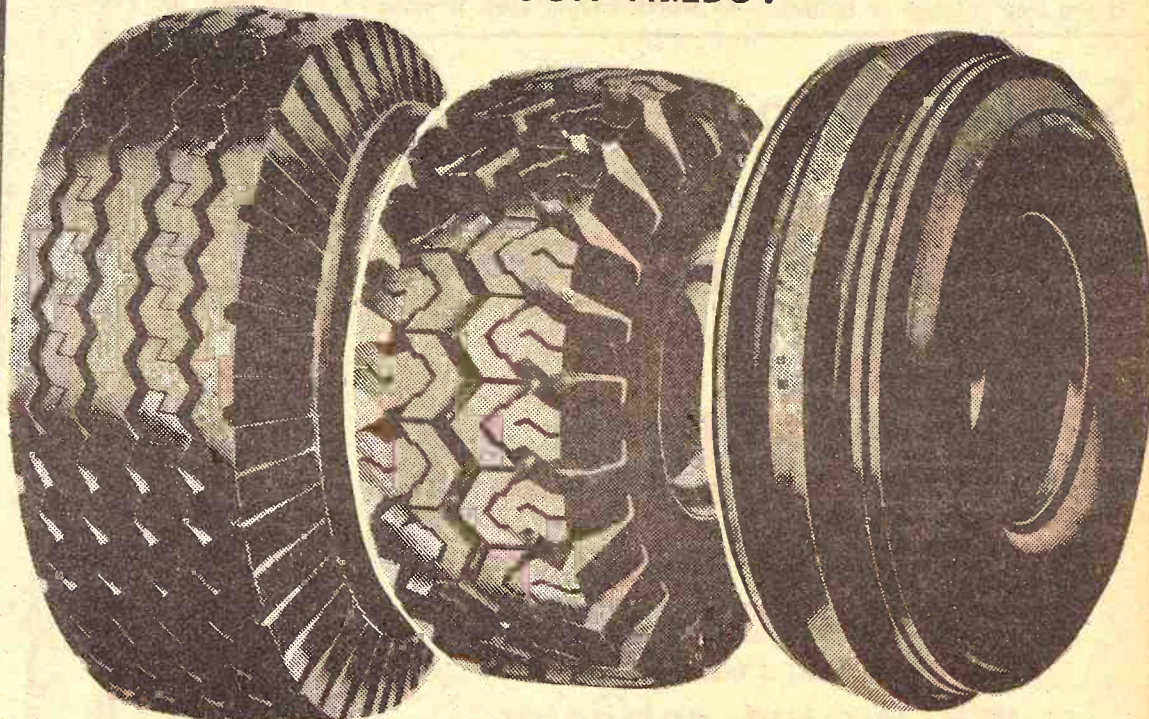

How To Prune Storm-Damaged Trees

How do you prune and repair storm damaged trees & shrubs?

James J. Nighswonger, Extension landscape architect at Kansas State University, indicates that the answer to this question depends upon three factors — the size of the damaged tree, the extent of the damage, and the nature of the damage.

If the tree is large or if limb

breakage has occurred high on the tree, don't attempt to repair it yourself. Hire a trained arborist to do the job. Limit your own repair work to small trees and damaged limbs near the ground.

If the main trunk and scaffold (supporting) branches are still intact, the tree will usually be worth saving even if severe

top damage has occurred. However if the tree is split down the middle, uprooted, badly twisted, and broken up, then you probably should remove it.

When removing broken, torn or split limbs, always remove the limb completely. Leave as short a stub as possible. The limb should be removed back to its point of attachment. After

shaping the cut, paint the edges of the wound with white shellac. Then paint the entire wound with a tree wound dressing, available at lawn and garden supply stores.

"Topping or dehorning may be necessary if severe top damage has occurred," Nighswonger says. "This method of pruning leaves large stubs, subject

to decay, so top a branch only when absolutely necessary. Do not top or dehorn undamaged, slightly damaged limbs. Leave them alone even when nearby ones require topping."

Bolting or cabling will sometimes aid greatly in repairing badly damaged tree. A trained arborist with the proper tools can do this work.

"If your shrubs have been damaged extensively, remove all broken canes," the K-State landscape architect advises. "With tree branches, remove them completely. Do not leave stubs. If the shrubs are severely damaged, cut the canes off at ground level. Most deciduous shrubs have a remarkable ability to grow back."

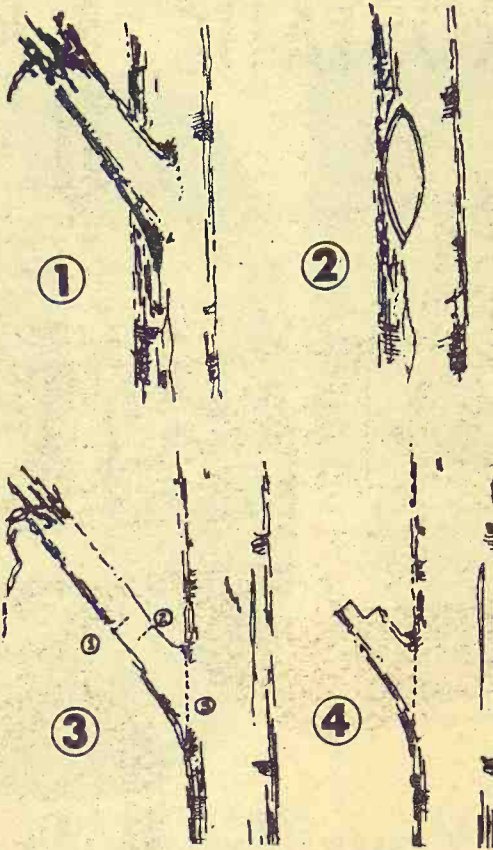

Won't Tell Sites Of Big Farm Center Promotion

The locations of 10 sites for huge agribusiness centers have been chosen, but National Farm Stores Inc. of Minneapolis, Minn., says it isn't telling another 30 days.

The big farm supply centers each to be built on a 40-acre site around a livestock auction will have tenants supplying feed, animal health supplies, financing, and other segments of agribusiness.

The livestock markets are to be built by the Competitive Livestock Markets Corp. of Kansas City, an association of country livestock auctions. Financing of the farm centers thru Litton Industries.

Promoters of the farm centers are predicting each livestock auction would have annual sales of around \$10 million and the other affiliated stores in the center would gross around \$2 million per year.

By The Drink, Or Not At All?

The chances for Kansans to vote in 1970 on liquor by the drink have been built up by a ruling of the Kansas attorney general, who held that amendments for prohibition and liquor by the drink could go on the same ballot.

The opinion was requested by Sen. Glee Smith Jr., president pro tem of the Senate, who asked Frizzell whether there was any constitutional ban on conflicting amendments being submitted in the same election.

"Under our constitution and the authorities cited," Frizzell replied, "we find no constitutional objection to both propositions being placed on the same ballot."

In his opinion, Frizzell referred to two resolutions pending in the Legislature.

One is a concurrent resolution pending in the Senate to submit the question of a constitutional amendment to permit the sale of liquor by the drink. The other is a resolution introduced in the House by Rep. John Bower (R-McLouth) to allow a vote on a constitutional amendment to return Kansas to prohibition.

Senator Smith said after he had received the opinion from the attorney general that he believed it would be a good idea for the Legislature to submit both amendments to the voters in the coming election.

"That way there could be no question about the matter in how either House or Senate members vote on the resolutions," Senator Smith said. "The voters could express their opinion by voting for whichever one they were for and against the other."

Proponents of an election on the sale of liquor by the drink have supported submitting both amendments to insure that the question of liquor by the drink gets on the ballot.

They have pointed out that some House and Senate mem-

bers might be reluctant to submit an amendment only on a quorum by the drink, and would be more inclined to submit both to the voters in 1970.

The concept was first proposed at a press conference two weeks ago by Henry Parkinson, Wichita public relations man, who is the lobbyist for a group of Kansans who seek an election on liquor by the drink.

\$17 Million Lost In Missing Wheat Sales To Japan

The Agriculture Department estimates that 17 million dollars in farm export trade was lost because of a recent Japanese embargo on U.S. wheat.

Japan imposed the ban in November after receiving shipments of sprout-damaged wheat from the United States. After two months of negotiations, Japan resumed buying U.S. grain and the United States agreed to give that country about 500,000 bushels of new wheat to offset the loss.

Total cost of the wheat gift was about \$750,000 with the grain trade paying \$250,000 and the federal government \$500,000.

In a report released by the foreign agricultural service, the department estimated U.S. trade loss with Japan during the two months at between 10 million and 12 million bushels of wheat valued at around 11 million dollars.

Also, Japan turned to Australia heavily during December, buying 13,100,000 bushels of wheat in the month — more than Australia sold Japan in all of 1965 and nearly equal to 1966 sales, the report said.

"Now that trade has resumed we are hopeful of regaining some of this loss in the months ahead," the department said.

The sprouted wheat was attributed to wet harvest conditions in the Pacific Northwest, which produces most of the U.S. wheat sold to Japan. In many cases, officials said, sprout damage is not visible and requires laboratory examination.

Japan now requires a maximum tolerance of one-half of one per cent in sprout-damaged wheat kernels as part of the agreement to resume buying U.S. wheat.

U.S. grain standards include sprout-damaged wheat in an over-all category limiting damaged grain to 2 per cent.

Department officials said that "the question of invisible damage exists," but since there are no quick and easy tests readily available for handling of large export shipments the matter deserves more study before a change in the present inspection standards is recommended.

In the meantime, the department said, extensive crop sampling and testing of the 1969 wheat crop in the Pacific Northwest will be conducted.

800 Acres Brings \$114,800

Food From The Sky

Food from the sky was delivered to this small herd of wild mustangs on a rocky Western Nevada ridge. The animals had climbed to the 9000-foot level to escape shoulder-deep snow on their usual winter range and they were well above their winter food supply. Ranchers discovered their plight and organized a helicopter haylift.

Initial Report On Signup For Milo Program

The Agriculture Department says farmers agreed to cut back 1969 feed grain production by more than 14,600,000 acres during the first three weeks of the annual signup period for government crop-adjustment programs.

The department hopes to reduce this year's crops of corn, sorghum grain and barley by about 37 million acres, compared to 32,400,000 idled under the program last year.

Farmers have until March 21 to sign up in this year's federal programs for feed grains, wheat and cotton. The recent figures were for signups thru February 21.

Under the program, feed grain producers must reduce their base acreage by 20 percent to qualify for government price-support loans. In addition, producers may retire additional acreage and receive direct payments.

The department said that of the total feed grains acreage diverted so far, about 8,900,000 acres were additional diversions for payments.

The wheat acreage signup during the first three weeks totaled 12,800,000 acres of the 1969 national allotment of 51,600,000, the department said.

This year's wheat allotment is 13 per cent less than the 59,300,000 million acres permitted under the program in 1968. Additionally, the department hopes farmers will divert another 5 per cent — perhaps as much as three million acres — from production in return for direct compensatory payments.

Cost of Big Nigerian Power Dam Illustrates Growing Pains Of Africa

A new \$266 million dam across the Niger river illustrates the gap between the dream and reality of development in Africa.

The Kainji Dam is the largest power project in West Africa, but its cost was 40% greater than anticipated, the \$14 million a year interest to the World Bank is a staggering obstacle for Nigeria, and its output is

greater than the country will likely need for many years.

So far, Nigeria has tapped the dam for only a third of its potential capacity, and the Nigerians are not even getting cheaper power than they had before the Kainji was built.

Already reeling from a 20-month civil war in Biafra, the Nigerian economy is in little shape to pay for the dam. When

the east seceded as Biafra, it was cut off the power grid. Consumption dropped 30 to 50 percent. The war has drastically altered power-use predictions, so that economists will no longer even try to predict when the country can use all the power available from Kainji.

Secessionists claimed that the east did not need Kainji power because it was rich in natural gas. They contended that a north-dominated central government wanted to use money from Eastern oil to build a dam to

March 4, 1969

benefit the north.

The dam displaced 50,000 northerners for whom 117 new villages were built. It will provide the dry north with a 480-square mile lake. Its potential catch of fish is estimated at 10,000 tons annually. It also will provide irrigation and control the flow of the Niger, making it more navigable than ever. But most of the power will be furnished to the south.

Three Area Counties Get Pilot Food Programs For Needy

Kansas State University's Cooperative Extension Service is now offering a new educational program designed to help limited income families in three selected Kansas counties cope with problems of using family

income to the best advantage in buying food and preparing nutritious meals.

Dr. Robert A. Bohannon, director of the KSU Extension Service, announced today that special United States Department of Agriculture funds have been offered to Kansas to "help families get more for the dollars they spend for food and other necessities."

The USDA money being used in this expanded Extension effort comes from fees and duties levied against the imports of agricultural products from other countries. The money is available to the Cooperative Extension Service on a national basis. The Kansas share is based upon the number of families in the state with limited incomes (less than \$3000 annual income).

The special \$105,000 grant allocated to Kansas for the first six months of 1969 will be used to employ a corps of neighborhood KSU Extension aides in

three pilot counties — Crawford, Douglas, and Sedgwick.

"Everyone knows that the cost of living continues to rise," Dr. Bohannon points out, "and higher costs are putting a real squeeze on many Kansas families who must get along on modest incomes."

The Extension Service now has a new opportunity to assist some of these families in stretching their incomes as far as possible. If our efforts are successful in these three pilot counties, we may be able to expand our program into other counties after July 1."

As with other K-State Extension programs, this nutritional project will be locally oriented and will be directed by the local county Extension staff with the approval and guidance of the local county Extension board.

Similar projects in other states have shown that people in low income areas will often accept new food buying ideas that come from a resourceful neighbor who has similar budget problems. So Extension personnel in the three pilot counties are now in the process of hiring a group of five or more of these full-time KSU Extension aides to carry out the nutrition program.

The KSU Extension aides will work directly with limited income families in their own neighborhoods by suggesting ways to improve skills in shopping, selecting food, planning meals, and using available commodities.

When time permits, the in-the-home advice may also include money management, shopping for credit, buying clothing for the family, especially for children, and low-cost ways to improve housing.

KSU Extension aides will be under the direct supervision of Mrs. Juanita B. Johnson, Crawford County Extension home economist, Girard; Mrs. Oletha L. Blevins, Douglas County Extension home economist, Lawrence; and Mrs. Ruby C. Truax and Mrs. R. Jean Hodges, Sedgwick County assistant home economists, Wichita.

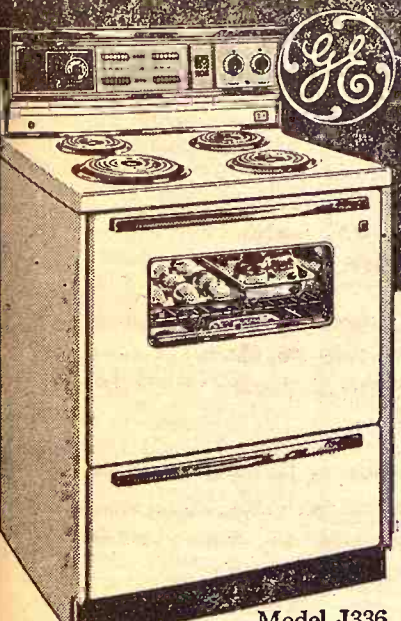

"This new foods and nutrition program is an example of the expanding educational role that Kansas State University's Extension Service has accepted in order to be of greater service to all the people of Kansas," Dr. Bohannon emphasizes. "As always, our major educational goal is to 'help people help themselves.'"

Go Ahead On New Grades For Feeder Pigs

The U.S. Department of Agriculture on Feb. 20 announced the adoption of revised standards for grades of feeder pigs effective April 1.

The new standards coordinate the grades for feeder pigs with the 1968 revision in the grades for slaughter swine and for barrow and gilt carcasses. Essentially, the standards are the same as those proposed on Nov. 22, 1968, according to USDA officials.

A few minor revisions, based on comments received by USDA on the proposal, were made to aid clarity and uniformity in interpretation of the standards.

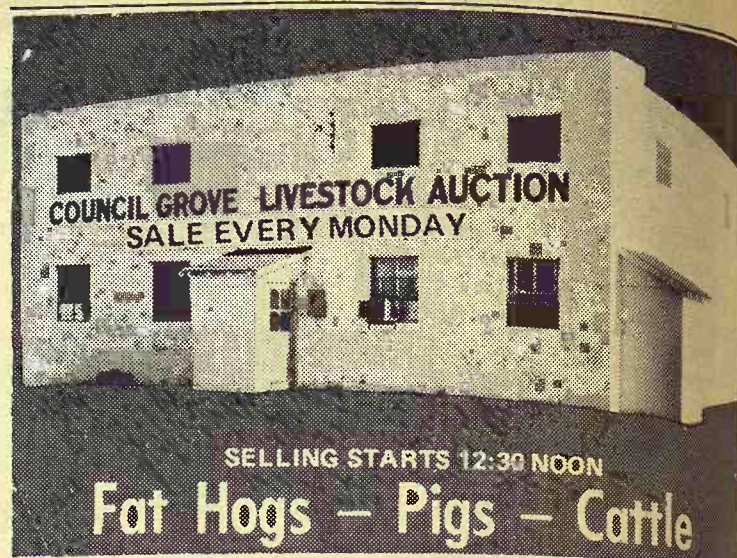

Japan Becomes Major Importer Of U.S. Beef

Sales of U.S. choice beef cuts in Japan have been growing steadily since last fall's Tokyo Trade Center Show featuring beef, according to USDA's Foreign Agricultural Service.

It says in a recent issue of its Foreign Agriculture publication that several representatives of the Japanese meat industry are planning trips to the U.S. in the near future for the purpose of buying meat under the new import quotas that the Japanese government issued last fall. These representatives, says the service, will be investigating the possibility of importing beef carcasses in addition to the refined hotel and restaurant cuts presently being shipped to Japan.

A number of Japanese firms interested in purchasing beef from the U.S. have jointly established a new wholesale concern which is to handle U.S. beef only. The 4-story building that will house this concern — located in the heart of Tokyo's booming Ginza business district — will also house a restaurant specializing in the product. Several outstanding Japanese hotels are now selling U.S. beef.

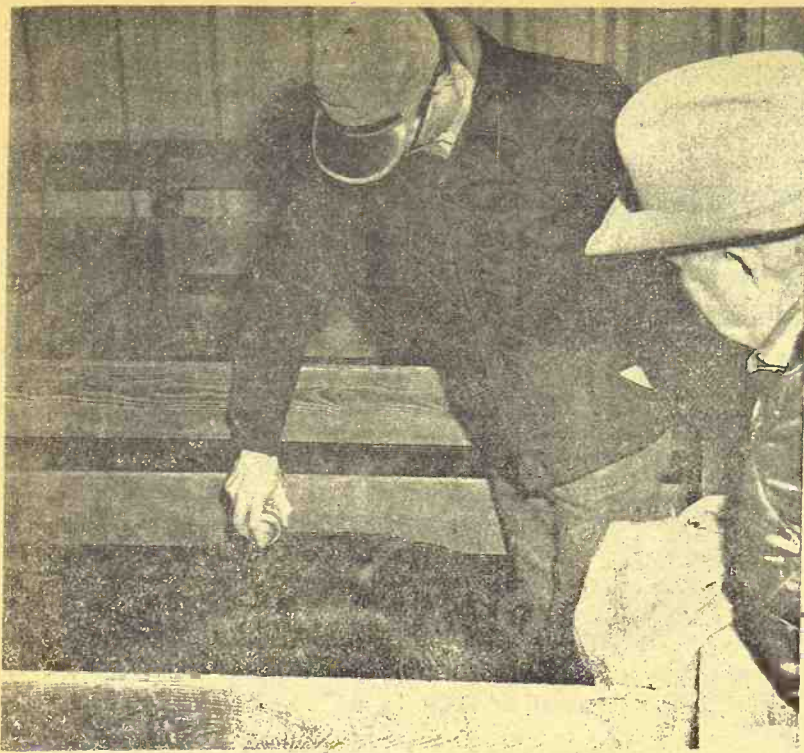

Much of Farmer's Income From 'In Town' Jobs

Jobs farmers hold in town will continue to provide a growing share of their disposable incomes in 1969, the Agriculture Department says.

Per capita income of farmers from all sources this year is expected to show little change from 1968, but a larger share of what they receive will come from nonfarm sources, the department reported.

Last year the personal income of farmers totaled 24.4 billion dollars before taxes. This included 13.5 billion from actual farm operations and 10.9 billion earned from other sources.

Their 1967 income was 23.7 billion, including 13 billion from farming and 10.7 billion from other sources.

Historically, about 70 per cent of "other" income is from wages and salaries earned off the farm, a department official said.

After personal taxes, farmers had 22.7 billion left to spend, an average of \$2,168 each, compared with 22 billion and \$2,037 in 1967, the department said.

This disposable income was about 73 per cent of that earned last year by nonfarm people, relatively unchanged from 1967, the report said.

Gross farm income last year was about 50.8 billion dollars

and is expected to increase by around 1 billion dollars in 1969, officials predicted.

However, they added, net income per farm is not expected to equal the 14.9 billion from actual farming operations last

year. But because of continued declines in the farm population — now estimated at about 10 million, or 5 per cent of the nation's — the average net per farm this year is expected to be about the same as the \$4,863 reported in 1968.

The report also predicted that increased production in 1969 may push cash receipts from farm marketings up by 1 billion dollars over the 44.1 billion reported last year.

1.8 Million New Calves In State

Record Kansas Calf Crop

A record high 1,801,000 calves were dropped on Kansas farms during 1968, 2 percent more than a year earlier, according to the Kansas Crop and Livestock reporting Service.

This is the largest calf crop in

45 years of record and exceeds the previous high of 1,782,000 set in 1954. The 1968 calf crop of 1,801,000 compares with a range from 1,620,000 to 1,740,000 in the 1962-66 period.

The number of calves born in

1968 expressed as a percentage of the number of cows and heifers two years old and over on January 1, 1968 was 94 percent, 1 point more than a year ago and compares with a range from 88 to 92 percent in the preceding 5 years.

Since the January 1 inventory of cows and heifers two years old and over does not include all heifers which gave birth to calves during the year and includes some cows that died or were slaughtered before calving, the calf crop as a percentage of cows and heifers two years old and over cannot be interpreted strictly as a calving rate.

The percentage is calculated to show a trend in production over a period of time and may fluctuate from year to year due to variation in cows slaughtered and trends in breeding herd replacement.

United States

The 1968 calf crop for the United States is estimated at 44,102,000 head. This is one percent more than the 43,765,000 head born a year earlier.

The number of cows and heifers two years old and older on farms January 1, 1968 is estimated at 50,049,000 head, slightly higher than the 49,883,000 head on farms January 1, 1967.

The number of calves born during 1968 expressed as a percentage of cows and heifers two years old and older on hand the

above 1967. The South Atlantic and South Central States are each up two percent from 1967.

Texas, the leading cattle state, showed a one percent larger calf crop.

The calf crop in the 11 Western States at 8,244,000 head is up one percent from the previous year. Colorado and Utah, each with 5 percent more calves born than a year earlier, had the largest percentage increases.

The number of calves born in the North Atlantic States declined 3 percent to 2,349,000 head. Every state in this region shows a smaller calf crop than a year earlier.

first of the year is estimated at 88 percent, the same as a year earlier.

This percentage is not strictly a calving rate because the January 1 inventory of cows and heifers two years old and older does not include all heifers that calve during the year and includes some cows and heifers that died or were slaughtered before calving.

The calf crop in the North Central States totaled 17,035,000 head, slightly below the 17,123,000 calves born a year earlier.

The East North Central States are down two percent while the West North Central States are up slightly.

The 1968 calf crop in the Southern States is estimated at 16,398,000 head, two percent

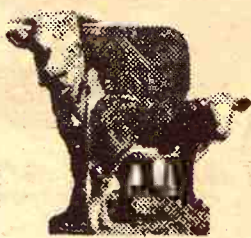

A spokesman for the American Farm Bureau told a Senate committee that the government's higher grazing fees for livestock in public lands should be canceled.

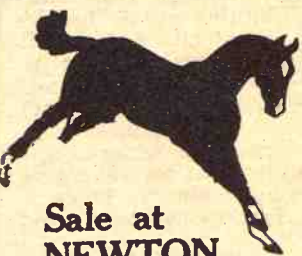

ARKANSAS VOTES FOR LIQUOR-BY-THE-DRINK

Most Farm Dollars In California

The Agriculture Department says California continued last year as the leading producer of agricultural crops, as measured in dollars, followed by Illinois, Iowa and Texas.

California produced about 2.4 billion dollars of the nation's record 22.4 billion in harvested crops, compared with about 2 billion and 21.9 billion in 1967, respectively.

Illinois crops were valued at 1.7 billion, compared with 1.8 billion a year earlier; Iowa 1.6 billion, up slightly from 1967; and Texas 1.4 billion, compared with 1.3 billion a year earlier.

The department said the value estimates included crops used by farmers for their own purposes as well as marketings.

The ranking for 1968 value of fruits and nuts was California, Florida and Washington, while in commercial vegetables it was California, Florida and Texas.

Corn was the most highly valued crop produced last year — 4.6 billion — followed by all hay 2.8 billion; soybeans 2.6 billion; wheat 1.9 billion; cotton 1.4 billion and tobacco 1.2 billion.

Other crops listed according to value included sorghum grain 687 million; potatoes \$609,100,000; oats \$556,600,000; rice \$526,800,000; tomatoes \$512,300,000; oranges \$382,000,000; barley \$364,500,000; and apples \$340,600,000.

Some Light On Corporate Farming Scope

If corporation farms are a threat to the family farm, it is a distant threat.

Right now there aren't enough of them to count as a menace.

So concluded those who attended a 2-day National Farming Institute at Des Moines.

The institute is an annual affair sponsored by the Des Moines Chamber of Commerce, which each year picks sides to discuss a controversial subject in agriculture. The speakers this year didn't find as much controversy as they expected about "Corporate Farming and the Family Farm."

Basically, the conclusions were two: 1) that corporation farming is not presently widespread or important; 2) that many people equate corporation farming with large family farms, which dominate farm production today.

The institute heard an advance report from a study by the Economic Research service of USDA on the subject, which indicated that corporate farms accounted for about 1% of all commercial farms, farming about 7% of the land in farms.

But these figures included the family corporation farm and the one-man incorporated farming business.

It is the third type, "outside" or publicly owned corporation which draws the fear from conventional farmers, and the survey indicated that only one-fifth of one percent of all commercial farms are operated by "outside" corporations. These farms account for 2% of gross sales.

Not all corporations are large, the survey revealed. Nearly two-fifths had sales of less than

\$40,000 in 1967. Fewer than 1000 had sales of \$500,000 or more. Many of these large firms also had other agribusiness interests, such as feed and fertilizer supply firms which operate farms in order to have an assured outlet for a part of their production.

Many fruit and vegetable producers are directly in the farming business because they seek some coordination and control of production with marketing requirements.

If corporation farms are not yet a major part of the agricultural scene, are they increasing at a rapid rate? The data is not conclusive here, but the report suggests they are not.

William Scofield, USDA economist who gave the results of the corporation farming study at the Des Moines meeting, said the survey revealed new and existing corporations, but not those that had gone out of business.

The survey showed that 46% of the farm corporations now in existence were formed before 1960, another 45% between 1960 and 1966, and 9% in 1967 or early 1968.

"Looking only at corporations with gross sales of \$500,000 or more," Scofield reported, "we found 64% had been incorporated before 1960, 31% in 1960-66, and only 5% in 1967-68. Conversely, a higher proportion of the smaller corporations had been organized since 1960."

The data indicated that the incorporation of existing family farms is taking place at a faster rate than is the organization and entry of newly-formed corporations in farming.

The family corporation farm is usually, but not always, larger than an average farm and has been incorporated to get the advantages offered on inheritance taxes and in transferring the estate.

As an example, if farm parents have several children it could be necessary at their death to break up the farm in order to settle the estate. But if the children are stockholders, settling the estate becomes only a matter of distributing the stock among them — the family farm may remain intact.

In the case of either the family corporation or the one-man corporation farm, there is little or no separation between stock ownership and management. The farm is operated under corporate laws which make it different from a partnership or sole ownership, but for practical purposes it is still a family-owned and operated business.

In 1965 there were about 18,500 farm corporations in the U.S. (slightly more than 1% of all corporations), but about 4000 of these were strictly landlord operations.

Of the 14,500 farming operations, about 500 of these were grazing operations and institutional operations. Of the remaining, 14,000, more than one-third were in four states — California, Florida, Texas and Montana.

In the Middle West, the largest number were found in Nebraska, Wisconsin and Indiana. In the Middle West, corporate farms accounted for less than one-half of 1% of all commercial farms.

As a group, corporate farms are not typical of all farms. As Scofield explained, the survey

showed their production tends to be concentrated to a greater extent in beef cattle, both feedlots and ranches, in poultry and in fruits and vegetables than in field crops.

These also are the farms which tend to have the largest gross incomes. Except for the cattle ranches, such firms frequently are involved also in the manufacture and sale of farm inputs or in the processing and marketing of the commodities they produce.

It is among firms of this type where most of the farm corporations are found which have capital stock thus for sale. Firms specializing solely in the production of farm products, without related farm supply or marketing or processing activities, are rare.

Scofield said that the data doesn't necessarily mean there is no threat to the family farmer from corporation farming.

Increasingly, Scofield admitted, the traditional farmer will have the problem of obtaining access to sufficient land and capital, of business organization and financial management, of being able to compete effectively for production inputs and an outlet for his products.

These are factors, often not readily apparent, which perhaps can be achieved more readily by the corporate farm organization.

Opinions at the Des Moines meeting seemed agreed that farming would continue to get into fewer and fewer hands and into larger units, but the trend to bigness would be mostly in the field of larger family farms or family corporations than in "factory type" farms.

Comeback By 'Mom & Pop' Store

MANHATTAN — A quiet revolution is occurring in the food retailing industry. The traditional "mom & pop" neighborhood store, which took such a beating from the supermarkets



not too long ago, is making a comeback in the form of the convenience store.

Convenience stores operate far more efficiently than their

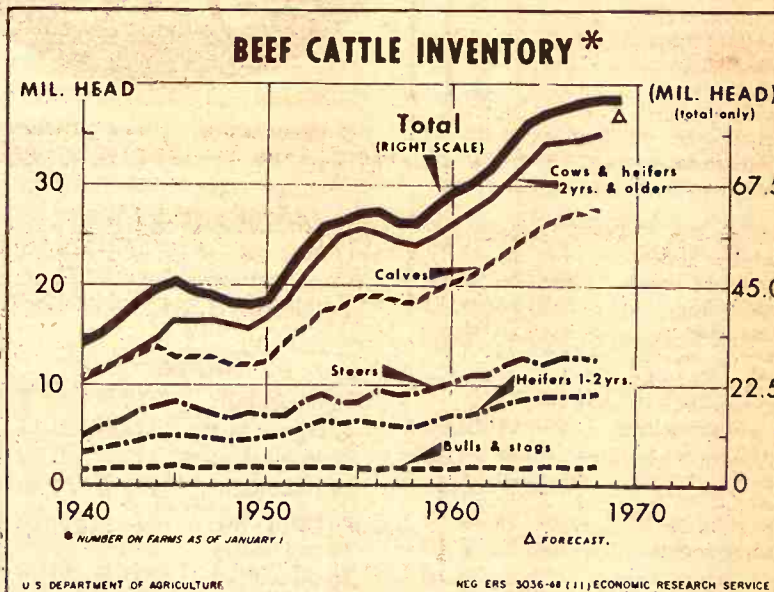
predecessors, says S. E. Trieb, Extension economist at Kansas State University. They feature many of the latest techniques of location analysis, inventory control, self-service merchandising and promotion.

Another plus factor is parking. Most stores offer enough space for at least 10 cars.

Convenience stores may look like miniature supermarkets to some consumers, Trieb says, but their way of doing business is different. The basic philosophy is that of bringing food shopping back to the neighborhood.

The little stores feature long hours, convenient location, and in-and-out service. Consumers use these stores for late-hour shopping. Average sale per customer is less than a dollar. The most frequently purchased items are bread, milk, soft drinks and lunch meat.

The big boom in supermarket growth has slowed as convenience stores spring up across the nation. The National Association of Convenience Stores, a Washington D.C. trade association, predicts that these stores will ring up to \$10 billion in sales before the end of 1970.

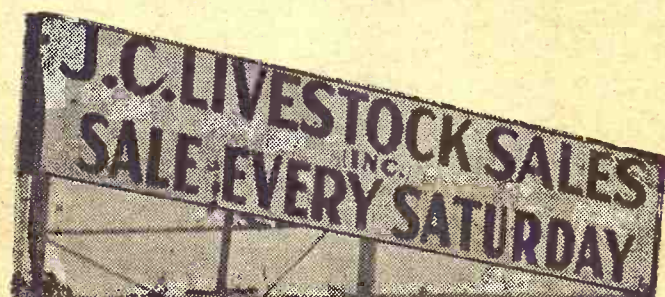
