

See A 2-Million Kansas Calf Crop For '71

Mid-Year livestock surveys showed an expected record high Kansas calf crop of 2,097,000 head during 1971, according to the Kansas Crop and Livestock Reporting Service.

However, the expected lamb crop of 211,000 head and prospective wool production of 2,518,000 pounds for 1971 are smallest in more than four decades.

Calf Crop

Calves born in Kansas during 1971 are expected to total 2,097,000 head, 7 percent more than the previous record high set in 1970.

The 1971 calf crop would represent 100 percent of cows and heifers that had calved on Kansas farms January 1 this year compared with 99 percent a year ago.

This percentage is not a precise calving rate since the January 1 inventory of cows and heifers that had calved does not include heifers calving for the first time during 1971 and includes some cows that died or were slaughtered without calving this year.

The number of cows and heifers that had calved on Kansas farms on January 1 totaled 2,097,000 head, up 6 percent from last year.

Lamb Crop

The 1971 lamb crop is expected to total 211,000 head, down 5 percent from last year and the smallest number since 1926.

The lamb crop percentage (number of lambs saved per 100 ewes one year old and older on January 1) this year was 103 percent, up 3 percentage points from last year and equaling the highest since 1955.

The number of ewes one year old and over on Kansas farms on January 1 this year was 205,000 head, down 7 percent from last year and the smallest number since 1926.

Wool Production

Wool shorn from Kansas flocks in 1971 is expected to total 2,518,000 pounds, down 3 percent from last year and lowest since 1927.

The number of sheep shorn totaled 298,000 head, down 7 percent from

last year and the smallest number since 1924.

The average weight per fleece is estimated at 8.4 pounds, 0.3 pound heavier than last year but closely in line with those in the late 1960's.

United States Calf Crop

The 1971 calf crop in the United States is expected to total 47,092,000 head, 3 percent more than the 45,926,000 head in 1970.

The January 1, 1971 number of cows and heifers that have calved, totaled 50,002,000 head, a 2 percent increase from a year earlier.

Calves born and to be born during 1971 are expected to total 94 percent of the January 1, 1971 inventory of cows and heifers that have calved—the same as last year.

This is not strictly a calving rate because the January 1 inventory did not include young heifers which have had their first calf since that date. Also, the inventory included some cows that died or were slaughtered before calving.

A calf crop of 17,909,000 head is estimated for the North Central Region, 3 percent higher than for a year earlier. The crop is estimated to be up 4 percent in the West North Central and 1 percent in the East North Central States.

The calf crop in the Southern States at 18,079,000 head is 3 percent more than the 1970 crop.

The Western States are expected to produce 8,697,000 calves, 2 percent more than a year earlier.

Montana, with a 2 percent increase, replaced California as the leading State in this region. California showed a 1 percent decrease from last year.

Calves born during 1971 in the North Atlantic Region are expected to total 2,322,000 head, up slightly from 1970.

Lamb Crop

The 1971 lamb crop for the United States is estimated at 12,910,000 head, 4 percent less than the 13,413,000 head produced in 1970.

Breeding ewes 1 year old and older on farms and ranches January 1, 1971 were down 2 percent from a year earlier, and ewe lambs under 1 year old were down 5 percent.

The lambing percentage for 1971 (number of lambs saved per hundred ewes 1 year old and older on hand January 1) at 95 is 1 point under 1970

The 1971 lamb crop in the 13 Western States (11 Western, South Dakota and Texas) totaled 9,218,000 head, down 3 percent from the 1970 crop of 9,533,000 head.

The lambing percentage was 91 for 1971 compared with 93 for 1970.

The number of breeding ewes 1 year old and older on January 1, 1971 at 10,120,000 head was 1 percent under a year earlier.

The number of early lambs (dropped before March 15) in the Western States was up 2 percent from 1970.

The lamb crop in the 35 Native States (excluding the 13 Western States and Alaska) totaled 3,686,000 head, down 5 percent from the 1970 crop of 3,874,000 head.

The number of ewes 1 year old and older on January 1, 1971 was 3,463,000 head, 6 percent less than a year earlier. The lambing percent

for 1971 was 106, unchanged from 1970.

Wool Production

Wool shorn and to be shorn in the United States during 1971 is estimated at 154,653,000 pounds, grease basis. This is 4 percent below the 1970 production of 161,301,000 pounds.

The 1971 production is equivalent to 73,769,000 pounds, clean basis, compared with 76,941,000 pounds in 1970 based on a conversion factor of 47.7 percent.

The number of sheep and lambs shorn and to be shorn is estimated at 18,593,000 head, a 2 percent decline from the 19,063,000 head shorn in 1970. The 1971 average weight per fleece is 8.32 pounds compared with 8.46 pounds last year.

Shorn wool production in the Western Sheep States (11 Western States, South Dakota and Texas) is

estimated at 118,320,000 pounds, down 4 percent from the 123,248,000 pounds.

Wool production is expected to be less than the 1970 production in the Western States except in Idaho.

Sheep shorn and to be shorn are estimated at 13,870,000 head, 1 percent less than the 14,000,000 head shorn in 1970.

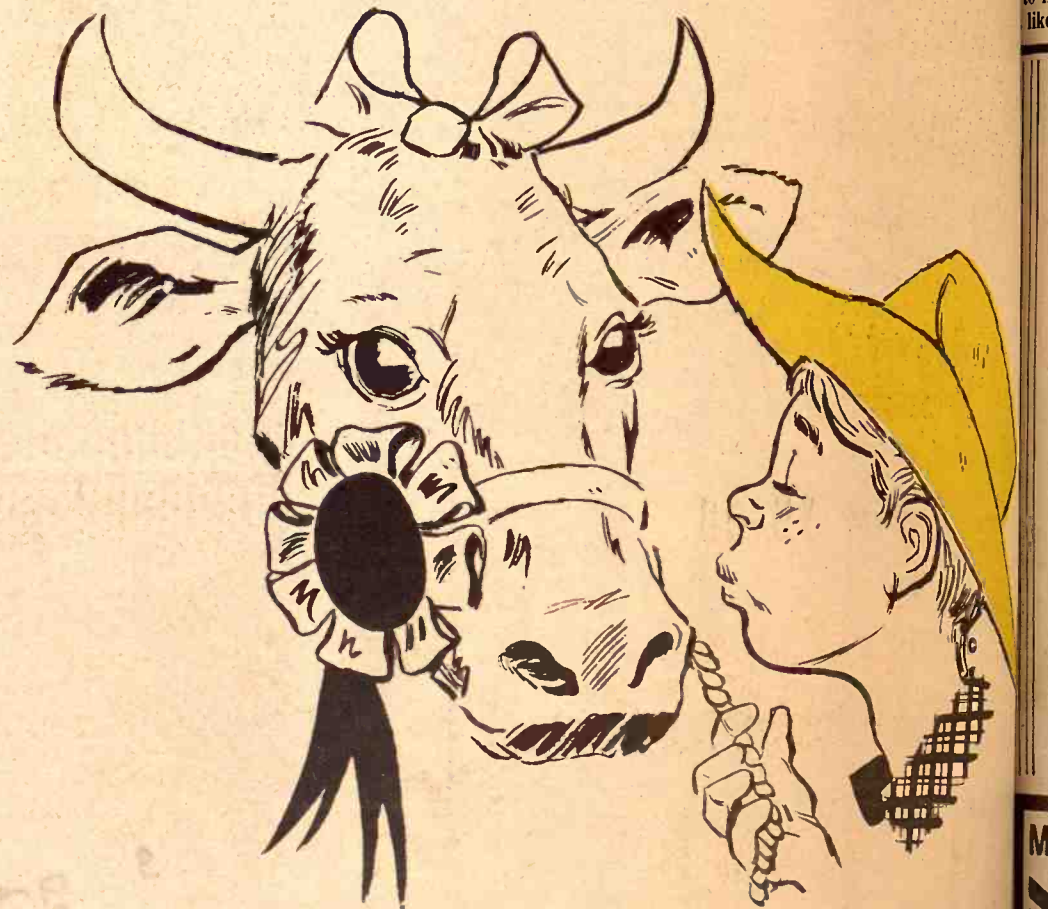
The 1971 average weight per fleece is 8.47 pounds compared with 8.46 pounds in 1970.

A wool clip of 36,000,000 pounds is estimated in the 13 Western States and Alaska, 5 percent less than the 37,700,000 pounds shorn in 1970.

The smaller clip is the result of a percent reduction in the number of sheep and lambs shorn. The average fleece weight is 7.78 pounds compared with 7.78 pounds in 1970.

ITALIAN SPAGHETTI & MEATBALLS

- 2 large green peppers
- 1 medium stalk celery
- 3 large onions
- 2 small cans tomato paste
- 2 quarts tomato juice
- 1 teaspoon caraway seeds
- 1 teaspoon pure garlic powder or juice
- 1 teaspoon thyme
- 1 teaspoon oregano
- 1 teaspoon marjoram
- 1/2 teaspoon red pepper, crushed
- 1 package Italian spaghetti seasoning mix
- salt, pepper, sugar (season to own taste)
- Grind pepper, celery and onions together and set 1/2 cup, drained, aside for meatballs. Mix all ingredients, except 1/2 cup you set aside, together thoroughly. Start cooking sauce over low flame and stir frequently. Should cook for about one hour before adding meatballs.

MEATBALLS FOR SPAGHETTI

- 1 1/2 to 2 pounds hamburger
- 1/2 cup ingredients you set aside
- Salt & pepper to taste
- Make into balls. Cook meatballs in a skillet over low flame until done. When done, place just meatballs, no grease, in sauce. Cook sauce and meatballs together until sauce is as thick as you like or till sauce has favored meatballs. Serve over spaghetti. This is a large recipe and you may freeze what you don't use. If you freeze any, make sure you thaw it completely before you rewarm it.

FROZEN CORN

- 4 quarts corn cut off cob (This does not need to be blanched first)
- 1 quart water

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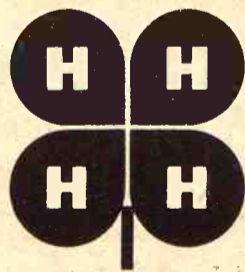

- 1 cup sugar
- 4 teaspoons salt
- Boil lightly ten minutes. Cool and pack water and all in containers and freeze. When serving—boil eight to ten minutes and add butter or cream as desired. "Most delicious!"

LEMON CREAM PIE

- 2 cups milk
- one-third cup cornstarch
- 1 cup sugar
- 1/4 teaspoon salt
- 3 eggs, separated (leaving whites for meringue)

Cook the above ingredients together until thick. Be sure that it is cooked thoroughly before adding the following:

- one-third cup lemon juice
- 1/2 teaspoon lemon rind
- 2 tablespoons butter
- Pour in an 8-inch baked crust and top with meringue. Bake in a 350-degree oven for ten to 12 minutes or until nicely browned.

EASY HOT WEATHER COOKIES

- 2 cups sugar
- one-third cup milk
- Boil milk and sugar together three minutes. Remove from heat. Add: 6 tablespoons peanut butter
- 1 teaspoon vanilla
- 1/4 pound saltine crackers (crumbled)
- Mix well and drop on waxed paper.

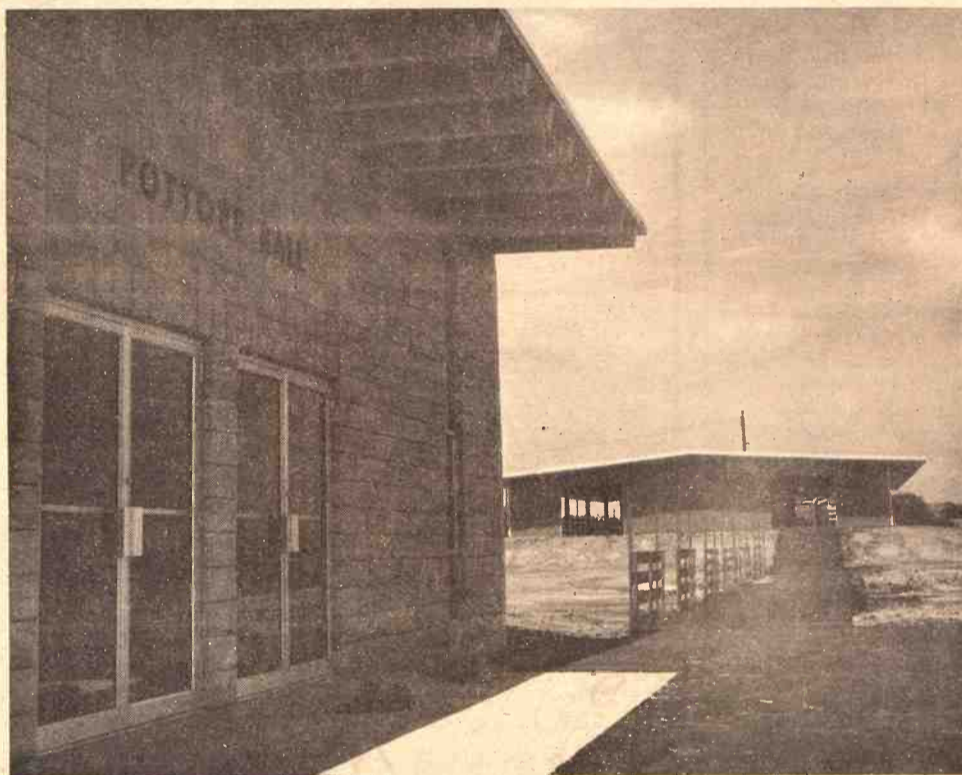
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Homemakers Need Courage To Create A Livelier Decor

Many homemakers are too concerned with committing a decorating blunder to join the swing to the bright, bold and beautiful in home furnishings.

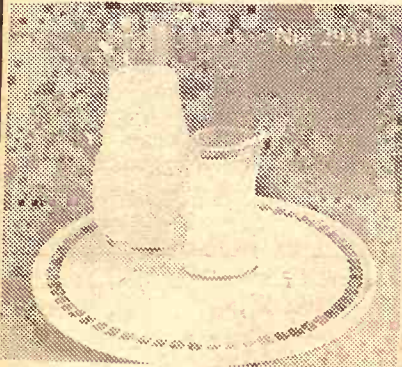

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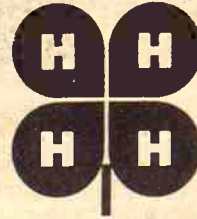

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Do's And Dont's To Ensure Safety Around The Home

When it comes to safety around the home, parents need to know the "inside" story for their children's sake as well as their own. Here are checkpoints to help you avoid downfall within your own domicile.

1. Don't overload electrical circuits. More than two cords plugged into one outlet constitute a fire threat.

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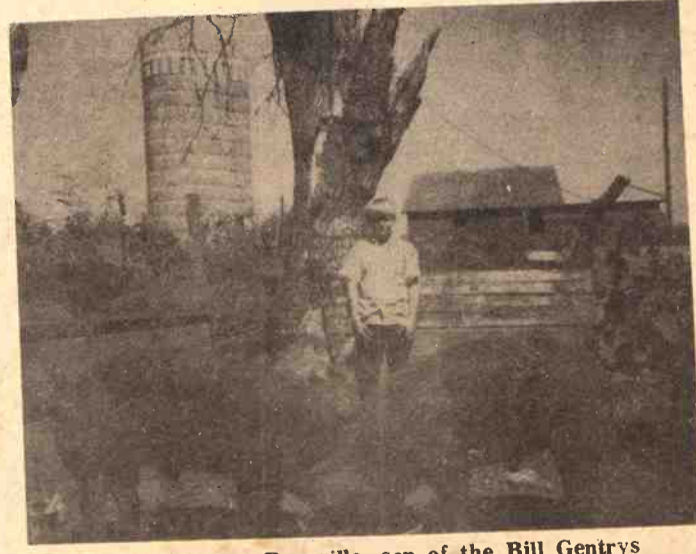
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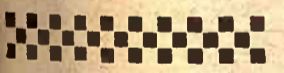
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DDT Decline Even Before Fed. Crackdown

An updated study on DDT shows farmers were using less of the chemical long before recent crack-downs on it, but that cotton growers are still the biggest users.

The report by the Economic Research Service in the Department of Agriculture includes some DDT production and use statistics not included in previous studies.

Only one U.S. company was manufacturing DDT at the beginning of 1971, the report said, compared with 13 manufacturing the pesticide 20 years ago. Production reached a record high of 188 million pounds in 1963, dropped to 114 million in 1967 but climbed slightly in 1968-69 to 126 million and 123

million pounds, respectively.

Domestic use during those years however, dropped steadily from a peak of 79 million pounds in 1959 to 30 million in 1969. Exports, one of DDT's biggest markets, dropped 30 per cent from a high of 114 million pounds in 1963 to 82 million in 1969.

"In recent years, exports claimed about 70 per cent of U.S. total production," the report said. "Shipments to India and nearby countries made up a large share of the exports. Much of the exported DDT was purchased by the Agency for International Development (AID) and the United National primarily for malaria eradication."

Farmers used more than half the DDT in the U.S. in 1966, the most recent year analyzed, the report said. About three-fourths of that was used in the South, mostly for control of cotton field pests.

Since late 1969, a number of steps have been taken by federal agencies

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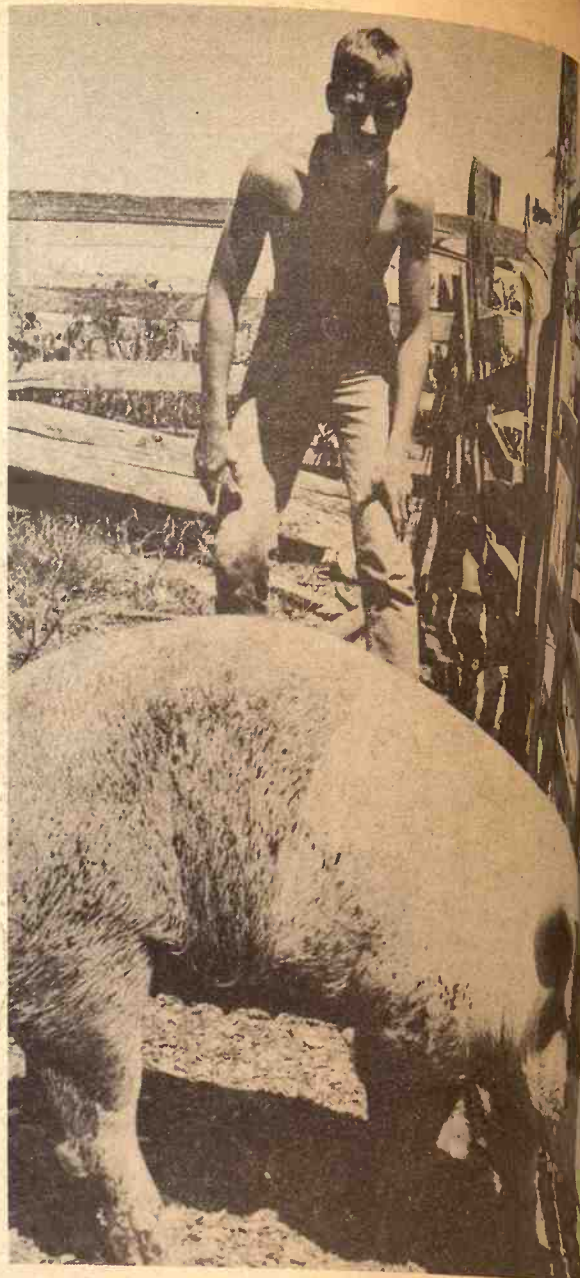

to restrict the use of DDT, a chemical that environmentalists claim endangers human health and ecological balance. The report noted Environmental Protection Agency cancellation notices last January for all remaining uses of DDT. Those decisions, subject to review, still are pending.

NEBRASKA COUNTIES JOIN IN AERIAL FLY CONTROL

Seven western Nebraska counties have cooperated for an aerial spraying program for fly control. The program involves control of horn flies on about 130,000 range cattle in Keith, Arthur, Garden, Grant, Lincoln, Logan and McPherson counties.

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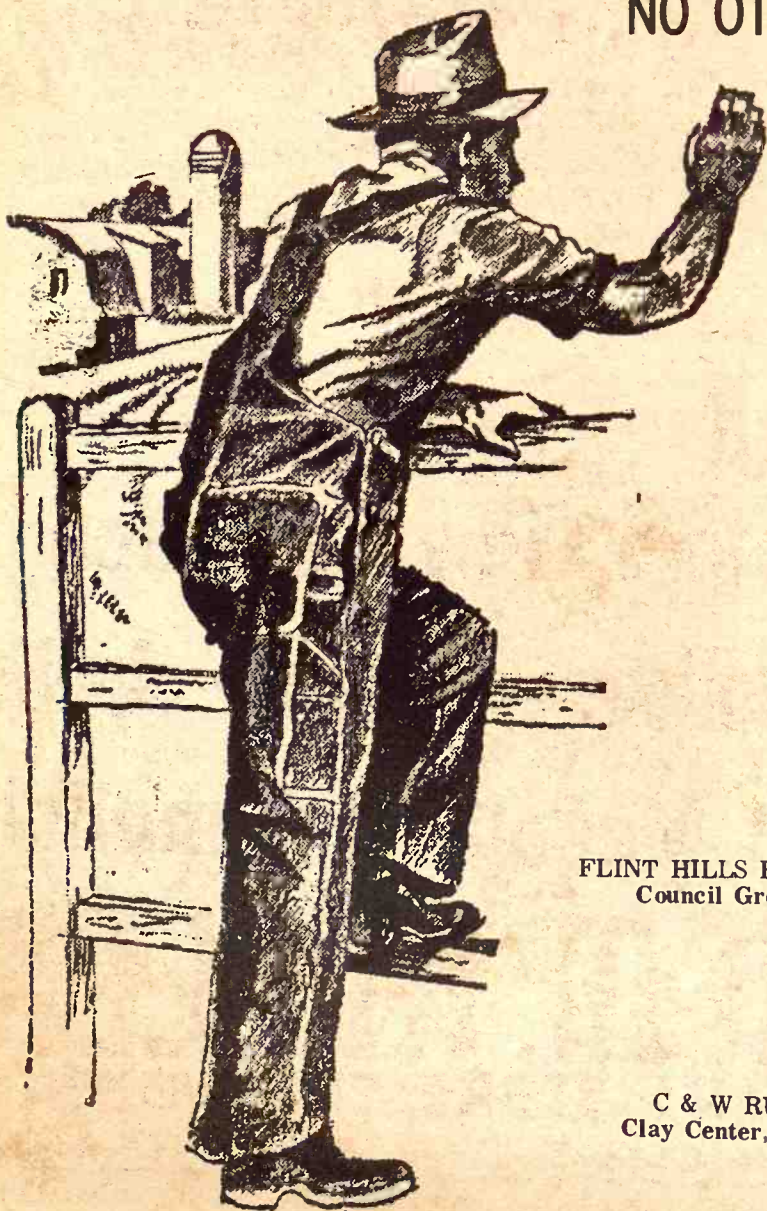
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White Sees Top 4H Livestock At Riley Co. Fair

Livestock exhibits make up an important part of the Riley County Fair, August 2-6, according to Charles R. White, County Extension Agricultural Agent.

The Riley County Beef Show will feature over 100 head of quality steers. Each steer has been fed, groomed and will be shown by a 4-H member. 4-H'ers will be competing not only as individuals but also 4-H clubs will compete for a traveling trophy, presented each year to the club with the best pen of steers. All breeds of market steers will be shown against each other according to weight.

The 4-H horse project in Riley County has grown from five or six horses to over sixty in seven years.

Bernard Wells, county horse project leader, has been the big factor in increasing the horse project in this county, White said.

The County Horse show will be held at 7:00 p.m. on Wednesday, August 4. Horses are judged at halter on conformation and movement. They are shown under saddle to demonstrate the ability of the rider and the horse. According to White, this year's show will be the biggest and best ever.

The most improvement and progress of any phase of livestock has been in swine. At the fair, some of the top swine in the state will be exhibited. The swine judge will be looking for trim, long meaty hogs to use at the top of each class.

Last year, over 80 head of swine were exhibited. Since no means of restraint can be used on swine, boys and girls must have them trained to drive. Many hours of preparation and training go into the finished product shown at the fair. Pigs shown by these 4-H'ers have received top honors at other fairs such as Mid-America, State, American Royal, Wichita Livestock Show and the AK-sar-ben.

Dairy cow numbers have decreased, but their production has increased due to advancements in scientific technology. But boys and girls enrolled in the dairy project have also been leading factors in production increases. There 4-H'ers, through their project work, realize the genetic potential of their animals and the nutrition required to make cattle produce.

About 30 dairy heifers and cows will be exhibited at the Riley County Fair. Some Riley County dairy projects in the past have stood high in competition at the various fairs.

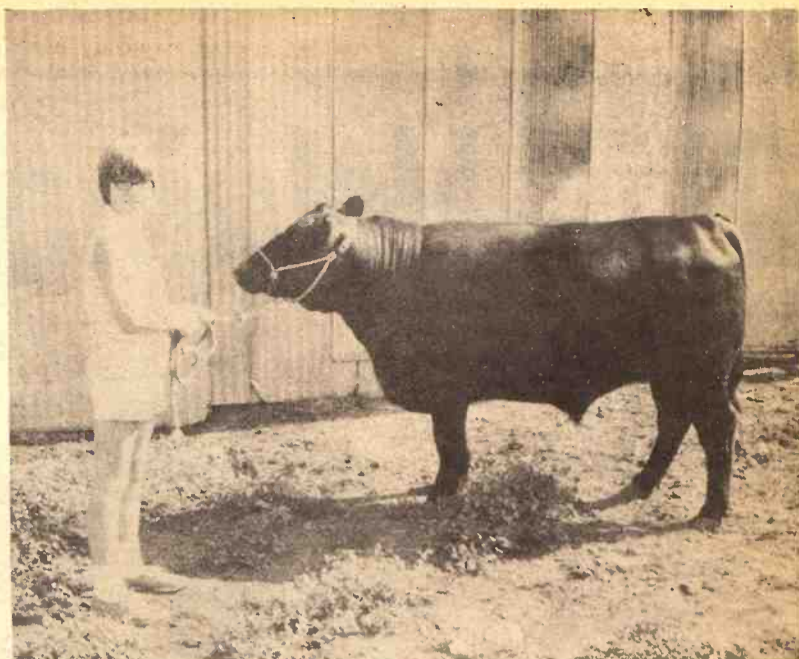
Sheep is the smallest livestock enterprise in Riley County. Yet, 4-H

boys and girls have shown that lambs can be a profitable project. About 40 head of lambs will be shown on August 4 at the fair. Every year, the quality of sheep in the county has improved. Sheep shown at other major fairs by Riley County 4-H'ers have received Champions and Reserve Champion ribbons.

Sportsmanship in the show ring is an important part of the Fair. Comments on conduct in the show ring for exhibitors apply with equal emphasis to 4-H'ers showing livestock.

Said White: "Commandments of the ring include (1) Be courteous (2) Be alert (3) Be prompt; know where your class is to be judged (4) Keep animals moving slowly but stop for close-up judging (5) Be confident, don't grandstand (6) Don't jockey for position (7) Don't let your animals contact other animals (8) Be a modest winner (9) Be a gracious loser; congratulate the winner."

Subsidy Break To Cotton Farmers

The Agriculture Department has liberalized a formula under which cotton farmers will be able to collect larger government payments in 1972 to help offset losses this year from drought and other natural disasters.

The formula change was included in a package of drought-relief actions announced by Agriculture Secretary Clifford M. Hardin.

Involved is a cotton farmer's average production used as a basis for computing his price support payments of 15 cents a pound. That payment is for cotton grown on "national allotment" acres which is used domestically.

Although the regulation change was directed mainly toward south-western cotton areas currently plagued by drought, an agricultural stabilization and conservation service spokesman said the upgraded formula will apply university throughout the Cotton Belt.

A farmer whose crop was cut this

year by too much rain, for example, also would be eligible for the increased benefits.

Hardin's announcement also extended haying and grazing privileges on land taken from production and emergency livestock feed sales from government-owned stocks through next Dec. 31.

Those programs, for designated counties in drought areas, were due to expire on Aug. 31.

Procedures for getting the government-owned grain also were modified, including authorization to let farmers use their own vehicles to help haul grain into drought areas, and a speed-up in clearing grain purchase applications through government offices.

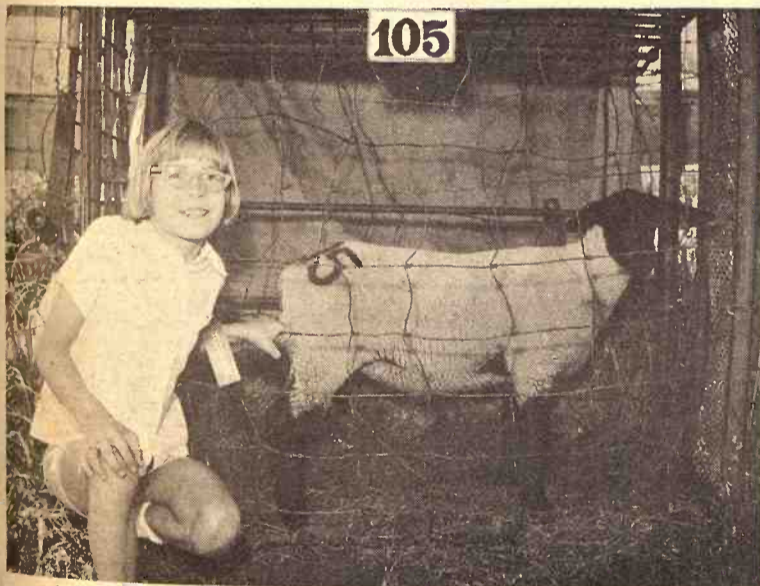

SEED DEALER KILLED IN AIR CRASH

One of the state's largest seed dealers, Gerald Sharp of Healy, was killed in an airplane crash last week. Sharp, whose seed firm operated out of tiny town between Scott City and Dighton, was president of the Kansas Seed Dealers Association.

He was killed, along with Roy Cramer, 22, also of Healy, who was working for Sharp this summer, when the plane piloted by Sharp struck three power lines and exploded, crashing to the ground in flames.

Sharp and Cramer, a Kansas State University student, were apparently inspecting land near Torrington, Wyo., for possible use as a grass-seed farm when the plane crashed.

Nobody Wants New Supply Of Half Dollars

Nearly 200 million 1971 Kennedy half dollars are gathering dust in government coffers, going largely unused for reasons the Treasury Department can't fully understand.

"I can't understand the population," said Mary T. Brooks, director of the U.S. Mint, shaking her head. "They're not using them."

The situation has reached the point Federal Reserve banks are calling commercial banks to spark demand, figuring if the public knows there are plenty of new half dollars, bearing the likeness of former President John F. Kennedy, demand will pick up.

"There are vending machines by

the thousands sitting in warehouses," Mrs. Brooks said in an interview. "The owners are dying to use them if the banks would use the half dollars."

But commercial banks say they are not ordering the coins because the public demand is too weak.

"I can't understand it," she said. "The half dollar weighs exactly the same as two quarters and there would be less rattling in the pocket. They're much less trouble."

The 1964-69 Kennedy halves, which

were part silver, never were in general circulation because the public stashed them away as collectors' items even though more than one billion were minted, she said.

Congress last year gave the Treasury authority to mint an

unlimited number of the new copper-nickel coins. But there was a full year, 1970, in which the public became unaccustomed to seeing the half dollar.

"If the country knew there were plenty of them around, they'd probably start hoarding them too," Mrs. Brooks said.

But neither the part-silver nor the nickel-copper coin is worth much for collecting, she said, because of the large number minted and because the value of the silver in the older

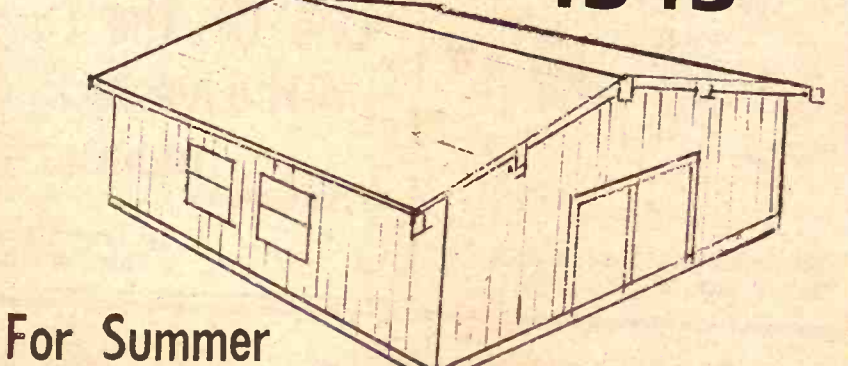

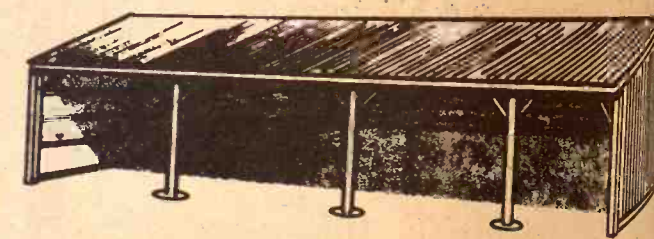


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Sedgwick Fair This Week For 4H's Largest Group

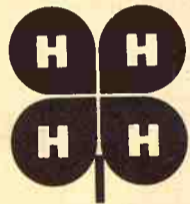

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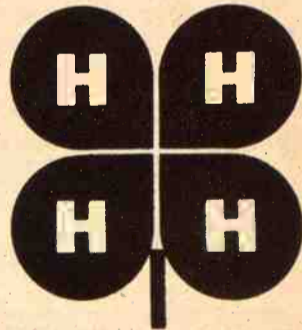

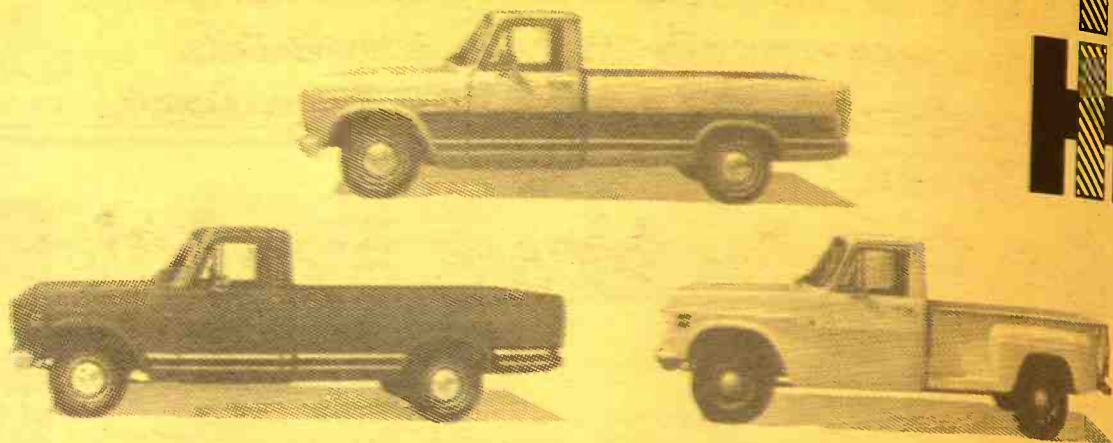

Too Much Talk Of Corn Blight

Damage from southern corn leaf blight has been over-emphasized in Kansas, Dr. Claude King, Kansas State University plant pathologist, says.

"As far as hurting the corn crop, it is minor compared to last year's drought when some fields didn't make anything," King said.

"With exception of a few counties, serious corn leaf blight is not expected. In those counties, about 30 fields in each county will be reduced to half a crop in rare cases.

"We'll raise a real good corn crop in Kansas, much better than last year."

One hope, he said, is that corn is getting along in the dough stage and passing into the dented stage where unless it stays real wet, it would not

be expected to rot further into the ear.

"We haven't had much wind in July and this prevents it from blowing around like it might have," he said.

King said that in June the situation looked bad, but the weather cooperated and strong winds did not carry spore showers from field to field as might have been expected. Rains were usually at night, followed by drying days which tended to hold down the blight.

Traces of the disease have been found in 38 Kansas counties. Recent findings were in Chase, Marion, Dickinson and Geary.

Hardest hit have been Leavenworth, Douglas, Jefferson, Shawnee, Coffey and Franklin where 8,000 acres have been sprayed.

Over the nation, the National Federal - State Information Center on Corn Blight reports, the fungus covers the majority of the counties in the nation's corn producing areas.

The disease has been reported in 31 states, an increase of two states (Arkansas and Oklahoma) from a week earlier.

Some degree of the infection exists in all counties of Illinois and Indiana and in corn growing counties of eastern Nebraska. Majority of the counties in Iowa, Missouri and Ohio. Infection is far less extensive in Minnesota, Kansas and Wisconsin.

There can be no reinforcement in cars, Val says, and seat belts and helmets are required. Those under 18 must have their parents consent.

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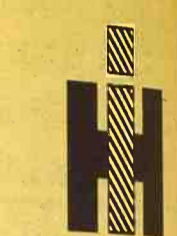

Teaching Market Has Changed; More Teachers Than Jobs Available

The World War II baby boom has passed through the nation's public schools and left the worst job market for teachers since the depression.

No relief is in sight for the next decade, says the National Education Association, predicting that the teacher surplus will double by 1976.

The job situation is so bad that one large eastern school has sent a letter to elementary education students suggesting they may wish to decide against a teaching career.

Unless new jobs are created, the N.E.A. said in a private memo to its staff, overproduction of teachers will reach 100,000 to 150,000 annually. In addition each year 15,000 to 35,000 experienced teachers who have quit teaching want to return to

school jobs, an N.E.A. official said.

The job picture is further complicated by school districts cutting back on programs and the size of their teaching staffs, and by professionals laid off by business and industry turning to teaching in search of work.

"The situation is completely unlike anything we have faced since the great depression of the 1930s," the N.E.A. Research Department said. "Not only beginning teachers but persons with above average experience and qualifications are unable even to find vacancies for which to apply."

High school employment also has been hit but the full impact of unemployment probably won't reach that level until the mid-70s, the N.E.A. said.

The job pinch is just beginning to be felt at college level. Nonetheless, the Co-operative College Registry, originally formed to find qualified instructors, finds its role changing. Now it is looking for jobs.

Mrs. Elizabeth S. Fisher, executive director of the registry, said that of 6,139 persons with doctorates who registered for jobs, 34 per cent were still without work last week. Fourteen per cent of those who found jobs aren't going into

teaching.

"Many of these people are having to settle for less," said Mrs. Fisher. "They don't get university level jobs and have to take jobs in junior colleges and high schools and business. In one case the man began driving a taxi rather than teach at a level below his degree."

She said the number of persons with masters degrees still seeking jobs for the start of the school year was even greater but she had no figures available on applicants and jobs.

Underscoring the bleak outlook Syracuse University's School of Education sent a letter July 1 to its elementary education students saying:

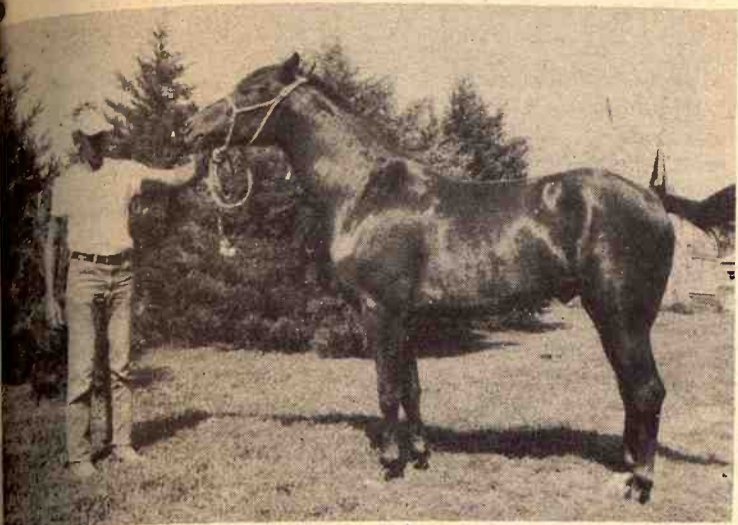
"Among our current graduating class less than half have positions for next year. . . it appears that at least a third of our graduates will not be employed come September. The situation among State University of New York graduates is even worse; in June, less than 30 per cent of the Oswego, Cortland and Potsdam graduates had teaching positions."

As examples of the tight job market in elementary schools the Syracuse letter noted that among area school districts, one had 400 applicants for six openings; another more than 300 applicants for each vacancy.

"Blame it on the pill or whatever but the cause of all this appears to be a reduction in the birth rate," the letter continued. "Give it some serious thought before you get so far into a program that it's impractical to change. . . We are fairly certain the situation that confronts us will not go away overnight."

The situation is not confined to any geographic area.

Dr. A. C. Murphy, director of placement at the University of Texas, said 60 per cent of the school's 1970-71 graduates had lined up teaching jobs. This is far above average, but "there is no way a graduate can continue to be selective over such matters as climate, geography and money," he said.

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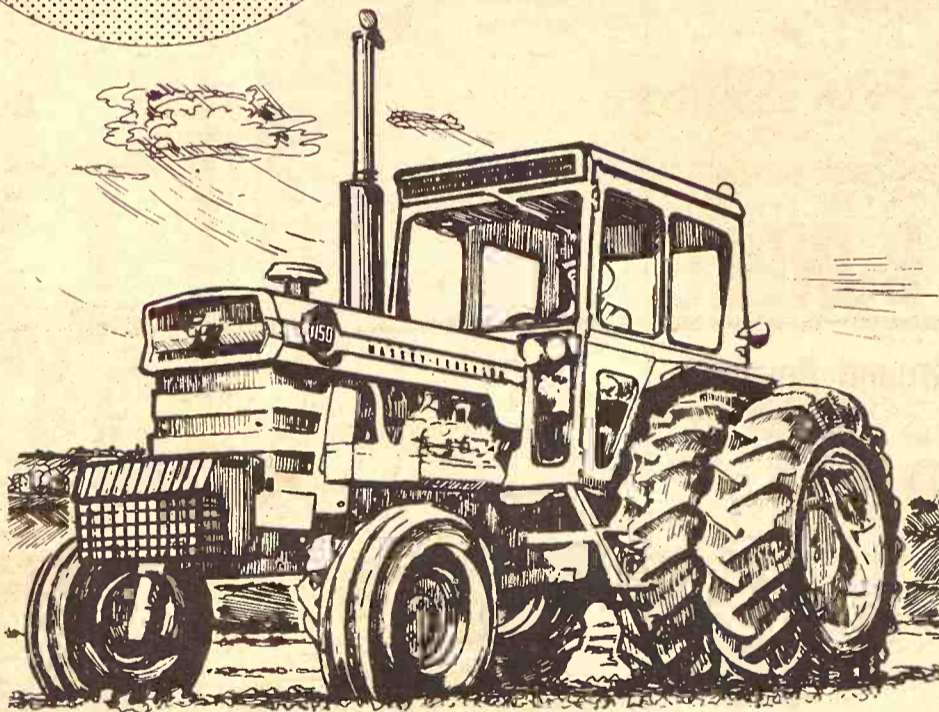
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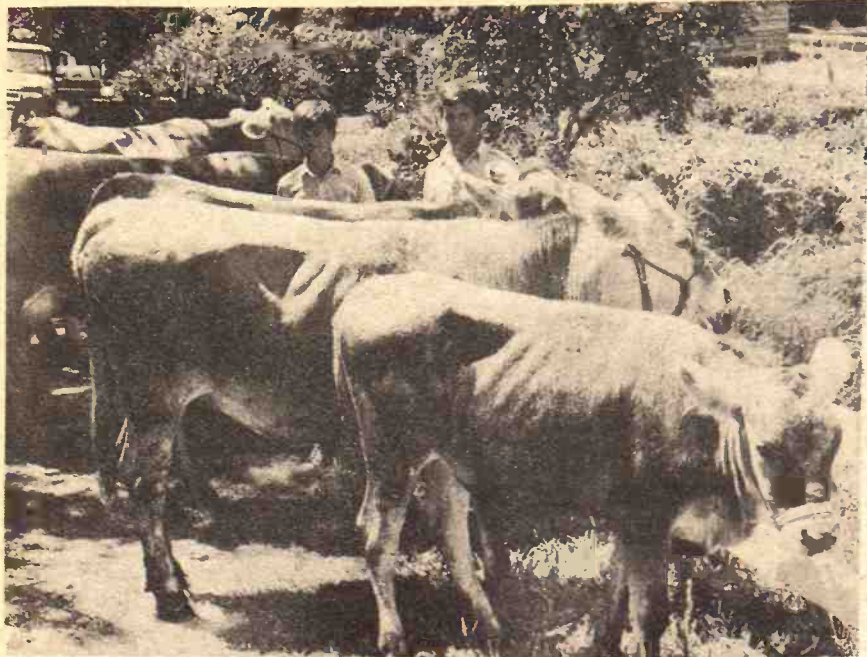

Sharecroppers Group Laments Subsidy Program

The National Sharecroppers Fund says the government's farm subsidy policies have made big, rich farmers richer and driven more than 2.7 million farmers off the land since 1950.

A report released by the fund said the nation's farm population has dropped from 23 million to 9.7 million in 20 years through a mass migration of small farmers and their families to urban areas.

Black farmers are the chief victims of federal policy, the report said, with black-operated farms dropping from 560,000 in 1950 to 98,000 now. Total black farm

population fell from more than 3 million to 938,000 in the period, the report said.

The report said 46 per cent of the \$3.7 billion the U.S. Department of Agriculture paid out last year in farm subsidies went to fewer than 5 per cent of all farmers.

"In the name of 'the most efficient agriculture in the world,' federal policy has abetted through sumptuous subsidies the growth of bigger and richer farmers," the report said. "Small operators have been driven off the land, as much victims of government policy as of competition."

The report said the Department of Agriculture also has helped big farmers at the expense of small ones through its research programs developing new crops, fertilizers, pest controls, irrigation techniques and labor-saving machinery.

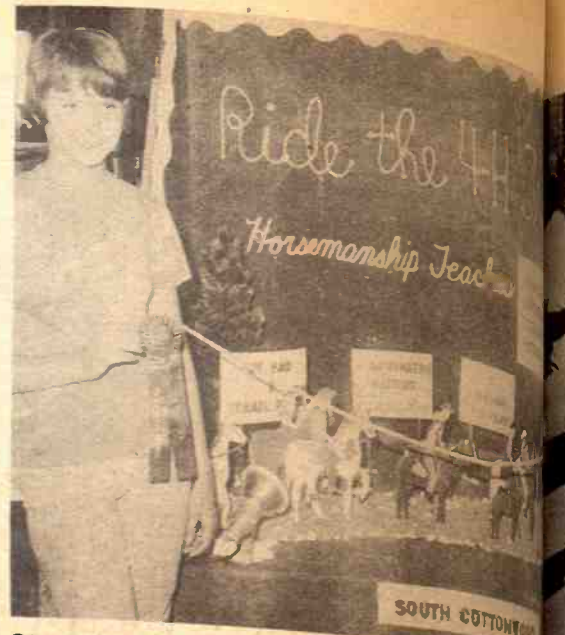
McPherson 4-H Fair Next Week

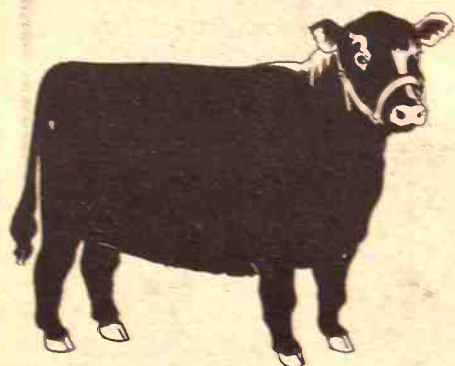

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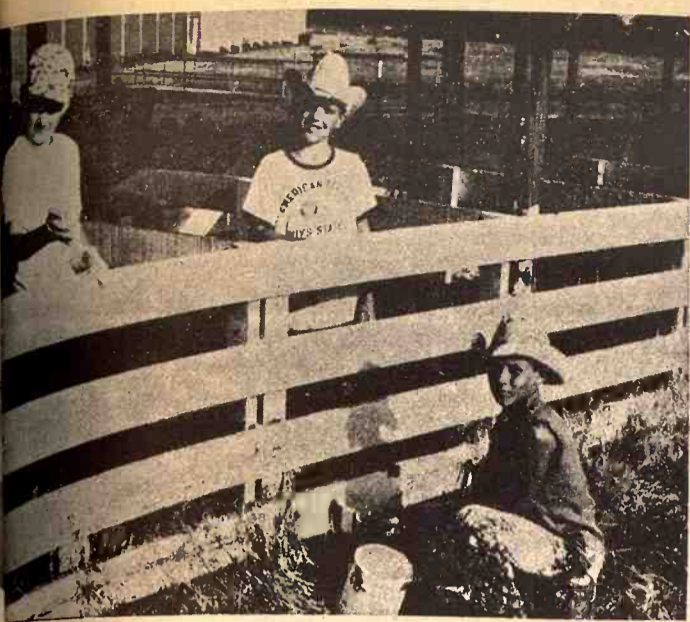


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CLEANUP AT McPHERSON

Interest Lag By Deerhunters

Sportsmen are thinking hunting, but not seriously enough, according to game commission personnel. The bird hunters are out in force with scatterguns, busting the blue rock at trap ranges and generally preparing for the season when their bird bag success will depend on shooting skills despite cold fingers and gusty winds. But the Kansas big game hunters are dilly-dallying, the game officers claim, and deer hunting applications are lagging while deadlines near. The commission began accepting deer hunting permit applications July 1 and by July 24 had received applications for 5,003 of the 8,665 firearms permits available. The state agency does no honor firearms applications postmarked after July 31. Commission staffers were hopeful hunters will not deluge the office

with applications to be processed in the last few days of the period. Archery deer hunters have longer to apply for permits and the archers are dragging their feet more than the gunners. Only 500 archery applications had been received by July 24. Last year, the archery permit count was 4,467. Aug. 25 is the cut-off date for archers. The game officers warned that persons who waited until the deadline to apply for firearms permits take a chance on not having their letters processed prior to the Aug. 11 drawings for valid permits in deer management units where applications exceed the quotas.

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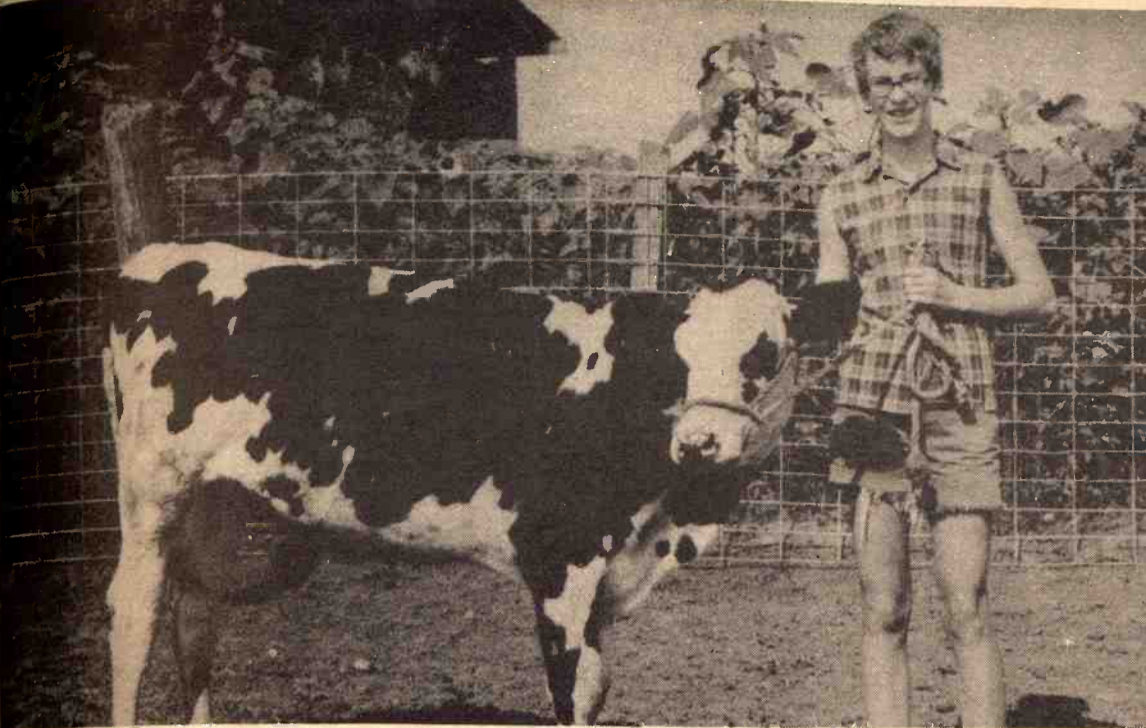

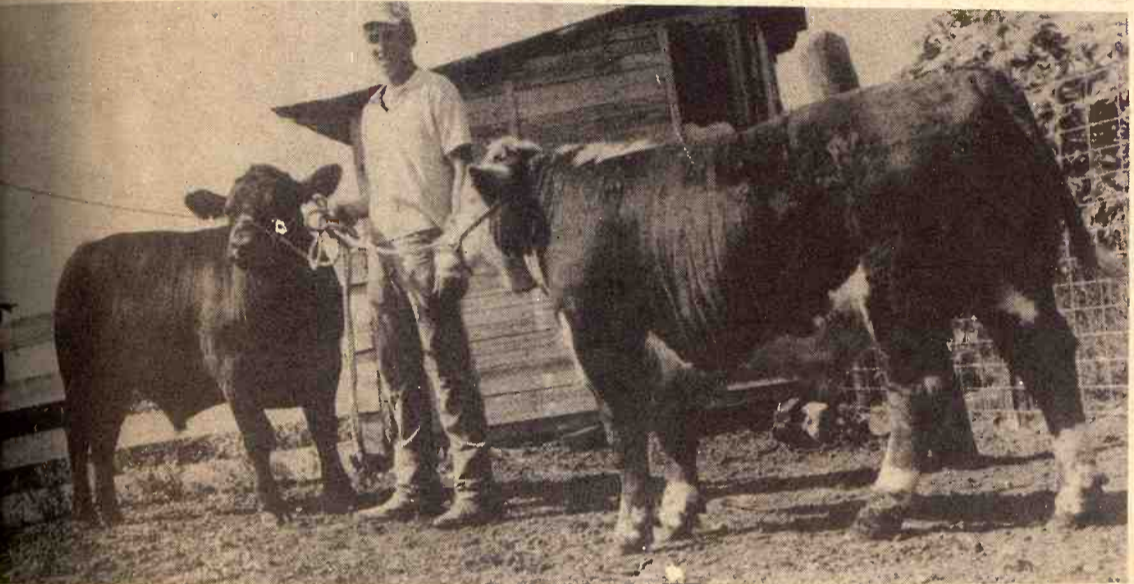

Don't Panic With Blighted Corn For Silage

Dairymen considering cutting blight-affected corn for silage shouldn't push the panic button.

That word of caution is from Dr. Dick Dunham, Extension dairyman at Kansas State University.

"While some heavily infected fields seem dry because of the browning of leaves, the corn plants may not be as dry as they appear," says Dunham. "And wet silage does not make good dairy feed."

If their corn was originally planted for grain, not forage, most dairymen would be wise to wait and see how much grain damage is done by the blight.

At the present time, Kansas blight damage is not extensive and the prospects of harvesting a bountiful corn crop from most fields are promising. If the blight does heavily damage a field, there's still plenty of time to ensile the crop, Dunham says.

Research shows that cows eat less silage and produce less milk when fed silage containing less than 30 percent dry matter. In addition, more nutrients are lost due to seepage when the silage is too wet for good feed.

"Don't get too excited about ensiling blight-damaged corn yet' because the stalks still may contain

a lot of moisture," says Dunham. The dairyman suggests the addition of chopped hay or ground grain if corn is ensiled before the dry matter content reaches 30 to 35 percent.

Are there any hazards in feeding blight-damaged corn silage? Dunham says scientists have been unable to find any animal health problems associated with southern corn leaf blight.

"Blight infection of the corn plant may enhance subsequent mold growth both in the field or silo," adds Dunham. "For this reason it becomes more important to follow silage-making practices that help exclude oxygen from the silage. These would include fine chopping to obtain good packing and sealing techniques which help to exclude air."

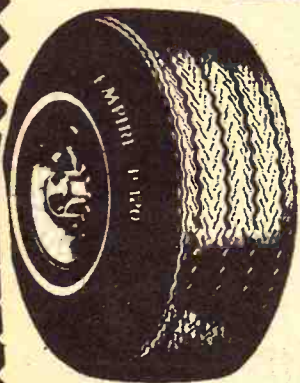
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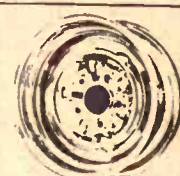

New Plant For Grass & Grain By Fall

Ag Press Inc., the corporation which owns Grass & Grain, will move this fall from its location at 1207 Moro, in Aggieville near the Kansas State University campus, to new quarters in southwest Manhattan.

The office and plant of the Allied Farm Equipment at 1635 Yuma has been sold to Dean Coughenour and his wife Verla. Coughenour is general manager and controlling stockholder of Ag Press.

The facility to which Ag Press will move contains 40,000 square feet and is on four acres of ground. The plant was built in 1946 for the Viking Manufacturing Co., a short-line firm which moved to Manhattan from Jackson, Michigan. The firm produced hammermills, mill mixers and grain elevators and sold them directly to dealers, many of them in the G&G area although the company's sales area was nearly nationwide, principally however in the midwest.

The company also had success with landscaping machinery and recently had worked on developing an electronic beet-thinning machine. At peak the company had over 70 people on the payroll and usually

had 40-50 workers.

Viking was sold in March 1966 to Allied Farm Equipment Inc., a Chicago-based implement distributor which had purchased manufacturing facilities in Canada and the U.S. in the 1960s.

Though officials said the Viking division continued to show a profit, Allied executives backed out of some of their manufacturing ventures after several years' trial, and they made the decision to close the Viking plant this spring.

Since May only a skeleton force has been at the plant, removing machinery and materials and winding up affairs of the company.

Ag Press, besides publishing Grass & Grain, does a sizable commercial printing volume, printing newspapers for other publishers, television guides, full-color programs and catalogs, and full-color flyers for shopping centers, supermarkets and furniture stores.

The company was one of the first in the midwest to switch to printing newspapers on a web offset press, using photographic methods to allow greater picture use, more color, and

faster speeds. In the last two years it became one of the first firms in the area to begin setting type with an in-plant computer.

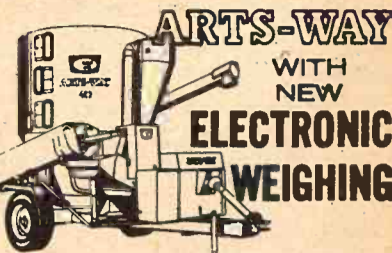
Coughenour said Ag Press's printing volume had a 14-time increase in the last decade. The firm has 25 employees, presently working out of two buildings which have only about one-fifth the space afforded in the new plant, which is scheduled to be in operation on October 1 or shortly thereafter.

Coughenour came to Ag Press in 1958. The late Ernest Woodward, state legislator from Oberlin, bought Ag Press from Albert Horlings, who had published a Manhattan weekly, The Tribune-News.

Coughenour and advertising manager Alex Goldberger decided to concentrate on Grass & Grain, a title given to a weekly advertising throwaway for a livestock auction.

The territory and scope of Grass & Grain was increased, and it was sold on a paid-subscription basis, emphasizing livestock and auction activity in northeast Kansas. It quickly became the large circulation newsweekly in the Kansas Press Association, even double the size of

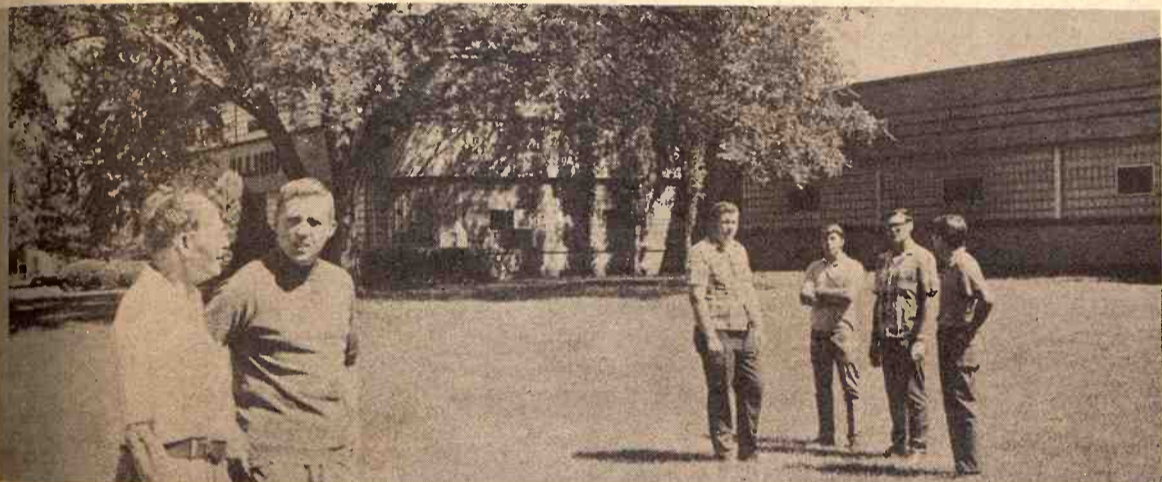

the next largest weekly listed. Presently the paid circulation of 14,000 plus over most of the eastern half of Kansas and southwest Nebraska is larger than that of all daily newspapers in the state except those from Wichita, Topeka, Kansas City, Hutchinson, Salina and Lawrence.

Coughenour said the real estate on Moro street would be for sale, as would continuous lots on Laramie street which contain two commercial buildings, a small house, and an asphalted 31-stall parking lot, which has been used by Ag Press.

Heavy Feeding Cuts Into Old Grain Supplies

Exports and heavy feeding continued to drain off supplies of old-crop grain during the year ended June 30, an Agriculture Department report shows.

Stocks of grain throughout the U.S. on July 1, the beginning of a new marketing year for wheat and some other small grains, were "well below" a year earlier, says the Crop Reporting Board. Large declines were reported for sorghum grain, barley, soybeans, corn and wheat. Holdings of rye, flaxseed and oats were larger than on July 1, 1970.

The supply of the four feed grains, corn, oats, barley and sorghum, totaled 60.7 million tons, down 21 per cent from a year earlier. Sharp declines in stocks of corn, barley and sorghum were only partially offset by a record-high supply of oats.

Stocks of all wheat on July 1 totaled 730 million bushels, down 17 per cent from a year earlier and 11 per cent less than mid-1969, the report said.

Rye totaled 27.9 million bushels, up 31 per cent on July 1 and the most since 1944, officials said.

Corn totaled 1.564 billion bushels, down 19 per cent from a year earlier and 24 per cent less than two years ago.

Old-crop oats carried over totaled 512 million bushels, up four per cent and a record for July, the report said. Barley was put at 156 million, down 34 per cent.

Sorghum grain totaled 178 million bushels, only half on hand a year earlier and the smallest since July 1, 1957, the end of the drought era of the early 1950s.

What Grain Stock Report Means

The quarterly report of grain stocks for July is of special interest to farmers this year because of the growing shortage of soybeans and

the uncertainty about the destructiveness of the southern corn leaf blight.

Soybeans
Soybean stocks on hand July 1 were estimated at 283 million bushels, down 30 percent from a year earlier. This amount was a little less than many dealers and processors had expected.

It now appears that the carryover on September will be only 80 to 100 million bushels. That would be just about enough to keep the mills and export lines running until new beans become generally available in mid-September.

The shortage of soybeans appears likely to continue through the next marketing year. The 1971 crop probably will total between 1,150 and 1,200 million bushels. This is no more, and possibly less, than the amount being used and exported this year, which will be just under 1,200 million bushels.

Corn
Stocks of corn on hand July 1 were listed at 1,560 million bushels, down 19 percent from last year. This figure indicates that the disappearance of corn during the April-June quarter was about 967 million bushels, 10 percent less than in 1970. For the first three quarters of this marketing year, the use and exports of corn apparently totaled about 3,550 million bushels, 6 percent less than one year earlier.

It now appears that the use and exports of corn this year will be about 4.4 billion bushels, 6 percent less than in 1969-70. If so, the carryover of old corn on October 1 will be around 700 million bushels, down from 1,000 million last fall.

The size of this year's corn crop is still uncertain. Even if the blight attacks corn with T-cytoplasm as vigorously as it did last year and if other corn produces an average yield, total production would be 4.5 to 4.6 billion bushels. That would be considerably more than the 4.4 billion being used and exported this year.

Other Feed Grains
The carryover of old oats on July 1 was estimated at 512 million bushels, up 4 percent from a year before. On the first of July, the new oat crop was forecast at 851 million bushels, down 6 percent from last year. Thus the total supply for this year was 1,363 million bushels, 3 percent less than a year ago.

The carryover of barley was reported at 156 million bushels, off 34 percent from 1970. This year's crop has been forecast at 463 million bushels, up 13 percent. The total supply, then, appears to be around 619 million bushels, or about 5

percent short of the supply available last year.

Stocks of sorghum grain remaining on hand July 1 were estimated at 178 million bushels, only about half as much as last year. Farmers increased sorghum grain plantings by about 21 percent this year. Average yields per acre may be held below 1970 levels because the drought in the Southern Plains is worse this year.

Six hours later Col. Stanley Stout's gavel hammered out the final sale after 1,872,792 Red Circle Stamps had paid for 15 registered CK Hereford heifers, 30 Hereford and Shorthorn steers, 40 registered Hampshire and Duroc gilts, 2 Holstein heifers, 10 Suffolk ewe lambs, and 10 portable electric sewing machines.

Hard Wheats Show Up Well In Feed Test

Two hard red winter wheat varieties caused steers to gain faster and more efficiently than two soft wheat varieties in an experiment at Kansas State University's Fort Hays Branch Experiment Station.

Golden-50 and Scout, the hard red winter wheats; Gaines and Stadler, the soft varieties, and milo were compared with and without added fat.

After 74 days of the trial, one pound of packinghouse fat was added to the ration of steers in one of each pair of lots.

The fat addition was tested for 54 days until the end of the trial.

Average rate of gain from the two hard wheats was 2.76 pounds compared with 2.58 for the soft wheats. There was no difference in gain between the hard wheats and milo. Gain efficiency was less with Stadler than the other wheats.

Fat increased average daily gain significantly when added to Gaines wheat and slightly when added to the milo ration. Net energy intake was less when fat was added in all rations except when Scout wheat was used. Carcass grade was improved only when fat was added to milo.

Winner of the \$300 scholarship at the college of her choice was Kayleen Harms, George, Iowa, who excelled in fashion design with her sewing machine.

6-County Study Puts \$\$ Lustre On Bromegrass

If the proof of a grass is in the pasture and the pocketbook, then eastern Kansas farmers should take a keen interest in a smooth bromegrass productivity and profitability study nearing completion in northeast Kansas.

Gerald McMaster, area crops and soils specialist for the Cooperative Extension Service at Kansas State University, stationed in Hiawatha, is conducting the multi-year, six-county study which involves approximately 30 commercial farms and a number of test plots.

McMaster says the study summaries show that timely and adequately fertilized bromegrass is a highly productive and profitable grass for eastern Kansas farmers. "We made no attempt to find out if bromegrass is more profitable than other crops," explains McMaster. "We only evaluated it for its beef, hay and seed-producing potential at various fertility levels and stocking rates."

The study was initiated in 1967 by Dean Dicken, who was then area agronomist, to be completed in 1971, five years later. However, the four-year summaries give a clear picture of bromegrass superiority.

To start the study Extension agents in Nemaha, Atchison, Jefferson, Doniphan, Jackson, and Brown counties, with the support of their Extension councils, located farmers willing to cooperate with the program and keep the records necessary to make the study valid.

Test plots for fertility and clipping studies were also located on the farms.

Once the farmers joined the team, the Soil Conservation Service made a detailed soil reading at each location so the influence of soil type on bromegrass production and response to fertilizer could be determined.

The Tennessee Valley Authority cooperated by providing 30-10-0 analysis fertilizer through local dealers at reduced rates.

Atchison county farmers in the program are Max Hargrove, Effingham; Milt Hines, Shannon; Don Ried, Atchison; Ed Schrader, Farmington; Harry Still, Potter, and Walter Yost, Farmington.

Brown county farmers cooperating are Ruben Finger, Horton; Don Knudson, Everest; Robert Korthanke, Morrill; Harold Neher and L. F. Rieger and sons, both of Hiawatha, and Shannon Nickelson, Fairview.

Doniphan county cooperators are Roger Caudle and John Atwood, both of Bendena; Ed Gordon, Highland, and John Halling, Leona. From Jackson county are Maurice Gilliland and Guy Grannell, both of Holton, and Lowell Moser and Clarence Vaught both of Mayetta.

Jefferson countians are Don Leu, David Perry and Waldo and Bill Schultz, all of Oskaloosa, and Herb Edmonds, McClouth. Nemaha countians are George Ackerman, Sabetha; LeRoy Becker and John Burdett, both of Centralia, and Lawrence Lierz and Wilbur Sigmund, both of Wetmore.

The farmers kept accurate records of fertilizer application rates, cattle stocking rates, and hay, seed, and pounds of beef yielded.

McMaster supervised the establishment of fertility test plots with assistance from Dr. Larry Murphy, David Whitney, and Roscoe Ellis, agronomists or Extension specialists at Kansas State University.

Here are the results of the study through the first four years:

- Calf on cow gains per acre averaged 206 pounds with a high of 214 pound in 1970.
- Steer and heifer gains averaged 201 pounds per acre with a high of 211 pounds in 1968.
- Seed production averaged 351 pounds per acre with a high of 407 pounds in 1970.

- Hay production averaged 2.47 tons per acre with a high of three tons in 1967.

The response of brome grass to various fertility levels was vividly displayed in the study. Pounds of air-dry brome hay per acre ranged from 2,314 pounds in unfertilized plots to 7,867 pounds when fertilized with 320 pounds each of nitrogen, phosphorus, and potassium.

The most economic fertilizer application in terms of fertilizer costs and hay value was in the range of 90 to 150 pounds of nitrogen per acre and zero to 30 pounds of phosphorus and no potassium.

A fertilizer application of 90 pounds nitrogen and 30 pounds phosphorus yielded 6,690 pounds of hay per acre. Valued at just \$15 per ton the hay was worth slightly more than \$50 per acre.

Summaries of brome hay production per acre in response to various fertilizer treatments are (the average of all six counties):

- 0-0-0 (no fertilizer), 2,222 pounds hay, \$16.67 hay value.
- 50-30-0, 5,004 pounds hay, \$6.70 fertilizer cost, and \$37.53 hay value.
- 90-0-0, 5,231 pounds hay, \$7.20 fertilizer cost, and \$39.23 hay value.
- 90-30-0, 5,747 pounds hay, \$9.90 fertilizer cost, and \$43.10 hay value.
- 90-30-0 (plus 15 pounds sulfur), 5,996 pounds hay, \$14 fertilizer cost, and \$44.75 hay value.
- 150-0-0, 5,837 pounds hay, \$12 fertilizer cost, and \$43.78 hay value.
- 150-50-0, 6,620 pounds hay, \$16.50 fertilizer cost, and \$46.65 hay value.
- 150-50-50, 6,239 pounds hay, \$19 fertilizer cost, and \$46.79 hay value.

Stocking rates for cow-calf operations in 1970 were .77 mature cows per acre and 705 pounds average weight for steers and heifers when turned on pasture.

Variations in stocking rates made the pounds of beef yield per acre vary from 103 pounds to 337 pounds for steers and heifers and from 124 pounds to 420 pounds for calves in cowherds.

Some pastures were grazed for a short season and then baled for hay, this made hay yields range from one-half ton to 5.1 tons per acre.

Seed production ranged from 100 pounds to 734 pounds per acre.

Preliminary results of soil type on brome performance logically indicate that more productive soils produce more bromegrass products than less productive soils, both fertilized and unfertilized.

However, a timely application of a balanced fertilizer considerably

narrows the difference in brome product yields between good and poor soils.

McMaster says the study shows just how versatile bromegrass can be as an income generator on eastern Kansas farms.

"Some of our farmers harvest seed, hay, and beef from their bromegrass in the same year. Those that manage it best reap the greatest economic return," he points out.

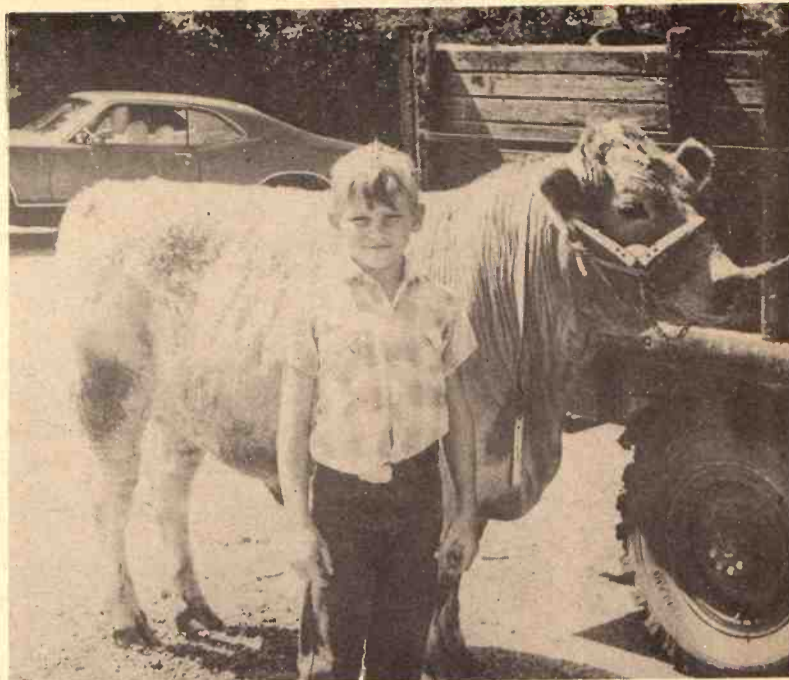

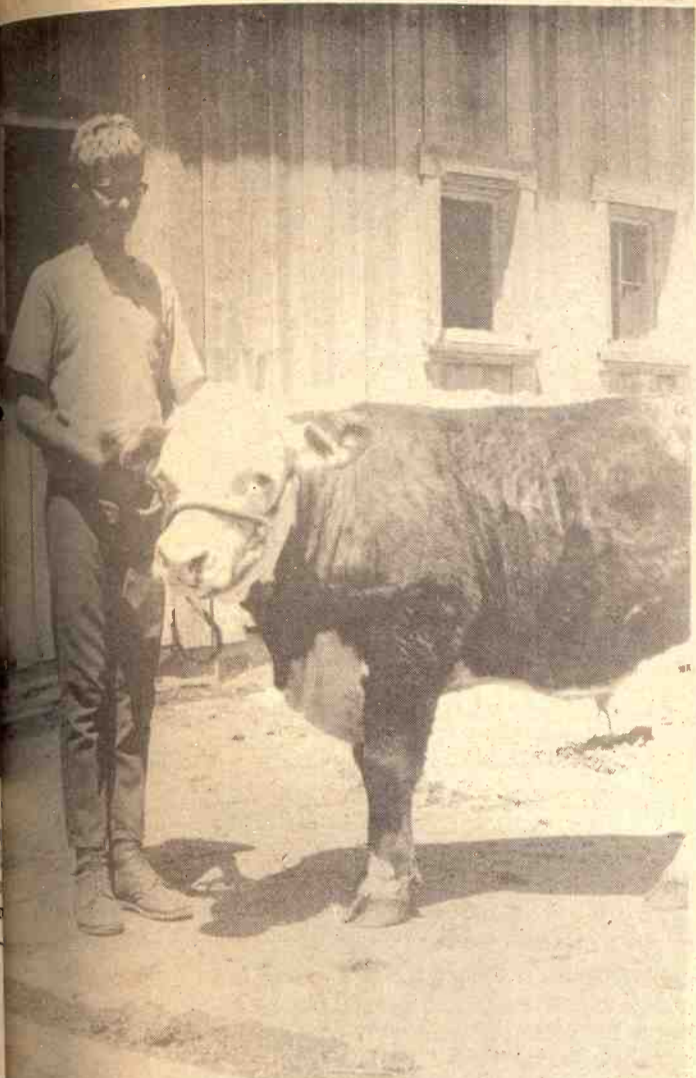

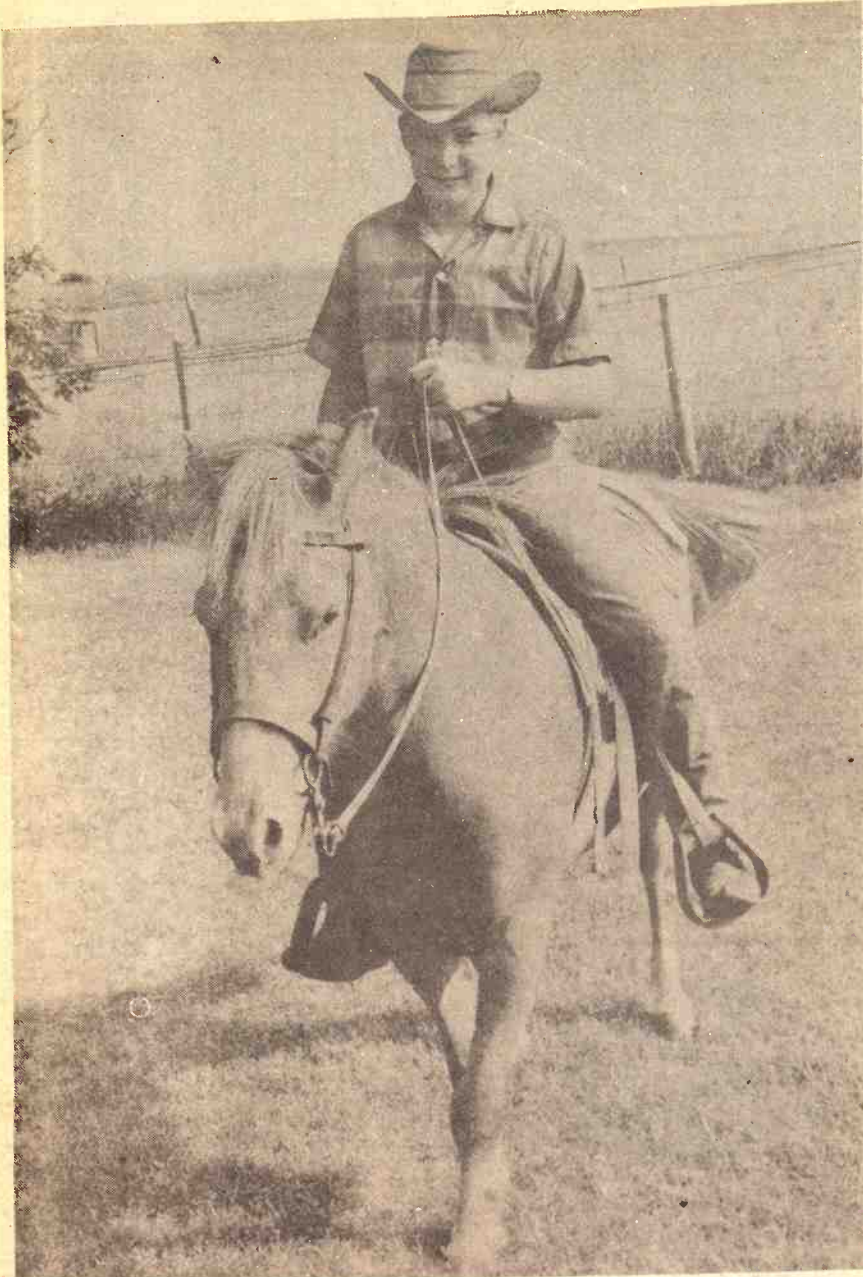

Differ With State Biologist On 2-4D Damage At Milford

JUNCTION CITY—No evidence has been found that 2-4D spray used by the Army in late April to spray 40,000 acres of the Ft. Riley military reservation entered Milford near here and killed natural fish food, the state Pesticide Advisory Board has ruled.

The 13-member panel held a public hearing on the use of 2-4D in Kansas.

The hearing was conducted after William Cole, regional fisheries biologist for the Kansas Forestry,

Fish and Game Commission, had charged the 2-4D used in the project killed 85 to 90 per cent of the Plankton in a part of Milford Lake, the largest reservoir in Kansas. The pesticide board found no evidence that 2-4D is harmful to zoo plankton or to phytoplankton, according to Freeman Biery, Topeka, director of the Pesticide Division of the Kansas Board of Agriculture.

The board found there was a substantial drop in the plankton count in Milford Reservoir from May to June but said the drop was not necessarily related to the spraying at Ft. Riley. The count dropped from 134 to 7 in the period.

The dropoff occurred in the same period when plankton count drops occurred in six other area lakes in

1970. The count at Stockton Lake in Missouri, dropped from 1,200 to five, Biery said. The board attributed the decreases to natural causes.

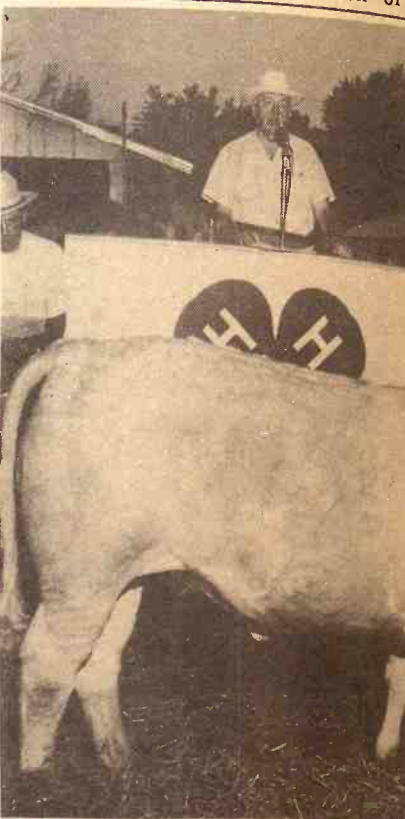

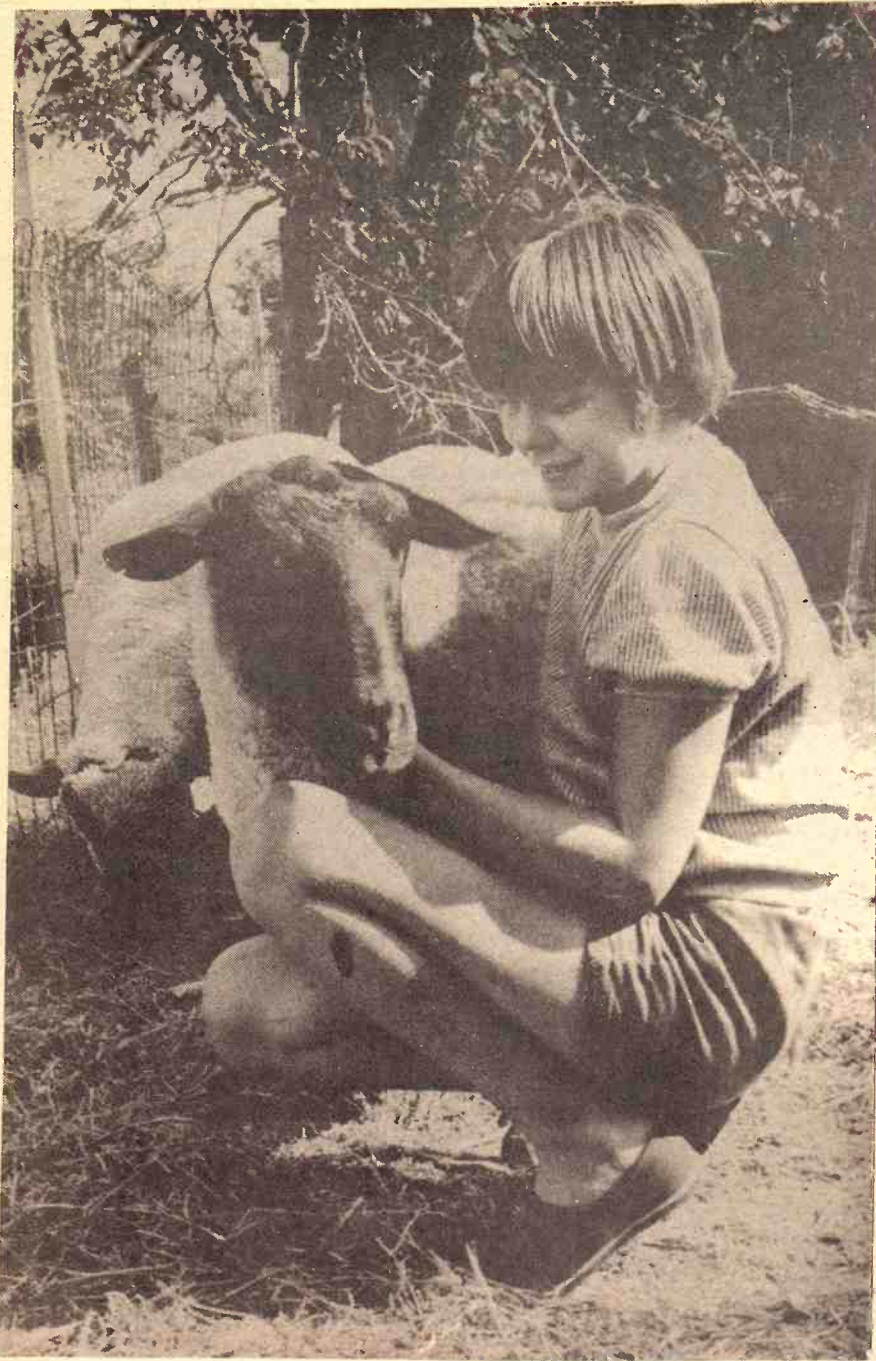

The improvements at the fair grounds are paid by the county. The booths in the Armory are rented from the Federal government and the rentals pay upkeep on the booths.

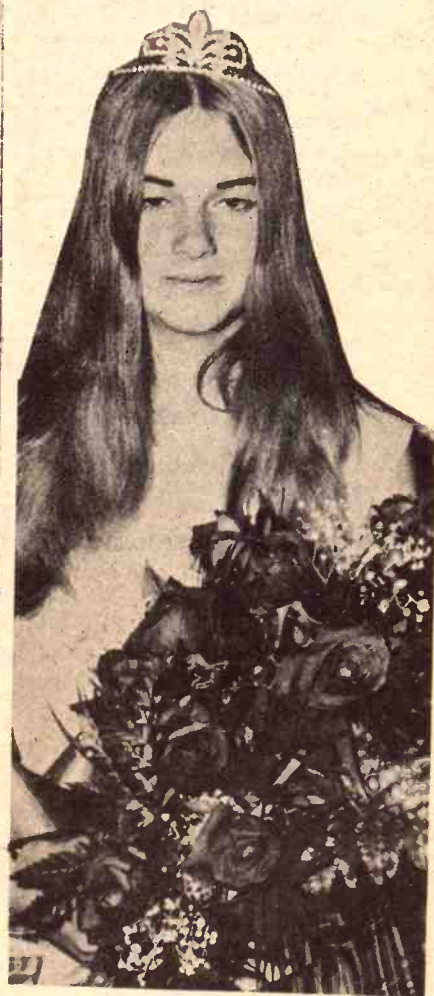
Space will be available for art displays at the fair, according to Glen Romig, fair executive secretary. He states that the idea of an art show in conjunction with the Clay County fair is new this year,

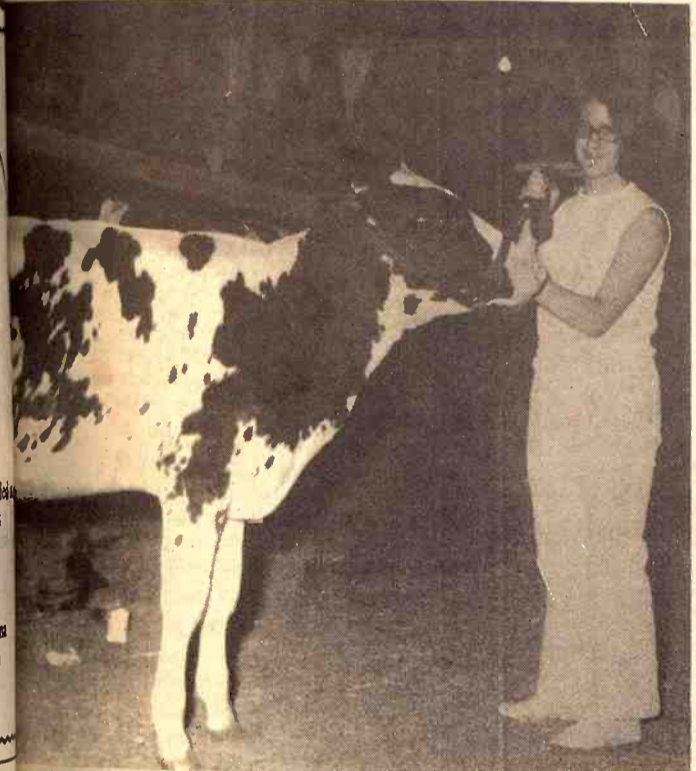

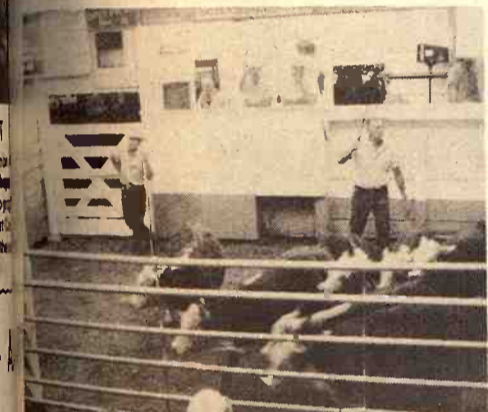
