What To Expect From a Kansas Spring?

Easter Eggs Straight From The Hen

Parents preparing for the messy job of Easter-egg coloring, throw away your dye. There is a breed of

chicken that will do the job for you. These novelty chickens are called Araucanas, according to Dr. F.E. Cunningham, associate professor of poultry products at Kansas State University, Manhattan.

Cunningham has worked with the chickens and their eggs extensively in doing protein analysis and other testing of the egg contents.

"The colors of the eggs we get are as varied as the bird's plumage," said Cunningham of the multi-colored Araucanas' eggs. Most of the eggs produced are a light blue, but others range in color from an olive or blue green to pink to a rusty

brown color.

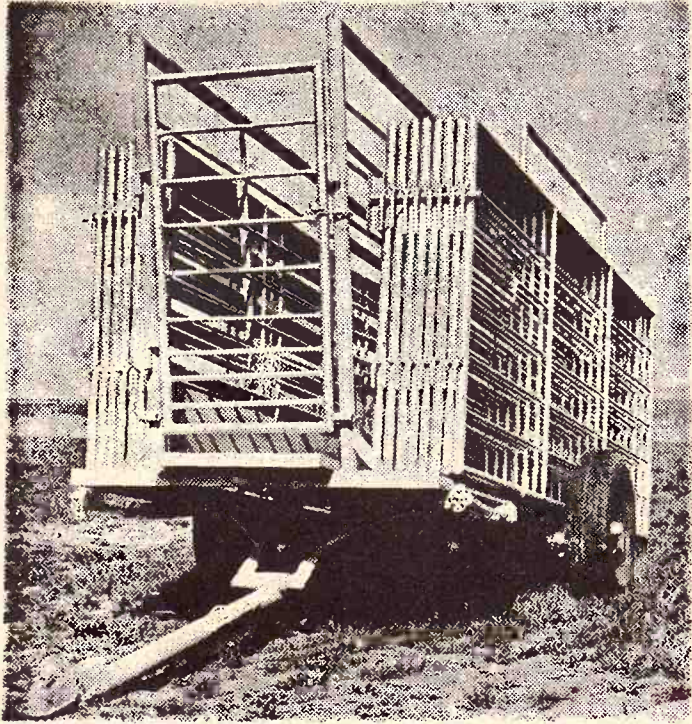
Each egg is uniformly colored, but individual chickens may lay many different colored eggs. "There is no way to predict, on the basis of plumage or previous eggs, what the egg colors from a specific hen will be," he explained.

The color of the eggs occurs because of the presence of pigments in the reproductive tract of the Araucanas hen. Usually eggs are white or brown, due to lack of pigment or brown pigment in the tract. Araucanas have many colors of pigment, so therefore lay many colors of eggs.

The details of the origin of the Araucanas breed are obscure, Cunningham said. First reports of the chickens came from sailors returning on the Clipper ships from South America 75 to 100 years ago. Some sources trace the birds' origin to the Golfo de Arauco; however, others claim the birds were discovered in the interior jungles of South America in 1914.

"These 'Easter egg chickens' are good layers and most of their eggs are large sized," Cunningham said. "Furthermore, they are edible and, except for shell color, are no different than any other kind of hen egg. Those qualities, in addition to their bright plumage and the unusual eggs they produce, make them a favorite of breeders and poultry showmen."

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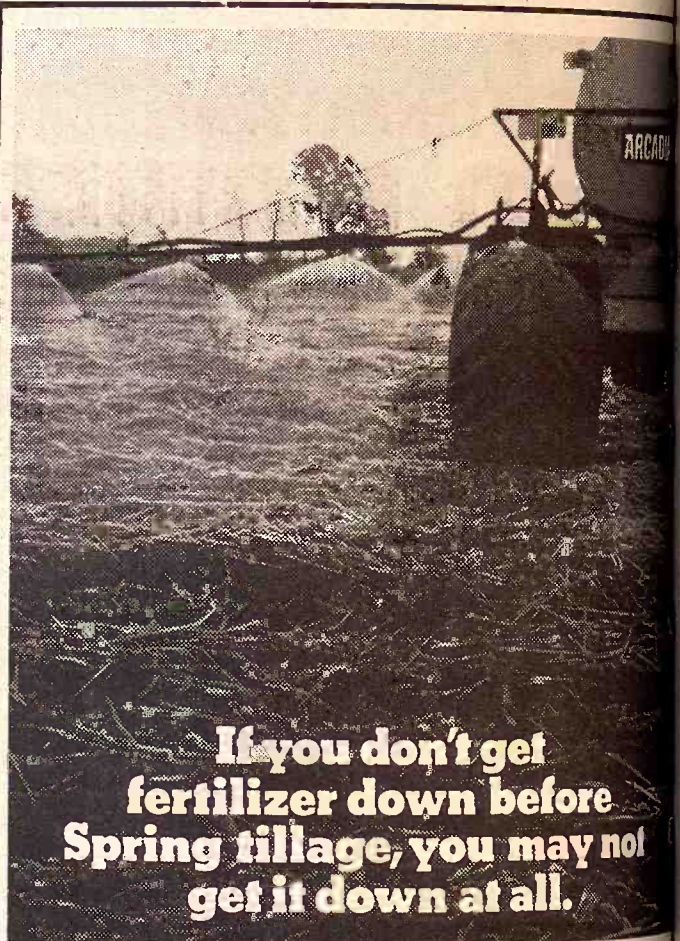
McPHERSON SCOUT TROOP HAS BOYS AND GIRLS

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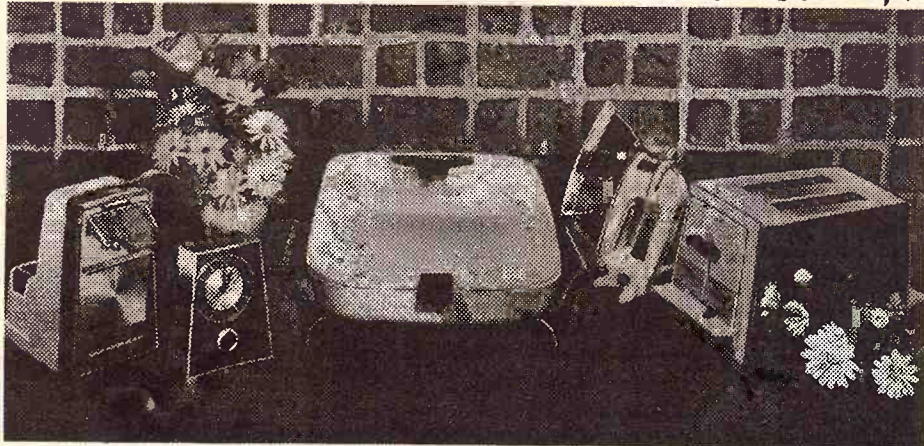
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Pay-As-You-Go For Overtime Parking Tickets?

Junction City — Payment of parking tickets here will remain on a pay-as-you-go basis despite a persuasive argument for a drawing account system by a woman apparently having trouble keeping track of her tickets.

Junction City police received a letter and a 5-dollar bill. The note said:

"I'm not criminally inclined, but all the red tape, yellow tickets, pennies, nickels and quarters add up to more than I can keep straight. Therefore, please credit five dollars to my account and deduct these and future tickets at 25 cents each. I would appreciate knowing when my account runs low."

The department deducted \$2.25 for two one-dollar notices for non-payment of tickets and 25 cents for one ticket not overdue, then refunded the \$2.75

citing Hardin's statement that last year 47.7 per cent of all disposable farm income came from nonfarm sources.

Hardin said that per capita farm income rose by \$200 dollars last year.

"The fact is that 1970 was in my view a disastrous year for the farmers," Proxmire said. He said total farm income declined from \$16.5 billion in the year's first quarter to only \$14.9 billion in the last.

At the same time, he said, income per farm inclined from \$5,200 to \$4,580. He said this is the lowest since 1965 and represents an income of only \$90 a week.

Hardin insisted that income derived from nonfarm sources must be considered also.

"These dollars are as useful in buying goods and services as those earned from farming operations," he said.

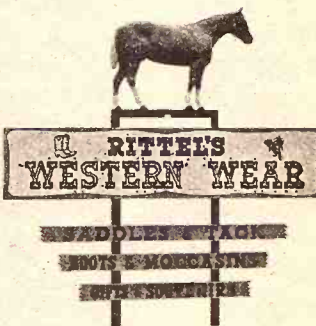
But Proxmire said difficulties arise when farmers are expected to get half or more of their income off the farm and still maintain quality and quantity in production.

Half Of Farmer's Income From Non Farm Sources

Secretary of Agriculture Clifford M. Hardin has told senators that farmers received nearly half their income last year from nonfarm sources. One senator told Hardin that is just evidence farmers are in a desperate economic plight.

Appearing before the Senate Appropriations Committee to explain his department's \$8.5 billion budget request for fiscal 1972, Hardin said great strides are being made to feed the hungry, inspect meat and poultry, improve the environment and improve rural life.

But Sen. William Proxmire, D-Wis., challenged the effectiveness of efforts to aid the farm economy,

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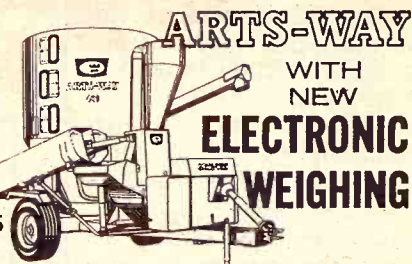
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Make Their Own Tornado In A Wind Tunnel

Although tornado season doesn't usually start in Kansas for a few more weeks, researchers have been "growing" them on the University of Kansas campus for several months. The creation of tornado funnels in the laboratory is part of a three-year study on the causes and actions of tornados.

With the help of a wind tunnel in aerospace engineering, Prof. Joe Eagleman in meteorology and his co-workers have isolated some answers that may help save lives during tornados of the future.

Prof. Joe P. Eagleman, a meteorologist, has headed the research. Working with him on the interdisciplinary study are Professors Vincent U. Muirhead, aerospace engineer, and Dr. Nicholas Willems, civil engineer.

"We have completed a large research report for the U.S. government, the sponsor of our research, describing our findings during the past three years," Eagleman reported.

"We know that a majority of tornados come from the southwest or west. Our study of many of them, including the one in 1966 in Topeka, indicates that the safest place during a storm coming from these directions is in the northeast or

north part of the house.

"If the approach direction of the tornado is uncertain, then choose the central part of the house. If you can get to the basement or storm cellar, that's best. If you can't, then a small bathroom or closet on the first floor is next best. Always stay on the first floor of the house if there is no basement. Don't go upstairs.

"House trailers are particularly vulnerable to tornado damage. Therefore, trailer courts should be required to provide at least a basement shelter for residents."

Research on the tornados eventually may help generate new building codes, the professors said.

Eagleman hopes their research will make it possible to predict when

a thunderstorm suddenly will turn into a spawning ground for tornados.

"To create a tornado, a storm area must have warm, moist air that is suddenly confronted with a cold front which lifts the moist air up to the jet stream," he said. "The interaction with these strong winds causes a double vortex to develop. Muirhead has been instrumental in simulating these conditions in the aerospace engineering laboratory with the help of a wind tunnel. By using a strong updraft and rotating winds, we can create an 8-foot funnel that we can study and test."

They plan to continue research on severe storms, but many of the mysteries of that sudden devastating wind coming from nowhere have been solved.

Eagleman said, "There really isn't any such thing as a 'tornado alley.' Tornados occur all over the United States, although the Midwest does have a greater number. It's just that with better communication systems, we're hearing more of

them than we used to. Therefore, you'll hear of them in every state."

The recent tornado in the South probably caused so many deaths because of the smaller number of basements and storm cellars, he said.

This storm occurred in daylight although tornados are more common at night in the South because the southern air warms up earlier due to the influence of the Gulf, he added.

"In Kansas, the mornings are generally cooler, so it is late afternoon or evening before we get enough warm, moist air that can be lifted by a cool front to create tornado conditions," he said.

Carl Latimer, the coordinator, said that fewer than 1,000 minority workers have been placed in training programs since the agreement was signed in January 1970. The Labor department was asked to review the agreement.

"The Chicago plan is failing. Going back to the streets is the only alternative," Latimer said.

The plan was written by representatives of Mayor Richard Daley's office, building unions, building contractors and minority groups after discussions at construction sites in the summer of 1969. Blacks and other minorities demanded more skilled construction jobs.

The act requires that 30 days written notice of service termination be given which required the posting

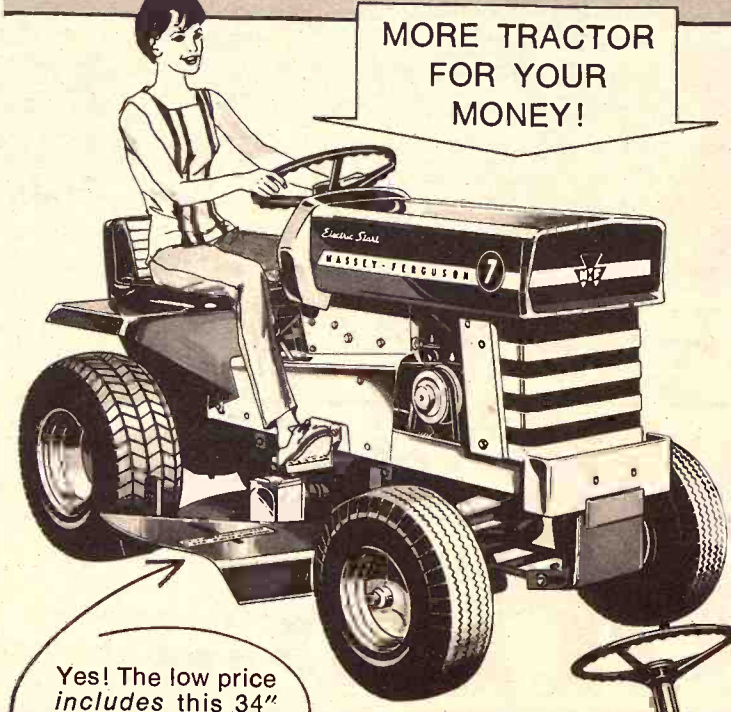

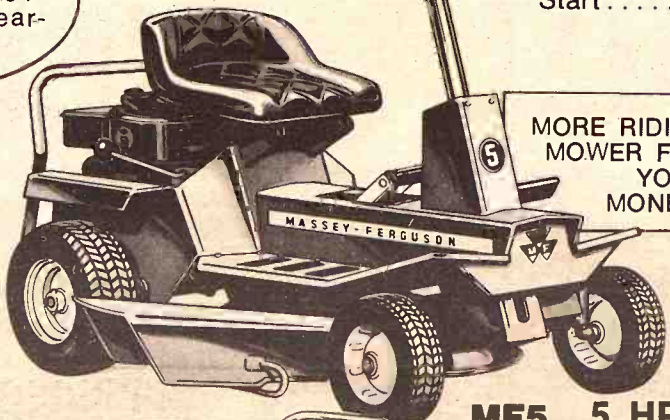

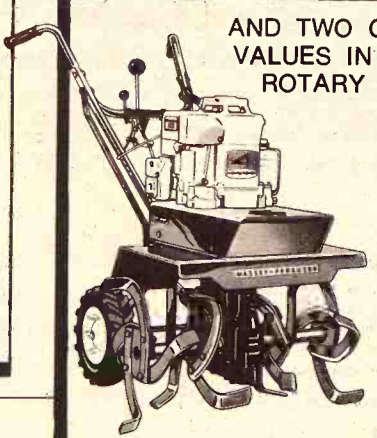

**Kansas Over
Average In Count
Of Older Persons**

Kansas exceeds the national average in the percentage of older persons in its population.

Kansas has 11.8 per cent of persons 65 years of age or older compared with the national average of 9.9 per cent. Older persons are concentrated more heavily in the west North-Central states than in any other subregional grouping.

The census Bureau noted that in 1960 the figure for Kansas was 240,269 or 11 per cent, and in 1970 it was 266,201 or 11.8 per cent of the state's entire population.

The increases in Kansas are attributed to longevity of residents of the state rather than a migration of retirees to the area. Statistics in the past have shown that younger persons tend to leave rural areas and small towns while the older residents stay. Although the elderly do have financial and medical problems, a bright side of the statistics indicate that persons in the Mid-West have a longer life span.

Florida continues to live up to its name as the traditional land of promise for retirees and pensioners, the Census Bureau said, by having the higher proportion of older persons in its population of all the states, 14.5 per cent. There the increase is due to migration. The total was 985,690 last year compared with 553,129 in 1960.

Iowa and Nebraska tie for second with 12.4 per cent, Arkansas, third,

Higher Fees For National Parks

The Interior department, reportedly under pressure by the Office of Management and Budget, recommended replacing the

Golden Eagle group ticket to national parks with a potentially more costly system of individual fees.

The department, in a report to Congress, said the proposed fees would probably produce less revenue on a short run basis than the Golden Eagle fee but would bring in

more money overall if extended to all public lands, some of which are now free.

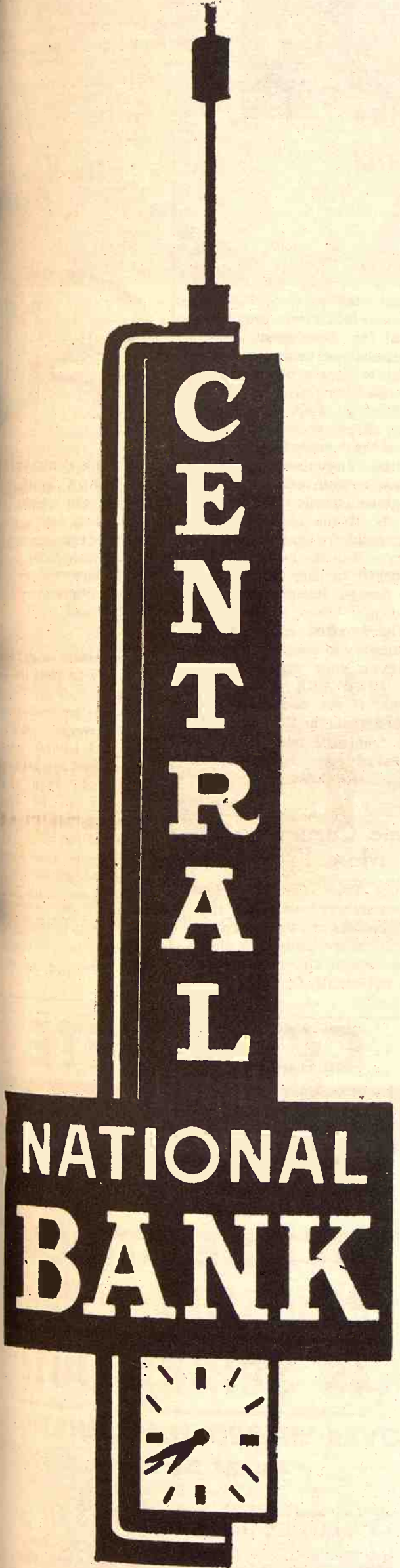
It admitted, however, the proposed fees may curtail park use by retired people with fixed incomes.

The report said some federal agencies in charge of the land wanted to keep the Golden Eagle plan with modifications but federal officials interested in maximizing revenue supported the individual fee plan.

Administration sources said Interior experts thought a \$3 fee a person would be feasible but, under pressure from the Office of Management and Budget, recommended a \$4 fee for each visitor above the age of 16.

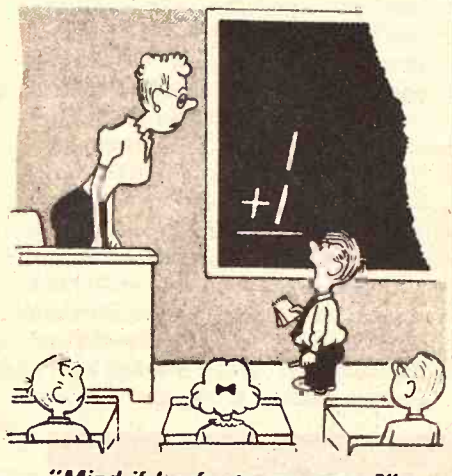
The \$3 fee would average about the same as the present Golden Eagle for many families but the \$4 fee would be more costly. Golden Eagle permits year-round entrance to national parks and recreation areas for a carload of people for \$10.

No Precedent For Linn Co. School District Which Might Dissolve Itself

Voters of Unified School District 346 in Linn County decide April 6 whether to dissolve their district.

If they do, they will be the first in Kansas to voluntarily disband and let another school district take over the education of their children. Others have disorganized for the purpose of consolidating with another district, but none ever has disbanded and let the state decide its educational fate.

Seven times in the past four years — since the Kansas Legislature enacted a law under which a school district may vote to disunify — districts have held disunification elections and each time they have failed.

U.S.D. 346 in Linn County, which borders Missouri in east central Kansas, tried it once before, in August 1968, and it failed. Only 752 favored disunification and 1,094 opposed it.

U.S.D. 228 in Franklin County has tried it twice and failed, while U.S.D. 499 in Doniphan County, 283 in Elk County and 335 in Jackson County have each tried once and lost.

The law provides that voters of a unified school district may hold an election to disunify. If disunification is approved, the State Department of Education has the responsibility to attach the district to one or more adjacent districts.

The state board doesn't decide where the students of the disunified district will go to school. That decision is up to the districts to which the disunified district is attached.

The receiving district also will decide whether to continue operating schools within the disunified district or close any or all of them and bus the students into the attached district.

Since no district has yet voted to disorganize under the law, the state department has no firm ground

rules on how it will go about deciding which district to attach U.S.D. 346 to in event the April 6 vote favors disunification.

George Keith, the state department's director of school district organization, said the state probably will have hearings in the district to be disorganized to learn what the people want to do. The state also will confer with officials of the surrounding districts to get opinions from them as to which might want to have the disunified district attached to them.

Central Kansas Measures Wheat Mosaic Damage

Soil-borne mosaic, a costly wheat disease, is now appearing in Central and Eastern Kansas wheat fields.

The disease shows up as yellow or bronze colored areas that tend to be round, explains Claude King, extension plant pathologist at Kansas State University.

Soil-borne mosaic first appeared in eastern Kansas in the late 1960s and has spread westward through much of central Kansas. Today it is most prevalent in southern Kansas.

Jack Barnes, extension agricultural agent in Harvey County, reports 20 per cent of his county's wheat acreage suffered from soil-borne mosaic in 1969 and 1970.

Small amounts of the disease have been located as far west as Kinsley and Smith Center.

Soil-borne mosaic is a virus that stays in soil regardless of crop rotation, King notes. Scientists believe it survives in a soil fungus, scientifically named *Polymyxa graminis*, during the time of the year when wheat is not in the field.

The disease is spread in fields by soil movement by farm machinery and water. There seems to be no pattern as to where the disease first appears in a field.

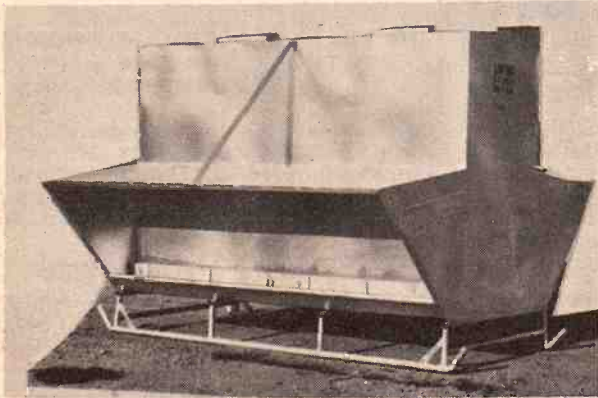
"It is possible that birds carrying mud on their feet transmit the virus to new locations," King explains.

The cost of soil-borne mosaic in reduced wheat yields has averaged \$1 million per year in recent years.

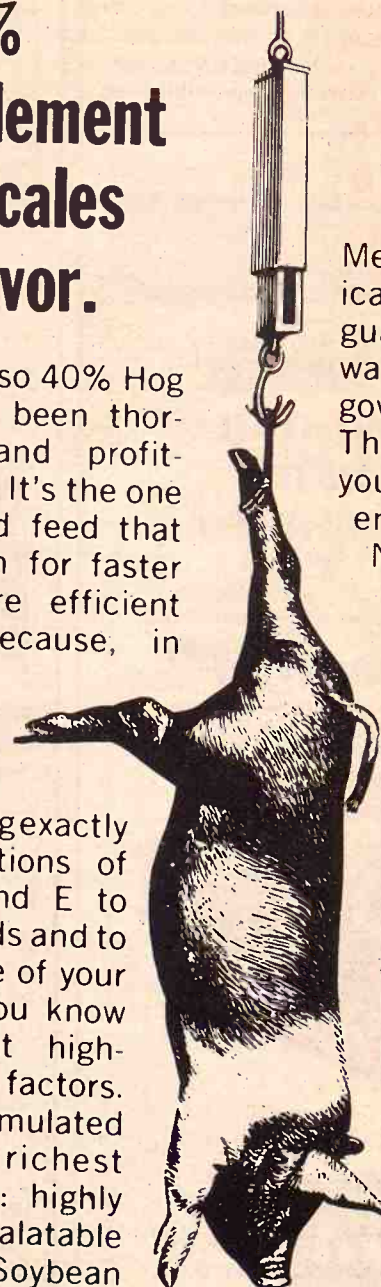
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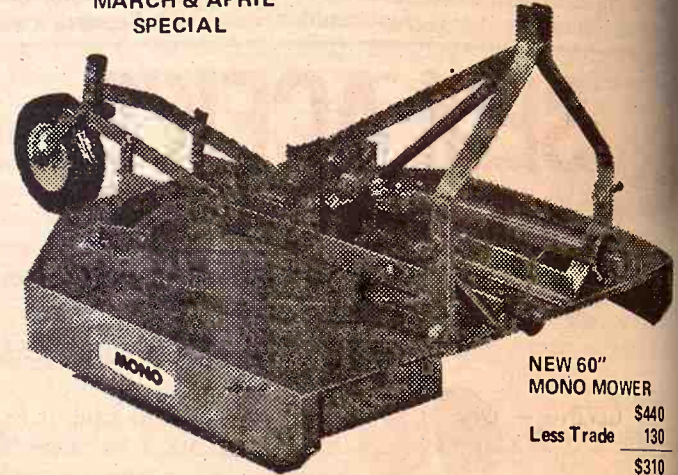

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Might Delay Farm Land Revaluation

An order from the state property valuation director which would affect farmland tax values in 95 counties might be rescinded for a year if the Legislature told him to study the problem for a year.

That's what director Ronald Dwyer told the Senate Assessment and Taxation Committee last week. Dwyer said he could see merit in rescinding the order on his own initiative if a "majority of the Legislature agreed to have an interim committee study all ramifications of the directive."

Dwyer had sent a directive in late March to county officials, instructing them to use a new set of land valuations for 11 types of agriculture lands.

He explained to the committee he first divided the state into nine districts which have homogeneous characteristics.

For each type of farmland, ranging from irrigated to wasteland, in each district, he arrived at a median valuation based on the opinions of the assessment officials as to what was fair market value in their counties.

"Our valuation," Dwyer said, "is 30 per cent of their opinion of fair market value."

Dwyer said he issued the directive, he believed it was the responsibility of the director to equalize property in the state to the best of his ability. This is supported, he said, by court and statutory mandates.

Sen. Robert F. Bennett, R-Prairie Village, raised the question of how the Legislature could, by resolution, tell Dwyer not to do something "which by statute we told you to do."

His question was unanswered. Dwyer said he would be willing to work with the committee with the hope of proposing some legislation next year that would bring about equalization.

"We have to get an equalization program going and I would be willing to work with them, but I would have to have the assurance from a majority of the Legislature that they would really get to all the nuts and bolts of this thing," Dwyer said.

The plan has been in the making for about a year. He said he mentioned the department's work on it at a meeting of the County Commissioners Association in Wichita last year.

He said it had been his plan to discuss his proposal with county officials before issuing the order and that he had scheduled such meetings "but circumstances prevented this." He did not explain the circumstances.

Although there are 12 classes of real property, his directive affects only the different types of farmland.

Dwyer said if he had waited until he could equalize all 12 classes of property, "it probably would never happen."

The director conceded the plan may not be the best possible but called it the best possible plan his department could implement at this time.

His directive, he said, is only the first step along the way toward equalization. A second phase would be to reclassify and regrade land types within these districts. The process may take five years before it is completed, he added.

An argument arose among committee members over whose responsibility it was to set land values. Dwyer maintained it was the county officials responsibility to set

land values. Sen. Lester Arvin, R-Rose Hill, said what Dwyer was saying, then, is that they haven't been doing their jobs.

Asked if there still would be disparity in land values along district boundaries drawn by Dwyer, the director said there would be and that he would attempt to resolve these differences.

Sen. Vincent E. Moore, R-Wichita, said he wondered whether Dwyer's order destroyed the reappraisal work in Sedgwick County, one of the first in the state to comply with the Legislature's mandate of 1963 to equalize property values and assessments. Dwyer didn't com-

ment. Sen. Harold Herd, D-Coldwater, asked if the directive would throw the rural-urban land value ratio out of line. He was told it would depend upon the county. In some cases, Dwyer said, there probably would be a shift in the tax burden from rural to urban property.

Area Ammunition Plant To Close

Production of rocket propellant at Sunflower Army Ammunition Plant near De Soto will be completed by July and the plant's remaining 775 employees will be laid off by January it was announced last week.

Lt. Col. Louis A. Mallia, com-

manding officer, said Friday the plant will then be placed in "layaway status and retained in a standby condition."

The Army said that after July 1 the contract for production of 2.78-inch rocket propellant grains will be awarded solely to the Badger Army Ammunition Plant in Wisconsin.

The closure of Sunflower is the result of winding down the war in Vietnam.

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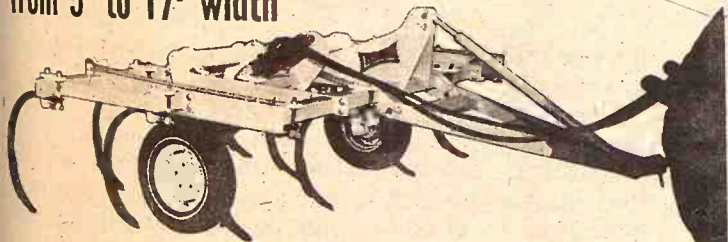
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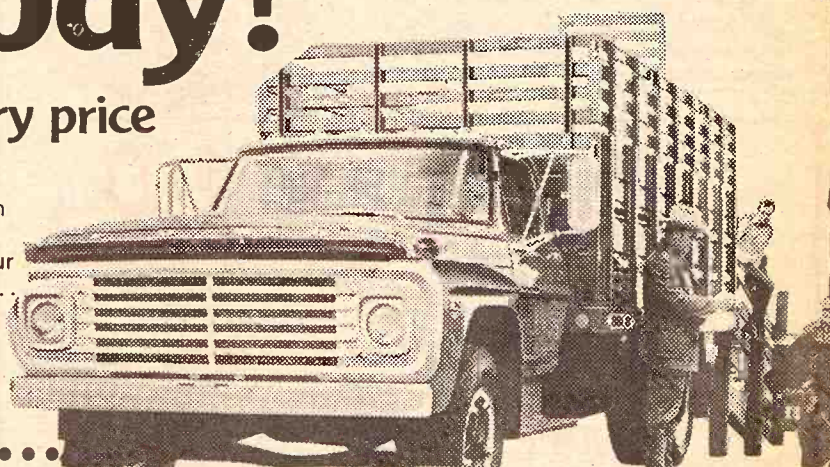

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No Cheer In Price Index

Prices received by Kansas farmers at mid-March 1971 were down slightly from February this year and moderately below March 1970 according to the Kansas Crop and Livestock Reporting Service.

The index of prices received for all farm products was 257 per cent of the 1910-14 base period, compared with 260 in February and 265 in March 1970.

Prices received for hogs dropped considerably from February while beef cattle, wheat, rye and milk were a little lower.

Prices for lambs were up moderately and for several feed grains up slightly.

Compared with a year ago prices for meat animals, chickens and eggs were down, while those for most grains and dairy products were up.

Crop Prices

The crop price index was 163 per cent at mid-March, 1 point below February this year but 16 points above March 1970.

Wheat at mid-March averaged \$1.30 per bushel, 1 cent below a month earlier but 10 cents above a year ago.

Corn brought \$1.34 per bushel, unchanged from the previous month but 21 cents above March the previous year.

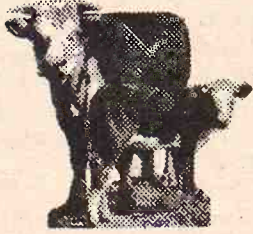
Barley price was 97 cents per bushel, 2 cents above February and 11 cents above a year earlier.

Sorghum grain was worth \$2.06 per cwt., 2 cents more than a month ago and 30 cents above last year.

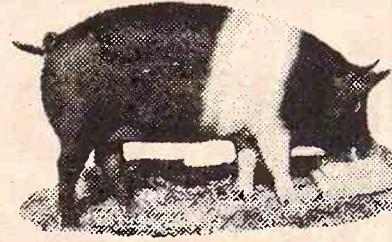
Soybeans averaged \$2.84 per bushel, compared with \$2.82 in February and \$2.32 a year earlier.

Livestock Prices

The livestock and livestock products price index at mid-March was 365 per cent of the 1910-14 base period, compared with 371 the



previous month and 399 the previous year. The meat animal price index was 438 per cent in March, compared with 446 in February and 447 in March 1970.



Hog prices averaged \$16.99 per cwt., \$2.30 below a month earlier and \$8.70 below March last year.

All beef cattle brought \$29.40 per cwt., 10 cents less than a month earlier and 70 cents below March a year ago.

The dairy price index was 344 in March, compared with 347 in

February and 338 a year earlier.

The preliminary wholesale milk price of \$5.30 per cwt. was 10 cents below the previous month but 15 cents above the previous year. Eggs averaged 23 cents per dozen, unchanged from a month ago but 10 cents below last year.

Prices paid by farmers for most supplement and mixed feeds were higher than in March 1970.

United States

The index of prices received by the Nation's farmers for farm products at mid-March was 284 per cent of the 1910-14 base period, unchanged from

mid-February but down 5 points from February 1970. Price changes except up moderately for lambs, and down considerably for hogs.

The index of prices paid by farmers for commodities and services (including interest, taxes, and wages rates) was 403, unchanged from mid-February and 18 points above a year ago.

The parity ratio in March was 70, unchanged from February but down 5 points from March 1970.



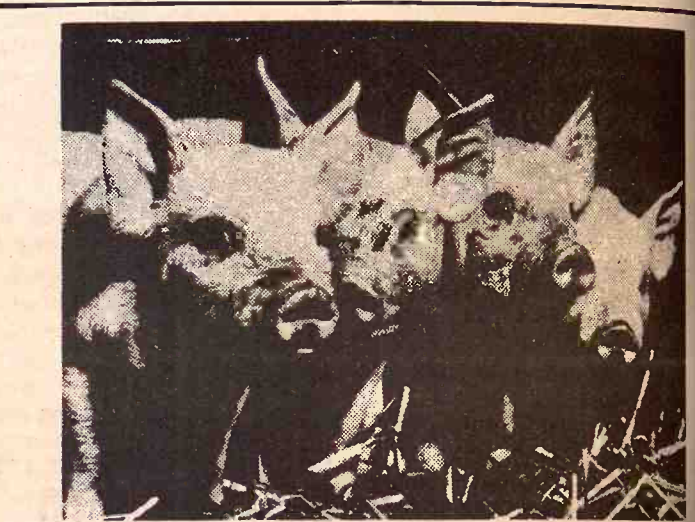

February but down 5 percent in March 1970. Price changes in February were mostly moderate for lambs and considerably for hogs. Index of prices paid by farmers for commodities and services, including interest, taxes, and insurance, was 403, unchanged in February and 18 points above the February 1970 level. The ratio in March was 403, unchanged from February but down 18 points from March 1970.

See A Big Farm Exodus In Europe

The common market's top farm authority predicts that 1.4 million farmers would leave the land in the six member countries as a result of its new agricultural policy. Sicco L. Mansholt, vice-president for agriculture on the executive commission of the European Community, told a news

conference those who would leave the land would include 1.2 million over 55 years old, and 200,000 younger people.

Mansholt spoke following the decision of the EEC Council of Ministers of Agriculture to adopt a four-year program of higher prices and social measures to help small farmers to either quit or improve their farms.

But Mansholt said the measures were still inadequate, and he regretted that the council had rejected proposals for compensating

needy farmers, victims of backward conditions and inflation.

He also told the United States it should be glad that new price increases in the six member countries are not a great deal higher. When prices are raised in the common market, U.S. farm exports must pay higher duties. Higher European prices also encourage European production, cutting down the need for imports.

Campus Building Insurance Costs Not All Explained

The executive officer of the Kansas Board of Regents says the cost of insuring some buildings at state universities and colleges has gone up as much as 700 per cent in the last year for policies providing less coverage.

Max Bickford said it appears to be part of a reevaluation by insurance companies of risks involved in insuring school buildings at all levels.

Bickford told the House Ways and Means Committee he could understand some of the actions of the insurance companies but that other actions were beyond his understanding.

He said he could see why insurance companies were taking a new look at the risk involved in insuring against fire and malicious destruction.

But he said he could not understand why the insurance companies were imposing such a large deductible in insuring against such natural disasters as tornado, wind and hail.

He asked the committee to recommend passage of a bill already approved by the Senate to allow the regents to create a self-insurance fund to cover the deductible loss involved in the insurance coverage which has been written recently.

The regents are required to insure buildings financed through issuance of bonds, such as dormitories, student union buildings, and now, some classroom buildings constructed through issuance of bonds. The state acts as a self-insurer on other college and university buildings.

Opposition to the plan was registered by a representative of Kansas insurance agents.

He said the Kansas Insurance department could change its regulations limiting coverage under a state assigned risk plan to \$500,000 as far as coverage of college and university buildings was concerned.

The committee voted to recommend passage of the bill.

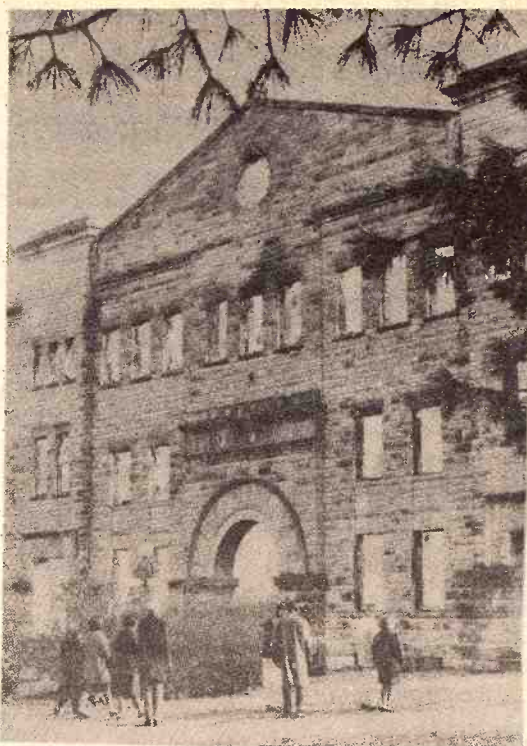

Columbia Basin Hay Country Still Bitter Over August '70 Fires

A strong feeling of suspicion and distrust — of neighbor against neighbor, like the aftermath of an Old West range war — pervades the community of Ephrata, Washington, and others in the farm country of the Northwest.

The feeling stems from a fiery night — August 7 of last year — when more than 80 incendiary fires sent \$500,000 worth of hay up in flames in two and one-half hours.

The fires occurred at a time when numerous farmers, working through

the National Farm organization, were trying to hold out for higher hay prices and arrange their own marketing. In the current economic crisis the farmers have been squeezed between soaring costs and falling prices.

To date the courts have not determined who did the burning. A sign offering an \$18,500 reward for information leading to the arrest and conviction of those responsible still is posted in the Grant County sheriff's office.

Grant County — scene of most of the August hay fires — was literally a rainless sagebrush desert until the early 1950s when water from Grand Coulee dam turned it into a fertile, irrigated farming area. Hay is a major crop.

Today about 150,000 of the project's more than 500,000 irrigated acres are planted in alfalfa hay, and massive haystacks border the roadways everywhere.

Three years ago farmers in the Columbia basin began to join the militant National Farm organization, based in Corning, Ia. Through the organization they have organized the sale of wheat, cattle, beans and hay and they currently have a marketing arrangement with Japan to ship 1,000 tons of hay each month. All the deals are at higher prices than the farmers would get through regular marketing channels.

By holding out for higher prices in 1969 members of the farm organization and others had raised the price of hay from \$18-\$20 a ton to \$27 a ton — although at that time some farmers broke ranks and sold their hay for as little as \$18.

Farm organization members and Columbia basin ranchers were again trying to do the same thing when the August 7 pre-dawn fires broke out.

Dale Smith tells about being awakened at 2 o'clock in the morning by flashing red lights. He ran outside to find one of his haystacks burning.

"It was like a nightmare," he says. "Every 15 minutes a fire bomb went off in another of my haystacks. There was no way to stop it."

The same was happening to neighbors in all directions from his farm.

After the fire investigations led the the placing of arson charges against one person. The charges later were withdrawn. A search warrant was issued and later suppressed for lack of probable cause. Two men were convicted of causing flat tires on hay trucks. Another is under presentence investigation on two counts of perjury. All of these men are farm organization members. About 85 per cent of the fires were in stacks of farmers who do not belong to the organization.

In prosecuting the perjury case Carroll D. Gray, an assistant U.S. attorney, said: "Although N.F.O. will be mentioned in the case the organization is not on trial. However there exists within the N.F.O. a radical fringe group that has advocated the use of violence."

At a Grant County meeting Paul

Manke, N.F.O. staff member, said: "It's ridiculous to think that we would destroy the very family farmer we're working so hard to preserve."

"If it turns out any N.F.O. member is involved in any way," Devon Woodland, Idaho's farm organization director said, "We'll do everything in our power to see that they're prosecuted."

N.F.O. members believe that their threat to traditional marketing channels creates a strong motive to discredit their organization. The polarization that pervades the basin in the wake of fires readily is apparent.

"The day after the fires," Alvin Schulz, a farm organization member says, "I walked into the Turf cafe in Quincy, and none of my neighbors would say hello. One trucker who's hauled my hay for years called after the fires and asked if I had any hay. Yes, I said. Are you can N.F.O. member? Yes. Then I can't even talk to you."

"The most tragic part of the whole business is the distrust that's come out of it," Sheriff Ralph W. Hall said.



Programs Filter Income To Poor

The processes of government now shift income from rich to poor with substantially greater effect than commonly is believed, according to a complex new study by two Census Bureau experts.

The study shows that the impact of all taxes is not progressive. Overall most families pay direct and in-

direct taxes at the same 30 per cent rate, regardless of income.

But, the study goes on, when payments from government—such as unemployment insurance—are taken into account, the result is a markedly progressive redistribution of income.

For example families with earned

year were in the top 5 per cent, the study said, and they received 22 per cent of total national income. Those with more than \$60,000, the top 1 per cent of the population, received 9 per cent of the income.

The study defined income not only as wages but also as capital gains, life insurance and other payments, increasing the national income total 13 per cent, to 805 billion dollars. Under this broader definition the number of families with incomes of \$50,000 or more increase to 900,000 from 200,000 Miller said.

If income were defined in the usual narrower way, families with more than \$12,500 in 1968 were in the top 20 per cent of the population and families with more than \$19,700 were in the top 5 per cent.

Miller and Herriot also defined taxes broadly, including indirect taxes that are passed on to consumers. Their tax total thus was double the 124 billion dollars paid in income, property and other direct taxes.

The authors of the study also plan to define government payments more broadly than they did in the study. So far they refer only to direct government cash payments. They now are developing a further study that allocates the value of

other government spending, ranging from public housing to national security.

'Equal To' Status On Kansas Poultry Inspection

The Kansas poultry inspection program is equal to the federal one under provisions of the wholesome poultry products act, the Agriculture department certified yesterday.

Kansas is the sixth state to achieve the "equal to" poultry inspection status. Missouri already has been certified.

The Kansas certification will affect 17 plants and Kansas now has full responsibility for inspection of poultry slaughter and processing. The state and federal government equally share costs of the program. The state developed a law, regulations, financing and staffing to earn the certification.

income of less than \$2,000 a year in 1960 paid an estimated 50 per cent of their income for all taxes — but got back 106.5 per cent in government payments. So their "net" tax was not a tax at all, according to the study, but a benefit of 57 per cent.

Families with more than \$50,000 a year, meanwhile, paid 45 per cent in all taxes and got back less than 1 per cent. So their net tax was 44.7 per cent of income.

The study was made by Herman P. Miller, director of the Census Bureau's population studies, and Roger A. Herriot, a bureau statistician. Miller, a student of "Rich Man, Poor Man," a recently published book on the subject.

"Conventionally people look only at taxes as a percentage of income without considering the benefits of tax payments," Miller said. "But when the burdens and the benefits are taken into account, there is a substantial net gain for lower-income levels and a substantial net loss for the upper levels."

But these gains and losses, both authors said, are selective within income classes. For example, Herriot said, a woman with \$4,000 income who is on Social Security comes out ahead. But a laborer with the same income may receive no government benefits.

The study, based on 1968 data, is the first such analysis since one by the Council of Economic Advisers based on 1965 data. As part of their study Miller and Herriot showed how much of total national income was received by families at different levels.

The lowest 20 per cent of the population, earning \$3,800 a year or less, received 3 per cent of total national income. The highest 20 per cent, earning \$17,500 or more, received 48 per cent.

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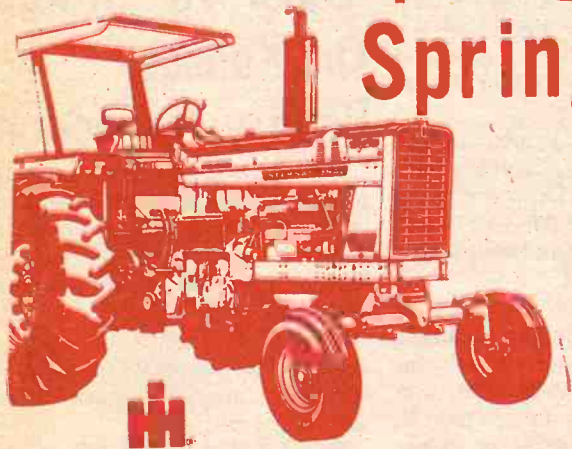

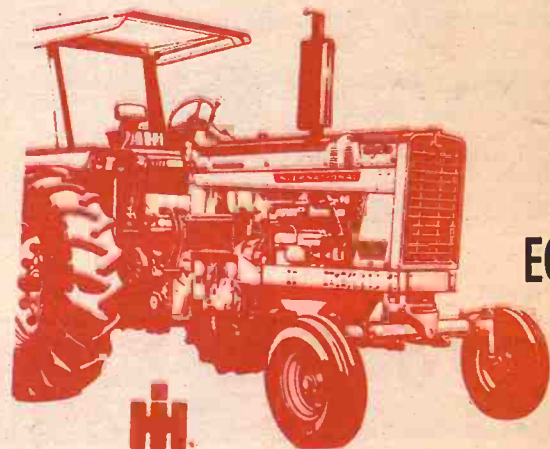

U.S. Still 10 Years Ahead Of European Farming

Agricultural advancement in America is 10 years ahead of Europe, according to a French

executive, who was in Kansas City to purchase fertilizer applicator machines manufactured by Rickel, Inc., a Kansas City company. The comment came from Franco Corbellini, director of marketing and research for Pechiney-Saint Gobain, a chemical company in a Paris suburb. Corbellini was asked why his

company is buying American products. "We think that in America you see things well in advance in comparison with Europe," he said. "Each time we come here, it is a forecast of what is going to happen 10 years later in Europe. For instance, we find the fertilizer applicator machines in the United States much more advanced. At this time, there is no manufacturer of that kind of machine in France."

European agriculture faces many of the same trends as those now taking place in the United States, Corbellini stated. One of these is a decrease in the number of farms and a second is an increase in the production of corn. This is especially true of France where the introduction of new varieties make it possible to grow corn farther north than before. Another trend described by Corbellini is a reduction in the availability of farm labor. In France, 15 per cent of the population still lives on the farm, but the number is declining rapidly. This makes it necessary for the farmer to rely on bigger machinery.

Average size for farms in France is 120 acres, but this takes into account the smaller farms in the central part of the country, Corbellini said. In the bigger farming areas, the usual farm size is about 250 to 300 acres, and some of them go up to 1,000 acres.

Annual business volume for Pechiney-Saint Gobain is about 320 million dollars, he said. The company manufactures fertilizers, plastics and industrial chemical products, and has about 12,000 employees.

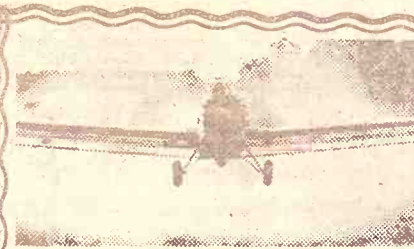
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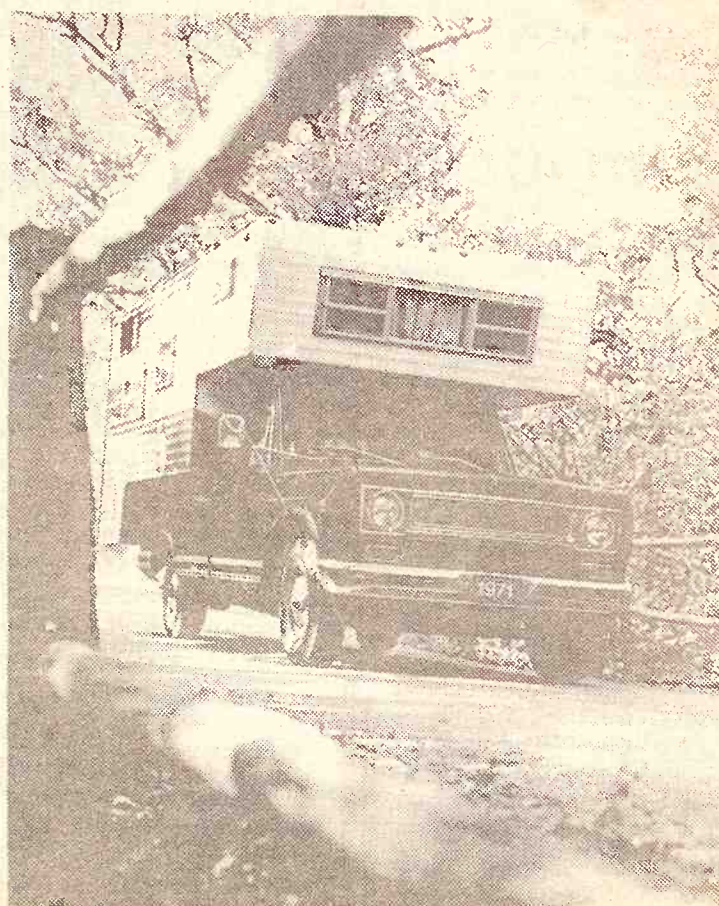

The orders were issued by Herbert S. Denenberg during five days of crowded public hearings at city hall into a request by Blue Cross of Greater Philadelphia for a 50 per cent increase in rates. The hearings, and Denenberg's actions, attracted nationwide attention. Health insurance rates, including Blue Cross premiums, have been spiraling in all states in recent years. Blue Cross got an average 17.8 per cent rate increase in the New York area this year and a 43 per cent increase last year. In the fiscal year ended last June 30, the cost of hospital care rose 15 per cent nationally, more than any other health cost.

Across the country, the average room and board charge now is about \$70 a day, exclusive of laboratory

tests, medicine and other prescribed items. Reports from a number of states show that as hospital costs rise, Blue Cross, the major insurer for hospitalization, routinely seeks state approval for rate increases and most states almost routinely approve them.

The Blue Cross organization here got a 25 per cent increase last August, but says it will go bankrupt if it does not increase the current rates 50 per cent by next August. This would raise a typical family's monthly premium to \$37.70 from the present \$25.60. Blue Cross blames rising hospital costs and greater use of the insurance plan.

Denenberg exploded when the latest request of the Philadelphia Blue Cross came in.

Since some 60 per cent of the population in the area has Blue Cross coverage, he contended, hospitals depend upon Blue Cross as a major source of revenue and Blue Cross should require them to meet reasonable standards of operating efficiency, rather than simply accepting higher charges and passing the cost on to subscribers in higher rates.

"Bold steps are demanded and bold steps will be taken" he asserted, adding:

"While it may be unwarranted to blame Blue Cross entirely for increased hospital costs, it is clear that Blue Cross has not really tapped its potential for influencing hospitals to take a much harder look at the factors within their own operations which contribute to this intolerable escalation of health care costs. I intend to see that this potential is realized to the fullest extreme possible.

"Too much emphasis has been

given to the problems of physicians, hospitals and Blue Cross; too little attention has been given to the problems of the patient, the policy holder and the public."

"It is a national issue," he said. "The financial problems of Blue Cross are real, and some great adjustment will be inevitable. But the problems of the consumer are also real, and it would be unfair to him to grant an increase without being sure that all reasonable steps are taken to control costs."

Among the shocks Denenberg administered to Blue Cross and hospital officials summoned to testify were the following:

- He ordered Blue Cross to reorganize its board of directors within two weeks to provide greater representation for the consumers and employers who pay the premiums. He asked that hospital representatives and physicians be eliminated from the board. "The problems of medical care and hospital financing are too important to be left to the hospitals and doctors," he said.

- He ordered Blue Cross to cancel its contracts with all 80 hospitals here at once and negotiate new ones requiring unaccustomed economies. Under the new contracts hospitals would not be allowed to defray the costs of research, education and other hospital costs of no direct benefit to patients by charging a percentage to patient services.

- He ordered Blue Cross to provide a list for distribution to the public of room and board costs at each hospital so consumers could do some comparative "shopping" in deciding where to seek hospitalization. Rates vary as much as \$50 a day among hospitals here.

- He suggested that doctors rather than hospitals pay the salaries of interest and residents, a major hospital cost now passed on to Blue Cross and patients as overhead. He noted that the work of student doctors was directed by physicians, not hospitals, and that the physicians benefited by collecting fees.

- He ordered Blue Cross to itemize the money it spends for advertising, public relations and membership dues in hospital and other organizations engaged in lobbying and publicity activities — all reflected in premium rates.

The aggressive approach of the commission produced strong statements of support from consumer witnesses.

As in most other states, however, his regulatory power is severely limited by lack of control over hospital and doctors.

The new commissioner believes there are some things that can be accomplished by alerting the public to what he considers cozy relationships between Blue Cross and the hospitals and to the role of doctors in decisions that raise hospital costs.

"If there is to be progress, we have no alternative but to provide a steady stream of criticism," he said, "and that's what we intend to do."

"Blue Cross and insurance companies blame the hospitals, the hospitals blame the physicians, and the physicians blame the system. It's time to improve the system rather than to attempt to palm off blame on someone else."

"Too many of those involved are waiting the grand federal solution of national health insurance rather than working toward improving the system here and now."

Farmer Defended

Pioneer Ecology

A Senate subcommittee was told today that there would be no pollution problem in rural areas if farmers had more money available for soil and water conservation.

The comment came from the prepared testimony of L.C. Carpenter, vice president of the Missouri Farmers Association.

The subcommittee's hearing on agricultural pollution concluded after eight hours of testimony by witnesses representing agriculture and feed lot industries as well as state health officials.

"For generations," said Carpenter, farmers have been environmentalists at heart, conservationists by nature and ecologists by profession."

He said he spoke for an organization of 152,000 members in more than half a dozen mid-western states.

"Many observers seem to believe modern farm technology is incompatible with a clean environment," he said and then analyzed the problem of fertilizers, agricultural chemicals and feed lots.

With respect to feed lots Carpenter said experience at the MFA research farm "dictates the need for additional federal funding for two purposes:

"1. The development of totally new technology directed toward much more economical methods of handling the animal waste problem.

"2. Federal funding to specific on-farm projects designed to eliminate animal waste escaping from the farm of origin."

He added that "control of erosion then becomes the primary method of keeping plant nutrients, pesticides and animal wastes at the point of origin."

Agricultural pollution can be controlled and eliminated, he continued, "if we establish the proper agricultural policies and secure adequate funding to control erosion."

Hog Production Passing Peak

The quarterly report on hogs and pigs, issued by the USDA, in March, was about as expected: Compared to year-ago figures, farmers will have about 20 per cent more hogs to sell during the April-May-June quarter,

but only a few more for sale in the July-August-September period.

Hog prices seem likely to average around \$18 to \$20 during the spring quarter, possibly \$22 to \$24 during the summer quarter. These are

personal estimates — forecasting hog prices is not an exact science. The USDA report covered the ten, leading hog-producing states. It showed that farmers in these states had 37.1 million market hogs and pigs on hand March 1 — 13 per cent more than a year before. Most of the increase consisted of hogs, rather than pigs, especially those weighing over 120 pounds.

Increases By Weight Groups

The number of hogs weighing over 220 pounds was estimated at 1,087,000 — 17 per cent more than last year. The number weighing 180 to 220 pounds was listed at 5,562,000 — up 26 per cent; those weighing 120 to 180 pounds, 9,383,000 — up 22 per cent.

The number of shoats weighing 60 to 120 pounds 8,032,000 — 13 per cent more than a year earlier. Pigs under 60 pounds were listed at 13,010,000 — up only 3 per cent.

The USDA report also showed that farmers intend to reduce spring sow farrowing, by 7 per cent versus a year ago, and summer farrowings by 15 per cent below the 1970 level. Such a reduction in summer farrowings would trim hog production to about where it was two years ago. This could set the stage for hog prices to move into the upper 20's again, as they did two years ago. Prospective Market Supplies

The market receipts of hogs during the April-May-June quarter seem likely to be about 20 per cent greater than last year, but up only around 5 per cent during July-August-September. Pork production will not increase as much as hog slaughter, because farmers will market their hogs at lighter weights than they did last year. The reduction in the average weight will probably be 5 to 10 pounds per head (2 to 4 per cent).

It now appears that the pork supply for the 12 months ending June 30 will average 71 to 72 pounds per person. This would be 14 per cent more than last year and the largest per-capita supply since 1952, when the figure was about 72 pounds per person.

Changes by States

In the report, Illinois and Ohio showed the smallest increase, 7 per cent, in the number of market hogs and pigs on hand March 1. The increases in other states were Missouri, 9 per cent; Iowa, 13 per cent; Indiana, 17 per cent; Nebraska and Minnesota, 19 per cent; and Wisconsin, 21 per cent.

The largest cut in spring farrowings (March-May) was planned in Wisconsin, Iowa, and Nebraska — 10 per cent. Reductions elsewhere were expected to be 8 per cent in Minnesota, 7 per cent in

Illinois, 6 per cent in Indiana, and 5 per cent in Ohio and Missouri.

The largest reduction in summer farrowings was the 20 per cent cut in Illinois and Missouri. Cuts in other states were expected to be 18 per cent in Nebraska, 18 per cent in Wisconsin, 16 per cent in Iowa, 8 per cent in Indiana, and 7 per cent in Ohio.

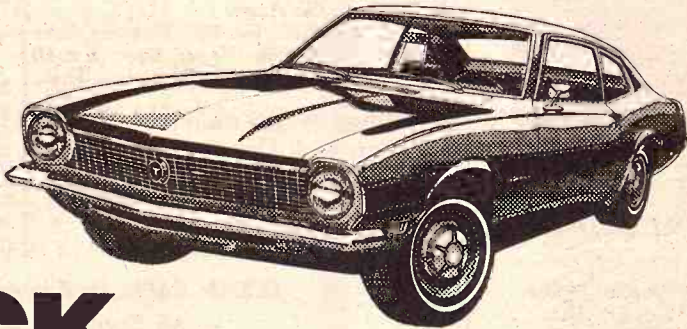

Port Strike Would Hurt Grain Sales

An impending longshoremen's strike which would close Gulf ports would hurt Kansas wheat and other grain export marketings, according to the Kansas Wheat Association's board, Hawes explained.

In resolutions passed by the Association, the group called on the Gulf Coast Maritime Association and the International Longshoremen's Association to begin earnest negotiations immediately, and at least three months prior to the contract's expiration date (Sept. 30, 1971) to lay all unresolved issues open to the public.

Kansas ranked sixth in the nation in export marketings last year, according to a USDA report. Kansas export values for wheat and flour alone totaled \$183.6 million in 1970. All together, exports of U.S. agricultural products in 1970 totaled \$7.17 billion, 21 per cent higher in 1969.

"...Strikes of longshoremen over the last 10 years have taken a heavy toll of U.S. agricultural exports and of agribusiness due to the permanent loss of a significant portion of these exports, the accumulation of surpluses, and a general depression of producer activities.

"We have lost dollar-producing exports permanently," Hawes continued, "and would suffer further damage if we face another disastrous shutdown when present contracts between the longshoreman's union and shippers expire on Sept. 30."

Lawrence E. Brennan of Dodge City, a member of the Association's board who was unable to attend the Houston meeting, and also chairman of the Kansas Wheat Commission, agreed.

Brennan said a recent survey compiled by Prof. L.H. Simerl of the University of Illinois has shown the loss of overseas markets would do far more damage than corn blight.

"The corn lost to the blight has been offset by higher prices for the remainder of the crop. But there would be very little gain to counterbalance the loss of foreign markets for our wheat, corn, soybeans and other agricultural products," Brennan said.

Some 712 million bushels of wheat were shipped for foreign consumers last year, according to the Simerl survey. This national figure includes flour and other wheat products and is equivalent to 52 per cent of last summer's harvested wheat crop.

Foreign purchases in the export market accounted for more than half the nation's soybean crop and about 27 per cent of the nation's corn

crop sold by farmers.

Exports of grain sorghum totaled 144 million bushels, representing 26 per cent of the amount sold by farmers, or 21 per cent of the sorghum grain produced nationally last year.

Early Year Decline In Meat Imports

The Agriculture Department says meat imports during the first two months of 1971 totaled far less than in January and February last year.

The Jan.-Feb. total, officials said, was 148.5 million pounds, compared with 225.2 million a year earlier.

Agriculture Secretary Clifford M. Hardin has announced that "voluntary restraint" agreements negotiated with supplying countries appear to be working.

Hardin, following requirements of a 1964 meat quota law, estimated that meat imports for all of 1971 will total 1.16 billion pounds. That was the same level he announced on March 13 after the White House invoked, then suspended, quotas for this year.

The March 13 move involved a procedure under the 1964 formula requiring a president to invoke quotas whenever the meat estimate for the year exceeds a maximum

level.

Hardin had informed President Nixon earlier that 1971 imports were expected to total 1.16 billion pounds, the same as for last year.

This year's maximum under the law's formula was less than 1.13 billion pounds. Thus Nixon invoked quotas and then, as the law also provides, suspended them because of "overriding economic interests" of the country.

The higher 1.16 billion pound level was set, based upon voluntary agreements with the supplying countries, principally Australia and New Zealand. The agreements have been used since late in 1968 to keep meat imports within bounds and to avoid stiffer quota action by the United States.

A similar procedure of invoking quotas and then suspending them was followed last year.

Insurance Companies Sweeten Pot To Hold Onto Policyholders' Cash

At a time when banks and thrift institutions have been cutting the interest rates payable on deposits, insurance companies apparently are moving to increase the rates they pay to persuade more policyholders to leave their cash with the company.

The Equitable Life Assurance society, one of the nation's largest insurance companies, believes that reasonably high interest rates are here to stay for a while. It has just announced that from now on it will pay 6 per cent to beneficiaries of policies and payees of matured endowment policies if they leave the proceeds on deposit with the company for five years. This is the same rate that savings banks and savings and loan associations are offering on a 2 to 5 year deposits.

As most owners of life insurance policies know, there are several options available upon death of an insured or maturity of an endowment policy. A company will pay out the money in a lump sum. Annuity options are available. The

money can also be left on deposit, drawing interest.

Equitable recently has been paying about 4.6 per cent on the money left on deposit.

Charles F. Andolsek, vice-president in charge of the claim department, explained the company's average policy runs about \$5,000. At any one time he figures only about 1 per cent of the \$500,000,000 claims payable has been left on deposit in recent years.

The reason was that the money could be invested for a higher rate of return elsewhere, such as in savings banks, savings and loan associations, bonds of various types, or good stock.

Andolsek came up with the idea for the new 6 for 5 plan — 6 per cent guaranteed for five years if left on deposit.

Currently the Metropolitan Life Insurance company pays 5 per cent on money left on deposit, and it can be withdrawn at will. A spokesman said the company "has in the works" a plan offering a higher rate.

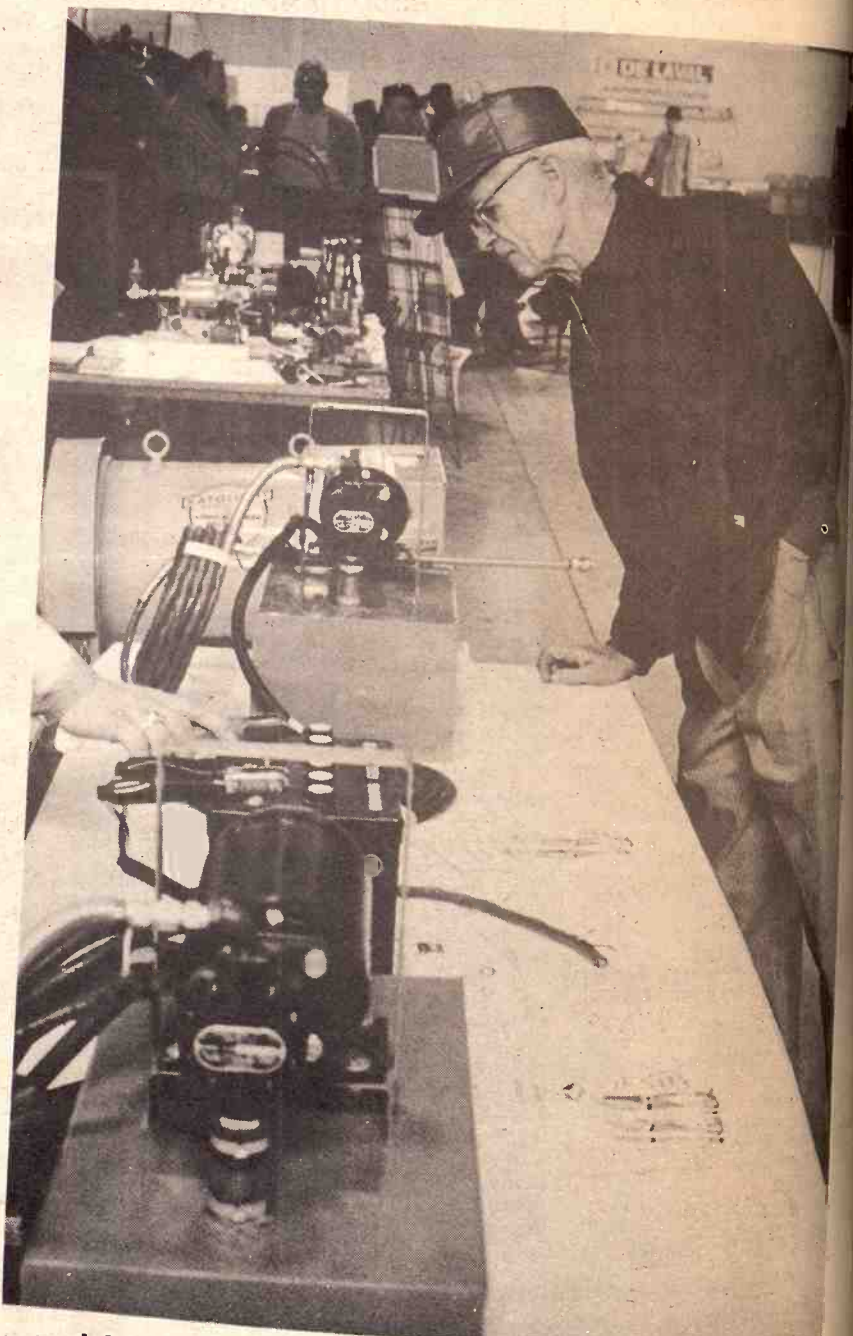

'I'm Not Sick — You Are,' Says New Lib Group

To women's liberation, Gay Liberation, Third World Liberation, now add a new cause: Insane Liberation.
It may sound like a put-on, but it is not, although it is hardly a movement on the same scale as that of other minorities.
So far, it is confined to a small

group of people in New York City, all of its members former patients in mental hospitals or persons who feel they have been victimized by psychiatrists or psychologists.

The members, who talk of "pig shrinks" and criticize outsiders for their "sane chauvinism," have been developing their thinking into a manifesto. A notice of their organization appearing recently in the *Liberated Guardian*, a radical newspaper published in New York, helps define their perspective:

"We of insane liberation are former mental patients and people who society labels as insane. We are beginning to get together — beginning to see that our problems are not individual, not due to personal inadequacies, but are the result of living in an oppressive society. We are beginning to see that our so-called sickness is personal rebellion or an internal revolt against this inhumane society.

"We believe that the only way people can be helped is through people helping each other; people with hangups being totally open and sincere to each other. The majority of shrinks, on the other hand, set themselves up as all-knowing authorities and from their positions of power automatically assume that the so-called patient is sick and not the society..."

Poland China 'No' To Merger With Spots Registry

SPRINGFIELD, Ill. — Poland China swine breeders by an overwhelming margin rejected the proposal to merge the Poland China and Spotted Swine national registries. The vote was 460 against to 91 in favor of the merger.

The vote was taken during the annual meeting of the Poland China Record Association here. Poland China board members earlier had approved the merger in principle. An official of the Association said the negative vote of the membership amounted to a censure of the board.

President J. Verald Brown, Hampton, Iowa, was among the members who looked with favor on the merger, regarding it as an opportunity for the two breeds to widen their genetic base and produce

improved hogs for the quality-conscious swine industry. Other officers and board members generally agreed with him, having voted 8 to 1 to submit the idea to the membership.

Backing for the plan also came from Spotted Swine breeders, who voted 53-13 in favor of the merger last December.

An official of the Poland China association said the lop-sided no-vote on the proposal meant it was dead for now.

The two breeds, which have separate registries, are quite closely related. For many years the Spots were known as "Spotted Poland Chinas."

Shorthorn Assn. Appendix Registry For Crossbreds

An unprecedented, new registry program for upgrading commercial

and crossbred Shorthorns and Polled Shorthorns has been established by the American Shorthorn Association.

The program was inaugurated April 1st. To be eligible for the New Appendix Registry, either the sire or dam of the entries must be a registered Shorthorn or Polled Shorthorn.

"The value of commercial and crossbred Shorthorns in a more valuable beef program has long been recognized," stated Association executive-secretary C.D. Swaffar. "The Appendix Registry will provide a vehicle to further identify the more outstanding commercial and crossbred cattle of our breed and to provide further incentives toward increasing the concentration of Shorthorn blood in the commercial industry."

The Appendix Registry will be separate from the current Purebred Registry of the American Shorthorn Association. A Certified Certificate will be issued on 15 16 blooded bulls and on 7 8 blooded females. Fees for entry will be the same as registration fees that currently prevail for entry into the American Shorthorn Association Herd Book.

Provisions have been made for the inclusion of performance information on All Appendix Registry certificates. Sales of Appendix Registry and Certified Shorthorns and Polled Shorthorns are planned.

Chevy Model 'Clean' But Still Short Of '75 Law

General Motors has shown off a Chevrolet that it said same close to meeting antipollution standards which take effect in 1975, or possibly 1976.

"We think we might be able to meet the 1975 law requirements," said a G.M. spokesman, but he said it will take more "break-throughs" in engineering, a liberal interpretation of the 1970 law, and modifications in testing.

Last November, while the law was still before Congress, Edward N. Cole, the president of G.M., said the 1975 pollution standards simply were not attainable with existing technology. In December, Henry Ford II said Ford Motor company felt the time was already too short for automakers to meet the law's 1975 standards.

The experimental Chevy was unveiled at a news conference in the Radio City Music Hall by Dr. William G. Agnew, G.M. auto emission research director.

He said its emission control system would produce "a 95 per cent reduction in hydrocarbon emissions; an 85 per cent reduction in carbon monoxide emissions, and more than 80 per cent reduction in oxides of nitrogen."

ages." This gum may stop up the carburetor and cause engine deposits. It also may cause damage when mixed in small amounts with fresh gasoline.

In addition, seasonal changes in grades of gasolines spell trouble if fuel blended for one season is carried another season.

For example, winter-grade fuel should not be bought just before spring. This gas may cause the engine to skip because of vapor lock. The condition occurs when gasoline boils in the fuel lines, fuel pump or carburetor.

Vapor lock may even cause an engine to cut off. The only remedy then would be to wait for it to cool or to pour water on the lines or fuel pump to speed the cooling process, says the K-State engineer.

Summer grade fuel may cause hard starting during cold weather.

Other considerations are the color and location of the tank. A dark colored 300-gallon tank positioned in bright sunlight during hot weather may lose 10 to 12 per cent of its capacity by evaporation in about three months.

In a 55-gallon barrel, summer losses may run as high as 12 gallons, or 22 per cent of capacity.

By painting the tank with white or aluminum paints, evaporation losses may be reduced by one-third, Horn concludes.

How Can Western Beet Growers Get Feed Grain Base?

The House Rules Committee, after vigorous debate, cleared for the House last week a controversial bill to allow sugar beet growers in three western states to come under the feed grain subsidy program.

The vote was 7-6 and signals a tough fight ahead in the House for the measure. The Senate has passed a similar bill.

In back of the bill was the closure earlier this year of sugar beet factories at Chaska, Minn., West Jordan, Utah, and Hardin, Minn., leaving the growers without a market for their product.

Under the bill, the growers would be given feed grain bases and would have to plant 45 per cent of their base presumably in corn. They also would be eligible for a subsidy for not growing the crop which, in some

Dairymen Win Higher Supports

Retail milk prices, already at their highest level in two years, are likely to go up even more because of government dairy price supports into effect last week.

Government economists say the increased price supports also could boost prices of hamburger and other inexpensive types of beef.

This new increase in the government's guaranteed price to farmers for milk used in butter, cheese and other products is just under 6 per cent. A 9 per cent boost was approved last year.

The latest increase came on the heels of a White House meeting between President Nixon and dairymen urging higher price supports. The Agriculture Department initially resisted the increase.

Agriculture Department economists decline to estimate how much the latest price support in-

crease will raise retail prices.

Last year's dairy price support boost resulted in retail price increases of 2 per cent for table milk and 2.8 per cent for butter, five and seven times the rise in general food prices during the same period.

Farm economists said the dairy support boost might encourage farmers to hold off butchering older or marginal dairy cows. That could reduce the supply of canned and ground meats and drive up prices.

Support prices are not the only factor affecting milk and meat prices, the economists emphasize. The price boost followed disagreement between agriculture and dairy state congressmen.

Secretary of Agriculture Clifford M. Hardin originally announced March 12 there would be no dairy price support increase this year.

Four days later Sen. Gaylord

Nelson, D-Wis., and 27 other senators introduced a bill to overturn Hardin's decision. Rep. W.R. "Bob" Poage, D-Tex., chairman of the House Agriculture Committee, scheduled hearings on a similar bill.

Nelson said farmers have to pay more for feed, labor and replacement stock. An Agriculture Department report noted the cost increases but concluded that record high prices and a greater labor supply would still permit a net gain in dairy income.

Two days after the White House meeting, Hardin raised dairy support prices, noting that feed costs had risen.

Under the dairy price support program, the government puts a floor under milk prices by promising to pay any farmer \$4.93 per hundred pounds of raw milk. Farmers turn to the government if they can't get at least \$4.93 on the open market.

Study Of Four Supplements

daily ration of three pounds of alfalfa and three pounds of milo proved to be more economical

than three other rations used by Kansas State University in a study to determine minimum feed needs for satisfactory production in beef cows.

The two-year study was conducted by Dr. Robert R. Schalles, associate professor of animal science and

industry at KSU. The cows in the study were dry and bred to calve in the spring. All four groups were wintered on good native blue-stem pasture in Riley County.

Schalles attempted to determine which of four supplemental rations was the most satisfactory for total calf production. The criteria utilized to measure the cow production were cow conception rates and weaning weights of the calves produced.

Schalles noted that a change in the body weight of the individual cow was a good indicator of her production.

The daily ration for each group of cows consisted of the following:

Group 1—three pounds of alfalfa, three pounds of milo, 1 1/2 pounds of soybean meal.

Group 2—three pounds of alfalfa, three pounds of milo.

Group 3—three pounds of alfalfa, 1 1/2 pounds of soybean meal.

Group 4—three pounds of alfalfa. The effect of the different rations was analyzed for cows four years old and older. It was found that cows on ration No. 1 and No. 3 had acceptable conception rates. The older cows on ration No. 3 produced calves with the lightest weaning weights and needed longer period between giving birth and being bred back.

The K-State researcher noted that all cows in this age group gained weight from November to January and all lost weight from January to May. The main difference was that the cows on rations No. 1 and 2 gained more weight from November to January than the cows on ration No. 3 and 4.

The results of the various rations on three-year-old cows indicated that conception rates "weren't too bad," Schalles said. The time between calving and breeding was longest for the three-year-olds on ration No. 3.

The weaning weights of the calves were heaviest for the cows on

rations No. 1 and 2. Schalles said three-year-old cows should weigh the same in the spring as the previous fall.

Schalles felt that the results of the study indicated that energy intake must be adequate during the wintering period.

He added that the protein requirements should be kept at the minimum daily required amount and more emphasis should be placed on energy intake. Ration No. 2 appeared to be the most economical in regard to production in this study, he concluded.

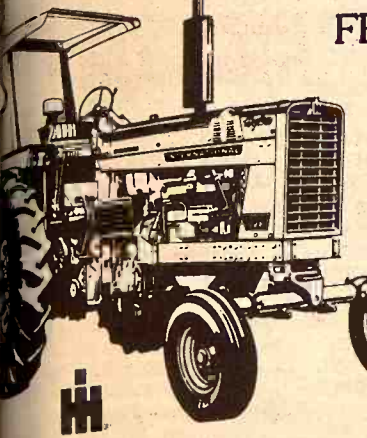

K. C. Stockyards Profit Holds On Down Revenues

Revenues were down at the Kansas City Stockyards Co. last year but profits stayed around the quarter-million dollar mark. Total revenues for 1970 were \$5.69 million, down from \$5.81 million in 1969, but profits held at \$246,000. The year before abandonment of property in the stockyards area put a onetime bookkeeping loss onto the


books which reduced the profit to \$214,000. Before the extraordinary charge was deducted profits in 1969 were \$279,000.

The Kansas City Stockyards operation includes three Golden Ox restaurants and the new livestock auction center which was opened in March 1970.

Livestock receipts at Kansas City were down at 1.982 million head compared to 2.226 million the year before. The majority of cattle sold at Kansas City now are through the auction center, rather than through commission buyers.
