

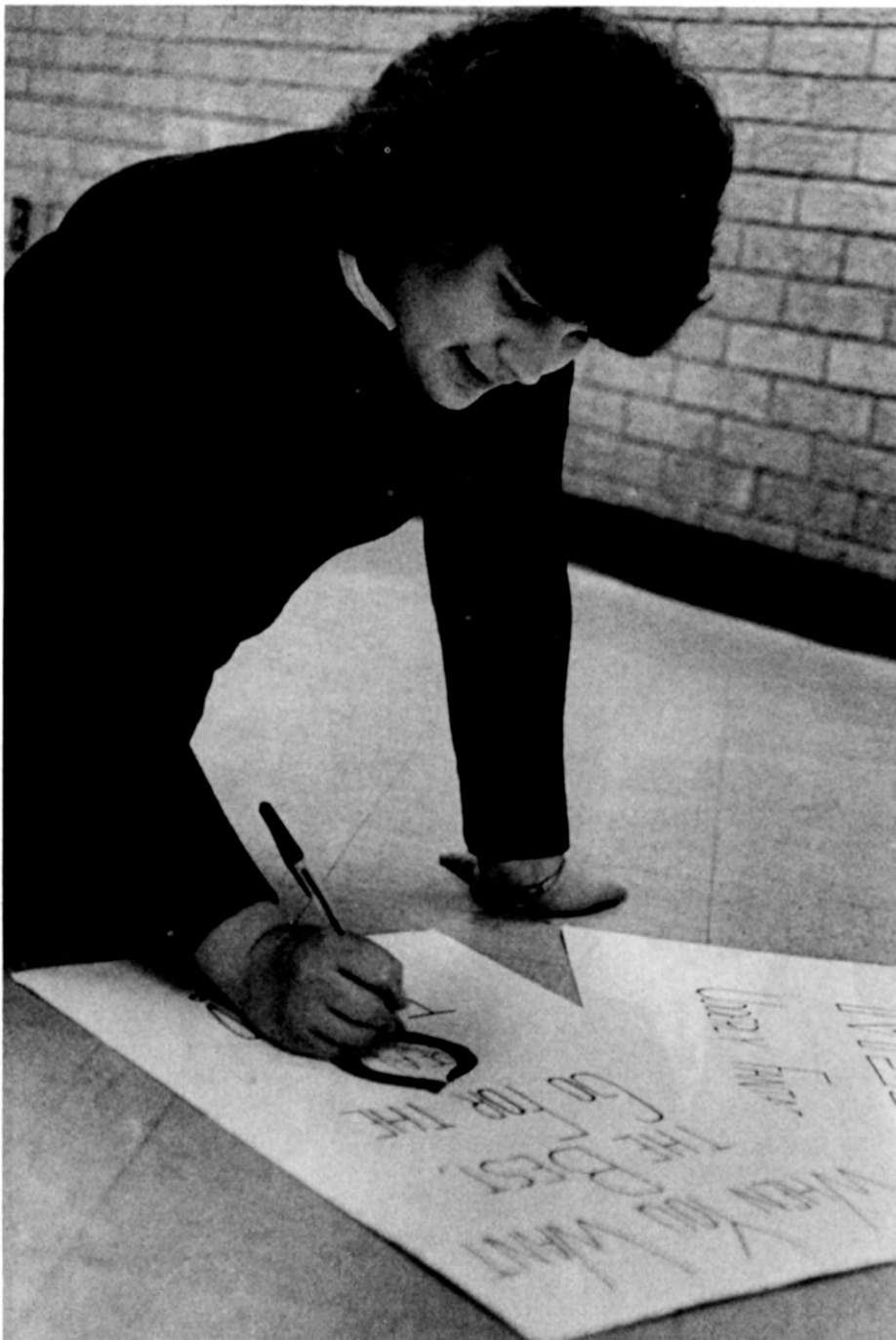

Youth touts milk products

"Drink milk. It's natural, refreshing and good for you," Michele Staatz, Dickinson County 4-H'er, tells other youths.

"I love milk; I have been raised on it."

Michele, who drinks milk daily, promotes dairy products as part of her dairy foods project. She has spoken on how to cook dairy foods in the microwave, the history of cheeses and how to make yogurt. She also has written an article for the Abilene Chronicle's dairy issue and has taught her 4-H foods project group about dairy products in cooking.

"We look for the Real Seal. When you want the best, look for the real thing," she tells groups.

Michele not only likes dairy foods, she likes dairy cows. She has two Holstein dairy heifers, Babes and Brandy, and started out with a grade cow that was a gift from her parents. Moonshine, so named because she was all black with a moon on her forehead, and the young dairyman soon developed a special relationship.

"She was a best friend. She could tell when something was the matter," Michele recalls.

When Moonshine developed mastitis, Michele milked her by hand twice a day to keep her from being sold.

Michele was 14 when she obtained a \$2,300 loan to purchase her first registered Holstein cow. Moonshine and her steer served as collateral, and her parents signed the note. The cow calved the day after Michele bought her, and the welcome milk checks went to pay interest on the loan.

Today Michele is still paying on the note but at least she says payments are fewer.

Michele likes dairy cows because, she says, they're lovable and gentle. "Treat them right, and they will respect you for it. They also can be your friend."

She tells young 4-H'ers to start with a small animal. A bucket calf is a good place to start, she says. Don't be scared of them. They're just as scared as you. Remember, too, you are responsible for caring for them."

Michele says dairy cows have taught her patience, and that it takes time to accomplish goals.

4-H has taught her how to make decisions, how to compromise and more about herself.

Elk County welcomes new 4-H members and parents

Elk County is welcoming new 4-H members and parents to the 4-H program with "Welcome to 4-H" parties.

Parties are conducted in June and January by county Extension agents Rachelle Mengarelli and KelLee Parr and Junior Leaders. At the January session, county club days is explained and in June, fair and judging schools discussed.

Following the discussion, Junior Leaders conduct new games and other recreation while Mengarelli and Parr meet with parents.

Shortly after new families join 4-H, Parr and Mengarelli meet with them to

answer any questions they might have and give them the book, "It's Greek to Me." The book, written by 4-H member Elizabeth Perkins, defines 4-H terms.

Elizabeth also sends each new member a letter of welcome and letters before club days and the county fair.

Mengarelli says Elk County began emphasizing "Welcome to 4-H" parties last year when 40 new members joined. Thirty of these remained in 4-H, and the county has 21 new 4-H members this year. 4-H enrollment in Elk County is 125.

Refinishing furniture is challenging

With the rising cost of woodworking equipment, such as table saws, band saws, jointers, and drill presses, the young 4-H woodworker soon can become discouraged. Unless his father owns a well-equipped woodworking shop, he can only make small projects such as window sticks and boot jacks. Youth today want a challenge!

The 4-H'er does have an alternative. He can enroll in the woodworking phase, refinishing of furniture. The refinishing phase is much cheaper because it requires less equipment. Furniture can be professionally stripped for a small fee if the design is too intricate, or you can do it yourself. A gallon of paint remover, a wire brush and a putty knife are all that is needed to remove the finish.

Once this is done, you can begin the more interesting area of furniture restoration. Repairing and finishing furniture are a learning experience, and one any beginning woodworker should learn.

Repair involves learning about the original construction and finishing techniques. Most furniture is restored using the same procedures including dovetailing, rabbets, mitres and veneering.

A common assumption is that all furniture was of a dark finish. Research, however, shows that many items were finished in a light color.

A good restored and refinished project has all the nicks and scratches removed and an original type finish applied. Drawers must glide easily. Imagine how much you will have learned by the time you take that old family heirloom from the attic, restore it and have it ready for the 4-H fair.

The refinishing project is practical and timely. Current trends in home decoration include antique furniture in almost any room of the home. Cost can be minimized by buying articles that need to be restored. Your time and small investment is rewarded with a piece of furniture that will be used many years by your family.

Your 4-H woodworking leader or Extension agent can help you get started in this project.

Doug won the 1982 state woodworking award primarily due to his interest in refinishing furniture and has a business restoring furniture.

Their lives spell service

The Dwane Schaake family

The Dwane Schaake family, rural Lawrence, is the sort 4-H is built on. Because 4-H means so much to them, they always are anxious to pass on their enthusiasm.

Dwane, wife Dorothy, and their two children, Mark and Jill, claim over 70 years of service to the 4-H program.

Dwane and Dorothy were both 4-H members and served as community leaders during the 18 years their children, Jill and Mark, were in 4-H.

Today they are assistant community leaders. Dorothy also is a cooking leader, and both work at the county fair. Jill, a Kansas University freshman, is club safety leader, and Mark and wife, Sheila, still drive from their home in Wyandotte County for the annual county achievement banquet.

Because of their dedication to the 4-H program and an equal record of other community service, the Schaakes were honored June 9 as the 4-H Family of the Year at Rock Springs 4-H Center. The award is sponsored by the Kansas 4-H Foundation.

"4-H is education at the home level; it's a lot of opportunity," Dwane says.

His 4-H education began with the Douglas County Jayhawk 4-H Club. By enrolling in the crops, beef and swine projects, he obtained information he later used in his career as a farmer.

Dorothy was among the charter members of the Jefferson County Golden Valley 4-H Club. Swine, foods, clothing and health were major projects, and she was a health delegate to Rock Springs Ranch.

Little did Dwane and Dorothy know their initial involvement in 4-H was merely the start of an almost life-time commitment. When Mark became a member, they rejoined, this time as community leaders for the Greenwood Meadowlarks 4-H Club in Douglas County.

Since, they have spent countless hours keeping vital a club that ranged from 50 to over 100 members. Keys to keeping all members involved were an active Junior Leaders group and parent advisory.

The two groups met regularly to plan special events and club meetings. Junior Leaders also served on calling committees and as assistant project leaders. A monthly newsletter telling of important events was distributed at club meetings.

Participation by both 4-H'er and parent was encouraged. Without that you've lost the child, Dorothy says. A child must be involved to feel good about himself. Parental support is needed, because 4-H takes a commitment of time.

Citizenship and safety long have been club projects. Many state and national project award winners were groomed by the Schaakes.

Dwane and Dorothy always had time to make the individual feel special, too. When a youngster brought her first apple pie to a potluck dinner, Dwane made sure it quickly disappeared. Dorothy always was available to help a first-year 4-H'er with his project talk or record book or to just listen.

The Schaakes tried to work with each child at his level. A 7- or 8-year-old will be lost if left to fill out his record book alone, Dorothy explains. You may feel like you're doing it for him, but he's learning. And next year he'll do more of the work himself. Even today she remembers her father helping her with her swine records.

Dorothy takes her vacation from the Reuter Organ Company, Lawrence, to work at the county fair, serve as county or day camp counselor or as a junior leader chaperone.

Dwane is one of the bus drivers for county camp at Rock Springs and the club trip.

County club day events and county fairs always brought bedlam to the Schaake household as Mark and Jill rushed to finish projects. "I spent some pretty sleepless nights making sure all the bases were covered," Dorothy says. Mark, she recalls, always predicted he would come home from club days with a "top white" ribbon.

Mark's first project, woodworking, was one he carried throughout his 4-H years. The family jokingly says it's because sanding is the only project he could do and still lie on his back and watch TV. He quickly dropped the beef project after his calf stepped on his foot.

Mark especially enjoyed meeting new people, traveling to new places and doing new things. He went to National 4-H Congress in Chicago as a Santa Fe Scholarship winner, to North Carolina on an exchange trip and to Washington D.C. for the Citizenship Short Course.

Through his contact with many different people, Mark learned not to judge people quickly.

"Everyone has their own personality and needs to be treated differently," he says.

A die-hard 4-H'er, the county agent returned Mark's last enrollment card because he was too old to be a member.

Jill attended her first club meeting at six months and racked up seven years of perfect club attendance before she was old enough to join.

She was active in clothing, foods, beef, conservation, and leadership projects and was recognized as a state safety award winner. 4-H wasn't all blue ribbons for Jill. She remembers times when the judge didn't agree with her evaluation of a top ribbon dress. 4-H taught her about winning and losing, both important aspects of life.

Mark and Jill have found the skills they learned in 4-H helpful in many aspects of their lives.

Mark, a project engineer for Marley Pump Co. in Mission, says record keeping taught him organization, and public speaking, how to present himself. He learned the importance of deadlines by taking woodworking items to the fair with the paint still wet.

"I've written so many thank yous in 4-H, now it's automatic," Jill adds. "4-H provides a survival kit for today's world."

Because they can see how 4-H has helped their children and other club members, Dwane and Dorothy often can be found promoting the program.

"When Dwane decides an 8-year-old should join 4-H, the family doesn't have a chance," says Lindy Lindquist, Douglas County 4-H agent.

And Dorothy knows 4-H would be just right for grandson Courtney.

The Schaakes' lives spell service. Whether asked to raise funds, serve on the Extension Council, or provide equipment to transport chairs to the fairgrounds, their answer almost always is yes. They're the sort of family 4-H is built on.

She's hooked on woodworking

Cindy Larson looks at a piece of unfinished wood and sees a challenge. Can she shape that piece of walnut into a rolltop desk, that board of cherry into a medal cabinet?

As a young child growing up on a farm near Leonardville, Cindy always was building something out of wood.

"Dad always complained he could never find his hammer," she says with a laugh.

When Cindy entered high school, she enrolled in the woodworking class and also became involved in the 4-H woodworking project.

Her first projects were a foot stool and a quartz desk clock. From there, her mother says, Cindy went from big to bigger projects. She made a grandfather clock from a kit, a king-sized cedar chest, a walnut rolltop desk and this year is building a waterbed.

The rolltop desk has drawn a crowd wherever it has been exhibited. When the desk was displayed at the Kansas State Fair, Cindy, a student at Barton County Community College, nightly drove to the fairgrounds to listen to the comments of those gathered around it.

"A 17-year-old girl did this!" was a common remark.

"It just made me chuckle inside," she says.

Cindy had plenty of advice from her parents about how to make the desk.

"Most of it went in one ear and out the other. I had my own ideas. I wouldn't even let Dad get close to it except when it came time to move it."

The Leonardville Hustlers 4-H'er spent one semester just drawing up the plans.

"If you can draw up the plans, you can visualize it in your mind and solve a lot of problems," she explains.

She spent every spare moment of the following semester building the desk and several nights was still at work in the early hours of the morning.

There were days, she admits, when she thought the desk never would go together right. Like when she was cutting out the cubbyholes or trying to get the rolltop to roll.

"I learned patience. Things don't go together at the snap of a finger. I learned a lot about myself."

Materials for the desk cost \$500, but the Riley County youth has had offers to sell it for much more — all which she has refused.

"It's kind of like a kid; you hang onto it. You hate to see it go," she

says.

As the assistant woods leader for her club, Cindy has shared her knowledge with other youths. And often learned from them.

"You've got to listen to the kid and basically leave it to him to decide what he makes," she says.

She wasn't sure the handicapped boy, Clay, would be able to complete a project and was apprehensive about working with him.

But, he sanded the wood until it shone, and his eyes shone when he showed the clock to his mother. "It brought tears to her eyes," Cindy recalls.

Cindy spent a lot of time on her woodworking project records last year, and that work paid off when she was named the state wood science project winner.

Cindy says she is hooked on 4-H.

"It seems like whatever you do pays you back," she says. "4-H makes you set goals. I've learned so many things I'll use later in life."

Woodworking will continue to be a part of Cindy's life. She often has stored lumber in her room at school for a woodworking project. Upon graduating from Barton County Community College, she plans to attend Fort Hays State University where she will study to be a woods instructor.

Handicapped learn through 4-H

4-H is giving handicapped youths in the Lakemary Pioneer 4-H Club in Miami County a greater feeling of self-worth.

Thirty-six youths are members of the club that was begun in 1972 to provide mentally handicapped children an opportunity to enjoy the benefits of 4-H. Though the club is named after the Lakemary Center in Paola and often meets there, it is not associated with it.

Lola Cook, who has been a community club leader since 1979, says the club functions much the same as any other 4-H club. Youths join because they want to and must conform to rules outlined by Mrs. Cook.

"When it comes to 4-H, we can't tolerate any behavior problems," she says. Club members are well mannered when they attend community 4-H events and are the first to correct each other.

A special dance and a day camp sponsored by the Miami County Junior Leaders provides social growth both for Lakemary Pioneers members and Junior Leaders.

"The day camp is a good way for Junior Leaders to learn about the world around them, to learn about other people," says Cindy Siemens, Miami County 4-H agent.

"They're put in a position of being

a teacher, a special friend. They learn to give of themselves more. Some Junior Leaders think it's the neatest thing."

This and other interaction by Lakemary Pioneers members and the community furthers understanding of the handicapped in the community.

The club meets monthly, and the new year begins with election of officers and members learning the 4-H pledge. Photography, crafts, cooking, and sewing projects are taught. Club members exhibit projects in a special class at the Miami County Fair where they are judged in conference according to each youth's ability.

Mrs. Cook believes competition is important for the handicapped. "It's good for them to compete; competition makes them do their best," she says.

By caroling for shut-ins, baking cookies to give away, purchasing canned goods for a needy family, and entertaining foster grandparents, club members learn about giving.

"They get real excited about giving. It gives them a feeling of self worth," Mrs. Cook says.

"4-H is supposed to teach skills children will use in the future; it's the same with this group," Mrs. Cook says.

4-H'ers learn about sharing

The Valley Victors 4-H Club of Sedgwick County and residents of New Horizons are learning about sharing and understanding by working with each other.

New Horizons is a residence and workshop for mentally handicapped adults in Valley Center.

The Valley Victors club has donated games, books, and craft items to help with New Horizons' projects and its behavior modification canteen. At club-sponsored Valentine and Halloween dances, residents and 4-H'ers learned new dance steps.

At Easter this year, the 4-H'ers helped the residents dye 200 Easter eggs. The

eggs were colorful, and so were everyone's hands when the afternoon was over.

At the April meeting about 15 New Horizons residents presented a program that included an aerobics-jazz demonstration, comedy routine, harmonica player, singing quartet, and a 50s dance demonstration.

"We have learned a lot by our interaction with New Horizons," say Valley Victors club members. "We've learned planning, nutrition, and socialization skills. The most important skills, however, have been those of communication and understanding with our new friends."

District wheat show has a new look

The District 4-H Wheat Show will take on a new look in 1985 with a new location and division.

Because of declining participation, the two shows are being combined into one Great Bend show August 9. The show will feature a new open division as well as the traditional division for youths enrolled in the crop production project.

"Any 4-H'er may enter this division by adopting a Kansas wheat producer," says Steve Fisher, state 4-H specialist. The youth does not have to be entered in crop production and can enter wheat grown by another individual.

The new division opens the show to a greater number of youths. The emphasis of the show is on marketing and food production, which also are of interest to youths in the breads, foods and commodity marketing projects, Fisher says.

The objectives of the show remain the same: to stimulate interest by youths and their families in the state's most important commodity — wheat; to help them appreciate the complex system of wheat production and marketing and that quality wheat must be produced to meet world food needs; and to help them recognize variety differences in milling

and baking.

A 4-H'er can enter in only one division. To enter a physical sample, a quality analysis sample must be submitted to the county Extension office by July 19. It is not necessary to enter a physical sample.

For quality analysis, a five pound wheat sample must be submitted. The

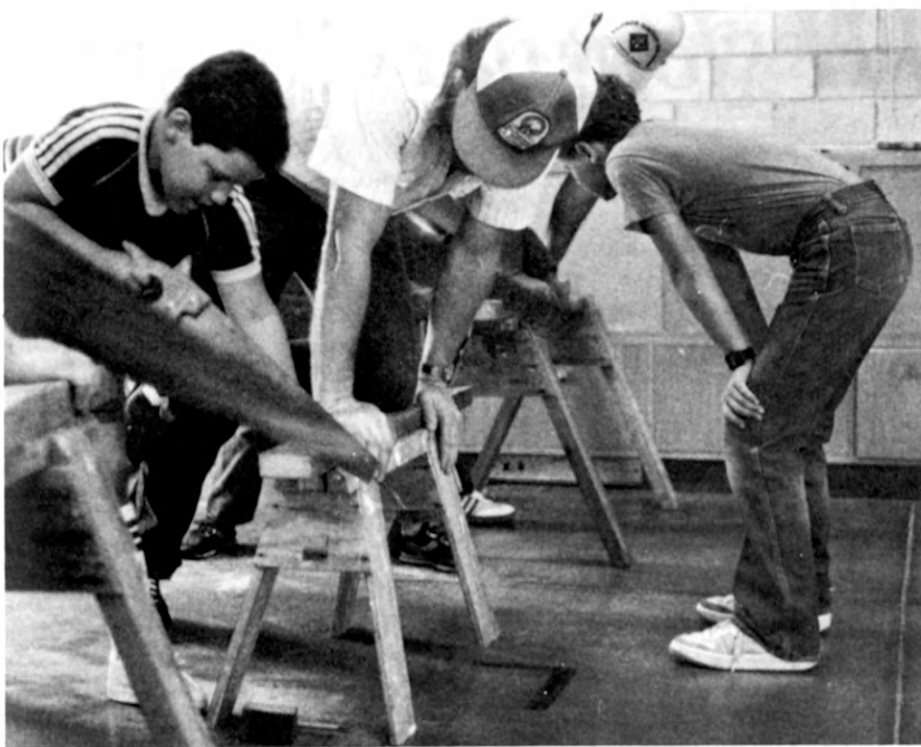

Woodworking activity day featured relays, skillathons

McPherson County 4-H woodworkers learned about woodworking and tools of the trade at a woodworking activity day.

The first such event to be held in the state, 22 4-H youths judged four woodworking classes, competed in relays and skill-a-thons. Judging contests consisted of identifying different kinds of wood, hardware, tools, and finishes. In relays, youths hammered nails, sawed boards and pulled out nails.

Janene Lewis, McPherson County 4-H agent, said the woodworking day grew out of a meeting she held of woodworking leaders in the county. About 50 of the 330 4-H'ers in the county are enrolled in the project, making it one of the largest in the county.

Leaders got ideas from meeting together and decided to have an event that would bring kids together for a learning and fun activity.

Club Day winners demonstrate talents

Miami County Club Day winners demonstrated their talents for the community with a special 2½ hour Sunday afternoon session. Cindy Siemans says this gave the public, 4-H'ers and leaders an opportunity to see the winning numbers.

The event, which was attended by 300 people, was publicized in the newspaper and with posters in downtown Paola.

The event did just that, Lewis says. 4-H'ers enjoyed themselves and at least one youth went home ready to start on this year's project. Leaders are excited about the woodworking day, too, and already are making plans to have it next year.

Rocketry comes to the Kansas State Fair

4-H rocketry projects will be displayed and judged at the Kansas State Fair for the first time this year.

4-H'ers must be a minimum of 12 years and have received a purple ribbon at the county fair. Each exhibitor may enter as many as three rockets, and one of the rockets must have been flown.

Rockets may or may not be exhibited on their launching pad. If exhibited without the launching pad, each must be able to stand by itself.

A report must accompany the rocket that was launched telling how the rocket was constructed, its flight and altitude reached. A picture must accompany the report.

A new 4-H class for color slides is part of the 1985 Kansas State Fair. This class will not be judged and is being offered on a trial basis.

Each county may enter up to two slides. 4-H'ers in all photography units are eligible. Only one slide can be entered per member.

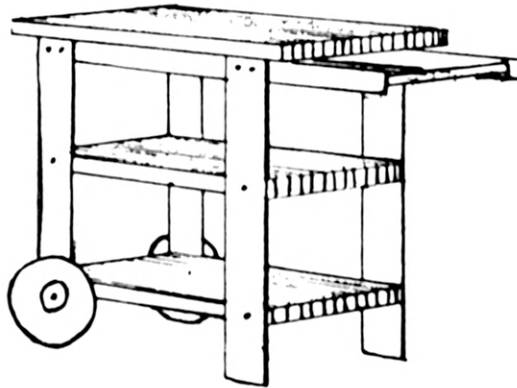

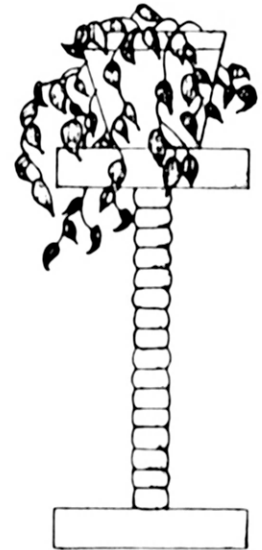

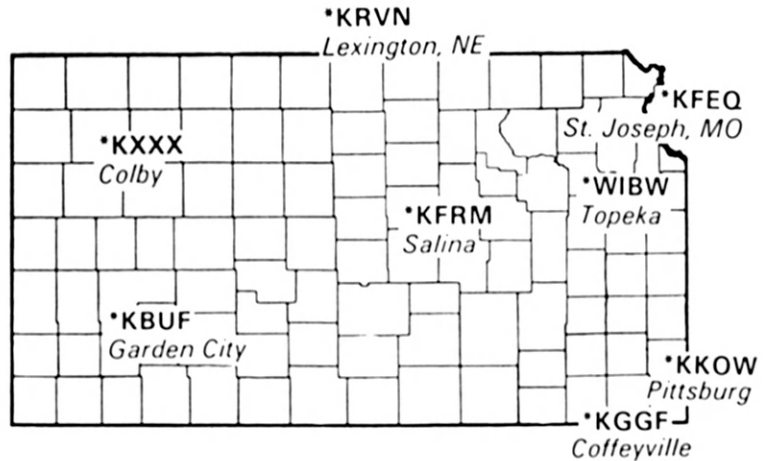

Southcentral area roundup

Sumner County is sponsoring a pumpkin growing contest this year. Pumpkin seeds were given to 125 first and second graders in the Belle Plaine and South Haven Schools.

Students at Belle Plaine will display their pumpkins at the South Haven Fair and students in Belle Plaine will exhibit at the Belle Plaine Autumn Fest.

Pumpkins will be judged in three classes: largest in circumference, largest by weight and best decorated.

Harvey County annually has a spring show for 4-H members in the flower and garden, hand pet and rabbit projects. A show-and-tell display and home economics judging clinic also are featured.

Kansas State University horse specialist Pete Gibbs gave tips on performance classes to 17 Barber County youths at a horse clinic in that county. The clinic is an annual event.

Senior demonstrations were taped during county 4-H day, model meetings at Regional 4-H Day and youths at a horse clinic. By looking at the tapes, youths can critique and improve their performance, says Harper County Agricultural Agent William McCully.

Stafford County's first 4-H market pig sale gave area youths enrolled in the swine project the opportunity to purchase good, quality show animals.

Byron DeFreese, Princeton, provided 32 40- to 90-pound Duroc and Yorkshire pigs for the sale. Buyers were from Edwards, Scott, Cowley, Rice, Reno, Kingman, and McPherson counties.

Leon Dunn, a former 4-H'er and livestock leader, arranged the sale.

Sasnak 4-H Club members of Saline County learned about meat processing when they toured Beverly's Meat Company in Salina.

The Lily Lake 4-H Club of Butler County promoted 4-H during the recent Augusta Chamber of Commerce's sidewalk bazaar with a block-long 4-H show-and-tell display.

They had a petting zoo, demonstrations on how to fit and show beef, sheep and swine, booths displaying 4-H projects, and demonstrations and talks.

A Rice County 4-H'er, Doug Keesling, was among 39 4-H'ers who attended the 34th annual 4-H Commodity Marketing Symposium, April 13-17 at the Palmer House, Chicago, Ill.

Sponsored by the Chicago Board of Trade, the annual event brings together 4-H'ers who have completed outstanding commodity marketing projects.

The Derby 4-H Club will celebrate its 57th anniversary with a picnic June 1 at Hand Park in Derby.

The club was organized at a Pig Club meeting at Pleasant Valley School in Sedgwick County and chartered in 1928 — the first year Kansas 4-H clubs were issued charters. The club had 38 charter members.

The Derby Presbyterian Church has been the meeting place for the club for many of its 57 years, and the club still meets there today.

Youth plans to be an electrician

When other youths were playing football, Bryan Bogner was wiring appliances, rewiring a lamp or repairing a faulty outlet.

"Some kids like football. I don't; I like electricity," the Ford County youth says. "It just interests me."

As a young boy, Bryan wired extension cords and fixed electrical appliances around the house. When he joined 4-H nine years ago, naturally he enrolled in electricity and has continued to enroll in the project throughout his 4-H years.

He has exhibited items such as a display board, extension cord, and trouble light at the county fair and since he turned 14 annually has entered an electric project at the Kansas State Fair in Hutchinson.

His most recent state fair exhibit, a light stand with a lawn mower base, was awarded a purple ribbon. "I was really surprised, that's been the highlight of my 4-H career," Bryan says.

The light is unique in that the cord quickly rolls up on a spool at the base of the lamp. To unwind the

cord, merely take hold of it and pull.

It took Bryan only 30 minutes to wire the stand, but 2½ hours to construct it.

He says he has learned a lot about electricity in 4-H including circuitry, the right way to wire a light switch, polarization, the National Electric Code, and 220 and 440 circuitry. That knowledge made wiring the family woodworking shop and his sister's room easy.

As light engineer for the spring play in high school this year, Bryan used his knowledge of electricity to wire a circuit board to plug into the main light board in the auditorium. The board controlled extra electric props such as lamps.

Bryan is the junior leader for the electric project this year and hopes to teach younger members about basic wiring.

This summer he hopes to apprentice with an electrician and, upon graduating from high school, study electricity at a vocational school. He hopes to be an electrician.
