ately below August a year ago, according to the Kansas Crop and Livestock Reporting Service.

The all-farm products price index stood at 225 per cent of the 1910-14 base, down 2 points from mid-July and 7 points below a year earlier.

Lambs, hogs, corn and sorghum grain decreased substantially from July while other grains, butterfat and chickens declined some. Higher prices were received for beef cattle, milk, eggs and turkeys.

### Crop Prices

The crop price index was 142 per cent of the 1910-14 base at mid-August, down 5 points from July and 19 points below a year ago.

Wheat averaged \$1.17 per bushel, 3 cents below July and the lowest since December 1942.

Corn brought \$1.07 per bushel, down 7 cents from a month earlier and 10 cents below last year.

Sorghum grain at \$1.64 per

cwt. was down 12 cents from a month ago and 23 cents below last year.

Soybeans averaged \$2.45 per bushel compared with \$2.47 last month and \$2.48 last year.

The oat price of 71 cents per bushel and barley at 90 cents per bushel were both 1 cent below July.

Alfalfa hay averaged \$20.50 per ton, unchanged from last month and last year.

### Livestock Prices

The livestock products price index as of mid-August was 319 per cent of the 1910-14 base, 1 point above July and 6 points above last year. The meat animal price index was 378 per cent compared with 379 per cent last month and 376 a year ago.

Hogs brought \$18.20, \$1.90 below July and \$1.70 below last year.

Steers and heifers averaged \$25.60 per cwt., compared with \$25.30 last month and \$25.30 in

August 1967. Cows at \$17.20 per cwt., were 20 cents below mid-July but 20 cents above a year ago.

Calves averaged \$25.40 per cwt., 10 cents below last month and 40 cents below August a year ago.

Lambs at \$24.20 were \$2.40 below last month but \$1.50 above August 1967.

### Dairy Prices

The dairy products price index at mid-August was 307 per cent of the 1910-14 base, 1 point above last month and 23 points above last year. The preliminary wholesale milk price, at \$5.10 per cwt., was 10 cents above July and 55 cents above August a year ago. The poultry and egg price index was 117 per cent, 6 points above mid-July and 8 points above last year. Chickens, at 6.4 cents per pound, were a little below last month while eggs, at 22.9 cents per dozen, were moderately

### To Thin Wildlife Refuge Herds

Kansas, Oklahoma, Colorado and Montana are in the process of thinning out their Buffalo, Elk and Longhorn herds.

In Pratt, Kans., reservations are now being accepted for the annual sale of surplus slaughter buffalo yearlings and adults.

Bob Wood, Game Biologist for the Commission in Pratt, said, "We are selling dead slaughter animals this year and hope to go to live sales next year. The Fish and Game Commission maintains around 500 head across the state in five herds and the sale this year is the excess over our limit."

"There are about 80 head to be sold from both the Finney County and the Maxwell Game Refuge herds. Both yearlings and adults are for sell."

The price for the yearlings is \$160 and the adults will cost \$185 each. Processing of the animals is the responsibility of the purchaser, but there are processors in Garden City, near the Finney County herd and in Canton, near the Maxwell herd who are equipped to handle the buffalo."

The only restriction on the purchase of these buffalo is that all sales are on a first-come, first-served basis, and no one may purchase more than five buffalo in a calendar year.

Persons interested in purchasing one or more of these animals may contact the Game Division, Forestry, Fish and Game Commission, P.O. Box 1028, Pratt, Kansas 67124.

At the Wichita Mountains Wildlife Refuge in Cache, Okla., slaughter buffalo and about 300 slaughter elk are to be sold. Applications may be received by writing the refuge manager in

care of the refuge.

The refuge is also going to offer at public auction on September 19, 1968, 83 head of Longhorn cattle and on November 21, 1968 between 50 and 60 head of live long yearling male and female buffalo. These auctions will be on individual animals and further information may be obtained by writing the refuge manager.

Fort Niobrara National Wildlife Refuge at Valentine, Colorado is having a public auction on October 22nd for 64 head of buffalo and 45 head of longhorn cattle. All inquiries should be directed to the Fort Niobrara Refuge manager.

The National Bison Range at Moiese, Montana, is accepting sealed bids on lots of buffalo. Details on this sale may be obtained by writing the refuge manager at Moiese, Montana.

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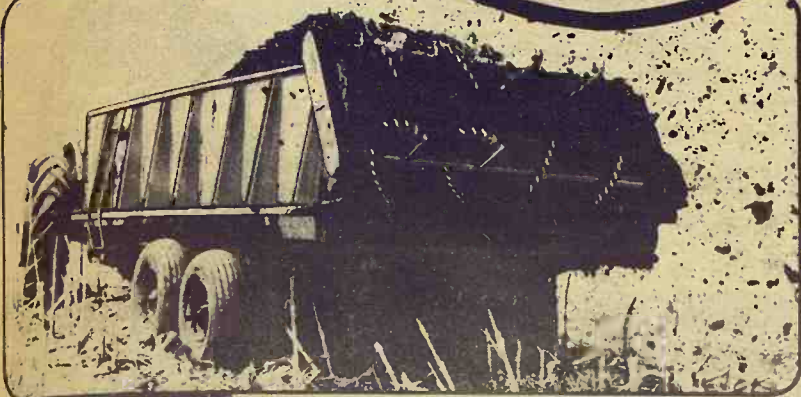
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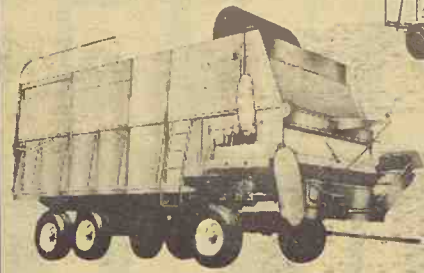


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## Lacy Sees 40% Beef Industry Gain By 1980

EMPORIA — A 40 percent increase in the Kansas beef industry by 1980 was forecast here by Jack Lacy, director of the Kansas Department of Economic Development.

Addressing the annual Flint Hills Cattlemen's picnic Lacy said, "In the near future Kansas will be one of the largest cattle feeding areas in the world."

Lacy based his projections on an expected increase in national population to about 245 million people, and an increase in beef consumption per person. "Kansas will be marketing about 1,400 slaughter cattle in 1980 for every 1,000 marketed now," he stated.

The KDED Director believes the projected increase is "very conservative, since it is based on a three percent increase per year for 13 years. Actually the increase in Kansas has been nearer five percent a year since 1960."

More and expanded meat packing facilities will be built in Kansas to keep pace with the growth, he predicted.

"When ground was broken for the new \$4 million National

Beef Packing plant in Liberal, it marked the sixth new multi-million-dollar meat processing facility to be built in Kansas during the past five years. The Liberal facility, which will process 2,000 cattle daily and employ 300 persons, marks the second beef packing plant to get under construction in 1968," Lacy said. Iowa Beef Packers are completing work on a \$4 million plant in Emporia. The Emporia plant will handle 8,000 head of cattle a week and employ 200 persons.

"Everything is in favor of this continued expansion in Kansas," Lacy said, "the climate is proving most favorable for feedlot operation and our geographic location is best for nation-wide marketing."

He pointed out that more than 100 million bushels of grain sorghums produced in Kansas annually provide lower cost grains than can be obtained in many other states. Kansas ranks fourth among the states in beef production with a total of more than 5.6 million head of cattle.

Lacy credited the Kansas cattlemen with supporting the state's red meat packing industry which he said produces an income of \$533 million a year and provides employment for 10,000 Kansans. Employment in

Wichita-operated packing plants runs well over 2,000.

"Cattle and calf sales are the number one source of cash receipts from farming in Kansas. They provided 37 percent of cash receipts to Kansas farmers during a recent 10-year period. This compares with 34 percent from wheat; and only 29 percent from all other sources," Lacy concluded.

## P&S Slap At Wilson-Flynn

The Agriculture department has announced that the Wilson-Flynn-Laws Commission company, which operates at the Kansas City stockyards, has been ordered to stop violating the packers and stockyard act.

Thomas J. Flavin, Agriculture department judicial officer, ordered the firm to cease and desist from violating trust account, conflict of interest, tariff and record keeping requirements of the act.

In answering the complaint, the firm neither admitted nor denied the allegations, the department said, and consented to issuance of the order. The firm also was ordered promptly to deposit proceeds for livestock sold on a commission basis in a special trust account.

## Reduce Discounts For Low-Grade 'Sample' Wheat

The Agriculture Department has announced an increase in price support loan rates for several types of low-grade wheat.

The increase was made effective by limiting discounts originally applied to wheat graded as "sample" because of low per-bushel weight and other defects including sprout damage.

Under the original discount schedule for this year's crop, the discount for wheats graded and total defects was as much as 70 cents per bushel.

Now, total discount below the normal price support loan will not exceed 30 cents per bushel where total defects are under 50 per cent of the wheat, or 45 cents where total defects are above 50 per cent.

The department said the action was taken to prevent heavy losses to farmers because of sharp marketplace reductions for damaged grain. It said this was a particular problem in Idaho where weather has caused sprout damage.

Under previous discount schedules, price support loan rates for some damaged wheat were below the value of the grain for livestock feed, the department said. It added its new discount schedule did not apply to wheat graded "sample" where test weight of the wheat was below 40 pounds a bushel.

**Drastic Cutback By Turkey Growers**

Turkeys raised in Kansas in 1968 are expected to total 371,000 birds, 38 per cent below 1967, according to the Kansas Livestock Reporting Service.

The number raised this year is about half the 1962-66 average and the smallest for Kansas in any year since 1931.

Heavy breed turkeys raised are estimated at 364,000, a decrease of 39 per cent from last year. Light breed turkeys raised are estimated at 7,000, more

than double the number raised in 1967.

Turkey poult hatched in Kansas during the period September 1967 through July 1968 were almost three times the number raised this year with outshipments far exceeding in-shipments.

**United States**

Turkeys raised in the nation during 1968 are expected to total 106.9 million birds, 16 per cent below 1967. Fewer turkeys are expected in all regions.

Decreases from last year by regions are as follows: North Atlantic, 15 per cent; East North Central, 16 per cent; West North Central, 15 per cent; South Atlantic, 5 per cent; and South Central and West combined, 20 per cent.

Minnesota, the leading turkey producing state this year, will raise 16.1 million birds; followed by California with 14.4; Missouri, 9.1; North Carolina, 8.2; Texas, 7.0; Arkansas, 6.9; Iowa, 6.0; Virginia, 4.5; Wisconsin, 4.1; and Ohio, 3.8 million.

Turkey poult hatched during the period September 1967 through July 1968 were 17 per cent below the corresponding

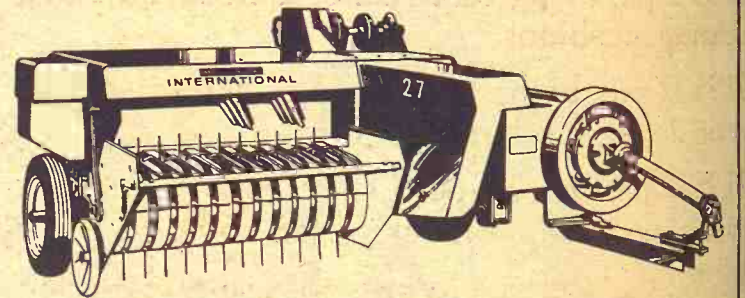
period the previous year. Compared with a year earlier, decreases occurred in all months except September and October, which were up 15 and 18 per cent, respectively.

The largest percentage decreases from a year earlier occurred from December 1967 through March 1968. During this period changes ranged from 72 per cent in December to a low of 60 per cent in Jan-

uary 1968.

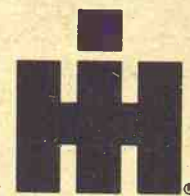
The number of heavy breed eggs in incubators on August 1 was down 14 per cent and light breed eggs in incubators were down 37 per cent from a year earlier. Prices received by producers for live turkeys during January through July have been below the same months in 1967.

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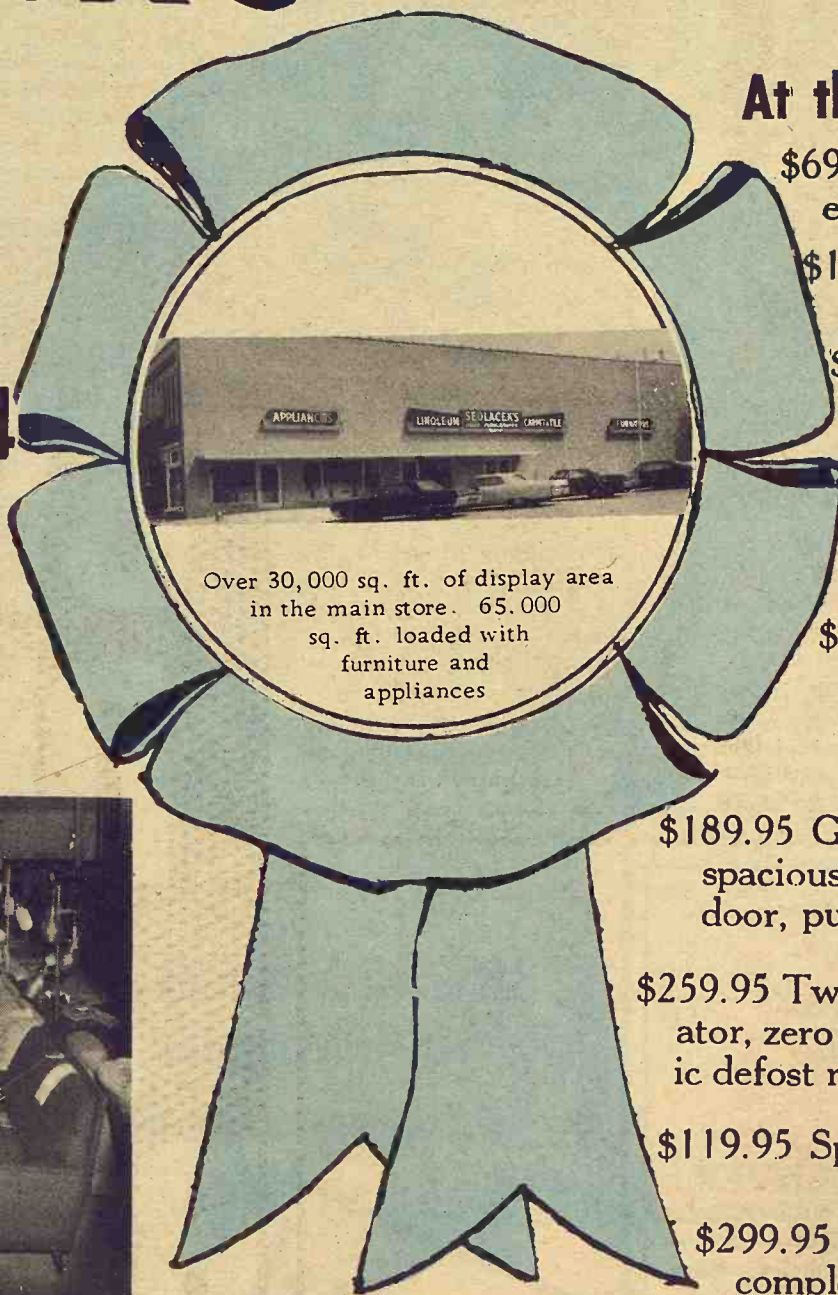

#### GLAZED PEACH PIE

4 cups sliced fresh peaches  
1/2 cups water  
1 cup sugar  
3 tablespoon cornstarch  
1 tablespoon butter  
9-inch baked pie shell

Crush enough peaches to make 1 cup, leaving the rest sliced. Combine crushed peaches with water, sugar and cornstarch. Bring to a boil. Cook over low heat until clear 2 or 3 minutes, stirring occasionally. Add butter. Cool slightly. Line baked pie shell with fresh peach slices. Pour glaze mixture over peaches. Chill two hours. Top with whipped cream.

#### CHRISTMAS CASSEROLE COOKIES

2 eggs  
1 cup sugar  
1 cup English walnuts  
1 cup cut-up dates  
1 cup coconut  
1 teaspoon vanilla

1/4 teaspoon almond flavoring  
Beat eggs. Add sugar gradually. Add other ingredients. Put in an ungreased 2-quart casserole. Bake at 350 degrees for 30 minutes. While still hot, stir and then cool. After it is cooled make small balls and roll them in sugar. Makes 3 dozen.

Mrs. Sam Bervin, 1027 F Street, Fairbury, Nebr.: "Ever wonder what to do with those big, yellow-ripe cucumber that ripened under the leaves before you found them? This recipe, Yellow Cucumber Pickles, is a tempting answer to your problem."

#### YELLOW CUCUMBER PICKLES

12 large ripe cucumbers  
12 large white onions  
12 large stalks celery  
1/2 cup canning salt  
3 cups sugar  
1 quart white vinegar\*  
2 tablespoons mustard seeds  
1 cup prepared mustard  
Peel cucumbers; scrape out seeds. Cut cucumbers, onions and celery in small cubes. Sprinkle with salt; let stand 2 hours. Rinse well with cold water; drain. Add sugar, vinegar, mustard seeds and prepared mustard. Bring all to a boil; stir to prevent scorching. Ladle into hot, sterilized jars; seal at once. Makes 11 pints.

A white distilled vinegar gives pickles the best color. Cider vinegar may darken the pickles, but some cooks like to use it for its flavor and aroma. Be sure that the vinegar you use has a 4 to 6% acid content . . . look on bottle label for acid content.

Irene Myers, 214 West 4th, Topeka: "Here is a recipe I tried and I like it real well. The first batch I made I peeled the cucumbers — the rest I didn't."

#### PICKLES

1 quart sliced cucumbers  
1 medium onion  
1/2 cup salt  
2 quarts water  
1 pint cider vinegar  
1 cup medium brown sugar  
1 teaspoon mustard seed  
1/2 teaspoon celery seed  
1 tablespoon mixed spices  
1 teaspoon tumeric powder

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into 8 equal parts, cored and seeded). Place apples in parallel rows as close as possible in a greased 8x12-inch pan. Mix together 2 tablespoons sugar and 1/4 teaspoon cinnamon. Sprinkle over apples. Put 1 cup flour, 1/2 cup butter, 1/2 cup brown sugar in bowl. Cut until mixture is crumbly. Sprinkle over and between apples. Pat to make a smooth surface. Bake 30 minutes in 425-degree oven. Serve either warm or cool. Note: If you don't have fresh apples use 2 cans of sweetened pie sliced apples.

The following recipe is from Mrs. Clarence Hobbs of Beverly:  
**HARVARD BEETS**  
1 can or 2 cups cooked beets  
1 cup sugar  
1 tablespoon cornstarch  
1/2 cup water or juice drained from canned beets  
1/2 cup vinegar  
2 tablespoons margarine  
Mix sugar and cornstarch. Add vinegar and water or beet juice and boil five minutes. Add beets to hot sauce. Add butter, let stand at least 30 minutes. Serve either hot or cold.

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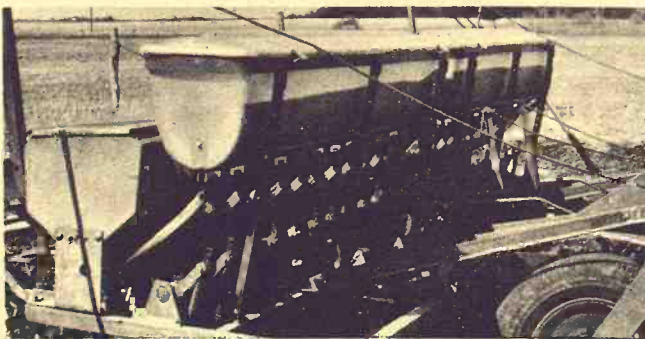
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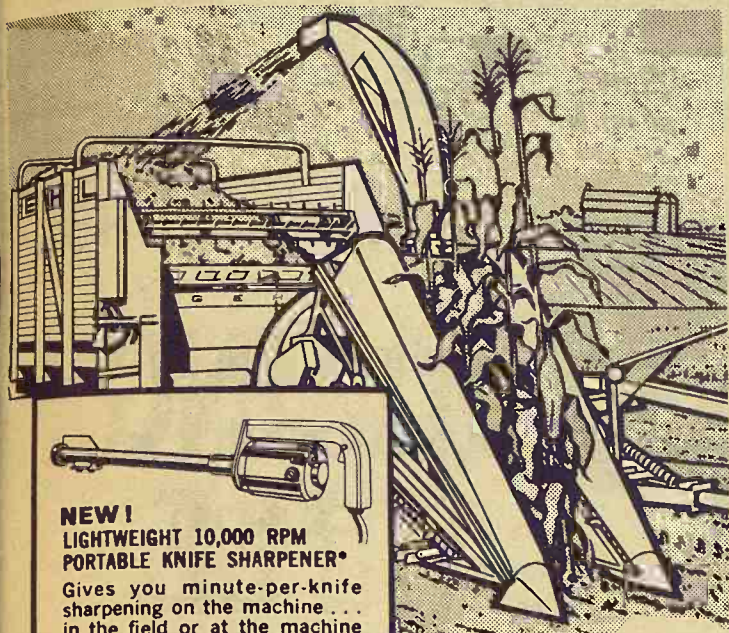
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## Many Ways To Use Versatile Raisin Bread

18 slices raisin bread  
1/3 cup softened butter  
3/4 cup cheddar cheese spread  
dash dill weed  
2 (4 1/2-ounce) cans deviled ham  
1/2 teaspoon prepared mustard  
1 tablespoon mayonnaise  
Spread raisin bread lightly with butter. Combine cheese spread and dill weed. Mix deviled ham with mustard and mayonnaise. Make into six triple decker sandwiches using both fillings in each. Press lightly together; cut as desired. Makes six triple decker sandwiches.

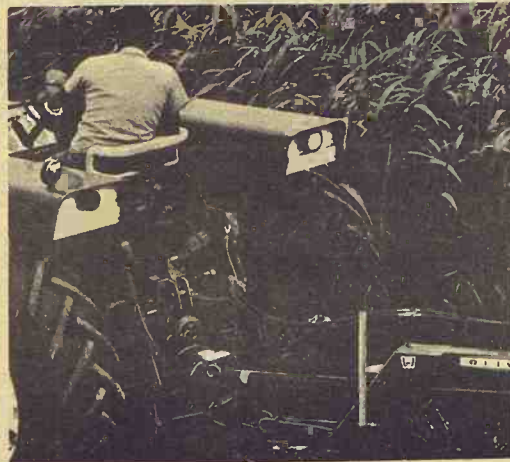

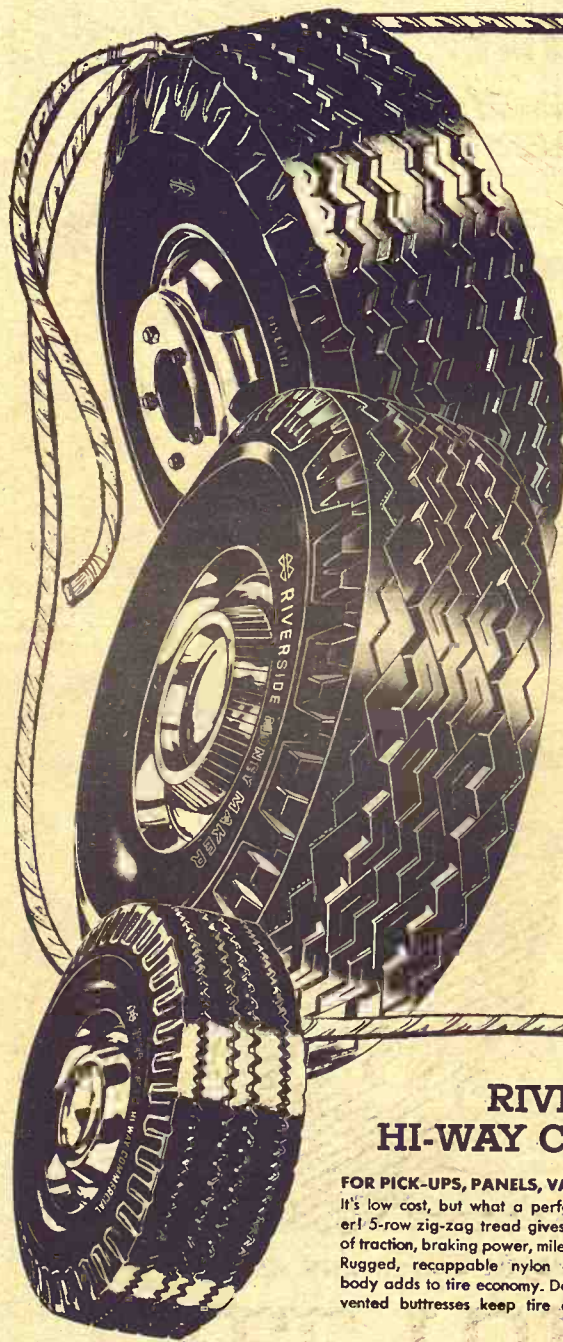

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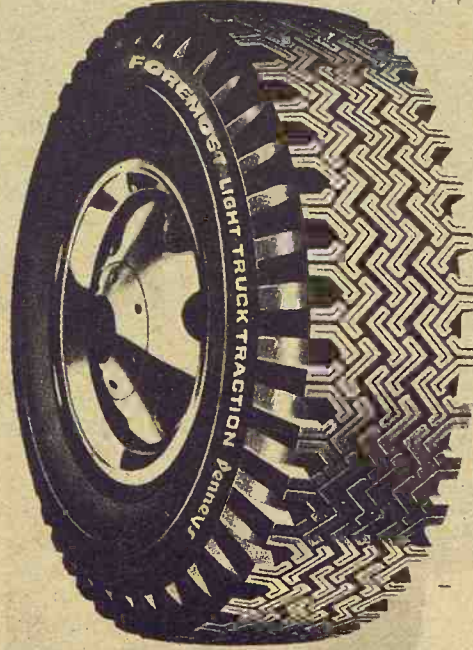

## New Speed Control

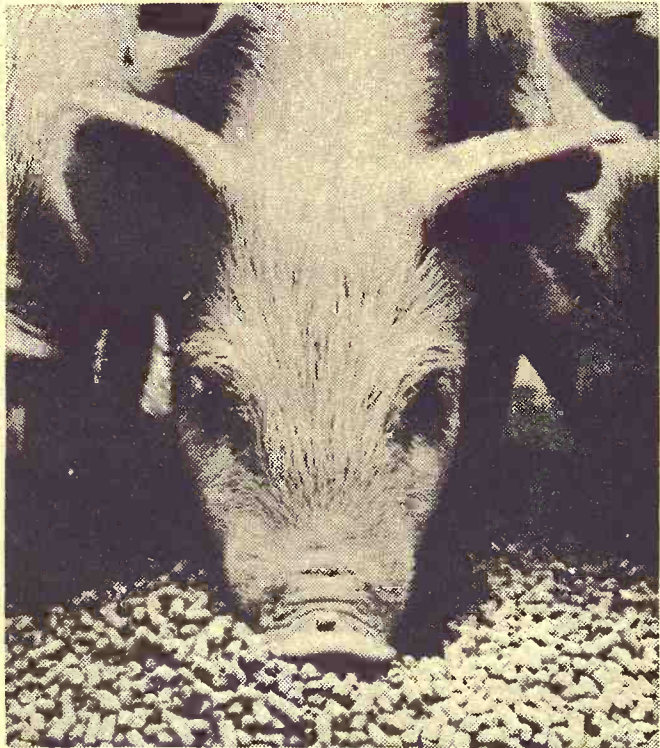
The Kansas Highway Patrol has put into use an electronic device called VASCAR that can compute the speed of any vehicle within sight of the patrolman. The main unit is installed underneath the driver's seat with a digital display module, which shows the computed speed, mounted on the dash (right).

The device allows a police officer to calculate speed of an auto whether it is coming or going, behind or ahead of his police car — or moving on a cross street.

The device can be used when the patrol car is parked or moving.

Initially only 50 of the Highway Patrol's 250 cars will be equipped with VASCAR, but if it proves as successful as officials anticipate, all cars will be so equipped, and replaced will be the patrol speedometer, stopwatches and roadside radar equipment as clocking tools.

The Patrol said a recent survey showed 12 percent of the drivers on expressways around Topeka were speeding, and the percentage around Russell rose to 28.

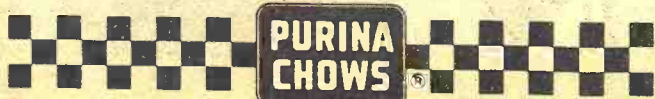

## Seasonal Decline Ahead In Hog Market

By Robert L. Coppersmith

A seasonal decline is ahead for hog prices the next few months, the result of an increase in marketings.

Look for prices to bottom out at the \$17 to \$18 level during November or early September.

## FALL OUTLOOK

Number of 120- to 179-pound hogs on farms June 1 was up 3 percent from a year earlier. In addition, the supply of pork in storage is up 13 percent. Pork will also face more competition from slightly higher supplies of beef and chicken.

Price discounts on heavy hogs will be smaller than in June and July. Hogs weighing 240 to 280 pounds may sell within 50 to 75 cents of top hogs.

Price differentials for meat-type hogs will improve as hog supplies increase to the point where buyers can be more selective. Meat-type hogs may consistently sell for 50 cents to \$1 more this November when supplies are plentiful.

Look for feeder pig prices to hold up fairly well during September, level off for a few weeks, then fall off late this fall. Prices for 40-pound pigs will be in the \$15 to \$17 range during September and then drop to \$12 to \$14 in November and December.

Several factors point to a more stable hog market during the next few years. There are more large scale hog enterprises today, and modern hog farmers are less inclined to "jump in and out." Multiple farrowing will result in more stable market supplies.

6 to 6½ percent. As a result, inflation will likely run around 3 percent in the coming year.

The unemployment level will likely creep up further in the coming year and probably will drop employment below the level normally considered as full employment for our economy.

The problem in coming months is to reduce demand pressure sufficiently to control inflation without reversing the present upward growth trend of our

economy.

The quantity and quality of the labor force, potential to use this labor more intensively, and actions by consumers point to a continued healthy growth rate for our economy in the long run.

## See Slackening Of Pace Of Economy

The rate of expansion in the nation's economy is expected to slow in the coming year from the fast pace of recent months. Total annual production of goods and services — known as gross national product — should increase more than \$60 billion to an estimated \$852.3 billion during 1968. Almost two-thirds of this increase occurred during the first half of the year and a slower pace should prevail during the second half and into 1969.

About half the gain in GNP likely will be the result on inflation. The consumer price in-

dex was up 4.2 percent in the 12 months ended in June 1968 — the most rapid single year gain recorded in a decade and a half.

The economic brakes have been applied in response to our over-heated economy through a planned \$6 billion cut in government spending and a 10 per-

cent increase in federal income taxes.

These moves were intended to reduce demand pressure on the economy.

There is evidence, however, that demand was already beginning to weaken during the sec-

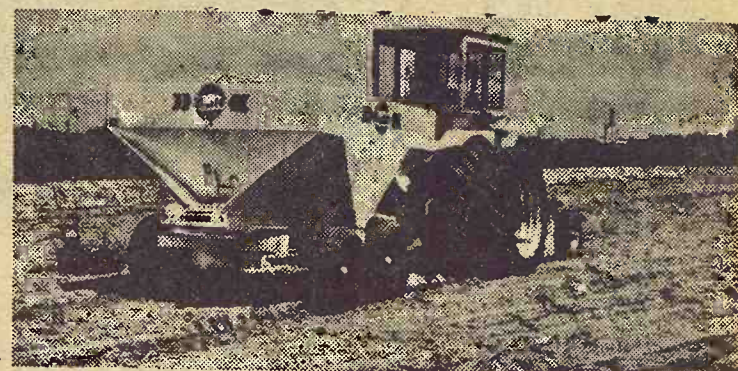
ond quarter of this year, although part of this may have been in response to anticipated higher taxes.

Business spending is expected to moderate somewhat in the coming year but should increase modestly. Government spending should grow at a reduced rate, the result of recent fiscal policy action. Pressure for government spending will remain strong, however, due to defense needs and domestic programs.

Spending by state and local government is likely to continue upward.

All this adds up to continued demand pressure on the economy, but the rate of increase is expected to be slow. This is the objective of the current monetary and fiscal policies.

Cost-push inflation is expected to be a problem in coming months due to wage settlements that have been running around



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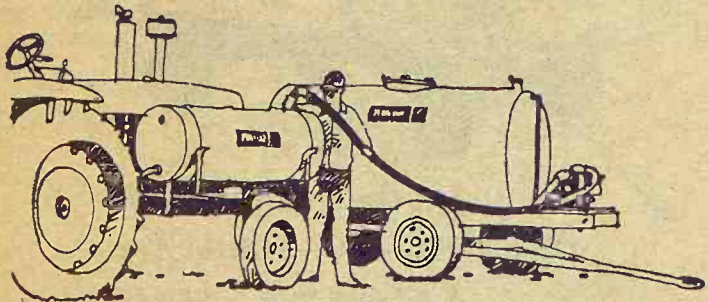

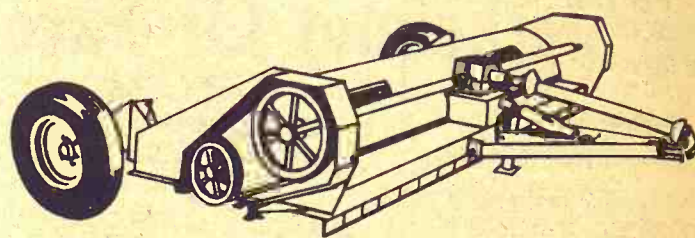

# Optimistic Feeder Forecast

By Robert L. Coppersmith  
Kansas State University

The feeder cattle outlook is an optimistic one for this fall and winter, with prices expected to hold near present levels thru October 1, then decline slightly during November and December.

Prices during early 1969 should top those of the same period of 1968.

## FALL OUTLOOK

Choice 400-pound steer feeder-calves will consistently sell in the \$31 to \$33 range this fall while 550 to 700 pounders will bring between \$27 and \$29.

Heifers in the same weight range will sell for \$3 to \$5 less than steers. Look for next spring's prices to be slightly higher than this fall.

Several factors account for the optimism in feeder cattle prices:

Cattle feeding profits have been reasonably good during the past 6 to 10 months. Feeders have experienced a favorable margin between prices paid for feeder cattle and prices for slaughter cattle sold.

—Feed should be relatively cheap during the rest of 1968 and 1969. Pasture and forage conditions are good in most areas and more feed grain is available than last year. Cheap feed usually means higher feeder cattle prices.

—The strong demand for beef this year is expected to carry over to 1969.

—The supply of feeder cattle is near or below a year earlier. Coupled with increased demand, this means prices, while declining seasonally, will remain strong.

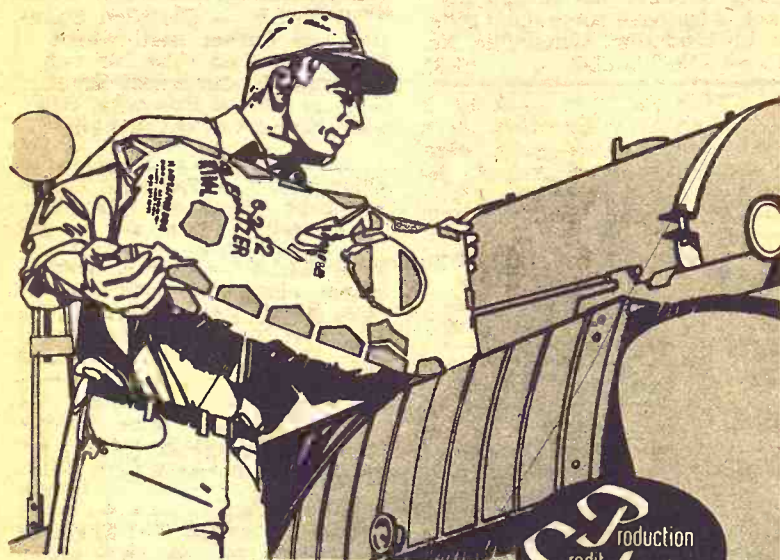

Pursuant to Article 14, Section 1 of the Constitution and in compliance with House Concurrent Resolution No. 1063, adopted by the legislature on March 7, 1968, a proposition will be submitted to the voters at the November 5, 1968, General Election for their approval or rejection to amend Section 2 of Article 4 of the Constitution as follows:

"Sec. 2. General elections and township elections shall be held biennially on the Tuesday succeeding the first Monday in November in the years bearing even numbers. All county and township officers shall hold their offices for a term of two years and until their successors are qualified: Provided, One county commissioner shall be elected from each of three districts, numbered 1, 2, and 3, by the voters of the district, and the legislature shall fix the time of election and the term of office of such commissioners; such election to be at a general election, and no term of office to exceed six years."

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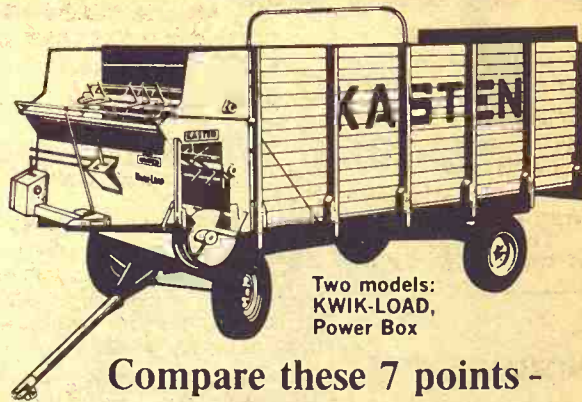

Turkey Prices Better Than '67

By M. E. Jackson  
Kansas State University

U.S. farm turkey prices during the remainder of the August-November marketing season should average 21 1/2 to 22 cents per pound or about 2 to 2 1/2 cents higher than last year.

Most of this price increase will occur during the latter part of the period.

The 1968 turkey crop will total about 106 million birds, down some 16 percent from the 1967 crop. Carryover on July 1, 1968,

FALL OUTLOOK

was an alltime record 185 million pounds, 25 million more than in 1967. This factor will tend to limit early prices of live turkey.

Slight upward pressure on live prices will result from a recently announced USDA purchase program designed to remove 15 million pounds of stored turkey from marketing channels.

Present trends point to a favorable 1969 turkey season as less breeding stock is being placed. However, more breeding stock could become available for the 1969 poult starting season if prices of market birds are higher than expected.

Turkey production in Kansas will be some 16 percent lower than the 600,000 birds produced in 1967. Kansas producers should continue to receive U.S. average prices during the coming year.

Milk Hike, Premium Hike Cancel Out

The federal marketing order price to farmers in the G&G area on class I milk will go up 24 cents a hundred pounds September 11. However, at the same time, the premium which the dairy co-op which supplies milk in the area has been charging handlers will be reduced by 24 cents.

Thus the price to handlers (bottlers) of milk will be unchanged.

Last spring, Mid-America Dairymen Inc., a consolidation of dairy co-ops of several states negotiated a premium of 50c a hundred pounds over the federal marketing order price for class I milk sold to handlers in this area.

Recently, following hearings, the government determined to raise the federal market order price in Kansas City 24 cents a

hundred pounds to bring it in line with prices in Chicago and other cities in the Middle West. This is the order that is to take effect September 11.

The price farmers will get after September 11 on class I milk is \$6.33 a hundred pounds, which will include \$6.07 as the federal marketing order price plus 26 cents remaining in the premium.

The price farmers actually get for their milk is a blend, depending upon utilization. Around 60 to 70 per cent of the milk handled by the co-op is used for class I purposes. The remainder goes for cottage cheese (class II) for manufacturing purposes (class III). In August \$4.50 a hundred pounds was paid for milk classified as Class II, and \$4.20 was the class III price. It is not until the milk is sold that the actual blend price can be determined. However the new federal marketing order price should make little difference either to farmers or handlers because of the corresponding reduction being made in the premium.

A Peak To Improvement For Dairymen

Dairy farmers are better off today than ever before. However, the period of rapid price improvement and farmer income seems to be ending.

Production is leveling off. Consumption is falling, and fluid milk substitutes threaten to steal part of the Class 1 market.

FALL OUTLOOK

Next year should be another good one for dairy farmers, but prospects for big price increases are slight, and rising costs should wipe out any gains from higher prices.

Nationally, Grade A milk should average \$5.70 this year up from \$5.44 in 1967. The 1968 price is expected to average about \$5.75.

Manufacturing milk may rise to \$4.25 in 1968 from \$4.06 in 1967. A top of \$4.30 would seem in the picture for 1969.

Grade A prices in Kansas should average \$5.60 this year and \$5.70 in 1969. Kansas producers shipping to Kansas will have an advantage, because they will receive a 24 cent Class 1 price increase this fall.

Kansas manufacturing milk prices are expected to jump from \$3.99 in 1967 to \$4.20 this year and to \$4.25 in 1969.

The dairy price-support level was increased 28 cents to \$4.25 last April — almost 90 percent of parity. However, no hikes are likely in 1969 due to large government stocks and a charged political situation.

## Lyons Creek Watershed Finance Finally Gets Its OK By Voters

WOODBINE — Persistence pays. Just ask Hayes B. Beck, Junction City, president of the Lyons Creek Watershed joint district No. 41.

Voters in the district had vetoed a proposed mill levy numerous times.

The issue was put to a vote again last week and the watershed won.

Voters approved a maximum 2-mill levy by a 72-vote margin. The tally was 329 for the mill

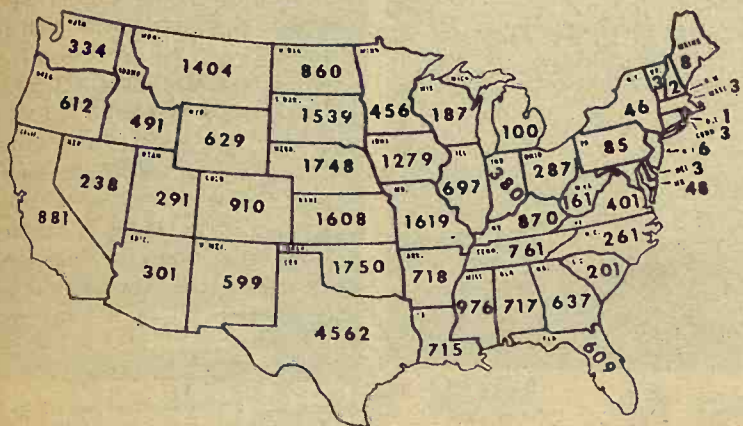
levy and 257 against.

Beck said the votes would be canvassed before the results are declared official.

"Watershed plans have been on the governor's desk over a year," Beck said.

"We assume he will recommend the plan to Congress for authorization and federal funding.

"We could get started on the local watershed projects as soon as early 1969.



## Beef Calf Crop

Total of beef calf crop this year is expected to be 30,997 million for the 48 states, pictured above. Including dairy calves, total of 43.9 million has been estimated by USDA. Cows and heifers 2 years and older as of January 1 were estimated at 49.9 million, which puts calf crop at 88 percent.

"Work can't begin on the federally-funded projects until Congress has authorized the money."

Beck said only about a .94 mill levy will be required to finance the district's estimated operation costs of \$24,850.

The district is limited to not more than a 2-mill levy, and has been operating on a 1.91 levy.

He said the reduction is due to a large carry-over of funds from last year.

Twenty-two of the largest structures in the district qualify under the Watershed Protection and Flood Prevention Act, and would receive federal funding.

Beck attributed the victory to better-informed voters.

"People are becoming more water-conscious, too," he said.

## Soybeans At \$2.35 To \$2.40 At Harvest

The nation's first billion bushel crop plus record carryover stocks point to little if any improvement in soybean prices in 1968-69.

The price-support level — \$2.50 — will floor prices again next year. Look for Kansas prices in the \$2.35 to \$2.40 range at harvesttime, rising to the loan level next summer.

## FALL OUTLOOK

This year's yields are estimated at 26 bushels on 41 million acres. That would boost the crop beyond the 1 billion bushel mark, up 9 percent from last year and 38 percent from the 1962-66 average.

September 1 carryover stocks of 163 million bushels are up 73 million from last year. Adding the expected billion bushel crop brings total stocks to 1.2 billion bushels, an alltime high.

Continued excessive oil supplies will result in low oil prices. This, along with soybean price supports at 2.50 per bushel, will put upward pressure on soybean meal prices.

Increased U.S. supplies of cottonseed meal will put upward pressure on soybean utilization. A small increase in disappearance would result in September 1, 1969 carryover of close to 300 million bushels.

# The 'White Hat' Kind — A Booming Business In Bugs

Like fellow Texans who strike oil and prosper, rancher Jack Gothard thinks big. Though he has only a 60-acre spread down in Canutillo, he's raising a billion head of livestock this year.

Very tiny livestock, certainly, but not inconsequential or moth-eaten. In fact, they're moth-eaters. In fact, they're bugs.

Mr. Gothard raises trichogramma, a breed of wasp so tiny that four can crouch on the head of a pin. Trichogramma are death on crop-destroying moths, and Mr. Gothard expects their lethal talents to yield \$200,000 at retail this year.

Indeed, the bug business is big business. About a dozen companies are now in the field of biological control — the business of raising "good" insects to eliminate "bad" insects —

and everyone agrees the surface has hardly been scratched.

One Federal official says beneficial insects, such as the praying mantis, the ladybug and the lacewing fly, "offer a promising means of dealing with harmful insects" and have a big future in bug work.

There's no industry association yet to plot the growth of interstate insect traffic, but most observers say it's increasing rapidly. Take the case of Eugene Mincemoyer, the praying mantis king. He's president of Biological Control Co., a company that will ship nine million mantis eggs this year, double 1965 volume.

Bug customers range from big cotton, corn and fruit growers who may buy several million assorted bugs to set loose in their infested fields to the backyard

gardener, who pays a dollar for 1000 praying mantis eggs.

Moth eggs filled with the trichogramma are sold to farmers, who scatter them among crops and sometimes even drop them into fields from airplanes. When the trichogramma emerge from the eggs, they take off after any moths residing in the fields.

And trichogramma are efficient: A farmer gets enough trichogramma from a square inch of moth eggs — on the order of 2000 — to treat an acre of land.

There's a little more romance and a lot less precision to the ladybug business. Basically, ladybug collectors head for the hills, bearing sacks and washpans, and scoop two-inch thick swarms of ladybugs from leaves, grass and pine needles. An experienced plucker can grab several hundred ladybugs with one swoop. Ladybugs are stored in cool places (32 degrees to 36 degrees Fahrenheit) until summer, when a gallon can be sold for \$10 postage paid (\$15 airmail.)

The praying mantis game is a harvest operation. Mr. Mincemoyer, a 38-year-old former tree surgeon, searches for overgrown fields and turns loose some mantises. "If they like it," he says, "you harvest the increase" in the form of egg cases. His special equipment consists of a coat with pockets big enough to hold 400 egg cases, each resembling a ping pong ball.

You don't have to be a big operator to make it in the world of little creeping things. The total capital equipment owned by Western Biological Control Laboratory in Tacoma, Wash., is a refrigerator for storing praying mantis eggs. Melvin R. Hansen, Western Biological owner, says the gross annual income for his family-run business is \$5,000. "Demand is really starting to take hold," he says.

Two trends underlie the bug boom. One is a mounting campaign against the use of chemical pesticides. A New York group called Citizens for Clean Air, for example, recently set loose a million ladybugs in an attempt to rid a park of aphids, lice, scales, borers and other little devils. The group includes the wives of Mayor John Lindsay and Sen. Jacob Javits; a city horticulturalist diplomatically assesses the project's value as "hard to judge."

The second push for the commercial bug business comes from the government, which

has passed on technological breakthroughs to bug growers. The Agriculture Department's entomology research division now has 25 scientists studying biological control; it says its efforts in the field are double the efforts of five years ago.

"Beneficial insects are probably our most valuable ally in pest control," says Edward F. Knipling, the division's director. "We're trying to find out how to raise them in sufficient numbers at an economical cost. Progress is encouraging."

Bug ranchers tend to specialize. Mr. Gothard, a 57-year-old former cattleman, limits himself to raising trichogramma. Gothard Inc., a highly professional operation, includes a 4,000-square-foot building that houses rows of wood-frame cages, covered by muslin and con-

taining millions of moths. The moths, nourished on 60 tons of wheat kernels a year, are then exposed to the trichogramma. The tiny wasps deposit their own eggs within the moth eggs effectively preventing the hatching of the moth eggs and packing the trichogramma eggs for shipment.

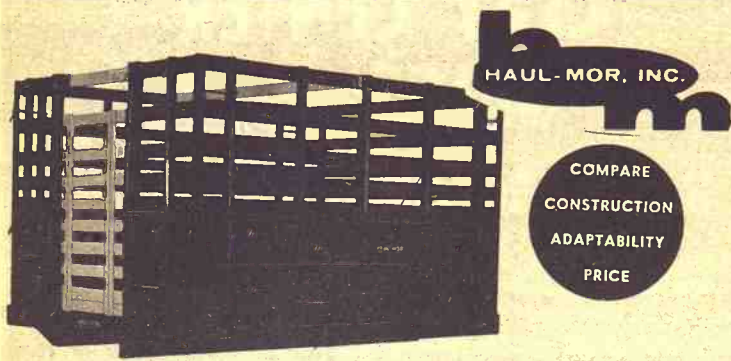

## Complete Troop Transfer To Fort Riley

FT. RILEY — Redeployment of two 24th infantry brigades and nondivisional support units from Germany to Ft. Riley was

completed yesterday.

The move, which began January 12, involved 10,000 men and 3,000 families. It was accomplished by chartered jet flights from Munich, Germany, to Forbes Air Force base in Tpeka.

### Final Unit of 95 Men

The final unit to arrive here was Company D, 1st combat

support battalion, a nondivisional organization with 95 men and nine dependents.

A third brigade of the division remained in Germany. Present plans call for a brigade from Ft. Riley to rotate with the German brigade every six months. The three brigades will meet in Germany once a year for maneuvers.

The 24th division is still assigned to the NATO alliance.

Maj. Gen. Roderick Wetherill, former commanding general of the division, arrived here May 1 and assumed command of Ft. Riley. He was transferred to Vietnam June 23.

Brigadier Gen. Linton S. Boatwright succeeded Wetherill as commander of the division and Ft. Riley.

### A Housing Shortage

The influx of troops has caused a critical housing shortage in the Junction City area.

Officials of the Geary County unified school district, which operates Junction City and Ft. Riley schools, yesterday said elementary and secondary enrollment increased more than 600 pupils over the closing enrollment of 5,800 last spring.

Lower feed grain prices are in the offing for the second straight year, with harvesttime prices for corn and grain sorghums expected to drop below the loan rates.

of a larger corn carryover and expected production increases in the other feed grains.

August crop report points to a 4.5 million bushel corn crop. This, along with a 400 million bushel increase in carryover, results in a corn supply of 5.8 billion bushels. This supply is well below the average of the early 1960's but well above requirements for 4.5 billion bushels for the coming year.

Grain sorghum production of 772 million bushels is also in excess of needs of 735 million bushels. Beginning year carryover of 280 million bushels and production exceeding needs will result in further buildup of carryover stocks in 1969.

Slightly larger numbers of grain consuming animals should boost feed use somewhat. Lower prices also will lead to heavier utilization and somewhat heavier feeding rates. Exports should increase slightly during the coming year.

## K-State On A 10-Hour Day

In an effort to get more classroom and laboratory use and to eliminate Saturday classes, Kansas State University will operate on a 10-hour day beginning this fall term. Classes will begin at 7:30 and the last ones of the day will not end until 5:30.

In the past K-State operated on an 8-12, 1-5 workday and had Saturday morning classes scheduled.

Since each classroom can be used two hours more each day, some poorly located and substandard classrooms can be removed from use.

## See 5-Cent Hike For Eggmen

Higher egg prices — probably about 5 cents a dozen above year earlier levels — are in the picture during the next 12 months. But those production costs — labor, interest, and feed — also will be up about a cent a dozen.

## FALL OUTLOOK

U.S. farm prices are expected to average 34 cents a dozen during September, 3½ cents above a year earlier. October-December prices should climb to about 37 cents a dozen, nearly 7 cents higher than in 1967.

The January-March quarter will see prices hold at 36 to 37 cents a dozen, dropping to about 32 to 33 cents during April-June.

Egg prices in Kansas will average slightly lower. Kansas producers should get 30 to 31 cents a dozen for all eggs sold on a graded basis this fall, and 32 to 33 cents this winter and early spring.

Eggs sold on a current receipt basis, however, will probably average less than 27 cents a dozen during the next 12 months.

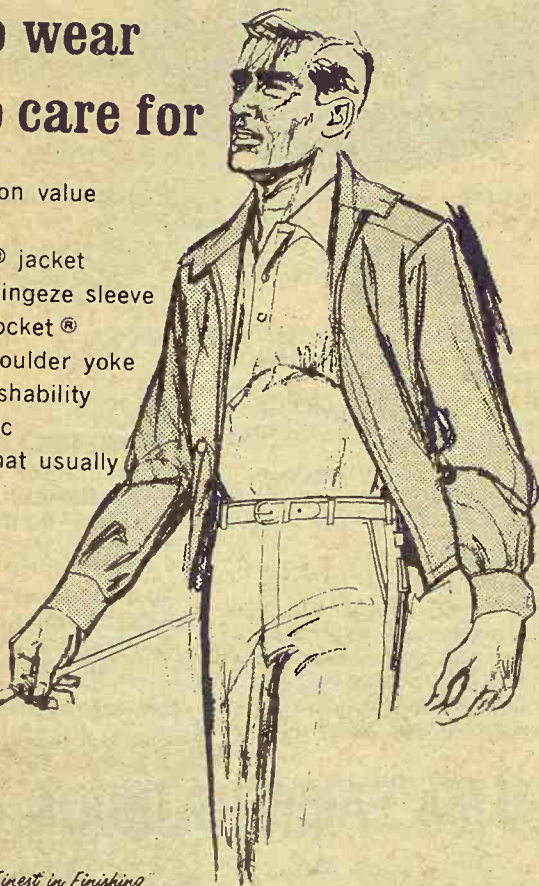

# No Spending Lull for Consumer

This year will go into the books as another year of higher food prices. By the end of 1968, prices will be up an average of 3 1/2 percent from 1967.

Prices for food consumed at home will average about 3 percent higher, while food eaten away from home will be up

about 5 percent. And an average of one-fourth of the family food dollar is spent on food eaten away from home.

Americans will spend almost \$101 billion for food this year, an increase of 6 percent from 1967. But families will be spending only 17.2 percent of their disposable income for food, compared to 17.4 percent in 1967

and 18.1 percent in 1966.

Looking at it another way, 1 hour of factory labor bought 12.3 pounds of white bread in 1967, compared to only 9.8 pounds in 1949. That same hour's labor purchased 2.6 pounds of round steak, up from 1.6 pounds; 2.9 pounds of pork chops, compared to 1.9 pounds; 3.3 pounds of butter, up from 1.9 pounds; and 5.3 dozen eggs, up from 2 dozen.

## FALL OUTLOOK

We are spending more for food, but higher prices are only part of the answer. As our incomes go up, our buying habits change to include more meat and more higher priced cuts of meat, more convenience foods and services.

For example, per capita consumption of meat averaged 90 pounds during the first half of 1968, up 2 pounds from a year earlier. Beef accounted for almost two-thirds of this total, and beef prices averaged 5 percent higher during the period.

Besides meat, retail prices of vegetables, fruits, poultry, eggs, and dairy products are higher this year. But you're paying about the same or a little less for coffee, potatoes, fats and oils, cereal, bakery and fishery products.

## Lamb Prices Better Than Last Year

Prices will decrease seasonally during the next few months, but will remain \$1 to \$2 higher than last year. That's the fall outlook for lambs.

The low point in prices will probably occur in November when choice slaughter lambs will sell in the \$23.50 to \$24.50 range.

## FALL OUTLOOK

Looking ahead to next year, prices are expected to exceed 1968 levels. Top prices for spring lambs could easily be above the \$32 mark, compared to a 1968 high of around \$31 in April.

Choice slaughter lamb prices increased fairly steadily from about \$22.50 in January to ar-

ound \$30 in late April. Prices have dropped slowly since May, a trend which will probably continue the rest of 1968.

Feeder lamb prices will be in the \$22 to \$24.50 range this fall, only slightly above 1967 levels. Supplies will be ample. Look for lambs to go into feedlots later and at heavier weights than in 1967.

Contracting for feeder lambs has been slow this year. Feed and pasture conditions are good, and sheep ranchers will be in no big hurry to move lambs off pasture.

Light lambs will be few in number and will sell at premium prices. Look for 70- to 75-pound northwest lambs to sell in the \$22 to \$24.50 range while 60 to 65 pounders will probably sell above \$25.

## Straighten Turn In Old US81

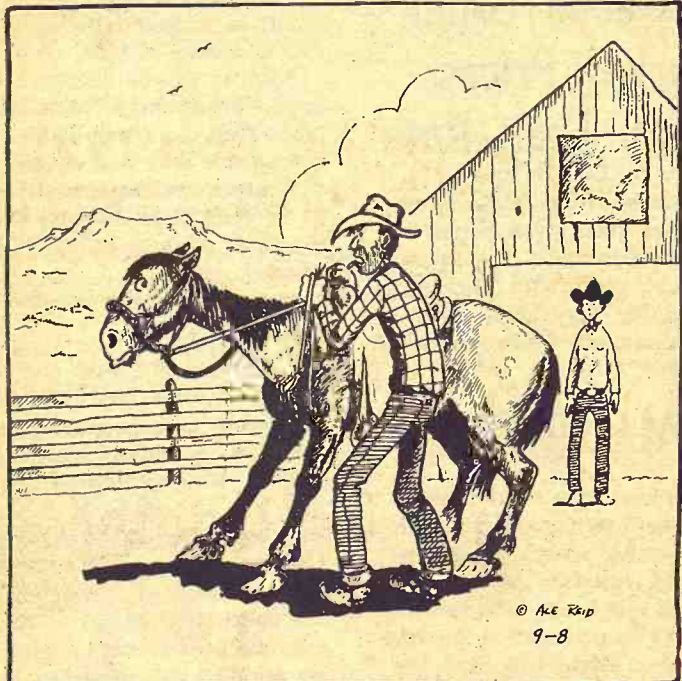
BENNINGTON — The "dog leg" on old US81 north of Bennington is doomed.

# Ask A Hearing Over State ASCS Removal Of County Committee

The Department of Agriculture will be asked to hold a hearing in Sublette on the removal from office of Haskell County's three-member Agricultural Stabilization and Conservation Committee.

This was decided last week at a meeting attended by about 325 farmers at Sublette.

The group decided to appeal to the state's congressmen and senators to see if the hearing can be held here, where records are readily available, instead of in Washington.

It also was decided to ask farmers to vote for community committeemen who would elect the same three men who were ousted by the state ASC committee.

In Washington, the Department of Agriculture was being close-mouthed about the ouster.

But sources outside the department say the committee was fired for allegedly showing favoritism in handling federal payments.

The three men were dismissed Aug. 20 after months of investigation ordered by the Agricultural Stabilization and Conservation Service, which admin-

isters farm programs through a system of state and county committees.

Ray Fitzgerald, who supervises ASCS field operations, said the three officials were dismissed "for impeding the effectiveness of the programs administered in the county."

He would not elaborate. The three men have until Sept. 20 to appeal their dismissal.

The department identified the committeemen as Kirby Clawson, Satanta; Laverne C. Simth, Copeland, and Thomas G. Lewis, Satanta.

"For obvious reasons there is not much I can say about it," Fitzgerald said. "They have a right to file an appeal and present their side to us."

County committeemen help administer federal farm programs directly to farmers including: Payments for price support loans on crops, land taken from production, and assistance for soil and water conservation projects.

A good deal of support for the ousted officials is being generated in the county, sources say. Public meetings have been called to which state ASCS officials have been invited to explain the matter. So far none has accepted.

The Kansas congressional delegation has received numerous letters, telegrams and phone calls from people in the county

supporting the committeemen.

One congressional aide said he had been told that ASCS officials had found evidence that one or more of the committee members allegedly violated regulations prohibiting landowners from receiving government payments which should go to tenants.

These payments have now been ordered returned to the government for redistribution to both tenants and landowners, the aide said.

## Highest Wheat Yields In Holland

Dutch farmers have the biggest wheat yield of any major producer in the world with an average of 70.8 bushels to the acre.

The Swedes have an average yield of 65.7 bushels; the Americans, 25.9 bushels; the Canadians, 17 bushels; the Russians about 17 bushels; and the Chinese roughly 12.2 bushels.

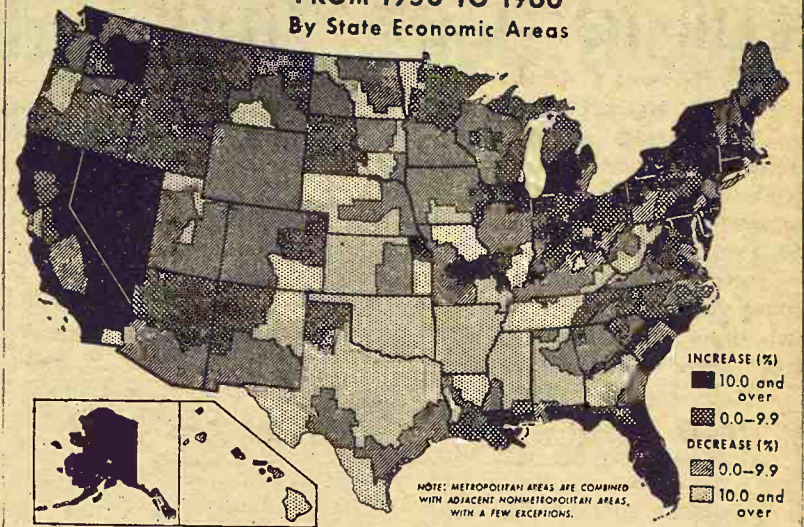
## Spiegel Turns In Law License

Dale Spiegel, the onetime Emporia lawyer who made two good runs at becoming Kansas Attorney General, has turned in his certificate to practice law in the state.

Spiegel, in turning over his certificate, said he no longer practices law and no longer resides in Kansas. However, the State Board of Law Examiners reported that it had received complaints on an unspecified nature about Spiegel and had made an investigation.

Spiegel was pardon attorney for the late Governor George Docking and came within 4000 votes of upsetting Attorney General John Anderson in 1958 and within 11,000 votes of defeating William Ferguson for the job in 1960.

## Rural Population Shift From 1950

This USDA map shows rural population changes from 1950 to 1960, showing that the Flint Hills area of Kansas lost rural population by something less than 10 per cent, although most of Kansas — and most of Nebraska too — lost 10 per cent or more. The gain of nearly 10 per cent in northeast Kansas is attributed to the increase in population in rural towns, which include non-farm citizens.

A current trend, says USDA experts, is for people leaving the farm more less to the cities than they have in the past but to stay in a rural area. Thus, Department attempts to encourage industrial development in rural areas.

Senator James Pearson of Kansas has sponsored a bill in the past session of Congress that would have provided tax advantages to companies which build plants in farm territory. The bill died in committee. However, Pearson says he'll try again.

# Shading Or Cheating? Wheat Pact Nations Don't Trust Each Other

The U.S. and other major wheat exporting nations are having trouble enforcing the price-stabilizing international grains agreement that's been in effect since July 1.

Some American officials say they believe one result may be that the U.S. will lower its floor price under the international accord for "soft wheat," used in pastry flour and cakes.

The basic problem, U.S. officials say, is that the world has a big wheat surplus and that market pressures are prompting wheat traders here and abroad to look for ways to cut their prices.

The Canadians are accusing the U.S. of undercutting them on export sales by "shading" transportation costs.

Wheat traders in the U.S. and elsewhere allege that the French, in trying to move into far east wheat markets, are shaving the floor prices listed in the grains pact for certain

types of wheat they export.

There also have been charges that Australia has sold some wheat to Japan at prices below the minimums by marking the wheat low quality or animal feed.

U.S. Agriculture Department officials say they are inclined to believe that some of these practices by other wheat exporting nations are going to require the U.S. to lower, for example, its floor price for "soft wheat" to keep others from taking far eastern commercial sales away from this country.

This, U.S. sources said, is a "possibility," but they add that it isn't going to happen right away.

The U.S. and the other major wheat-exporting nations are sending government delegations to Canberra, Australia, for mid-September talks on international wheat marketing problems that have shown up under the pact. Then, starting Oct. 7 in

London, a larger meeting of nations, both wheat exporters and importers, will review the system of floor and ceiling prices.

Out of these consultations, U.S. officials believe, may come some agreements on changes in the wheat price stabilization arrangement. Some types of wheat not covered by the agreement may be brought under it. Floor prices set in the agreement for wheat exports of various countries could be scaled downward, and other changes could be made, they said.

If other wheat exporting countries continue, beyond then, to undercut the pact-specified price floors, a U.S. official said, Washington will be prepared to act on its own to adjust its export pricing controls.

"We intend to remain competitive," the official said.

## Milford Lots On Sale Soon

MILFORD — Sale of 30 waterfront building lots on Milford Reservoir is expected to start soon, says Milford City Atty. Lee Hornbaker.

The sites are part of a 66-lot subdivision owned by the city of Milford. The land was purchased from the U.S. Army Corps of Engineers as part of the Milford townsite relocation contract.

Hornbaker said the lots will be sold on first-come, first-served basis. They are \$3000 to \$6000 each, which includes all utilities, sewer, water, curb and streets.

All funds will be placed in escrow until enough lots are sold to finance the improvements, estimated to cost \$100,000 for first 30 lots.

Eldon Hoyle, Junction City, realtor for the project, said a

commercial developer may purchase a large portion of the land. If so, the project will be redesigned to contain 32 to 38 building sites and the balance commercial.

## More Favor For Rural Job Bill

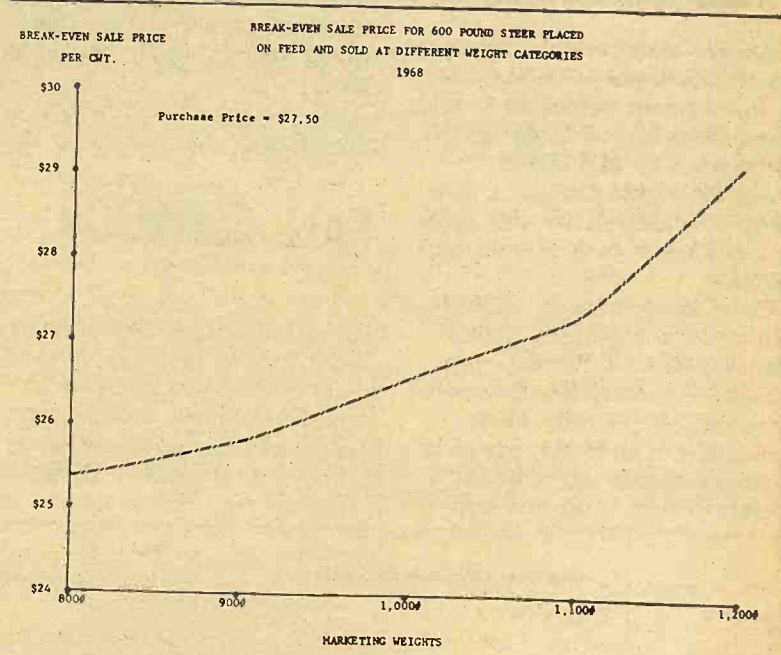
The rural job development legislation co-sponsored by Sen. James B. Pearson, R-Kans., and Sen. Fred R. Harris, D-Okla., is getting increased interest. The legislation was the subject of a special study by American Enterprise Institute for Public Policy Research, a non-partisan organization which studies national policy problems. Since its introduction on July 21, 1967, the legislation has picked up 22 additional bipartisan sponsors in the Senate.

Sen. Pearson has summed up his bill: "It would be improper to treat this program simply as an effort to reduce rural poverty. For what we seek to do is not simply to improve present depressed rural income, but to expand the economic opportunities in rural areas so more of those who otherwise would be forced to migrate will now find it possible to remain in their home communities if they so choose." The institute's study found

the proposed legislation laudable. The study also revealed, in the institute's opinion, that two changes in Sen. Pearson's bill would tighten it and increase its effectiveness. The institute said that eligibility requirements as defined in the bill, may qualify areas — or counties — that should not receive such assistance. This would tend to pour assistance into the wealthy counties to the neglect of the poor areas. A remedy would be to change the eligibility criteria upward so that at least 30 percent instead of the present 15 percent of families must have incomes of less than \$3000 annually. The staff study also suggested a more flexible definition of poverty is needed. It was suggested the \$3000 annual income was too inflexible a dividing line and that family size also should be taken into consideration.

The institute concluded its favorable summary by admitting that where favorable location factors are present, the tax incentives proposed in the Pearson legislation "may be the catalyst which attracts industry." Private industry management, concerned with growth factor and responsibility to stockholders, is expected to take under study the institute's study when considering new plant locations. If Congress proves firm in its intention to adjourn quickly it is probable that the Kansas senator's bill will not be acted upon.

But Sen. Pearson always has had this possibility under consideration. He previously has stated that his rural development program is not a short range idea. If his bill should die with the end of the 90th Congress, he has said he plans to introduce it immediately after the start of the 91st Congress in January and push for early hearings in order to give it a high priority. Kansas could benefit by Sen. Pearson's legislation as the state shows a declining rate of personal income from farm operations indicated by government statistics. The institute's study showed that the exodus from rural areas to the cities is not a phenomenon limited to the United States. In France and Sweden concern has been expressed about the out-migration of people from rural areas to the cities. West Germany, said the institute, probably more than any other country in the world, "has had spectacular success in using tax incentives to stimulate economic growth." Japan is another nation reported to have given the nod to such inducements.



### Break-even Price At Various Weights

Based upon current feeding and replacement costs for a steer placed on feed at 600 pounds, this chart by the American National Cattlemen's Association illustrates the break-even sale price for several marketing weights. Even though current feed grain prices are relatively very low, the fed cattle price needed to break even increases very rapidly after the 600-pound steer reaches grade — typically between 1000 and 1100 pounds. For example, if the fed animal were sold at 1000 pounds, a sale price of \$26.40 per cwt. would be required to break even. If the same animal was left on feed and sold at 1100 pounds, the break-even sale price would be \$27.38 per cwt. or about \$1.00 per cwt. higher. Leaving this steer on feed until it reached 1200 pounds, the break-even price would be \$29.15 per cwt., or approximately \$1.80 per cwt. higher than if the animal were sold at 1100 pounds. These updated figures, says the ANCA, show the importance of cattle feeders (1) keeping slaughter cattle weights down and (2) not holding cattle for a price rise after they reach the grade for which they are best suited.

# Predict Farm Income Gain

Larger cash receipts, mostly for livestock products, and higher government payments should boost gross farm income in 1968-69 perhaps by \$1.5 billion.

Higher production costs, however, will likely limit any gains in net income to less than \$0.5 billion.

Crop marketings in 1968-69 will be 2 or 3 percent higher than last year if current crop prospects materialize. However, prices will be slightly lower.

Supplies of livestock products should continue at least at present levels. Livestock pro-

duct prices — up 3 percent in the second quarter compared to a year earlier — should continue somewhat higher during the coming year if supply is held in check.

Demand for farm products may expand less rapidly in the

coming year in the face of an expected slower increase in consumers' after tax incomes.

Real disposable income for consumers may increase little in the coming months. Consumer income influences demand of

items such as high-quality meat, frozen foods, and convenience items.

Of primary importance to farm prices is the influence of consumer income changes on feedlot finished beef and other items. Other factors such as spending to improve diets, particularly for low-income groups, is also important.

Increased domestic demand for most farm products, however, expands primarily with an increase in population rather than changes in income.

Demand for farm products is not always equivalent to demand for food. Price responses can be far different. Food expenditures often depend on the amount of services included in food purchases.

Services are a major source of present price increase as evidenced by price changes associated with convenience food items and food eaten away from home.

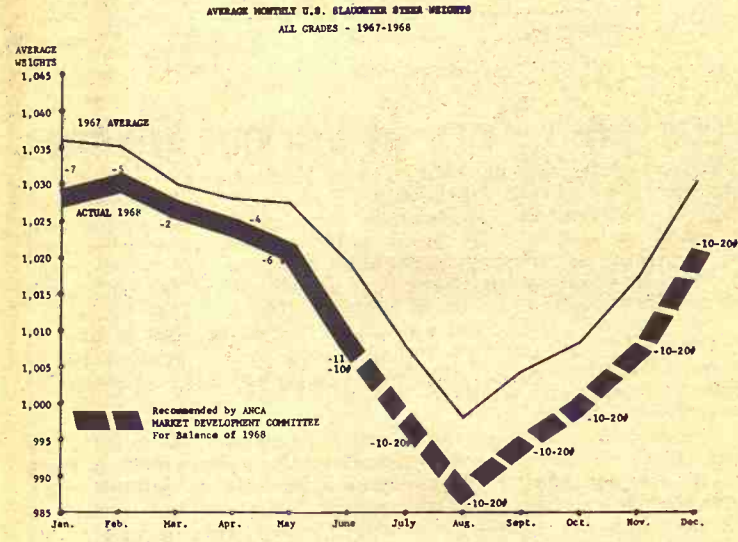
Food categories of this type respond to changes in consumer incomes and the rapid expansion in disposable income in recent quarters has resulted in steep price advances.

Exports of farm products have considerable influence on price, particularly on farm prices of a number of grain products. When exports are inadequate to remove excess stocks, prices are likely to be close to support levels. This can also influence the cost of government pro-

grams Exports in the coming year will probably be down from the year ended in June. Exports of 6.3 billion for 1967-68 were \$0.5 billion less than in 1966-67.

Both volume and price of exports were down in the early

months of this year. Volume of grain and soybean exports may be slightly larger for calendar 1968 if wheat exports reach the goal of 750 million bushels. But there is reason to doubt that this goal will be attained.



## Average Slaughter Weights

This illustrates the spread between average monthly U.S. slaughter steer prices. In January of this year, average slaughter steer weights were down 7 pounds from year-ago levels, whereas, in June of this year, average steer weights were 11 pounds less than the previous year level. Cattle feeders are urged by the American National Cattlemen's Association to keep monthly slaughter weights down and as close to 10 to 20 pounds below year-ago levels as possible. This is equivalent to reducing the average feeding period a minimum of only four to eight days.

Slaughter Cattle Prices Over Year-Ago Levels

By Robert L. Coppersmith

Slaughter cattle prices will decline slightly as we move into the fall and winter months, but will remain above 1967 levels. The long-term outlook shows 1969 prices averaging higher than in 1968.

Choice cattle prices in November-December will be down \$1 to \$2 from August and will prob-

ably level out at around \$25.50 to \$26.50 during early 1969. Prices will rebound to above the \$27 level next summer.

Choice steer prices this year have been running from 50 cents to \$3 above those of 1967. Average carcass weights were relatively stable during the first half of 1968 and generally below those for the same period of 1967.

Carcass weights during the first half of 1967 also varied considerably, making it more difficult to effectively merchandise beef at prices profitable to cattle feeders.

Lower slaughter weights and a stable beef supply helped boost prices during the first

few months of 1968. Since late May, slaughter weights have increased and will probably remain above 1967 levels.

Number of cattle and calves on feed in 32 states on July 11 was up 11 percent from last year. Increases from a year earlier were recorded in all weight groups except the over 1100-pound group which was down 1 percent.

Cattle for market during the next 30 to 60 days will come primarily from the weight groups above 900 pounds plus some 700- to 899-pound heifers. Thus, marketings will be up at least 4 percent during the next month.

However, a high consumer income will be able to absorb this supply and maintain a strong market.

Byproduct values in 1968 are down slightly from last year, resulting from a drop in hide prices, but should run close to 1967 levels the rest of the year.

U.S. imports of beef and veal so far this year have been up from the same period in 1967. Look for imports to continue slightly above 1967 levels the rest of the year. Total volume of imports is not expected to be high enough for the U.S. to impose import quotas.

# No Cheer In Wheat Outlook

By Don D. Pretzer  
Kansas State University

With wheat planting well underway over much of the state, Kansas farmers will find little to cheer about in the fall outlook for wheat prices.

In short, prospects are dim for prices to rise much above the loan level during 1968-69.

Prices will likely remain steady during the next few months, awaiting any developments which may trigger changes. However, an expected heavier loan participation could cause some small advances late in the marketing year.

## FALL OUTLOOK

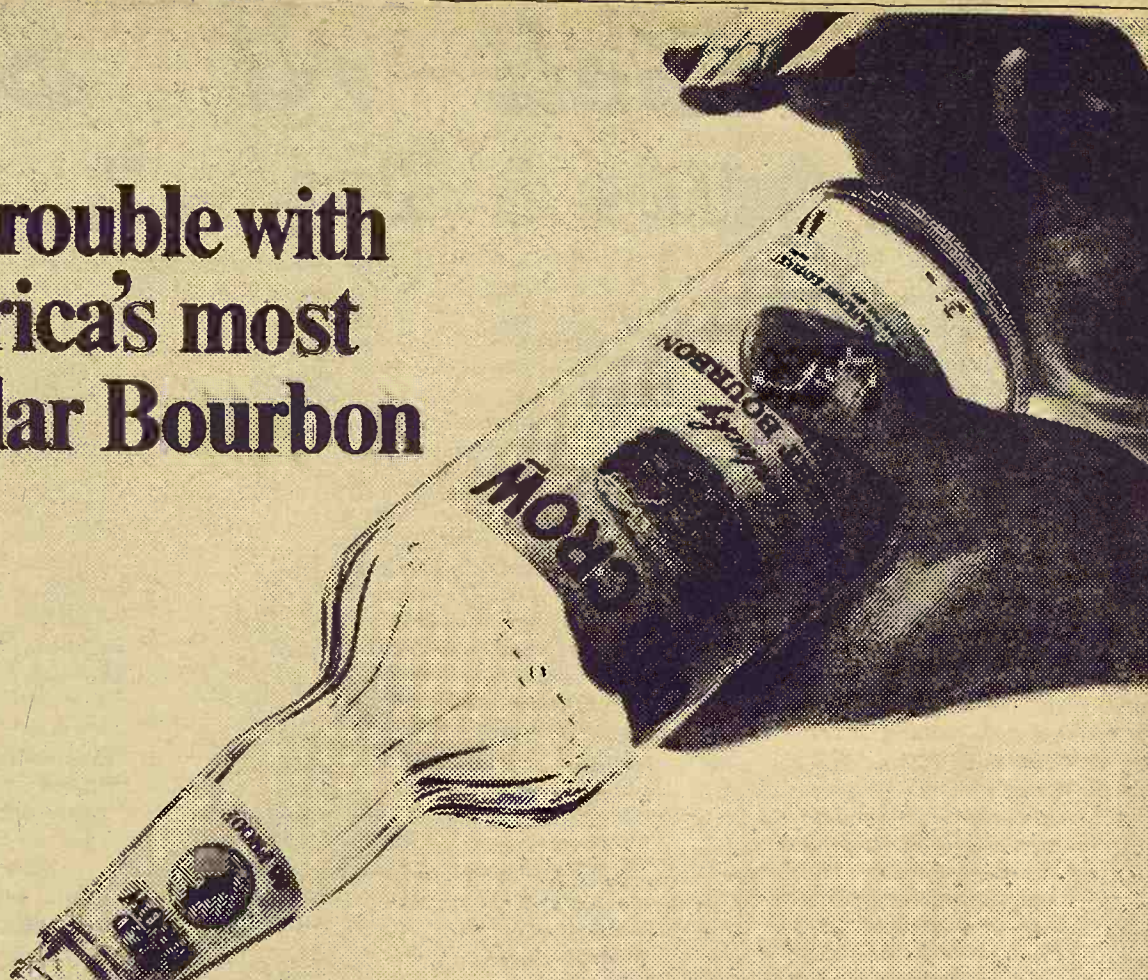
Acreage harvested was down 5 percent this year, but this was more than offset by a record average yield — 28.7 bushels. As a result, stocks have pushed to 2.1 billion bushels.

The 1968 wheat world harvest is expected to approximate the 10.2 and 10.4 billion bushel yields of the past 2 years. Production in Northern Hemisphere countries will likely total around 4.8 billion bushels, about the same as a year ago.

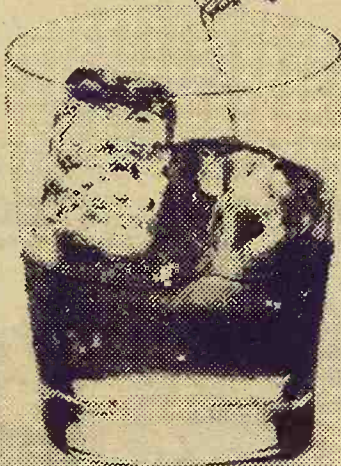
Secretary Freeman has set an export goal of 750 million bushels. However, honoring provisions of the International Grains Agreement and remaining competitive in world pricing — along with reductions in Asian needs for PL 480 wheat — may make the goal difficult to attain.

Domestic use should increase slightly. Higher feed usage should more than offset a 12 million bushel drop in seed requirements.
