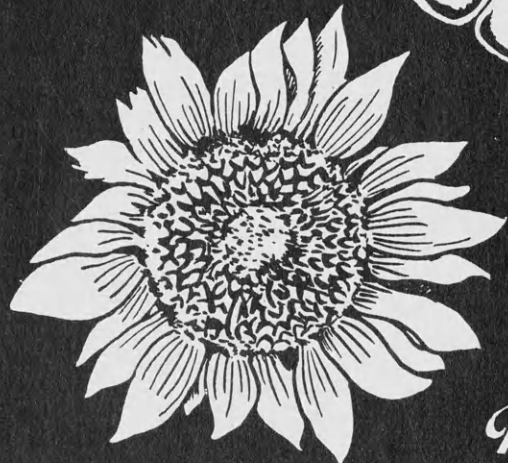
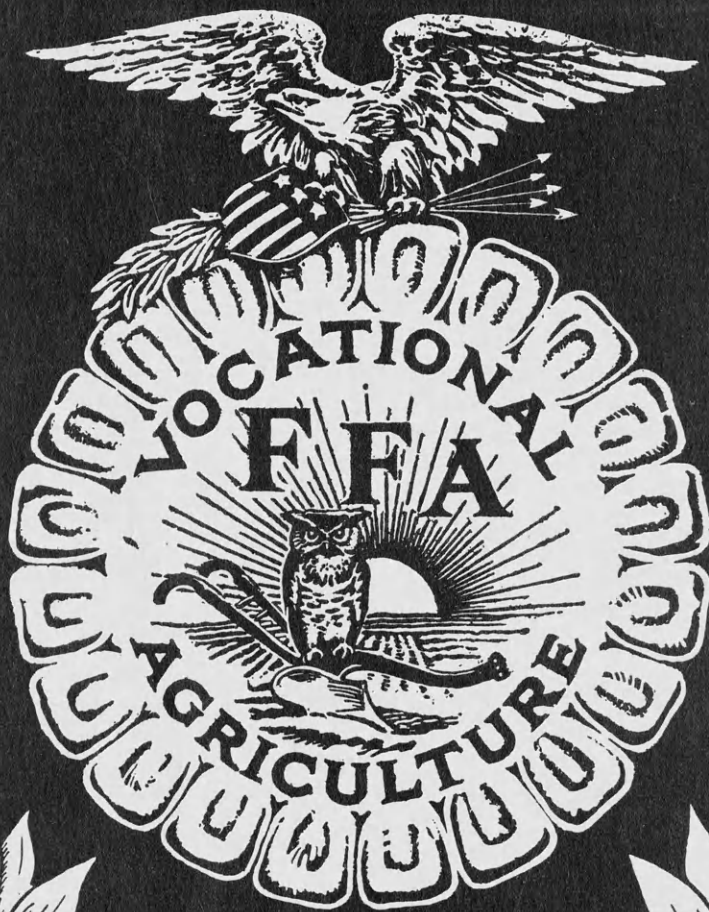

Review of the 37th State FFA Convention
April 25-27, 1965

The State FFA officers are to be complimented for their conscientious effort in making the State Convention a success. Practices started Friday evening, April 23, and continued through Saturday and Saturday evening. The State FFA officers met as a nominating committee throughout the afternoon on Sunday, April 25, and interviewed 21 State officer candidates. Ten Future Farmers were selected by this committee to be placed on the nominating ballot. The vice president of KVATA served as advisor member of the nominating committee.

The Parliamentary Procedure contest was held at 3:00 p. m., Sunday afternoon with 11 chapters participating. Judges for the contest were Les Olson, Waterville State Bank, Vernon Barnes, debate coach, Manhattan High School, and David Mugler, Assistant Dean of Instruction, Kansas State University. The four high teams chosen were: Beloit, Caney, Marion and Winfield.

The Vesper Service was enjoyed by 700 FFA and advisors in the Municipal Auditorium in downtown Manhattan. Musical numbers were presented by the Chapman FFA ensemble under the direction of Don Miller, and the Goessel FFA quartet.

A new film "The Challenge. . . . Leadership, The Answer The Future Farmers of America", was shown for the first time in Kansas.

Larry Prewitt, Thayer, Missouri, National Vice President of FFA, Central Region, attended the entire Con-

vention. He assisted with the nominating committee, brought greetings to the official first session, and made a major address during the Monday evening session of the Convention. Larry also discussed the National Foundation of FFA. His pleasing personality won him many friends in the Kansas Association.

Highlight speakers of the 37th Annual State FFA Convention were: Jerry Litton, Choralias Ranch, and former National Secretary of FFA; Frank Davis, President of Kansas Young Farmers of America; Mayor Richard Rogers, Manhattan; James Jeffry, Executive Secretary, Fellowship Christian Athletes; Connie Bestwick, President of the Kansas Association of FHA.

Mr. Bill Cox, Special Representative of the Santa Fe Railway, presented the annual contribution from that organization. Charles Manke presented the Union Pacific scholarships; J. D. Lynd, Executive Secretary of the Kansas Co-op Council, presented the Cooperative Activities award and the Co-op Quiz Award.

Professor James Hershberger, Director, Varsity Glee Club, Kansas State University, directed the 57 member State FFA Chorus. Members practiced throughout the day on Monday and presented a very inspiring 30-minute concert immediately preceding the Monday evening session.

HIGHLIGHTS OF THE KANSAS ASSOCIATION OF FFA FOR 1964-65

1. Myron Schmidt of the Goessel FFA Chapter was declared Star Farmer of Kansas for 1965.
2. The Fort Scott FFA Chapter received the Certificate of Merit from the National Safety Council.
3. Seven Kansas Future Farmers were awarded the American Farmer Degree at the 37th National FFA Convention in 1964.
4. Nine Kansas FFA members participated in the 1964 National FFA Band.
5. The Kansas Association has an active FFA membership of 6695 as of May 1, 1965.
6. There were 184 active FFA chapters in good standing with the State Association in 1964-65.
7. The Fifth Annual State FFA Camp was held at Rock Springs Ranch in August of 1964. Approximately 250 members participated.
8. Thirteen leaders in Kansas agriculture were received into the State Association as Honorary State Farmers.
9. The Fourth State FFA Chorus performed during the State FFA Convention. Fifty-seven FFA members took part.
10. Fifty-two large multicolored billboard signs were placed throughout the State to help advertise National FFA Week.
11. One hundred thirty-two Chapter Farmers from 80 local chapters were raised to the State Farmer Degree at the 37th State FFA Convention.
12. The State FFA officers made their second good will tour on February 2, 3 and 4. They visited Governor Avery's office to be present for the signing of the proclamation designating February 20-27 as FFA Week in Kansas. They visited Santa Fe Railway offices, Kansas Co-op Council, WIBW, Hesston Manufacturing Company, Federal Land Bank of Wichita, and the Kansas Farm Bureau in Manhattan.
13. Beloit FFA Chapter won first place in the second State Parliamentary Procedure Contest held at the State Convention.
14. Star Farmer of Kansas is Myron Schmidt, Goessel FFA Chapter. He received a check for \$200 from Robert Randle, Director, Association Relations, The Federal Land Bank of Wichita.
15. Richard Stewart of the Sears-Roebuck Foundation presented a check to the Kansas Association for assistance in the Sears Range Ewe Program, and to Young Farmers' work in Kansas.
16. Roger Barr, Manhattan senior, was named President of the Kansas Future Farmers of America for the year 1965-66.

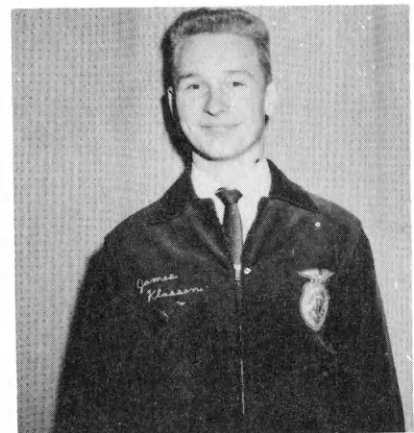

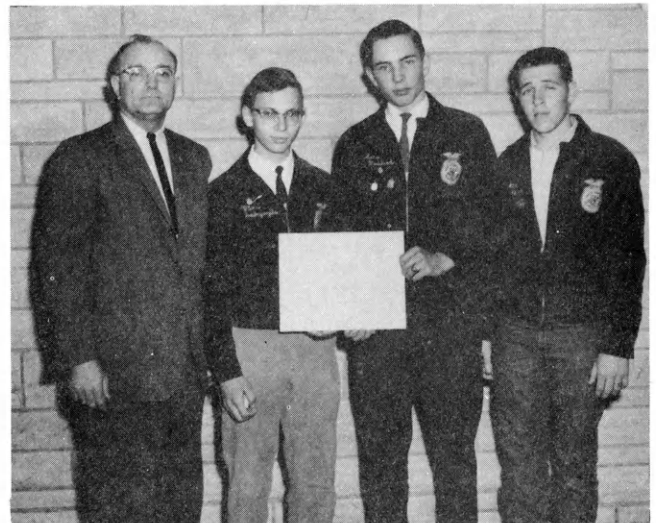

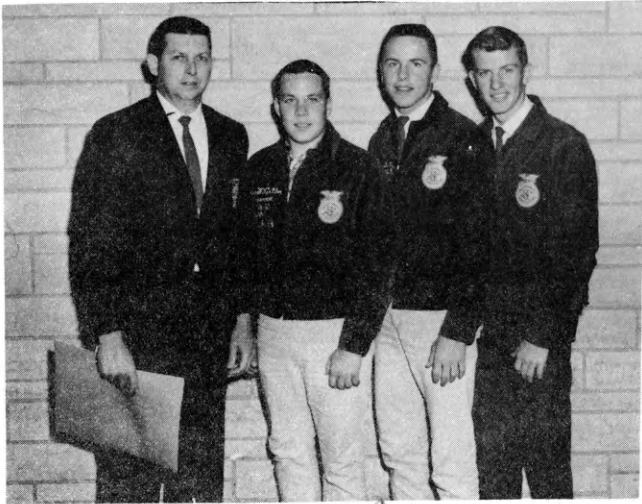

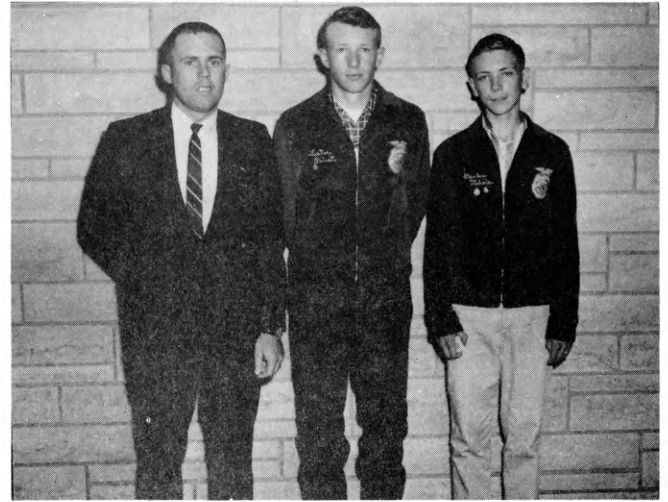

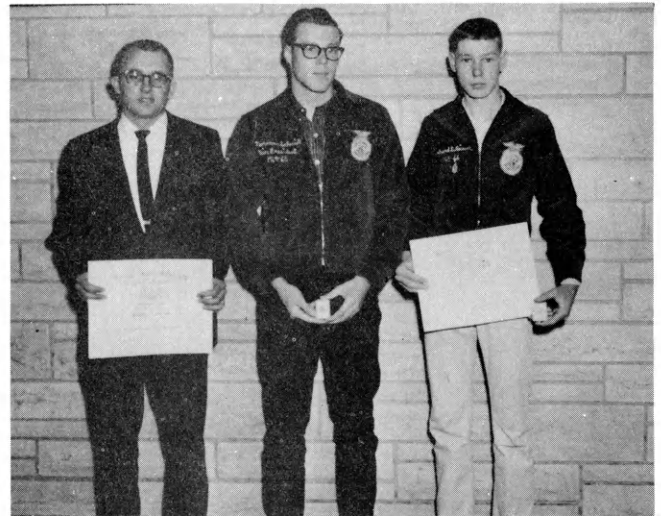

1965 CHAPTER AWARDS

The Kansas Association has continued to use the State Gold Emblem, the Superior, and the Standard Chapter awards in recognizing the merit of local FFA chapter programs.

The Kansas Gold Emblem chapters were selected from the chapters that ranked in the Superior Division of the National Chapter Awards Program. Each chapter which receives the Superior Award for the first time will receive a plaque from the National FFA Foundation. A chapter receiving either the Standard or Superior award will receive a smaller plastic classification plate for attachment to their plaques. Kansas Gold Emblem chapters receive a State certificate.

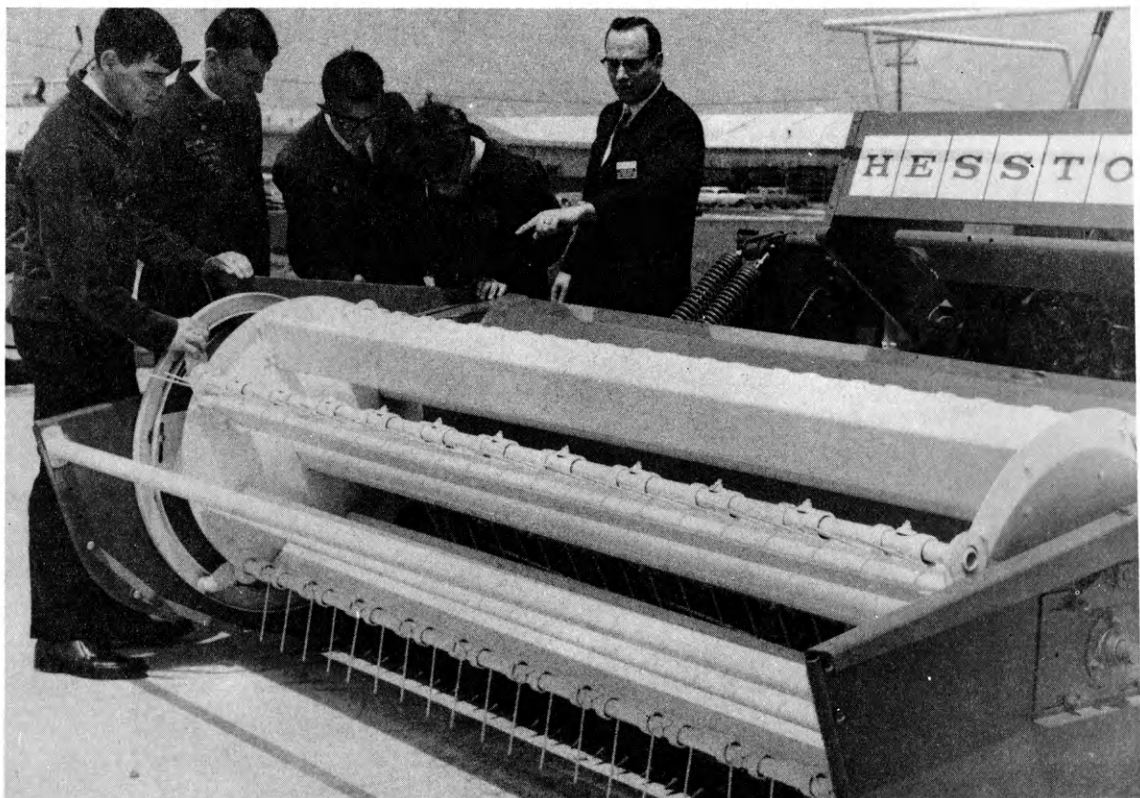

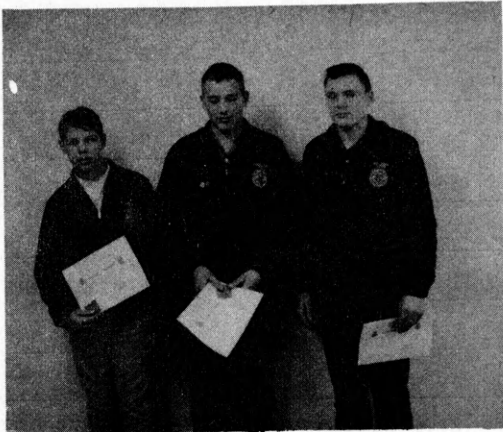
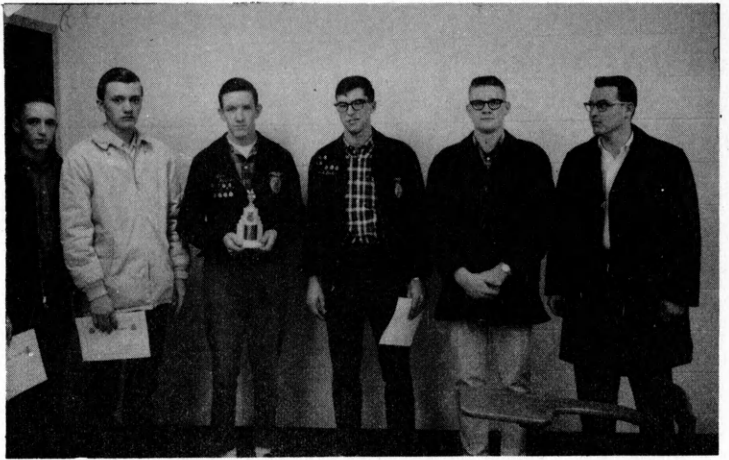

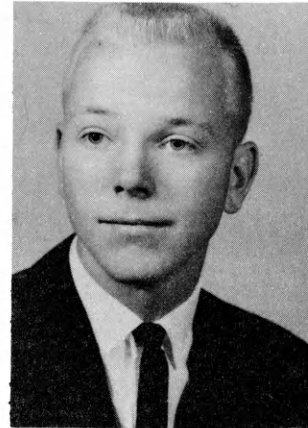


Crawford Hay Edie
