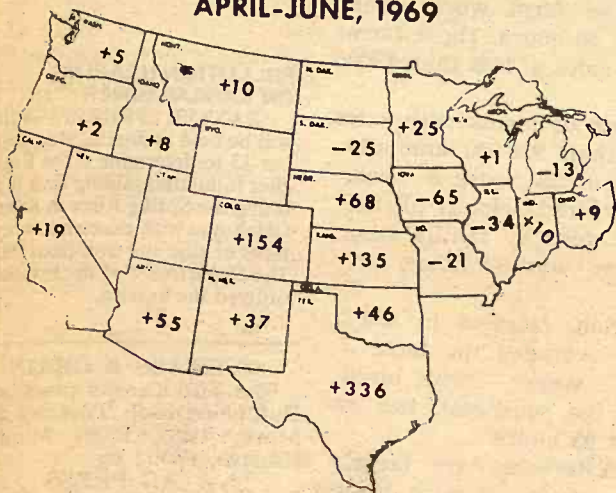

See \$1.80 Milo By Spring

Spurred by the boom in cattle feeding, grain sorghum prices are expected to be higher in 1969-70.

Even though larger supplies are in prospect, grain sorghum prices received by farmers during harvest will likely be in the \$1.68-\$1.80 per cwt. range, and will surpass the \$1.80 level in early spring.

This is somewhat higher than the \$1.69 average recorded during 1968-69.

Domestic consumption has increased substantially in recent

years, with the marked increase in cattle feeding. Commercial feedlots are growing in number, and existing lots are enlarging their capacity.

Consumption is expected to reach the 650 million bushel level in 1969-70, up from 630 million bushels a year earlier.

Exports have dropped sharply during the last three years, due to reduced commercial demand and smaller exports under PL-480. Exports in 1969-70 are not expected to improve much from the 1968-69 level of 85 million bushels — the smallest since 1960-61.

U.S. acreage is estimated at 17.3 million acres, compared to 17.9 million in 1968-69. Present indications point to a crop somewhat less than 750 million bushels.

The national loan rate remains at \$1.61 per cwt., with 53 cents per cwt. paid on 50 percent of the base (if planted) to producers who reduce acreage 20 to 50 percent.

More Fertilizer Used - But Increase Slows

Fertilizer sales in Kansas for the fiscal year ending June 30, 1969 reached an all time record high of 1,086,323 tons. The report, based on commercial fertilizer sales by manufacturers to Kansas dealers, was issued by the Control Division of the Kansas State Department of Agriculture.

Robert Guntert, Director of the Control Division, said the previous high was 1,072,882 tons in 1967-68. "Actual plant food content of fertilizers sold in Kansas in 1968-69 fiscal year amounted to 564,405 tons as compared to 548,467 tons in 1967-68," Guntert said.

"Substantial increases for most fertilizer materials were recorded over the previous fiscal year," Guntert said. Grades of mixed dry fertilizers were led by 18-46-0 (percentage nitrogen-available phosphorus-potash). For the first time in five years, 18-46-0 showed a slight decrease, 172,029 tons as compared to 177,118 tons the previous year.

Fertilizer sales for the six-month period ending June 30, 1969 recorded a slight decrease

from the same period ending June 30, 1968. This year's figure was 640,524 tons as compared to the 658,571 tons in the spring period of 1968.

A total of 320,545 tons of actual plant nutrients was sold during the spring period, a decrease of 8,720 tons from the same period in 1968. Nitrogen sales showed 232,874 tons, down 11,588 tons; available phosphoric acid sales totaled 65,095 tons, up 285 tons; potash sales were 22,576 tons, up 2573.

Doniphan County led the state in spring sales with 21,240 tons, followed by Brown 20,463; Nemaha 20,352; Atchison 18,063; Marshall 15,831; Finney 14,740; and Republic 13,782.

Five Co-ops On Fortune List

Again this year, five agricultural cooperatives made Fortune magazine's listing of the country's 500 largest industrial corporations.

Agway, Inc., Syracuse, N.Y., was 188th with its \$520 million annual volume, down a little from its 175th place the previous year.

Farmland Industries, Kansas City, Mo., was 244th with an annual volume of \$378 million, down slightly from 237th last year.

Land O'Lakes Creameries, Minneapolis, Minn., ranked about in the middle, 251st, with an annual volume of \$367 million, up in rank from 253rd last year.

Cotton Producers Association, Atlanta, Ga., was 312th, with annual business of \$272 million, moving up from 16th the previous year.

Farmers Union Central Exchange, St. Paul, Minn., ranked 471st with a yearly volume of \$153 million, down slightly from 468th place last year.

Two of these cooperatives also ranked among the top ten in sales per employee. Land O'Lakes ranked fifth with an average of \$158,000 of annual sales for each employee. Farmers Union Central Exchange ranked 9th with \$123,000 of annual sales for each employee.

Also on the 1969 Fortune list for the 50 largest life insurance companies was a cooperative-oriented company for the first time — Nationwide Insurance Companies, Columbus, Ohio. Nationwide's assets stood at \$414 million at the end of 1968, nearly \$62 million higher than 1967.

Nationwide has over a half million active policies and \$4.4 billion of insurance in force. Face amount of its sales volume last year was \$650 million, and total income \$90 million.

I-35 IMPROVEMENT ENDS
5 MILES EAST OF EMPORIA



START OF A HIGHWAY WAR?

The Kansas Turnpike Authority has already recognized a threat to its revenues near Emporia, which may be a bit premature in advertising I-35 as an alternate route for the motorist going northeast on the Turnpike to Kansas City.

The top sign advises the driver heading toward Emporia from the south to take I-35, by going thru Emporia. What that sign doesn't tell the motorist is that I-35 stops five miles east of Emporia, a fact which the Turnpike Authority thoughtfully provides several yards past the I-35 sign.

If a driver takes the I-35 exit, he will have to drive about 50 miles on 2-lane US50 to Ottawa before he can again pick up the 4-lane Turnpike route.

While the I-35 advice might appear premature, Turnpike Authority officials doubtless recognize a major threat to its income when the route is completed between Emporia and Ottawa. I-35 is completed between Emporia and Ottawa. I-35 is completed from Ottawa to Kansas City.

60-Hour Average For Farm Work

Many farmers say they would not live in cities because of the high-pressure, fast-paced way of doing things, but the Agriculture Department says this assumption may be wrong.

"Put a city slicker on a farm and he might crack under the strain," a new report says.

"For one thing, the 40-hour work week of the average non-farm clerical worker or wage earner rarely applies to farming."

A survey by the Economic Research Service on labor inputs of agriculture showed that in 1964 the nation's farmers averaged 59 hours of work per week if all the chores were done themselves.

Even with hired help, the ERS said, the average work week was

55 hours. The work year was computed at 49 weeks.

Only among the low-income farms, mainly in the South, did the average farm work week come near 40 hours. These farms had gross sales of less than \$5000 a year.

Operators of farms with sales of more than \$10,000 annually put in about 58 hours a week, even with hired help. If all the work was done by family labor, the average was 62 hours or more.

By region, farmers in the northeast averaged the most — 70 hours a week — with hired labor. In the southeast, the average was 45 hours.

"The differences are largely due to the choice of farm enterprise, with dairying predominating in the northeast and crop farming in the southeast," officials said.

Farm wives also pitched in with an average of about 25

hours of actual farm work week, or about 7 percent of total hours of farm work on farms in 1964, the report said.

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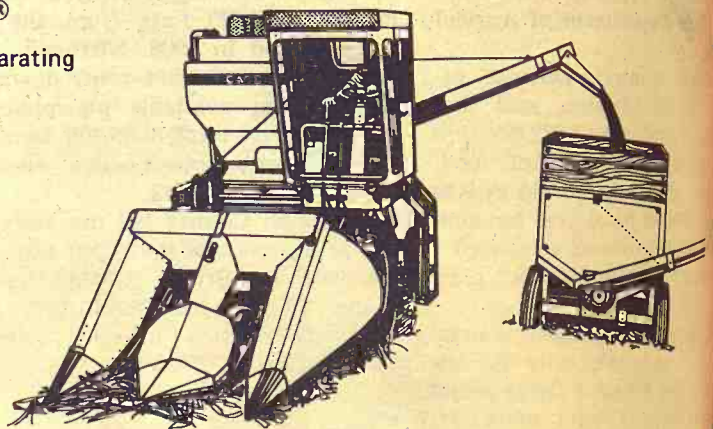
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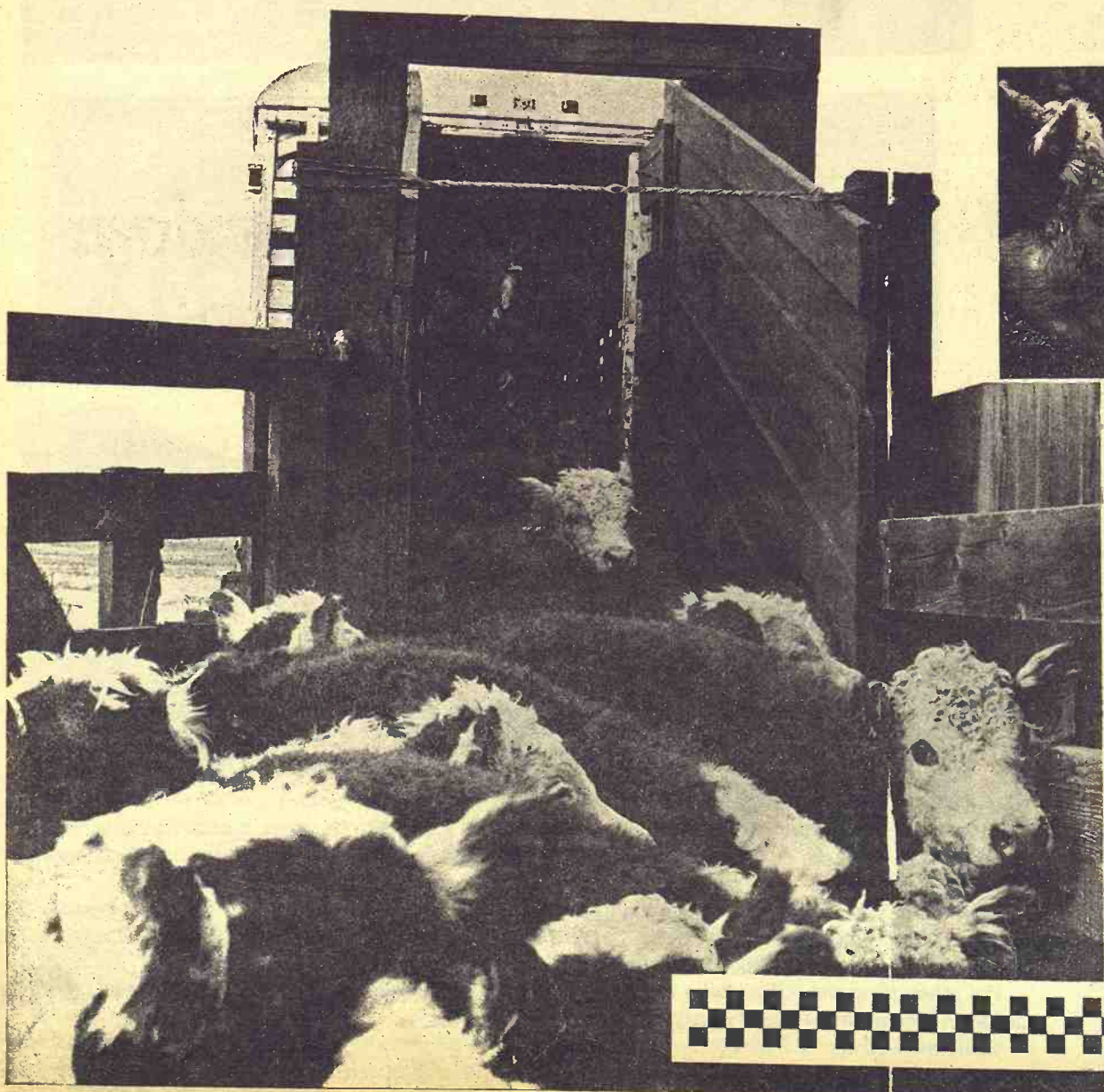
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Ford Drops Its Falcon

After a decade of production the Ford Motor Company will drop its compact Falcon line, John Naughton, vice-president and general manager of the Ford division, said.

The Falcon was one of the original compacts introduced in 1959 by American manufactur-

ers and currently is being assembled in Kansas City and at two other American plants.

The Falcon production line, Naughton said, will be converted entirely to the Maverick. He also said without further explanation that the Falcon name will be on a new car early in 1970, to be announced later.

Until the Maverick was introduced this year, the Falcon was the smallest car made by Ford.

The Maverick is four inches shorter in over-all length and eight inches shorter in wheelbase than the Falcon.

Maverick's success has been instant and is matching that of the 1965 Mustang. The Mustang was the first of the personalized sporty cars using the long hood and short deck formula which has been applied successfully by competing manufacturers.

The Maverick is the first American-made car introduced

to compete with the small foreign imports and the other American manufacturers are following with smaller compacts scheduled for introduction within the next two years.

Mustang's popularity cut into Falcon's sales in 1965 and now Maverick and its competing smaller compacts can be expected to have the same effect. As Falcon goes out of the picture, it will be following the Chevrolet Corvair. The Plymouth Valiant

made by the Chrysler corporation will be the only remaining original domestic compact of 1959.

Volkswagen and the other similarly sized imports from Europe and Japan are the target of the new emphasis on smaller domestic compacts. Last year the imports took 10 percent of the American market, and roughly half of them were Volkswagens.

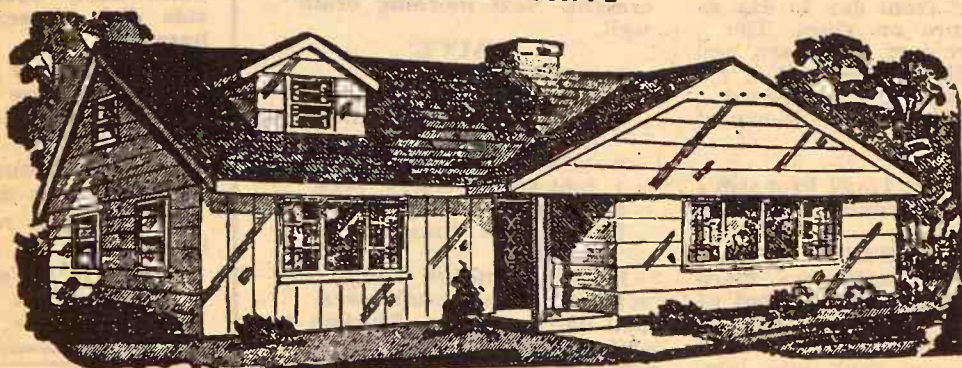

Mrs. L. J. Holthaus, Seneca, Sends Prize-Winning Recipe

Mrs. L. J. Holthaus, R 1, Seneca, is this week's prize winner. She writes, "I am enclosing a recipe for a salad which my family enjoys very much."

WHITE SALAD

Mix 1 teaspoon unflavored gelatin in $\frac{1}{4}$ cup cold water. Let stand five minutes. Dissolve over hot water. Let cool. Whip $\frac{1}{2}$ cup cream; add 2 tablespoons salad dressing and the cooled gelatin. Fold in $\frac{1}{2}$ package small marshmallows, 1 can (202) drained, crushed pineapple, 1 can mandarin oranges (drained) and 1 cup coconut. Refrigerate overnight.

Mrs. Ed Neumeyer, White City: "I am sending you one of my favorite applesauce cookie recipes which is delicious for children's lunch or anytime."

APPLESAUCE COOKIES

1 cup applesauce
1 cup seedless raisins
1 cup granulated sugar
 $\frac{1}{2}$ cup butter or oleo
1 egg, unbeaten
2 cups sifted all-purpose flour
1 teaspoon each salt, baking powder and cinnamon
1 cup chopped nuts
Mix applesauce and raisins. Set aside. Combine sugar, butter and egg in a mixing bowl. Beat until fluffy. Stir in applesauce and raisins; sift flour with salt, baking powder, soda and spices. Add and mix well. Stir in nuts; drop soft dough by teaspoonful two inches

apart on greased baking sheets at 375 degrees for 12-15 minutes. Makes four to five dozen soft cookies.

Stella Wetzel, R 1, Manchester: "This is the best stew you ever ate."

VENISON STEW

Place $1\frac{1}{2}$ pounds of shoulder or saddle of venison in an earthen jar and cover with vinegar. Combine with 3 or 4 slices of onion and 6 bay leaves. Marinate in vinegar mixture for two days. Then wash meat in cold water, add to boiling water and stew slowly until meat is tender. When venison is cooked, remove from water and bone. Dice 4 carrots and 5 sticks of celery and cook in meat broth until tender. Cut meat in medium pieces and add to vegetable broth mixture.

Thicken broth with salt and pepper to taste. Serves six to eight.

After requesting a Lazy Wife's Mustard Pickle recipe, your editor has learned that there is a variety of pickles that bear this title, although the pickles are prepared in different ways. A few of them appear here. All the recipes received were given to the woman who requested them and she joins me in thanking all of you for your help. — ed.

This recipe was sent by Mrs. Henry A. Nutsch, R 1, Haddam:

LAZY WIFE MUSTARD PICKLES

These pickles are easy to make and easier to eat. Mix together 1 can ground mustard, 2 cups sugar, $\frac{1}{2}$ cup salt and 2 quarts vinegar. Do not heat. Cut cucumbers into chunks and place in a stone jar. Cover with the mustard mixture. Let stand for 2 or 3 weeks before using. Need not be sealed. You can use the misshapen cucumbers of which you finally find a few when making other pickles, or you can prepare the vinegar mixture, put into jar, and add cucumbers from day to day as they mature on vines. The pickles are tart, but tasty, and they enable you to utilize cucumbers you might discard when making other kinds of pickle.

Here is Mrs. Louis Frohardt's recipe. Mrs. Frohardt lives on R 2, Chapman:

LAZY HOUSEWIFE PICKLES

Sterilize 5 quart jars. Place 4 slices of onion in bottom of each. Slice fresh, washed cucumbers, either lengthwise or crosswise, and pack into jars. Heat to boiling point 4 cups sugar, $\frac{1}{2}$ cup salt (not iodized), 1 quart vinegar, 1 pint soft water. Pour over cucumbers in jars. To each jar add $\frac{1}{2}$ teaspoon celery seed, $\frac{1}{2}$ teaspoon dried dill seed (I prefer small head of fresh dill), a piece of alum half as large as a pea. Seal jars at once. Pickles will be ready to eat in two weeks. For variation, omit onions and use half as much celery seed and more fresh dill. This is very good for small gardeners, for a small amount may be canned at a time.

The next recipe is from Mrs. Gerald J. Meyer of Hollenberg:

LAZY HOUSEWIFE PICKLES

3 quarts vinegar
1 quart water
1 cup salt (pickling)
1 cup sugar
1 cup dry mustard
 $\frac{1}{2}$ teaspoon alum
2 tablespoons mixed pickling

spice
Combine all ingredients and bring to a boil. Put a couple sprigs of dill in each sterilized quart jar. A couple cloves garlic may also be added, if desired. Pack jars with cucumbers. If medium size, split or chunk. Pour boiling syrup over and seal. "Takes about two months before they're real good, but we can never wait that long." This will make about 8 quarts, depending on how tight they're packed.

This recipe is from Mrs. Ina Griffie, Blue Rapids:

MUSTARD PICKLES

Chunk vegetables:
4 quarts cucumbers
3 quarts onions
6 green or red sweet peppers or both
3 boxes frozen cauliflower
3 cups cabbage
2 pints or more of green beans
6 carrots, scraped and split
Cook carrots and beans 25 minutes. Add to other vegetables. Layer vegetables (except cauliflower) in bowl or crock with 1 cup pickling salt. Add 1 quart water and let stand overnight. Next morning drain well.

SAUCE

4 cups vinegar
4 cups sugar
 $\frac{1}{4}$ cup dry mustard moistened with vinegar
2 tablespoons mustard seed
1 tablespoon celery seed
2 teaspoons celery salt
2 teaspoons tumeric, moistened

Heat the sauce to boiling. Add vegetables and cauliflower. Boil 10-12 minutes. Thicken to suit with cornstarch. Seal in

sterilized pint jars. Makes about 12 pints.

Laundrying Rules For Fabrics With Soil-Release Finishes

Soil-release finishes are not new in fabrics because each fabric has its own chemical properties.

However, if your fabrics are treated with soil release you can get good results if you follow these laundrying rules:

- Read and follow instructions on merchandise labels.
- Blot or sponge spots or stains promptly. The longer stains are left in, the more difficult they are to remove. Aged stains should be pre-treated with a concentrated solution of detergent for about an hour before laundrying.
- Do not expose spots and stains to heat or sunlight, since some type can be "baked" right into the fabric.
- Sort and wash white pieces separately from colored ones and heavily soiled pieces separately from those that are only lightly

soiled.

Use as much (or even a little more) soap or detergent in the wash cycle as the amount recommended on the container. Follow directions on the merchandise label for washing and rinsing temperatures.

Leave Fat Layer

When a recipe directs you to trim the excess fat from around chops or other cuts of meat, be sure to leave a thin layer to act as a protective coating so that during cooking the meat itself will not dry unduly.

Some fat is desirable because it helps to keep meat from sticking and it adds flavor.

To Mend Knits

When mending a knitted garment, place the torn portion over the bristles of a brush. This will prevent the yarn from stretching while you work and eliminates puckering or drawing the yarn too tight.

Iron Trim On Wrong Side

Iron a rickrack-trimmed dress first on the wrong side. The rickrack will lie flat instead of catching the iron when you iron the dress.

Don't Toss Out Old Bedspread

Don't discard an old chenille bedspread. Probably there is enough good material to make your daughter an attractive little housecoat.

Easy Way To Cream Shortening

If you heat the blade of your electric mixer in hot water, it will cream cold shortening more readily.

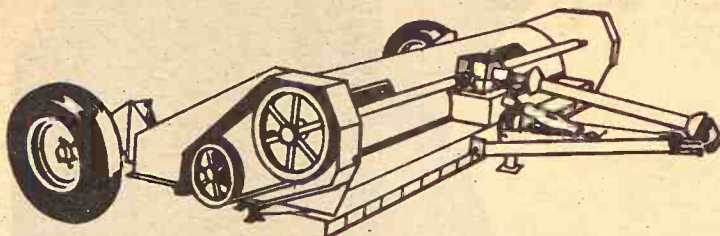
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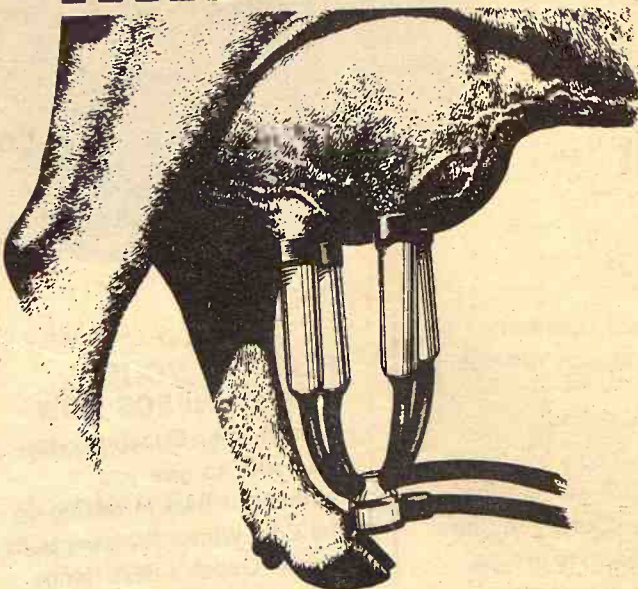

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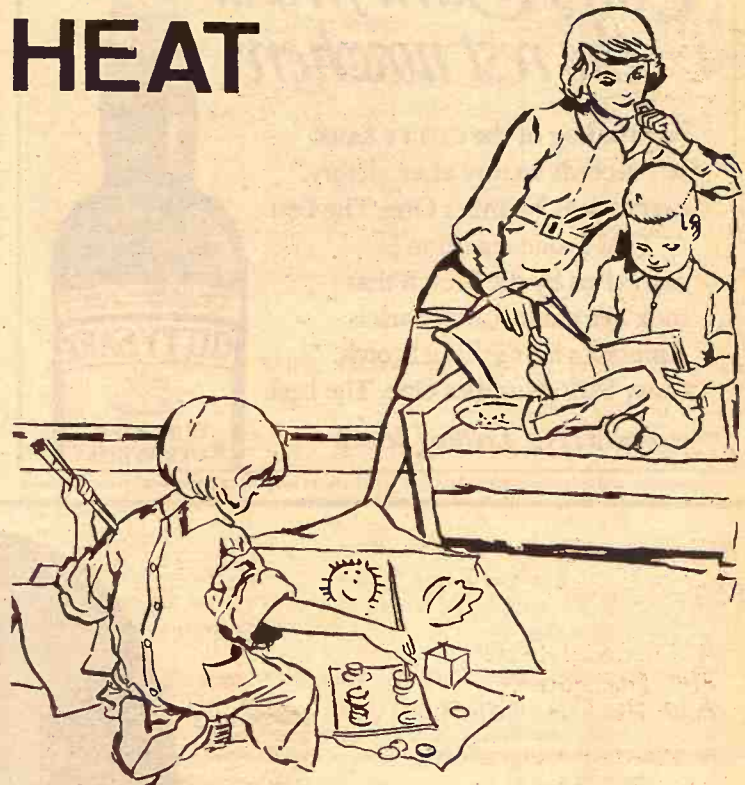
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Need Small Waist for Dirndl Skirt

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At Last — A Dishwasher That Can Eat Leftovers



Hand rinsing and scraping of dishes before automatic dishwashing is practically a thing of the past.

Now there are dishwashers with a soft-food disposer built in which eliminates pre-washing chores. You can even put in plates with leftovers such as mashed potatoes on them with complete assurance that they'll be washed away and gobbled up.

Not only do today's dishwash-

ers scour the dirtiest dishes clean with water much hotter than hands can stand, but automatic wetting agent dispensers prevent spots from forming on fine china and glassware even in the hardest water areas, assuring the homemaker of a "spotless reputation" in the dishwashing department.

These dishwashers also feature simple controls and there are no restricting loading pat-

terns to follow. Most models handle up to 17 table settings which means the dishwasher need be operated only a day, providing definite savings on hot water and detergent.

Special features of some of the deluxe dishwashers are a wash cycle for partially soiled dishes and a "door indicator" which lets the homemaker know if the door in the machine has been opened or not.

When the machine has completed the wash cycle and the drying cycle, the word "open" appears in a small transparent window adjacent to the control dial. The indicator resets automatically when the door is closed to remove the dishes.

Back Off From Color TV

The Federal Trade Commission joined the Public Health Service in cautioning television viewers to sit closer than 6 to 10 feet from their sets because of possible radiation emission.

The FTC said a staff study of radiation danger in response to expressions of concern from consumers and Congress excluded science does not know what effects, if any, low radiation doses may have on the body over long periods of exposure.

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Dairymen Seek More Import Protection

The dairy industry, led by several Wisconsin industry and producer groups, wants to discuss with the Agriculture department the possibility of tightening import regulations.

ening loopholes it says exist in U.S. import regulations.

A series of import changes over the last couple of years has brought a considerable decrease in the volume of foreign dairy products entering the United States, but industry spokesmen say more tightening is needed.

For most of the last decade, dairy imports totaled less than one billion pounds of milk equiv-

alent annually, or less than one percent of U.S. production.

Then, as world supplies grew, particularly in the European Common Market, the United States became a favored market place. In 1966 dairy imports rose to about 2.8 billion pounds, compared with 923 million in 1965.

Instead of imports being 0.7 percent of U.S. output in 1965, the rate in 1966 jumped to 2.3 percent.

Increases continued and in 1967 imports peaked at more than 2.9 billion pounds or 2.4 percent of U.S. production.

Some import quotas were set in 1968 and again this year. These, as well as last winter's dock strike, cut 1968 imports to about 1.8 billion pounds. The latest outlook is for around 1.3 billion pounds of dairy imports in 1969.

However Sen. Gaylord Nelson (D-Wis.) says dairy spokesmen plan to meet this month with Secretary Clifford M. Hardin of the Agriculture Department to discuss the possibility of further adjustments in the import program. Foreign suppliers, Nelson said, have taken advantage of quota loopholes.

For example, he said, a provision in the regulations exempts higher-quality foreign cheeses from the quotas which are aimed at types selling for 47 cents a pound or less.

Nelson said that cheeses originally selling for "substantially less" than 47 cents now are being offered at slightly more than the cut-off price and thus avoid quota regulation.

He cited also foreign export subsidies ranging from 60 cents

a pound on butter to nine cents a pound for nonfat dry milk to ship surpluses into other markets.

Nelson said imports of butter-fat-sugar mixtures which had been placed under U.S. quota restrictions now are being disguised as nonquota ice cream which displaces milk produced by American farmers in the production of authentic ice cream products.

"The facts are simple," Nelson said in a statement. "Western Europe and other dairy producing areas are facing constantly growing excess milk production and are desperate for export markets for their surpluses."

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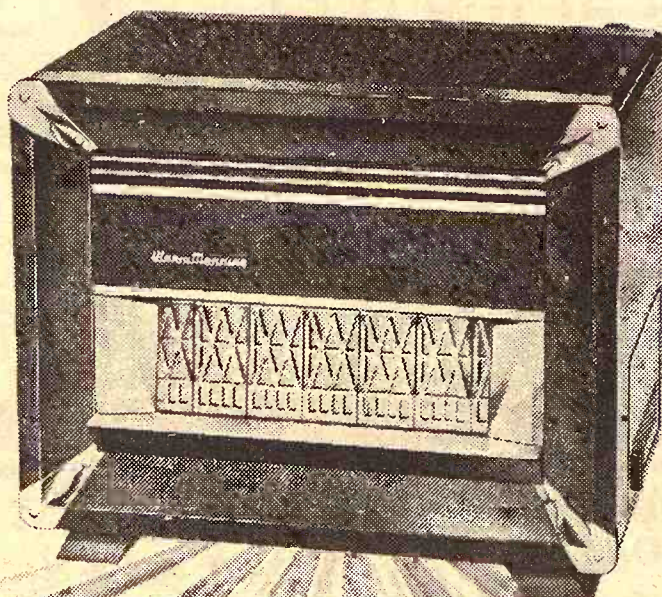


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Aussies Maneuver To Avoid U.S. Meat Quota

Meat imports are running far ahead of a year ago, and Australia — the major foreign supplier — has taken steps to avoid U.S. quota action.

The Agriculture Department

said in a report that the Australian meat board began on August 10 to hold a close rein over exporters to shipments will not rise enough to trigger U.S. restrictions.

Under law, certain types of meat — primarily beef and mutton — are allowed to be imported each year up to a basic level reflecting U.S. domestic production and consumption. This year's basic allowance is 998 million pounds. But the law permits an override of 10 percent — in this case a total of 1,086,800,000 pounds — before tight quotas are put into effect.

Each three months, the secre-

tary of agriculture must estimate the year's total quota of meat imports, and if this estimate exceeds the so-called trigger point then restrictions go into effect. The last estimate was for 1035 million pounds — more than the basic allowance but not high enough to trigger quotas.

But monthly quota-type meat has been coming into the United States at a high rate. In July, the last monthly total announced, imports totaled 107,100,000 pounds, compared with 85,700,000 in June and 86 million in July last year. The 7-month total for quota meat is about 591,700,000 pounds, compared with 542,800,000 for the same period in 1968.

The Foreign Agricultural Service said the August 10 action was designed "to make sure that Australian exports to the United States . . . are held to the voluntary restraint level."

The move was not unprecedented. Last year, as quota-meat imports rose, the United States unofficially encouraged Australia, New Zealand and other major shippers to cut back voluntarily so tight restrictions would not have to be imposed.

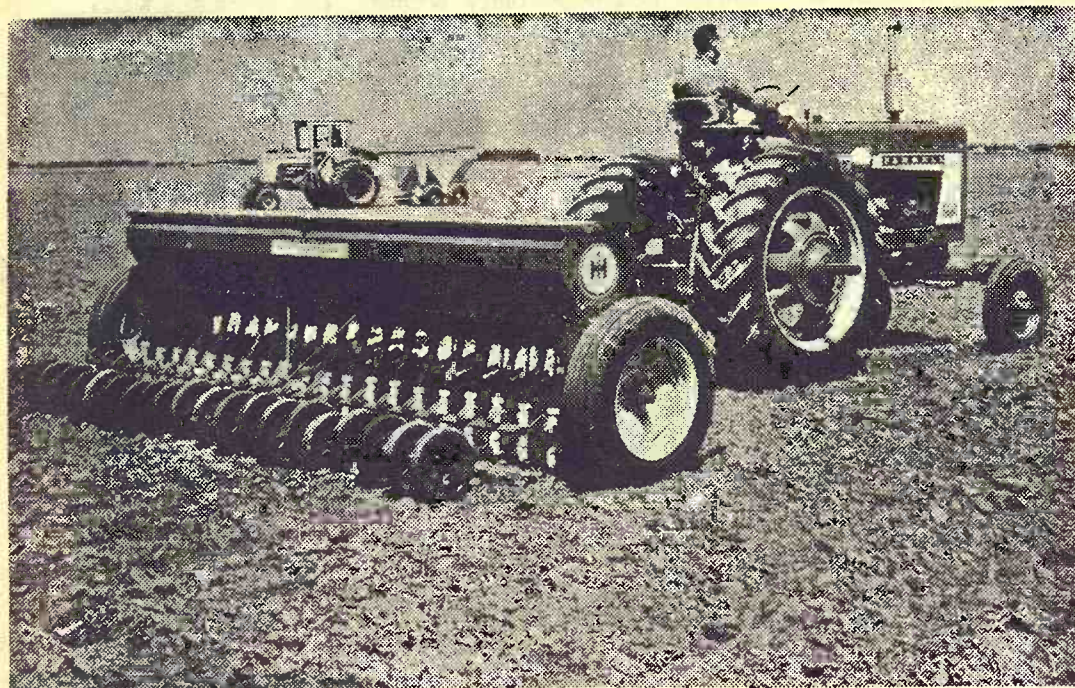
FAS officials also noted that Australian beef and veal production this year could be 5 to 6 percent more than in 1968. There are also indications that mutton

output has risen and could be percent larger than last year. The report also raised the possibility that this increase in Australian meat production could mean much larger export

ity next year. "The expected production increase will probably be used most entirely for export," FAS said. "Total consumption of beef and veal in Australia has been virtually static at the level so far this year, while mutton consumption has declined."

Also, the FAS said, it appears Australia soon will have to go beyond the traditional big

ish market for larger outlets. Beginning October 1, the United Kingdom will reduce its port duty on fresh, chilled frozen beef from non-Commonwealth countries. This means the FAS said, that Australia and other Commonwealth countries which have had preferential trade treatment in the islands will have much greater competition for the British market.



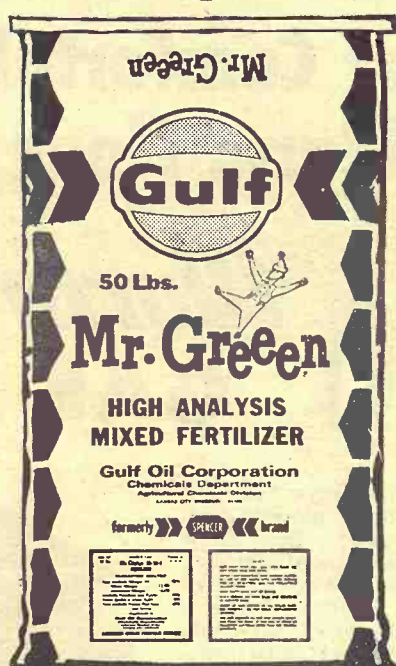
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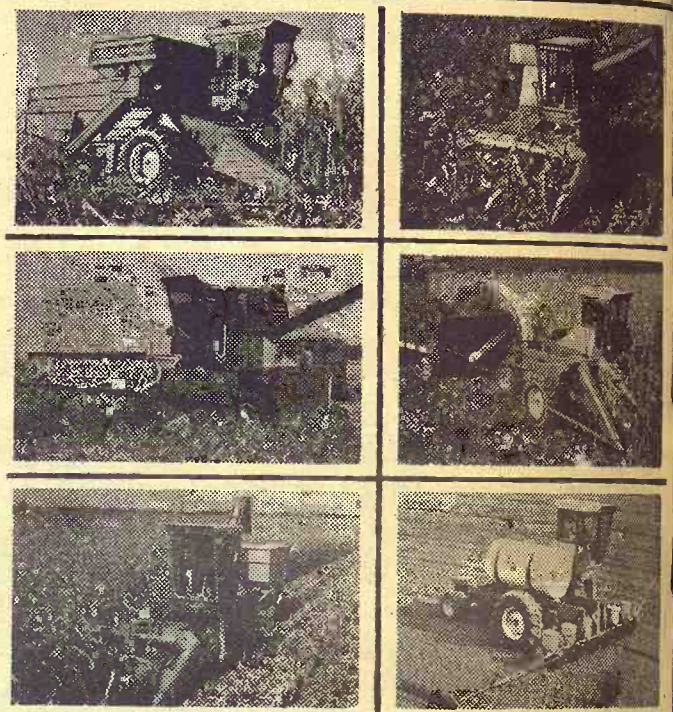

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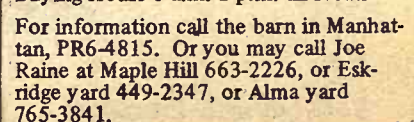
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Egg Profit In Forced Molting

Poultrymen can shift their egg production pattern to take advantage of high and low egg prices by using the proper forced molting method at the right time, reports Kansas State University Extension poultryman M. E. Jackson.

Jackson notes that the profit making potential of forced molting methods was shown in a recent 40-week California experiment.

Dr. Milo Swanson and Don Bell of the University of California conducted the test of slow versus fast molting methods on nearly 600 White Leghorn hens, divid-

ing them into many experimental and control groups.

All hens received water but no feed for 10 days to induce molting. Half were given approximately one-half pound of oyster shell during the starvation period. Artificial lights were off for the first 28 days of the test.

Following the starvation period, groups of hens were fed cracked milo from zero to four weeks, then all hens returned to a 17 percent protein lay mash.

The researchers found that during the first 10 weeks of egg production following molt and milo eating, hens that had eaten milo longest had the lowest laying rate and that hens fed milo the shortest time had the highest

laying rate.

The opposite was true during the second 10 weeks of laying after molt. Hens on long milo feeding had the best egg production and hens on short milo feeding time had poorest egg production.

Oyster shell also proved beneficial during short molting periods and no oyster shell was better during long molting periods.

Feed costs per dozen eggs averaged 16.2 cents for all hens in the experiment.

Lowest feed cost per dozen eggs was 15.4 cents on hens receiving oyster shell during the starvation period and milo, plus vitamins on mineral, for three weeks thereafter.

Highest feed cost per dozen eggs — 17.6 cents — was with hens receiving no oyster shell and fed two weeks on cracked milo, plus vitamins and minerals.

Jackson notes that the California researchers concluded that a short molting period, with oyster shell provided during the starvation period, was best when egg prices are high and hens need to get back into production fast to take advantage of the good prices.

They suggested a long molt and no oyster shell for times when egg prices are low. This practice will result in higher hen performance later when prices are higher.

The researchers alerted poultrymen to one minor problem. Hens put through a fast molt may produce eggs with rough shells when they get back into production. Slow molting results in smoother shelled eggs.

Cut Restrictions, Increase Income — But How?

House Republicans have called for a new approach to farm legislation that would increase farm prices and eliminate government subsidies.

In a report timed for the opening of congressional hearings on farm policy, a G.O.P. task force

on agriculture said the current program had been a costly failure.

Under it, farm prices have gone steadily down and subsidy payments have risen, the report said, resulting in a depressed rural economy that has driven millions of persons from the farms to the cities.

The Republicans did not make specific recommendations for a program but said its goal should be the guarantee of adequate market prices for farm products and an end to farm subsidies.

"Our efforts should be concerned with compensating the farmer for the food and fiber he does produce rather than paying him off for not producing," said Rep. Odin Langen of Minnesota, task force chairman.

Langen said the average prices for wheat and rye had declined since 1963 from \$1.94 and

\$1.31 a bushel respectively, \$1.33 and \$1.06. In the same period, he said, annual farm commodity payments doubled from billion dollars to 3 billion.

"Since 1963," he said, "absolutely low market prices have driven farmers 11 billion dollars in income and farm programs to cost taxpayers 14 billion in subsidies. Our recommendations would obviously better serve everyone — the farmer, the payer, the consumer and the government."

The current farm program in effect through next year's crop season. The House agriculture Committee opens hearings today on new proposals.

The administration has not come forward with a program. Secretary of Agriculture Clifford M. Hardin is due to testify before the committee September 24.

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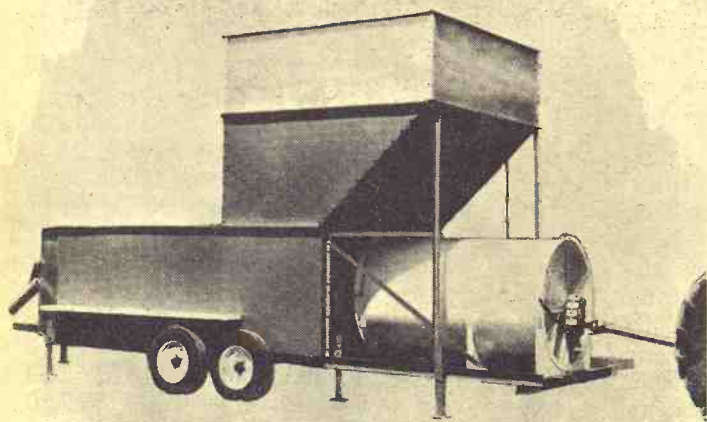

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Strong Feeder Market Thru '70

Feeder cattle prices may vary considerably in the short-term, but are expected to remain strong throughout the rest of 1969 and 1970.

Feeder prices will follow fat cattle prices in general, but are more likely to remain high this year even if the fat cattle market shows short-term decreases.

Look for choice 450-pound steer calves to range between \$34-\$37 in October and November, rising to \$35-\$38 by next spring. Choice

700-850 pound feeder steers are expected to be in the \$28-31 range this fall, increasing slightly to \$29-\$32 next spring.

Favorable feeding margins the past 12 months will make cattle feeders more optimistic. Good feeding profits along with reas-

Imports of feeder cattle in 1969 will probably be down slightly from the 1 million head imported last year. Total feeder cattle imports in 1969 will likely not exceed 900,000 head.

This year's calf crop increased less than one percent from 1968. Lower slaughter of calves and non-fed slaughter animals will add to the supply of feeder cattle the last half of 1969.



onably cheap feed usually are reflected in higher prices paid for feeder cattle.

The supply of young beef animals outside feedlots July 1, 1969 was down from a year ago. This can be accounted for partly by the heavy placements of feed before July 1. Placements the first half of 1969 were 700,000 above 1968.

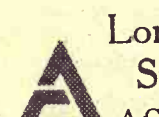

Outside Income Up For Some

Recently-released IRS statistics for 1966 show that people who have their own businesses, professional offices or farms depend, on the average, on sources other than their trades for more than half their income.

It varies from trade to trade, however. Dentists average 85 percent of their income from their practices, the figures show, while field crop farmers earn less than one-third their income from farming. Outside sources include salaries, dividends and rental income.

Texas Boom In Cattle Feeding

Texas is growing bigger and bigger — at least in beef production. Both cattle feeding and beef processing are expanding rapidly in Texas.

An example of the expanding industry was cited recently by an official of the U.S. Department of Agriculture's Consumer and Marketing Service, who visited 11 feedlots within a 40-mile radius southwest of Amarillo. These lots combined had some 300,000 head of cattle on feed. Feedlot expansion is continuing, as reliable reports indicate that 16 new feedlots with individual capacities of 20,000 to 60,000 head are planned or are under construction in the High Plains.

As of July 1 this year, numbers of cattle on feed in Texas were 60 percent higher than in 1968 — ranking Texas second in number of cattle on feed in the United States. The present rate of growth indicates another sizeable increase likely in this area by July 1970.

A similar expansion is occurring in the High Plains area of Oklahoma, Kansas, and New Mexico. Feed grain supplies are abundant and additional land is being brought under irrigation to produce more milo and some corn for the expanding cattle feeding operations.

Texas produces more than 10 percent of the Nation's calf crop. USDA estimates that nearly two-thirds of the gain in the calf crop this year will be in Texas. About a 236,000 head increase is expected to occur in Texas out of an anticipated 369,000 head gain in the nation.

With the increased cattle feeding, there has been a similar increase in new packing plants. One of the largest beef slaughtering plants in the United States was opened in Friona, Tex., about a year ago. Another large plant is under construction at Hereford, and at least three other plants are reportedly planned for this general area in the immediate future.

Continued Strong Feed Grain Demand

Feed grain supplies should be fairly tight during the coming year, with price averaging above the loan rate.

Total feed grain supply for 1969-70 is estimated at 214 million tons, 3 million less than last year. The crop — forecast in July at 165 million tons — would be 3 million smaller than last year and 11 million below the record crop of 1967.

Look for corn prices to drop to the loan level (\$1.05) during harvest, then rebound to \$1.10-\$1.25 by May or June.

Utilization of corn is expected to be 4.5 million bushels, resulting in a reduction in carryover stocks to 800 million bushels.

Feed grain disappearance in 1969-70 probably will exceed production, resulting in a moderate

reduction in carryover stocks at the close of the year.

Strong feed grain demand which developed the past year is expected to continue into 1969-70. A further increase in livestock numbers is in prospect for 1969-70, although the rate of feeding may recede somewhat from the 1968-69 record.



Total carryover into 1969-70 is expected to be around 48 million tons, about the same as at the beginning of the current marketing year.

However, "free" carryover stocks may total only 10-12 million tons, down from 18 or 19 million the past three years.

Rough Year On Mutual Funds

Only seven of 379 mutual funds checked have increased their net asset value in this year of falling stock prices, Arthur Lipper corporation, a New York brokerage firm reported.

Lipper said that while this has been an unsuccessful year for the funds, many of the large funds have held up well because they have not been aggressive in their investments as in the past two years.

Topping the list of funds, with an increase of 6.39 per cent in asset value this year, was Templeton Growth fund.

Others whose assets increased were Vantage Ten Ninety fund, 5.85 per cent; Pro fund, 0.54 per cent; Scudder International Investments, 0.37 per cent; United Funds Canada International, 0.25 per cent; Investors Selective fund, 0.10 per cent, and Keystone B-1, 0.07 per cent.

The biggest losers, according to Lipper were Hubshman fund, 38.31 per cent; Worth fund, 35.32 per cent; O'Neil fund, 35.01 per cent; Olympus fund, 34.85 per cent; Ling fund, 31.79 per cent; All American fund, 31.57 per cent; and Mates Investment fund, 31.50 per cent.

Lipper calculates its rankings on the basis of reinvestment of all income and capital gains.

In another report on the mutual fund industry, the Investment Company Institute said sales of fund shares by its members declined 11.4 per cent in June to \$469,100,000. Redemptions in June totaled \$338,300,000 down 10.1 per cent from a year earlier.

The institute reported that in June the funds were net buyers of securities with total portfolio purchases exceeding sales by \$525,200,000.

Thefts included ones from nearby counties in Kansas and Missouri, and an attempted theft of a tractor at Bronaugh, Mo.

The sheriff said any offers to sell a tractor "cheap" should be reported immediately to his office.

'The Train Just Went Toot-Toot'

"The train just went toot-toot and that was the end of it."

Dairyman Garman Breitenbach of Belpre was speaking after a passenger train mowed thru his 69-head herd of cattle, killing 37 Holstein and Ayrshire heifers. Breitenbach had to destroy two more, and several others were injured.

The cattle had escaped a pasture by battering a gate. The cattle had crossed US 50 to get to the tracks, where they were bunched when the train hit.

"I always knew cattle were dumb, but I didn't think they were this dumb," said Mrs. Breitenbach.

Breitenbach bought the heifers from a Summerfield dealer as calves. They were not registered or insured.

He said the loss of 39 cattle "won't put me in the poorhouse. I'm not through. But it backs me up a little."

\$30 Lamb By February

Lamb prices will decrease seasonally during the next few months, but will remain above last year's levels.

Look for prices to bottom out at around the \$26-\$27 level between November 15 and December 15. Prices will show some strength early in 1970 and should reach \$29-\$30 by February 15.

Lamb supplies will be down next year. The 1970 lamb crop probably will be 5 percent lower than 1969. Top prices for choice fat lambs next April-June will be in the \$32-\$34 range.



Feeder lambs will sell in the \$25-\$29 range this fall, depending on quality and weight. Desirable type 65-75 pound feeder lambs will consistently sell at \$27-\$29.

The 1969 lamb crop was down 6 percent. Slaughter was off about 10 percent the first six months of 1969. Imports were very high between March and May and are expected to run fairly high the rest of 1969.

Breeding ewes on farms Jan-

uary 1, 1969, were down 4 percent from 1968. January 1, 1970 ewe numbers will be down 4.5 percent under 1969. Look for a 1970 lamb crop of about 13 million head.

HOSPITAL BIDS WAY OVER ESTIMATES

McPHERSON — Bids for the McPherson County Hospital came in about a quarter-million dollars over estimates, postponing a decision on the 70-bed structure. No bidder offered a bid on any of the 45 proposed alternates which might reduce the cost of the structure. The county had planned to spend about \$2 million, including outlays for equipment. Estimates were about \$1.75 million for the construction, but the lowest bid — by Johnson Builders of Salina — was \$1.996.

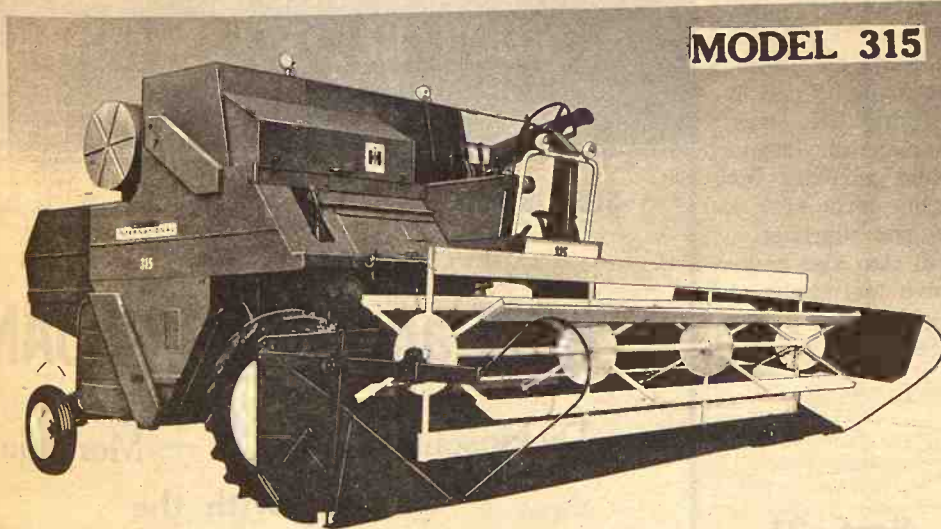

GM Boosts Prices But Holds Line On Warranty

General Motors Corp., the acknowledged auto price pacer, set the stage for the biggest industry increase on new cars in recent history when it boosted its 1970 model quotes by an average it calculated at \$125 a car, or 3.9 percent.

The only rise at GM that comes close was \$110 a car, or 3.6%, when the 1968 models were introduced.

On the 1970-model prices, GM sought to demonstrate that the increase was actually \$84. It argued that about \$40 of the boost stemmed from changes in equipment on the 1970s, such as the installation of glass fiber reinforced tires, bigger standard engines in several lines and making disc brakes standard equipment on others. Thus, it said 1969 models with "comparable" equipment averaged about \$85 more.

In setting its prices, however, GM posed a tactical problem for Ford Motor Co. GM kept unchanged its basic warranty policy of five-year or 50,000-mile coverage on power-train parts, and one year or 12,000 mile on others.

Late last month, Ford announced plans to drop its five-year or 50,000 mile coverage as part of a new policy that gives one-year coverage on everything without mileage or transfer restrictions, and covers certain repairs during the first 90 days that weren't previously included.

Reduced warranty coverage gives financial relief to auto makers just as price increases do and is considered a critical part of auto pricing. Ford must de-

cide whether to gamble that its reduced, but simplified, policy will be more attractive to car buyers than GM's. Its decision could influence the overall amount of its price rises. By staying with its new warranty, it could go for somewhat smaller "sticker" price boosts.

The \$125 increase in the base price, GM said, is on the basis of averages weighted for projected sales volume. In further comments on the boost, GM argued that on "stripped-down models without optional equipment, the \$85 increase it spoke of works out to only a 2.6% jump. And on cars with the usual load of optional equipment (about \$765 on the average 1970 model), the increase from a "comparable" 1969 car is only \$84, or 2.1%, GM reasoned.

Balance Of Evidence Favors The Pill

A government advisory panel says the benefits from oral contraceptives still outweigh the risks, despite new proof of danger from blood clots.

The committee of 14 physicians yesterday submitted its second report to the Food and Drug Administration since 1966 on the status of "The Pill."

FDA Commissioner Herbert L. Ley Jr. termed the findings "favorable."

The committee chairman, Dr. Louis M. Hellman of New York City, said the panel's message to the eight million American women using the pill is similar to the one in 1966: "The light is still yellow — caution."

The report's chief conclusion: "When (the) potential hazards and the values of the drugs are

balanced, the committee finds the ratio of benefit to risk sufficiently high to justify the designation safe . . ."

"There is no effective drug on the market that doesn't have serious adverse side effects associated with it," Ley added.

Hellman said evidence has mounted in the past three years on links between oral contraceptives and such diseases as cancer, diabetes and high blood pressure. But definitive proof is missing, he said.

Inflation Tough Everywhere

Few Americans are not suffering from inflation. But they may take some consolation that they are not suffering alone.

A recent United Nations bulletin of statistics shows how inflation is hitting other countries. The chart shows representative countries from a base of 100 for 1963, showing the change from May 1968 to May 1969.

Dirty Air Cleaners Can Choke Engines

Time spent servicing a tractor during dusty field work this fall can prolong its life and improve engine efficiency.

Kansas State University Extension engineer Elwyn Holmes figures a tractor engine takes in about 9000 gallons of air for every gallon of fuel it burns.

A tractor in normal operations will burn about 3 to 5 gallons of fuel every hour. This means for every 10 hours of operation, the tractor engine takes in from 1/4 to 1/2 million gallons of air.

"That much air may include a lot of dirt," observes Holmes, "especially under dusty conditions. In extreme conditions, dirt can ruin an engine in less than a day's work, if the air is not filtered."

Proper care of the air cleaner results in better economy and insures longer engine life, says Holmes. An efficient air cleaner removes any dust particles that grind away engine parts, such as cylinders, rings and bearings.

An engine will also lose power and use excessive fuel if the air cleaner is clogged.

Holmes suggests that tractor

operators remove the oil bath air cleaner cup and replace the old oil after 10 hours of engine operation. The bottom of the cup should be scraped and washed in kerosene or solvent before it is refilled.

Dry paper filters on some newer tractors function much like air filters on cars. These filters can be blown out a couple of times with an air hose, although they can be easily punctured.

In addition to caring for the air cleaner, a tractor operator should also make periodic checks of engine hoses.

"It doesn't do much good to keep the air cleaner in good condition if the hose leading to the engine isn't checked carefully from time to time," Holmes says.

Wrong Guess On Price Turn

Revised government figures showed that a reported drop in wholesale prices last month — hailed by the White House as among the best economic news in a year — didn't occur at all.

The Labor Department published a more detailed report on a broad range of wholesale food and industrial raw materials that said prices remained unchanged in August, rather than taking the earlier reported drop of one-tenth of one percent.

Renew Talk On World Hunger

MANHATTAN — A conference on "Overcoming World Hunger" will be held at Kansas State University, Manhattan, November 13-16.

The event, jointly sponsored by the American Assembly and by Kansas State University, will deal with world food and population problems.

According to KSU President James A. McCain, the program will represent a continuation for 1969-70 of the Senator Frank Carlson Symposium on World Population and Food Supply initiated by the University last year.

The theme of this conference is of surpassing importance to the future of Kansas agriculture," President McCain said.

Apparently a survey taken in
Missouri and showing than an
alarming number of people don't
think too highly of the legal pro-
fession prodded the Kansas bar
into action.

In that survey, 80 percent of
the people interviewed said they
never recognized the need for
legal services and one-third of
them never had consulted a
lawyer.

Probably more disconcerting
was that when the surveys turned
ed the questions on the attorneys
themselves, 27 percent answered
that not more than half their
fellow lawyers live up to their
code of ethics.

The percentage of lawyers con-
sidered not entirely ethical was
the same as when the general
public was consulted but the
percentage of people who held
this opinion climbed to 34 per-
cent.

These figures were cited by
Darrell D. Kellogg, Wichita at-
torney who as chairman of the
KBA public relations committee
last year, led the drive for an
organized image polishing cam-
paign.

"As we examine our public re-
lations in the eyes of the general
public," Kellogg told the state
bar, "it is interesting to note
that lawyers rank high in pro-
fessional ability . . . but we rank
relatively low in general reputa-
tion as compared with other
leading professions."

Kellogg convinced the bar
membership that the job called
for a professional, meaning that
it would cost money.

At its annual meeting last
year, then, the association voted
a \$10 per member per year fee
to build a \$20,000 fund for each
of the next four years.

Some Caution In Hog Outlook

By Robert L. Coppersmith

A seasonal decline is ahead for
hog prices the next few months.

Look for prices in the \$23-\$24
range during November-December,
dropping to around \$21-\$22
by February, 1970.

Next spring's pig crop will be
up as much as 5-7 percent, the

result of current good hog prices
and reasonably cheap feed. Next
summer will bring a seasonal
price increase, with prices reach-
ing the \$24-\$25 range during
July and August.



Late fall and winter prices in
1970 will be below this year and
could easily drop to the \$18-\$20
level in November and December
unless producers hold spring
and summer farrowing in line.

Feeder pig prices have been
high during 1969. Disease and
embargoes by some states slow-
ed movement of pigs in July,
but prices recovered somewhat

in August.

Look for 40 lb. pigs to sell
around \$17-\$20 per head the rest
of 1969. Prices will decline slight-
ly in early 1970, but should be
near current levels during
March and April.

Little Cheer In Wheat Outlook

By Norman V. Whitehair

A third straight year of lower
wheat prices appears to be in
store for Kansas farmers.

There's nothing on the hori-
zon to trigger an end to the
slump which has seen prices
drop steadily from \$1.78 in July
1966 to the current rate 15 to 25



cents below the loan level.

However, heavy loan participa-
tion, withholding from the mar-
ket and higher exports would
strengthen prices to near the
loan level by January 1970.

Wheat exports for the 1969-70
marketing year are estimated at
550-600 million bushels, up
slightly from a year ago. Large
and well distributed world sup-
plies held the world trade to 47
million metric tons, the small-
est since 1962-63.

Factors working against any
sizeable export expansion are
continued large and increasing
world stocks and record wheat
crops two years in a row in India
and Pakistan — often the prin-
cipal outlets for U.S. wheat.

Future wheat exports will
probably be maintained at pres-
ent levels until exporting coun-
tries reduce their surpluses.

Wheat feeding soared to 175
million bushels in 1968-69, the
highest in 20 years. Present
corn, grain sorghum and wheat
price comparisons would signal
a 50 million bushel increase in
usage of wheat as feed in
1969-70.

See Net Farm Income Near \$16 Billion

By Jack A. Richards
Marketing Information
Kansas State University

Net farm income may near the \$16 billion level for 1969, despite lower crop prices and a continued increase in production expenses.

Net income from farming was up about \$1 billion (annual rate) during the first half of the year — due mostly to more favorable



livestock prices. A continuation of this trend would boost net income considerably from the \$14.8 billion earned in 1968.

Production expenses for 1969-70 are estimated at \$39.3 billion, up from around \$37.6 billion in 1968-69 and \$35.3 billion in 1967-68.

Volume of production for both livestock and crops is expected to be up somewhat in the coming year. Prices for crops in general

will average lower, but livestock prices should be higher.

Government farm programs are currently receiving considerable review with little clear direction indicated at the present time. Political action in coming months may result in significant change in direction from farm programs of the past several

years. Farm prices are heavily influenced by our export policies particularly for some of the grain products. Intense competition in world markets is likely to continue in the coming year. The improvement is expected world demand for products produced by Kansas farmers.

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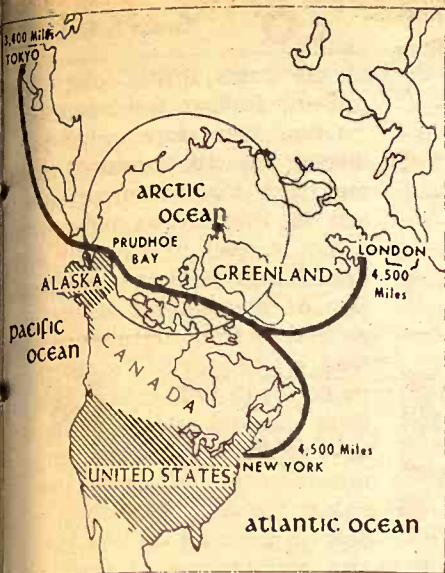

ARCTIC SHIPPING GAMBLE

The Humble Oil Co. has \$39 million invested in a gamble that it can send a commercial-size freighter thru the fabled ice-covered Northwest Passage and bring oil from tremendous new Alaskan reserves markedly cheaper than it could be brought back thru pipelines to refining areas.

Arctic seacaptains seem to believe that Humble's venture will fail, that jumbled masses of ice, some 140 feet thick, will be too much for the experimental ice breaker which is attempting the trip.

Oil men say if the trip proves technically feasible that the shipping savings over a decade could amount to \$200 million a year.

If shipping thru the Northwest Passage proved feasible, oil men say that Alaskan oil might also prove competitive with Middle East oil in Europe and Japan.

land retirement," Frisbie concluded, "let me also correct one other erroneous report. There has been at least one report that the American Farm Bureau is the only major farm or commodity group in the nation favoring massive land retirement as a means for beginning a complete phase out of current farm programs. Stockmen Fed Up With Meat Price Complaints

Housewives are dismayed over rising beef prices, but some livestock groups are fed up with the housewives and have launched a counterbarrage aimed at telling consumers they never had it so good.

The National Livestock Feeders Association says, for example, that considering today's improved living standard and higher wages, "red meats are

still one of the very best buys to be found."

Farmers who fatten cattle for the retail trade also are skeptical of consumer claims of exorbitant store prices and resent being blamed for \$1.49 sirloin.

Midwest beef producers offer no apologies for today's price situation. Rather, many say, producers have had it coming, that production costs have risen constantly and that prices for live

cattle only recently have been high enough for decent profits.

Bill House, president of the American National Cattlemen's Association, not only defended beef as one of the best buys, but noted that cattle prices have dipped and added that "if the free market system operates as it should, the prices the consumer pays for all cuts of beef should be reflected accordingly."

It still is difficult for housewives who must pay 25 cents a pound more for hamburger than they paid last winter to understand farmers' logic. Instead, when meat prices go up it is much easier to blame a distant farmer than the neighborhood supermarket which, incidentally, may employ the family breadwinner.

But it is the middleman who takes two-thirds of a family's food money, not the farmer. And the middleman blames inflation, rising labor costs and increasing demand for higher food prices.

Prices for fed cattle have dropped about \$5 per hundredweight from peaks in June, but still are well ahead of last year.

The Agriculture Department's farm price report said the average cattle price for the month ended August 15 was \$27 per hundredweight, down \$1 from mid-July. This price includes fat cattle in the slaughter market as well as all other types.

The \$27 average in August was computed at 87 percent of parity — the formula used to show what farmers receive in relation to costs.

The point made by spokesmen is that if cattlemen received consistently fair prices in relation to their expenses then housewives would be paying much more for meat than they are.

Fall Forage Field Day Draws 600

A spirited demonstration of silage harvesters in the field climaxed the annual fall forage field day on the Kansas State University agronomy farm.

Operating in a field of tall, rugged forage, equipment bearing the name of some 10 major farm implement manufacturers paraded before several hundred approving spectators.

The harvesters cut swaths in the field in no time.

There was much more than a field demonstration, though. In the morning, visitors were taken to the field in trucks to view crops, hear about research and ask questions of KSU personnel responsible for much of the experimentation.

They were told, for instance, that pearl millet has possibilities as a forage and grazing crop in Kansas because of some late breakthroughs in breeding experiments.

The visitors — nearly 600 of them — were also told that soybean maturity groups III and IV are best adapted to Kansas. The five recommended varieties from the maturity groups include Calland, Wayne, Cutler, Clark 63 and Kent.

Visitors also learned that soybean producers may use one or more of several herbicides — some applied before planting, others applied as a preemergent treatment.

It was suggested that fields heavily infested with resistant weed species might be substituted by other crops for planting so weeds could be more easily controlled.

One tour stop included a discussion on musk thistles, which can play havoc in some Kansas fields. Visitors were told the thistles must be removed by hand. Digging below the crown

of the musk thistle rosette prevent further development.

Other tour stops included a display of sophisticated equipment used for measuring water loss by evaporation and transpiration, a visit to a heavily fertilized forage field and an explanation of the dangers of nitrate poisoning from fertilization of feed crops, a visit to another field where the newest hybrids were growing side by side, an explanation of how range management influences steer gains, including the effect of date of burning on beef yields and maintenance of grass species.

Following lunch, Dr. C. C. Jones, vice president for university development, told of construction now under way on the KSU campus and discussed future financial needs of the university.

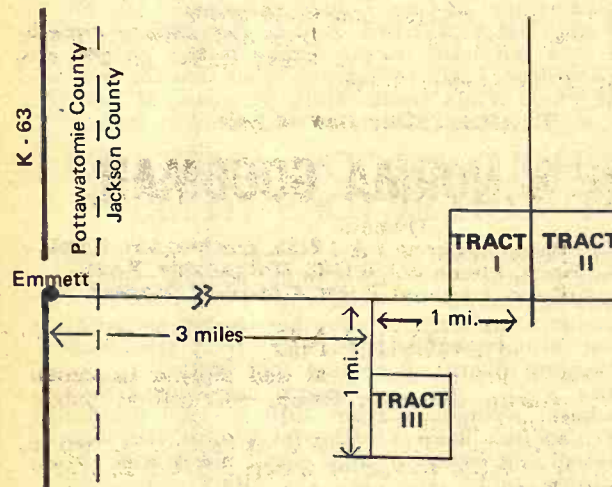

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Slower Rate Of Inflation?

Inflation will continue to be a serious problem in the coming year, but is expected to slow somewhat from the rate which has seen consumer prices soar five percent the first half of 1969.

Control of inflation will continue to play a dominant role in economic policy during the next 12 months. This could result in a pause or mini-recession in our current record-long period of economic expansion. However, much depends on how businessmen and consumers respond to economic policies.

Spending by consumers, businessmen and government is ex-

pected to increase, but at a less rapid rate. Production of goods and services will expand at a slower pace, but may pick up steam during the closing half of 1970.



Unemployment will likely exceed 4 percent during the coming year. This economic pause should help control future inflation and hopefully will set the stage for a continued healthy economic expansion during the

1970s.

Economic policies to control inflation will influence spending at all levels. Continuation of the 10 percent surtax will reduce consumer spending and maintain the federal budget at a surplus. Interest rates will remain relatively high.

Business and residential investment may be influenced more by fear of inflation than by high interest costs. Credit restrictions and a less buoyant outlook should dampen business spending.

Political action will likely limit growth in government spending, especially in the federal sector. If successful in gradually controlling the economy without reversing the present upward expansion, these policies may set the stage for continued economic development.

In the process, unemployment will be controlled only gradually and will likely continue through any pause in the economy. However, significant signs of slower price increases should develop.

In the longer run, these policies hopefully will reduce inflation to about 2 percent annually and bring about more rapid increases in national production.

Expand Bushton Plant To Extract Chemical Ethane

BUSHTON — Construction of an ethane extraction plant, with an ultimate capacity of 500,000 gallons a day, will increase the liquified products production capacity of the Northern Gas Products plant here by 50 percent.

Production is expected to start early next year. The ethane, to be used in the mushrooming petro-chemical industry, will be extracted from the natural gas stream of Northern Natural Gas Company, parent company of Northern Gas Products.

The new plant will be an integrated part of the Northern Gas 1000 acre complex near Bushton.

It will cover 30 acres. Although highly automated, the plant will increase its payroll of 74 by 30 percent.

The company has been extracting liquified petroleum gases and helium since 1962. One million gallons of butane, isobutane, and natural gasoline are removed daily for shipment to national markets.

Northern Gas pipelines from various parts of Kansas and Oklahoma join near Bushton. Only gas from the Hugoton field in Kansas — 470 million cubic feet a day — will be processed for ethane.

Company officials said extraction of the ethane from the natural gas will not affect its heating qualities. The plant is designed to reject a proportionate amount of nitrogen to offset the loss of BTU's brought about by the ethane removal.

Seed Treatment Increases Yields

Kansas growers can increase
wheat stands an average of 10
percent by treating their seed
with a proper fungicide.

Claude L. King, Kansas State
University Extension plant path-
ologist, says this applies even to
seed of high laboratory germina-
tion.

Research at K-State by Dr.

Earl Hansing has shown that
when wheat or barley seed is
treated with a proper fungicide,
there is an increase in stand up
to 20 percent.

King says there is also evi-
dence that the protection seed
treatment gives to seed and
seedlings will increase yields at
least one bushel an acre. This is
a return of \$15 for \$1 spent for
the fungicide.

Cleaning the seed before it is
treated removes shriveled and
cracked kernels, weed seeds and

straw which clog drill spouts.
Sixty-pound test, weight seed in
K-State tests has yielded five
bushels more per acre than 53
pound test weight seed.

King says if custom service is
not available a grower can treat
his own seed with an auger load-
er. He can spoon-feed dust or
liquid forms of any of the
recommended fungicides into
the auger tube near where the
grain enters at the base of the
auger. This should be done each
time a bushel or two of seed
passes, he says.

Fungicides recommended for
treating wheat and barley seed
are Panogen, Ceresan, Chipcote,
Ortho LM Concentrate, Memmi
and Co-op Vapor Guard. Ortho
HCB is to be used only on seed
wheat, King observed.

"When the seed is being treat-
ed, the auger should be fed seed
at about half capacity and oper-
ated as upright as is convenient,"
King added.

"The flow of grain from
bin should be regulated so
grain feeds halfway up on the
entrance to the auger.

"There shouldn't be any
over treated seed. If more
needed, wheat, barley and
can be treated in the drill
during planting time with Ce-
san M-DB or Panogen PX, or
can treat only wheat in the
box with Ortho HCB."

King concluded that when
seed has been treated the auger
should be cleaned of all residue
by putting some oil through it.
This is to prevent livestock
or market grain from becoming
poisoned. Concrete mixers and
barrel treaters also are satisfac-
tory for treating wheat seed.

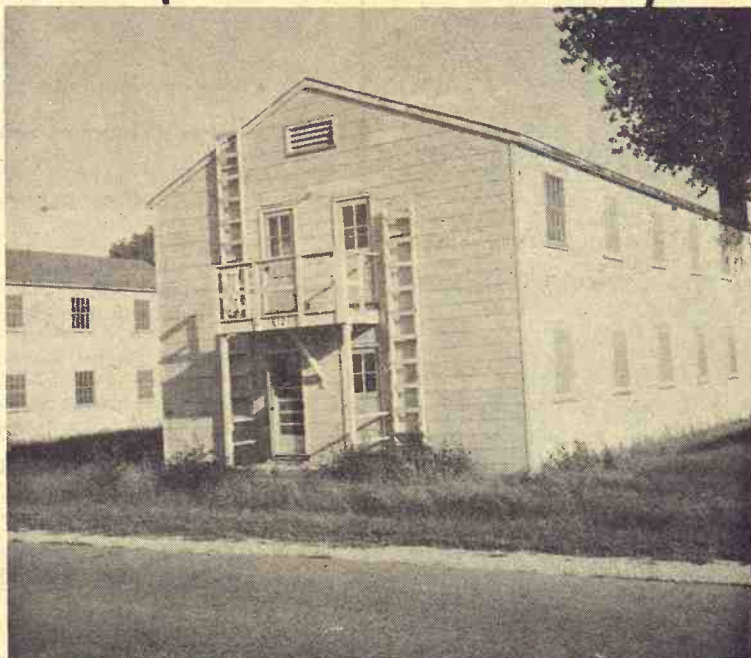

The outlook for fed cattle pri-

ces is an optimistic one, providing producers hold market weights in line. Kansas cattlemen can look for

choice fed cattle prices to be in the \$28-\$31 range this fall, rising to \$29-\$32 during April-May 1970.

Market weights will be the key factor for the rest of 1969. If weights are held close to current market weights, producers will receive good prices.



If weights are increased, cattle prices could suffer.

Consumer income is up and the U.S. population is around 200 million. Pork supplies will not be burdensome. There will be more competition from poultry products. Competition from foreign imports will probably lessen as we near the end of 1969.

All in all, there is a good market for beef with ample supplies

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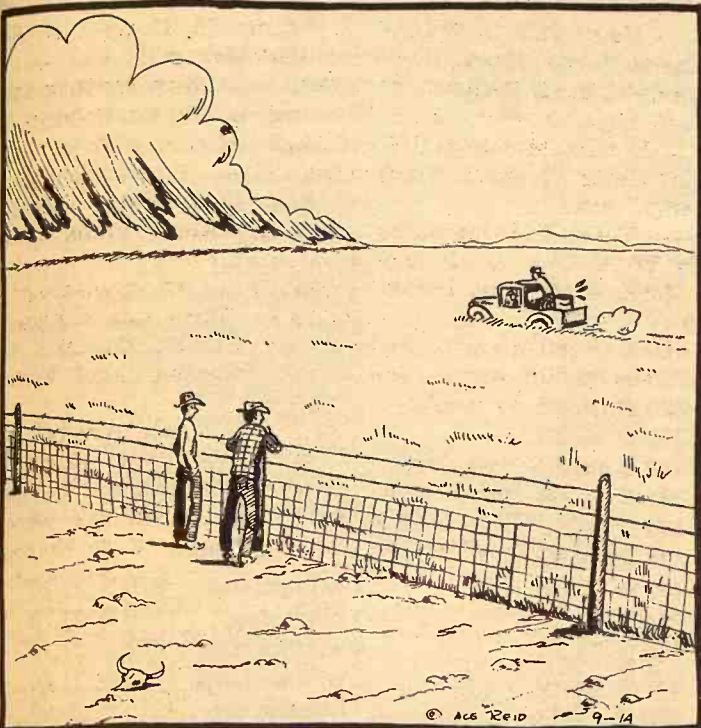

Wheatgrowers Reviewing Policy; Seek Opinions On Guidelines

Chairmen of county organizations in the Kansas Association of Wheat Growers are seeking ideas and opinions from county wheat producers on policies and activities of the Association. The Wheat Growers leaders attended a KAWG State Board of Directors meeting in Larned recently to review basic policy and program guidelines in preparation for the annual state meeting at Dodge City Nov. 18 and 19. There were 88 wheat

producers at the meeting, including county chairmen from 36 wheat producing counties. The wheat men heard members of the KAWG executive committee review the present status of wheat markets, government programs, and export, and then took part in organized discussion groups on wheat subjects.

"We expect these subjects to be discussed further in the counties," says Ray F. Uehling of Ness City, president of KAWG, "and we hope new resolutions for consideration at the state convention will come out of these county discussions."

Joe Luecke of Hays, vice-president and chairman of the Farm Programs Committee, asked county organizations to submit their proposed resolutions in writing.

The sampling of opinion at the meeting in Larned was not considered "policy making," but as a basis for discussion on action for the state meeting, Uehling said.

Reports from the discussion groups in the Larned meeting indicated that wheat producers present —

- Favored the present domestic certificate program,
- Would prefer that the certificates come entirely from the market place rather than part from millers and rest from the U. S. Treasury.
- Favored adding an export certificate to the domestic certificate in order to improve producer income and keep wheat

competitive in world markets;

- Opposed massive land re-tirement programs;
- Favored the Purcell proposal to allow inverse subsidy funds to be used for market development research.

Reaction to the International Grains Arrangement and the Kansas Co-op Council plan for the Wheat Marketing Act of 1969 were mixed, probably due to lack of information on the two plans, Uehling said.

Broiler Price Up Too As Exports Subsidized

Housewives turning from steaks to chicken because of soaring beef costs have seen retail broiler prices rise from 39.1 cents a pound in January to 44.4 cents at mid-summer.

And despite an eight percent boost in chicken production this year and lower prices paid farmers authorities say consumers may realize only slight relief this fall.

Meantime, as Americans spend more for chicken, the government is spending millions to subsidize broiler exports to Switzerland.

Nearly \$3.5 million has been paid in subsidies to exporters since the Department of Agriculture launched a new chicken war with the European Common Market in April 1968.

The subsidy program is aimed at regaining U.S. chicken markets riddled by European competition and subsidies the past five or six years. In the early 1960's, exports ran about 146 million pounds a year but Common Market subsidies had driven this to 14 million pounds in 1967.

Government and trade offi-

cials, however, say the subsidy program has had little or no effect on U.S. consumer prices and that larger broiler production has more than offset stepped-up exports. Only about 20 million pounds have been sent to Switzerland, a tiny fraction of the 7.5 billion pounds produced annually.

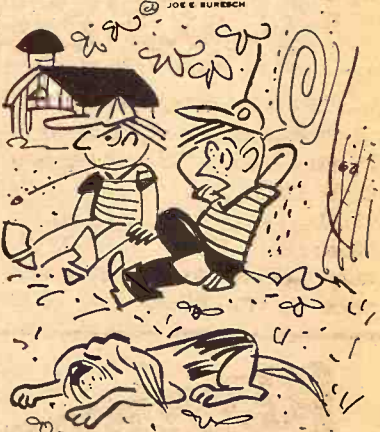
A trade spokesman said retail broiler prices may drop some this fall as larger supplies hit the market and farm prices continue to decline.

Last month's farm price for broilers was 16.5 cents a pound, down from the average of 17.3 cents in July but still ahead of the 14.9 cents paid producers a year earlier.

In May 1967, when farmers received 13.2 cents a pound for broilers, urban housewives paid an average of 38.5 cents — not much less than charged six months ago when farm prices began their recent rise.

Recently, the subsidies to private exporters have averaged about 17 cents a pound, which is more than U.S. farmers receive for live birds.

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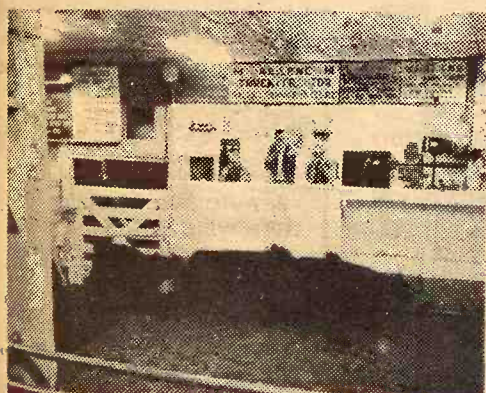

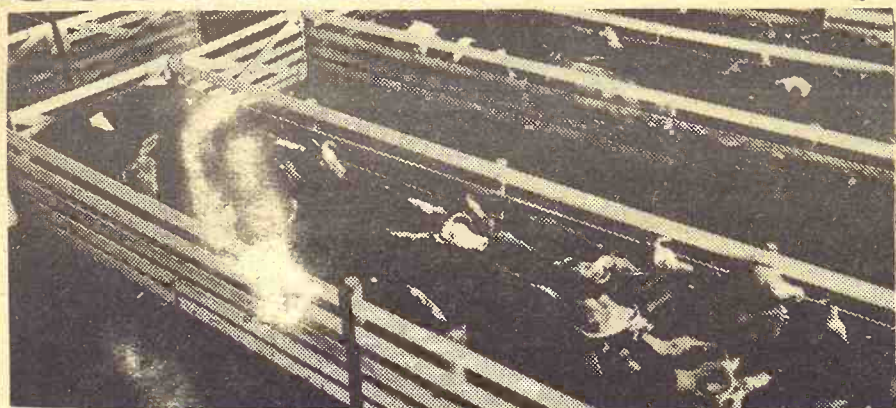
