Less Acres-But More Wheat Eligible For '70 Certificates

Kansas farmers have just completed harvesting their second largest wheat crop on record -304 million bushels. Under the same conditions under which the 1969 crop was produced, 1970's yield is estimated to be 88 per cent of 1969's.

If prices do not vary much, it might mean a 12 percent drop in a large share of the Kansas economy.

Farmers need not panic. Their income would not be so badly affected. Much of their wheat income comes from wheat certificates, which boost their income even when yields are low and prices are slipping.

The federal price supports for each bushel of wheat are based on the difference between the July 1, 1970 wheat price at 100 percent of parity, and the national average loan rate of \$1.25 per bushel.

To determine the payment rate per acre, the above wheat certificate rate is multiplied by the farmer's normal yearly yield.

Thus, if a farmer experiences a low yield next year, it would not hurt him in 1970.

He would feel the pinch in the ensuing years, when the lowyield year was averaged with previous yields to determine the new normal yearly yield.

This year 43 percent of the allotment, if planted, was eligible for certificates. In 1970, 48 percent will be eligible.

This 48 percent figure reached the office of the Kansas Agriculture Stabilization and Conservation last week, and processing this into county figures started immediately

Frank Hoober, head specialist of production adjustment, said the county allotments would be sent to Washington at once for approval.

With an okay from Washington, the figures then will be sent to each county where ASC officials will determine the acreage for each farm. All this will not take more than 10 days, Hoober

The 12 percent cut in the allotted wheat acreage for 1970 is the third reduction in as many years. The allotment was boosted for the 1967 crop when the surplus had shrunk and drought had reduced production in some of the other wheat-producing nations. The national average for 1967 planted to wheat was 68-2 mil-

In 1968 this was cut to 59.3 mildion acres. For the 1969 crop, another 13 percent was lopped off

to reduce the total acreage to 51.6 million. The 1970 acreage cut of 12 percent will reduce it further to 45.5 million.

The acreage reduction, officials said, was necessitated by increasing carryover supplies of wheat. The Agriculture Dept. said surplus supplies on July 1 totaled 811 million bushels, compared with 529 million bushels last year. Export sales are down and officials see little chance they will rise in the face of world wheat supplies.

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WHERE THE WHEAT WAS

When Kansas' major wheat-producing counties-Sumner, Reno, Ford, Thomas, Harper, McPhersonhave big crops, poor harvests in other parts of the state bring down the total very little.

There was very little to hold back the 1969 Kansas' wheat crop. Despite reduced acreages, a late start because of rain, and some delays past the usual end of harvest season, the state produced 304 million bushels of grain, second highest on record.

This map shows the total production and yield in each county. The upper figure is in millions of bushels. The lower is the yield per acre.

The state yield averaged 31.5 bushels, three bushels above the previous record set in 1958 and 1960. No county had a yield of less than 27 bushels. Republic had the state's highest yield of 39 bushels per acre. Jewell had 38.

Sixteen counties had production over five million bushels, with Sumner-the state's perennial leader- recording over 11 1/2 million. Reno was second and Ford third.

Kansas schoolteachers will take home more money this fall, but some college graduates teaching in Kansas will find their annual pay barely above the \$5000 mark.

A total of 276 of the state's 310 unified school districts replied to a Kansas Association of School Boards questionnaire on salaries. For some of them, increases reported were dramatic changes

Kansas schoolteachers will take from salaries five or 10 years

The recently released report warns school board members that teacher groups in the state may use salary statistics as "pressure" during negotiations. KASB urges its members to counteract exorbitant demands" of teacher associations.

Of the districts reporting, 138 had beginning salaries for those with bachelor's degrees from \$5000 to \$6000. Another 138 districts had a starting pay range from \$6000 to \$6500. The beginning salary average in Kansas is close to \$6000 for the new school year.

Lowest beginning salaries reported were at Elk City and Cherokee which pay new teach-

ers \$5200.

Three cities, Paola, Sublette and Shawnee Mission, reported they begin new teachers at \$6500 a year, highest stanting salary in the state. Kanss City, Kans., reported starting pay of \$6450.

Top pay for a veteran teacher with a master's degree in some of the poorer districts barely equaled the beginning pay in some more fortunate districts, the report reveals.

KASB lists 18 districts as paying between \$10,000 and \$11,000 to teachers with a master's degree.

There are four cities, Atwood, Glasco, Sublette, and Lewis, that pay between \$11,000 and \$12,000.

Listed as over the \$12,000 mark on master's degrees were the cities of Troy and Hamilton.

The report lists the top Wichita salary at \$10,145, the highest a teacher there with a master's can go under the 1969-70 salary scale. Actual top Wichita salary as approved for this year by the school board is \$11,560, for persons with doctorate degrees. There also are pay steps here between master's and doctor's degrees.

The school board report cautions board members against "misuse" of salary comparisons at teacher-board negotiating tables.

"There is no known effective method of eliminating this pressure from being used by teacher groups at the bargaining table," the report states, "but it is important to have reliable data available to counteract exorbitant demands."

Some school districts reporting to the association still do not have written salary scales based on definite steps, although they are the exception. The Hill City teachers' pay scale was reported as "\$6000 plus experience plus college hours and extras." Others listed similar approaches.

Hamilton schools reported a base pay of \$5800, with "all other pay negotiated." The 34 school districts not responding gave no reason for not reporting, according to the summary.

A teacher new to the Wichita system this fall will earn more than five times what a beginning teacher received in 1942, according to National Education Association Wichita figures.

Starting pay in the 1942-43 school year was only \$1000. Maximum pay then was reported as \$1980 for a teacher with a master's degree.

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

A number of exporting nations, primarily the European Common Market, have recently offered wheat in areas considered traditional U.S. markets. Huge world supplies in the major exporting countries have caused cut rate price competition among most exporting areas.

The United States had been under pressure, particularly from Japan, to lower its export prices in line with those cuts made for the European market last month.

"The action is taken to help U.S. wheats regain their previously competitive position in a world market situation where current and projected supplies exceed demand by a large margin," the department said.

The Japanese, protesting what the considered price discrimination by the United States, quit buying U.S. wheat several weeks

The Japanese Food Agency was scheduled to consider bids Wednesday on 284,000 tons of wheat, about 10.6 million bushels.

A spokesman said he hoped the Japanese now could consider U.S. wheat.

Japan has been the best cash market for U.S. farm products, but wheat sales during the year ended June 30 dropped to 68.3 million bushels, compared with 82.2 million a year earlier.

The United States had announced a 12 percent cut in the government wheat acreage allotment for 1970 in an effort to head off rising stockpiles caused by a slump in the export market.

Wheat exports last year totaled 542 million bushels compared with 761 million in 1967-68.

Medical Limits To Longevity

Population experts theorize that man has lengthened his life span as much as he can by fighting contagious disease and will have to change his way of living to lengthen it any more.

Their theory, set forth in a U.N. report, attempts to explain a recent rise in death rates in some countries.

They say the rates fell for 150 years mainly because improvements in living standards and simple health and medical measures brought "a decline in mortality from acute infectious diseases."

But they speculate that these methods only took advantage of an innate resistance to infection in mankind and now that resistance has been exploited to the limit. "If we are to increase life ex-

pectancy," they say, "we may need to change our basic patterns of behavior."

Specifically, they call for "introduction of some new factor or factors capable of preventing death from a quite different range of diseases."

They point out that more and more deaths are caused lately by heart and lung ailments, motor car accidents and suicide.

Someday, they hint, mass starvation a so may be a major

HARVESTER

cause of death unless "population growth is not countered by either falling birth rates or an increasing food production or both."

The expents, with the United Nations and the World Health Organization, prepared the report for the U.N. Population Commission, to meet in Geneva November 3-14.

They do not list the countries where death rates have begun to rise again.

But latest published figures show that death rates last year were the highest in seven years in Australia, Belgium, East Germany, West Germany, West Berlin, Hungary, Israel and Sweden, and equaled the previous 7. year high in Austria, Czechoslovakia, Finland, Greece and the United States.

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

Tax Reform To Cut Bank's Bad Debt Loophole

Commercial banks would pay much higher taxes under the House tax measure.

More dramatic "reforms" have caught the public eye, but few have a sharper bite than the \$250 million a year the Treasury expects from a drastic tightening of the bad-debt reserves banks are allowed.

Currently, they may set aside tax-free reserves of up to 2.4% of outstanding loans, regardless of their actual loan losses.

The House bill would have banks base the reserves on actual bad debts, averaged over the most recent six years.

Existing loan-loss reserves are commonly 12 times what the new measure would justify - as much as 20 times for major banks, analysts say.

The effect could stop further tax-free inputs to reserves for easily a decade or more. Published bank earnings wouldn't be affected, however, because net operating earnings after taxes and per-share figures don't take the present tax break into account. But actual tax bills would shoot up, and banks would have less cash to put to work.

Last year, for example, New York's First National City Corp. would have paid \$56.4 million in taxes on operating earnings, but the bad-debt provision cut this amount by 19.2 million. The saving was 15% of the bank holding company's after-tax operating

AVERAGE PROPERTY ASSESSMENT RATIOS

For each county, this map lists the average property assessment ratio, and urban and rural ratios, published recently by the Property Valuation Dept., State Chamber of Commerce. Although state law requires Kansas property to be assessed at 30 percent of "fair market value," most Kansas counties did not meet this standard in 1968. For 1968, the average ratio of assessed value to sales value was 18

percent. Although 91 counties have conducted county-wide appraisals to determine the value of property, only 35 counties now show urban properties assessed at 27 percent or more, and only four counties show rural property assessed at 27 percent or more. If proper assessment is not completed before 1971, the counties will be penalized by the state. Shawnee County, with a 16 percent assessment value, was given a \$225,378,303 tax valuation for 1968.



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
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OON LAUNCH MIXING SYSTEM

The feed storage and mixing system on the David Hirt farm near Westphalis almost looks as complicated as a launching pad for a moon ocket. The farm was viewed at the recent field day in eastern Kansas arm Management Association.

Grain unloaded within the building is elevated to the top of the 65-bot tower. Then it drops by gravity to any of several storage bins which have a total capacity of 12,000 bushels. Ground grain mixed with other ingredients for a balanced ration is augured from the building to feeding pens for hogs which are out of view at the right. Everything works automatically. Hirt feeds more than 1000 hogs a year.

Massive Detail To Federal Meat Inspection

The government has published insumer protection regulations which ultimately all meat recessed commercially in the mited States must be judged. Under the wholesome meat act 1967 the states have until next recember 15, or a year later unsome circumstances, to set pinspection programs at least real to federal standards. The 12 page manuscript issued by 12 Agriculture Department sets out detailed proposals for caralleg out the act.

"It's big medicine in terms of dditional controls to determine one effective consumer protection," Dr. Hyman M. Steinmitz, consumer and Marketing Server official, said in an interview. The far-ranging proposals interested mostly existing federal pecifications on meat inspection and packing house operations,

these and some new features would have full impact when the states begin operating their programs.

All meat sold in interstate commerce, about 85 percent consumed in the country, now is federally inspected. But the department estimates there are about 15,000 meat plants doing siness entirely within single states and not subject to federal inspection.

Steinmetz said one of the major provisions in today's proposals permits federal authorities to delain suspected meat in interstate commerce wherever it is found. States would have the same authority over intrastate operations. "Under the old law," Steinmetz said, our ability to act on meat and meat products largely was confined to the premises of lants. Now we have the authority to detain and seize meat out-

side the plants."

Auother important provision,
Steinmetz said, involves stricter
control over rendering works and
similar plants which deal in dead
westock used for inedible pro-

The proposals eliminate many of the exemptions in meat inspection requirements, including those involving slaughter of livestock on farms.

Public comment on the regulations will be accepted until October 13. Steinmetz said a final decision will be made later on any changes and when to put the proposals into effect.

Violent Crimes In State Half Of Nat'l. Average

The Federal Bureau of Investigation reports that Kansas was well below the national crime level in 1968.

Statistics showed a national index of serious crimes averaging 2235 per 100,000 population last year, an increase of about 10 percent from 1967.

The Kansas crime index figured out at 1480 per 100,000 residents.

Breakdown disclosed that in violent crimes — murder, rape, robbery and assault — Kansas last year averaged 150 crimes per 100,000 population against a national average of 295.

In the classification of crimes against property — burglary, larceny and automobile theft — Kansas in 1968 averaged 1330 per 100,000 population against a national average of 1940.

Total crime indexes for last year per 100,000 population listed Kansas City (including Johnson and Wyandotte counties in Kansas) 2900; Topeka (including Shawnee County) 2061 and Wichita (including Sedgwick and Butler counties) 2155.

VENEZUELA BEST U.S. LATIN CUSTOMER

Venezuela is our best cash customer in Latin America for agricultural products with a \$90.8 million purchase in 1968, up from an \$80.1 million average in the 1955.59 period. This is in the face of a 78 percent increase of Venezuela's gross agricultural production in the past 10 years.

Life insurance policyholders there are 130 million in this country — are stepping up borrowing on their policies because at an interest rate of 5 percent it is the cheapest money available.

range to 81/2 percent and personal loans at banks draw almost 12 percent.

The volume of policy loans has increased steadily in recent years because the policyholder can save money in financing the purchase of a house, a car, or smaller expenses.

"Most people think twice or three times before borrowing on a life insurance policy because it defeats the purpose of life insurance," an industry spokesman said.

"But in this time of high interest rates elsewhere more people are doing so, mainly for smaller expenses such as college tuition and medical bills."

Another instance in which the availability of policy loans is valuable is in the case of companies which insure the lives of their top executives for large amounts. In the event that the company needs a sizable amount of cash for a short time, it can borrow on the policies and receive the benefits of low interest.

An insurance company executive, who asked not to be identified by name, said the companies do not care to discuss the growing policy loan volume because

they do not wish to encourage the trend.

The 5 percent interest rate on policy loans is set by law in most states.

In addition to the low interest charge, policyholders are turning to cash heavy insurance companies for loans. The supply of lending money available to banks and other savings institutions has been limited by government monetary restrictions, imposed in an effort to stem inflation.

The Institute of Life Insurance reports that total policy loans made in April — the latest month for which figures are available - amounted to 1.47 billion dollars against 819 million dollars in April 1968.

Net outstanding loans last April totaled 11.9 billion dollars, representing 6.2 percent of the companies' aggregate assets. This compared with 10.44 billion, or 5.8 percent of assets, a year

A 12 percent reduction in wheat higher — next year, the secreallotments for 1970 was announed in Washington last week, ending a weeks-long interdepartmental battle in the nation's capital.

Secretary of Agriculture Clifford M. Hardin announced the cut from the 51.6 million acres allowed in 1969. He said the program is "aimed at strengthening the U.S position in world markets and continuing the effort to bring wheat production in line with needs.

It was the third consecutive year of decreased wheat planting in the United States. Stockpiles of wheat in the United States have continued to grow despite the reduced plantings.

The announcement ended an argument between the Department of Agriculture and the Bureau of the Budget over the amount of decrease in wheat acreage for the coming year. Hardin had held out for a 10 percent cut reflecting the recommendations of wheat growers and grain trade men. The budget bureau leaders had earlier recommended a 24 percent cut in acreage but switched to proposing a 16 percent cut during the past few weeks.

The allotment announcement had been due since late May or early June. In the past few weeks officials had said it would be made momentarily.

Kansas farmers next year will be allowed to plant 8,526,307 acres of the nation's 45.5 million acres of wheat. Last year's allotment for Kansas was 9,670,-690 acres.

Hardin noted that the new year's program will include certificate payments on 48 percent of the production as compared with 43 percent for the 1969 crop. Certificates this year were valued at \$1.52 a bushel. Values are expected to be as high - or



The hog market has been sur- mostly the result of a very strong demand for pork. Supplies of pork have been quite abundant - slightly larger than last year.

Pork production during the first half of this year totaled 6491 million pounds, 3 percent more than one year before. Hog slaughter during the six months totaled 42,667,600 head, or 2 percent more than in 1968. Average live weight was 237 pounds, 2 pounds less than last year.

While pork production increased about 3 percent, population growth was just a little more than 1 percent. The supply of pork per person during the first half of this year was about 2 percent greater than in 1968. By contrast, the average price of hogs has been up much more. This indicates that it is strong demand - not short supply that has pushed up prices of

The summer is, of course, the season when pork production is at the lowest level of the year. On a weekly basis, supplies usually reach their low for the year early in July. Supplies increase slowly from early July into Octo-

Two other market factors tend to offset the increase in pork production from July to October. These are: (1) a decrease in the supplies of broilers, and (2) some increase in the dmand for pork with the arrival of cooler weath-

A consumer protest movement could undermine hog values during the next few weeks. Such an action could be especially trouble-

some at this time when supplies are increasing seasonally. One woman, who led a protest demonstration against grocery

stores a few years ago, has been quoted as saying that she might soon go out against processors. That might produce an interesting situation: Women on one side demanding lower prices and farmers on the other asking for higher prices.

Many families are getting big increases in income. A recent news story listed increases as follows: (1) A machinists' group got an increase of 32 percent over the next three years. (2) New York longshoremen got a 30 percent increase over the same time. (3) Construction workers at Buffalo got a boost of 64 percent over 2 years.

Not every family, however, is getting such increases. Some have even suffered from reduced income - because of shortened work weeks, forced changes in employment, or retirement. Many older people living on savings, pensions, etc., receive little or no increases in income. Thus, many people are forced to cut their purchases of meat and other essential items even while others live in ever-increasing luxury. During recent months the increased spending by the "newly rich" has more than offset the reduced purchases by those who have been left behind. This development may put hog prices in a vulnerable position, especially during the next three months.

USDA To Cut Use Of Persistent Chemicals

Reacting to public pressure, the Agriculture Department has announced a substantial curtailment in government use of such long-lived pesticides as DDT, dieldrin, and heptachlor.

The department announced that from now on it will use lesspersistent chemicals such as chlordane wherever possible in federal insect control programs.

These programs were suspended on JJuly 9 for 30 days to permit department officials to study contamination effects of the pesticides.

"We were being whiplashed on this thing," a department spokes-man said, "and so we decided to call a halt and look it over."

The private use of pesticides is not affected by the department's

Widespread public concern over pesticide use prompted the department to suspend control program operations so they could be studied more fully.

Under the revised federal-state control plan the number of acres to be sprayed also would be reduced in some cases.

As an example, the spokesman said, before the July 9 suspension the plan called for spraying 22, 000 acres with dieldrin to control Japanese beetles, white fronged beetles and European chafers.

This now has been cut to 16,200 acres, with dieldrin to be used on only 6000. Chlordane and sevin considered less persistent in plants and soils - will be substituted for the remainder.

The July 9 order also suspended spraying planned for 56 airpouts. The suspension was continued until Sept. 14 to give authorities more time for study

Sen. Gaylord Nelson, D-Wis., a critic of government pesticide policies, said in a statement that the department's cutback action is encouraging but does not go far enough.

Nelson said the postponement of a decision on airport spraying - done to prevent insects from spreading among states and overseas - was "most unfortunate" and that there is ample evidence available to set restrictions immediately.

He also said Secretary of Agriculture Clifford M. Hardin should not withhold his department's plan any longer to stop

the use of DDT in aquab and for aerial dusting.

Nelson said the depart should set up a timetaly canceling federal registre





The sorghum grain crop is expected to total 169 million bushels, a new record high.

bushels, although largest since 1964, was not a large crop.

The expected sugar beet crop of 782,000 tons is well above last year and a new record high for the State. Hay production is expected to reach an all-time high of 5.7 million tons.

Wheat Production

Kansas wheat production is estimated at 304,070,000 bushels, one-fourth more than last year and the state's second largest crop.

The average yield of 31.5 bushels per acre was 3 bushels above the previous record set in 1958

and 1960.

Harvest got off to a late start because of rain but was virtually completed during July. Test weight of the 1969 crop averaged 61.2 pounds per bushel, slightly below a year earlier but about average for the state.

Protein content of this year's crop, at 10.9 percent, was well below average. Sumner County ranked first in wheat production, followed by Reno and Ford coun-

Sorghum Forecast

Sorghum grain production is forecast at 169,441,000 bushels, 4 percent above 1968 and a shade above the previous record of 168 million bushels set in 1960.

The expected yield of 53 bushels per acre is 6 bushels above last year and a new record high

Greenbugs have been a problem in some areas but beneficial insect populations and some spraying have limited damage. Rainfall during the month was generally sufficient to keep the crop developing well in most areas.

Corn Production

Corn production is forecast at 88,425,000 bushels, 4 percent above last year and the largest since 1944 The August 1 indicated vield of 75 bushels per acre is equal to last year's record high.

Other Crops

Barley production is estimated at 5,624,000 bushels, 52 percent above the 1968 crop and the largest in five years.

The oat crop of 6,318,000 bushels was 8 percent below a year earlier. The barley yield per acre of 37 bushels was equal to last year's record high, while the oat yield per acre of 39 bushels was the highest since 1883.





Check Tree Leaves For Water Needs

Homeowners can read sage about the water ne their trees and shrubs by closely at the wilted condin the leaves, reports Kansas University Extension ornan horticulturalist Larry Leu

A slight wilt on the leave ing the afternoon that disa before sundown indicates lack of water is not caus vere stress to the plant, h old explains.

However, if the leaves, limp in the early evening tree needs help in the form deep soaking. If the tree sandy soil, it may need reing in five or six days. For in heavy clay soils, the watshould be repeated every to ten days.

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

Texas NFO Signs Major Milo Contract

The National Farmers Organization has agreed to a \$3 million milo contract with the West Friano, Texas, Grain Co., according to the farm editor of the Amarillo News, Wayne Board.

The Texas state NFO president Don Kimball said his group now "has enough strength to short the market. The milo contract, ratified by 800 NFO members at a closed session at Hereford, Texas, calls for a "15% increase for the farmer." Kimball called that the highest price since 1954.

Clarence Martin, owner of the elevator facility at Friona, said he entered the agreement to insure a 12-month supply of milo and "to give the freight to the farmer." His elevator has a capacity of about 200 million pounds.

The contract calls for No. 2 yellow milo with a moisture content of 14% with a 56-pound test weight. Also included is a 10% penalty, should the farmer fail to deliver the milo to Martin .
