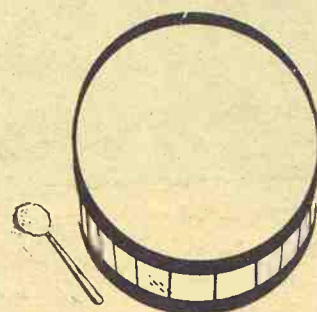
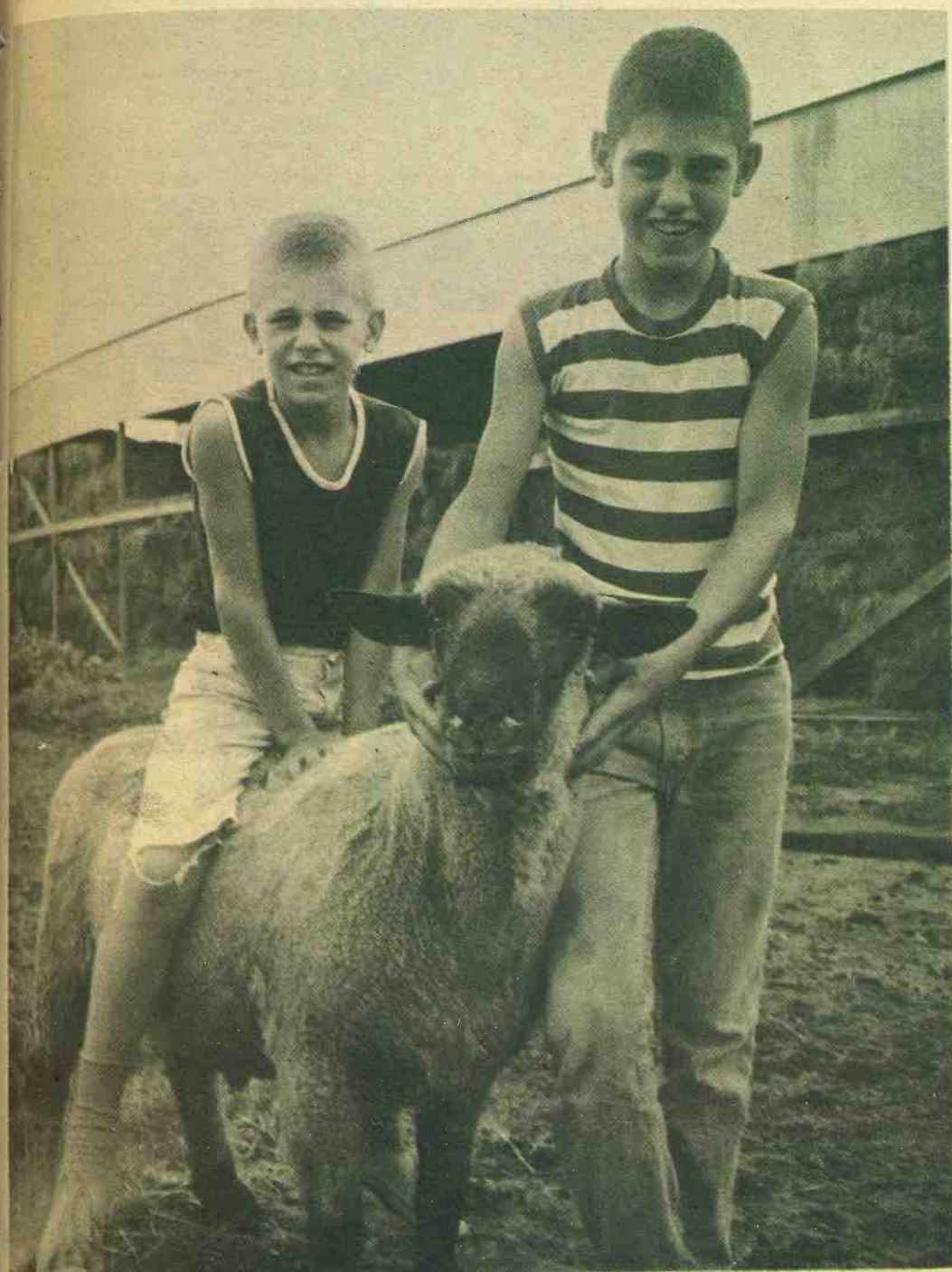

### 1968 Fair Farming Edition

Unmistakably this is Fair Season in the G&G area. Practically all counties in the area have fairs, some of them relatively quiet affairs used as a late summer showpiece for 4-H activities, but most of them expanded to include both open class and 4-H exhibits plus carnivals, variety shows, and other outside entertainment.

Some of the festivals have outgrown the county fair designation and attract exhibits and customers from a multi-county region. Salina, Abilene, Belleville and Herington all have fairs that are legitimately billed as regional fairs.

Attention is focused on livestock competition in most fairs, with many a young stockman eager to win a local ribbon that will justify a trip for greater competition at statewide fairs at Topeka and Hutchinson.

The local fair season, however, is in its glory right now. A few fairs have already been completed but most of them are scheduled for this week and next. Several more are set for the final 10 days of the month.

### Heavy Irrigation Usage Out Of Smoky Hill

SALINA — So many farmers have been dipping into the Smoky Hill River between Kanopolis Reservoir and Salina for water to irrigate their crops that the river bed is virtually dry at Salina.

The diminishing water supply has resulted even though 13,464 gallons a minute are being released from the reservoir, about 35 river miles above Salina.

As a result, Salina has been forced to stop relying on the river as a source of water for two days, and to get its entire supply from wells.

The amount of water being siphoned from the river for irrigation one day equaled the rate at which it was released from the reservoir.

The reservoir is releasing twice the inflow from the river at the upper part of the reservoir.

Emil Kroutil, engineer-in-charge at the reservoir, said: "We will continue to release at the present rate until we receive further orders from the Kansas City district office of the federal Corps of Engineers."

Conservation pool is maintained at 1459 feet mean sea level. Present elevation is 1460 feet.

Kroutil said that water released from Cedar Bluffs Reservoir further upstream is used for irrigation and city water supplies before it can reach Kanopolis, leaving no solution to the problem except rain.

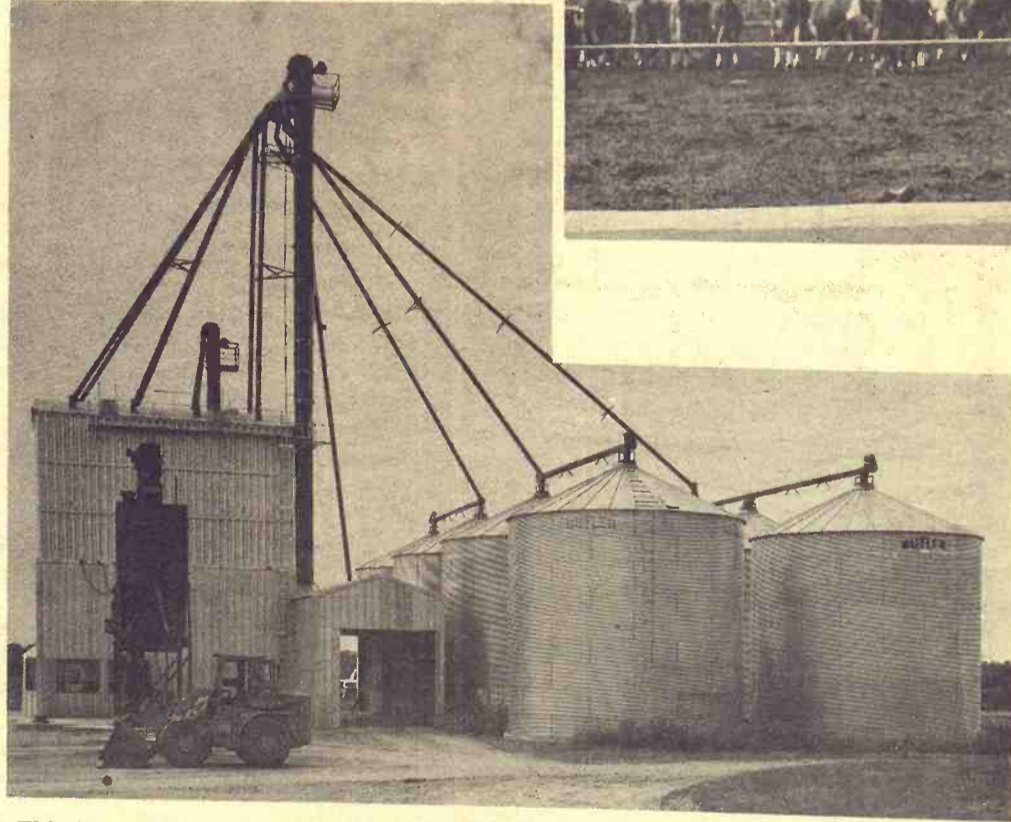
#### TWO AREA AUCTION BARN ARE DE-POSTED

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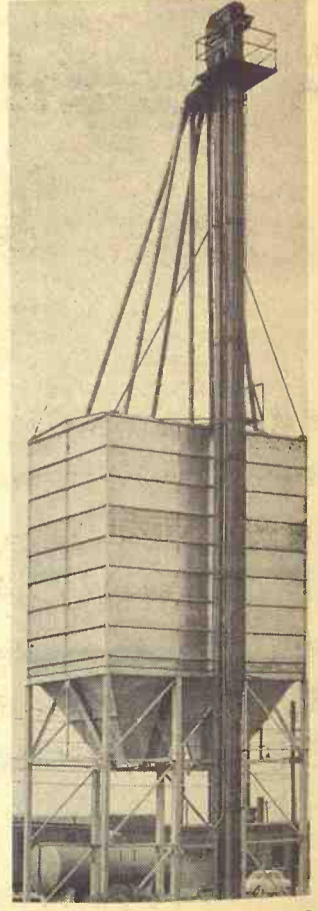

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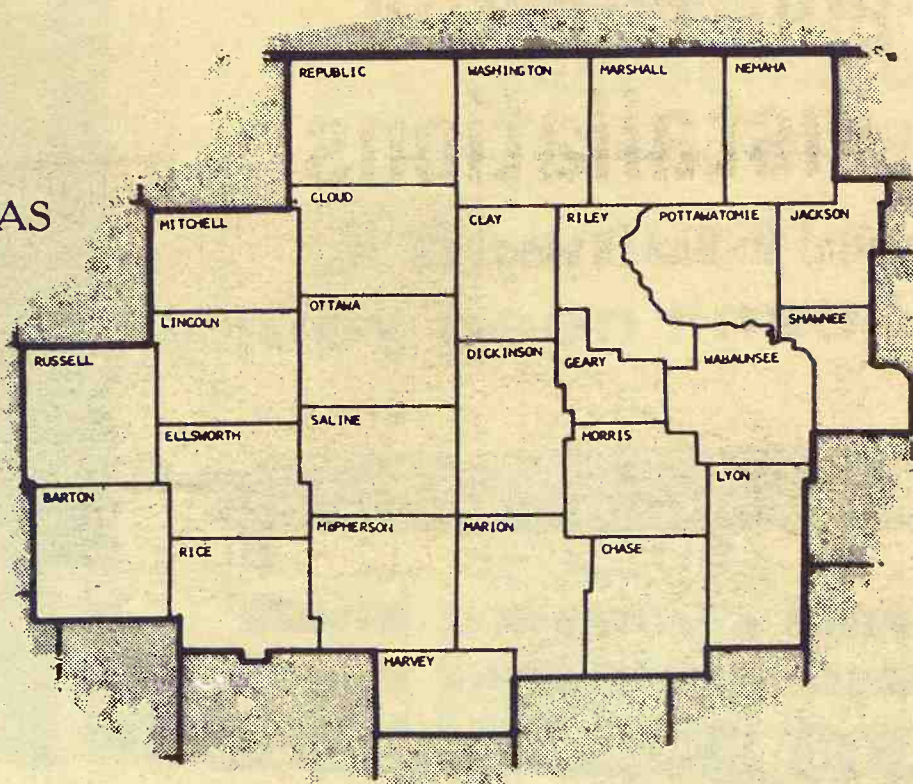

## Natoma Another Town Looking For A Doctor To Use Its Clinic

NATOMA — "Help — Have Building Need Doctor."

This is the inscription printed on a large sign outside the \$35,000 Natoma Clinic. No doctor has occupied the building during the past four years. The last doctor in Natoma was Dr. Frank Dattilo but he left to take charge of a small hospital at Faith, S.D.

Natoma, situated on K-18 in Osborne County has a problem all too common among small and isolated Kansas communities. It is one of having medical services available within the community.

While many towns larger than Natoma, population 751, have given up trying, Natoma is still trying to attract a doctor and optimistic that they will succeed.

They are keeping the clinic building attractive and tending the roses which surround it.

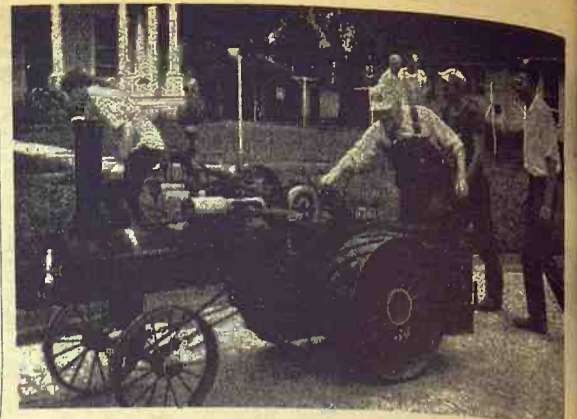
Harold Krueger, clinic board member explained the position

of the town in their efforts to secure a doctor. "We don't want our town to die. People don't want to live where there is no doctor."

Krueger said that the Natoma has a high school and a 20-bed rest home. The presence of these two institutions are added reasons for the tiny town's search for a doctor.

"We'd try to meet almost any terms to get a doctor," Krueger said. The townspeople of Natoma and some 1200 others who live in the surrounding area made contributions to build the clinic.

Board members said that when Dr. Dattilo, an osteopath came to Natoma he was permitted to use the building rent-free for the first month and

charged only \$50 a month rent thereafter.

The clinic building is modern and air-conditioned. In addition to two doctor's offices and two examining rooms there is a waiting room with new furnishings, an X-ray room and an oval reception office in the center of

the building.

The funeral director operates an ambulance service. There is no pharmacist in Natoma. The last doctor, Dr. Dattilo operated a small pharmacy that was planned as part of the clinic.

Natoma is practically surrounded by hospitals. A doctor

situated at Natoma could refer patients to a hospital at Plainville 13 miles to the west, Russell 29 miles south, Osborne 40 miles northeast and Hays 40 miles southwest.

But the sign is still up in front of the clinic at Natoma.

The Wabaunsee Fair itself will begin Wednesday, August 14, for a 3-day run.

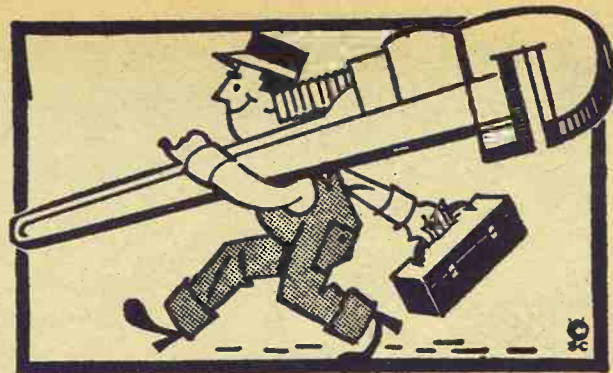
A tractor pulling contest, drum and bugle corps drill program, and variety show will highlight the first day activities.

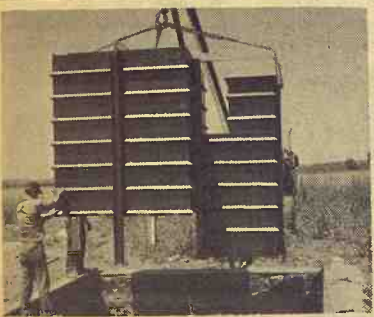
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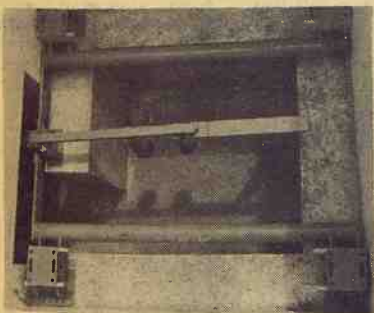

## Sensitive Scales

Two sensitive scales, specially designed so that Kansas State University scientists can measure water losses from the soil, are being installed on the Ashland Agronomy Farm southwest of Manhattan and will be ready for use this fall. The instruments, called lysimeters, can measure the loss of a few ounces of water from a ten ton block of soil. These photos show:

1) The outer tank of the lysimeter which holds back the soil. An inner box which is six feet square and five feet deep fits into the box on the left, while on the right side there is a manhole and access tunnel so that maintenance can be performed on the scales once the inner box is in place.

2) This view shows the precision scales in place within the outer tank before the inner box is placed on them. The bottom of the pit is about ten feet below the surface of the ground. The access tunnel can be seen at left.

3) Workmen are ready to lower inner box of lysimeter into installed outer tank.

## Blue Cross Backs Out Of State Coverage

WICHITA — Kansas Blue Cross-Blue Shield, the state's largest carrier of group insurance programs, reportedly is canceling its coverage of about 10,000 state employees.

The cancellation apparently is due to the state entering into a contract with the Equitable Life Assurance Society of the

United States, the Wichita Beacon said last week.

John Workman, a representative of the state purchasing division, said the new plan is optional and "can increase coverage substantially and decrease premiums."

Present insurance programs are available on a department basis only to the employees, Workman said, adding "Some state agencies have no coverage at all."

Blue Cross, Workman said, insures only about 10,000 of the state's 30,000 employees.

Workman said, "At no time did the state of Kansas direct cancellation of existing groups by Blue Cross-Blue Shield."

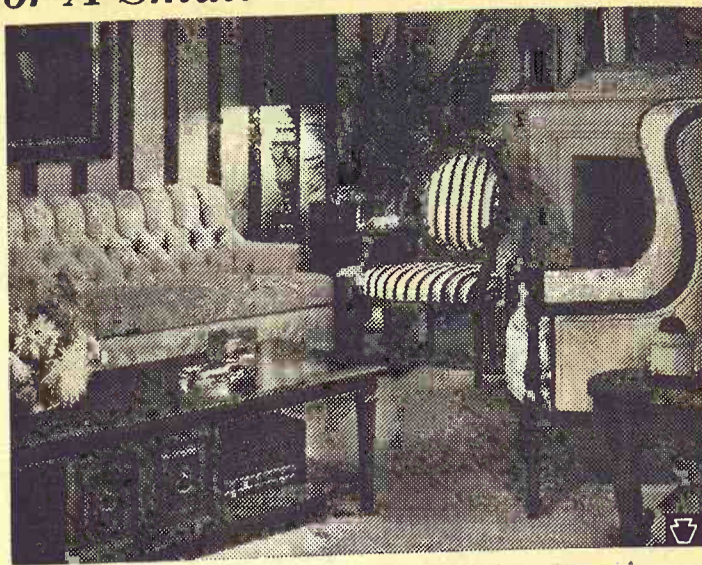
#### To Unstick Stamps

### Seafood Casserole

Here is a seafood casserole that is both stimulating and delicious. It is called Seafood Gratin.

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## Appetizing Torte Recipe Features Fresh Nectarines



Properly impressive for a dessert and coffee party is this "Nectarine Torte California." It takes a little time but is surprisingly easy to put together.

### NECTARINE TORTE CALIFORNIA

6-7 fresh nectarines  
1 cup water  
granulated sugar  
1 cup butter or margarine  
2 cups sifted all-purpose flour  
1/4 teaspoon salt  
6 tablespoons ice water  
1 package (3-3/4 ounce) vanilla pudding & pie filling  
1 cup whipping cream  
1 tablespoon powdered sugar

Peel and slice some nectarines to yield 4 cups. (Save remainder). In large saucepan, heat sliced nectarines and water to boiling. Add 1 cup granulated sugar and simmer 20 minutes; cool. With knife or pastry blender, cut butter into flour and salt. Add ice water and mix to pastry dough consistency. Divide into eight equal parts; chill 30 minutes. On lightly floured board, roll each part into 9-inch circle. Prick circles with fork; sprinkle with 2 tablespoons granulated sugar. Bake 5-6 minutes at 425 degrees; cool. Prepare vanilla pudding according to package directions; cool. Divide cooked nectarines into four equal parts; divide pudding into three equal parts. Place a pastry round on serving plate; top with one part nectarines. Cover with another pastry round; top with one part pudding. Repeat layers, ending with pastry round. Slice remaining fruit; arrange sunburst-fashion on top. Whip cream with powdered sugar. Encircle nectarines with cream; dollop spoonful into center. Eight to ten servings.

### Toys For Toddlers

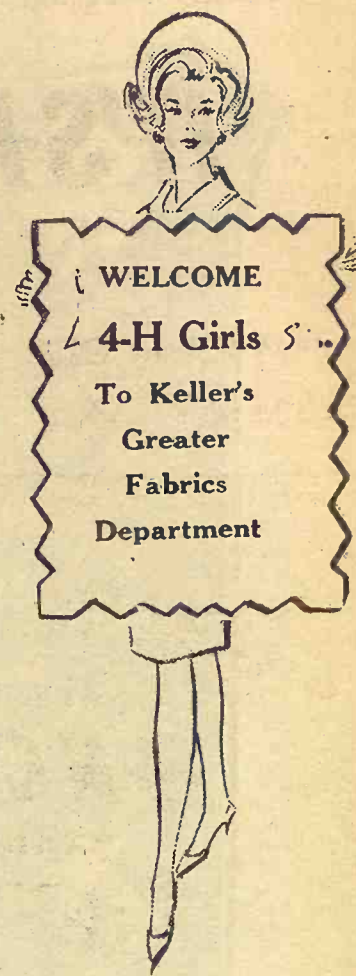

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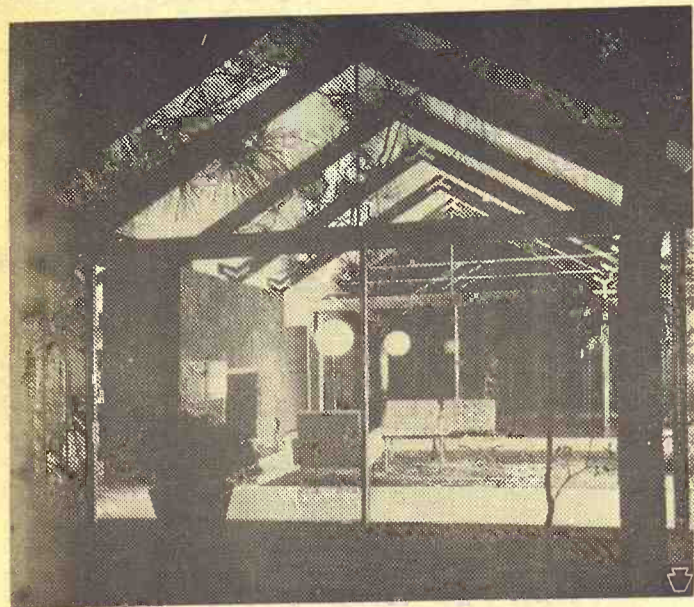

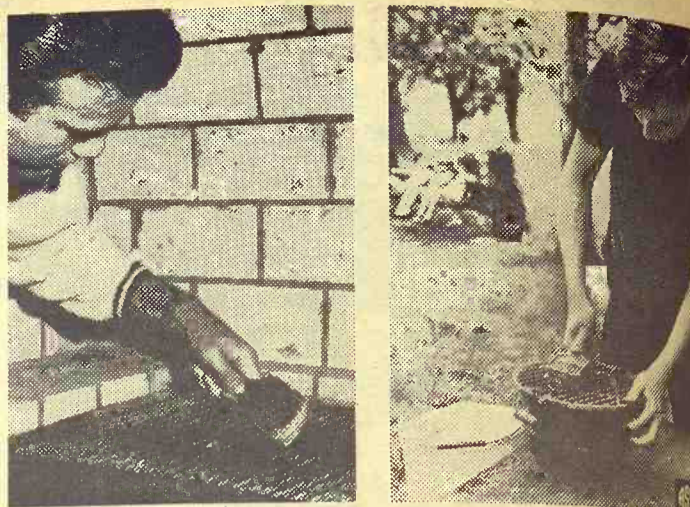

# "Any Color, If It's Not Black"

Remember when Henry Ford would sell you any color of car you wanted so long as it was black?

Things have changed so much that trade papers say General Motors may make black a "special order item." Presently only about 2% of cars sold are black, and that's about the lowest percentage the carmakers allow for a color before they drop it from their list.

About a dozen years ago black, white and grey cars accounted for 40% of all color selections. Now they account for only half that. At the same time, beiges and golds have zoomed from 2% to over 20% of the market.

Carmakers say there was a similar color spree right after World War II. Returning veterans, fed up with olive drab, went for such hues as pea green, flaming red and chartreuse.

That preference soon subsided, however, and for a decade thru 1965, white was the over-

all favorite. Two years ago, medium blues took over as the hottest colors, only to be eclipsed a year later by beiges and golds, the favorite color group currently.

Because women are playing a growing role in car purchase decisions, auto men searching for new color ideas watch for early signs of female fancies. Ford sends some of its 17 color stylists to the fashion shows conducted each year in New York for store buyers by the Fashion Group Inc.

"Women are inclined to experiment with color on the clothes they buy before they graduate to costly home furnishings and cars," says Helen Vincent, an interior designer for Allied Chemical Corp.

No matter how careful the automakers are in picking colors, they choose some duds.

Ford once came up with something called "regency purple" for the Lincoln but dropped it half way thru the model run

when buyers shunned it.

Chrysler also got a chilly reception with a color known as "lavender metallic." Because of such experiences, Detroit is cautious about drastic changes. The Wall Street Journal quoted a Chrysler man as saying, "Out of 25-colors, about 21 aren't new. They're warmed over."

After colors are selected, they are tested for durability, often at a "color farm" in Florida. If the color "can stand Florida's sun, salt and humidity, it can stand anything," says one color expert.

To promote new colors, the automakers turn to their advertising agencies for exotic names, such as "Caribe acqua" (greenish blue), "royal plum" (maroon) and "Sierra fawn" (beige.) Renaming a color sometimes helps. When Ford introduced the Mustang in 1964, it offered "poppy red," but the color won only fair acceptance. As "calypso coral," however, the identical color has been the hot seller on eMercury's new Monetto.

## No Birth Gain In Catholic Countries

A long-standing belief that birth rates are higher in predominantly Roman Catholic nations may stand re-study.

The Population Reference Bureau says its latest studies indicate that "birth rates are not soaring anywhere in the world."

The bureau released a study of birth trends in 136 Catholic and non-Catholic countries shortly before Pope Paul VI restated the Church's opposition to artificial birth control.

The bureau found that "the big difference between high and low birth-rate nations is not whether they are Catholic or non-Catholic, but whether they are economically underdeveloped or advanced."

The 11 Roman Catholic countries in Europe have an average annual birth rate of 18.1 babies per 1000 population, while the figure for the 15 non-Catholic nations is 18.0.

The direct cause of the world's accelerating population growth is the widening gap between births and deaths, the report said.

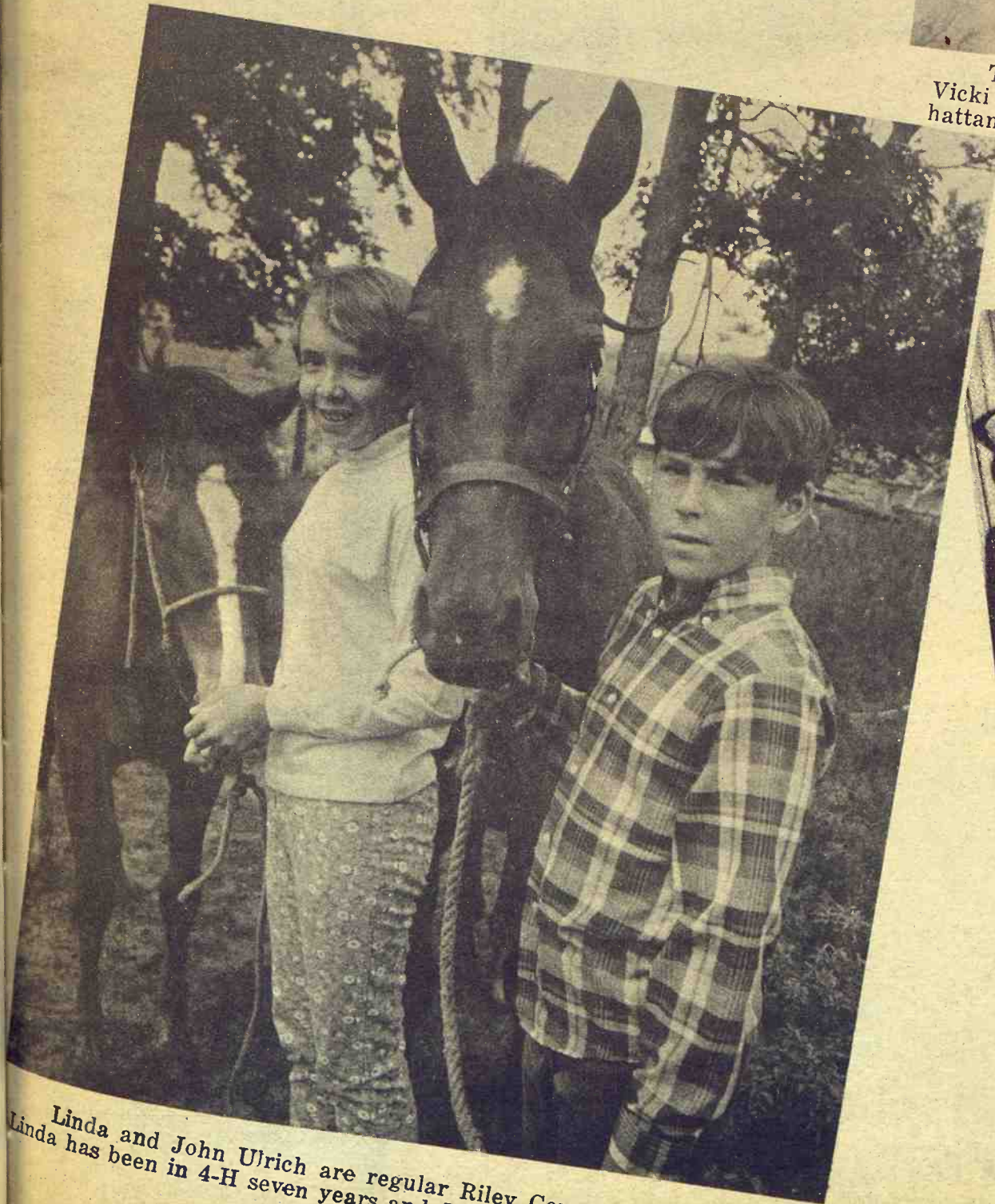

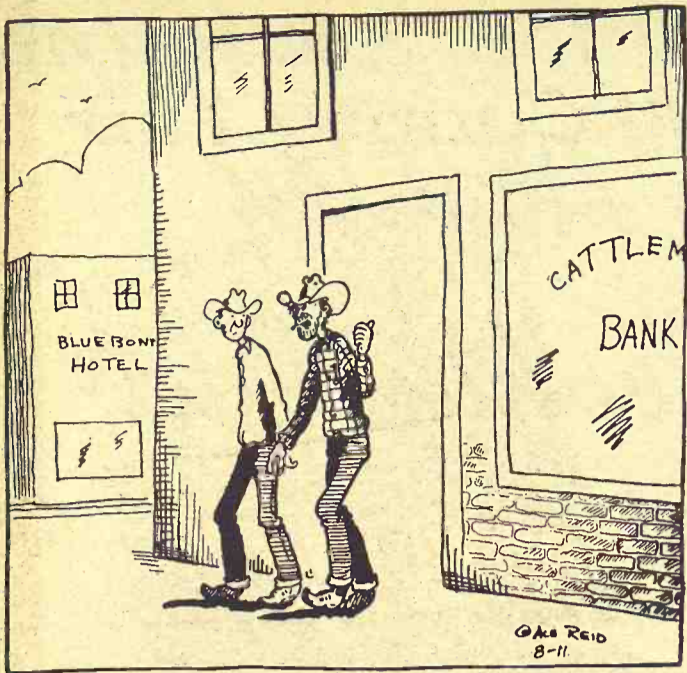

# Price Index Still Won't Budge

Prices received by farmers in Kansas at mid-July were slightly below June and moderately below July a year ago, according to the Kansas Crop and Livestock Reporting Service.

The all-farm products price index stood at 227 percent of the 1910-14 base, down 1 point from mid-June and 8 points below a year earlier.

Slight to moderate price declines from June were noted for most grain crops, beef cattle, calves, sheep and lambs.

Higher prices were received for hogs, milk, butterfat, chickens and eggs.

Prices of grains were considerably below July of last year, while those for livestock items averaged a shade above last year's level.

**Crop Prices**

The crop price index at mid-

July was 147 percent of the 1910-14 base, down 3 points from last month and 21 points below a year ago.

Wheat averaged \$1.20 per bushel, down 3 cents from last month and the lowest since January 1943.

The price of corn was \$1.14 per bushel, down 1 cent from June and 9 cents below July last year.

Sorghum grain, at \$1.76 per cwt., was 4 cents below last month and 22 cents below July 1967.

Soybeans brought \$2.47 per bushel compared with \$2.51 last month and \$2.59 a year ago.

The oat price of 72 cents per bushel and barley, at 91 cents per bushel, were both below June and a year ago.

Alfalfa hay averaged \$20.50 per ton compared with \$20.00

last month and \$21.50 a year ago.

**Livestock Prices**

The livestock and livestock products price index as of July was 318 percent of the 1910-14 base, 2 points above last month and 6 points above a year. The meat animal price index was 379 percent compared with 378 percent last month and 375 percent last year. Hogs brought \$20.70 per cwt., up \$1.10 from last month but 80 cents below a year ago. Steers and heifers averaged \$25.30 compared with \$25.40 in June and \$24.10 last year. Cows brought \$17.40, \$1.10 below mid-June and 40 cents below a year ago. Hogs averaged \$25.50 per cwt., 30 cents below last month and 20 cents below July 1967. Hogs brought \$26.60 per cwt., 10 cents above a year earlier.

**Dairy & Poultry**

The dairy products price index at mid-July was 306 percent of the 1910-14 base, 5 points above June and 22 points above July a year ago. The preliminary wholesale milk price at \$3.50 was 5 cents above June and 45 cents above July last year. The poultry and egg price index was 111 percent, 3 points above mid-June and 5 points above July last year. Chickens at 63 cents per pound and eggs at 21 cents per dozen were both moderately above last month.

**Prices Paid**

Prices paid by Kansas farmers for most protein supplements were slightly higher than last month while complete feeds were unchanged to lower than a month ago.

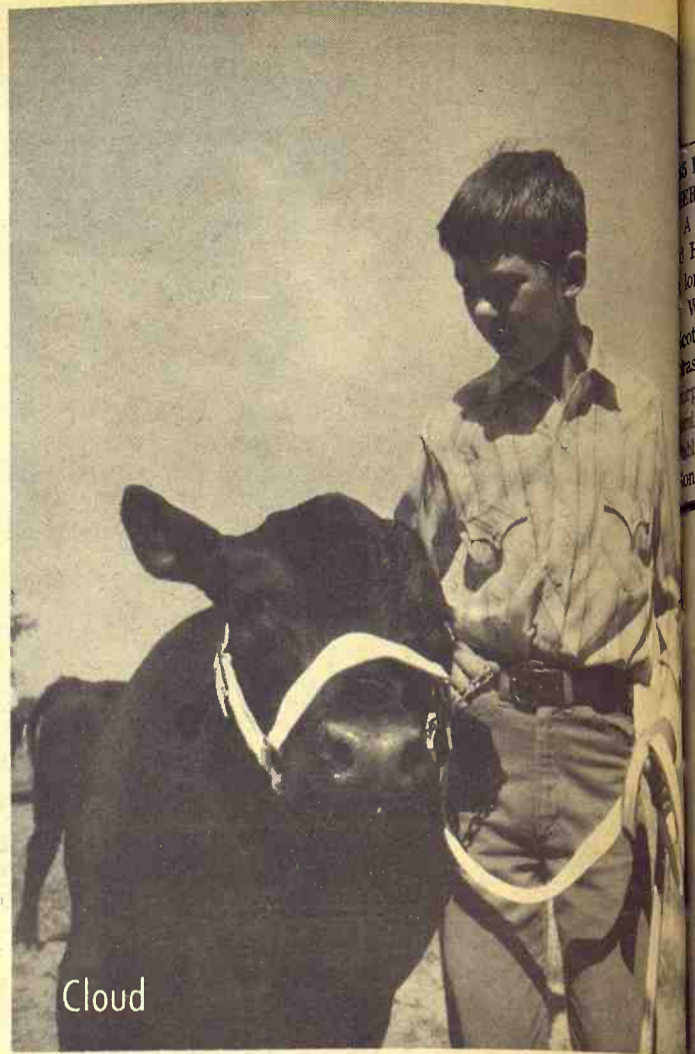


WEIGHTS — Earlier in the year, slaughter weights were under 1967. In first three weeks of June, however, weights were heavier than a year ago.

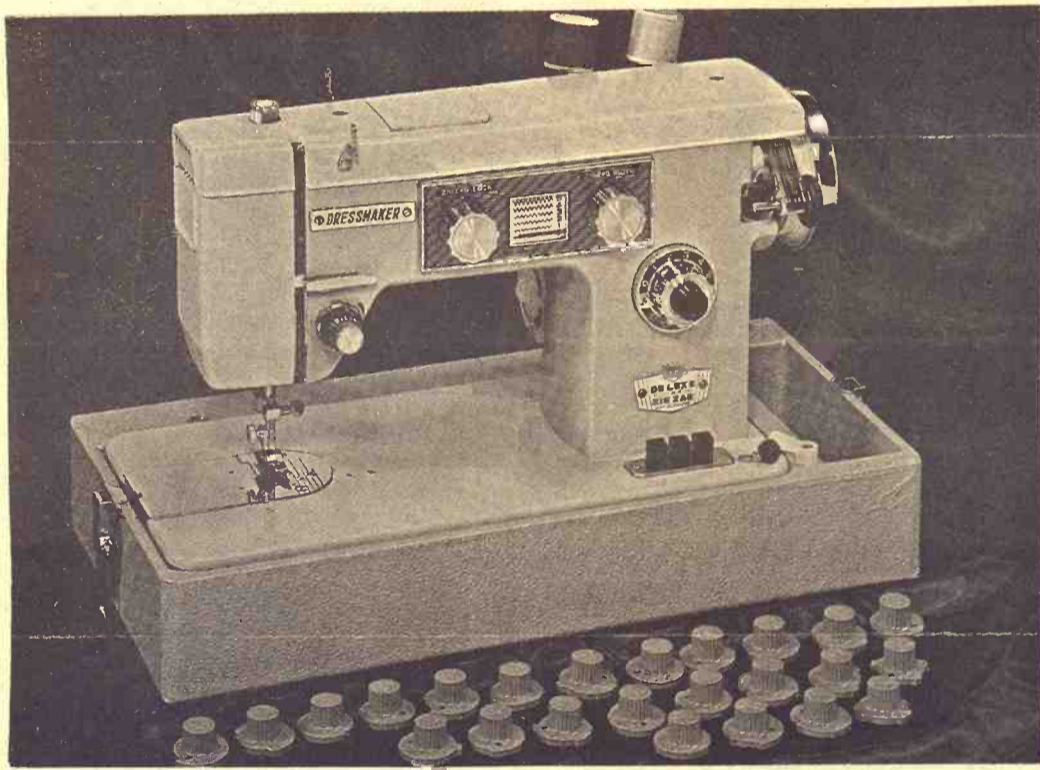

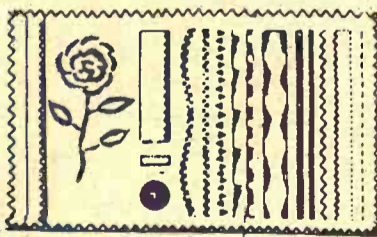

## Last of W. W. Smith & Sons Is Gone

CLAY CENTER — The death of Ralph Smith recently ended an unusual and long business partnership of three brothers . . . W. W. Smith & Sons of Clay Center. Ralph, 81, was the youngest and last to die. Clay preceded him in death by four years, and Murrey by 2. All brothers were in their eighties.

Murrey took over the implement business, which is managed by Lyle Sproul, and Ralph separated from the partnership at that time. Foster Smith, son of Ralph, also administers the Murrey Smith estate and supervises the implement store as one of the estate properties.

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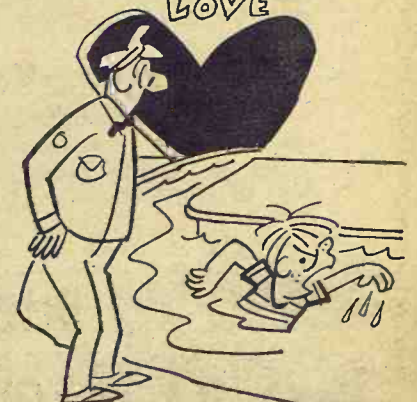

## \$20 Million Would Build Agriculture In Dahomey

Emile-Derlin Zinsou, a doctor diplomat handed power by the ruling army, has drafted a plan to double crops in two years and better the lot of Dahomey's two million population.

All he needs, he says, is about \$20 million.

"We need a loan to provide means for production," the 50-year-old president-designate said in an interview. "People have land, they have will . . . but no money or tools."

The plan involves an agricultural credit agency where subsistence farmers can borrow enough to spread out.

"If you fly over Dahomey you'll see one hundredth of the land cultivated . . . We just need

the means," Zinsou said.

He looks forward to exporting perhaps 300,000 tons of corn and some cotton to supplement the palm oil.

A new peanut oil plant is expected to press 30,000 tons yearly by 1970.

## Better California Fruit Crop Promises Lower Grocery Prices

Bumper crops in California's orchards and vineyards are promising some relief from last year's inflated canned fruit prices.

"Everything is right," one fruit expert here says for big, high-quality crops of peaches, pears and grapes. Only apricots will fail to match the general production gains.

Retailers won't be setting their shelf prices for some time yet, but packers already are predicting wholesale price declines for most canned fruits of perhaps 15% from last year. That would take prices back down almost to the 1966 level.

Last year, prices rose 20% to 25% because of short fruit supplies. The 1967 crop was heavily damaged by unseasonably late heavy spring rains, followed by a particularly hot summer and then autumn frosts. Observers describe growing conditions this year as "ideal," with rains ending at the right time, permitting optimum budding of fruit trees.

### Long List of Added Expense

The big crops couldn't have come at a better time for packers — or consumers, for that matter — beset by rising costs. California growers and packers cite a long list of added expenses this year, including a 5% jump in transportation costs and can prices, plus higher wage rates for pickers. But these costs could be offset by the growth in fruit supplies, industry officials say.

California peach packers this month contracted to pay growers \$72 a ton for their clingstones, depending on the total tonnage harvested, compared with \$83 a ton last year on a much smaller harvest.

Even so, one major packer of

brand-name peaches opened the 1968 season last week with a case price of \$5.95, up from \$5.65 a year earlier. "Starting last Thursday evening, other packers began announcing case prices with proportionate increases. A major private-label packer opened at \$5.50 a case, up from \$5.25 last year.

Last season, however, the case price rose steadily as stocks ran out, until it hit \$6.30 in February 1968.

Canners say some price weakness might result this year from loss of the traditional West European markets (which took about 20% of the California crop) to Australian government-subsidized competition.

### Initially Offered \$125 a Ton

Pear growers this month were initially offered \$125 a ton for their fruit compared with \$175 a ton paid last year. The opening offer was rejected and negotiations between packers and growers are still under way.

Canned pear prices haven't been set yet by most packers, but one major processor said

they will undoubtedly sell under last year's price of \$9.25 a case for private-label stocks.

Brand-name pears run about \$1 a case higher (40 cents a case higher for peaches).

Apricot production was hurt by a late frost this year, and the crop is expected to total only 145,000 tons, less than a 2% gain from last year and down more than 30% from the previous five-year average. As a result of the short crop, packers are paying from \$155 to \$165 a ton this season, compared with \$135 to \$150 a ton last year.

A major private-label California packer, however, says a 24-can case of the standard No. 2 1/2 size choice grade apricots is selling to grocery chains and jobbers at \$7.60 so far this year, unchanged from last year.

But this price could rise during the season as apricot supplies dwindle. A brand-name

case of fancy quality apricots is selling for \$9.30, unchanged from the start of last season.

Union efforts to organize grape pickers won't affect the harvest, grape sources say, because there are plenty of pickers.

But the organizers are pressuring Eastern grocery chains

to boycott California grapes as part of their organizing drive. If the boycott is "not correct," one source says, it will have a "depressing effect" on prices because it will eliminate a portion of the market and thus increase the quantities of grapes available to the rest of the country.

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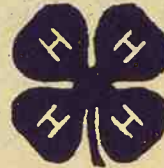
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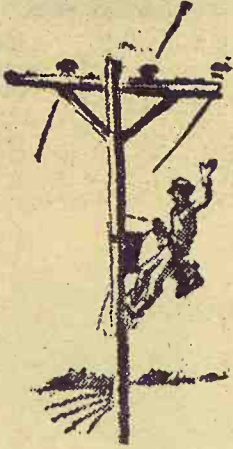
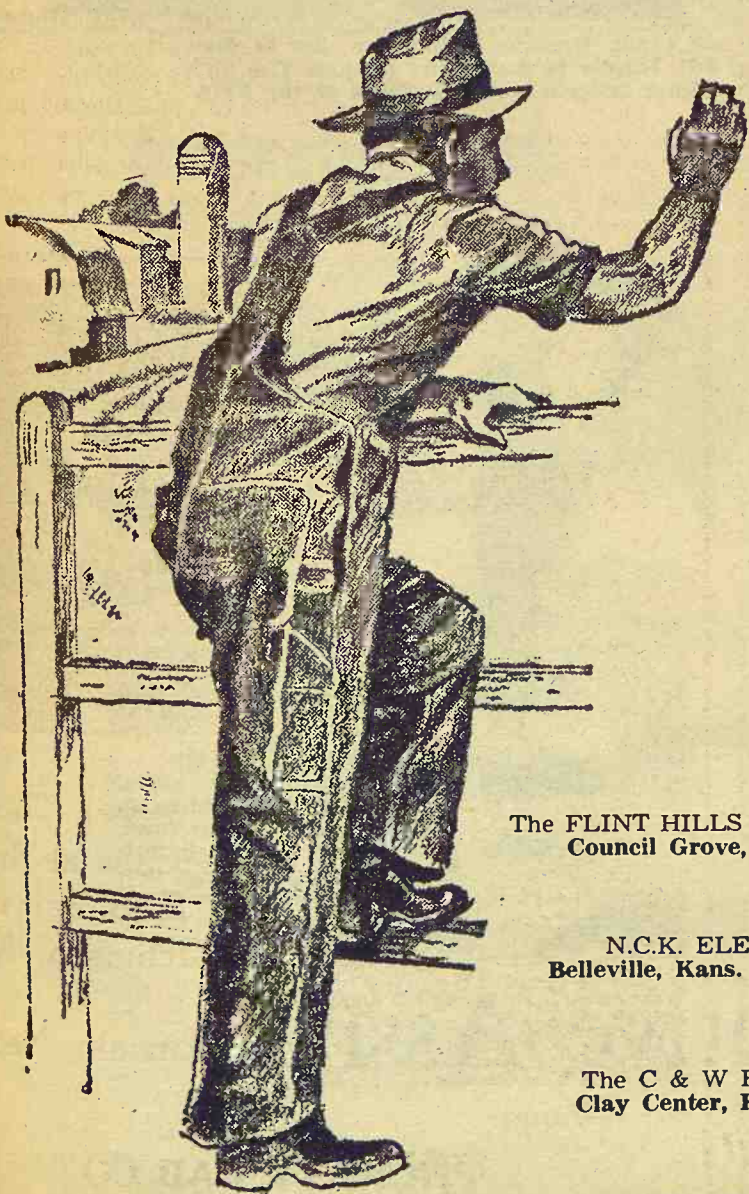

# Major Tree Research Project At Milford

A forestry and horticultural research project has been established by Kansas State University on the Milford Reservoir reservation just northwest of Junction City.

The 125-acre plot, located east of the dam, will be used for forestry research by state Extension foresters and KSU research foresters. The goal is development and production of superior Kansas-grown trees, Harold Gallaher, state Extension forester, said.

An 80-acre tract will grow select superior black walnut and cottonwood trees. Cuttings of selected trees from over the state will be grown at the site and then used to produce seed and cuttings for planting stock. The researchers will also test cottonwood and walnut selections from about 20 other states.

A 40-acre field will be used for breeding and developing hybrid cottonwood, walnut, and other tree species.

About 4,800 ponderosa pines selected from throughout the natural range of that tree are now growing on the site. From these selected trees, those specially adapted to Kansas will be identified, and researchers will expand production by collecting seed from the original area of the tree. This will be an important source of well-adapted Kansas pines.

Researchers expect to develop

a walnut tree that will be marketable size within 30 to 40 years instead of 75 to 100 years as it normally takes to produce a desirable size tree, Gallaher explained.

With research on cottonwoods, the foresters expect to develop a tree that will produce pulpwood-size trees (5 inches or more in diameter) in about 4 years. The research is in cooperation with the U.S. Forest Service.

Extension foresters scanned the state to obtain cuttings from selected, superior trees to grow for the project. "We have many superior trees already growing over the state," Gallaher said.

A walnut tree can be exactly duplicated by taking scionwood and growing it on root stock of a locally adapted tree. The foresters will start planting trees for root stock next spring. A scion is a shot of one plant which can be grafted to another plant. In this way, superior walnut trees can be obtained from over the state and in other parts of the country and used as seed trees for other plantings in Kansas. Cottonwoods can be selected and developed by taking cuttings.

Quality of growing trees is determined by appearance and by using a rating sheet. Desirable characteristics of a walnut tree are fast growth and nut-produc-

ing ability. Large nuts generally mean strong seedlings. In addition, quantity of nut production is a desirable characteristic, so those trees that produce a large number of nuts are also desired.

In full production, the tree orchard is expected to produce planting stock of about 1½ to 2 million trees. The demand for walnut is increasing and is so great that walnut is the highest priced tree in the country, Gallaher said. This year Extension foresters distributed about 200,000 walnut seedlings and nuts to Kansas landowners.

Kansans can justify a strong interest in walnut trees because of the price and because of the rich resource of high quality trees now growing in the state. Kansas is among the top four states in the production of walnut veneer.

The trees will be fertilized, and experiments will be conducted to evaluate a variety of kinds of fertilizer and methods of application. "We think with fertilization alone we can about double the growth of the trees," Gallaher said. The trees will be irrigated which will accelerate growth and maturity.

With a faster growing tree would come a reduction in the number of years required to produce a marketable tree. "However, we really won't know until we get into the project," he added.

Also included in experimental work will be use of insecticides and herbicides including some newly developed chemicals.

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# Field Day Stops Make Point About Farm Management

WAMEGO — The purpose of the field day was to demonstrate that farms varying in capitalization, size, source of income, and labor could be profitable if properly managed.

The several hundred visitors who traipsed thru rain and mud to see three farms apparently came away convinced that was so.

The field day was the second annual farm management event sponsored by the Kansas City Chamber of Commerce with Kansas State University. Visited were the farms of David Hund near Paxico, LeRoy Miller near Wamego, and Warren Roepke, at Zeandale east of Manhattan.

The program at all three farms stressed farm management. Visitors heard the host farmers tell why their farms are successful.

Farm specialists from K-State were on hand to explain the management decisions involved in each operation.

Miller managed 1330 acres and feeds about 1000 head of cattle a year. He buys calves in the fall to winter them on silage with a low level of grain. He markets fat cattle and also sells direct to packers.

Miller raises about half of his feed on 400 acres of irrigated land. He has elaborate equipment for storing and handling

grain, including scales for weighing feed. He is installing a 20-ton scale for weighing cattle.

Hund combines a laying hen operation with a 50-cow Holstein dairy enterprise. He has capacity for 30,000 hens in four laying houses and is shifting entirely to colony cage houses after using open floor housing for several years.

Hund holds costs down by raising some of his own grain, buying farm-raised grain and concentrate and mixing his own feed ration. He raises his own replacement hens from chicks.

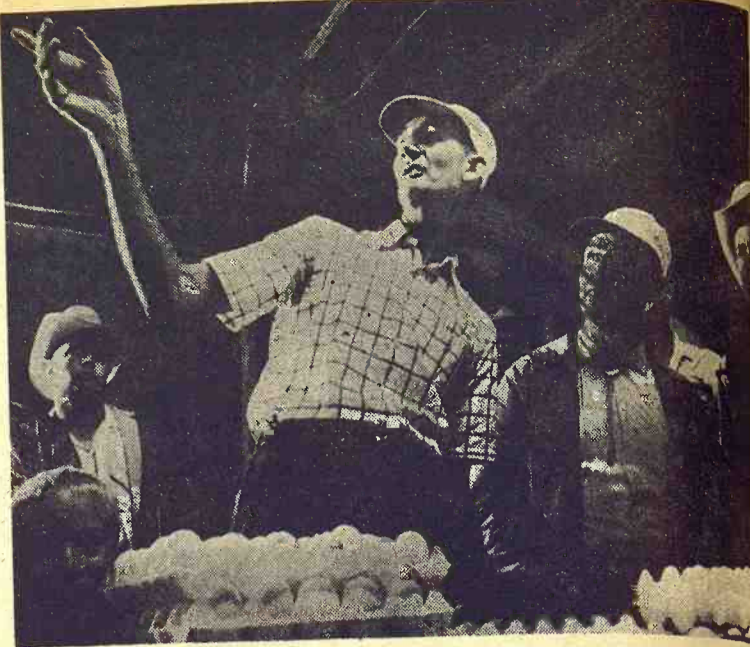
His dairy operation features a walk-thru dairy barn, loose stall housing and a self-feeding bunker silo.

Roepke raises feed crops and uses high moisture corn in his cattle feeding operation. He buys light yearlings in the fall and markets them as feeders or fed cattle the following spring or summer.

The Riley County farmer has 400 acres in irrigated and dry-land corn, 50 acres in alfalfa and 25 acres in wheat.

He harvests corn at 25-28 percent moisture, holds it in limited air storage, grinds each day and feeds corn along with the silage. He eliminates the silage and feeds ground corn only during the final 60 days before marketing.

At a noon luncheon at the Wamego City Park, Dr. Carroll V. Hess, dean of agriculture at K-State, said that proper decision-making is extremely criti-

cal in today's increasingly competitive and complex farm environment.

"There's no such thing as a \$10 or \$20 mistake in farming anymore," he commented. "Some may well be \$10,000 mistakes."

Dr. Hess listed three necessary steps in successful farm management:

- Keep a first class set of farm records
- Keep up to date on advancing technology
- Keep informed about markets for production inputs and farm products.

"Farm management is important on both large and small farms," he said. "The small and medium size farm operator can

compete if he follows good farm management procedures.

"Larger scale operations do not necessarily insure high returns. Poorly managed, they could lead to greater losses."

The noon program included brief remarks by Dr. Robert B. Hannon, in his first day as director of the K-State Extension Service.

Each farm visited at the field day was different from the others, in total investment, in the farming system employed, and in the amount of labor used.

But each demonstrated, Dean Hess said, "that there is a best farm plan for any given farmer with given resources, managerial abilities and set of family goals."

## Manhattan May Get Industrial Plum

MANHATTAN — Chamber of Commerce officials are mum and so are officials of a national printing firm, but the Wichita Eagle said last week it had learned that Norton Simon Inc. would construct a printing facility here that would employ 200 to 300 persons.

Norton Simon is an amalgamation formed by McCall Publishing Co., Hunts Foods Inc., and Canada Dry.

The printing firm said it would make an announcement when it had an announcement to make, and Manhattan civic and business leaders have been reluctant to discuss the subject for fear the company would be scared off by advance publicity.

Santa Fe repair shop work will be shifted out of Wichita yards to the railroad's Topeka yards, company officials say. Santa Fe has had about 250 workers in the repair yards and has told them to move to Topeka or find other jobs.

### NEW YORK HOPES TO HYPO LOTTERY

New York state hopes to get its sagging tax-raising lottery on its feet by contracting to sell tickets thru the American News Co., which thru its Union News Co. and Savarin restaurant chain operates newsstands, restaurants, gift shops, drug stores

and other retail facilities.

Net from the lottery goes to aid education. In its first full year of operation the lottery sold 62 million tickets at \$1 each, netting \$32 million. But that figure was well below forecasts of sales of 300 million tickets a year. Sales in June were the lowest since the lottery started.

## Same As A 3-Hammed Hog

Have you ever heard of a three-hammed hog? "We don't have such an animal, but today's hog yields 14½ pounds more lean meat, or about the weight of an extra ham, than did hogs 15 years ago," Wendell A. Moyer, Extension livestock specialist at Kansas State University, says.

In the past decade and a half, a 10 percent increase in the amount of lean meat, along with a 25 percent decrease in the amount of fat and lard, have resulted from advances in genetics and also in improved practices, Moyer explains.

In other words, the meat hog today has more lean and less

fat, more protein and fewer calories, he says. Today's pork has 36 percent fewer calories and 57 percent less fat than food consumption tables once indicated. Pork products contain as much or more protein than other animal protein foods.

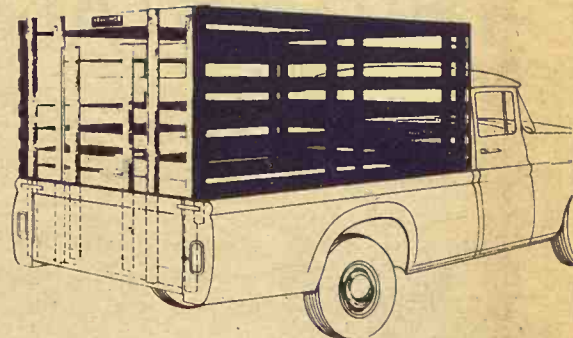

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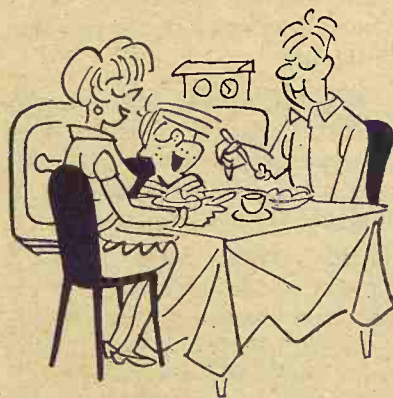

The merger becomes effective immediately. Interstate is the survivor with no name change.

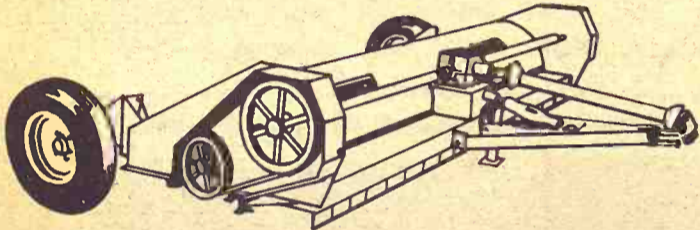
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## Suggestions On Mosaic Control

Kansas wheat farmers can take aim on a couple of would-be enemies in 1969 — streak mosaic and soil-borne mosaic.

Right now is the time to consider controls of these diseases in next year's wheat crop, Claude King, Extension plant pathologist, says. Once wheat is in the ground, nothing can be done.

To control streak mosaic, destroy all volunteer wheat in the field to be seeded at least 3 weeks before planting. Also, destroy volunteer wheat in adjoining fields at least a week before seeding wheat. This will destroy the virus in the plants and the mites which carry the disease.

King suggests using wheat varieties that show resistance to streak mosaic where they are adapted. Bison and Triumph have medium resistance, and Scout and Comanche have some resistance.

A third precaution against streak mosaic is to seed as late as considered practical for the area. Cool fall weather helps hold the disease in check.

King suggests farmers also consider using resistant varieties where there has been considerable soil-borne mosaic in the past. These include the new Shawnee variety recently developed by K-State, or Ottawa, Gage, Rodco, Tascosa, or Comanche.

Growers should ask at their county Extension office for the publication "1967 Report on Experiment Station Variety Tests with Small Grains" which gives the yield on wheat varieties at their closest experiment station.

## Farm Living Expenditures Vary With Age of Oldest Child

How much did your family living expenditures run last year? The answer probably varies with the age of your oldest child, according to a Kansas State University Extension economist.

Larry R. Kepley, Hutchinson, fieldman for Farm Management Association No. 2 in south central Kansas, reports that 138 farm families enrolled in this K-State sponsored educational program spent an average of \$5,152 on living expenses in 1967.

Families with a child older than 18 averaged \$6,821 a year in living expenditures. But those with no children in school spent only \$4,241.

Families with the oldest child

in grade school averaged \$4,112. For those with the oldest child in high school, the average was \$5,376. Couples with no children spent \$4,404 a year.

Kepley says families with older children also spent more on savings and life insurance. Those with the oldest child over 18 averaged \$1,732, while parents with pre-school children averaged \$569 on savings and life insurance.

"Older children usually require greater expenditures for such items as clothing and schooling," Kepley says. "In addition, families with older children are usually in their peak earning years, so they have more money to spend on these items."



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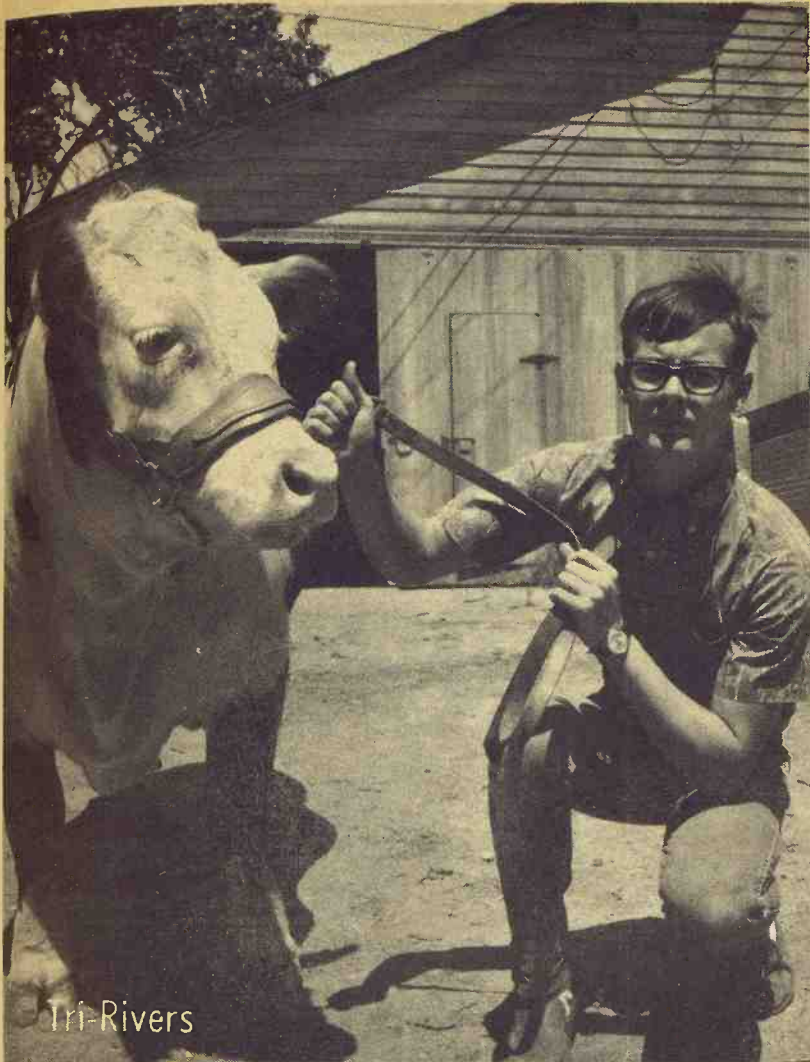

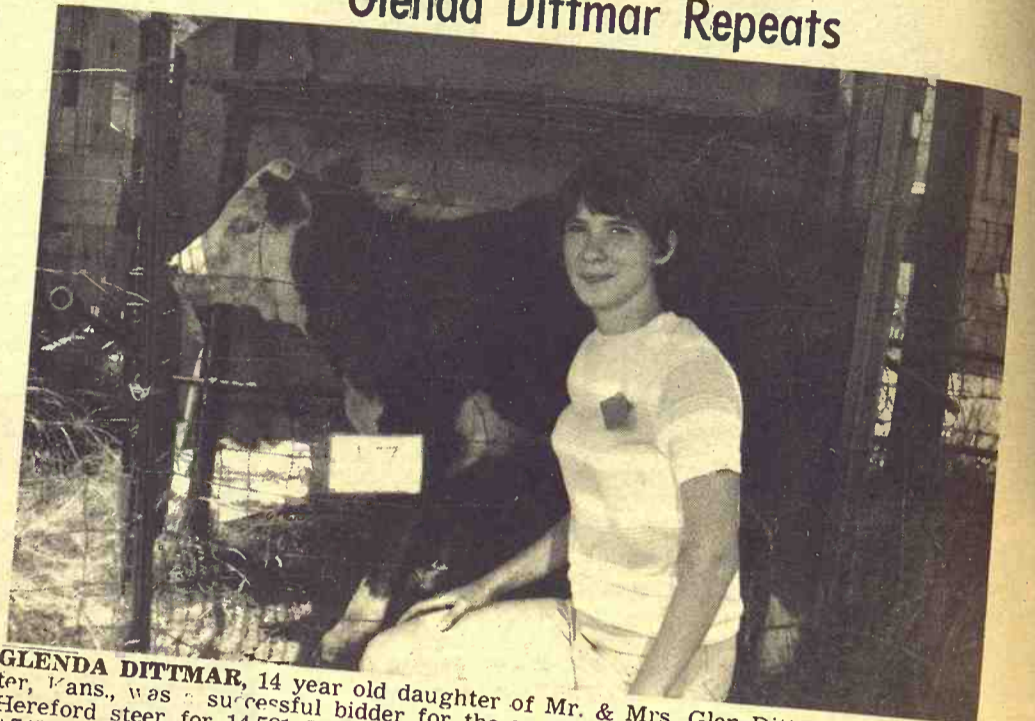

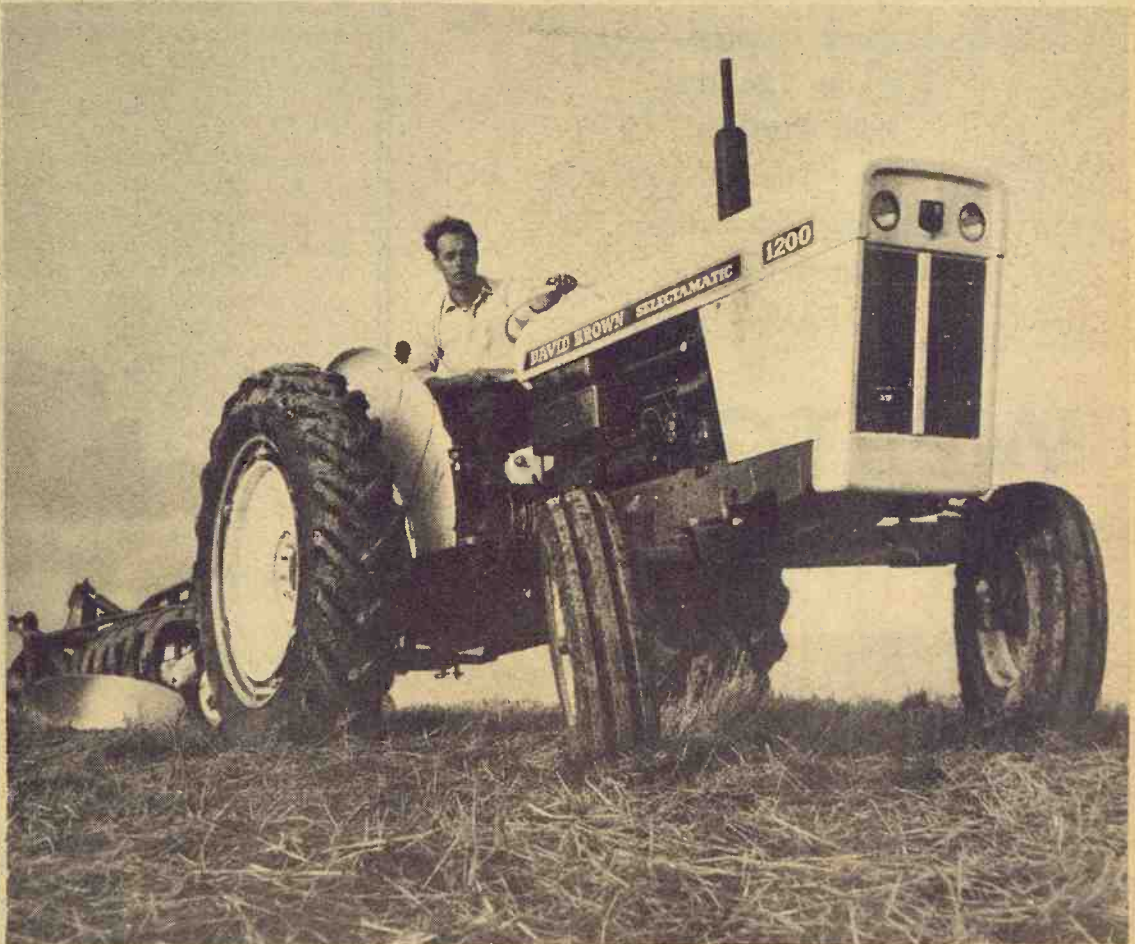

## Swift Will Raze Kansas City Plant

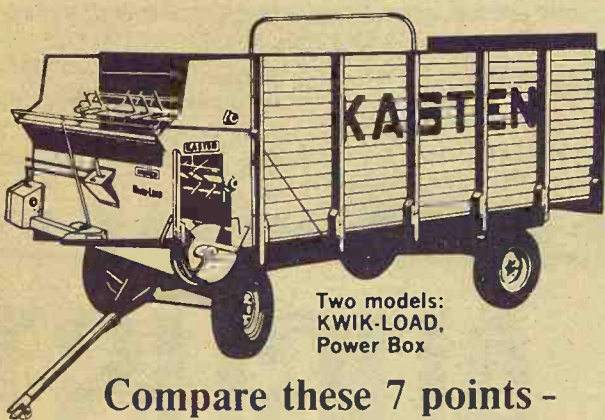
Swift & Co., which said it would reduce operations of its packing plant in Kansas City last January, is going to do more than that. It's going to raze most of the 25-acre plant on the west bank of the Kansas river.

Swift established the plant in 1888 and decided that remodeling the plant uneconomical. All

beef, lamb, veal and fresh pork packing have stopped in the Kansas City plant, and only a domestic sausage production will continue. Until the reduction Swift was slaughtering 12,000 hogs, 5000 lambs and 5000 cattle weekly.

Wilson is the only one of the four major packers in full swing in Kansas City. Cudahy quit its K.C. plant after the 1951 flood, and Armour closed its doors in 1965.

# Saline Land Sale Over Quarter-Million

SALINA — A \$282,767 auction sale has liquidated one of the early Saline County fortunes.

The estate of Henry Schippel sold in 16 tracts of land in a sheriff's sale of 1000 acres plus three city lots in Salina. Much of the land was along Ohio and Pacific streets in northeast Salina, attracting commercial de-

velopment prices as well as farmland.

Henry Schippel was the son of Gotthart Schippel, a German immigrant who with his brother John reached the Saline river a good year before Salina was founded in the 1850's.

The estate was built up thru land revenue acquired from a

river ferry across the Saline. The latter venture especially flourished when Schippel had a contract ferrying troops and gold-seekers across the Saline in the 1850s. Eventually nearly 10,000 acres were acquired, much of it now major commercial property in Salina.

Schippel died in 1906 and his children continued to operate the estate as a partnership until 1932. The son Henry died three years ago.

There are several descendants, including Mrs. D. A. Nelson of Salina.

The sale of the land brought anywhere from \$86 an acre for 80 acres of grass in Ottawa county, to over \$400 an acre for land on Pacific Avenue (old US 40) between Ohio and Front streets.

The latter purchase was made by Joe White, manager of the estate, who paid \$45,500 for the land along the Santa Fe tracks. The buildings in this area belong to the tenants.

White, with others, was also the bidder for \$87,000 for 280 acres along K4 near Smolan. This land averaged about \$310 and acre.

Bert Nelson, husband of one of the plaintiffs in the partition action, paid an average of \$360 an acre for 80 acres east of Salina, for a total of \$28,750, and Mrs. Nelson was listed as the bidder for another quarter in

that area for \$53,000, overaging \$333 per acre.

Another 80 east of Salina brought an average \$150 an acre, the North Central Investment Co. of Burr Oak paying \$12,050. Clayton Walker, the purchaser, also paid an average \$166 for 280 acres in that area. He had been grazing cattle on this pasture for a number of years.

The buyer of the 80 acres in Ottawa County was Glen Northern, Salina, who had adjoining land.

The three city lots went for \$500 to White and others; \$667 to Frank Bradley; and \$2050 to Floyd Walters.

Frank Harz and Bob Perry were auctioneers, handling the sale in about three hours. The sales were final, without redemption.

The property had been appraised at slightly over \$300,000. The law requires that property bring at least two-thirds of its appraised value. The total sale of \$282,767 was well within that restriction.

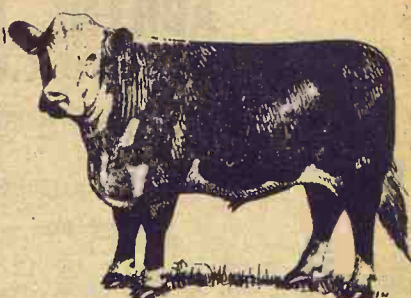

## Area Airline Still Building Despite Losses

Frontier Airlines — The Denver-based local service carrier which serves the G&G area and has hopes of becoming the next major trunk line — has conceded that it has had more than its share of cost troubles since it merged with Central Airlines in October 1967.

Frontier had a loss each of the first five months of 1968 and a \$2.4 million loss for the first half. Trade publications say that Frontier officials have confirmed that they have not paid bills as promptly as they had in the past.

Frontier has been very successful in gaining new routes. Civil Aeronautics Board officials say that it is possible that some of the new routes award-

ed Frontier haven't had "an opportunity to mature yet." But CAB people say that Frontier's losses won't affect its possibility of gaining more new routes. On July 1 two new round-trip flights between Winnipeg, Manitoba, Bismarck, N.D., and Denver were approved, and CAB has recommended four other new routes.

Frontier's goal has been to capture lucrative long-haul passenger markets between major cities, enabling it to reduce its Federal subsidies without cutting back on needed services to smaller towns — a plan that has endeared it to CAB. Despite its losses, Frontier cut its subsidy by three-quarters of a million dollars to \$3.7 million dur-

ing the last six months.

General Tire & Rubber owns 56% of Frontier thru its subsidiary, RKO General Inc. of New York.

Frontier has looked as cutting back on its costs, negotiating with bank and insurance lenders for the best interest rates and slowing down its equipment purchases.

The company has started an economy drive and delayed the initiation of new flights that might operate at a loss for the first months.

The airline has made selective fare increases in its famous promotional fares. Cut-rate promotional fares for such diverse groups as the military, clergy, government employes, youths, skiers, families and any group of 10 or more have annoyed its competitors, including the bus companies.

Some observers believe in its rush to get new routes, Frontier spread itself too thin. Many of its routes are over the most sparsely populated areas of the country and some say that in many cases it has more than enough flights to meet demand.

Lewis Dymond, chief executive of Frontier, claims that many of his critics are airlines who are trying to keep Frontier from gaining new routes in direct competition with them. Frontier has eight new route applications before applications before the CAB, including authority to fly to three cities not currently part of the Frontier system.

## Kansan In World Beef Improvement Planning

ROME — Walter Lewis, a Larned, Kans., rancher is meeting here with the United Nations Food and Agriculture Organization (FAO) to devise plans to improve native cattle production in underdeveloped countries.

Lewis, the only American named to a permanent committee of the World Hereford Council, met with the U.N. organization last week.

The conference was called to develop a master plan for improving quality of native cattle in parts of the world suffering the most severe hunger.

Lewis is president of the American Polled Hereford Association, Kansas City, and was appointed to the planning committee at the World Hereford Conference in Sydney, Australia this April.

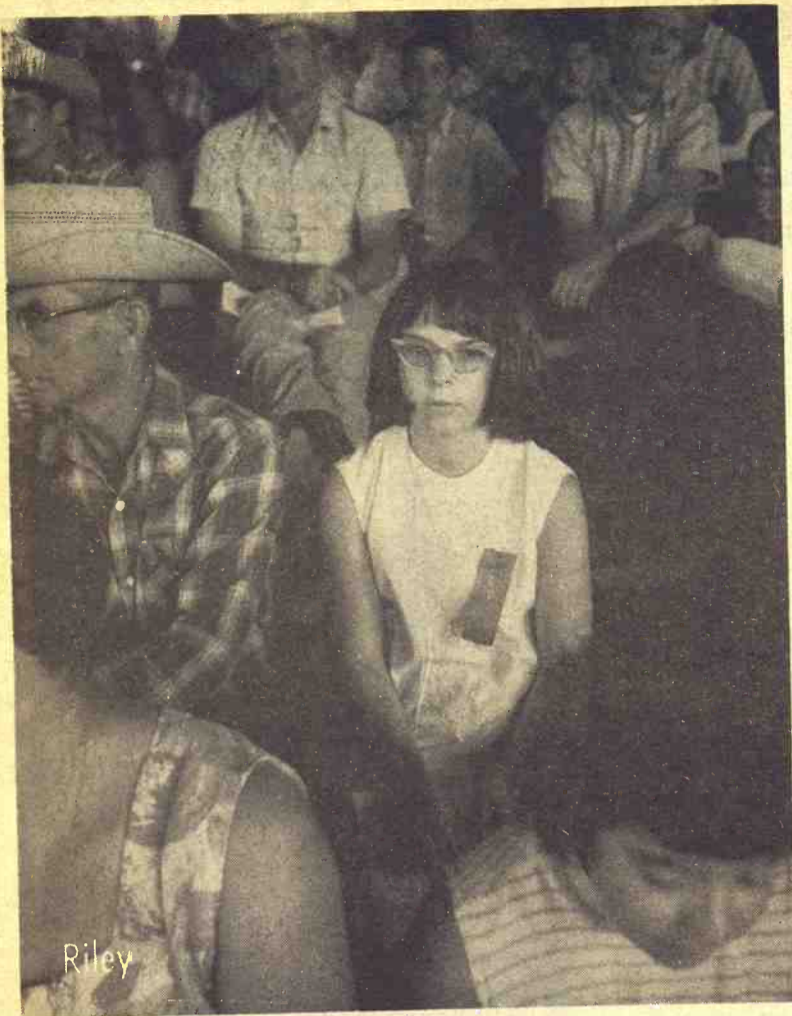

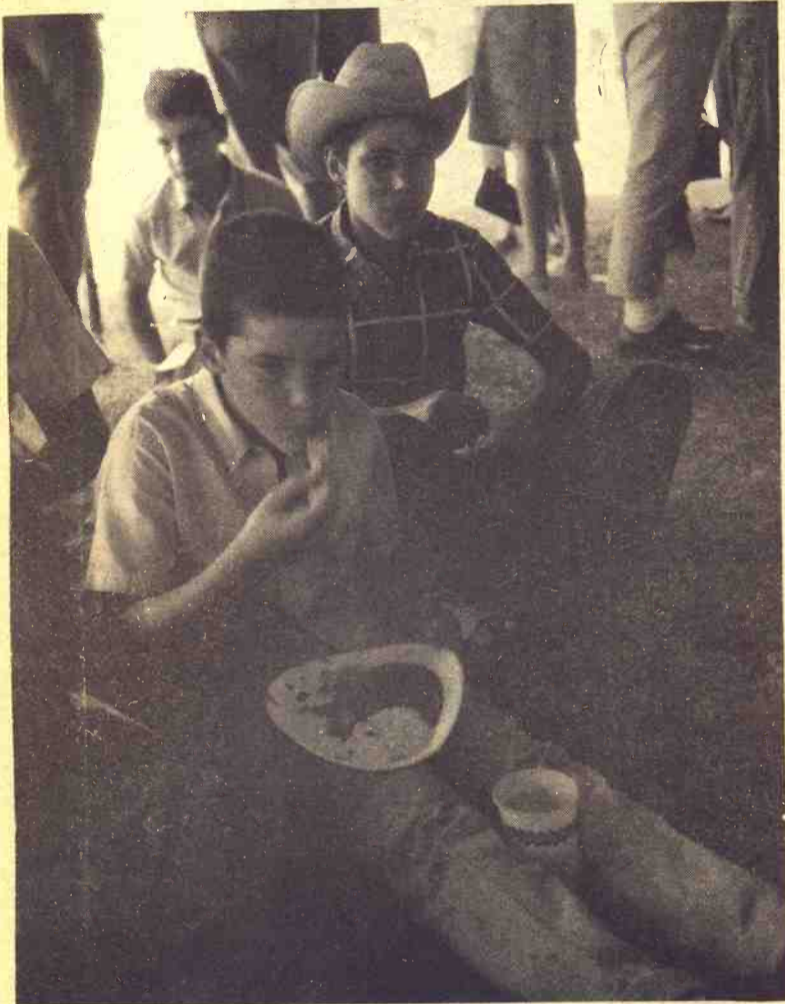

## House Mulls Farm Payment Limits Again

The House clamped a \$20,000 limit last week on individual payments received under the farm program and then voted to extend the controversial measure for one more year.

The vote on final passage was 213 to 176.

There are no payment limitations now. Proponents argued \$1 million payments are unacceptable and amount to a bonanza for corporate farms.

Chairman W. R. Poage, D-Tex., of the House Agriculture Committee warned that "the program just won't work if you limit participation of large operators."

But the house voted 230-160 to support the \$20,000 ceiling proposed by Rep. Silvio O. Conte, R-Mass.

It would apply to all payments to individual farm operators under programs relating to wheat, feed grains, cotton and wool, becoming effective in 1970.

The present program expires at the end of 1969. The one-year extension would carry it thru the 1970 calendar year.

The Senate has passed a four-year extension of the basic program but an effort to increase the House version to this level failed on a standing vote of 39-120.

Voting for Conte's limitation were 137 Republicans and 93 Democrats. It was opposed by 130 Democrats and 30 Republicans.

The over-all program has made possible payments of more than \$3 billion a year.

The result overturned an earlier voice vote rejection of the same proposal and a series of lopsided defeats for other forms of payment limitations.

Poage said the program is designed to limit production by providing payments to farmers for idling land but said the amounts are "not the bonanza that some have assumed."

Only one other amendment was approved to the straight one-year extension which had been voted by the Agriculture Committee. It provides that dairy farmers be given a quota for their share of the fluid milk market with one price for milk that does not exceed this am-

ount and a lower one for the portion that does.

## Big Crops May Hurt Cattle Market

The current expansion of the cattle business and prospects for another big crop of feed grains is causing concern that market prices for fed cattle may weaken severely in the coming months.

A trend to heavier cattle for the slaughter market appears

to be continuing, despite Agriculture Department warnings in July that heavier cattle could produce a price break.

Another indicator of possible stormy weather ahead is the department's current report on the numbers of cattle being fed for slaughter. The total on July 1 in the 32 major production states was estimated at 9,304,000 head, 7 per cent more than a year earlier.

The July 1 figure traditionally

shows a seasonal slump from winter and spring totals, but the decline this year was only 13 per cent below the April 1 estimate, compared to a 17 per cent decrease a year earlier.

Prices for slaughter cattle generally have been on an up-trend the last four years and have been rising from a low in the cycle about 18 months ago.

Department experts point out that stockmen frequently are tempted to hold cattle for feeding longer to use available grain. The added gains, however, often are burdensome to the market and tend to depress prices.

"Cattlemen sometimes deny this, saying they're better businessmen than this, but they do tend to hold cattle longer when prices start to slide," a department spokesman said.

A remedy, economists say, is for cattle feeders to take advantage of strong markets with lighter weight cattle.

Feeders in the 32-state area had 6,436,000 steers on feed on July 1, 2 per cent more than a year ago. Heifers showed a 12 per cent hike, to 2,839,000 on July 1, the department said.

This year's calf production is reported up 1 per cent from last year, reflecting the expansion

## Record Kansas Calf Crop

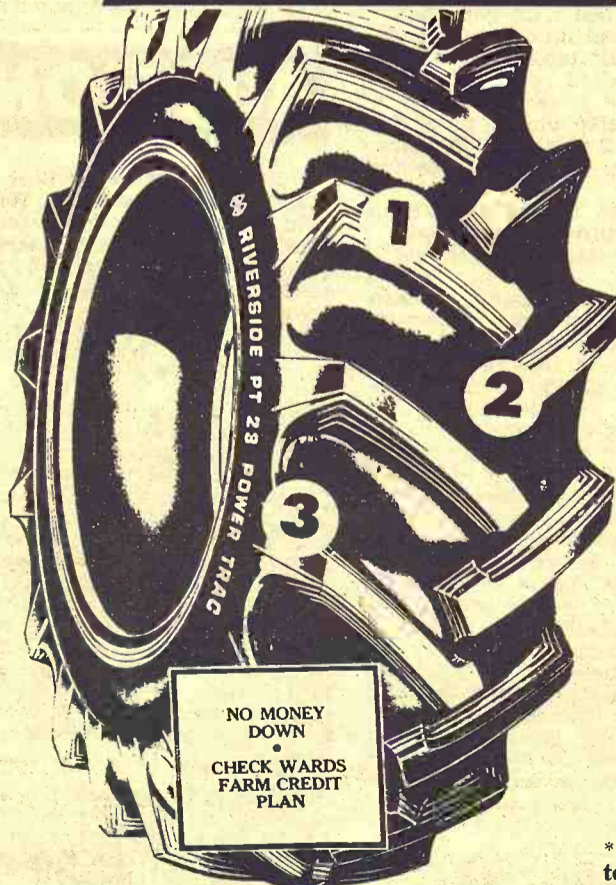

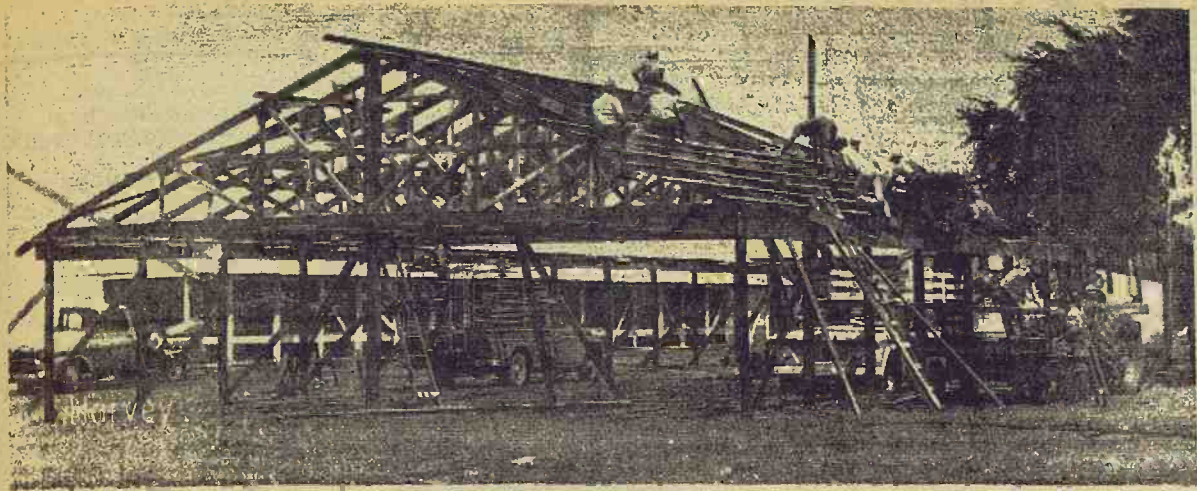

# No Record Of Corporate Farm Growth

Large corporate farms have not made serious inroads into the traditional family style of American agricultural production, says a new report by the Department of Agriculture.

The survey is a preliminary report on corporate farming in 22 states. It was ordered last fall by Agriculture Secretary

Orville L. Freeman and released Friday.

Corporations make up less than one percent of the commercial farms in the area, operate less than seven per cent of the land and sell about four percent of the farm products, the study shows.

"Further, more than 70 per

cent of the corporations found were family-owned, including many family type farms which have incorporated for business reasons," the report said.

Large-scale, corporation agriculture has caused concern among many who claim that huge "conglomerate" farming corporations could spell doom for family-type operations.

Sen. Gaylord Nelson, D-Wis., who has been investigating corporate agriculture for the Senate small business monopoly subcommittee, said the survey shows corporate farming is growing steadily and that more information is needed.

"No one suggests that corporation farming has already taken over American agriculture. But this report confirms the fact that the trend is increasing rapidly," he said in a statement.

A total of 6,700 corporation units are farming about 40 million acres of land in the 22 states. About one-third operated nonfarm activities in addition, the survey found.

Gross sales from the corporate farms were estimated at slightly less than \$1 billion, about four per cent of the cash receipts from all farms in the area last year.

Nearly 60 per cent of the 400 largest corporations were family owned.

The study covered corporations providing crops, livestock or livestock production and included feedlots, poultry and hatchery operations.

Corporations owned land but renting it to others were among those excluded.

The survey did not provide

substantial indication of growth of corporate farming or its impact on agriculture broadly.

States included in the preliminary survey: Michigan, Wisconsin, Minnesota, Ohio, Indiana, Illinois, Missouri, Iowa, North Dakota, South Dakota, Nebraska, Kansas, Montana, Nevada, Idaho, Wyoming, Colorado, New Mexico, Arizona, Utah, Washington and Oregon.

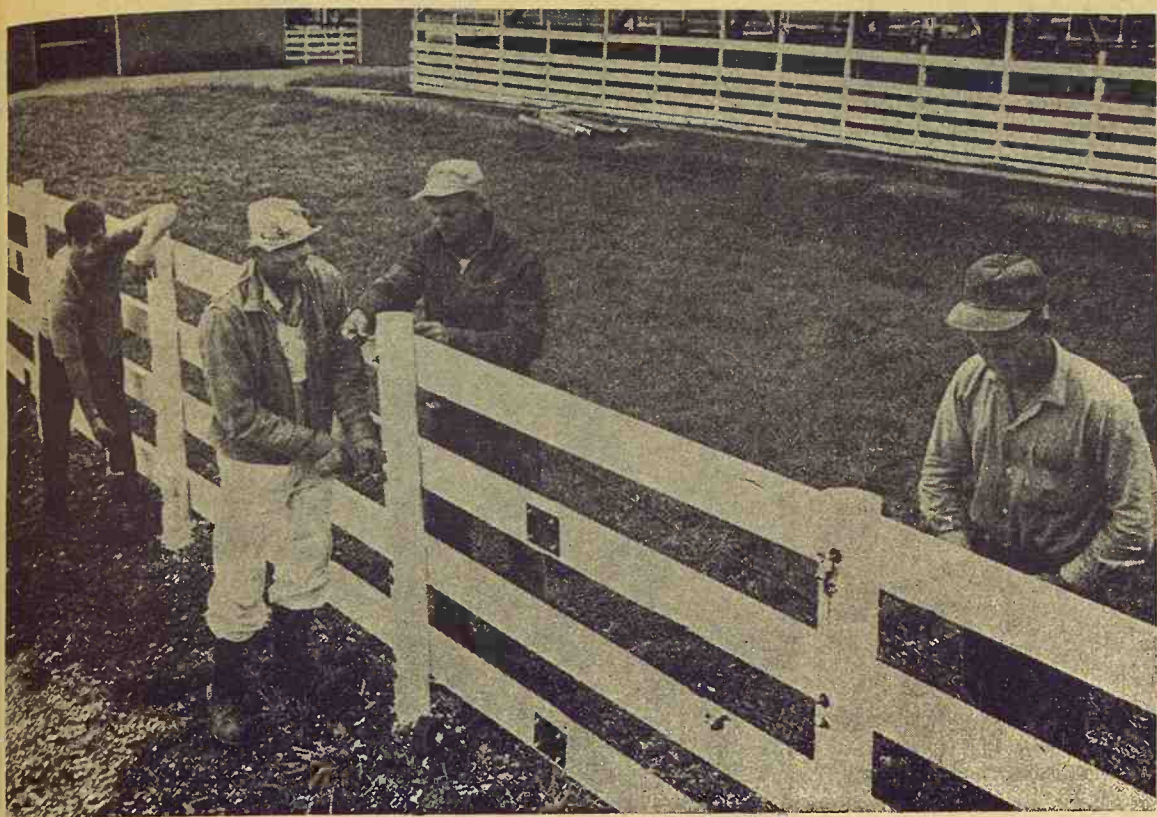

## More Cash, But Less Net, Farm Income Story Thru June

Cash receipts from the sale of farm products the first half of this year were about \$300 million above the mid-1967 mark,

the Agriculture Department said.

Higher prices for farm products accounted mainly for the increase, averaging about 2.5 per cent above a year earlier. Total volume of farm marketings was about the same, the department said.

Livestock sales totaled about \$12.3 billion, compared with \$12 billion for the first half of 1967.

Crop receipts were estimated at \$5.2 billion, about the same as for a year earlier. Prices averaged 3 per cent higher but volume was below 1967.

Production costs through June were estimated at \$35.5 billion, about \$1 billion over 1967.

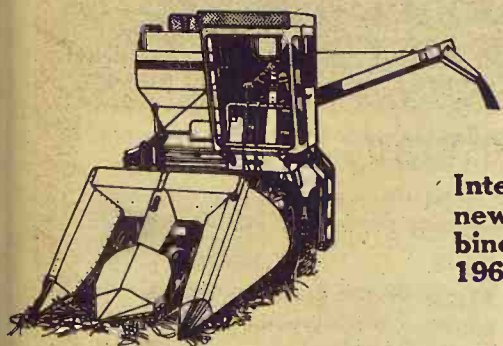
Farm machinery and motor vehicles were 5 per cent higher than last year. General farm supplies cost about 2 per cent more, but feed for livestock declined about 5 per cent, the department said.

Government payments to farmers, tabulated only through May, totaled \$568 million this year, compared with \$640 million for the same period in 1967. However, the department said the total for all of 1968 is expected to be about \$3.4 billion, compared with \$3.1 billion last year.

## Musk Thistle Found In Harvey County

HESSTON — Harvey county weed specialists say they have identified musk thistle as being present in the county. There are reports of the plant growing in an area south of Ha'stead. The weed, first reported in Kansas in 1948, has been spreading slowly across the state from the northeast.

The thistle is a severe threat to pasture land, for cattle will not graze in areas with heavy concentrations of the spiny thistle, and it threatens desirable forage plants by competing strongly for water, light and nutrients.

Chemicals may be used to destroy the plant.

County agent Jack Barnes said his office wants reports of locations of musk thistles found in the county.

# Late-Breaking Aphid Problem In Milo Fields

MANHATTAN — A critical aphid infestation has developed within the last few days in many grain sorghum fields in eastern and portions of western Kansas, according to Kansas State University Extension entomologists.

Just as the corn leaf aphids were beginning to diminish, the new aphid attack began to develop and many farmers have not detected the difference between the two species, Dr. Leroy Brooks said this week. "We have experienced heavy corn leaf aphid infestation in parts of the state for at least a month and corn leaf aphids are not particularly damaging to sorghum,"

he said.

The insect now working on sorghum is a pale-green aphid, tentatively identified by KSU entomologists as greenbugs. Since greenbug infestations on sorghum are unknown at this time of year and since the summer form may vary slightly in appearance from the winter form commonly found on wheat, entomologists hesitate to definitely label the new species as the true greenbug until further studies can be made, Brooks explained.

However, the toxic effect that the bug is causing on the sorghum plants is typical of greenbug injury and control meas-

ures are needed in many fields to prevent further damage.

The late-planted fields where sorghum plants are 6 to 18 inches high are the ones suffering the greatest amount of injury, the entomologist said. In many cases, the plants are completely loaded with greenbugs and affected plants turn red, wither, and eventually die where infestations persist.

The situation is not nearly as critical in early planted fields where sorghums are headed, Brooks said. Greenbugs may be present on the underside of the lower leaves, and some of the lower leaves may be lost, but this probably will not be critical at this stage of plant development. Also, in most cases, predators and parasites should eliminate infestations in these fields within the next 2 weeks, he said.

"We suggest farmers make immediate examinations of sorghum fields and particularly those that are late planted," Brooks urged. Greenbugs and corn leaf aphids are both small-bodied sucking insects, but greenbugs are a very pale yellowish-green with an indistinct stripe down the center of the back, whereas corn leaf aphids are very dark green.

To control greenbugs, spray malathion at 1 pound of actual, or apply 6 to 8 ounces actual diazinon per acre. These amounts are same for farmers to use in ground equipment. Drop nozzles may increase the amount of spray coverage.

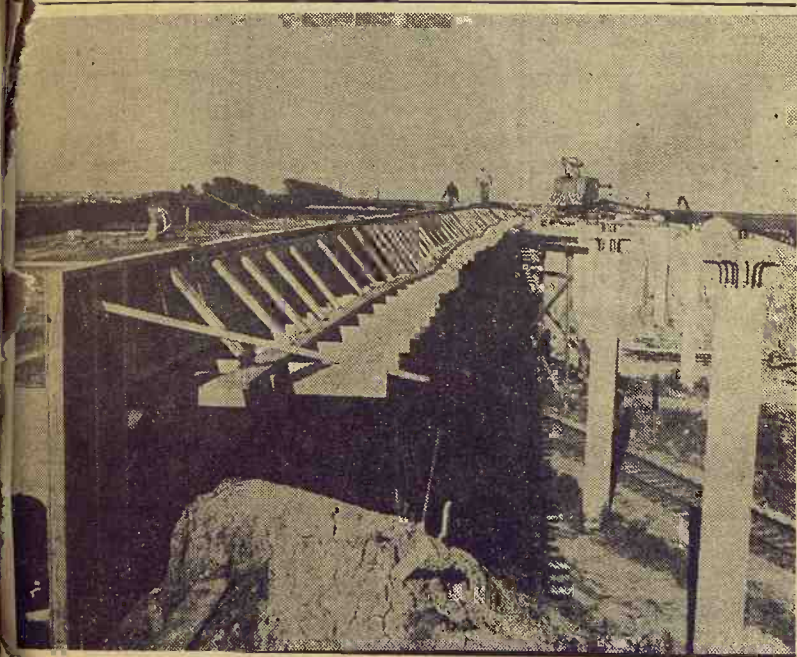
Experienced aerial applicators may also use 1/2 pound actual parathion or 2 to 4 ounces of actual phosdrin per acre where conditions are suitable. Plenty of spray volume should be used in both aerial and ground sprays since infestations will be difficult to control.

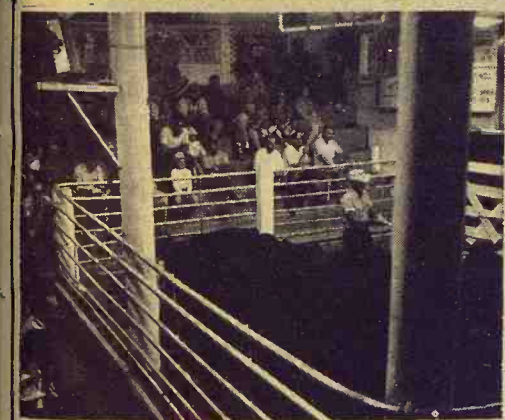
