## KANSAS CLUB WORK

Boys' and Girls' Club work in Kansas started about 1905 with corn clubs for the boys, and homemaking clubs for the girls. The corn clubs were quite prominent for a number of years and gradually branched out to take in other activities as livestock projects, judging, tree planting, etc.

The Smith-Lever Act which created the present extension service, provided a means by which club work could be co-ordinated, and has made possible the 4-H Club as we know it today.

The first Round-up was held in 1923 and the Who's Who 4-H Club was formed. The Collegiate 4-H Club was organized in 1927 and assumed the responsibility for publishing WHO'S WHOOT the following year.

The 4-H Club members in Kansas owe their success to the county agricultural agents, the county 4-H Club agents and home demonstration agents who willingly guide the club work.

Considering some of the more favorable factors affecting club work it is well to mention specifically the continued good interest and effective work on the part of the local 4-H leaders.

In 1939, 22,962 boys and girls were 4-H members in 1,074 community clubs in all 105 counties in the state. Of these members 83.8 per cent completed projects. Two counties finished 100 per cent and 40 counties had a completion of over 90 per cent.

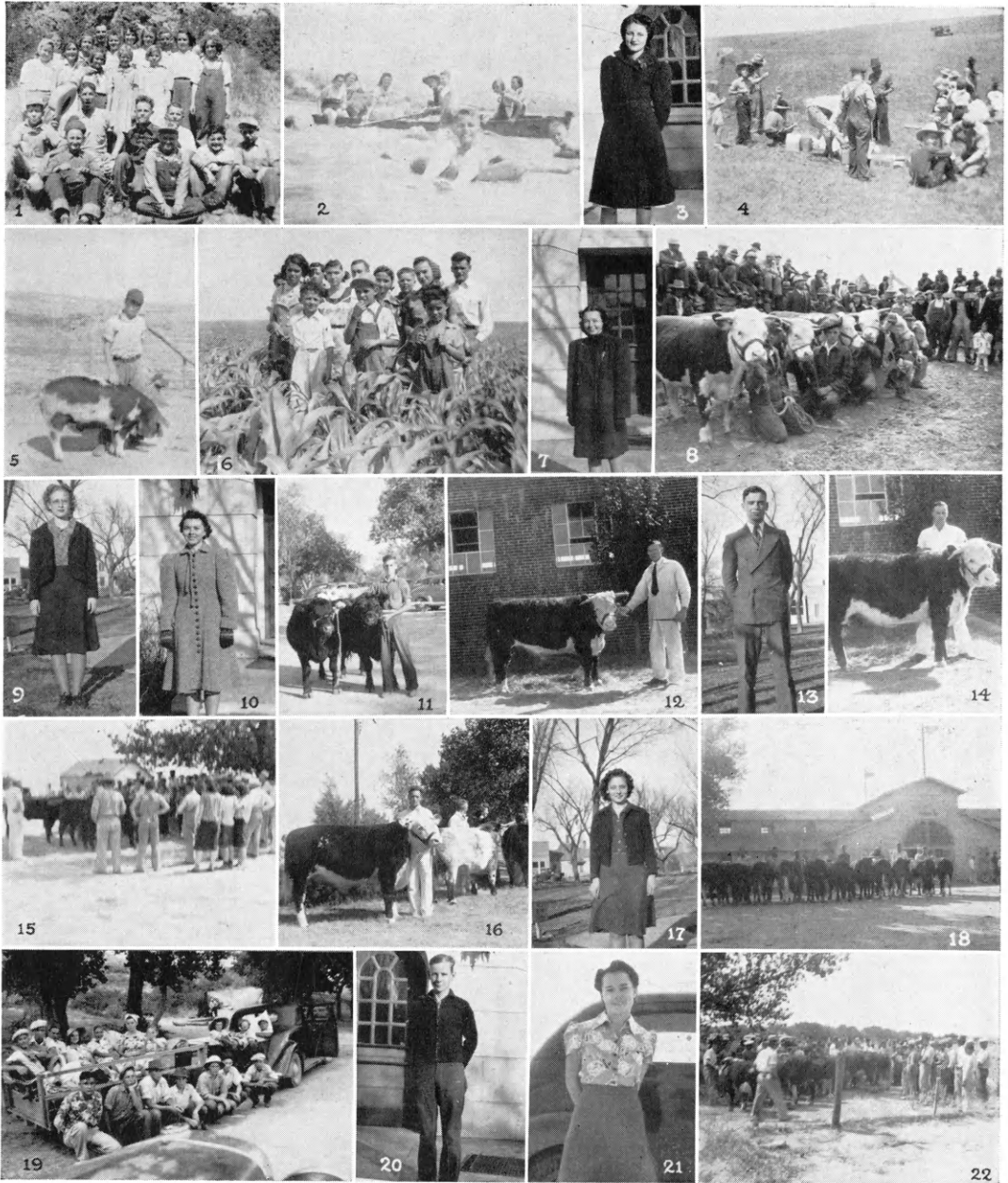

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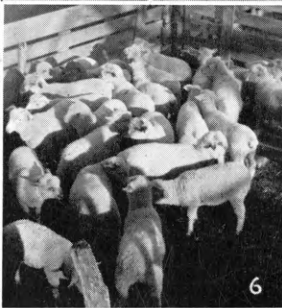

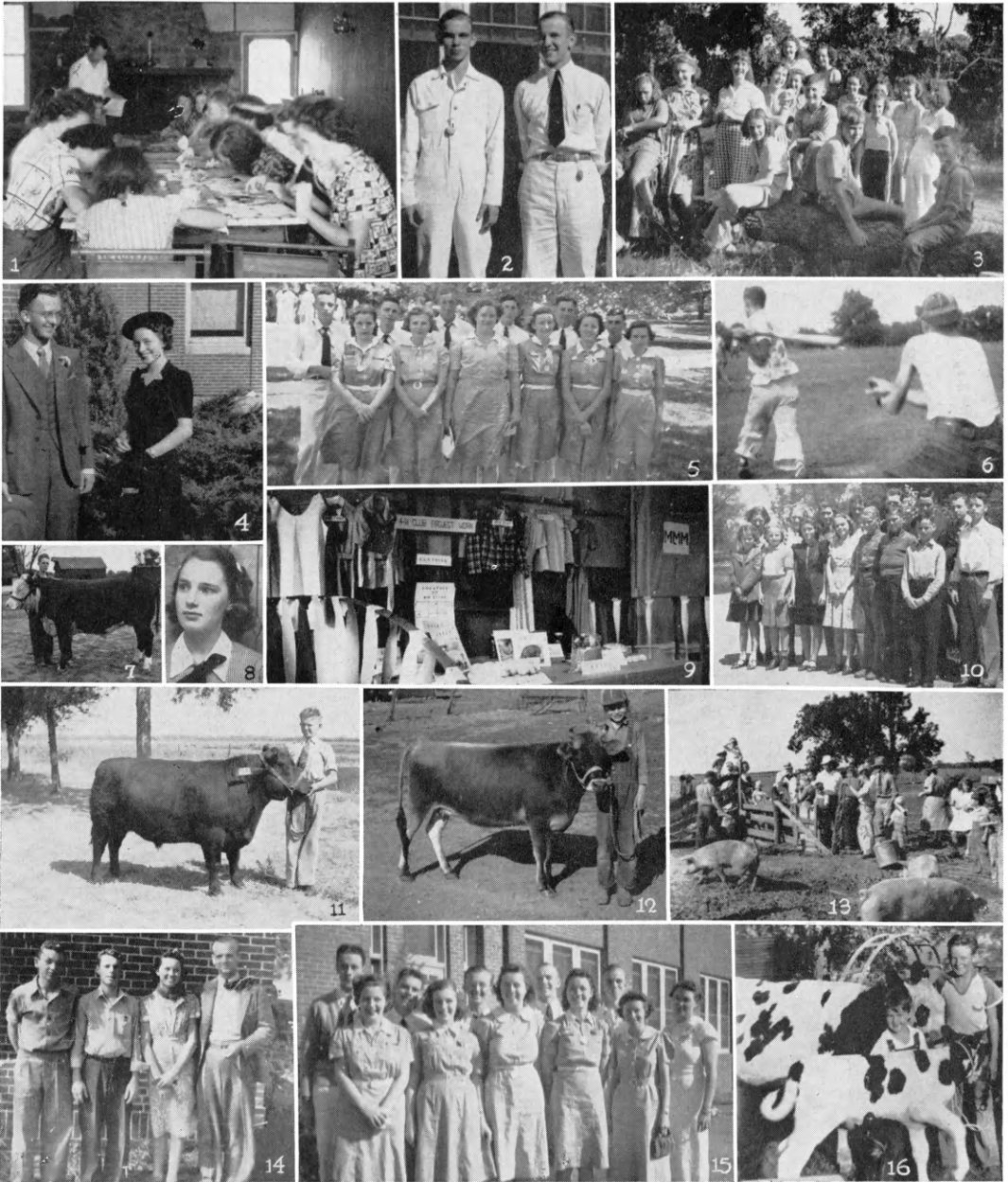

Each year at the annual Round-up, the club offers a \$150 scholarship to an outstanding club member of the state. Last

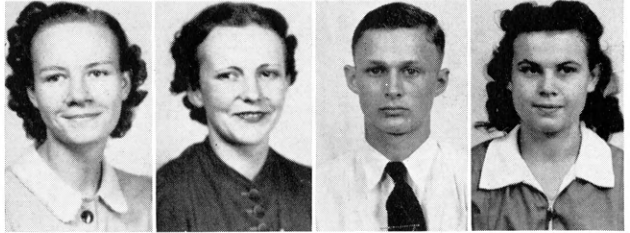

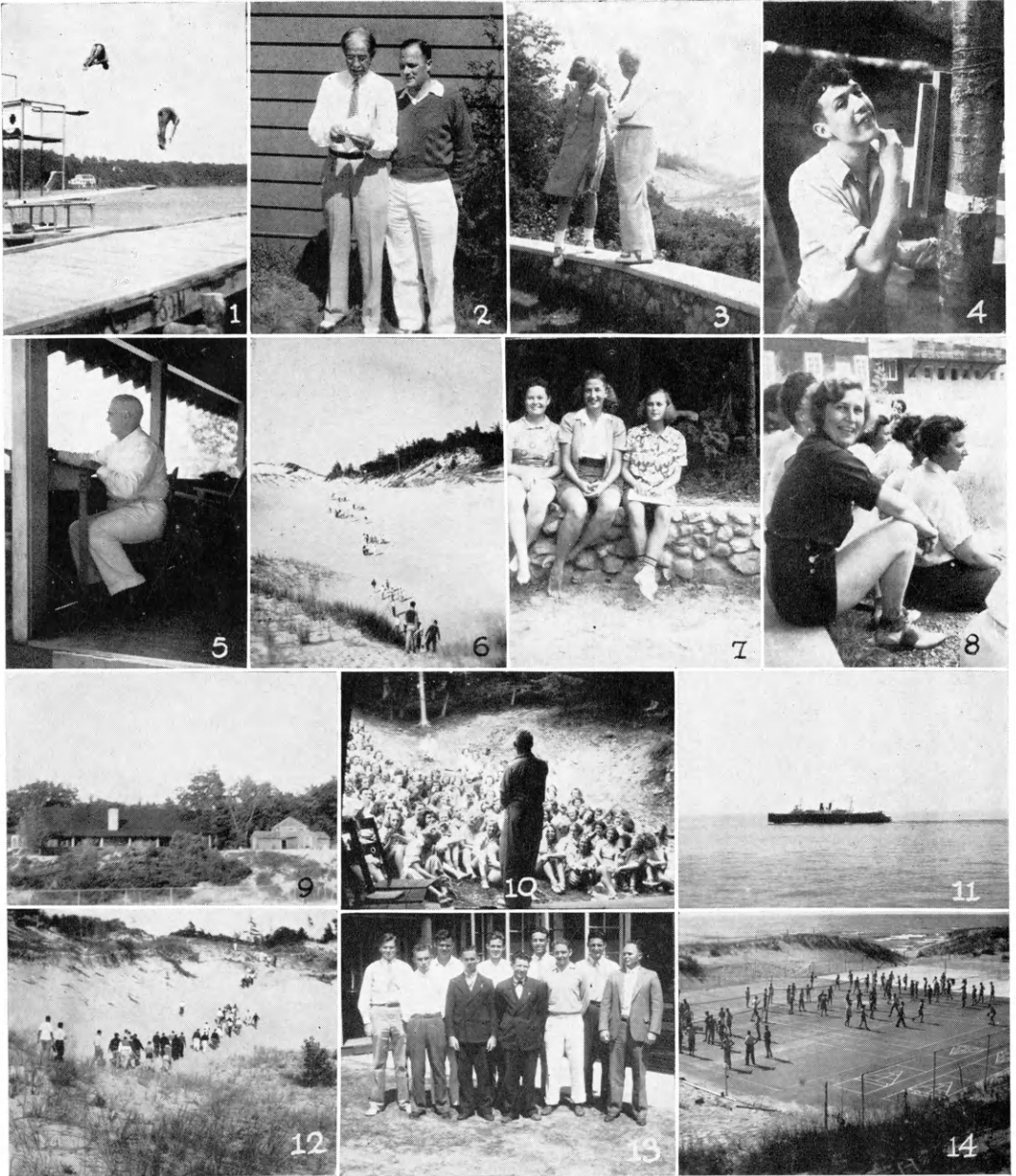

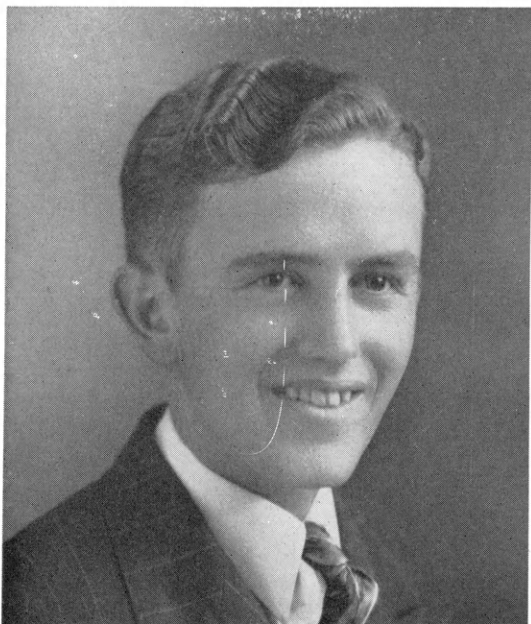

# COLLEGIATE 4-H CLUB



One of the most popular and important organizations on the Kansas State College campus is the Collegiate 4-H Club. This club is open to former 4-H Club members and to those who are interested in the 4-H Club movement. This year the total membership in the club was 400 members, an increase over all other years. Two meetings are held each month and four parties are given each semester for the members, including a dinner dance in the fall and a special spring party in April.

The Collegiate 4-H Club was organized in December, 1927, with about sixty members. Since then the club has entered into various activities. Some of these include the publishing of the WHO'S WHOOT, the maintenance of a student loan fund, sponsoring the annual Kansas Rural Life Association Conference, assisting at Round-up, and conducting 4-H radio programs from station KSAC.

Other equipment includes an office desk, typewriter, paper cutter, etc.

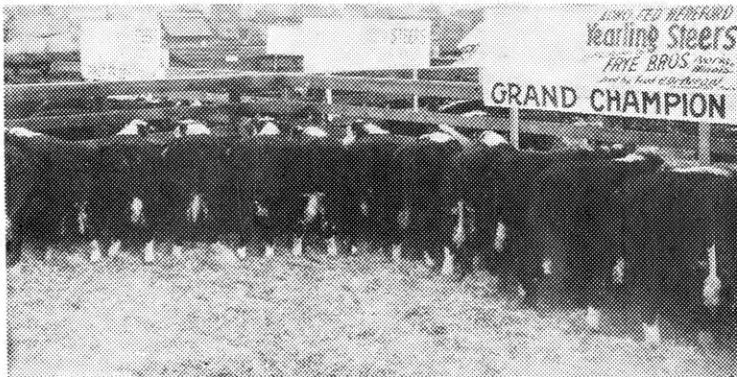

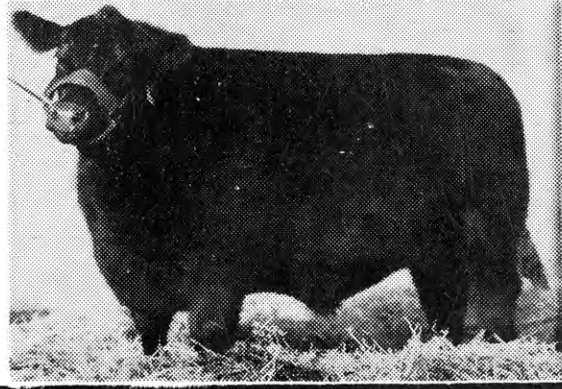
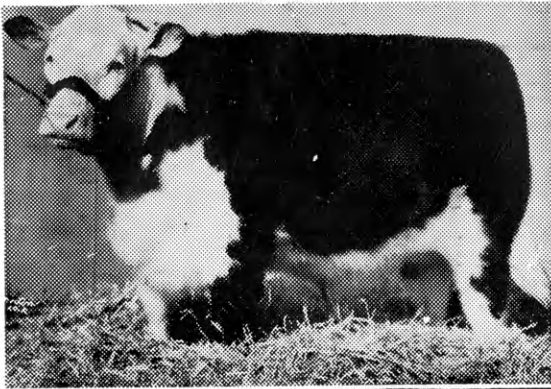
