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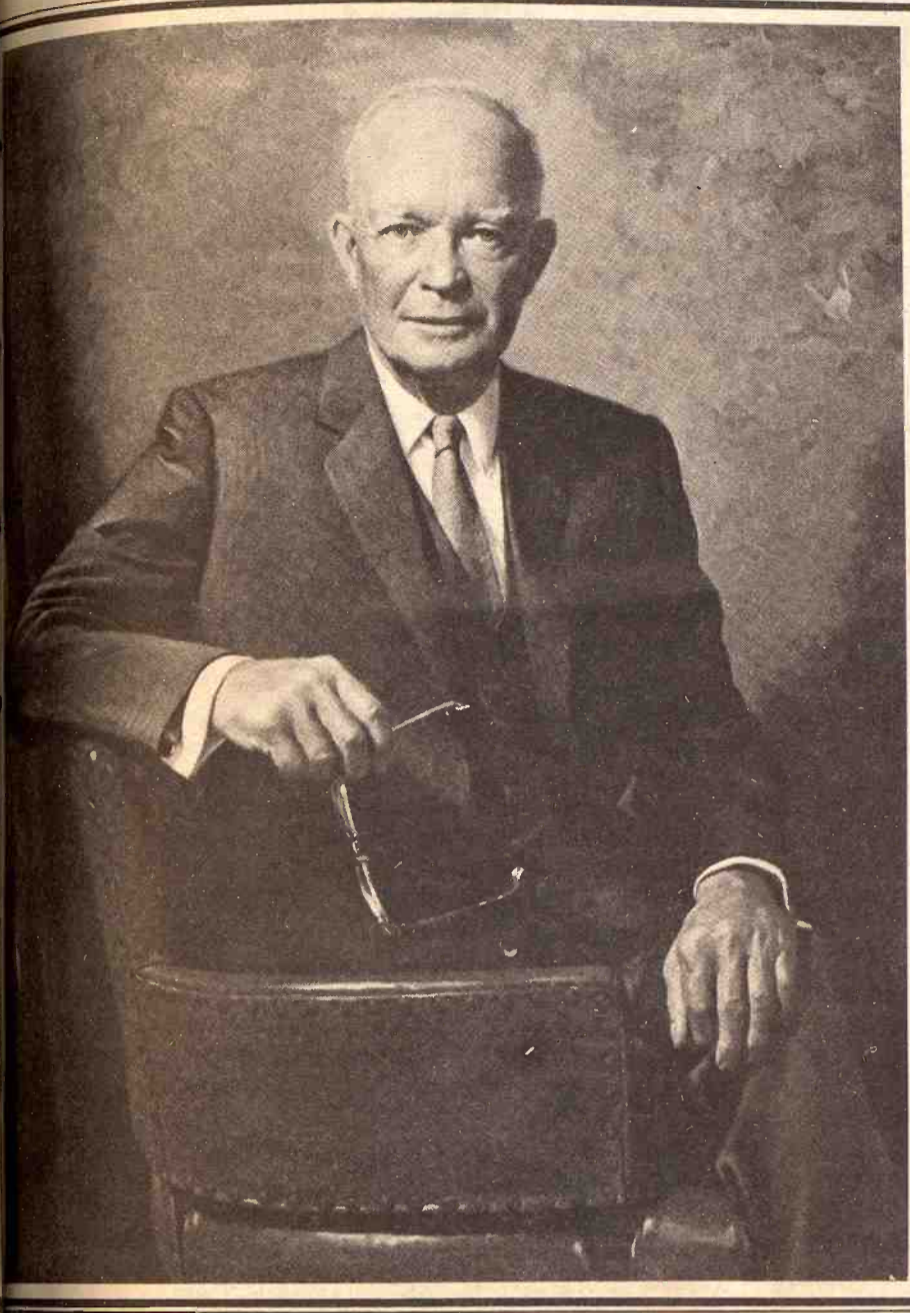
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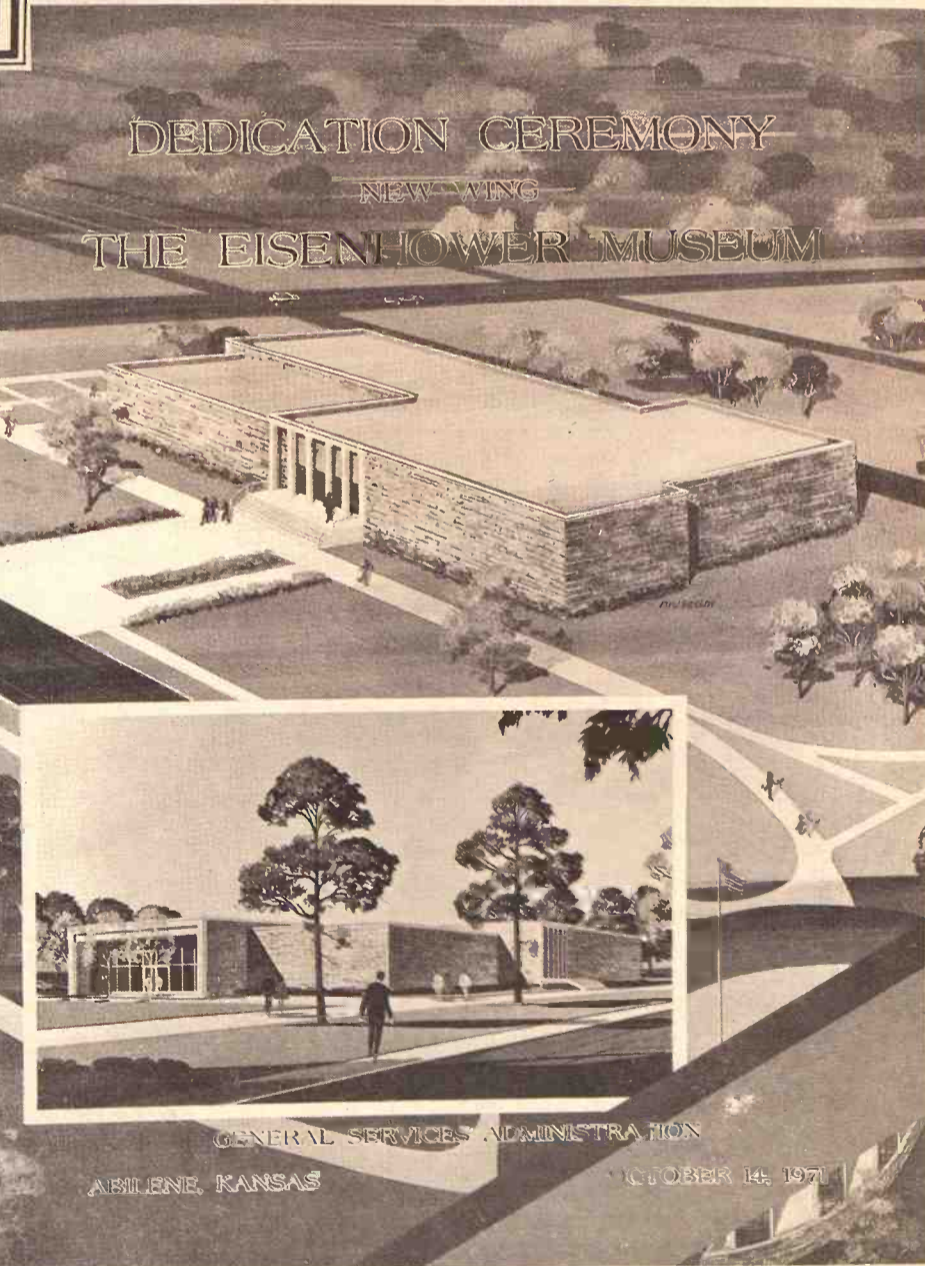
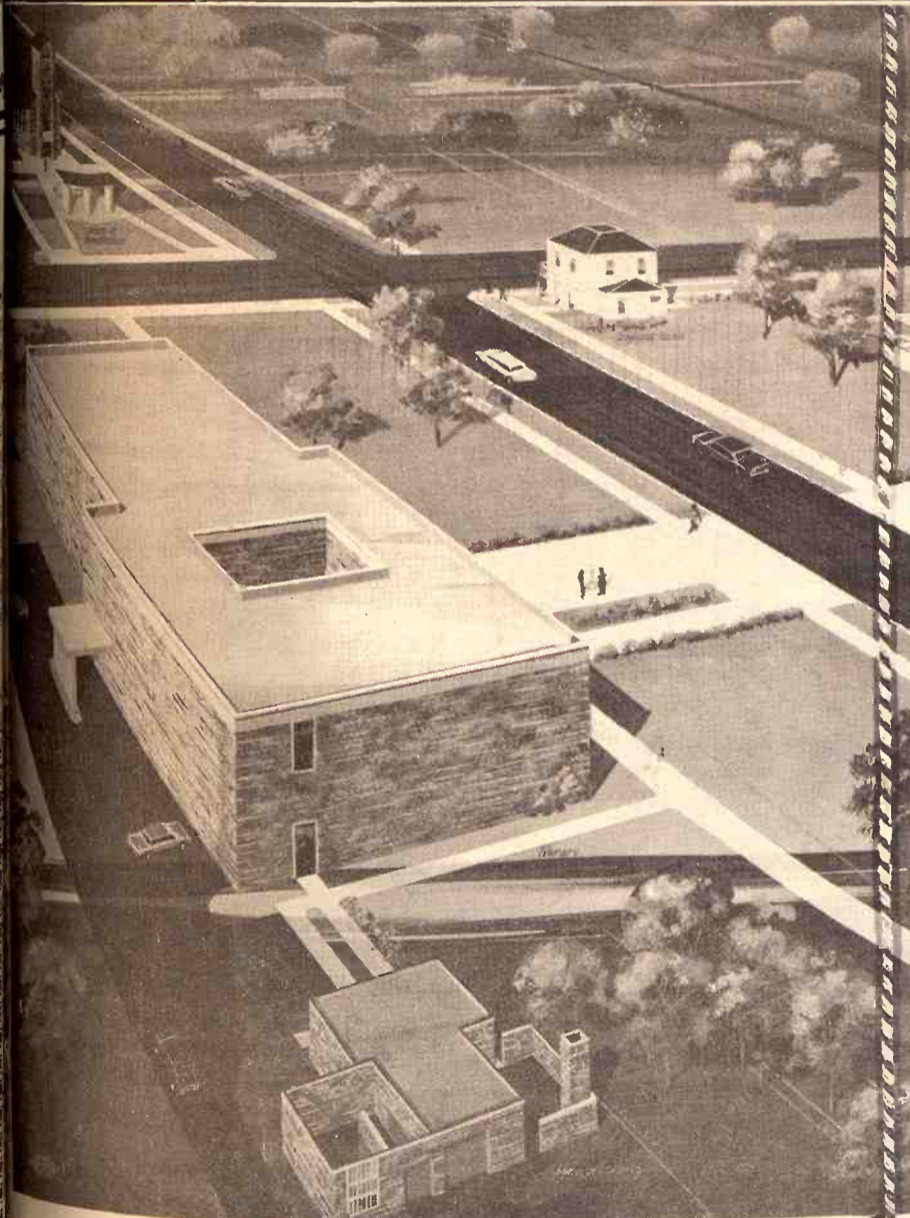

Closer Study On Cattle Respiratory Problems

The feedlot cattle industry, Kansas' largest, is getting a boost from a Kansas State University team of scientists studying respiratory diseases in feedlot and dairy cattle.

Respiratory disease is acknowledged as the number one illness in feedlot cattle.

The K-State team is dedicated to do anything it can to combat bovine respiratory disease, a source of economic concern to Kansas cattlemen and the various industries they support.

Dr. A. L. Burroughs, Dr. Russell A. Frey, and P. P. Suleiman of the KSU College of Veterinary Medicine and Dr. J. L. Morrill of the department of dairy and poultry science, have recently reported results of studies with a vaccine to combat respiratory infection in calves.

The team developed a vaccine producing a good antibody response. They believe that eventually industry must supply cattlemen with this type of vaccine because some vaccines now on the market do not produce sufficient response to protect against respiratory disease.

Asked why vaccines didn't protect

sometimes, the team members explained it like this:

There are two main types of virus vaccines, killed and live. Live virus vaccines are cheaper to produce and more profitable because, in the manufacturing process, they are diluted. Killed virus vaccines are more expensive because they are concentrated and require much more virus in each dose.

Live virus vaccines multiply in the inoculated animals and stimulate production of antibodies when the animal population has no immunity to the disease. But when a disease like respiratory infection, widespread in cattle, has to be prevented, a high degree of immunity is necessary.

What happens is that most animals have some antibodies, but the younger ones don't have enough to prevent infection in their respiratory tracts. The antibodies they have, though, are enough to react with the live virus vaccine and prevent it from multiplying and producing immunity.

So sometimes the live virus vaccine is not very effective. But it

is often very effective in populations having no antibodies against the particular virus.

Over a period of three years the KSU research team collected respiratory disease specimens from cattle. These samples were studied to determine what kinds of viruses were prevalent during outbreaks in feedlot cattle and dairy calves.

Dr. Burroughs explained: "We found that in feedlot cattle in Kansas there were mainly two kinds of viruses responsible for respiratory

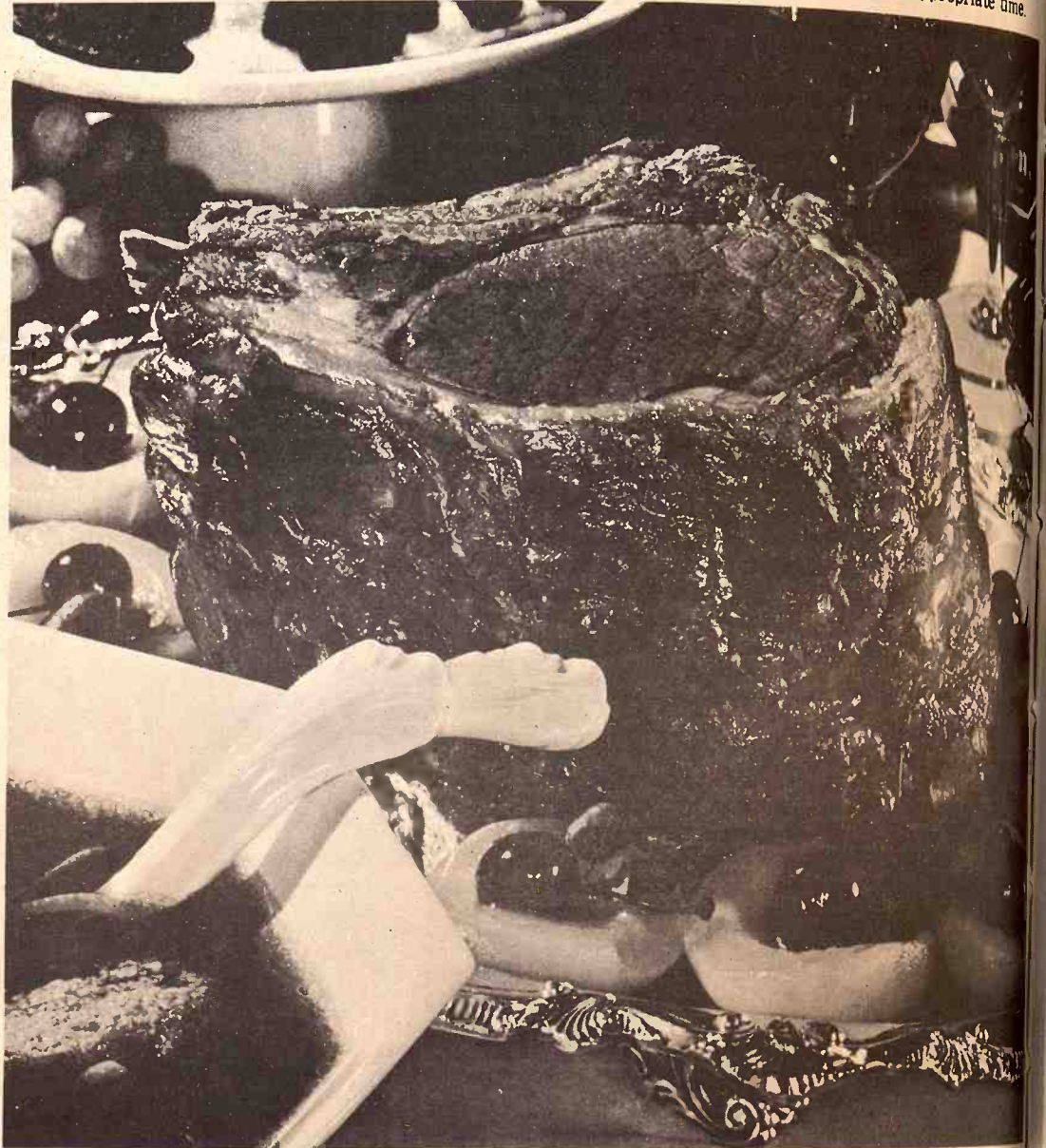
disease, Infectious Bovine Rhinotracheitis (IBR) and Parainfluenza Type 3 (PI-3).

"Both these viruses were common in feedlot cattle during all four seasons. Only PI-3 was common in dairy calves."

Team members pointed out that they wondered whether there might be some differences in the PI-3 viruses and whether this could explain reports from the field that the vaccines were sometimes not effective.

So they compared PI-3 viruses recovered from 40 different feedlot dairy cattle. They found the viruses were much alike and that a vaccine effective against one of them should be effective against all of them.

Asked what they considered have priorities in the near future help with the respiratory disease problem in cattle, these three things were mentioned: The continuation of study of respiratory virus vaccines, the development of a method to produce less expensive killed virus vaccines, and education of cattlemen to use the right vaccine and at the appropriate time.

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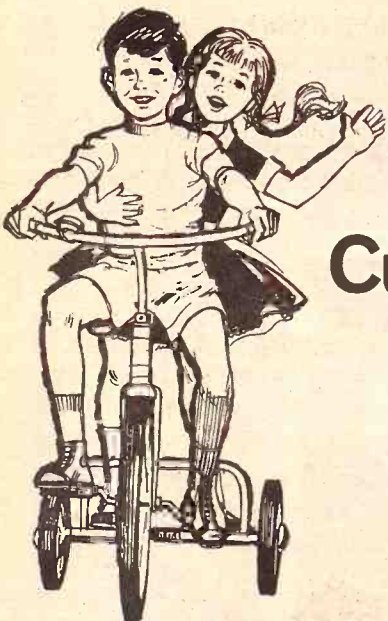

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ICC Says Rails Must Continue to Haul Livestock

president of the American National Cattlemen's Association said following an ICC ruling which denied the Rock Island permission to step out of the livestock hauling business.

Farr said, "This decision supports ANCA's long-held position that railroads have the legal obligation to provide livestock transportation services upon request."

At the same time the Commission said "no" to the Rock Island's

request, it did grant permission to the Soo Line Railroad to "flag out" of livestock hauling because of the limited amount of livestock business the rail line has had in the past several years.

Reporting on other railroad transportation activities, Farr said. "ANCA's Transportation Committee chairman Stanley Schoelerman, Spencer, Iowa led a task force into Washington,

D.C. to protest a proposed railroad livestock hauling rate increase. Schoelerman, and several other expert livestock witnesses presented testimony to the ICC in strong opposition to a petition by Southwestern and Western truck lines (except the Union Pacific and Northern) to increase livestock hauling rates by 15 per cent."

Farr summarized the main arguments against the proposed

rate increase this way. "These railroads have already received a 22 percent increase since the original petition was made. The additional 15 percent increase would further prohibit the free movement of livestock. Lastly, the increase would add to the already confused joint-line-tariff situation."



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Plugs For Minimum Tillage

Labor, time and machinery costs are reduced when fewer tillage trips are made across cultivated land.

This, combined with the fact that farm laborers are fewer and timely planting is becoming more important, points to a need for tillage modifications on Kansas farms.

Verlin Peterson, Extension crops production specialist at Kansas State University, points out that farmers who like to incorporate plant residues into the soil may find it more profitable to leave them on the surface to help control erosion, increase moisture infiltration, and decrease evaporation.

Peterson sees little need today for the traditional moldboard plow, although it is still needed in certain situations, such as when soybeans are planted in a field where corn or grain sorghum was traditionally grown.

Otherwise, moldboard plowing requires too much time and fuel, in Peterson's opinion.

He says more farmers are becoming interested in chisel plowing, a fact that he applauds. Chisel plowing leaves trash on the soil surface, is a faster and less expensive method, eliminates dead furrows, and works terraces easier.

Peterson feels disking seedbeds is sufficient for corn or sorghum

following soybeans, especially if the combine is equipped with a chopper or straw spreader. Disking has two advantages over plowing: 1) it costs less, and 2) soybean residue helps control erosion.

Once-over planters also figure in the tillage revolution. They combine primary tillage, secondary tillage, and planting operations of the conventional system into a once-over operation.

The moldboard plow, tandem disk, cultivator, springtooth harrow, and other tillage implements are replaced by chisels, disks, shovels, or rotating blades on the once-over planter.

Regardless of the method chosen by the farmer, Peterson feels the time has arrived to begin minimizing tillage operations on Kansas farmland.

First Foreign Aid To United States Since Revolution

West Germany is going to make some direct cash payments to help support U.S. troops there, producing a direct subsidy to the U.S. Government for the first time since French money helped win the American Revolution in 1776.

The U.S. figures it has been spending about \$1.2 billion yearly in foreign currency to keep 200,000 troops in West Germany. The actual costs in dollars are much higher.

West Germany is going to help pay part of the cost by spending some \$900 million for U.S. military equipment and will pay for much of the rest of U.S. spending with loans and direct contributions. But just how much hasn't been said by either government.

The U.S. Treasury says it wasn't certain of records on direct contributions from foreign governments but that a gift of about \$1.1 million by Louis XVI in 1781 may be the last one. The French king also loaned a great deal of money to the American revolutionists but that was paid back.



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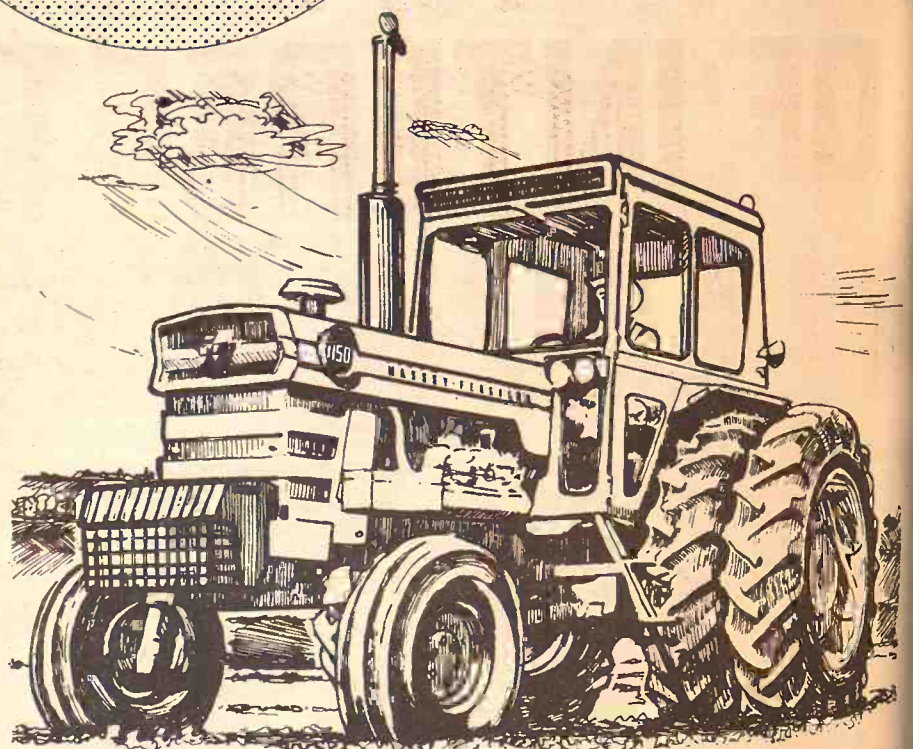
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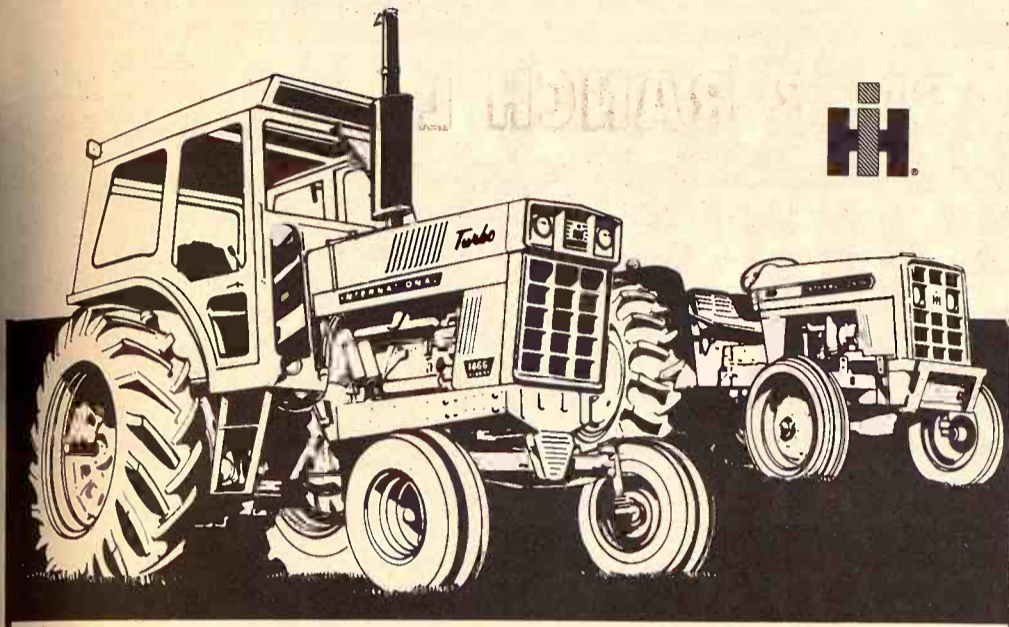
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Tornado-Spawning Clouds Mask Their Identity

More than 470 high-altitude flights to photograph storm clouds have failed to reveal any easily identifiable physical differences between storms that create tornadoes and those that do not.

Jean T. Lee of the National Severe Storms Laboratory, Norman, Okla., said the only outward physical difference appeared to be a relatively larger dome rising out of the cirrus clouds in storms that spawned tornadoes.

However the differences in dome size are too subtle to be detected by current weather satellites, he said.

Lee said it had been hoping the flights would reveal characteristics that could be identified by weather satellites to implement radar soundings in the forecasting of tornadoes.

However he is hopeful that future satellite cameras will be sensitive enough to detect such hard-to-see cloud characteristics.

The photographs, taken with special cameras that swept from one side of the image to another to expose a 4-mile strip of film, were taken from U-2 and specially equipped RB-57F aircraft flying 60,000 feet high and 10 miles away from the storm systems. Twenty-nine of the storms were tornado-

producers.

The cirrus clouds in a storm system are the flat, anvil-shaped cover through which the storm's core pokes its dome. The dome is the top of the updraft at the storm's core.

Lee noted that other scientists had discovered that the larger a storm's core the greater the likelihood of it producing tornadoes.

"That may explain why we saw larger domes in storms that produced tornadoes," Lee said.

EMPORIA BACK AS SUPER CHIEF FLAG STOP

Emporia has gotten back on the Santa Fe Super Chief run, now operated by Amtrak. Emporia, and Garden City too, had been designated a "conditional" stop on the Super Chief run by Amtrak, which meant that the train would only stop for long-haul passengers going as far as Albuquerque. The new designation as a "flag" stop, similar to the positions Emporia and Garden City had before Amtrak took over the service this summer, means the Super Chief will stop for any passenger at either station.

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Another Hospital Quits Long-Term Care

ABILENE—The Abilene Memorial Hospital long-term care unit will be closed Dec. 1, E. A. Morse, chairman of the hospital district board, has announced. The decision was based on a feasibility study which showed the annex's physical plant does not conform to the latest standards of either the Kansas State Department of Health or the Joint Commission on Accreditation of Hospitals, according to Morse. Current occupancy is 23 patients.

The facility originally was built adjacent to the hospital to serve as a nurses residence. It was not fully utilized for that purpose and several years ago was converted into a long-term care unit, operated by hospital personnel and under hospital administration.

Another factor influencing the

decision was a new Medicare ruling requiring the cost of long-term patients to be applied to the average cost for all patients. Under such a determination a drastic reduction in reimbursement for Medicare patients in the acute section of the hospital would result said Robert Holtzen, administrator.

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High-Risk Drivers To Pay More For Coverage

Drivers considered the worst risks by automobile insurance companies will be able to obtain more coverage under a new state plan, but their premiums could be 2 1/2 times as high as those paid by less accident-prone drivers.

The new plan expanding the auto insurance coverage available to high-risk drivers was announced by Fletcher Bell, Kansas insurance commissioner.

It would enable a driver who formerly could obtain only liability coverage through the state's assigned risk plan to also obtain comprehensive and collision coverage on his car and medical payments coverage for himself and his passengers.

The maximum liability coverage he can obtain also was raised. And under the new plan, eligibility requirements for assigned-risk coverage are removed, so that any driver with a valid drivers license can obtain the coverage if he can pay for it.

Liability automobile insurance protects a driver against possible liability for another person's costs for property damage and hospitalization caused in an accident. Collision and comprehensive coverage pays a driver's bills for damage to his own car.

Bell said the new base rate on liability coverage for assigned-risk

drivers — the rate from which the other rates are figured — is 10 percent above the rates for non-assigned-risk drivers.

High-risk drivers with a clear record — no accidents nor traffic violations — will receive a 10 percent discount from this assigned-risk base rate. Assigned risk rates will increase according to a point system based on the number and severity of accidents and violations. The worst risks, Todd said, will pay rates 150 percent above the assigned-risk base rate.

This is the rate charged assigned-risk drivers who accumulate seven or more points under the point system. For example, a driver is charged six points for one DWI conviction during a three year period, five points for having no license plates, four points for reckless driving, and two points for an accident causing damage of \$100 or more.

Two points cause an increase in the assigned-risk base rate by 10 percent. Four points mean a 50 percent increase, five points a 75 percent increase, and six points a 100 percent increase.

The same assigned-risk base rate and point system applies to collision coverage. The assigned-risk rates for comprehensive coverage are a straight 50 percent above the

regular rates.

In providing an example for comparing a driver's premiums under regular rates and assigned-risk rates, Bell used a driver living in Topeka with a fairly new full-sized car who has had two \$100 or more accidents within the past three years.

He has \$10,000-\$20,000-\$5,000 liability coverage, \$5,000 medical payments coverage, \$100 deductible comprehensive coverage and \$100 deductible collision coverage.

If he were paying regular rates, his auto insurance cost would be \$266 per year. If he were under assigned-risk, it would be \$361 per year.

Under the former system, collision and comprehensive coverage was not available at any price for some drivers. Bell, in announcing the new plan, said the new system should help high-risk drivers in financing the purchase of new cars.

Financial institutions usually want borrowers to provide comprehensive and collision insurance on the vehicles they borrow money to buy, and thus high-risk drivers sometimes found it difficult to borrow money to purchase cars.

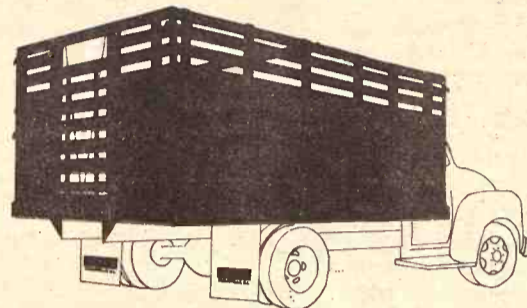
Europe Turning To Wheat For Livestock Feed

A surplus of soft wheat and a shortage of domestically produced feed grains are encouraging farmers in the European Economic Community to feed wheat instead of importing feed grains, according to a report issued by the U.S. Department of Agriculture.

The report by USDA's Economic Research Service analyzes the policies that led to the wheat surplus within the European Economic Community and outlines the major marketing regulations for grains for the six member nations. The report also touches on U.S. and German experiments on the relative feeding values of wheat.

The EEC policy of premium prices for wheat over feed grains resulted in the wheat surplus at the same time a booming livestock industry

Proper Application Of Nail Polish Important

A smooth, colorful application of flowing, gleaming nail polish contributes much to a total look of beauty.

Although the shade of polish is important, what is more important is the way you apply it. Here are a few suggestions to minimize the possibility of peeling or chipping:

1. Take your time. Be sure your nails are clean and dry before you begin the application. If a film of moisture or oil is present, the polish may peel off within hours.

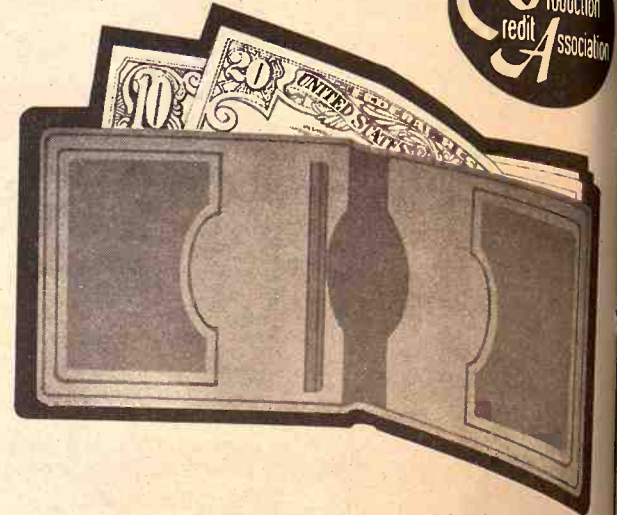
2. Always check the consistency of nail polish before using it. Too thick polish can cause peeling.

3. Allow the first coat to dry thoroughly before applying the second. If applied correctly, in an even film and using a minimum number of strokes, the polish should be hard enough to feel "slick" to a light touch within seconds after

application. Applying a second before the first dried is another cause of peeling.

4. Nail polish should be allowed to dry naturally. Forced drying by running cold water over the nails, holding them near heat may cause the enamel to begin chipping off in small, brittle bits and pieces shortly after it is applied. For best results let the polish set overnight.

Laundry Practices

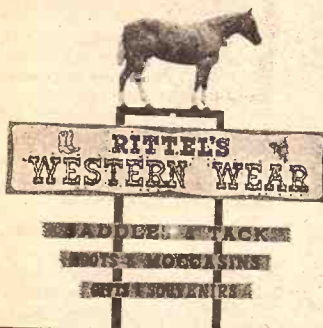

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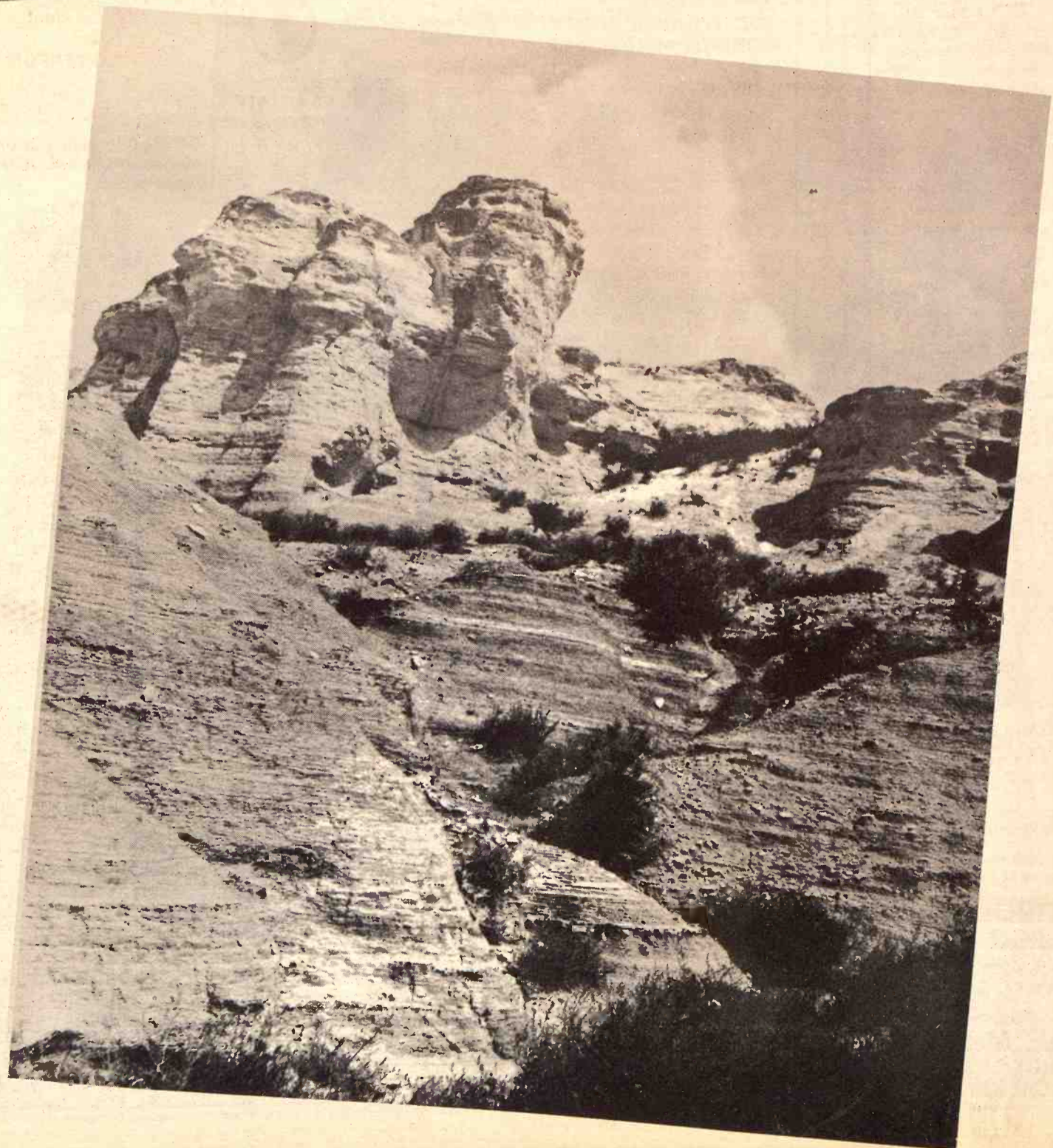

State Packers Slip Back On Red Meat Output

Slaughter plants in Kansas produced 152 million pounds of red meat during August 1971, up 25 percent from August 1970 and slightly below July 1971, according to the Kansas Crop and Livestock Reporting Service.

Cumulative production for the first eight months of 1971 totaled 1,196 million pounds, 22 percent above last year.

August beef production was 124 million pounds, up 27 percent from August 1970 but down 3 percent from July 1971.

The number of cattle slaughtered totaled 203,000 head, compared with 158,000 head in August 1970.

Average live weight per head was 1034 pounds, 14 pounds lighter than in August 1970.

Production of beef in the first eight months of 1971 totaled 961 million pounds, up 22 percent from last year.

Pork production during August was 28 million pounds, 17 percent above August 1970 and 12 percent above July 1971.

The number of hogs slaughtered was 183,000 compared with 158,000 during August a year ago.

Average live weight per head was 241 pounds, compared with 238 pounds a year ago.

Cumulative pork production through August was 235 million pounds, 23 percent above last year.

Lamb and mutton production in Kansas during August totaled 32,000 pounds, compared with 14,000 pounds a year earlier and 22,000

pounds in July 1971. Average live weight per head was 106 pounds, compared with 97 pounds a year earlier.

National Files, Controls On Auto Drivers?

The federal government has outlined plans for a major new program in the control of negligent drivers.

The over-all control system would require that a record be kept on each motorist from the time he first appeared for a driver's license throughout his driving career.

Douglas W. Toms, administrator of the National Highway Traffic Safety Administration, said planning for the new control system includes:

- Use of inexpensive simulators and test machines, to make the driver license examination a better test of both skills and knowledge.

- Extensive use of probationary permits, particularly for new young drivers. The permits would be cancelled as a pattern of devious behavior developed.

- Periodic re-examination, as already required in many states. "We would hope to increase the frequency from four years to perhaps two years, providing for rigid eye examinations, simulator and test machine retesting."

- The use of medical screening panels if any medical problems crop up. These would be aimed at suspending the licenses of deviant drivers and restricting those of persons with physical handicaps.

"With regard to our senior citizens we would in some cases restrict driving to daylight hours, to non-freeway roads, and perhaps to limited geographical areas," Toms said.

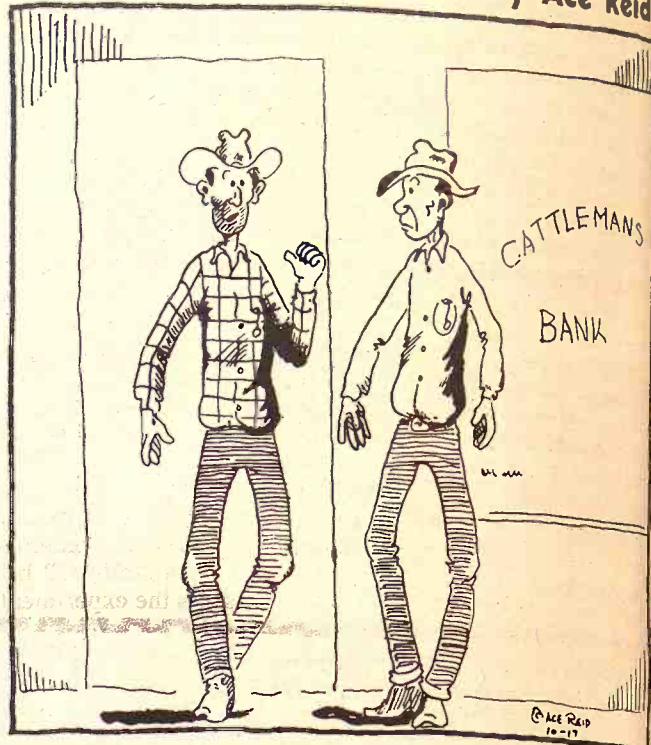

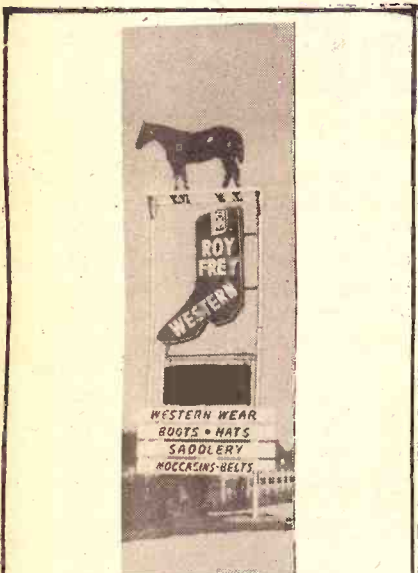

How To Improve Cowlots

Cowlots aren't things of beauty, even with good management. Ralph Bonewitz, Extension dairy specialist at Kansas State University, encourages dairymen to begin preparing for wet weather and snow next spring.

"And a little planning and timely action now can make winter more tolerable for both cow and man," he says.

"Of course, lots won't drain unless they are higher than the surrounding terrain. Many lots have become lower than surrounding ground because of cleaning and scraping operations over a period of years. 'Use some type of material to fill these areas,' suggests Bonewitz. 'Diversion ditches around the edge of lots may also help. Dairymen have gotten good

results with mounds of dirt in their lots. After all, half a lot above water is better than none, reasons Bonewitz. Mounds can be erected quickly and inexpensively, and are most effective when they allow cows to travel to the milking barn, eating areas, and water containers without walking through deep mud and manure.

The KSU specialist points out that well-drained lots help keep cows cleaner and make the job of washing udders quicker and easier. Filters may remove the sediment in milk, but they will not remove the flavor left by removed sediment.

In addition, cows won't get needed rest unless they can lie down out of mud and manure. They must eat well and remain healthy to produce well.

For the dairyman with free stall barns, efforts should be made to get the animals to use stalls. Sometimes more fill in front of stalls will help. Bonewitz suggests the experimental

use of various kinds of fill material and bedding so dairymen can achieve more efficient use of stalls.

Beetgrowers Close To Buying Own Sugar Plant

A new sugarbeet growers' cooperative has enlisted 92 percent of the 6,000 growers now contracting production through Great Western Sugar Co., with an eye toward purchasing the Goodland firm, it was announced at Goodland last week.

The 66-year-old company's parent firm is Great Western United Corp., a Denver-based conglomerate.

At a meeting in Goodland where about 300 beet growers, bankers and landowners appeared for a progress report, Robert Owen, who was removed as president of Great

Western Sugar Co., last June in a corporate shakeup, said he will manage the new corporation if it is purchased.

Owen said growers have agreed to a \$1 per ton checkoff on beets sold from the current crop to raise \$6 million as a down payment on the sugar company, the nation's largest.

Owen said the purchase price is estimated at \$120 million, including 19 refineries. Ten are in Colorado, four in Nebraska, two in Ohio and one each in Kansas, Wyoming and Montana.

The newly formed group is called the Seven-state Beetmen's Organization of Great Western Beet Growers' Co-Operative. It was chartered in Denver Sept. 15.

Santa Fe Shops May Have New Jobs Coming

The repair shops at Santa Fe's Topeka location may put some of its laid-off workers back on the payroll if Santa Fe accepts a proposal by Amtrak for a contract to repair some 1200 passenger cars which the National Railway Passenger Corporation now controls.

The Santa Fe shops are regarded

in the industry as first-class facilities. Santa Fe laid off 600 workers in August and has recalled only 300 of them since.

The work to be done on the Amtrak cars would include gutting, installing new seats and interiors, replacing wheels and making other major repairs.

House OK For Whitewater Watershed

The House Committee on Agriculture has approved East Sector Whitewater River Watershed.

The watershed includes 153,000 acres in Butler, Marion and Harvey counties. Shriver said 11,260 acres will be benefited by the project.

Principal measures planned include soil conservation practices on farms and woodlands and 11 single purpose floodwater retarding structures. The project will cost about \$3,381,000, with \$1,577,000 coming from federal funds.

The project still must be approved by the Senate Committee on agriculture.

Leland Elliott Heads State Land Brokers Assn.

Three G&G area men have been named to head for the coming year the Kansas chapter of the National Farm and Land Brokers. Leland W. Elliott of Washington, Ks., is president of the organization.

Other officers are vice president Theodore Derks of Shawnee Mission and W. R. Ames of Emporia, secretary-treasurer.

The annual meeting of the state organization was held recently in Johnson county.

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Wheat Exports Market Turns Gloomy

All of a sudden, the brisk U.S. wheat export business has taken on a gloomy outlook.

The Agriculture Department predicts that exports in the current crop season, ending next June 30, could drop 10 to 15 percent from the 735 million bushels shipped overseas in the 1970-71 season. Private exporters say the decline could be even steeper.

"We are confronted with increased competition from other wheat-producing nations and with . . . work stoppages at U.S. ports," explains an official of a leading exporter.

Moreover, other exporters contend that some wheat-buying countries are shopping elsewhere for their grain partly in retaliation to President Nixon's 10 percent surcharge on their exports to the U.S. The main reason for the predicted

downturn, though, is that wheat-sellers have more to export, while buyers need less imports. "Bigger grain harvests this summer and fall, together with continued strong competition among exporting countries, are expected to take the snap out of the world wheat trade," says the Agriculture Department's foreign crop service. Increased grain supplies in Europe, which was a major importer in the 1970-71 crop year, is an important contributing factor, officials say.

How much smaller the wheat trade will be is still a matter of conjecture among the authorities. The Agriculture Department's foreign service figures that world wheat trade will decline about 112 million bushels from 1970-71 shipments of nearly 2.1 billion bushels.

A few pessimists predict the world wheat trade could decline from the

1968-69 volume of 1.7 billion bushels.

All of which hits hardest at the U.S., the leading wheat-exporting nation. Total U.S. wheat supplies for 1971-72, including both estimated production and carryover stocks, are about 2.28 billion bushels, slightly more than the 2.26 billion bushels on hand the previous season. Carry-over stocks on July 1 were 730 million bushels, down from 885 million a year earlier.

But U.S. production this year was increased a whopping 12 percent, mainly to offset actual and predicted declines in feed grain supplies caused by a blight epidemic in the 1970 corn crop. For a while this spring even that big a boost looked like it might not be enough, as drought threatened the sizable wheat crop in the Southwest and grain men expressed fears that the blight would wither the corn crop

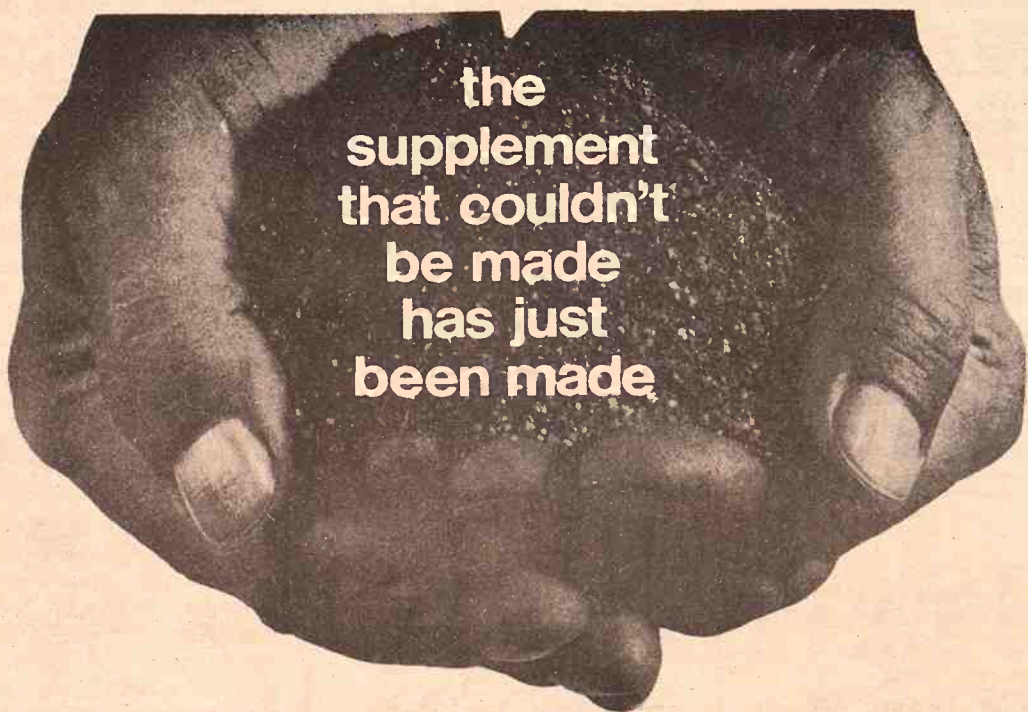
again.

The rains came and the blight didn't, however. Now the Agriculture Department predicts record harvests not only of corn and wheat but of grain sorghums and soybeans as well, along with record per-acre yields of oats and barley.

That means livestock feeders will switch back to the other, cheaper feed grains; the Agriculture Department estimates that use of wheat for animal feed is likely to decline 10 to 15 percent from the

1970-71 level of 214 million bushels. As the amount of U.S. wheat made into flour for domestic consumption varies little from year to year, the combined decline in the livestock feeding and export markets indicates a buildup of excess wheat stocks by the end of the current season.

The Agriculture Department figures that carry-over stocks next June 30 could be 120 million bushels greater than a year earlier, if private sources foresee a big increase of up to 200 million bushels. On the surface, U.S. wheat exports



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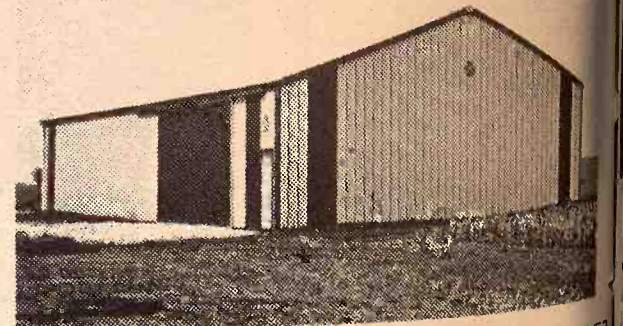
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appear to be nearly keeping pace with last year's volume. Since July exporters have shipped 140 million bushels, about 18 million less than a year earlier. But most of it was shipped from Atlantic and Gulf of Mexico ports under priority orders clear U.S. shores before shoremen's contracts expired at the end of September. Foreign buyers also placed extra orders for wheat as a hedge against a possible U.S. port strike, which helped keep export volume at a misleadingly high level.

This business will drop off even without a long strike at Gulf and Atlantic ports, exporters say. Strike buying will take care of many foreign buyers' needs for several months, they say, and other countries have preferred to do business with wheat-selling nations that don't have labor problems; some of these call for delivery through the first weeks of 1972.

Meanwhile, the Pacific Coast dock strike continues. Since it began on Sept. 1, exporters say, an estimated 1 million bushels of wheat exports have been lost, mainly to Canada and Australia, that can't be shipped after the strike is settled. In traditional U.S. customers as

the Philippines, Taiwan, Japan and Hong Kong have placed orders with competitors.

Other wheat-selling nations are filling their bins with grain aimed for the export market. Canada's harvest is expected to be about 500 million bushels, up from last year's purposely restrained crop of 338 million bushels. In addition, expected record crops of barley (600 million bushels) and rapeseed (100 million bushels) will give Canada ample supplies to compete for world feed grain sales.

Argentina planted 11.3 million acres to wheat this year, one million more than last year, and expected to produce a crop big enough for some export business; last year, Argentina was practically out of the export market because of a drought-reduced crop. Brazil has another record crop in prospect, reducing import requirements.

Estimates aren't in yet on Australia's crop, but exporters look for a big harvest because the country's surplus stocks were nearly eliminated last year. In the first nine months of this year, Australia exported 56 million more bushels than in the year-earlier period, primarily because of the West Coast dock

strike, exporters believe.

International grainmen say Rumania and Bulgaria are likely to be wheat and corn exporters this year, and the Hungary appears to have a record wheat crop, which means less imports. Grain crops in Poland have improved from last year, and Radio Free Europe, the Iron Curtain listening post, says Czechoslovakia is reporting excellent harvests.

"Russia, always a big unknown, set off much speculation about its possibly poor crops with their May 28 purchase from Canada of 2.5 million tons of wheat for shipment this crop year," says James R. Good, vice president of Continental Grain Co., a large exporting and merchandising firm. Russia also bought 500,000 tons of wheat from Australia for shipment in the first half of 1972. "These purchases, however, don't give us much insight on Russian crop conditions when we consider that the Soviets supplied 7.5 million tons of wheat alone to Eastern (Communist) bloc countries last year," Good comments.

Under such a law, a buyer is generally given the option of canceling within three days a contract he has signed in the home, provided the merchandise cost over \$50.

Slowdown In New Consumer Laws

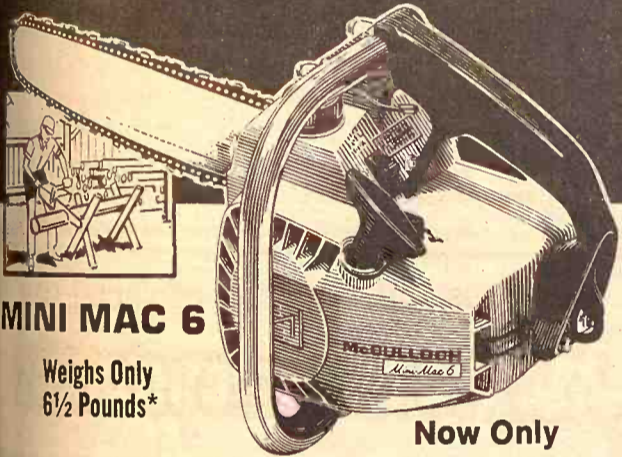
After scoring heavily in state legislatures over the previous two years, consumer advocates have encountered something of a slump in 1971 as few new major consumer laws have been passed.

But if the box score was not what some consumer specialists had hoped for, neither was it dismal. Five states joined the ranks of those with broad consumer protection codes and mechanisms to enforce them. Four others put "cooling off" periods on the books so families could have a chance to change their minds after buying expensive merchandise from a door-to-door salesman.

The "Holder-in-due-course doctrine, long a loophole for unscrupulous creditors and a trap for unwary installment plan buyers, was outlawed in several states. Two legislatures made unit-pricing mandatory in their states' food stores.

Perhaps the most encouraging trend in the eyes of consumer advocates was that toward com-

Cites Fertilizer As Bargain

Most farm production items cannot be purchased for what they sold for 25 or 30 years ago.

One item that has not been caught up in the inflationary spiral is fertilizer, and many Kansas farmers are missing a good bet by not using more of it.

That's the opinion of Jay Treat, district Extension economist at Kansas State University.

The farm management specialist, stationed at Iola, says fertilizer may be the best bargain available to a farmer. The cost per actual pound of plant food is about the same as it was during World War II in the early 40's.

Most other items purchased by farmers have at least tripled in cost since the war. For example, land prices soared from an average of \$25 per acre in 1940 to \$159 per acre in 1971.

Why is the price of fertilizer holding the line? The KSU economist

offers these considerations:

- Fertilizer is more concentrated now. For example, 18-46-0 and 12-24-12 are typical formulations used on many farms today, compared to 2-12-6 and 4-12-4 used 30 years ago. This means lower shipping, storage, and handling costs.

- Larger volumes are produced today, lowering the cost of fertilizer production.

- Technological developments in fertilizer manufacturing.

- Keener competition for the booming fertilizer trade.

Treat believes many Kansas farmers, especially in central and eastern areas, are not taking advantage of this. The greatest net profit from fertilizer comes from using it up to the point where the last 25 pounds or so increase average yields just enough to cover the costs of that 25 pounds, he explains.

Contrary to what some people say, fertilizer will not burn up a crop

when used correctly. In fact, fertilizer pays its biggest dividends during some moderately dry years. Phosphate, for example, speeds up early root growth, resulting in healthier plants that withstand drought.

Farmers will spend liberally on equipment, seed, and fuel to produce a good crop, but hold back on fertilizer, using plant food in relation to soil moisture at planting time, how much they think it will rain during the season, or according to their financial position.

Treat's answer: Use an ap-

plication each year based on average rainfall and soil test results.

The cost of seedbed preparation, planting, cultivation, and harvesting is about the same whether a crop makes 10 or 100 bushels per acre. Farmers in one Farm Management Association in Kansas spent \$34 an acre on these four items in 1970, compared to only \$8 for fertilizer and lime.

In other words, they went 80 to 90 percent of the way, cost-wise, and then cut back on a cost (for fertilizer) that was required for a good crop.

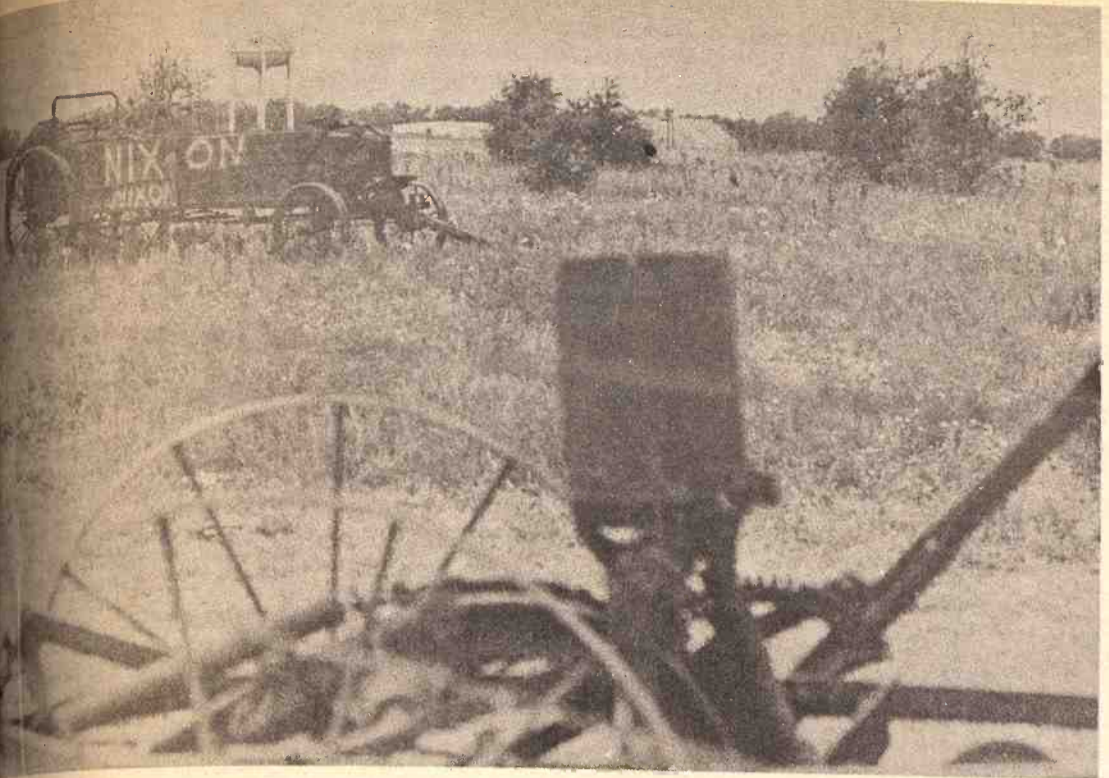

ANCA Seeks Exemptions For Wholesale Beef

The USDA is listening with a sympathetic but noncommittal ear to a proposal by the American National Cattlemen's Assn. that wholesale beef prices be exempted from Phase II of the Administration's economic program. Administration spokesmen say the

proposal is being given serious consideration in the formulation of plans to control the economy after the 90-day wage price freeze ends November 13.

The ANCA's plea for the exemption of wholesale beef prices is based on an attempt to let the industry make seasonal price adjustments. ANCA President W. D. Farr said the price freeze has prevented adjustments in prices on hind and forequarter cuts resulting in a lower-than-normal price for the entire beef carcass. This he said is

then reflected in the prices paid for live cattle.

He said the wholesale price could be allowed to rise and fall to compensate for the seasonal demand of various cuts without affecting the entire carcass price.

The prospects for a record crop of corn and other feed grains this year will help assure more beef in the future, Farr said. There is little likelihood, he added, that the huge feed supply will result in price breaks for the cattle market although feeders are expected to market heavier cattle later on.

2-TO-1 CHANCE AGAINST PICK FROM DRAFT POOL
There's about a two-to-one chance that a young man in this year's draft

pool won't be drafted. Selective Service said last week that men classified as 1A won't be called if they have a lottery number higher than 125. Earlier Selective Service said it probably would draft men who drew the first 140 lottery numbers.

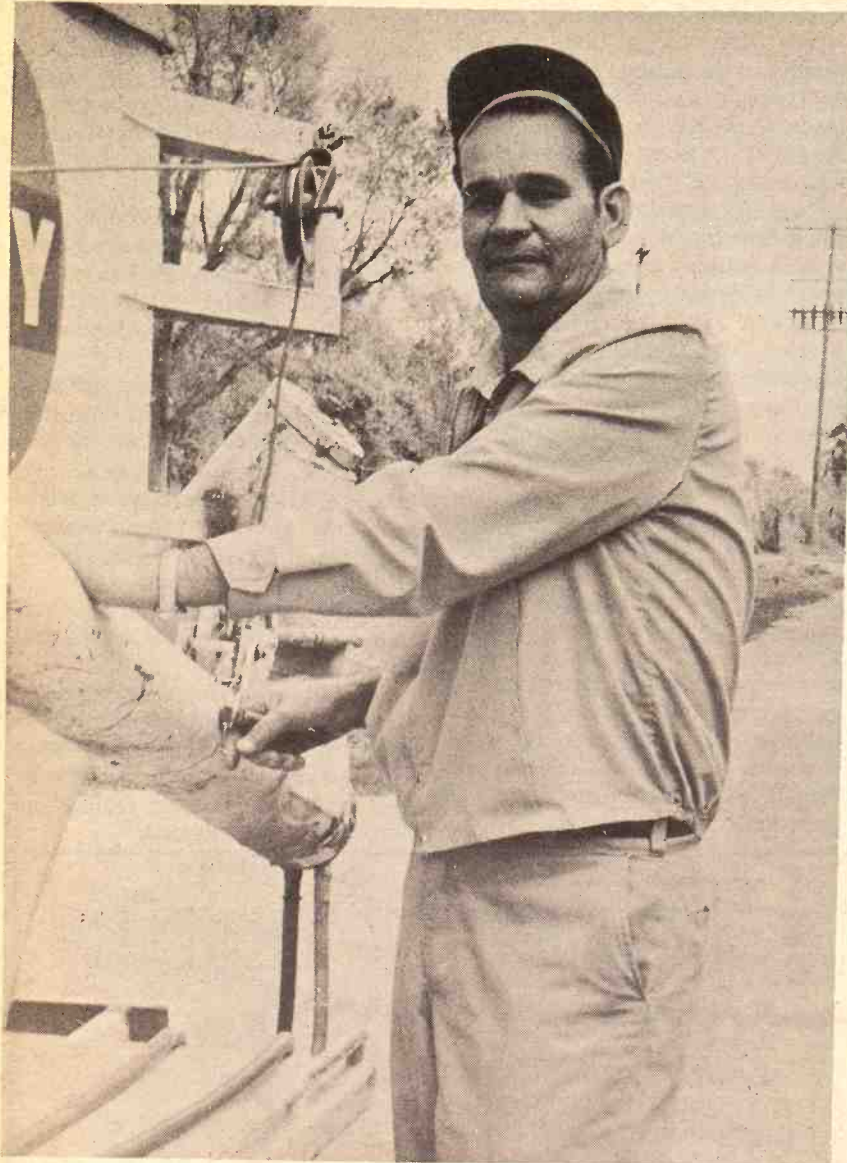

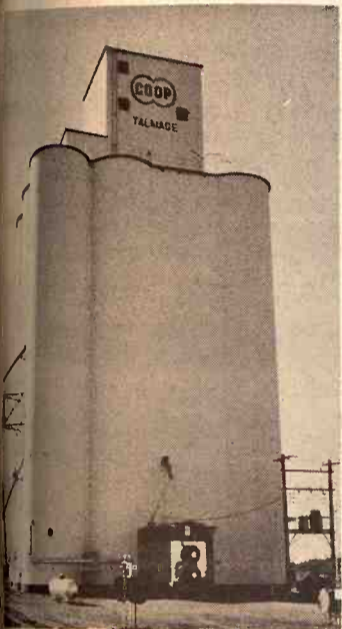


CONVERTS HOTEL TO FRENCH-STYLE HOME

There will be no change in workforce, however, plant officials say. The company is merely shifting production to pigments that do not contain lead.

Down-To-Earth Scope Of Swine Industry Day

Down-to-earth information about swine crossbreeding highlighted the annual Swine Industry Day at Kansas State University. More than 250 swine producers and others interested in swine industry attended.

Dr. I.T. Omtvedt, swine researcher at Oklahoma State University, was the principal speaker. He reported on an extensive swine crossbreeding study underway at OSU.

Three swine breeds—Durocs, Yorkshires, and Hampshires—are

being used in the study. Purebred lines and all the possible crossing combinations are being studied. Specific traits under scrutiny are reproductive proficiency, pig performance, mothering ability, and sire and dam influence on crossing combinations.

After two years of work, Omtvedt said his findings showed that two-way cross litters averaged 1.4 more pigs than purebred litters, crossbred pig survival rate was 15 percent higher than purebred pigs,

and litter weight at six weeks favored crossbred pigs by 34 pounds per litter.

In addition, crossbred pigs gained .12 pound per day faster than purebreds, required 11 fewer days to reach 220 pounds, and needed .13 pound less feed to put on a pound of gain.

Omtvedt told swine day visitors that a crossbreeding program using a rotation between two breeds and keeping gilts for breeding will average two-thirds of the hybrid vigor (heterosis) available in the pure cross.

A three-way cross, using two-way cross gilts bred to a boar of a third breed, will net 84-88 percent of the hybrid vigor available from the pure crosses.

He concluded that the way to swine improvement is through the sire. "Your future as a hog producer lies in the boars you use. So it pays to do your homework, shop hard, and come up with the right boars for your particular program."

Dr. Gary Allee, KSU swine researcher, described some feeding trials he had conducted to test the response of hogs to amino-acid supplements.

He pointed out that hogs require 10 amino acids to grow up to their genetic capability. Milo is deficient in two of these essential amino acids—lysine and methionine. Wheat is deficient in only lysine.

In his trials, Allee fed a number of rations (1) straight wheat; (2) wheat and lysine supplement; (3) straight milo; (4) milo with lysine and methionine supplement, and a control ration of (5) milo and soybean meal.

He found that without the supplemental amino acids, wheat or milo alone was inadequate for finishing pigs. Growth rate, feed efficiency, and loin eye area were all suppressed on straight milo or straight wheat rations.

Pigs on the amino acid supplemental rations performed equally well as those on the grain and soybean meal rations. He concluded that ration decisions should be made on the basis of cost for soybean meal and lysine and

methionine supplement.

Dr. Robert Hines, KSU swine researcher, reported on trials to evaluate milo processing methods for swine. Rations of steam flaked milo, ground milo, and dry rolled milo were compared.

Pig performance was slightly better on the steam flaked milo; however, the increased efficiencies in performance were not enough to offset the costs of processing the milo.

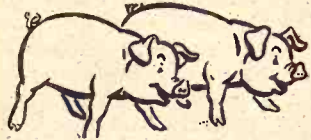
Dr. David Schoneweis, K-State veterinarian, gave a roundup on the status of TGE disease in Kansas. He said TGE is extremely costly to Kansas swine producers. Incidence of TGE fluctuates widely from year to year in Kansas and has killed as many as 50,000 head in a year.

He related that no treatment prevention method is entirely satisfactory but he recommended that the best prevention is to limit access of people on premises.

Schoneweis said that one vaccine for TGE is licensed commercially and has been used. Other vaccines are being tested and may eventually be released.

Vaccinating for TGE has drawbacks: (1) cost, and (2) it must be injected before the TGE outbreak occurs. Recent work in performing the fluorescent antibody test in hog cholera diagnosis possibly brings about an accurate method of diagnosing TGE.

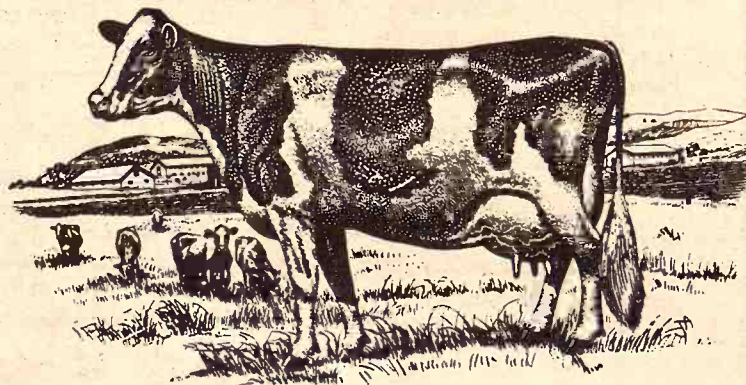

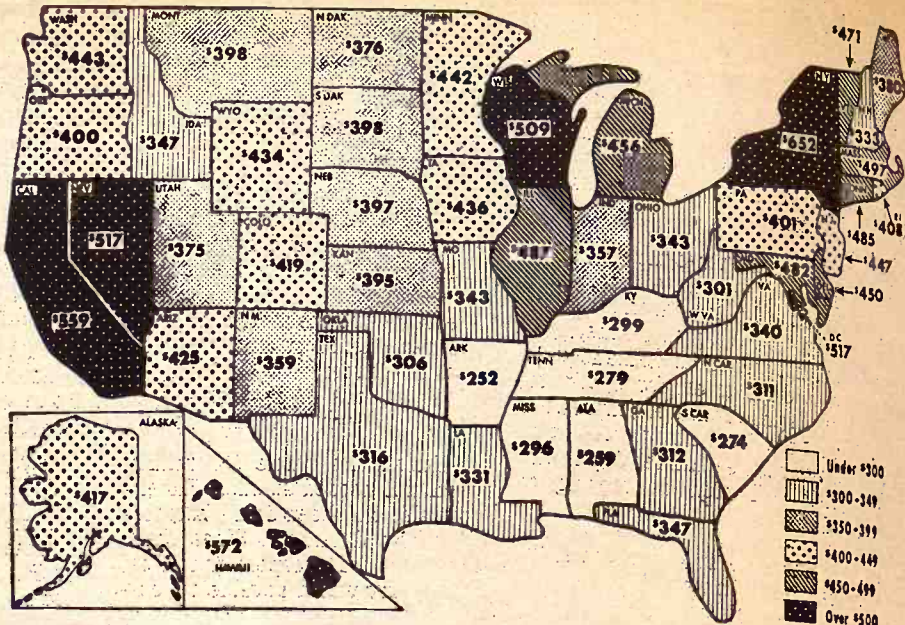

HOW THE TAXES FALL

Americans paid an average of \$427 in state and local government taxes in fiscal 1970—a \$47 increase per person from the previous period, says the Commerce Clearing House. Taxes ranged from a low of \$252 in Arkansas to a high of \$652 in New York, the first time the \$600 level was passed.

He Wants To Study Tornado From Inside

Scientists would have a 90 per cent chance of catching and examining a tornado in Kansas or Oklahoma if they stood on alert through one twister season, a University of Notre Dame engineer says.

Dr. Bruce Morgan is working on a four-month preliminary study started Sept. 1 by the National Severe Storms Laboratory, a Commerce Department agency at Norman, Okla.

Participating scientists will meet at Norman in January and make detailed plans for the Tornado

Detection, Tracking and Interception Study.

They want to look closely at a twister from outside. Then, perhaps in 1973, Dr. Morgan believes they can plunge into the debris spinning at hundreds of miles per hour.

"We have to do this a step at a time," Dr. Morgan said, "but I feel personally that we can approach a tornado closely with ordinary vehicles by knowing its path, then enter it later with an armored vehicle."

Before getting too involved, the study group had to be reasonably

certain it could make close contact with a tornado, which moves along a narrow strip.

Dr. Morgan fed data on lifespans of storms and probabilities of tornado occurrences into a computer. "I spawned" 160,000 tornadoes, he said, "and attempted to go through them with intercept techniques learned from the Army and Navy ROTC units here."

He concluded he could get close about one in 20 twisters with a m.p.h. vehicle, in open country as Oklahoma and Kansas.

For the actual entry vehicle which would be carried on a flatbed truck, Dr. Morgan proposes military personnel carrier sheathed in 5-inch armor plate, complete "buttoned up" and navigated through a periscope.

Little is known about what happens at the center of a big twister. The project leaders hope they will learn how to build more tornado-resistant buildings and how to develop a more efficient warning system.

Dr. Morgan has been studying tornadoes since long before the current project started.

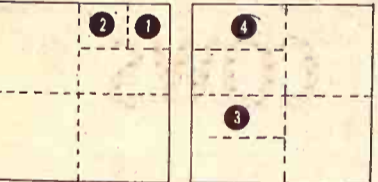

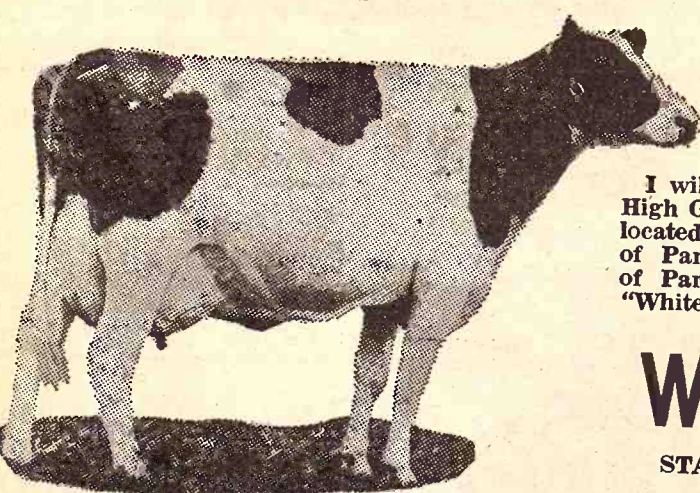

Changes in the Kansas 4-H Foundation staff, effective November 1, include the appointment of a new executive director, establishment of a field representative position, additional responsibilities for the associate director, and the retirement of the Foundation secretary and assistant treasurer.

Merle Eyestone, associate director for the past 10 years, becomes the executive director. He succeeds J. Eyestone, a former Leavenworth County 4-H member, is a Kansas State University graduate and earned a Master's Degree and PhD Degree in adult education from the University of Wisconsin. He served as Shawnee County Extension 4-H agent from 1947 to 1960. As Foundation associate director, Eyestone was also director of Rock Springs Ranch, state 4-H center south of Junction City.

Riley, who joined the Foundation staff in 1968, will continue as associate director. He will be Rock Springs Ranch manager and director of 4-H camping facilities, and managing editor of the Kansas 4-H Journal, published by the Foundation.

Riley is a former Washington County 4-H'er and a KSU graduate. He was a teacher and coach in Junction City and Salina schools before coming to the Foundation staff.

Johnson was the first county Extension 4-H agent in Kansas, serving in Sedgwick County before joining the state 4-H staff at KSU in 1935. A KSU graduate, Johnson has a Master's Degree from George Washington University. He served the Kansas 4-H program for 44 years and will continue on a limited time basis as field representative for the Foundation.

Miss Bly completes 37 years of service to the Sunflower State 4-H program as she retires. She was a member of the KSU 4-H department secretarial staff before joining the Foundation staff in 1958.

Oklahoma Bucks Trend, Says Farm Land Gains Value

Oklahoma farm real estate was valued at \$6.476 billion on March 1, 1971, a 4.1 percent increase from the year before, state agricultural experts say.

The Oklahoma Crop and Livestock Reporting Service in conjunction with the Economic Research Service of the U.S. Department of Agriculture said the national average increase in value of farmland and buildings for the one year period was 2.8 per cent.

Average value per acre of Oklahoma farmland and buildings on March 1, 1971, was estimated at \$181, or \$8 more than March 1 a

year ago. The index of average value per 1,000 farms. This compared with 43.6 transfers per 1,000 above the March and November, 1970, level of 221.

Farm title transfers in Oklahoma were up slightly during the 12-month period ended March 1, to 46.4 per 1,000 farms. This compared with 43.6 transfers per 1,000 farms for the preceding year.

Voluntary sales comprised 65 per cent of the total number of transfers, compared with 69 per cent the year before. Foreclosures accounted for 3 percent of the transfers, unchanged from March, 1970.

The two agencies issued a report showing that the average value of farmland and buildings per acre was

Comparative per acre values on March 1 included: Kansas \$150, Texas \$152, Arkansas \$277 and Louisiana \$380.

Total value of farm real estate in Oklahoma was placed at \$3.1 billion in 1960, \$5.85 billion in 1969, \$6.218 billion in 1970, and \$6.476 billion in 1971.

Nationally, Texas had farm real estate valued at \$21.2 billion last March 1, while the total for Kansas was \$7.5 billion. Others included Arkansas \$4.6 billion, Louisiana \$4.3 billion, and Colorado \$3.3 billion.

The agencies also said the per acre value of farmland and buildings in the Panhandle was only 64 per cent of the state average, while the north central figure was 128 per cent of the state average. Other per acre values expressed as a percentage of the state average included: northeast 113, central 100, southwest 99, west central 93, south central 91, east central 89 and southeast 84 per cent.

While the value of farm real estate went up 4.1 per cent during the past year, it had risen by 6.3 per cent the preceding 12 months, the report said.

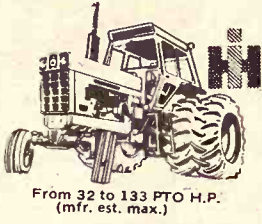

'Farmer Subsidizes U.S. Consumer'

Rep. Keith G. Sebelius (R-Kan.) told a "Day of Bread" audience at Dodge City last week the U.S. farmer is playing a key role in solving problems of hunger and malnutrition.

"In fact the American farmer today is currently subsidizing the American consumer," Sebelius said. "The consumer today is free to spend more than 83 per cent of his disposable income for non-food expenditures."

Sebelius referred to statistics which show the average consumer spends less than 17 cents of each take-home dollar on food. His

remarks were in "Day of Bread" ceremony at the Agriculture Department.

"Farmers have actually subsidized our nation's business growth and industrial development by providing the best quality of food at the lowest price in the history of mankind," Sebelius said.

Clifford M. Hardin, secretary of agriculture, said farmers are demonstrating "matchless productivity" by harvesting record grain crops this year.

"Even though they all too often have gotten far too little net return, farmers have built a bulwark against inflation, have strengthened our balance of payments, and have fed this nation well."

More Controls On Semen Shipment

The USDA has proposed regulations restricting the interstate movement of bovine semen used for artificial insemination.

Under the proposed rules, donor sires must be free from evidence of communicable diseases and have a physical examination by an accredited veterinarian within 60 days before the first semen is collected for interstate shipment.

The proposals also set regulations that semen processors must agree to — testing donors, packaging semen and retaining semen records.

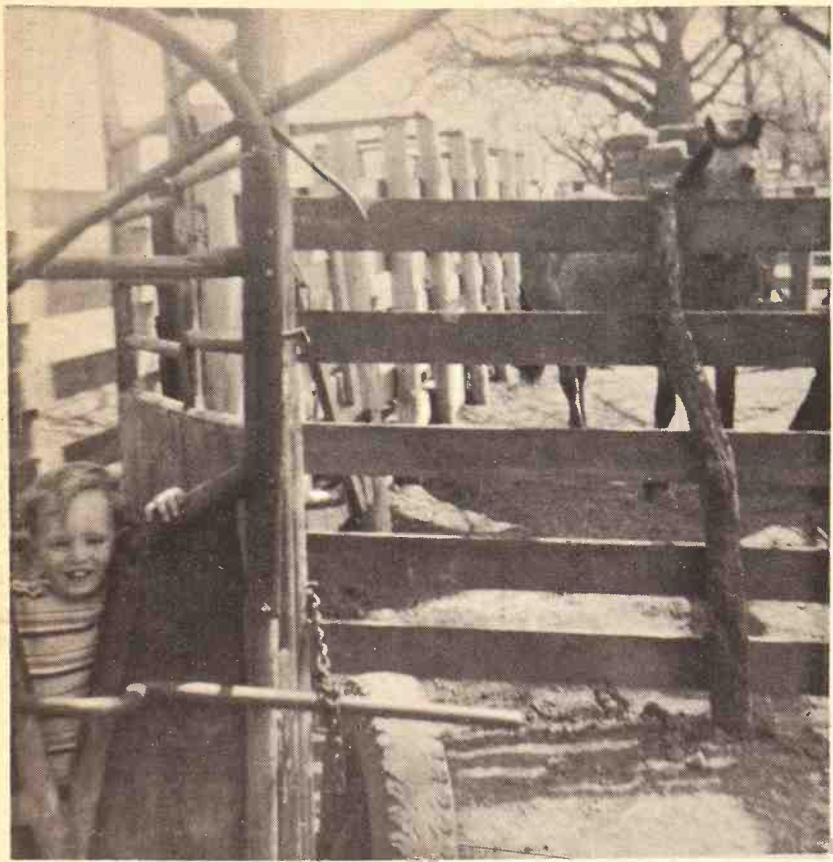

Slight Drop In Angus Registry

Members of the American Angus Association recorded 346,196 head of new bulls and heifers during the 1971 fiscal year ended September 30, and

transferred the registration papers to new owners on 267,762 head, Lloyd D. Miller, executive secretary reports.

"Total registrations were down 1.8 percent from 1970," Miller said, "but 24 states actually reported increases in registrations compared to a year ago and helped the Angus

Association retain its position as the world's largest beef registry association. These increases in registered Angus activity, coupled with higher bull and cow prices are encouraging, and signal a halt to the sharp three-year decline in registrations created primarily by a dramatic change in beef cattle type and a strong commercial female and slaughter cow and steer market," he concluded.

Participation in the Angus business by young people also increased during the year. In all, 1,882 boys and girls became junior members of the American Angus Association, an increase of 2.6 percent over 1970. In addition, 4,311 adults took out life memberships in the American Angus Association. Of this total 389 were junior members who reached their 21st birthday during the year and converted their memberships from junior to life. This figure was a new record and up just over 5 percent over last year.

Missouri retained its top position in registrations with 34,147 head; in transfers with 26,967 head; and in new life members with 385. Texas was second with 25,242 registrations and 18,967 transfers. Tennessee ranked first in junior memberships with 175 and second in new life memberships with 228. Illinois was second in junior memberships with 149.

Still Shy Of 2 1/2 Million

Set to make the 2.5 million population mark this year, Kansas didn't even quite do that.

The increase over 1970 was so small — less than one hundredth of a percent — that the 2.5 million mark still was missed.

The exact count, certified by county assessors as of last January, was 2,249,248. The gain over the federal census of 1970 was only 177.

Federal census figures are based on counting people where they are when the census is taken, and the Kansas census is based on legal residence.

Because of the change in counting (the legislature reverted to the traditional way after a one-year law that counted people by the federal census definition), 89 of the 105 counties showed a gain in the figures, despite the tiny net increase.

The reason was that counties which have regularly been losing population regained the right to count college students, soldiers and some other government employees who have a legal residence other than their actual residence.

Particularly affected was Riley County (Manhattan) which a year ago got to count some Kansas State University students as well as several thousand military families living at a Fort Riley family housing unit. Riley County lost 19,000 in population because of the change.

Kansas reached the two million

population figure in 1955 and its pace toward the 2.5 million mark has been slowed by one of the slowest growth rates in the U.S.

With current interest in environment and zero population growth, it is possible that the state may be able to sell what has long been regarded as a detriment as a major source of strength in the state.

It takes over 25,000 people to make the state's 10 largest city list. Here it is:

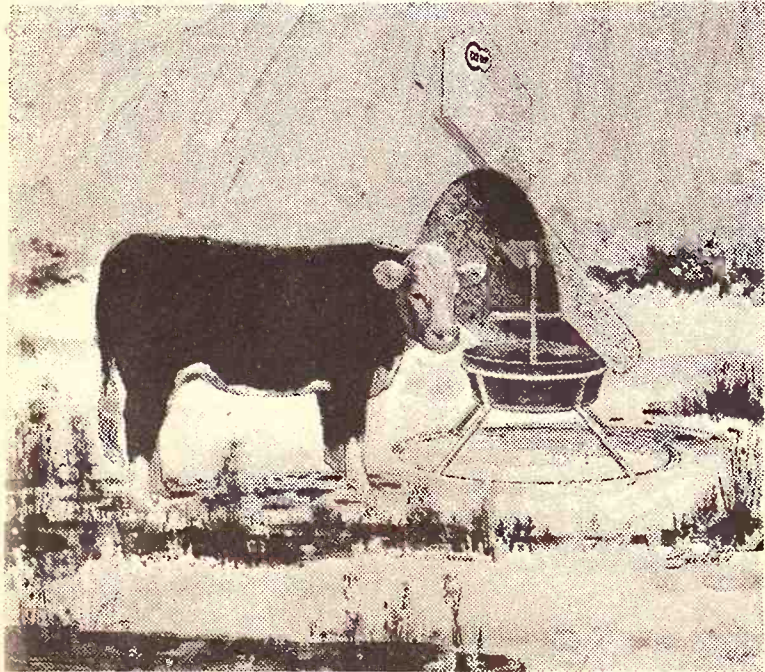

chairman of the Kansas Corporation Commission says.

Dale E. Saffels said the commission's decision will depend on evidence submitted by the company and the federal price freeze standards in force at that time.

Although the commission is not granting any rate increases because of President Richard Nixon's wage-price freeze, Saffels said the commission is obligated to investigate applications.

The telephone company has requested rate increases totaling \$14.78 million. Of that amount, the company would realize \$7.3 million in net revenue after taxes.

Saffels said the Southwestern Bell request is the largest rate increase application ever filed with the commission. He said it is about double the largest previous application.

James F. Haake, vice president and general manager of the company, emphasized "we do not expect to receive increases in excess of those permitted by law."

Saffels said the next step will be to audit the books of Southwestern Bell and to make a general investigation of its operation. He said the commission has retained the accounting firm of Elmer Fox and Co., Wichita.

He said Jack Glaves of Wichita, former chief counsel of the corporation commission, has been hired as special counsel in the case. He said James Wells, now chief counsel for the commission, also will work on the case.

"There is not much to be done until the audit and investigation is completed," Saffels said. "After we get the application checked and the audit and investigation completed, the matter will be set for public hearing."

"Southwestern Bell will have to introduce evidence to substantiate its position and the commission and intervenors can offer counter evidence."

Increases in basic monthly telephone rates account for the bulk of the requested revenues.

Under the company's proposed schedule, basic telephone rates would be increased from 75 cents to \$1.20 for a one-party residence phone and from \$2.30 to \$4.10 for a one-

party business phone. The increases are per month and vary with the size of the exchange involved.
