## Japanese Still Pamper Their High-Priced Beef

The blackhaired beauties around Matsusaka, Japan, get the best food and drink, never work, take morning sunbaths and are massaged. But all this pampering doesn't last long, for after three or four years they are slaughtered and the result is what might be the best beef in the world.

Many Americans have heard of or tasted Kobe beef, but in Japan these days Matsusaka beef is considered superior. The best cuts bring up to \$14 per pound in Tokyo markets, and the domestic demand has always been so great that producers have never bothered to export any.

The breed—a Japanese shorthair called Wagyu, is the same as Kobe, but cattlemen and judges in Japan have rated Matsusaka beef tops for the last several years.

"Just after the war, an American came around and asked us about exporting it to the States, but we refused," said Takeyasu Matsuda, director of the Wadakin beef restaurant, which opened here in 1969, following the Meiji restoration that destroyed feudal government and eroded religious restrictions on eating 4-legged animals.

Matsuda's restaurant found demand so great that it started its own farm six years ago. It now produces about 700 head for slaughter per year, but this isn't enough to meet the needs of its restaurant so an expansion is under way.

"We have always stressed the taste instead of the number," said Atio Kitagawa, local government agriculture official. "About 3,000 head are produced each year in the prefecture (province)," mostly by farmers who raise fewer than 10 at a time.

This allows individual attention, on which a local brochure says: "Farmers don't work for the cattle only because of their duty, but because of their love for the animals."

The love of the sale price must have something to do with it. The average 1,400-pound animal brings \$1,400 on the block. This is the top price of Japanese beef, all of which is expensive because import restrictions and tariffs keep imported beef uncompetitive.

Matsusaka cows eat a combination of wheat feed, imported from America and Australia

soybean, corn and fish meal, and rice straw.

Beer—contrary to the popular belief—is fed only rarely these days, mostly for the sake of tourist cameras. At Wadakin's small experimental farm, Jiro Teranishi, a tender for 20 years, pops the top from a quart of beer and pours the contents down the throat of a cow each time a busload of tourists arrives from Tokyo, about 240 miles to the north.

The daily massage is important, Kitagawa said. It helps distribute surface fat within the muscles to produce a classic marbled tenderness and flavor that Japanese gourmets prefer to eat with Sukiyaki or raw as sashimi rather than as steak.

Teranishi takes a healthy swig from a bottle of shochu, Japanese vodka, and sprays it with his mouth on the cow's back before massaging with a stiff rice straw scrubber. He says the vodka helps dissolve surface fat.

American tourists are always

surprised to find that Japanese ranches are usually no bigger than the average Kansas farm. Matsuda said. But space is a problem, and, besides, the cow that has walked 120 miles from Hokkaido doesn't exactly make a mouth.

# Strong Hopes For More Soviet Feed Grain Sales

Department officials said they, too, believed some U.S. grain would be included in Cargill's sale.

Some of the uncertainty is due to the inability of either the grain companies or the government to predict whether the current dock strike will force Continental and Cargill to make good on their agreements with purchases on other grain-producing nations.

To encourage U.S. corn exports to the Soviet Union, the Commodity Credit Corp. is offering barley and oats from its stocks for export provided that the purchasers match these quantities with corn exports. Farmers in Russia and other Eastern European countries prefer barley because it is the grain with which they are most familiar, and CCC stocks currently are considered the major available source in this country. One Washington official speculated that Cargill thus will have to rely most heavily on foreign supplies because it still hasn't landed a Soviet corn agreement.

The opinion that the transaction would represent only a first step in expanded commodity shipments to Russia comes from members of an Agriculture Department team that recently concluded a month's inspection of Soviet farm areas. Team members agreed that despite efforts to improve native corn varieties, Soviet agronomists won't be able to make their own feed-grain harvest keep pace with demands of home meat and poultry production.

There's a good possibility, too, that Soviet production of cottonseed and other crops needed to supplement high-quality animal rations won't be adequate either. As a result, the experts who visited the Soviet Union anticipate Russia will

want to buy U.S. soybeans, even though beans aren't part of the initial pact.

"There's no question about the future Soviet need for concentrated feeds, and it's my hunch that we've broken the ice on a big, big deal," commented one department official familiar with Russian requirements.

Even if future events prove such a forecast too exuberant—and department analysts conceded that forecasting Soviet commodity output is far trickier than predicting U.S. output—the initial sales do represent a fairly significant plus for the U.S. farm economy.

The grain included in the pact includes 80 million bushels of corn, equivalent to 15 percent of total exports during the crop year ended Sept. 30; 28 million bushels of barley, equal to 36 percent of exports for the same period; and 21 million bushels of oats, equal to 117 percent of 1970-71 exports. Top department officials hope that the news will reduce pressure from farm belt Republicans in Congress for direct government purchases of grains as a means of shoring up market prices for key grains.

However, the Russian purchases will only dent the mount of corn that the record 5.4 billion-bushel crop currently being harvested by U.S. farmers is expected to leave at the end of the current crop year.

Barring further Soviet purchases after June 30, the corn carry-over figure next Sept. 30 promises to be in the neighborhood of a hefty 1.2 billion bushels.

The transaction between the grain companies and Soviet officials had hinged entirely on the willingness of U.S. maritime unions to permit shipment of the grain in foreign-flag vessels. President Nixon by executive order in June erased a 1963 requirement set by President Kennedy that 50 percent of any grain and flour shipments to the Soviet Union, China and Eastern European nations must move in U.S. flag vessels. The grain companies and Soviet officials still feared, though, that the unions might seek to keep the 50 percent rule intact by refusing to load foreign-flag vessels. It wasn't until the administration obtained union approval for the unrestricted foreign-flag movements that the pact could be firmed.

The outlook for future U.S. grain sales is linked closely to the question of how much Soviet leaders will be bound by promises to improve the diets of their people, Agriculture

Department experts say. Russian beef and pork production is supposed to expand to 15.6 million tons by 1975 from 12.3 million tons last year. Similarly, Soviet egg production is slated to reach 51 billion in four years, compared with the 40 billion eggs produced in 1970.

More feed is essential to such growth, but the only thing clear about Soviet grain supplies is that current domestic production isn't equal to feeding needs.

The Agriculture Department originally estimated this year's total Russian grain harvest, including wheat, somewhat below last year's figure of 140 million tons. It appears that good harvest conditions in wheat areas will make the gross harvest about equal to 1970. However, after discounting high moisture content and other factors, last year's combined harvest was reckoned to have a feed value equivalent only to 120 million tons, the department says. The feed value this year probably will be higher, but no one here yet has an accurate idea of what this will be, much less a forecast for the coming year.

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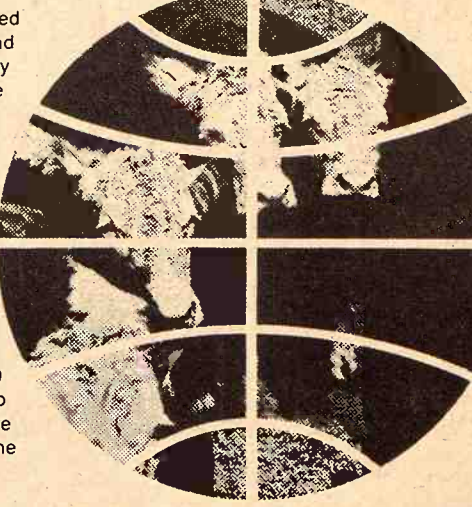

# More electricity for agriculture

Long before the general public was concerned with ecology, KPL was busy devoting time and money in search of new ways to use electricity for the improvement of our environment and the conservation of our natural resources.

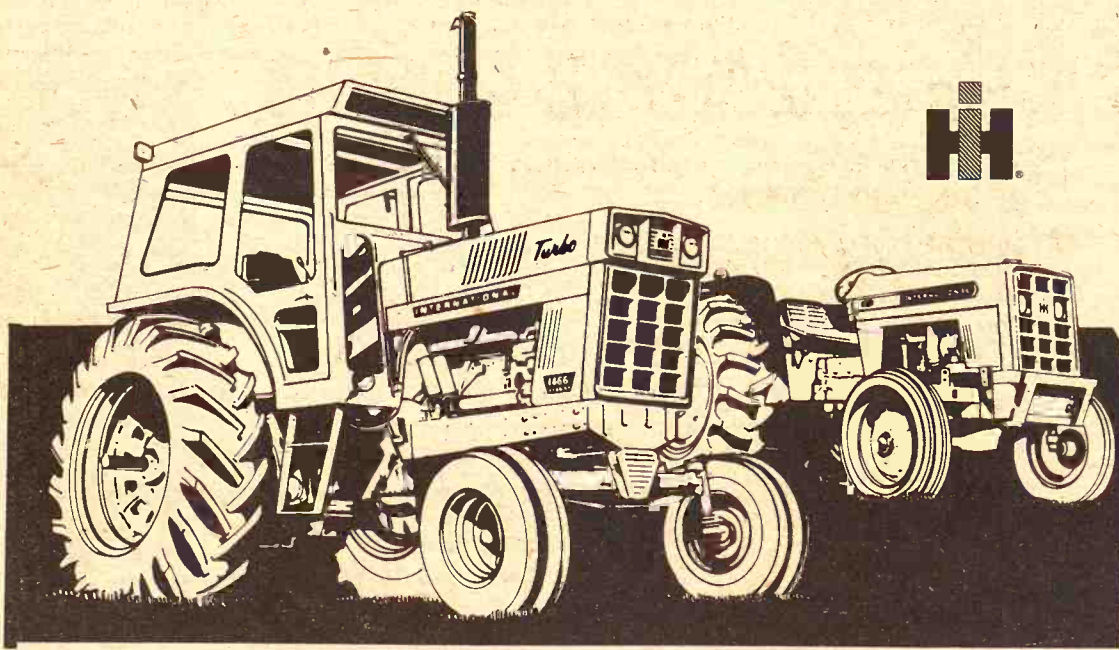


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## Most Wheat In Storage In Past Decade

The Agriculture Department has issued new projections on wheat output and use showing the nation's stockpile of the grain is expected to be 975 million bushels by next July 1, the most in nearly a decade.

A record crop more than 1.6 billion bushels was harvested this year. Added to a carryover of 731 million bushels last July 1, the start of the current marketing season, the wheat supply is 2.36 billion bushels.

Of that, the department said in a report, total use in 1971-72 is expected to be about 1.385 billion bushels, including domestic and export use.

That will leave 975 million bushels for carryover into the new crop year next July 1. It would be the most since 1963 when the reserve was nearly 1.2 billion bushels.

Department officials said exports are expected to run about 600 million bushels, down sharply from 739 million shipped last year.

The report said wheat for food use this marketing year is expected to total 520 million bushels, about the same as recent trends; seed use was put at 65 million; and livestock feed 200 million.

Feed use was projected slightly larger than earlier indications but down from the 216 million bushels fed last season.

"A record average yield of 33.7 bushels per acre together with a nine per cent increase in acreage pushed the 1971 crop to a new high," the report said.

Commenting on the reduced export outlook, the report said a larger world crop has cut into import demands.

"The dock strikes are also limiting shipments," the report said. "Some

sales to Far Eastern markets already been lost to Australia and Canada because of the West's shutdown.

The report said wheat prices growers on open markets average below last year's 11.24 bushel.

## Army Holds 13 Divisions In Manpower Loss

The Army has escaped a cut in the number of its divisions, Pentagon sources say.

They reported President Carter has decided the Army should have 13 divisions, rejecting a more administration budget authority scale the force down to 11 divisions.

This means the Army will lose only a brigade, reported about one-third of a division.

Two months ago, Pentagon leaders predicted victory in a to avoid a slash in the Army divisions below 12, already the smallest number in years.

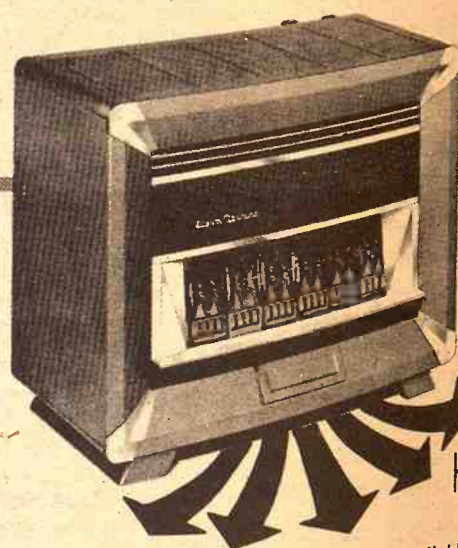
Senior Army general outlined the time that this is rock division strength considering Atlantic Treaty commitments the need to be ready for emergencies elsewhere.

Even though the number of divisions will remain essentially 13, the over-all size of the Army is expected to be slashed in the present one million-plus to 820,000 and 840,000 under the defense budget.

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## Trade Show At January Stockmen's Convention

A convention format loaded with speakers on current issues and topics; plenty of time for committee discussion; time to visit with other ranchers and feeders about gains, weather and prices; and an Industry Trade Show will highlight the 1972 January Convention of the Kansas Livestock Association.

Jim Harper, Ashland, convention chairman stated this, the 59th Annual KLA Convention, will be January 6 and 7 at the Broadview Hotel in Wichita. He said the Industry Trade Show would add greatly to the importance of the convention as a major Kansas event for the year. Trade Show exhibitors will include feed and chemical companies, livestock equipment, and artificial breeding firms from Kansas and surrounding states. Harper said there are a few spaces left for interested agri-business firms.

This year's array of speaker topics will include presentations on Federal Estate Taxes, the Kansas Tax Laws, the Industry Information Council, American National Cattlemen's Association, and one nationally known figure in agriculture circles yet to be announced.

Fred Germann, Dwight, KLA president stated that several other livestock groups will be holding meetings at the convention. They include the Kansas Sheep and Wool Growers Association, Kansas Pork Producers Council, Kansas Certified Livestock Markets, and the Kansas Animal Health Board.

The Kansas CowBelles and the Kansas Junior Livestock Association, affiliates of the KLA, will also hold their annual meetings in connection with the KLA convention.

Harper emphasized that this year's convention was designed with those attending in mind, allowing time to visit with stockmen from other parts of Kansas as well as more time for Committee

discussions.

Several activities will begin on Wednesday, January 5. These include Board of Directors, Cattle-Fax subscribers, and Cattle Feeders Council meetings. Also an early bird social hour will be held on the evening of January 5 for the early arrivals.

Germann stated, "All in all, with the other livestock groups, the Trade Show and top speakers, this year's convention promises to be a very important industry meeting and one a progressive stockman can't afford to miss."

## New Charts May Cut Some Take-Home Pay

Millions of individual taxpayers will find their take-home pay dropping in January despite income tax cuts if a \$16-billion tax-reduction bill approved by the Senate Finance Committee becomes law.

In many cases a new withholding

plan adopted by the panel will take away more than the tax cuts will yield, even though everyone will get some tax reduction.

The withholding plan, recommended by the Treasury Department, is designed to eliminate underwithholding for many individuals.

The principal groups which now must pay when filing returns are persons earning \$15,000 or more a year, working married couples and individuals with two or more jobs.

What the new schedule will mean is that a taxpayer now in the underwithholding category will not have to fork over a large sum when he files his return for that year.

It is estimated underwithholding now totals at least \$800 million a year.

The House, in passing the tax bill, voted to put the new plan to correct this into effect in two steps—in 1972

and 1973.

But the Senate committee decided, by a 7-6 vote, to change to the new system in one step—to take effect in 1972.

The Finance panel, in giving final approval to the tax bill, 12-1, handed President Nixon a substantial victory.

The measure contains practically all the benefits for individuals and business which the President has been counting on to boost the economy and produce new jobs.

Democrats lost in their fight to give additional relief to individuals but pledged to renew their efforts on the floor.

The committee's bill containing \$16 billion in reductions for the 1971-73 period is slightly larger than the \$15.5-billion House version.

The chief difference is in a provision added by the committee allowing many working couples and

all individuals to deduct up to \$4,800 a year for child care and domestic help.

Principal benefits for individuals in the Senate bill are an increase in the exemption from \$650 to \$675 this year and to \$750 in 1972, a new \$1,300 minimum standard deduction effective next year compared with the present \$1,000, and an increase in the standard percentage deduction to 15 per cent with a \$2,000 ceiling next year.

For business, the chief provisions are restoration of the 7-per-cent investment credit on machinery and equipment, writing into law of an accelerated depreciation plan declared earlier in the year by Nixon but challenged in the courts, and tax deferrals on certain imports.

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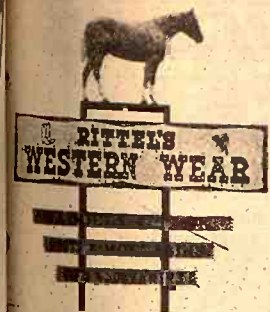

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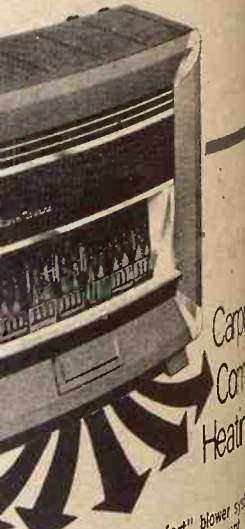

#### TACO MEAT PUFFS

- 1/2 pound ground beef
- 2 tablespoons instant potatoes
- 2 tablespoons instant onions
- 2 cans prepared biscuits
- 2 or 3 tablespoons taco sauce
- salt and pepper (to taste)

Put ground beef, instant onions and salt and pepper in skillet. Brown over medium heat stirring to break up ground beef. Drain fat from skillet and add instant potatoes, stirring in to make meat fairly dry. Add taco sauce and stir. Cool mixture until barely warm. Divide biscuits in half and flatten each half with hand or rolling pin. Put teaspoonful of meat mix in center of biscuit half and form biscuit around meat into a ball, sealing ends. Place sealed side down on a cookie sheet and brown in preheated oven, 425 degrees, eight to 10 minutes or until golden brown. Serve warm or cold as appetizers. Makes 40 puff balls. To serve for main dish put larger amount of meat mix in whole biscuits and brown as above.

When determining the number of turkeys to allow three-fourths of a turkey per person of one-third to one-half a turkey for a turkey roast. Probably the frozen whole turkey should be thawed. Turkey should be thawed in the freezer to the refrigerator. Just follow the instructions.

Stuffed, the slow-roasted, the juicier. It should be thawed. Keep the turkey wrapped and place in a roasting pan.

For one and one-half to two days for a 12 to 16 pound bird, two to three days for a 16 to 24 pound bird.

### Frozen Foods Make

### Holiday Menu Quick, Easy

Traditional menus for Thanksgiving dinner may seem very much like the ones served generations ago, but there is a major difference.

Thanks to the frozen food industry, the traditional meal can be prepared quickly and easily—in hours rather than days.

Turkey, of course, is a menu requisite and the majority of whole turkeys are sold frozen, assuring top quality at economical cost. They are available both stuffed and unstuffed, with the stuffed birds ranging in weight from five to 16 pounds and the unstuffed birds weighing from four to 14 pounds.

When determining how much to allow, three-fourths to one pound per person of stuffed turkey and one-third to one-half pound of unstuffed turkey roast.

Probably the foremost question about frozen whole turkeys is how they should be thawed. If stuffed, the turkey should go directly from the freezer to the oven without thawing. Just follow the label directions.

If unstuffed, the slower the bird is thawed, the juicier it will be. Ideally, it should be thawed in the refrigerator. Keep the turkey in its original wrap and place it on a tray in a roasting pan.

Allow one and one-half days for a five to eight pound bird; one and one-half to two days for an eight to 12 pound bird; two to two and one-half days for a 12 to 16 pound bird and three to three and one-half days for a 16 to 24 pound bird.

Follow the traditional holiday

vegetables including sweet potatoes, yams, Brussels sprouts, onions, squash and turnips are available in freezer cabinets in a range of package sizes to help you complete a holiday meal. For dessert, freezers are well stocked with pumpkin and mince pies. Packed in their foil pans, they are complete and ready to bake for the holiday.

#### To Alter Slip

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## Grain Surplus Favorable To Livestock Producers

A Kansas State University agricultural economics professor believes the state's large surplus of feed grain during the last few years places livestock producers in a favorable position.

Dr. John H. McCoy says Kansas had an average annual surplus of 2.94 million tons of feed grain during the four feeding years covering 1966-70, although some localities within the state experienced shortages.

"While cattle and hog production has increased at a significant rate in Kansas, it has not grown as fast as

feed grain production," he points out.

The state's feed capacity potential has been an area of concern among some livestock producers, who have questioned the future of feed grain production and whether it can keep pace with the expanding demand for livestock.

McCoy says the areas with deficits of feed grains in relation to livestock consumption during this period included Barton, Butler, Chase, Clark, Cowley, Elk, Ellis, Ford, Gove, Greenwood, Harper,

Kingman, Lincoln, and Pratt counties.

Northeast and southwest Kansas, except for those localities already mentioned, have had large surpluses of feed grain. Counties in these two areas have the greatest potential for increased livestock production, McCoy believes.

Some areas of Kansas have also had surpluses of roughage. McCoy says the largest surpluses have been in the north central and east central sections.

## Search For High Quality Walnuts, Cottonwoods

Wanted: High quality black walnut and cottonwood trees as sources of scions and cuttings for use in Kansas' tree improvement program.

State and Extension foresters at Kansas State University are attempting to produce varieties of walnuts and cottonwoods that will grow larger, higher quality trees in a shorter period of time than Mother Nature normally allows.

In the case of black walnuts, the goal is to develop fast-growing timber types which produce high

quality nuts that will provide an income until time for harvesting for lumber and veneer.

Some qualities that contribute to the classification of a walnut or cottonwood as a superior type include a fast growth rate, high quality log potential, disease resistance and adaptability to adverse growing conditions.

Size, quality, and quantity of nuts produced are important considerations in classifying black walnuts used in tree improvement work.

KSU Extension foresters point out that the success of the tree improvement program depends on reports of outstanding trees by interested citizens in addition to those found by foresters in their professional activities.

Approximately half of the selections being utilized in tree improvement work in the state results from reports of superior trees sent in by woodland owners and timber buyers.

Once a tree is reported, it is evaluated by an Extension forester. If it has superior qualities, the tree improvement forester will collect twigs (shooting them off the top of trees with, of course, the owner's permission) for propagation in Kansas State University's greenhouse. They are then moved to a seed and clone orchard below

Milford Reservoir for additional evaluation.

Eventually, seeds and clones of the best varieties growing in the orchard will be made available to people in Kansas who want to plant walnuts or cottonwoods from clones with proved performance.

If you know of a walnut or cottonwood tree that shows superior characteristics, notify your county Extension agricultural agent, district Extension forester, or Loy W. Shreve, Extension tree improvement forester, 2610 Claflin Road, Manhattan.

## Big School Bus Savings From Computer Routes?

A Kansas State University economist says Kansas taxpayers could save \$4 million a year by computerizing school bus routes.

The estimate was presented to the School Practices Efficiency Committee by Leonard W. Schruben, an economist with K-State's Agricultural Experiment Station in Manhattan.

"Savings can be accomplished by applying to school bus operations those modern methods of economic analysis that have been used successfully by commercial firms to reduce cost of truck delivery," he told the panel of legislators and laymen.

Sen. Joseph C. Harder, R-Moundridge, chairman of the committee, said the legislature will be urged to initiate a study of Schruben's school bus route plan.

In his presentation, Schruben cited the case of Unified School District 224 at Clifton. Last year, he said, the district used 12 48-passenger buses to transport 390 pupils.

"This fall," he said, "by following computerized routes, this district is using only nine of these buses to transport 373 pupils."

"The longest ride this year is no longer than the longest ride last year and the combined length of all the routes is 9,720 miles shorter this year than last."

He said for the most part, the students who board the buses earlier in the morning this year are returned home earlier in the afternoon.

A similar field trial is underway in Manhattan's Unified School District 383.

"My purpose for appearing before you is to bring this development to your attention and express my willingness to work with you and with others to make school busing operations more efficient, less costly and provide improved service," Schruben said.

Harder said the K-State economist reported to the panel that there are 250 million possible routes for a bus making 12 separate stops.

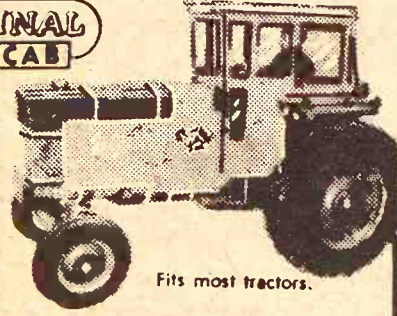

## Recommend School Closings Without Voting By 1975

School districts should be allowed to maintain small, high-cost attendance centers but not with the state picking up the tab, a special committee of laymen and legislators has said.

The Special Committee on School Practices Efficiency took that position in its final report adopted for presentation to the 1972 Legislature.

"If the local districts wish to maintain such centers at their own expense, they should have that prerogative. The decision to maintain or close marginal attendance centers should be the responsibility of the local board of education," the panel said.

It recommended enactment of a bill to give local boards authority to

close attendance centers without a vote of school patrons as now required in many cases.

However, the recommended bill would not be effective until July 1, 1975, in order to allow for a majority of board members to be elected between the time of enactment and the effective date of the measure.

A study initiated by the committee showed a potential savings to the state of \$10.2 million by closing small, high-cost attendance centers and dissolving unified school districts with fewer than 400 pupils.

The panel emphasized that any revision of the current school aid formula should not reward the continuance of small districts or centers.

Also included in the committee's report were recommendations dealing with use of paraprofessionals in schools.

It suggested that if the 1972 Legislature revises the school aid formula, special attention should be paid to the role of paraprofessionals

in a district.

"We recommend that if the state financial aid formula is not revised," the committee said, "then the appropriate laws should be amended to provide that when a school district reduces the number of certificated employees by hiring paraprofessionals, it is not, thereby, given a reduced state aid entitlement."

## Feeder Pig Assn. Reaches Million Dollar Milestone

The first of the feeder pig associations in the G&G area has reached a sales milestone.

The Mid-Kansas Feeder Pig Assn at its fall sale at Hutchinson last week reached gross sales of over \$1 million.

The sales have been held since 1960, in spring and fall. The gross after 23 sales: \$1,047,284.35.

Buyer of the pigs that put sales over the \$1 million figure was D. W. Bundy of Sterling. He has been a regular buyer at the sales since they were started 11 years ago.

The association has members in Harvey, Rice, Kingman, Pratt, Stafford, Barton and Reno counties. There are currently about 250 members.

The sale last week brought in \$68,078, with 3708 pigs selling. They averaged 55 pounds each and sold for an average \$18.35 per head.

A year ago the average price was \$14.82. The all-time high average was in November 1969 when feeder pigs averaged \$31.66.

Clarence Fischer of Cunningham was the top-selling consignor. His pigs brought an average \$23.75.

There were 31 buyers at the sale, as well as 31 consignors.

The top buyers were all from the G&G area. Norman Naaf of Liberty, Nebr., bought 447 head for \$9267. Douglas Toll of Clifton bought 369 head for \$6840. J. Mead of Waldo paid \$4313 for 262 head and John Bachus of Moline paid \$4527 for 214 head.

# Whatever Happened To White Corn?

A question farmers are submitting to members of the Kansas City Board of Trade is, "What's happened to the price of white corn?" They are not asking a similar question on yellow corn because farmers know as well as members of the trade what has weakened prices on the yellow variety—the ample supply of corn. The corn crop this year estimated at 5.4 billion bushels is by far the biggest in history.

But practically all the statistics on corn and nearly all the market news is on the yellow variety. For the first time since 1946, the U.S. Dept. of Agriculture last spring reported the indicated acreage seeded to white corn. The report covered the 10 states where most of the white corn is grown, and the figure given was 222,000 acres.

Nearly all white corn is used for human food. Feeders of livestock and poultry prefer the yellow variety. Food processors will pay a premium, if necessary, to get white corn. Contrary-wise, livestock feeders often insist on a discount on white corn.

In 1970, when the country became aware of the damage done by the southern corn leaf blight, it was realized that white corn yields were down as well on the yellow variety. Prices zoomed and peaked at \$2.08 a bushel in Kansas City on Sept. 22. Kansas City is a basing point on white corn prices and one of the few places in the nation where quotations are listed each day.

April 1, 1971, the nominal quotations on No. 2 white corn were \$1.75 to \$2.09 a bushel, and on yellow corn \$1.46 to \$1.51.

Sept. 1, the quotations were \$1.28 to \$1.36 on white, and \$1.15 to \$1.32 on yellow. Oct. 1, the range was \$1.12 to \$1.17 on white, and \$1.08 to \$1.17 on yellow.

The market now is saying, although official government figures are not available on production, that white corn supplies are over ample just as are those on yellow corn. That then, is the answer to what has happened to prices on white corn.

What is ahead? No one knows for sure. On white corn, you just have to wait and see.

The 10 states where most of the white corn is grown are Ohio, Indiana, Illinois, Iowa, Missouri, Nebraska, Kansas, Kentucky, Tennessee and Texas. The four top states in order are Kentucky, Kansas, Illinois and Missouri.

**Problems In Saving Your Own Garden Seed**

Saving your seed from a vegetable garden may be risky business. Several problems arise when this happens:

(1) Seeds may carry some seed-borne diseases; (2) Crossing of varieties may result in off-type vegetables in next year's crop; (3) Seeds must be cleaned, dried, and stored properly through the winter; (4) Many varieties of vegetables are hybrids and seeds of hybrids will not produce plants that are true to the desired type.

Money spent for commercial seed is one of the best investments you as a gardener can make since you can get high quality, disease free, and properly stored seeds through your local garden store or from a seed catalog.

One reason you may want to save seed, however, is that there is no other source of supply. Gardeners often have some unusual variety that may be available for the next year only if they keep it.

In any event, don't save a crop that is a hybrid. For most vegetable crops you will have to allow the fruit to mature past the edible stage for best results.

This is true for melons, tomatoes, cucumbers, and similar crops. After removing the seeds, they should be washed and dried thoroughly.

In storing seeds for use the following year, choose a cool, dry place. This goes for commercial seed carried over, too. Damp areas with high temperatures should be avoided.

## Counties Eye Cattle In Feedlots As Tax Bait

Kansas county officials approved legislative proposals designed to provide home rule for counties and more local tax revenue from cattle in feedlots and from county idle funds.

The proposals were among several hammered out at a joint session of commissioners, clerks and engineers during the closing sessions of the Kansas Official Council annual convention at Wichita.

The proposals were part of a county platform which will be presented to the Kansas Legislature during the 1972 session.

The home rule proposal would allow county commissioners broad powers of local self-determination over matters of county concern. Presently, if state laws do not give power for a specific action, counties must ask the Legislature to enact a law for that action.

The taxing of livestock under feeding contracts with commercial feedlots on a per head per day value also was approved.

The proposal would require feedlot operators to collect the tax and to keep records of cattle under contract.

The idle funds plank proposes that interest rate paid by banks for use of inactive funds should be increased from 70 per cent of the average treasury bill rate to 80 per cent.

Other planks approved by the group include:

- Opposition to granting tax exemptions to private property unless the state provides replacement revenue.
- A request to compel the state property evaluation department to provide counties with an itemized certification of utilities assessments

by June 15.

- A proposal for payment of personal property tax on motor vehicles at the time of the vehicle's annual registration.

- Repeal of the statutory requirement for publication of county salaries and claims.

Kansas Official Council is composed of 11 county officials associations. Meeting were commissioners, assessors, attorneys, clerks, district court clerks, engineers, registers of deeds, treasurers, and welfare directors.

Sheriffs and probate judges groups met separately earlier this month.

## Keep Cows In Heat' Away From Herd

The most practical and profitable way to handle cows in heat is to keep them confined away from herd. "A cow in heat is a restless individual," points out Ralph Bonewitz, Extension dairyman at Kansas State University.

"She usually produces less milk, and will disturb the entire herd if allowed to run with it, often lowering production of several cows."

There is also danger of animal injury when a cow in heat runs with the herd. She may injure herself or other cows, especially the heavy milkers—the best cows.

It also has been found that reducing body temperature has helped in conception, says Bonewitz. The critical period for conception

appears to be the body temperature during heat and for a period of 10 to 14 days. The confinement stall for cow in heat should be in shade and made as cool as possible.

So, for the sake of herd production and precaution against animal injury, better breeding results and more net income, keep the cow that's in heat away from the herd, suggests the K-State dairyman. And don't forget to make plenty of feed and water available for the confined "heat" cow.

## Better Mail Delivery To Mobile Home Parks

Postmasters have been given immediate authority to improve mail delivery service to mobile home subdivisions, parks and trailer courts, the U.S. Postal Service says. The order allows residents of permanently placed mobile homes

to get delivery service similar to the type given families in permanent conventional housing areas. Postmasters may, for example, eliminate the requirement that parks with 100 or more units must locate all boxes in clusters of at least 20 boxes. The Postal Service said the new rules also allow greater flexibility, including deliveries to a greater number of places within parks having less than 100 units.

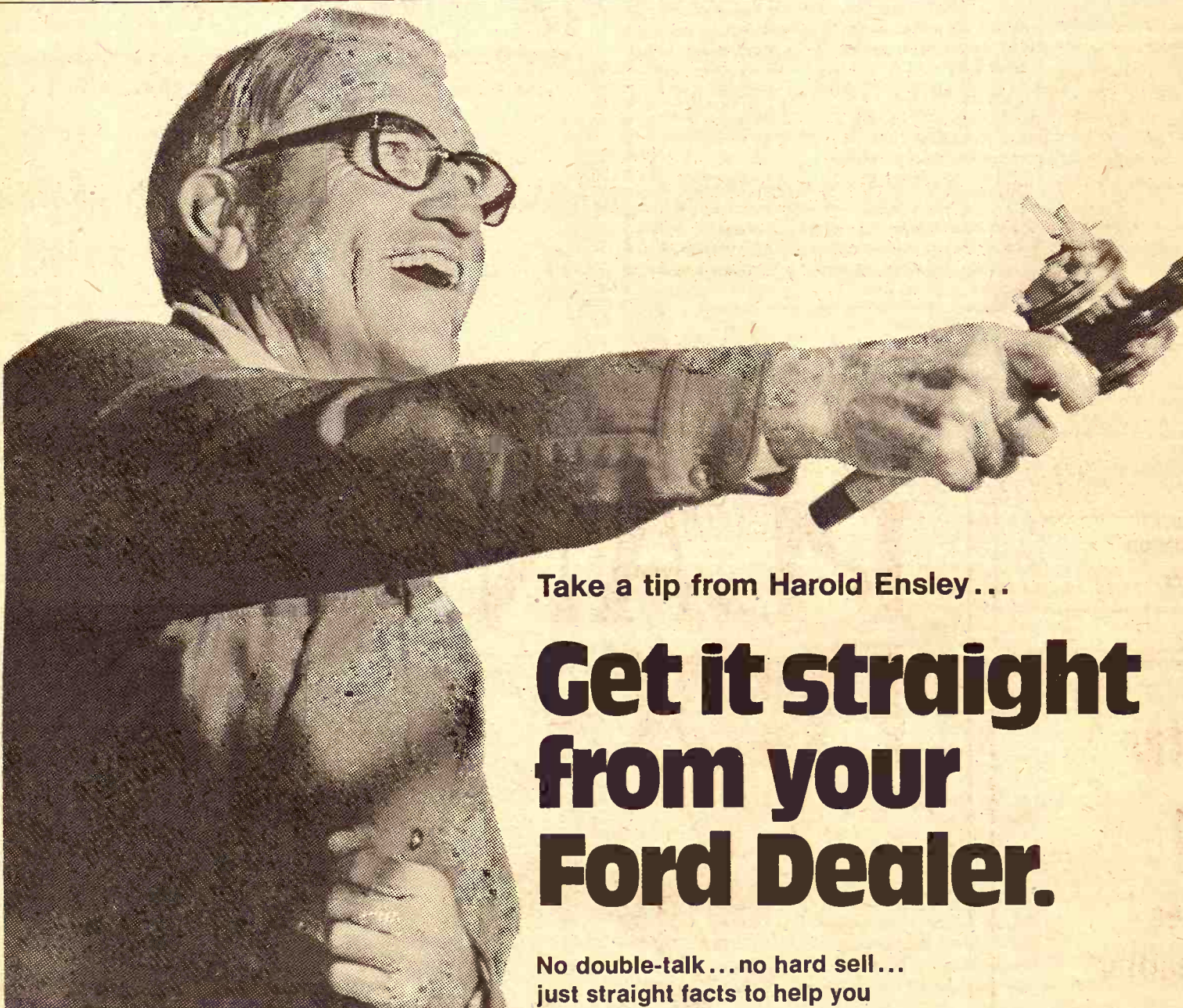

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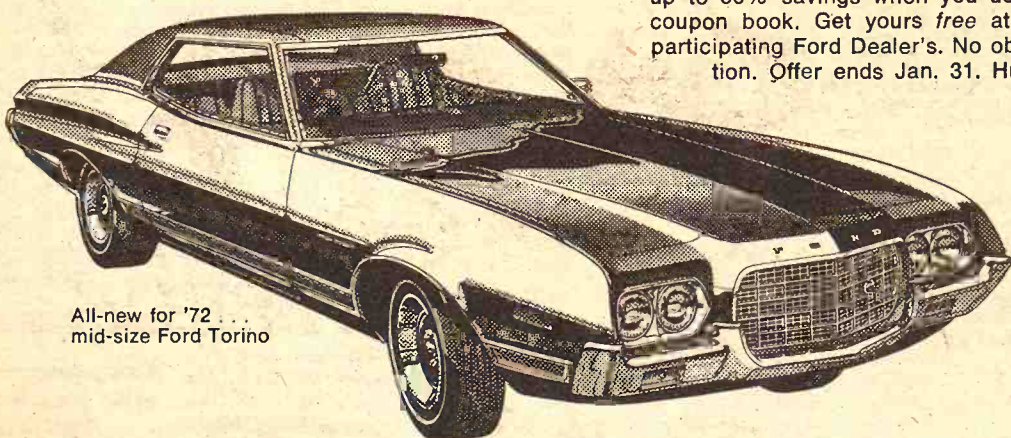
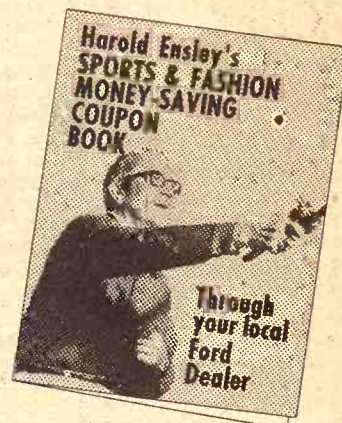

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## Chance For Drop In Home Insurance Rates

Homeowners may soon be paying less for their insurance.

After more than three years of almost continuous rate increases, some insurance companies have already begun dropping rates on a sliding basis as a result of improved underwriting experiences.

What's more, the Insurance Services Office, a trade group that rates or advises rate changes, said it plans to introduce a change in standard homeowner insurance forms within six to eight months that will have the effect of reducing insurance premiums by 10 per cent.

At this point, the reduced homeowner insurance rates are coming from only a handful of the major insurers and are concentrated in certain states. But insurers say they're considering further reductions based on improved homeowner underwriting experience, which for some companies became particularly noticeable in the third 1971 quarter.

Royal-Globe Insurance Cos., for example, said they reduced homeowner rates in Illinois 5 per cent as a result of favorable loss experience. New rates went into effect Nov. 1 for new policies and will affect renewals after Dec. 1.

In New York, Hartford Fire Insurance Co. dropped rates for both homeowner insurance and tenant insurance an average of 8.2 percent.

INA Corp., which credited improvement in third quarter earnings partly to a turnaround in homeowner results, said it has cut its rates for insurance on higher priced homes in Tennessee and Maryland.

Although INA reduced this rate only about 1 percent, in some cases actual dollar savings for policyholders were in the range of \$35 to \$40 a year. A spokesman for INA said the company is "definitely looking into the possibility of future homeowner rate reductions in other states."

At this point President Nixon's price freeze appears to be interfering with some potential rate reductions. The Insurance Services Office said it planned rate changes—some increases coupled with decreases—in eight states prior to the freeze, but these have been deferred. In one state, South Dakota, the office planned rate changes that would have produced a net decrease in premium rates.

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# Start To Jockey For Seats In House In Redistricting

A Republican plan for reapportioning the 125 seats of the Kansas House of Representatives has drawn immediate fire from Democrats as a blatant attempt at gerrymandering.

The plan was announced by Rep. William Bunten, R-Topeka, chairman of the House Reapportionment Committee.

Republicans control the house 84-41 and are in position to push through any reapportionment plan they choose.

But Rep. Richard Loux, Democratic floor leader from

Wichita, said his party will offer a plan to counter what he said was a partisan attempt to reduce the Democratic strength in the House. "This (the Republican) plan obviously has been drafted in secret and probably has been basically agreed to," Loux said.

Bunten, who had a major hand in drafting the Republican proposal, said he made a "conscious effort to be non-partisan about it."

"In those districts where incumbents are pitted against one another, I've tried to run Republicans against Democrats," Bunten said. "That's what it's all about."

In one district, two Democratic incumbents would be pitted against each other, but in the other five it would be Republican against Democrat.

The two Democrats who would be included in the same district are Reps. Albert Campbell, Larned, and C. L. Wilson, Jetmore.

The other representatives who would be paired:

Gene Steffes, R-Olpe, and Irving Niles, D-Lyndon.

Oscar Nowlin, R-Holton, and William Stutz, D-Effingham.

Harold Dyck, R-Hesston, and Walter Graber, D-Pretty Prairie.

Ansel Tobias, R-Lyons, and George Jelinek, D-Ellsworth.

Francis Jacobs, R-Phillipsburg, and Edward Steichen, D-Lenora.

Bunten, however, indicated there likely will be some changes in the plan.

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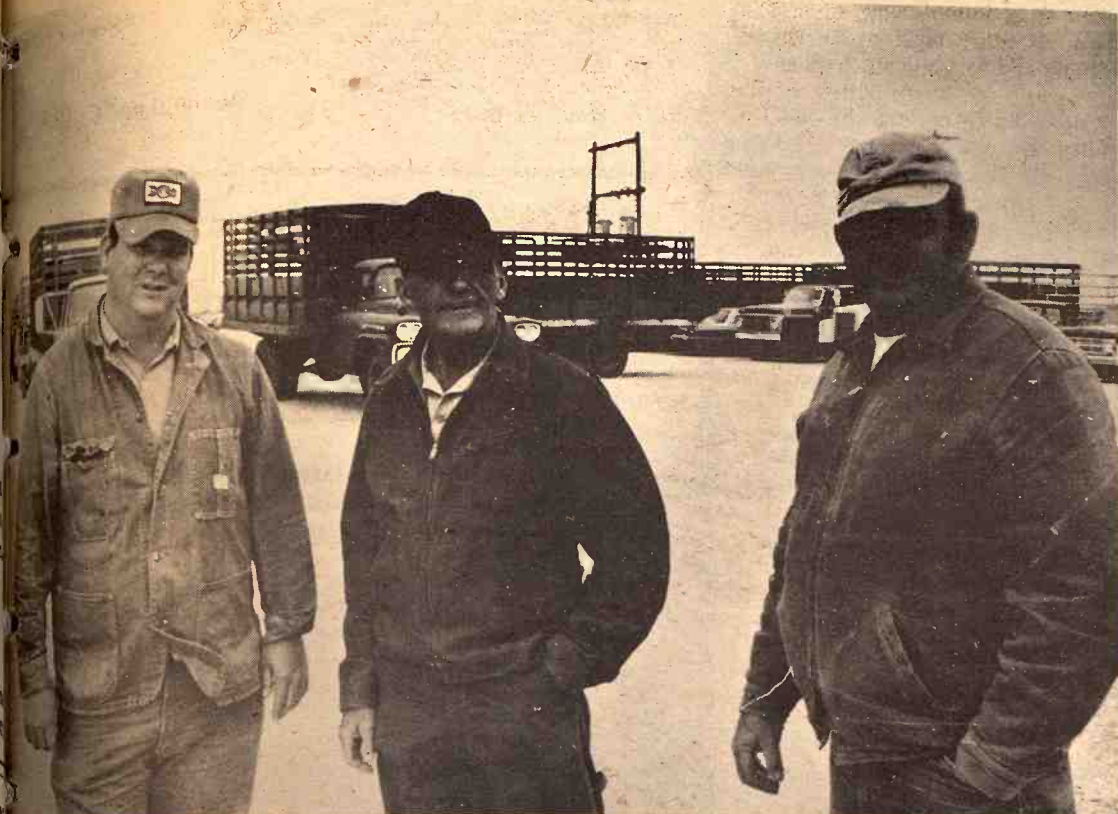

# Track Scabies Thru Kansas Feedlot

Scabies, a disease causing lesions in the flesh of cattle, has been discovered in at least one feedlot in Kansas. Dr. John Hudelson, state livestock sanitary commissioner, told the Kansas Livestock Association Cattle Feeders Conference at Wichita last week.

Hudelson told the 200-plus cattlemen attending that the communicable disease was found in Nebraska and traced to Kansas. From there it was backtracked to Texhoma in the Oklahoma

Panhandle, two feedlots in Oklahoma, two feedlots in Texas and at least 5,000 head of cattle in several states.

An eight-state meeting has been held in an effort to trace the origin of cattle carrying the lesions to stop it before the outbreak becomes any more widespread, he said.

BHC and Lindane, two common poisonous chemicals for treating these outbreaks, have been banned for use on slaughter cattle. Toxophene and hot-limed sulphur

are the remaining treatments available through dipping the animal entirely in the chemically treated liquid.

Use of toxophene requires two dippings, 10 to 14 days apart, then a 14-day waiting period before slaughter, so the hot-limed sulphur treatment is recommended.

Federal law does not prohibit transportation or slaughter of these animals and threat to human beings is not a factor. However, some states require dipping for scabies before cattle can cross state lines.

## Easy To Identify Holiday Trees

It's easy to identify pine, spruce trees if you know what to look for, suggest Extension foresters at Kansas State University.

If the needles are long and clusters of 2, 3, or 5, the tree is pine—usually Scotch, white Austrian. These pines will be in the market during the approaching holidays and becoming increasingly available from commercial tree growers in Kansas.

If the needles are attached to the twig singly, the tree is a spruce or fir. Needles on most firs and spruces are one-half to one inch long and shorter than pine needles.

When you have decided whether the tree is a spruce or fir, look for needles from a small branch on your thumb. If the needles are small bumps on the twig, the tree is a spruce. If there are deep depressions on the bark where needles were, it's a fir. Fir needles are flat compared with spruce pine needles, which are square or oval.

Norway, white, and blue spruce and Douglas fir are usually available in the Kansas market.

Extension forester Gary N. points out that certain trees have their needles better than others when placed in a warm room. Spruce holds up best, followed by fir, then spruce.

Kansas pines are cut later than trees imported from other areas and are therefore fresher and needles longer.

## Easy To Identify Holiday Trees

He served as director of the Minnesota game and fish division from July 1, 1967, to Feb. 1, 1971. During his tenure he developed cooperative programs between private landowners, citizen groups and the division.

# Feedlots Up 10% In Past Month

On November 1 there were 1,023,000 cattle and calves on grain feed for the slaughter market in Kansas, 10 percent more than a month earlier, according to the Kansas Crop and Livestock Reporting Service.

Data on November 1 cattle on feed in Kansas are available for the first time this year inaugurating a new program of monthly cattle on feed estimates.

The number of cattle on feed on November 1 was the largest ever for the State.

## Marketings

Kansas cattle feeders marketed 190,000 grain fed cattle during the month of October.

## Placements

There were 283,000 cattle and calves placed on full grain feed in Kansas during October.

## SEVEN-STATE TOTAL Cattle On Feed

The number of cattle and calves on grain feed for slaughter market on November 1 in the seven monthly cattle on feed States was 11 percent above that on October 1.

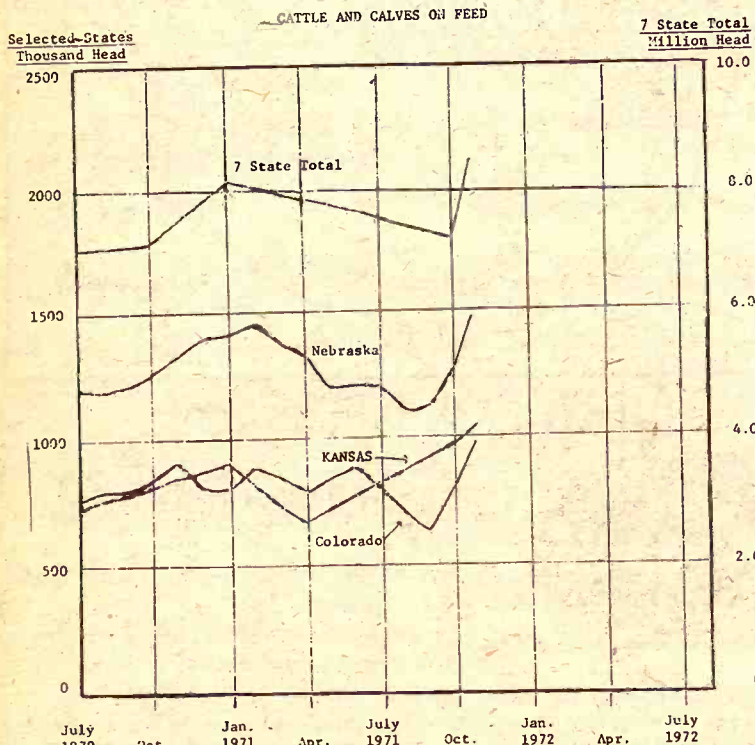
In the six States with comparable data last year (excludes Kansas) the number of cattle on feed on November 1 was 6 percent above a year earlier, compared with 3 percent on October 1.

## Marketings

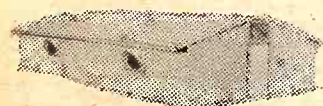

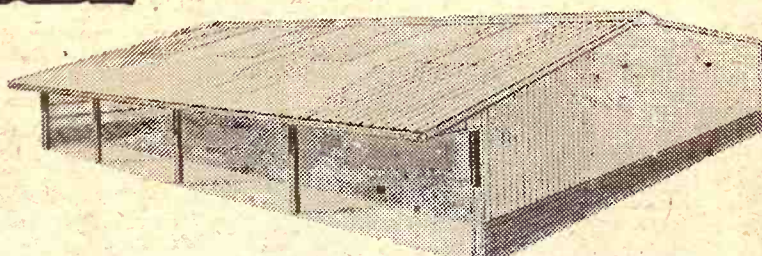

## Simmental Assn. Links Sale With First Convention

Plans for the first Kansas Simmental Association Sale have been finalized according to Sale Chairman John Teagarden of La Cygne, Kansas. The sale will be held Saturday night November 20, at the Farmers and Ranchers Commission Co. in Salina.

The sale will be held in conjunction with the K.S.A. annual meeting on Saturday morning and afternoon with headquarters at the Ramada Inn in Salina.

The cattle in the sale includes Half-blood Simmental females, bulls, and steers.

## Figures Show Advantages Of Larger Farms

In agriculture, as in industry, size is becoming more and more important.

Dr. Frank Orazem, Kansas State University economist, says large farms are generally highly productive while small ones are not. The economist refers to this division of agriculture as "dualism."

Orazem bases his view on the fact that only 7.6 percent of all U.S. farms gross more than \$40,000 annually, yet account for more than one-half (52.5 percent) of American agriculture production. The elite also accounts for more than 36 percent of realized net farm income.

In 1960 only 3 percent of U.S. farms grossed \$40,000, accounting for 32.8 percent of production.

In 1970 approximately 90 percent of agriculture output was produced on 38.6 percent of the farms, compared to 94.3 percent of the output on 53.4 percent of the farms in 1960.

At the same time, farm numbers declined by more than one million—from 3.9 million in 1960 to 2.98 million in 1970.

Another aspect of dualism as described by Orazem is the emphasis given to off-farm earnings.

He says off-farm earnings have been increasing more than net

earnings from farm operations.

Off-farm income for the farms with less than \$2,500 in farm sales jumped from \$2,731 in 1960 to \$7,954 in 1970. At the same time, realized net farm income on those farms rose from \$850 in 1960 to \$1,059 in 1970.

At the other end of the scale, the off-farm income for farms grossing more than \$40,000 rose from \$2,177 in

1960 to \$5,803 in 1970. Realized net farm income on these farms jumped from \$18,955 in 1960 to \$25,664 in 1970.

Orazem says large farms are increasing net income at a faster pace than small farms (35 percent vs. 25 percent), but the small farms are increasing off-farm income at a better rate (191 percent vs. 167 percent).

# Adding Machines Start Spitting Out Record Harvest Statistics

Paced by record harvests of sorghum grain and wheat and a good out-turn of other major items, Kansas crop production will set a new high record this year, according to the Kansas crop production will set a new high record this year, according to the Kansas Crop and Livestock Reporting Service.

With fall harvesting about three-fourths finished by November 1, the State's crop production index was 151 percent of the 1957-59 base, compared with 128 percent last year and the previous high of 140 percent in 1969.

Production of sorghum grain is expected to reach a record 227 million bushels, about 1½ times last year and one-fourth more than the previous record.

Corn production was expected to total 115 million bushels—the largest crop in nearly 4 decades.

Soybean production of 19 million bushels is considerable more than produced last year, but less than in some other recent years.

Yield per acre of sorghum grain equalled the previous record high of 56 bushels per acre and for corn the 88 bushels per acre far outdistanced the previous record of 75 bushels set in 1968.

Harvest progress for corn and sorghum grain was well ahead of usual on November 1 and for soybeans was about average.

## Wheat Plantings

This fall's wheat seeding started at a rather slow pace in early September due to lack of moisture.

September and October rains, however, provided sufficient moisture for seeding to move ahead rapidly to virtual completion by the end of October.

Stands have been good over nearly all of the State with very little replanting. Wheat has grown well this fall and moisture has been sufficient for it to root down well.

Volunteer and seeded wheat provided rather limited grazing for livestock prior to November 1, but prospects were generally bright for late fall and winter grazing.

## Milo Output

On November 1 production of sorghum grain was estimated at 227,248,000 bushels, 56 percent larger than last year and 59 percent above the ten-year average.

Expected yield per acre on November 1 was 56 bushels per acre, 15 bushels above last year and equal to the previous high set in 1969.

Killing freezes in late October stopped crop growth over essentially all of the State, and should help to speed harvest of fields. By November 1 combining was nearly three-fourths complete, considerable ahead of average.

## Corn Production

Corn grain production is estimated at 115,368,000 bushels, substantially above last year's 80 million bushels and the largest crop out-turn for the State since 1932.

Yield per acre of 88 bushels was far above last year's 62 bushels.

Corn harvest was three-fourths complete by the last of October, compared with the ten-year average of slightly over one-half. Virtually all of the corn crop reached maturity before freezing weather.

## Soybean Harvest

Production of soybeans is estimated at 18,774,000 bushels, compared with 15,075,000 last year but much less than the record 23,925,000 in 1968.

Yield per acre averaged 21 bushels, compared with 15 last year and a record high of 25 bushels.

Dry weather during late summer hurt soybean yield prospects. By November 1 soybean harvest was three-fourths complete, substantially ahead of a year earlier, but about average for recent years.

## Other Crops

Sugar beet production for the State was estimated at 660,000 tons harvested from 40,000 acres yielding

16.5 tons per acre. Digging activities moved along well in northwest Kansas but in southwest Kansas were temporarily interrupted by a strike of plant workers.

## Pasture

On November 1, pasture feed condition was 75 percent of normal, up 2 points from the previous month, but 4 points below the ten-year average.

Grass growth was helped by fall rains and cool season pasture grasses developed considerable feed. Wheat pastures were aided by recent rains and fall and winter small grain grazing prospects have been substantially improved.

## United States

Sorghum grain production in the United States was forecast at 890 million bushels on November 1, 28 percent above 1970.

The nation's corn grain production was estimated at 5,552 million bushels on November 1, up 35 percent from last year's crop and the largest corn crop ever produced.

Soybean production was estimated at 1,200 million bushels, compare with 1,136 million bushels produced in the Nation last year.

## Too Many Generals At Too High Cost

There's too much gold braid in the military services, the House Appropriations Committee complains. It ordered the Pentagon to get busy trimming it.

The committee confessed its distress at these facts:

• There are more three and four star generals and admirals in uniform today than there were at the height of World War II.

• There are 6,000 more colonels, major captains and commanders

today than in 1945.

• Total military personnel strength was 12.1 million in World War II, 3.6 million in the Korean conflict and 2.7 million now. Today there are 1,330 generals and admirals compared with 1,142 in the Korean conflict and 2,068 in World War II. Of these 190 hold three stars now compared with 139 in 1945. There are 57,819 colonels, Navy captains, lieutenant colonels and commanders today compared with 41,417 in the Korean conflict and 51,956 in World War II.

"The committee feels that much of this proliferation of high-ranking officers results from the assigning of

military men to traditional civilian jobs," the report said. "The need to let civilians do civilian jobs in the Department of Defense becomes increasingly important as the cost of military personnel continues to increase. Not only do some high-ranking officers cost more in terms of salary and benefits than their civilian counterparts, but there is the added cost of first having to train them for a new job and then having to move them to another new assignment after two or three years."

The committee told the secretary of defense to review officer requirements of each of the services

## Set Details On Irrigation Assn. Annual Meeting

The eighth annual meeting of the Kansas Irrigation and Water Resources Association will be held Wednesday and Thursday, Dec. 1-2, in Great Bend. Theme of the conference is "Our Responsibility For Water Management."

Russell Herpich, Extension irrigation specialist at Kansas State University, reports that committee meetings and a board of directors meeting will be held Dec. 1 at the Holiday Inn. Those meetings begin at 1:30 p.m.

The general meeting is Dec. 2 in the Knights of Columbus Hall. Registration begins at 8:15 a.m. with the educational program starting at 9 a.m.

Herpich says that "the educational information will be highly useful for all Kansas irrigators and water users. The speakers will discuss various means that we can conserve our precious water resources."

A film "The California Water Plan" will kickoff the meeting. Gordon Walhood, chief, Engineering Division of the Albuquerque District

Corps of Engineers, will follow with a talk about developing water resources in the upper Arkansas River basin.

Dick Muncie, manager, crop hail division of Kansas Farm Bureau Insurance, will discuss "adjusting of Insurance for Crop Hail Damage." The annual business meeting of the association will be held immediately prior to lunch.

Following lunch, Dr. Glenn Beck, vice-president for Agriculture at Kansas State University, will give his views about "Water, Agriculture, and the Kansas Economy."

Frank Rayner, manager of the High Plains Underground Water Conservation District at Lubbock, Texas, will describe the workings of his district and how it might be applicable to Kansas underground water sources.

Fred Corey, irrigation engineer for Benham-Peterson-Karl Associates, McCook, Neb., will outline an irrigation water scheduling program.

Evans Banbury, superintendent of the Colby Branch Station of the Kansas Agricultural Experiment Station at KSU, will cite research results showing crop response to selected water management practices. The meeting will be completed at approximately 3:30 p.m.

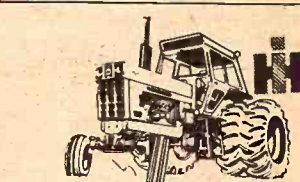

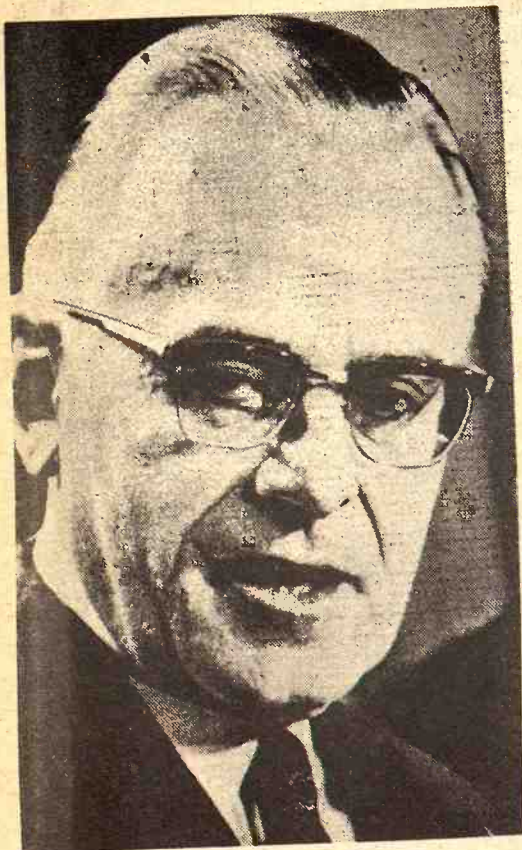

## Some Reluctance Butz Nomination

It's been a busy week in the Department of Agriculture. President Nixon gave Secretary Clifford Hardin his walking papers and at the same time announced that he no longer would work to abolish the Department and have its functions absorbed by other cabinet departments.

To replace Hardin, Nixon's choice is Dr. Earl Butz, like Hardin a career university administrator. Butz, once an assistant secretary of agriculture in the Eisenhower Administration, has long been associated with Purdue University.

The association with the Ezra Taft Benson regime in USDA in the 1950's has produced some congressional opposition to the appointment, as has Butz' position on the board of directors of four major farm-related companies.

He has been on the board of Ralston Purina, International Minerals and Chemicals, J. C. Case, and Stokely Van Camp. Butz said he would resign all four directorships before he would become USDA Secretary.

Some Congressmen were talking tough enough that there might be a question if the Senate would confirm the nomination.

Butz, however, did receive notice from the Farm Bureau, Farmers Union and the Grange, indicating their support of his nomination.

AWHAT EFFECT  
DOES GRAZING  
WHEAT HAVE ON  
GRAIN YIELD?

In some years as much as two-thirds of Kansas' wheat acreage is used for pasture during the late fall and early spring months. Under moderate grazing and timely removal of livestock in the spring, wheat yields are not reduced.

In years when growth is particularly heavy, grazing the wheat helps prevent excess early use of soil moisture and, thus, may even help yields. However, removal of between ½ and one ton of dry-weight wheat through grazing does reduce the nitrogen level of the soil.

Farmers who graze wheat can help prevent losses in grain yield and protein content by applying nitrogen fertilizer. Nitrogen removal could range from 40 to 80 pounds per acre during years of good moisture and good wheat growth.

The application of 40 pounds per acre of nitrogen as fertilizer before seeding or as a topdressing in late fall, winter, or early spring can help

provide adequate nitrogen for spring pasture and grain production.

Any of the common forms of nitrogen fertilizer, ammonium nitrate, anhydrous ammonia, or urea is equally good as a source of nitrogen. However, caution should be used in applying anhydrous

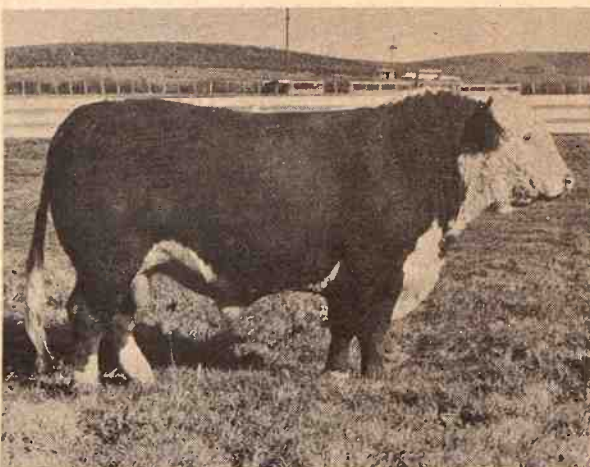

## Q and A

**ADVANTAGES OF PROCESSING STEAM-FLAKED GRAIN**

Steam-flaking of sorghum for feeding beef cattle has been a common practice in larger feedlots for several years. It has been demonstrated to provide substantial advantages in reduced feed requirements to finish cattle. A conservative estimate is a 10 percent advantage in feed required, plus some additional advantage of faster gain.

There are two reasons farm feeders, in general, have not adopted this method. First, investment in equipment required for this process is substantial. In general terms, the minimum equipment requires about a \$10,000 investment. Second, annual cost of owning such a plant would be about \$7,000 if the plant is on a 10-year depreciation schedule.

# Some Parks Get Fish Cleaning Stations

Fish cleaning stations at three state parks are likely to be in operation within months. Hopefully, they could benefit anglers in the 1972 fishing season.

The money, a package of \$15,000 for the three operations, is in the Forestry, Fish and Game Commission budget. Now commissioners have to decide how much they can get for the \$5,000 allotted for installation of each station, one at Cheney Reservoir, one at Wilson and one at Milford.

Walt Harrison, field services chief for the commission, was asked questions at a recent game commission meeting concerning the degree of efficiency and decor possible for the \$5,000 figure for each station.

Undoubtedly, the stations will not be elaborate. Planning to date foresees a toadstool type shelter similar to picnic facilities at the state parks, an "Insinkerator" type disposal unit to grind up fish remains left after the fillets are taken, a metal octagon table above the disposal unit for working on the fish, some sort of running water facility for cleaning of the table, and sewage stream to carry the leftovers to the sewage lagoon.

The fish and game money only will install the three stations. The planning has involved Kansas Park and Resources Authority staffers, because the stations will be located in state parks at the three reservoirs. The park employees will maintain and police the station.

property and it is their facilities which will take care of sewage. While design of the facilities is not complete, the site for the Cheney station is detailed. Park Executive Verne Hart, Manhattan, said all three stations will be in the marina areas of the reservoirs, and the Cheney facility will be located about 350 feet from the water at a back corner of the large, eastside boat ramp within the ramp parking area. Hart said the disposal unit will connect to sewage facilities in that area.

The Milford site will await sewage installation at the desired spot there. An attempt is being made to place the stations where they will get most use, Hart explained. The Park Authority created a primitive, but functional, cleaning station at Norton Reservoir several years ago when a state fishing contest was conducted at that reservoir. That station uses a tin-surfaced table, a water hose and barrels for refuse. Park workers cart away the fish remains in the barrels, Hart said. He added that the Norton facility was so popular it will remain in use.

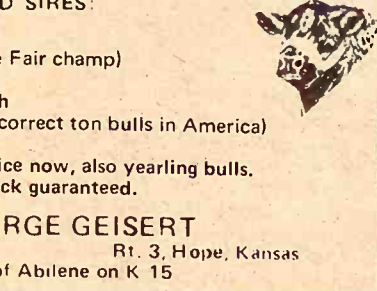

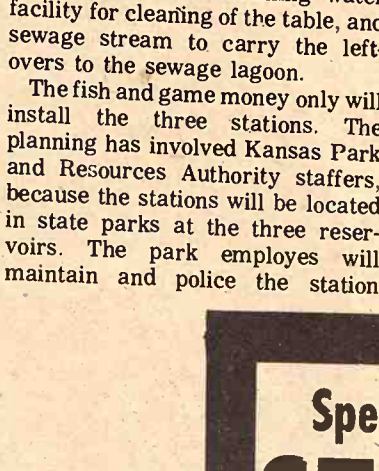

## Rounding Up Wild Horses On Montana Range

The wild horse range on the south slopes of the Pryor Mountains in south central Montana has been closed for public entry while federal mustangers capture part of the wild herd.

The closure order came from the Bureau of Land Management, which is carrying out the emergency horse removal orders from the Interior Department.

Edwin Zaidlicz, state BLM director, said about 18 foals and 30 to 40 bachelor stallions would be taken from their rugged and sparse home because of a lack of range food. An estimated 200 head now live in the area bordering Wyoming.

Zaidlicz said the area was closed to eliminate the danger of federal agents being accidentally shot at by hunters and to reduce the risk of injury to the horses and colts.

The colts will be turned over to an organization dedicated to the preservation of wild horses and placed on ranges in Wyoming and Montana.

The stallions will be handed over to the Crow Indians with the understanding that they will not be sold but will be broken to ride or turned loose on the range.
