Warranty Slash Nearly Balances Car Additions

The Labor Department says that because of value reduction in the warranties on 1969 model automobiles, only \$1 of the higher prices of these cars can be attributed to increases in quality.

According to a Bureau of Labor statistics study, the suggested retail prices for new cars average \$41 above last year. Quality improvements in the new cars are worth \$24, but revised warranty values cut this by \$23, the bureau estimated.

The 1969 average covers only medium-priced and lower-priced cars that represent about two-thirds of total automobile sales. It also includes changes in prices of popular optional equipment.

The average does not reflect the somewhat larger price increases on station wagons and the higher-priced "top-of-the-line" and special cars.

A breakdown of the \$24 rise in the value of quality showed:

- Changes made in response to new or modified federal safety standards: \$4. This includes improved defrosters, windshield wipers and side-marker lights. It excludes head restraints.
- Improvements involving other safety changes made in anticipation of future requirements: \$10. These include improved theft protection, structural changes to protect passengers from injury in collisions and more reliable brakes.

- Non-safety quality improvements, including more reliable and durable engines. Better ventilation systems and more durable trim: \$10.

General warranties covering 24 months or 24,000 miles on 1968 models have been cut in half on 1969 models.

Cut Cotton Crop Forecast

This year's cotton crop was estimated at 11,071,000 bales of 500 pounds gross weight each, down 126,000 from the September estimate, the Agriculture Department announced.

The forecast, based on October 1 conditions, is 49 per cent more than the 7,455,000-bale production of 1968, but smaller than the 1962-66 average of 13,986,000.

Average yield an acre this year was estimated at 515 pounds, compared with 521 pounds last month and the 1967 average of 447, the department said. The 5-year average is 500 pounds.

In an accompanying report, the Census bureau said 1,416,362 running bales of 1968-crop cotton had been ginned prior to October 1, compared with 1,012,911 a year earlier and 1,341,452 on the date in 1966.

He Farms By His Own Rules

THAYER, Ks. — Frank Meek has been practicing more than 45 years the fading art among farmers of laying his hands on a good share of the consumers' fooddollars.

Meek does that by doing things a bit differently. Such as never plowing his rock-studded 20 acres in northwest Neosho County. Another way he milks those 20 acres to produce a gross income of \$9000 to \$12,000 annually is that he sells and delivers his products directly to retail outlets.

Meek's biggest difference is what he produces. He grows fruits, nuts, berries and vegetables. But he doesn't stop with his picking, either.

He often plants out of the traditional cycles, which permits him to harvest at times of high market needs rather than when everyone else is selling. One week before or after the rush at traditional harvesting times is important, Meek said. And there are cucumbers.

"There are times when retailers'll tell ya they have 'em running out of their ears," are the words used by the 60-year-old Meek.

But by planting out of cycle, Meek this year has received from \$4.68 for a 50-pound bushel of cucumbers upwards to \$6 a bushel. Top price during times when most cucumbers are harvested ranges about \$1.75 to \$2 a bushel, Meek said. He predicted \$600 gross from a half-acre planted to cucumbers.

By planting early (a special early "Giant" variety), Meek grossed \$780 on tomatoes grown on one-half acre of his far-from-prime land. (Neighbors use similar land for pasture only.)

"I'll tell you," Meek said of his tomato crop, "we picked our

first about the 18th to the 20th of June." He received 22 cents a pound for the very earliest, down to 18 cents later.

Meek never plows his fruit and vegetable land; instead he deep-disks and subsoils — two methods of land preparation that conserve moisture. This leaves grass and other cover vegetation growing in places that more traditional farming methods scrape bare.

To emphasize his conviction that such garden crops pay better than so-called cash crops, Meek cited the revenue from 60 acres of his better land planted to wheat.

"Six hundred dollars on wheat for 60 acres," Meek said. "And my son-in-law is a good farmer." He compared that to \$600 gross for his favored crops from half an acre.

That figures out that wheat, based on the 3-year average, generated gross income of \$10 per acre while his fruits and vegetables produced \$1200 gross income from an acre of less desirable land.

Meek explained: Preparing the land differently; planting crops with high market value with an eye to marketing ahead of or after peak times; planting more than one crop each year (in between year-old peach trees he first had a crop of mustard greens, \$4 a level basket delivered in Wichita, followed by summer squash ready for picking now); planting less common crops (he gathered five brightly colored squash which he said would bring \$2); and irrigating and fertilizing.

"Don't waste water and fertilizer on crops that don't pay well," Meek advises. His fertilizer bill for the 20 acres this year

totalled \$111, he said. He pumps for irrigation from a pond he built nearby.

Meek finds it a mystery why farmers continue to plant wheat in the face of the declining market. He planted his first garden crop at age 14 when he lived in Johnson County. He lived in Kingman County a number of years before he moved to Neosho County in 1951.

"And I haven't missed a crop since I was 14," Meek said.

Meek grades and packages his produce in crates so that it is ready to put on the fruit and vegetable counters of the supermarket chain he supplies in Wichita.

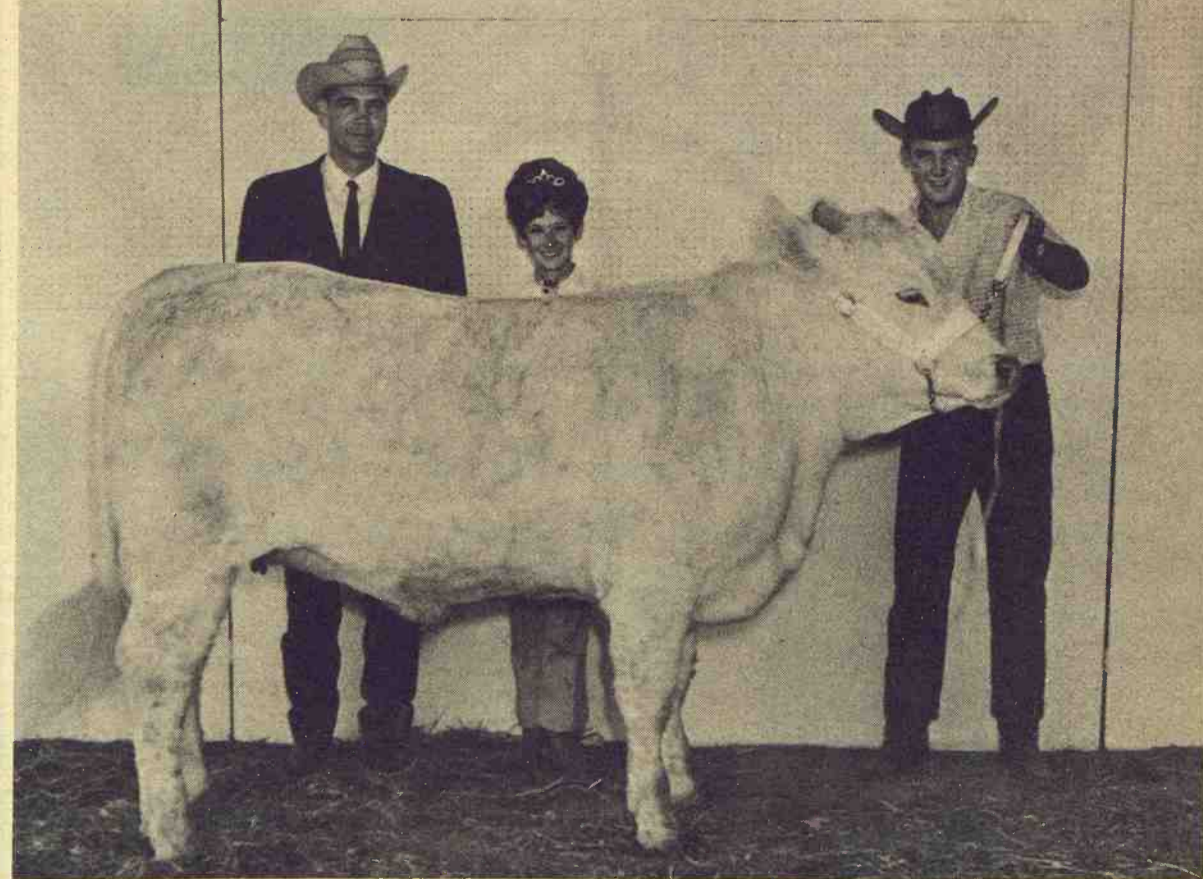
These stores won't mess with ungraded, roughly packed produce, he said. They haven't the time, nor the personnel. It must be ready for sale when received, Meek added.

Labor most often is the bugaboo for truck-farming operations. Pickers are hard to find and expensive. Meek and his wife Helen "do it all, except the planting and picking."

Were qualified help available ("five or six men who knew what they were doing"), Meek claims he could gross double the \$9,000 to \$12,000 he takes from his 20 acres.

Use Wheat For Feed, Urges Commission Head

The Kansas Wheat Commission is encouraging farmers to use wheat as a substitute feed grain for livestock.

Many farmers who previously raised only crops have diversified their efforts to include raising livestock, due to the continuing decline of wheat prices.

The Commission has prepared

a pamphlet containing a feed grain substitution scale, and stockmen may obtain a copy by writing the commission, 1021 N. Main, Hutchinson.

Carl A. Dumler, Russell, chairman of the commission, estimates 100 to 125 million bushels of the 1968 crop will be used as livestock feed.

Dumler said this compares to 64 million bushels used as feed in 1967.

Studies indicate wheat has a value of 100 to 120 percent over traditional feed grains such as corn and sorghum grain when

it does not exceed 50 percent of the feeding ration for fattening cattle.

Due to its higher protein content, 100 pounds of wheat can replace 90 pounds of corn and 10 pounds of soybeans in the ration.

The protein supplement can be reduced one-eighth pound for each pound of wheat used to replace corn or sorghum grain.

Dumler said wheat would continue to be competitive as a feed grain at the current price.

"With wheat at a price of \$1.18, corn is worth less than \$1.05 a bushel and sorghum grain less than \$1.80 a hundredweight," said Dumler.

"This means a saving of 20 cents per hundredweight is made by the feeder who uses wheat as a substitute."

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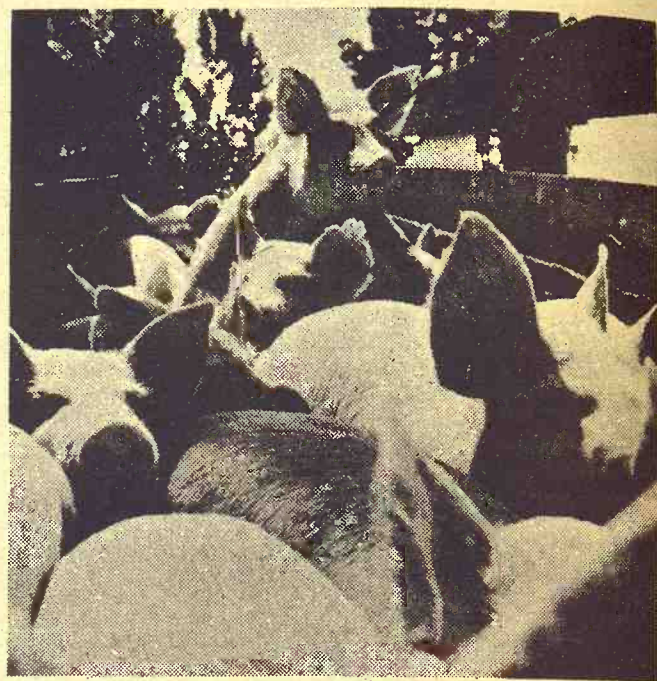
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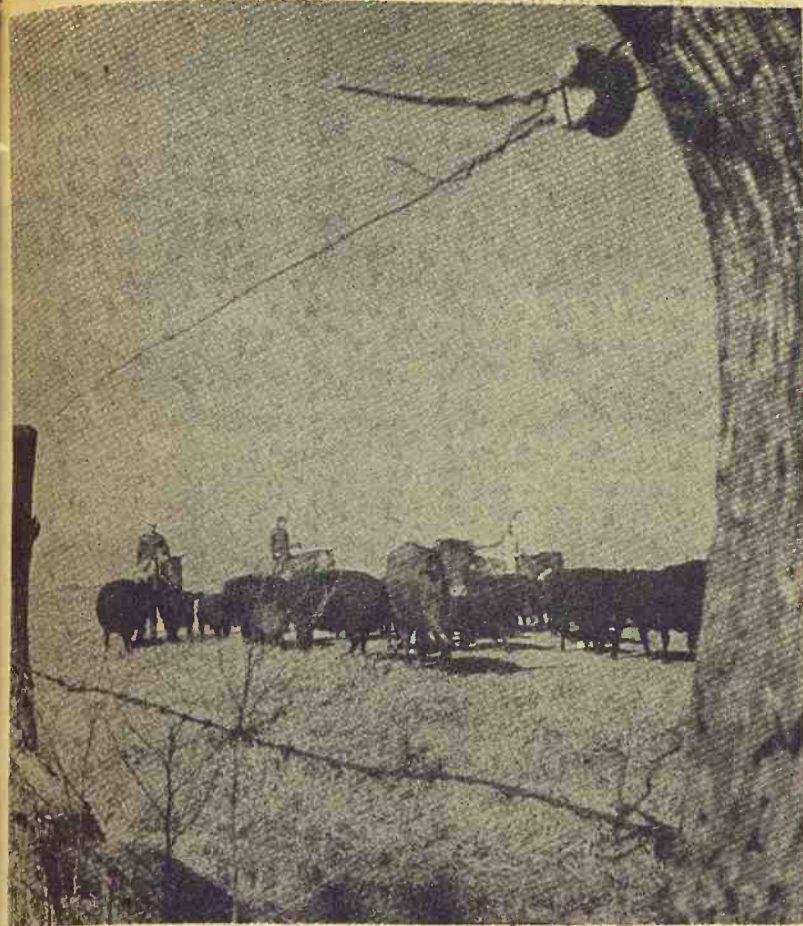
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Longhorn Lead

Mizzou Farmers Hope For Wood Pulp Cash Crop

PORTAGEVILLE, MO. — A row crop which offers the possibility of providing pulp fiber for paper production is being tested at the University of Missouri Delta Experiment Center near here.

The crop has been shown to field day audiences at the center along with sunflowers and tomatoes suitable for canning being developed for possible Boot-heel growth.

The new fiber crop is kenaf, which Norman Brown, superintendent of the center, said produces a high grade pulp for paper production and may prove to be cheaper and a better source of pulp fiber than now provided



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by forests.

The crop was grown at the request of Mississippi County farmers, Brown said, who pointed to the need for an annual producing row product.

The seeds were supplied by the U.S. Department of Agriculture. Seven varieties are being grown, but no conclusions have been drawn.

If the crop should prove an effective source, there should be a ready market in the area. At least two companies are engaged in wood buying and production for pulpwood purposes.

West Virginia Pulp and Paper Company is building a plant south of Wycliffe, Ky., and is engaged in extensive timber acquisition over several states.

Armstrong Cork Company also has been acquiring land for wood production and has bought acreages of timber throughout this section. It has property south of Cape Girardeau acquired in 1960, but never developed.

Procter & Gamble Co. is building a paper products manufacturing plant north of Cape Girardeau and has indicated it will locate a pulp mill on this site.

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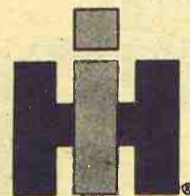

Glenn Cunningham May Get His Youth Ranch At Old Navy Base

HUTCHINSON — Use of 2000 to 4000 acres of the former Hutchinson Naval air station

here for the Glenn Cunningham Youth Ranch is under consideration, Ray Faubion, manager of the Hutchinson Chamber of Commerce, has revealed.

The ranch, now near Augusta, has cared for problem children since the onetime University of Kansas miler and his wife established the facility 22 years ago. It currently is home for 21 boys and girls. The figure has been as high as 80.

"The move and big expansion of our program is still in the planning stage. It's an exploratory thing on everybody's part," Cunningham said while visiting the Hutchinson site.

The plans call for construction of six homes, each to accommodate houseparents and 20 children. Kitchen facilities, a dining hall, metal and woodwork shop, ecumenical chapel and an administration building are included.

The Cunninghams are conducting a nationwide campaign to raise \$3,500,000 to finance the project.

"We need more money and

better facilities so we can expand this work and take care of hundreds of kids," he said. "Most of the boys and girls are sent to us by juvenile judges, although parents sometimes seek admission of children they are unable to handle.

"It's far less expensive to handle them at the ranch, than to let the children follow the road to crime which leads to court costs and confinement," Cunningham added.

Each youth is provided a horse, which he keeps and cares for as long as he stays at the ranch. An assortment of animals keeps the boys and girls busy with chores.

"We handle kids from all over the United States of every nationality, color and creed," Cunningham said.

Faubion said the chamber doesn't yet have access to facilities at the former naval base. "The economics are there," he declared. "The ranch pays bills and buys food and clothing. Industry doesn't have to have smokestacks."

culture. For August, the average weight of each animal was 995 pounds compared with 998 a year earlier and 1,006 in July. Commercial slaughter houses turned out nearly one billion pounds of beef in August, 4 per cent more than a year earlier and 1 per cent more than in July.

The 4 per cent boost in meat production resulted from only a 3 per cent increase in the number of cattle slaughtered this month.

Department spokesman believe the figures show the cattlemen's response to the urging for cattle to be marketed when they reach market weights and grade, thus keeping excessive amounts of beef off the market.

The USDA officials also added that improved breeding and selection of feeder cattle by stockmen have helped develop higher quality animals going to the slaughter market.

JOLT IN GRADING COST AT SALINA SCHOOL SITE

Salina school planners got a jolt last week when engineers told them that site development for a new high school in the northeast part of town would cost twice the original estimate of \$125,000. A parking lot is planned over an old river channel, and poor drainage conditions and traffic control problems were blamed for the revised estimate. Construction bids are not in yet.

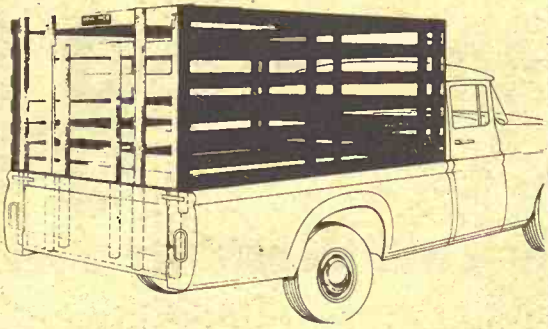

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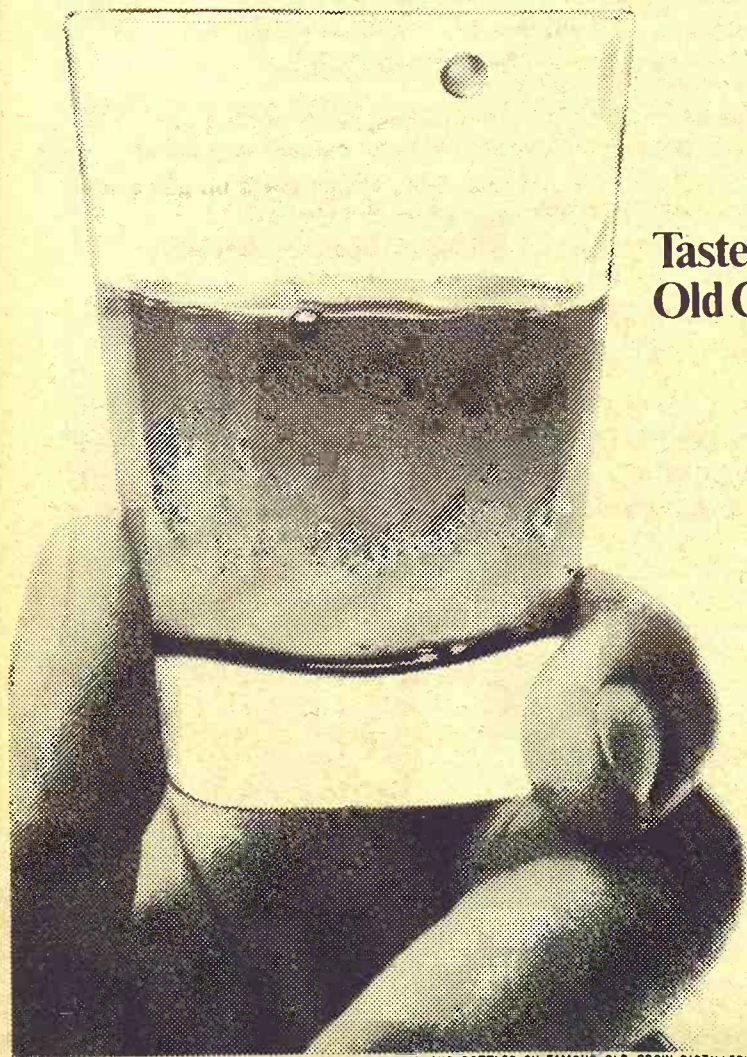
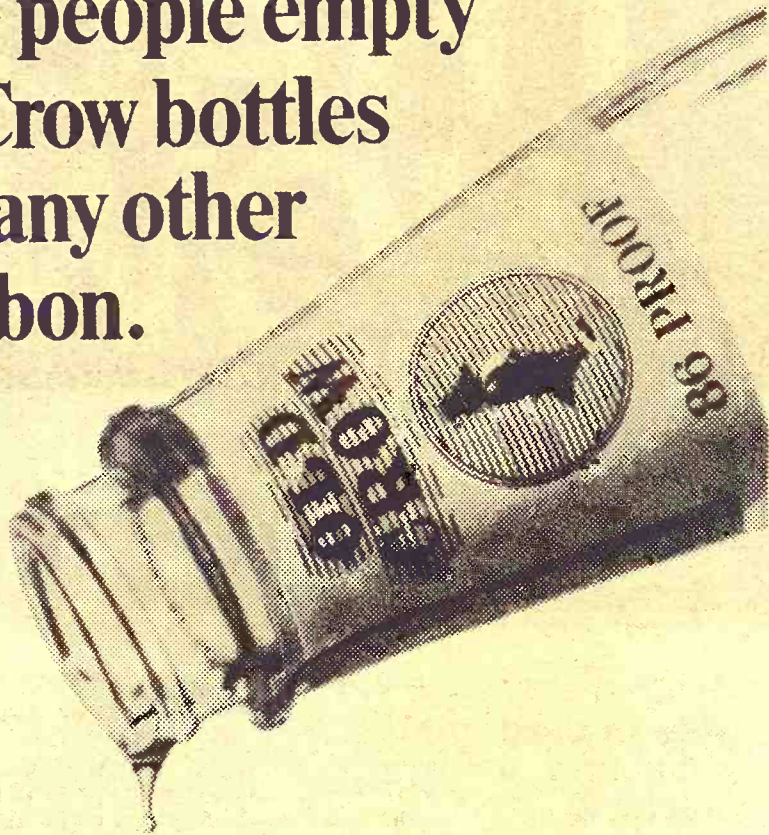

CRUNCHY OATMEAL COOKIES

- 1 cup shortening
- 2 cups brown sugar
- 2 eggs, unbeaten
- 1 teaspoon vanilla
- 2 cups sifted flour
- 2 teaspoons baking powder
- 1 teaspoon soda
- 3/4 teaspoon salt
- 2 cups rolled oats
- 1 cup shredded coconut
- 3/4 cup chopped nuts

Cream shortening and sugar together until fluffy. Add eggs and vanilla; beat well. Add flour that has been sifted with baking powder, soda and salt. Gradually stir in rolled oats, coconut and nuts. Shape dough into walnut-size balls on ungreased baking sheet. Bake at 375 degrees for 12 minutes. Makes about 5 1/2 dozen.

HUSH PUPPIES

- 4 cups cornmeal
- 1/2 cup milk
- 3 tablespoons flour

- 1/2 teaspoon salt
- 2 eggs
- 1/2 cup onion, finely chopped
- 1/2 cup green pepper, finely chopped

Mix all of above ingredients except milk. Mix thoroughly. Gradually add milk and mix until stiff (but not too stiff). Fry in deep fat until golden brown.

"We use 1-2 tablespoons to each Hush Puppy. These Hush Puppies take the place of bread at a meal."

Mrs. Wesley Hauserman, R 1, Longford: "This is a good way to use up those green tomatoes before frost."

CHOW-CHOW

- 1 peck green sliced tomatoes
- 8 large peppers, 4 green, 4 red
- 2 medium heads cabbage
- 1 bunch celery
- 5 pounds sugar
- 1 quart vinegar
- 1 box mustard seed
- 1 box celery seed

Wash and slice tomatoes. Let soak in salt water overnight. Put all vegetables through food chopper; drain, squeeze out excess juice and mix all ingredients well in large dishpan. Cook slowly three to four hours. Pack in hot, sterilized jars. Seal. Makes 12 pints or more.

PEANUT BUTTER CRUMB CAKE

- Mix together:
- 2 cups brown sugar
- 2 1/2 cups sifted flour
- 1/2 teaspoon salt

- Blend in:
- 1/2 cup peanut butter
- 1/4 cup of butter or margarine
- Mix until crumbly. Take out 3/4 cup for topping. To the rest add:
- 2 beaten eggs
- 3/4 cup milk
- 1 teaspoon soda, dissolved in hot water
- 1 teaspoon vanilla

Beat until smooth. Pour into buttered loaf pan. Sprinkle reserved crumbs over top and bake 30-35 minutes in 350-degree oven.

Bulbs Will Do Well In Shade

New UN Man Had Hand In Early ACP Plan

J. R. Wiggins, the Washington Post editor who has been named U.S. ambassador to the United Nations, left an imprint on controversial federal farm pro-

grams.

Old-timers at the Agriculture Department says that Wiggins helped originate the Soil Conservation Act, now in its 33rd year.

This act authorizes payment of \$500 million a year to farmers for carrying out government-approved soil and water conservation practices.

In recent years a program operated under the act has paid

farmers much less than the authorized maximum because of government efforts to limit federal spending.

The idea for the conservation act, department officials recall, was provided by Wiggins after the Supreme Court in 1936 ruled unconstitutional the first Agricultural Adjustment Act, one of the cornerstones of the Franklin D. Roosevelt New Deal program for pulling out of the big

depression of the early 1930s.

At that time, Wiggins, as Washington correspondent for the St. Paul Dispatch and Pioneer Press, was covering the Agriculture Department and had become a friend of Henry A. Wallace, first New Deal secretary of agriculture. Wallace had been a major architect of

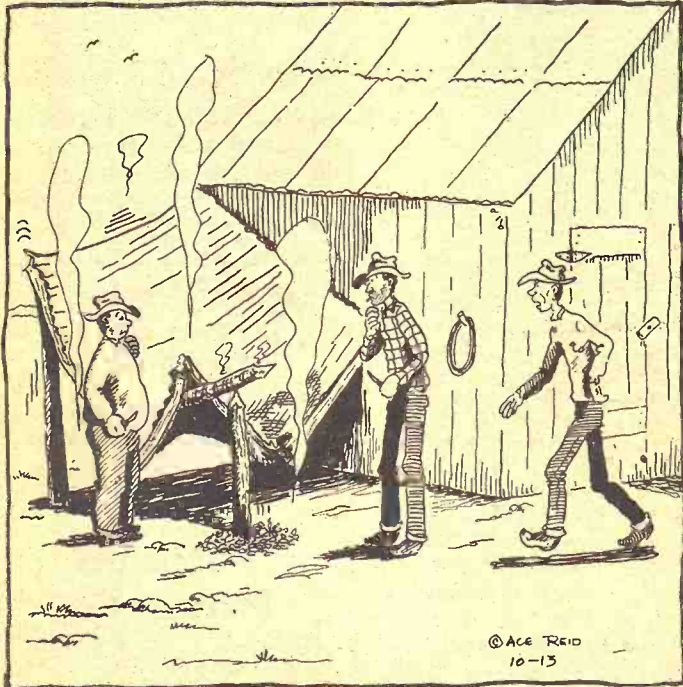

the farm plan outlawed by the high court.

Old-timers at the department say that Wiggins passed his idea for the conservation act along to Wallace who succeeded in getting it incorporated in to law.

Lumber Price Jumps Slack Off

Prices have finally leveled off after an almost unprecedented series of increases in lumber and plywood. Heavy demand over the spring and summer pushed prices upward so that items at Pacific Northwest mills jumped from \$78 to \$98 per thousand board-feet on 2x4s, from \$86 to \$114 on a thousand square feet of half-inch interior plywood; and from \$68 to \$88 a thousand square-feet on quarter-inch interior plywood. While prices have leveled off at the mills, industry sources say that orders suggest more upward pressure after the first of the year.

Too Many Rural Privies, Says Housing Report

A new Agriculture Department report on rural housing says little progress was made from 1960 to 1966 to improve living conditions for low-income families.

The main reason rural homes are less adequate than city dwellings, says the report, is because a larger percentage are without inside plumbing.

Of an estimated 4.8 million substandard homes in rural areas in 1960, about 2 million lacked indoor plumbing, 1.7 million

were minus some plumbing and 1.1 million were "dilapidated," the report said.

"Rural housing has improved considerably since 1960, but the condition of housing occupied by the rural poor may not have improved very much," the report said.

During the period in the study, about 3.7 million rural homes were built, and about 15.6 million repaired. However, the report said, more than 95 per cent of the new homes were built by families whose incomes were more than \$6,000 a year.

Also, the department said, most of the repairs were of a minor nature and were made to homes with standard conveniences.

"It is estimated that less than 150,000 rural homes that lacked plumbing in 1960 had complete plumbing added between 1960 and 1966," the department said.

The report was published by the department's Economic Research Service in a booklet, "Status of Rural Housing in the United States."

More than 4 million homes in the United States did not have water piped inside in 1960, the report said, and about 90 per cent of them were located in rural areas.

Almost 6 million homes in the nation were without flush toilets in 1960, about 5.4 million located in the countryside.

"In general, over one-half of the farm dwellings in the South lacked a flush toilet, compared with about one-fourth in the north central and the northeast regions," the report said.

Other findings:
— About 6.9 million homes lacked a bathtub or shower, including 1.5 million urban and 5.4 million rural.

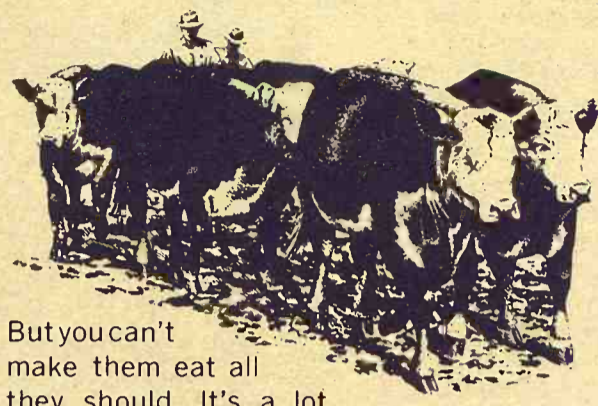
— Differences in housing conditions were more pronounced

between regions than between urban and rural locations.

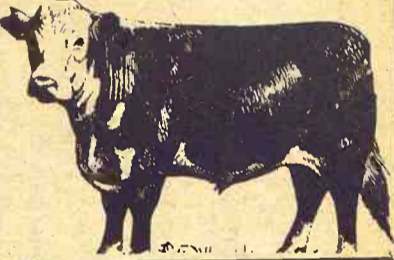

Record high yields per acre are indicated for most of the State's major 1968 fall harvested crops, according to the Kansas Crop and Livestock Reporting Service. Conditions on October 1 indicated record high total production of sorghum grain, soybeans and sugar beets, and the best corn crop since 1944.

Yield per acre estimate for sorghum grain was at a record level, unchanged from a month earlier.

The anticipated corn and soybean yields, though one bushel less than indicated on September 1, were also record high.

Total hay production of 4.7 million tons was the state's fifth largest crop.

Excellent fall weather kept crops maturing about normally and considerably ahead of last year. Harvest activities were

underway for virtually all crops by October 1 and rapidly gaining momentum. About two-thirds of the 1969 winter wheat crop was seeded by October 1, close to usual progress.

Sorghum Grain

Sorghum grain production was forecast at a record high 173,750,000 bushels, 16 percent larger than last year's crop and 33 percent above the 1962-66 average. The expected yield of 50 bushels per acre is 4 bushels above last year and a new record high.

Corn

Production of corn grain was estimated at 86,268,000 bushels, 20 percent above last year, 45 percent larger than average and the largest crop since 1944. The expected record yield of 79 bushels per acre is 11 bushels above last year's previous high.

Other Crops

Soybean production is expected to total 22,700,000 bushels, a new record, 22 percent above last year, and 45 percent more than average. Yield per acre at 25.0 bushels, compares with last year's previous high of 22.5 bushels and the 1962-66 average of 18.7 bushels.

Sugar beet production, estimated at 644,000 tons, is 54 percent above last year's previous record output and more than double the 5-year average.

The state's hay crop of 4,746,000 tons was 10 percent less than a year earlier, but 6 percent above average and the State's fifth largest crop.

Alfalfa hay output of 3,084,000

tons was 13 percent below last year, but 1 percent above average.

Expected apple production at 14.4 million pounds (320,000 bushels) is more than double last year's output and one-third above average. Peach production of 6.2 million pounds (130,000 bushels) was 72 percent above last year and 32 percent more than average.

Pursuant to Article 14, Section 1 of the Constitution and in compliance with House Concurrent Resolution No. 1063, adopted by the legislature on March 7, 1968, a proposition will be submitted to the voters at the November 5, 1968, General Election for their approval or rejection to amend Section 2 of Article 4 of the Constitution as follows:
"Sec. 2. General elections and township elections shall be held biennially on the Tuesday succeeding the first Monday in November in the years bearing even numbers. All county and township officers shall hold their offices for a term of two years and until their successors are qualified: Provided, One county commissioner shall be elected from each of three districts, numbered 1, 2, and 3, by the voters of the district, and the legislature shall fix the time of election and the term of office of such commissioners; such election to be at a general election, and no term of office to exceed six years."

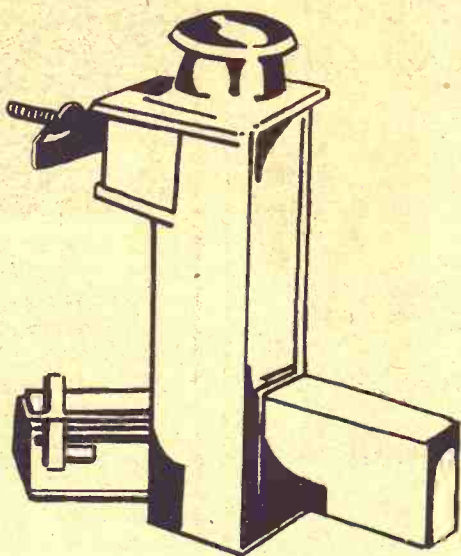

Proceeds From Certificates To Go To Farmers

Kansas wheat farmers cooperating in the government's 1968 wheat program will be paid the net proceeds from the sale of wheat marketing certificates to exporters.

Undersecretary of Agriculture John A. Schnittker Saturday assured Rep. Bob Dole that this action would be taken after June 30, 1969.

Dole recently asked Agriculture Secretary Orville Freeman to clarify his policy on such payments, pointing out that exporters of American wheat have paid as much as 25 cents or more a bushel for export certificates.

The Kansas lawmaker, a member of the House Agriculture Committee, estimated total collections under the certificate purchase program might reach \$100 million, if wheat prices remain at current levels.

Undersecretary Schnittker emphasized that distribution would be made only to wheat growers who take part in the wheat programs.

Because the amount to be distributed is a net figure, Schnittker said, distribution is not made during the course of the

crop year but at the end of the marketing year.

He said the amount to be distributed would depend upon the quantity of the various classes of wheat exported; upon the certificate cost and upon the direct subsidy payments made in putting the wheat into export.

Although Schnittker's decision will not be binding upon the next secretary of agriculture, Dole said the decision made in this administration should be considered as "policy making" for the succeeding administration.

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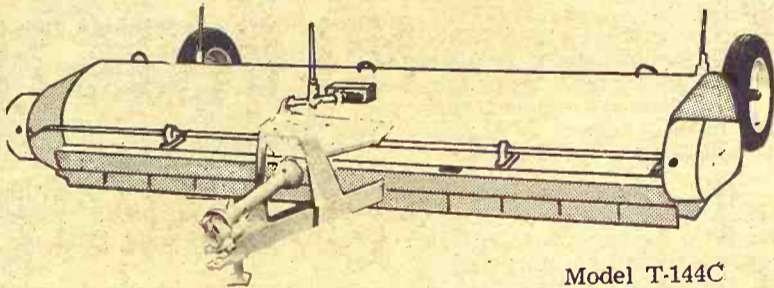

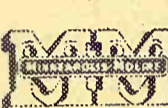

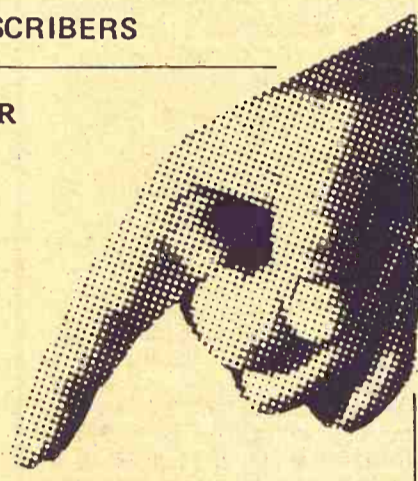

To Train A "In-Between" Doctor

A new kind of medical practitioner will be trained at the University of Colorado Medical School in an attempt to meet an impending crisis in health care for children.

The work will have a range broader than a nurse's but narrower than a doctor's. The workers will meet the medical needs

of children who don't require special attention or care for serious ailments.

The new category of medicine — it doesn't have a formal name yet — is the brainchild of Dr. Henry K. Silver of the medical school's department of pediatrics.

Silver said vast numbers of

children already are "receiving grossly inadequate total health care." And, he said, "It's going to get much worse."

He said estimates place the child population of the United States at 76 million by 1980. To provide adequate health care for these children an additional 100,000 pediatricians need to be trained by then, he said.

The quota cannot be met, even allowing for a drastic increase in the present rate of fewer than 1000 pediatricians entering practice each year.

Silver's plan will begin to become a reality when the first group of trainees starts classes next summer.

With this specialized training, the new practitioner will be ready to see patients after five years of post-high school study, compared with 11 years to put a pediatrician into practice and nine years for a general practitioner.

"This is not a substitute for a doctor, but entails more actual responsibility than a nurse or some form of medical technician," he explained.

The training period can be shorter, he said, because the courses will be focused mainly on the needs of children. This abbreviated training should make the program attractive to those — such as women who want a medical career along with marriage and family — who don't want to spend the time required to become a doctor, Silver said.

"This opens the health profession to people who might have had to select another area of study," Silver said. The pay, he said, is expected to start at \$10,000 to \$12,000, with increases up to \$15,000.

The training would include two years of undergraduate study, two years at the medical school in basic sciences and clinical experience, and a one-year internship. Those completing the course would be awarded bachelor's degrees.

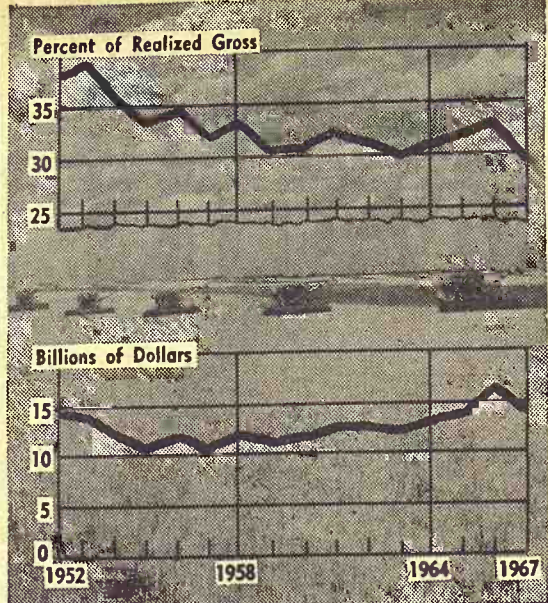
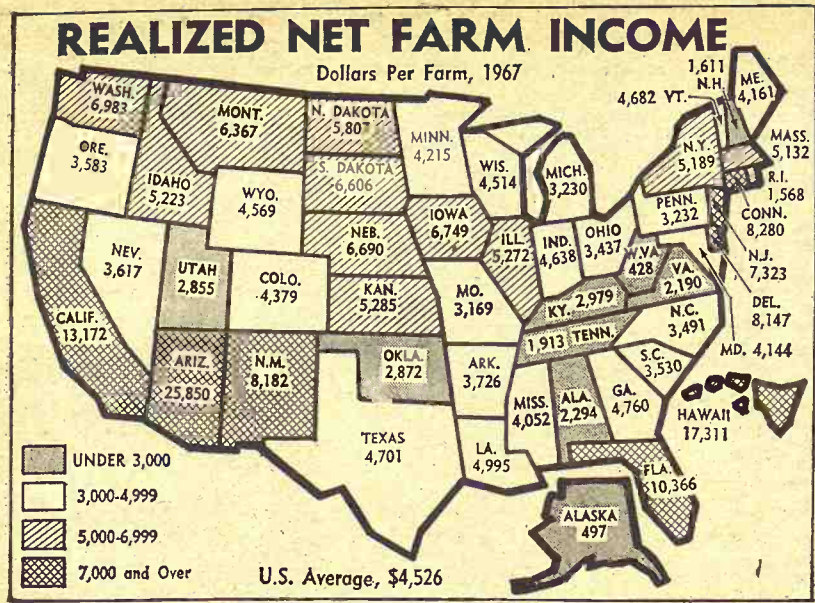

ELLSWORTH FARM BUREAU MEETS OCT. 19

ELLSWORTH — The Ellsworth County Farm Bureau will hold its annual meeting here October 19 at the Armory. Delbert Ekart, state safety director for the Farm Bureau, will be speaker.

Four Landowners Share Saline County Watershed

The largest watershed project in Saline County is now under construction near the Ellsworth and McPherson county lines.

The dam will be on the Melvin Schneider farm.

It will have 97,000 cubic yards of earthen fill. It will be approximately 2000 feet long, with a maximum height of 35 feet and width of 200 feet.

The prime purpose of the project is to preventing of cropland, farms and roads.

When conservation level is reached, the water back-up will cover about 25 surface acres. Full capacity of the reservoir will be 54 acres.

The dam will protect about 400 acres of cropland in McPherson County, and drain and intercept water from 1770 acres in Saline County.

A core trench is to be constructed at the base of the dam for a drawdown pipe for controlled release of water to croplands below the dam.

Construction of the dam is

being financed partially by four landowners in the area. They are Schneider, Harry Kejr, Leslie Blomberg and Elna Haubold.

These landowners will pay 40 percent of the \$28,000 in construction costs. The Saline county ASCS is providing the remaining funds with a grant made available under the Agricultural Conservation program.

The lake generated by the dam also will be developed into a recreational area with boating and fishing. It also will provide water for livestock.

This is the second such project in Saline County to be constructed with ASCS cost-share funds. The first was the Bavaria Community Watershed project built in 1964 at a cost of \$13,600, of which ASCS funds were \$9250.

Now 275 Rural Fire Districts

Growth of rural fire districts in Kansas is helping control fire as a danger of farm life. Here are about 275 fire districts in the state, some countywide and others covering one or more townships. They are manned by about 3000 firemen, almost all volunteers.

The rural fire program was

started in 1963 in cooperation with the U.S. Forestry Service, and there were only two or three districts then. Now every Kansas county is at least partially covered.

The departments are equipped with 1600 vehicles, mostly 2½ ton six-wheel army trucks. They are equipped to carry 1000 to 1200 gallons of water and can go almost anywhere. They can pump from ponds, wells or cisterns.

Kansas seems more susceptible than most states to grass fires, and rural departments control such blazes and save buildings and other farm properties from fire.

Last year 1983 rural fires were reported, with more than 231,000 acres burned.

With growth of rural fire departments, the number of fires has increased. Through training programs, the volunteers are developing.

USDA Sees Weaker Fall Cattle Prices

Livestock producers can expect moderately strong prices to continue this fall, but the Agriculture department says buildups of cattle and hogs for slaughter markets could bring price difficulties later on.

The department says in a summary of a livestock situation report that prices for fed cattle this fall are likely to be lower because of larger production, seasonal increases in pork supplies and gains in broiler chicken output.

"Fed cattle marketings this past summer continued well above a year earlier," the department said, "and gains at least as large are likely this fall."

The report cited increases in cattle feeding in a 6-state survey area, which jumped 32 per cent in July and 6 per cent in August from year-earlier levels.

Strong consumer demand for beef has contributed to the higher cattle price average during the summer, but the department said further gains in demand probably will lessen this fall in winter.

Hog slaughter this fall is expected to be "a little smaller" than during the October-December period last year. Ten corn belt states on September 1 reported up to 2 per cent fewer pigs in weight groups expected to provide most of the fall packing house supplies.

But hog slaughter in the first half of 1969 probably will be reflecting more lightweight pigs moving into feedlots at the pres-

ent time. Moreover, the department said, producers in the corn belt states expect to have 4 per cent more sows farrowing this fall and winter.

"Thus, expansion in hog production apparently is resuming after a brief interruption last March-May when farrowings were down 3 per cent," the department said.

The expected larger supplies of slaughter hogs this winter and next spring probably will renew downward pressure on prices, the department added.

Fall and winter prices for lambs are expected to continue higher than a year earlier, mostly because of a 4 per cent smaller lamb crop this year.

CONCORDIA — Boogaarts, once a family-owned, modest-sized grocery wholesaler in the G&G area, is now in the midst of a corporate struggle for stockholder control.

J. Milton Sorem of Concordia, once an executive in the Boogaart group who became chairman of the board when it was merged into the Scrivner discount house operation of Oklahoma City, has sold all of his stock in the Scrivner-Boogaart Corp. to another Scrivner director and principal shareholder, Charles Vose.

Sorem and his family reportedly held around 73,000 shares, or about 17% of the entire company.

IHC Inc. (not International Harvester, but a corporation formerly called Inland Homes Corp. which operates discount stores, a restaurant chain, laminated plastic facilities and wig manufacturing) claims that it had bargained to buy the shares of Sorem and J. V. Smith, Scrivner president.

IHC reportedly would have purchased 26% of the Scrivner-Boogaart stock from Sorem and

Smith. When Sorem sold his stock to Vose, an IHC official promised "appropriate legal action." Scrivner-Boogaart directors had gone on record as opposing a merger with IHC.

The purchase of Sorem and Smith's stock reportedly would have had a \$2.8 million price tag on it, based on about \$25 a share.

World Food Trade In Slump

World agriculture is in a slump because many countries are becoming increasingly able to feed themselves, the Food and Agriculture Organization — FAO — reports.

The statement came at the close of a meeting by the 34-nation committee on commodities. The committee reported that the decline in agricultural commodity trade in 1967-68 was due in part to better harvests in developing countries and those with centrally planned economies.

Another cause for the agricultural trade decline, said FAO, was a slowing rate of economic activity in some industrialized countries.

Summing up, FAO said most of the decline was due to "increasing self-sufficiency in importing countries in agricultural products or their synthetic substitutes, and the slow growth in demand."

Predicts 35 To 37-Cent Eggs

A Kansas State University Extension economist looks for producer egg prices in the 35 to 37 cents per dozen range during the next several weeks, up 5 to 7 cents from 1967 levels. But he sees prices skidding several cents next spring.



M. E. Jackson points to a drop in production, resulting from a reduced hatch of egg-type poults during the first half of 1968, as the reason for the higher prices.

Production for the October-December quarter may run 4 percent below year-earlier levels, he says.

Current reports indicate the pullet-type chick hatch for the last half of 1968 will be up 12 percent from the same period in 1967. These birds will be added to the laying flocks during February-June 1969. This could increase egg numbers and depress prices next spring.

A continuation of this trend toward increased hatch could push egg prices to very low levels next fall, Jackson says.

Plan A Major State Park Area At El Dorado

A 5-million dollar proposal for recreational facilities at El Dorado reservoir, including an 18-

hole golf course and lodge, has been presented to El Dorado area officials by members of the Kansas Park and Resources authority.

The proposal calls for 2.5 million dollars for an initial 10-year development program and 2.5 million for ultimate development of overnight accommodations and associated facilities.

HP Battle Even For Garden Tractors

A horsepower battle looms in the lawn and garden tractor market.

International Harvester Co. believes it executed a coup when it introduced a 15 HP model for the man-about home who wants to do his own plowing, pulling and mowing.

At least four other makers have started to offer 14 HP home tractors for the first time. In 1967, the power parade was generally led by 12 HP units. "The horsepower race is on," says an International Harvester representative.

Tractor makers say they're only catering to consumer pressures. "People demand more power whether they need it or not," says one manufacturer.

Explains a Minneapolis-Moline salesman, "A high-powered lawn tractor is a symbol of status."

It's also a sign of affluence. International Harvester's new unit, for example, is priced at \$1788. Its 12 HP unit sells for \$1150.

About 1000 acres would be used. Members of the authority, holding a regular meeting, elected C. V. Bargeman, Fredonia, chairman, to succeed William T. Niggeman of Girard, who remains on the board. Byron G. Stout, Jr., Wichita, was named

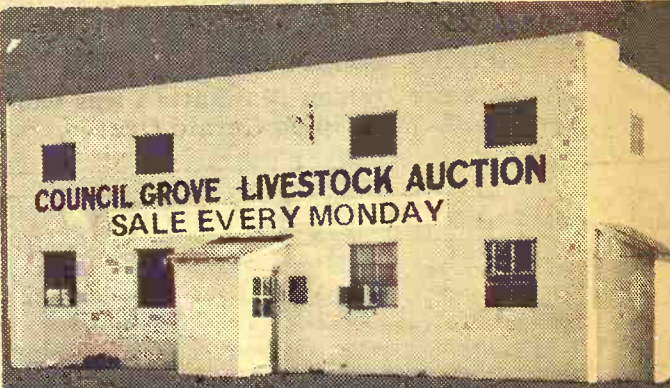

Strong Demand For Ag School Graduates

MANHATTAN — A rapidly increasing demand for graduates and a "changing image" are reasons cited for rising enrollments in the Kansas State University College of Agriculture by Dr. Carroll Hess, dean.

Since 1963, undergraduate enrollments in agriculture have been increasing by ten per cent or more a year — a rate somewhat faster than the increase in enrollment for the entire university. This fall the KSU College of Agriculture has enrolled approximately 1335 undergraduate and 275 graduate students.

As evidence of the demand for ag graduates, Dean Hess points to an effective 4-1 ratio of jobs to graduates in the North Central area and rising starting salaries.

In 1967 there were 5317 jobs available in the North Central area for 2635 agricultural graduates receiving the bachelor's degree. This is two jobs for every graduate.

"But when you consider that about 30 per cent of our graduates go on to graduate study, 9 per cent return to the farm and some enter military service, the ratio of jobs-per-graduate becomes more nearly 4-1," Hess says.

Average beginning salaries this past year for KSU ag graduates with a B.S. degree were \$7600. "This year," Hess says, "the figure will climb to approximately \$8000."

A factor in the increased demand for ag graduates is the expanded demand for food and fiber associated with a growing population.

Hess believes the image of agriculture is changing "from that of farming alone to the image of an industry beginning with those businesses which provide farm supplies like fertilizer, feed, seed and agrichemicals, the firms processing and marketing agricultural products, and the associated research, educational and services agencies. Expansion in off-farm industries accounts for most of the expanded demands for agricultural graduates," Hess says.

Advise A Smaller Feed Grain Acreage

October 15, 1968

An Agriculture Department advisory committee has urged that farmers be asked to make idle 2 million to 4 million additional acres of livestock feed grain crop land.

The recommendation was made by the national advisory committee on grains after a 2-day meeting with department officials. The cutback was urged to head off rising surpluses of corn, sorghum grain, barley, and oats.

A recommendation also was made to continue the government's soybean price support at \$2.50 a bushel. But the committee urged Orville L. Freeman, secretary of agriculture, to explore ways to slow down production of the crop, estimated this year at a record 1.1 billion bushels.

Edwin A. Jaenke, associate administrator of the agricultural Stabilization and Conservation Service and the committee chairman, said the department also was urged to raise feed grain price support loan rates and price support payments by 10 cents a bushel.

The price support loan rate on corn this year, for example, is \$1.05 a bushel, and the payment rate - based on half a farmer's allocated production - is 30 cents a bushel.

The committee also recommended that farmers be required to make idle a minimum of 20 percent of their feed grain base acreage to qualify for price supports and payments.

FLORIDA STOPS HOG MOVEMENT

Florida, in an effort to retain its recently acquired hog cholera free status, has stopped all shipments of hogs except those moving directly to slaughter. During the past two weeks 28 outbreaks of hog cholera have been confirmed, mostly in northern Florida, following a 15-month period free of cholera.

New Livestock Markets Exec

Karl Heimke, former livestock futures market executive in Chicago, has been appointed an executive officer of the Certified Livestock Markets Association, a Kansas City-based trade organization of livestock auctions, which includes many of the barns in the G&G area.

C. T. Sanders, general manager of the association, said Heimke would work especially with two wings of the association, The Competitive Livestock Markets Council and the Competitive Livestock Markets Corporation.

Trend To Lighter Cattle

More red meat is being produced from leaner, lighter cattle entering the slaughter market, Agriculture Department figures show.

Commercial slaughter houses turned out nearly 1,800,000,000 pounds of beef in August, 4 per cent more than a year earlier and 1 per cent more than in July, the USDA said. But the 4 per cent boost in meat production resulted from only a 3 per cent rise in the number of cattle slaughtered during the month. And the average weight of each animal was less — 995 pounds, compared with 998 a year earlier and 1006 in July.

The figures underline what most cattlemen already know and what the department has been urging for a long time:

Cattle should be marketed when they reach market weights and grade. Economists point out that when cattle are kept on feed beyond this point the extra costs offset much of the gain. It also increases the total volume of meat entering the market, which can contribute to de-

pressed prices.

Cattlemen's response to the problem is reflected in the slaughter report, department officials say. Improved breeding and selection of feeder cattle by stockmen also have helped develop higher quality animals going into the slaughter market.

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Shear A Sheep, Or Pluck It?

BELTSVILLE, Md. — A revolution in the shearing of sheep and in the business may be imminent. Scientists at the U.S. Department of Agriculture's research station here have used an experimental chemical, previously used mainly in cancer therapy, to cause sheep to make their fleeces available at a slight tug of the hand instead of the clippers.

The chemical, given to the sheep internally, causes a ring-like constriction in each wool fiber beneath the skin surface.

The constriction moves up from the bulb of each wool fiber as it grows and in six or

seven days reaches a position just beneath the skin surface. At that point, the fiber breaks easily and the entire fleece can be separated at the skin line, leaving the sheep completely bare. If the fleece is left on longer than seven days, the constriction grows out above the skin surface so that after fleece removal a short coat of new wool protects the skin, much as in shearing.

Wool has grown back normally on sheep chemically de-fleeced at the station, regardless of the interval allowed between dosing the sheep and removing the wool.

Further studies are necessary to determine whether this type of wool removal causes chemical residues in the meat or alters wool growth or quality.

Cost of the experimental treatment has not yet been worked out in dollars and cents, but its practical advantage is indicated.

\$4 Million State Past-Due Taxes

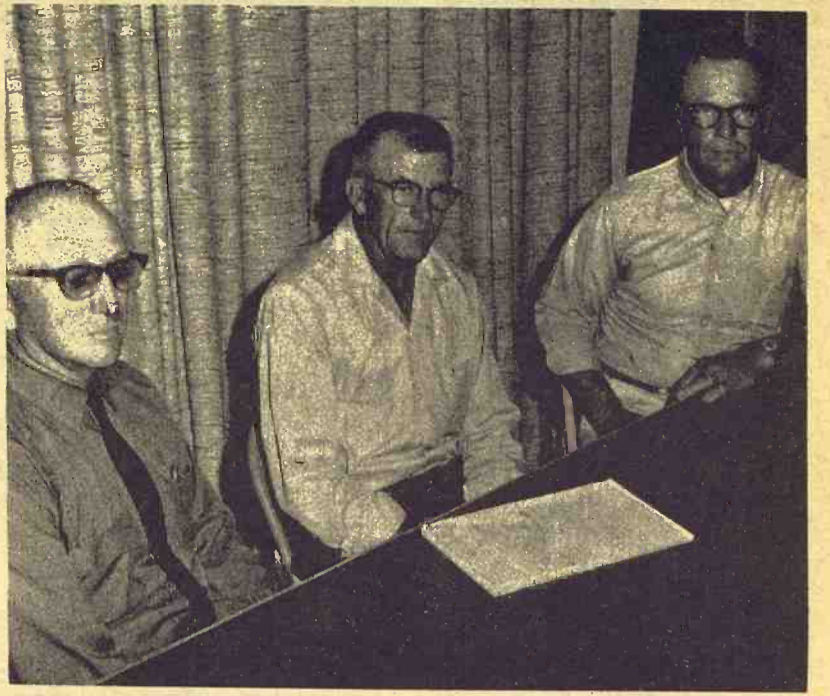
TOPEKA — The State Revenue Department has 50,546 delinquent income tax notices — representing about \$4 million in overdue taxes — ready to be mailed, primarily to Kansas residents.

However, James T. McDonald, state revenue director, said he has not decided how many of them actually will be sent.

Of the total notices, 18,924 of them concern accounts dating prior to 1961. They account for \$1.4 million in back taxes.

The newer accounts receivable total 31,622 and represent \$2.7 million in overdue taxes.

The director said only about 9000 of the accounts receivable are new this year. The others have been billed in past years.

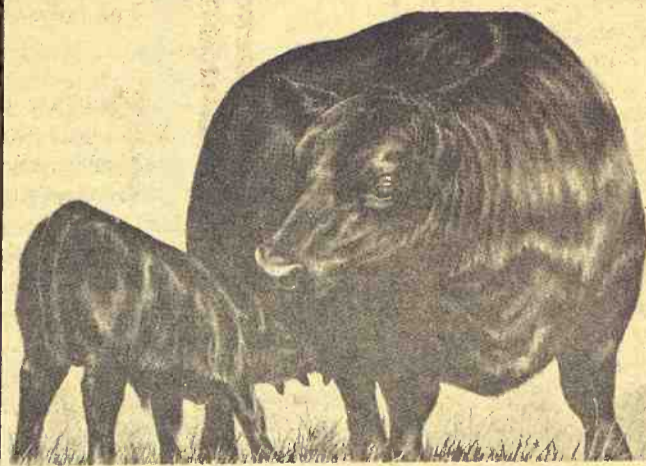

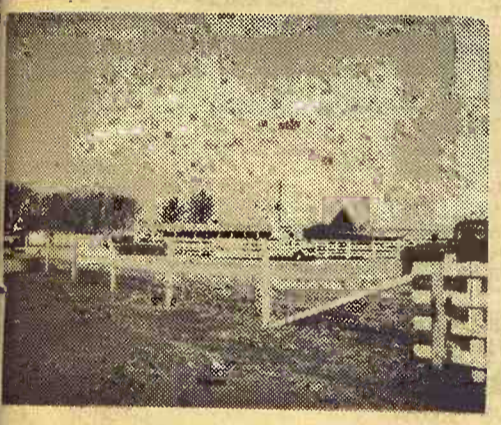

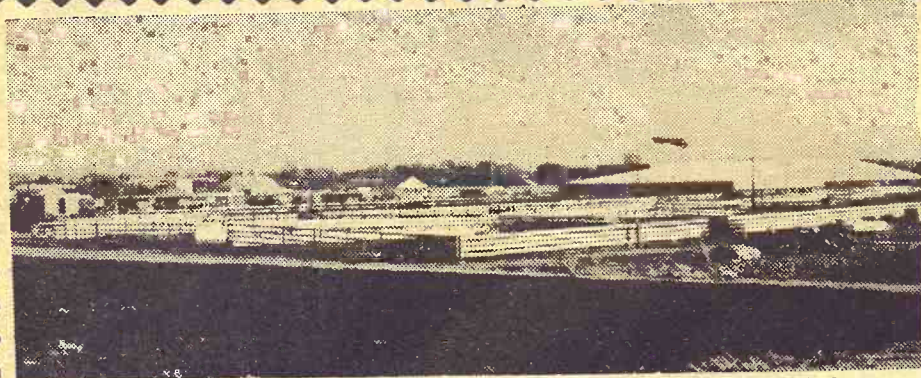
