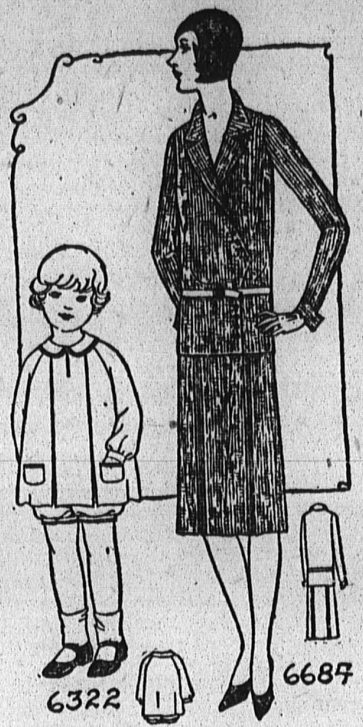

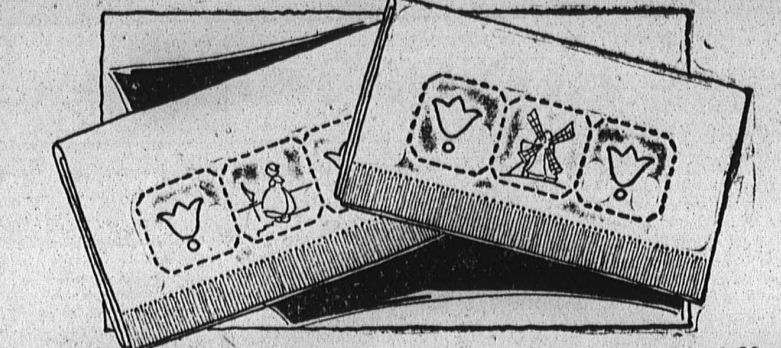

The report of the Audit was read by Mr. Creitz of the Auditing Dept. Mr. Seamans is the representative of you people who have helped to make this fine showing possible.

To be privileged to attend my eleventh annual Kansas Farmers Union state convention is indeed a pleasure and I am especially glad of the opportunity to appear at this time and bring a short message from the young men of the Kansas Farmers Union state-wide activities...

From a very humble beginning with less than eight thousand dollars paid up capital stock and a small volume of business, this enterprise has grown to a place where it is now classed among the largest centralized-silver creamery and egg packing plants in the middle west.

In addition to these cash returns, we cannot help but feel that the existence of the organization, if nothing more, has had some part in bringing about the condition wherein not only members and patrons of this organization but the dairy producers throughout Kansas are getting a tangible dividend in the form of higher prices for their butterfat on delivery than they received formerly.

The fact that the prevailing butterfat price to producers is at least three cents higher in relation to the Chicago market than it was in 1926 is substantiated by the following comparison of figures taken from the records of the Association and the official daily market bulletins:

Average price paid producers for butterfat: 1926, 35.7; 1927, 39.1; 1928, 41.9; 1929 (Jan. 1 to Sept. 30) 41.4. Average Chicago standards butter market: 1926, 41.6; 1927, 42.2; 1928, 45.4; 1929 (Jan. 1 to Sept. 30) 44.2.

Not all these problems have been mastered to the satisfaction of your servants. Neither have they been dealt with in ways that always rendered complete satisfaction to others concerned but they have been considered in the spirit of fairness and dealt with by honest effort.

New developments in the industry and changes in both the procurement and distribution of products have presented perplexities. On the procurement side has come the new cream buying method; the purchase of eggs on a graded basis; and the gathering of products by trucks.

Not only do both the butter and egg departments show a fair profit on operations for the first nine-months period of the current year but the finances are in the best shape in the history of the organization; Equipment valued at upwards of fifty thousand dollars is free from encumbrance. Discounts are being taken on all purchases. All loans for operating capital have been retired which leaves the only obligation to the stockholders.

With these things a matter of fact, it would seem that the surface has scarcely been scratched for co-operative endeavor in these lines. Many people view Kansas as a great wheat state, as important in the production of corn, ranking high in the live stock industry but overlook its place in the production of dairy and poultry products.

I can think of nothing that has aided more in developing Kansas to the great agricultural state it is today than the dairy and poultry industries and nothing that affords better opportunities for development in the future.

With the rapid gain in population in the U. S. in addition to the constant increase per capita consumption of both dairy and poultry products and the favorable condition for the production of these products, it would seem that Kansas is destined to a larger place in both the dairy and poultry industries. These facts tend to lend encouragement; however, they are somewhat overshadowed by the existing conditions wherein a great portion—altogether too great a portion—of these products are shipped to points outside of Kansas for market preparation thus assisting in the development of out-of-state enterprises and with the result that Kansas producers fail to get proper recognition.
