## Lyons Creek Voters Say 'No' Again

**WOODBINE** — Voters in Lyons Creek Watershed Joint District No. 41 in Dickinson, Geary, Morris and Marion Counties last week rejected for the second time a two mill tax levy to finance watershed construction. The unofficial vote was 233 in favor and 314 against. A similar levy was defeated by a 44-vote margin Dec. 5. Both elections were forced by the filing of protest petitions

after the district board of directors adopted the levy. A \$5,267,100 watershed work plan will be submitted to Congress for approval. The federal government would provide \$2,424,000 for construction of 22 dams while the district furnishes \$2,824,900 for 36 additional structures and land treatment. The two-mill tax would have raised \$22,000 annually. Another method of financing now will have to be found.

## Emporia AC Dealership Sells

**EMPORIA** — Robert Schaefer of Neosho Rapids, Kans., has bought the Cochennet Equipment Co., Allis-Chalmers dealership in Emporia. The new firm, which has continued business without interruption, will be known as Schaefer Equipment Co. Schaefer has been a livestock operator, but plans to reduce his farming operations to devote most of his time to the implement business. With his wife Darlene and two small daughters and son, he will continue to reside in Neosho Rapids.

# Tougher Competition In World Wheat Market

Farmers around the world are in the way to reaping a wheat harvest close to or even matching last season's record production of an estimated 10.1 billion bushels, Agriculture Department analysts say.

At a minimum, the analysts expect a harvest of more than 10 billion bushels in the crop year started July 1. This would be at least the second highest wheat year in history, exceeding the 1965-66 crop of 9.8 billion bushels of the vital grain. During the 1960-64 period, by comparison, world wheat production averaged 8.2 billion bushels annually.

One consequence of this bounce is likely to be sharper competition for world wheat markets — the U.S., Canada, Australia, Argentina and France — generally will have more of the grain available for export, though rainfall — too much in some areas, too little in Australia — may cause production trouble in those nations.

At the other day Agriculture Secretary Freeman formally acknowledged the prospect of big wheat supplies by announcing a 13% cut in the U.S. wheat acreage allotment for the 1968 year.

Explaining this cut on the basis of the 1966-67 increase of 10% in U.S. wheat acreage, Mr. Freeman stated in the following last year's acreage announcement, "new information from the Soviet Union, Canada and Australia indicated a bumper crop. So it isn't altogether possible to hit a one-year target exactly."

**U.S. Projections Altered** — Hazards confronting forecasters are seen in the altered projections for the U.S. crop, which is currently being harvested. Originally, department officials said the expanded acreage would produce a bumper winter and spring wheat crop of about 1.6 billion bushels. Then a dearth of winter and

early spring moisture in such states as Kansas and Oklahoma left young winter wheat sprouts withering in the dust, and some grain experts began to talk of a harvest totaling 1.4 billion bushels or less. However, rains came in late May and the latest department estimate is calling for a record U.S. harvest of about 1,550,000,000 bushels, up from 1,311,000,000 in 1966.

Such weather vagaries assume enormous significance to anyone assessing production in the Soviet Union, the world's largest wheat grower. For the Russians, who harvested some 172 million acres last year, against 50 million acres in the U.S., a highly possible fluctuation of two bushels in per-acre yields prior to harvest can mean more than a 300-million-bushel miscalculation — almost equal to the total food-grain imports required by hungry India this year to make up food deficiencies.

Added to this, of course, is the "puzzle wrapped up in an enigma" represented by Soviet agricultural statistics, which must be picked over for hidden meaning as carefully as any other Kremlin action.

A case in point was the Soviet claim that its 1966 harvest yielded about 3.7 billion bushels. U.S. experts know Soviet wheat figures are inflated by use of bunkered tonnages, which include the stones and trash often left unseparable from used grain. Also, the totals aren't adjusted for moisture content, which can range as high as 30% of total weight. The U.S. agricultural attache in Moscow advised that 3.1 billion bushels would be more realistic, but Washington analysts appraised the crop still lower, at 2.8 billion bushels.

**Fall Expected In Russia** — In the current year, department analysts look for Soviet production to fall to 2.2 billion bushels, largely because last year's almost perfect growing conditions aren't being repeated.

Wet ground delayed planting of spring wheat, which accounts for about 60% of total Russian production, while the "new lands" west of the Ural Mountains continue to suffer from lack of moisture.

"The Soviets talk of increased use of fertilizer, but we just don't know enough about their agriculture to allow them much more wheat than they've averaged in past years," one agriculture official observes. He notes that USSR wheat yield jumped to 16 bushels an acre last year from 9.9 bushels in 1965; the 1960-64 average was 11.5 bushels.


**Elsewhere in the world:** —The Canadians, chief competitors of U.S. grain farmers in the export wheat market, have indicated planting intentions which, if fulfilled, could produce a crop slightly larger than their 1966 record of 844 million bushels. Unlike the U.S., though, Canada depends on spring wheat for 98% of its production. Because planting was delayed by too much moisture, the harvest might be delayed, too, meaning snow may fall on the grain before it can be gathered. This is a common occurrence in Canada, but it does reduce yields.

—The Australians also are striving to exceed their record 1966 crop of 448 million bushels. Farmers down under, who've just finished planting their 1967 wheat, indicate they would increase their seeded acreage by 7%, but promptly ran into dry weather problems following last year's above-normal moisture. "In New South Wales, the leading wheat state, seed was planted in the dust." Now "good soaking rains" have arrived, a department wheat man in Washington says, and a good Australian crop seems likely.

**Argentina's Optimistic** — Argentina also is "something of an enigma this year," the department analyst finds. The Argentinian government is urging a harvest next December

of about 481 million bushels, a highly optimistic goal in view of last year's 246 million-bushel crop, and the 1960-64 average of 26 million bushels. Washington believes Argentinian wheat farmers, many of them bankers, lawyers and wealthy industrialists with large landholdings, aren't likely to increase planting much because of domestic inflation and the belief that their nation's wheat program offers insufficient benefits. On balance, a crop close to the 1960-64 aver-

age seems the most likely at this point. —France, though hampered by its second consecutive year of weather too wet for ideal planting, nonetheless projects wheat crop of about 475 million bushels, which would be up from last year's 414 million bushels. As a result, French wheat available for export could be around 130 million bushels, compared with slightly fewer than 199 million bushels in the year ended June 30.

# Hog Production Is Leveling Off

Hog producers are keeping a close eye on hog numbers and the market price of hogs. The June Pig Crop Report indicated that the December 1966 - May 1967 pig crop of 46 million was up 1 percent from the 45.6 million figure for the same period a year earlier.

While the spring pig crop was 1 percent greater than in 1966 (and 8 percent above the 1965 figure), it was 5 percent smaller than the 5-year (1961-65) average. (The spring pig crop includes pigs born from December 1 to June 1. These pigs are marketed mostly from July 1 to January 1.)

From these data we might assume that market supplies will be about 1 percent larger than during the last half of 1966. In the 10 Corn Belt states, the December 1966 - February 1967 pig crop was 5 percent

above that for the same period a year ago. The March - May 1967 pig crop was 3 percent less than a year earlier. These percentage changes are similar to changes for the U.S. crop.

The number of hogs on feed in the 10 Corn Belt states on June 1 in the 120-pound and up range was 4 percent more than a year ago, while the number under 120 pounds was about 2.5 percent less than a year earlier. The heavier group of hogs will make up the market supply during July and August. The lighter group will provide the market hogs from September through December.

We may expect July and August hog prices to remain slightly below those of a year ago. Toward the end of this year, prices may be a little stronger than they were last year in November and December.

What are the prospects for the remainder of the 1967 production? U.S. hog producers indicate that they intend to farrow 5,452,000 sows during June-November, 1967. This is a 3-percent decrease from the year-earlier level.

If farmers can save 7.27 pigs per litter (equal to the 1965 level), then a fall pig crop of 85,549,000 would be realized — 1 percent fewer pigs than in the fall of 1966.

With 2 to 3 percent fewer hogs available for market on January 1 and a slight reduction in fall farrowings, we should see a slight increase in market prices during the first part of 1968, over the 1967 early-winter marketings.



## Try Dream Cream Puffs For Next Dessert Party



Have you hosted a dessert party lately? It spells elegant informality for a birthday, bridal or anniversary gathering.

Bake the Dream Puffs a few days before the party. Store puffs in air-tight tin or freeze. An hour before guests arrive, prepare whipped cream variations and refrigerate. Rely on an automatic coffee maker to brew fresh coffee at the buffet table.

### DREAM CREAM PUFFS

1/2 cup butter or shortening  
1/4 teaspoon salt  
1 cup water  
1 cup sifted all-purpose flour  
4 eggs

Preheat oven to 375 degrees. Combine butter, salt, and water in saucepan. Bring to full boil, stirring until butter melts. Add flour and beat with mixer at "LO" over low heat until mixture forms a compact ball and leaves sides of pan — about 30 seconds. Remove from heat. Beat in eggs, one at a time, at

"MED" — about 30 seconds, beating for each egg. Scrape bottom and sides of pan with rubber spatula. Drop by tablespoons two inches apart on greased baking sheets. Bake at 375 degrees for 45-50 minutes. Immediately cut one or two slits in sides of puffs. Return to oven for five minutes to dry out. Cool before filling. Yield: one dozen.

Try variations in a half-pint of cream already whipped: Add 3 tablespoons of brown sugar; or, add a teaspoon of instant coffee, mixing well; or, add a few drops of food coloring and peppermint extract.

For perfectly-brewed coffee, use cold water, rinse the basket in cold water; this prevents small coffee grounds from dropping into the brew.

### Steam Spot

If a spot on a man's tie is particularly stubborn, hold it for a moment over steam, which may loosen imbedded dirt. Then use a cleaning agent.

### Sugar Is Sugar

Are you one of those shoppers who buys sugar more frequently this time of year? Notice you can buy granulated sugar of the beet or cane variety.

There's little difference in price. Which gives the best results? Both beet and cane sugar are the same chemically and will give you equally fine cakes, jellies, jams and other foods.

### Home Lighting Should Be Carefully Planned

You can use two types of lighting in your home to avoid contrasts of bright and dark areas, advises Ethel Self, extension home management specialist, Kansas State University. One is the general illumination which includes ceiling fixtures, valance covers and other types of fixtures that throw a soft wash of light over the whole room.

Local lighting by lamps builds up more lumens or brightness in areas where concentrated eye work is necessary such as for reading and sewing. If you use both types of lighting wisely, you'll prevent glare contrasts between light and dark areas.





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## Expert Gives Advice On How To Dry Fruit

Wonder if dried fruit such as peaches and apricots will keep a year or so? Miss Elsie Lee Miller, extension foods and nutrition specialist, KSU, Manhattan, says many homemakers ask this question each summer. Dried fruit will keep a year or more if stored in a cool, dry, dark place. She gives the following directions to dry fruit in your own oven.

Select six pounds of fresh, ripe, firm fruit. Wash and drain. Peel if you wish and cut

in halves and remove pits. To prevent discoloration, soak fruit 15 minutes in a solution of 3½ tablespoons sodium sulfite. A druggist can supply this chemical. Two other less effective treatments are: 1. dip fruit in salt-water bath containing 4 to 6 tablespoons salt to 1 gallon water for 10 minutes, or 2. precook fruit in steam of boiling water until tender but firm.

Arrange fruit on trays and place in a 150-degree oven with

the bottom tray three inches from the oven floor. Don't use the top unit in an electric oven. Proven oven door open ½ inch if electric or eight inches if gas. This helps control heat and lets out moist air. Alternate trays every one or two hours.

The fruit is dry when pliable and leathery; it usually takes about six hours. Pieces around the edges of the tray will dry first. Remove them as soon as they dry.

Cool fruit and package immediately. Pack in glass jars or plastic, metal, or heavily waxed cardboard frozen food containers. Use tight-fitting lids.

You may use plastic bags if they can be heat-sealed. Place

them in rigid containers to prevent tearing.





When you want real whipped cream to top your fruit desserts this summer, you buy whipping cream. You want it to stand firm. You'll want cream which is 30-35 percent butterfat because it will give you the largest volume and the best texture.

Cream with less butterfat is generally labeled coffee cream. It may whip, but not very satisfactorily.

Half-and-half is a favorite cream to use over cereal or fruit. Half-and-half contains about 11 percent butterfat. It is pasteurized and homogenized so that the fat won't rise to the top.

# Lawrence Area Site Of Management Field Day

Visitors will have an opportunity to see and hear how three successful farm managers run their operations August 1 during a Kansas Farm Management Field Day.

The first-of-its-kind event is sponsored by Kansas State University in cooperation with the Chamber of Commerce, Kansas City, Mo.

Scene of the activity will be distinctly different farms near Lawrence. The Al Pendleton farm, 2 miles east of town on Highway 10, can handle up to 800 head of cattle in its shade feedlots. Raymond and Robert Pine, a father-son partnership, raise cash crops and feed pigs on their spread a mile east and 1/4 mile south of the Inland Tepee corner on Highway north of town.

Visitors will assemble at 8:45 a.m. at the Pendleton farm, where three programs will be presented concurrently. Pendleton will kick off one program with a discussion of his farm business organization, feed storage, and processing facilities. Ken McReynolds, K-State Extension economist,

will talk about the economics of feed processing.

A second session will feature talks on feedlot arrangement and facilities by Leo Wendling, Extension engineer, and methods and economics of silage storage by Wilton Thomas, Extension farm management economist.

An experimental feedlot waste disposal system will be featured in a third program. Ross McKinney, University of Kansas, will describe the system which has been in operation on the farm for almost a year. Philip Phar, Extension animal husbandry specialist, will discuss controlling agricultural wastes.

Lunch will be served at 11:30 at the fairgrounds in Lawrence. Featured speaker for the noon program is Raymond J. Doll, Federal Reserve Bank of Kansas City, who will look at what lies ahead for the farm manager.

Other speakers and their topics are Wilber Ringler, assistant director of K-State Extension, "The Kansas Extension Service — Your Partner in Farm Management Programs,"

and Robert Coppersmith, Extension livestock marketing economist, "Future Trading in Grain and Livestock Marketing Programs."

The afternoon session will begin at 1:45 at the Pine farm. Roger Pine will describe their grain harvesting, drying, and marketing program. Grain storage and drying systems will be the topic of Leo Wendling, Extension engineer. Jay Treat, district Extension economist, will talk on the economics of farm machinery investment.

Raymond Pine will discuss their cropping system. Howard Wilkins, Extension agronomist, will speak on soils and soil management. Wilfred Pine, professor of agricultural economics, will look at land prices.

The program will conclude with a question and answer session.

## \$40 Million Year For Kansas FLBAs

The 24 Federal Land Bank Associations in Kansas completed the fiscal year, June 30, lending \$40.5 million in long-term Federal Land Bank loans to farmers and ranchers of the state.

This represented 1,940 loans made by Kansas associations, William G. Plested, Jr., president of The Federal Land Bank of Wichita, said Thursday.

The 24 associations and 36 additional associations in Colorado, Oklahoma and New Mexico were cited for volume of lending in the 4-state district. Plested said 4,006 loans were made in the district totaling \$100.2 million. This lending and prior loans represent an unpaid balance of \$457 million for the borrowers in the four states.

Plested reported that 38 per cent of member borrowing was

to purchase land, 33 per cent to refinance real estate mortgages, 14 percent for chattel securities and other open accounts and 6 percent for repairs and improvements to land and buildings. The remaining 9 percent was for general operations.

## Hope To Control Pasture Scale

A small wasp found in India by a USDA entomologist promises to control scale insects that make pastures unfit for grazing in large areas of the Gulf states and in other nations.


The wasp, *Neodusmetia sangwani*, lays its eggs in the scale, *Antonina graminis*, which dies when the eggs are hatched. Controlling scale in this manner could increase forage yields as much as 50 percent and prevent losses in those pastures where the scale is most harmful.





# Gov's Governor's Turn, Say Stockmen

The conflict between Gov. Robert Docking and the Kansas Livestock Association goes into this week with no new moves by the governor, altho it is likely the next step in the controversy will be taken from the Governor's office.

The most likely step, observers figure, is that Docking will make an appointment as livestock sanitary commissioner without the recommendation of the Kansas Livestock Association. If the association does not then place its recommendation on the Docking appointee, the controversy will presumably end up in the courts in a test case.

The livestock association has asked Docking to reappoint its executive secretary A. G. Pickett as the livestock sanitary commissioner. The association has refused to go along with the Democratic governor's request for additional recommendations.

The law requires that the association recommends and the governor appoints the livestock sanitary commissioner. The law has stood since 1919.

The recommendation by the KLA applies not only to the livestock sanitary commissioner's post but that of the state brand inspector and the 7-man Kansas Livestock Commission as well.

The law provides for the president of the KLA, two dairy cattle producers, a veterinarian, a swine producer and two beef producers to be members of the commission.

Three posts on the commission are also up for appointment and the KLA has listed only three recommendations. Docking has asked for more.

The group is approved by the KLA executive board — 353 members from all counties of the state — for recommendation to the governor for appointment.

For the post of brand commissioner, the livestock commission is required to recommend three names. Those recommended are the current brand commissioner Hade Gup-ton of Greensburg, Francis Ar-

# Complete Organization Of New Dairy Co-op

The big dairy cooperative formed from three G&G area milk associations has completed its reorganization.

The new organization is called Mid-America Dairymen Inc., formed from the consolidation

of the Shawnee Milk Producers of Topeka; the Nemaha Cooperative Creamery Assn. of Sabetha; and the Pure Milk Producers of Kansas City.

William A. Powell of Princeton, Mo., was elected president

of Mid-America at the first meeting of the board of directors.

Other officers elected are Harry Burger, Seneca, first vice president; Walter Lietz Jr. of Paxico, second vice president; Harold S. Purvis of Pleasant Hill, Mo., secretary; Leo Buessing of Axtell, treasurer; and P. D. Turner, former manager of the Nemaha Cooperative, assistant secretary and general manager.

Business office will be Kansas City at 5200 East 45th.

Division offices will be maintained at Topeka, with Bill Rankin as manager; at Kansas City, with Bernard McCracken as manager; and Sabetha, with Eugene Marti, as manager.

Combined membership is 2400 dairymen in Kansas, Missouri, Nebraska and Iowa.

Members of the three groups had milk sales totaling \$35 million in 1966.

## Another Rise In Farm Efficiency

Agriculture increased its efficiency rate again last year by nearly 7 percent.

The Agriculture department's annual report on farm efficiency said one American farmworker produced, on the average, sufficient farm products to supply himself and 38.56 other persons. This compared with an average of 37.02 persons, including himself, in 1965.

Largely because of technological advances, farming has made significant gains in ef-

iciency since 1950 when each farm worker produced sufficient supplies for 15.47 persons.

This increase in productivity contrasts sharply with the slight advance made in the 100-year period ending in 1920. The production per worker supplied 4.12 persons in 1820 and 8.27 in 1920.

Labor use on U.S. farms last year was reported at 7.5 billion man-hours, the lowest in more than 100 years of record-keeping.

Labor use reached a peak of nearly 24 billion man-hours a year during the 1910-14 period. Yet in this latter period, farm production was only 46 per cent of the 1966 level.

The cropland harvested last year totaled 289 million acres, the smallest in this century. The peak was 348 million in the 1920-24 period.

The number of tractors on farms climbed this year to 5,570,000, a record high, and compared with 3,610,000 in 1950. Farm use of fertilizers and liming materials was nearly three times as great in 1965 as in 1950 and nearly 15 times as great as in the 1910-14 period.





**Food Chains See Farm Danger In Low Prices**

Farmers efforts to obtain higher prices for their livestock and food crops are getting an assist now from the National Association of Food Chains.

It explained in a newsletter which went to its members last week that "food retailers want prices to go up . . . Modest increases are needed in some basic foods — notably beef, milk, poultry and eggs — in order to interest a sufficient number of farmers to stay in the business."

The newsletter pointed out that "unless the business of producing these basic farm goods is made more attractive, we will face very serious shortages in the years ahead." This is a point that spokesmen for the livestock industry have been making — that poor prices

would force production into the hands of a relatively few large operators.

The comments were seen as a move to help forestall any demonstrations of the type which found consumer groups picketing a number of food stores in the spring of 1966.

The newsletter noted that further advances in food prices could come later in the summer and fall. It added, "an increase in far mprices had been long overdue."

In contrast to remarks from Administration spokesmen little more than a year ago, views like those expressed in the chain store's newsletter have been expressed now by Secretary of Agriculture Orville Freeman.

Noting that consumers today spend only 19 percent of their take-home pay for food compared with 21 percent 10 years

ago and 25 percent 20 years ago, he said recently: "Consumers must realize that if farm

prices are not strengthened, the nation's family farm system could be replaced by monolithic corporate farming operations that conceivably could so

control food supply as to demand and get any price they want."







**Winter Wheat: Average Test Weight, Protein And Moisture Content 1967**

Quality tests of 1967 Kansas wheat continued to show protein content well above last year and average but test weight moderately below the previous year and average, according to the Kansas Crop Reporting Service.

Tests on 62 Kansas counties showed average protein content at 12.9 percent compared with 12.1 a year earlier in the same counties. The 1956-61 average was 11.7 percent.

**Recommends Aid For Displaced Farmers**

A presidential advisory commission has recommended increased federal aid for low-income rural Americans being forced out of farming, but was divided on the question of continuing government subsidies to farmers in general.

The 29-member National Advisory Commission on food and fiber, reporting to President Johnson on its 18-month study of farming and economics, foreign trade policies and agriculture programs, recommended tooling up American agriculture as an active competitor in world markets.

The commission also agreed that "freely functioning markets were the best mechanism to guide the needed changes in agricultural production and resource use." The advisory group split, however, on the issue of continuing federal price protection programs.

A majority of 16 members - mainly farmer spokesmen - recommended continuing with some modifications the basic government farm price support and production program, now in operation under the Johnson administration.

A 13-member minority, which included business and industry representatives, proposed that price supports should be phased out and eliminated in a relatively short time. The minority suggested temporary direct payments to farmers during the transition period, but called for a long-range policy based on the operations of efficient farmers competing in a "market oriented" economy.

The commission report, which included 74 recommendations,

was presented to President Johnson Friday by Secretary of Agriculture Orville Freeman. The advisory panel, appointed by Johnson in November 1965 to make its long-range study was headed by Dr. Sherwood O. Berg, dean of the University of Minnesota's Institute of Agriculture.

The advisory group found that for the foreseeable future, the United States will have the agriculture capacity to produce more than is needed for domestic use and export. The report noted that according to some studies, the present 3.1 million farms in the United States will have diminished in number to 1.8 million by 1980.

By 1980, the report continued the United States will require one-third less labor on farms than at present regardless of what types of domestic farm policies are pursued.

To help displaced farmers in the years ahead, the commission recommended rural education and non-farm job training programs and a direct relief program for giving low-income rural dwellers federal payments to increase their incomes \$600 a year.

Two district wheat shows held annually in Kansas have had 1967 dates set. Wichita will be the site for an August 4 show, and Garden City the location for the August 11 show.

**Kansas Turnpike To Consider Hike**

The Kansas Turnpike Authority (KTA) will decide July 24 whether to increase rates on the Kansas Turnpike by 8 percent.

Duncan said not all KTA crease was necessary. At the members were agreed a rate in present rate of profit, bonds supporting the turnpike could be retired six years ahead of schedule, he said.

Duncan said rate increases had been made in 1961, 1963 and 1965.

## LAYOFFS TOTAL 800 AT BOEING—WICHITA

WICHITA — Layoffs at Boeing Aircraft in Wichita have reduced the workforce of the state's largest employer to 19,500 — down more than 800

from the first of July. Layoffs are likely to continue during the month, though on a reduced scale. Declining workloads in the B-52 modification and 737 tooling programs caused the reduction in the payroll.

## Government Study Sees Free-er Trade In Farm Future

A presidential commission recommended that agricultural policies for the future be built around free markets rather than government programs.

However, a majority of the 29-member national food and fiber commission called for continuation of federal farm programs "until the problem of excess capacity in farming is alleviated and farmers are able to earn incomes from the market that are comparable to non-farm incomes."

The commission split, 16 to 13, on the need for continuing federal aid to agriculture, but both sides agreed that freely functioning markets were the best mechanism to guide the needed changes in agricultural production and resource use.

The minority urged that government programs, including price supports and production controls, should be phased out as soon as possible, but called for some protection to small farmers who are being squeezed out of commercial agriculture. This help would be in the form of direct payments to ease the transition.

The minority and majority agreed that displaced small farmers should be helped through various programs to find new pursuits.

The aids would include education and job training in rural areas, development of nonfarm jobs and in effect, a major relief program under which some disadvantaged and older rural

dwellers would be given federal payments to raise their income at least \$600 a year.

The majority called for price supports to be set "modestly below a moving average of world market prices. Coupled with

this would be direct payments "to enable efficient commercial farmers to receive parity of incomes (with nonfarm workers) when returns from the market do not provide such incomes."



**Test For  
 Soybean Chemical**  
 SKOKIE, Illinois — One hundred Midwestern farmers within the next few weeks will test a chemical growth regulator that is said to increase soybean yields by as much as 20%.

Last month the Agriculture Department issued an experimental permit to International Minerals & Chemical Corp. for the regulator. The chemical, effective with application rates as low as half an ounce per acre, is mixed in water and sprayed on the plant when it flowers, according to the company.

"We hope to obtain full Federal clearance to offer the product to all soybean growers by 1969, said Thomas J. Army, head of chemicals research at International. Soybean seed growers in Illinois, Indiana, Iowa, Nebraska, and Minnesota will apply the plant growth regulator, which is called triiodobenzoic acid — Tiba for short.

# Dairy Outlook Is Encouraging

The dairy situation has improved considerably in the past few years. Between 1962 and 1965, uncommitted government stocks of dairy products declined 88 percent. Between 1964 and 1966, milk production declined 5.3 percent; the prices farmers received for milk increased 20 percent.

Between 1950 and 1966, the number of milk cows in the United States declined 36 percent, while production per cow increased 60 percent. With these changes, total milk production increased from 117 to 120 billion pounds.

From 1950 to 1966, total U.S. consumption of dairy products increased 29 percent. On a per-capita basis, however, the consumption of dairy products decreased, from 740 pounds in 1950 to 603 pounds in 1966.

Imports of dairy products increased over 200 percent from 1965 to 1966. These increases were stimulated by high U.S.

prices for dairy products, less restrictive trade barriers for some dairy products, and increased milk production in other countries. During this period, exports of dairy products declined 58 percent. The Secretary of Agriculture and many farmer cooperatives have urged a tightening of import restrictions.

During 1967 the number of milk cows is expected to decline further, production per cow should continue to increase, total milk production is likely to be slightly higher, and the prices received by dairy farmers should average about 5 percent higher than in 1966. For the first 5 months of 1967, blend prices received by producers in the Chicago market averaged \$4.58, as compared to \$4.08 in 1966. The minimum basic formula price used to calculate Class 1 prices in federal orders will be \$4.05 through April of 1968. Class I milk prices thru April, 1968 will remain higher than they were for the first 6 months of 1966.

Over the next 5 to 10 years, the dairy outlook appears bright. Population projections indicate that there will be 230 million people in the U.S. by 1975, a 20 percent increase. The purchasing power of the American consumer, which has doubled since 1940, will continue to increase. As foreign countries become more affluent, the demand for U.S. agricultural products, especially soybeans and corn, should increase. High prices for soybeans, corn, and other farm pro-

ducts, and higher industrial wages, will encourage dairymen to continue to move out of dairying. Because of the high labor requirements, increases in farm wage rates will accelerate the shift out of dairying. These changes will bring about increases in milk prices.

Total U.S. milk production is expected to increase 12 percent between 1965 and 1975. With the large exodus of dairymen, Illinois production is expected to decrease 15 percent over this period. The number of cows will decrease by at least 38 percent; the number of farms reporting milk sold, by 63 percent.

Developments in consumption that may influence the amount of increase needed in production include possible increases in the use of substitute dairy products and a wider use of low-fat dairy products.

The department report also reviews the growth of Venezuelan agricultural trade with the U.S. and indicated that this trade should continue to grow.

By 1975 that country expects self-sufficiency in rice, sugar, potatoes, cassava, pork, poultry, eggs, and tobacco, based on increases in agricultural production since 1950, resources available for growth, and investments planned for irrigation and other technology.

Venezuela is expected to be an increasingly good market for such U.S. commodities as wheat and wheat flour, corn, barley and malt, oats and oat products, pulses, fats and oils, milk products, cotton, and seed potatoes.

Venezuela, a top U.S. trading partner at the top of South America, is looking toward self-sufficiency in production of many important farm commodities by 1975, according to USDA.







## No Question Drouth Is Broken

Only three of 17 state weather-reporting stations did not have more than normal rainfall up to July 7, according to this map compiled from data from the Weather Bureau state climatologist's office at Kansas State University.

The dark circles show areas with above normal rainfall. Lighter circles still had reported subnormal amounts.


The heavy rains of June and July broke more than a year of drouth in Kansas.

Climatologist Merle Brown at K-State said 1966 was one of the driest years on record, particularly in portions of east central, central and south central Kansas.

In Topeka and Manhattan it was the second driest year on record.

Brown compared the June rains in the state to those of 1951, one of the wettest years on record. Rainfall values then measured more than 14 inches above normal in parts of Kansas.

Brown said there was no consistent pattern or cycle in rainfall amounts of recent years. The last lengthy drouth was 1952 to 1957, comparing in severity to the baked conditions of the 1930's. Other generally wet years were 1958, 1959 and 1962, while in 1964 and 1966 portions of the state were extremely dry.



## Construction Firms Ready Disaster Plan

"Plan Bulldozer," a program for disaster relief and control in Kansas, designed to "place man-made construction equipment in an orderly condition on the disaster site in an orderly manner," was presented to Governor Robert Docking last week by representatives of the construction industry in Kansas.

The sole purpose and mission of Plan Bulldozer is to make immediately available to any public agency in Kansas responsible for combating an emergency or disaster the equipment, personnel, know-how of the construction industry, in event the agency is unable to control the situation with its resources," Kermit K. Thompson of Thompson Construction Agency, Ellinwood, general

chairman of Plan Bulldozer, said in making the presentation to Governor Docking.

"It is indeed a pleasure to accept on behalf of the people of Kansas Plan Bulldozer," Governor Docking said at the presentation ceremony held in his office.

"While we cannot prevent the occurrence of natural disasters within the borders of our state, government and private industry working together can greatly minimize the loss of life and property and the personal hardship caused by such disasters. It is reassuring to know that the construction industry of Kansas has united its resources into this voluntary, non-profit program and stands prepared to come to the aid of our citizens in the event of a disaster.

izens in the event of a disaster.

The program has been under development for the past 18 months by the Kansas Contractors Association with the assistance of the Kansas Builders' Chapter. Both are affiliated with the Associated General Contractors of America, which is developing Plan Bulldozer nationwide through the various chapters.

Several soil conservation contractors who are members of the Kansas Conservation Contractors Association are also participating in the program.

"Plan Bulldozer is a voluntary organization of more than 100 Kansas contractors who are pledged to suspend operations on work they may be doing and render assistance to local authorities in times of disaster on a non-profit basis. Equipment, manpower, supplies and materials will be furnished by Plan Bulldozer contractors at actual cost during the period of the emergency."

## Three St. Marys Men Buy Newton Barn

Three St. Marys men have purchased the weekly livestock auction at Newton for a price of \$40,000.

The barn was bought at auction Saturday by Ray Dohrman, his nephew William Dohrman, and his son-in-law Vernis Koch. The new owners say they will start regularly weekly sales in two weeks.

The auction was owned by the Newton Livestock and Commission Co., Inc. It consists of 10 acres of deeded land and an additional 15 acres of land leased from the Santa Fe railroad.

Its facilities include pen area for 12,000 head of cattle, 700 hogs, separate docks for unloading and loading out live-

stock and seating in the arena for 522. The scales are large enough so that a car load of cattle can be weighed at a time.

The auction was handled by Jim Kirkemide, Topeka.




