## 'Sound Reason For Farm Unrest'

"There is a sound reason for unrest," said Senator Frank Carlson last week as of farmer discontent over declining farm income and rising farm costs.

Carlson spoke at the annual meeting of the Kansas Cooperative Council at Manhattan, and he said farmer unrest "has now in some instances reached threa-

tened revolt."

While noting that agriculture economists don't regard the parity ratio as a meaningful farm indicator, Carlson said that regardless of how parity is figured "one thing is certain. The farmer must buy his machinery—pay for labor costs and pay his taxes in an economy in which he is not receiving his fair share of the national income."

Carlson noted the current parity ratio at 77—five points below a year ago, and said: "It is interesting to note that in June 1932 it was 53—its lowest figure. Its high was 123 in October 1946."

## Two USDA Moves To Soothe Price Woes

Orville L. Freeman, secretary of agriculture, said he planned two actions designed to ease what he said was farmer restlessness and uncertainty over agricultural prices.

He said the Agriculture department would expand purchases of pork and beef products for relief donations and related non-commercial programs, and extend resale procedures to soybean growers.

### Can Control Supply

Under resale, farmers can keep beans under government price support loans for extended periods, and, in effect, wait out the market until prices rise.

Freeman disclosed his intentions to the Senate agriculture committee during testimony supporting a congressional resolution that would endorse President Johnson's emergency food aid program for India.

Sen. Milton R. Young (R-N. D.) has asked why farm prices are declining when "everybody says we have no agricultural food surpluses."

Freeman replied that he shares farmer concern over price declines, saying "agriculture is restless, uncertain. The market is very speculative. Everybody is jumpy."

### No Wheat Action

But in an exchange with Young, Freeman said he has no present intention to raise price support levels for wheat.

Approximately 650 voting members attend the meeting. The co-op, now with three branches, Alta Vista, Westmoreland and Onaga, is planning a 50th anniversary celebration.

## Urges Half Payment At Wheat Signup Time

Wheat farmers could get one-half of their payments at the time of signup for participating in the wheat program under a bill being introduced in Congress last week by Rep. Robert Dole, R-Kan.

Dole said in a statement this would treat wheat producers the same as farmers who participate in feed grain and cotton programs.

The Agriculture Department

assured him, he said, that payments to those participating in the 1967 program would be made earlier this year.

Under his bill, Dole said, winter wheat growers would receive the first half of their program payments in the fall, and spring wheat producers would receive theirs in the spring.

The measure would apply to the 1968 and subsequent crops.

## Tested Boar Sale Averages \$137

MANHATTAN — The top-rated animal in the Tested Boar Sale at Kansas State University last week was a Duroc that brought \$300 at the auction block from Gary Stichernath, a commercial operator from Marysville.

Stichernath has purchased animals in four previous sales for his 40-sow operation. The top boar was bred by Hayes Beck, Junction City.

Another Beck bred animal brought the top price of \$340 at the sale. This was a Yorkshire that ranked sixth in the tests, but caught the fancy of Norbert Ohlde, Linn. Beck also entered the fifth and sixth place Duroc animals.

Two Hampshire littermates put on test by Joe O'Bryan had the second and third place test ratings. Bert Hucke, Parsons, paid \$300 for the second place boar.

An average price of \$137 a head was recorded for the 37 boars that went on sale. This event marked the close of winter tests at the Swine Testing Station operated in Manhattan by K-State for the Kansas Swine Improvement Association.

The Station was started in 1958 by the KSIA in an effort to better evaluate purebred stock. Rate of gain, feed efficiency, and meat-type characteristics are the important production factors considered, says Wendell A. Moyer, Extension livestock specialist.

In the tests, two littermate boars and a full half-brother boar are fed together. They are fed to an average weight of 200 pounds to determine feed efficiency and rate of growth. The barrows are slaughtered when the tests are complete to determine carcass length, backfat, loin eye area, and percent of lean cuts. The boars are probed for backfat and sonoray tested for loin eye area. Prospective buyers are furnished this information before the sale.

"The fact that most of the boars in this sale were purchased for use in commercial herds is an indication that Kansas swine producers are recognizing the value of tested boars in an efficient operation," Moyer says.

The Testing Station is now accepting applications for the spring tests, Moyer indicates. Purebred breeders should make applications now so they can deliver the test animals to the Station in April.

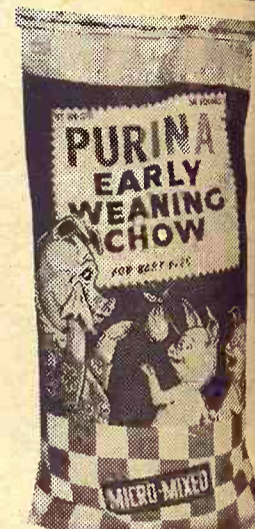

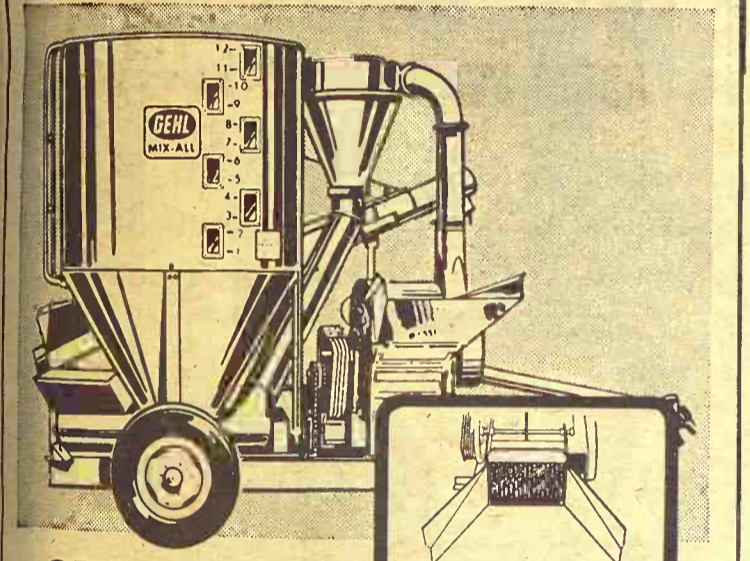

# How Cattle Seers Missed Mark

The beef cattle situation may not improve so soon or so much as has been expected. There seem to be a lot more cattle on farms and ranches than the forecasters thought.

The cycle of cattle numbers had seemed to reach its peak two years ago. We believed that farmers and ranchers sold more cattle than they produced in 1965 and 1966. In order to build up herds, we expected sales of cattle to be reduced this year, and during the next two or three years.

Now, however, it appears that cattle numbers continued to increase during the past two years. Farmers and ranchers have no need to reduce sales of cattle in order to rebuild their herds.

Thoughtful cattlemen may well ask, "What brought about the sudden change in the cattle situation and outlook?" They will also want to make a new appraisal of price prospects for 1967 and 1968.

Here is what has happened:

Each year, the USDA surveys a representative sample of farmers, then makes estimates of livestock on farms January 1. These estimates are published about the middle of February in a report called "Livestock and Poultry Inventory, January 1."

Each five years, a census of agriculture is taken. This is a complete count, and therefore it is more accurate than the annual estimates, which are based upon samples. When the census figures become available, the annual estimates of livestock numbers are revised in line with the facts obtained by the census.

The latest census figures became available in 1966. They showed considerably more cattle and calves on farms and ranches than were listed in the annu-

al estimates. Therefore, the old estimates — from 1961 through 1966 — were revised upward and were published, along with the estimates for January 1 of this year.

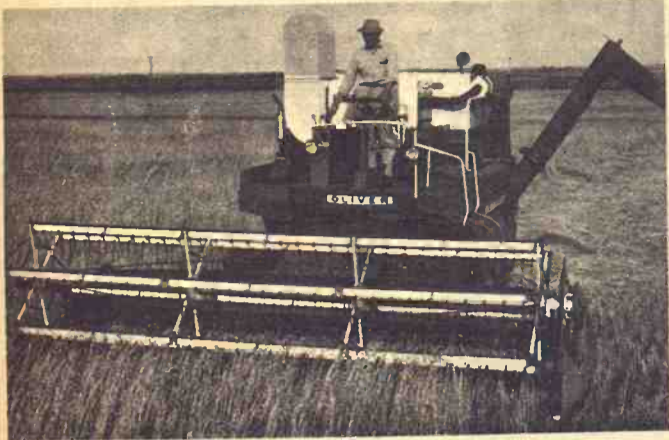
The number of beef cattle in various classes on January 1 appears as follows:

- The number of steers over 1 year old was 12.7 million — the same as a year earlier, and 5 percent more than two years ago.
- The number of beef heifers 1 to 2 years old was 9.2 million — up 3 percent from a year ago, but up only 2 percent from two years before.
- The number of calves under 1 year old on hand January 1 was listed at 27.3 million — up 1 percent from a year earlier, and up 4 percent from two years earlier. (These numbers include all calves, except heifer calves being kept for dairy purposes.)
- The number of beef cows was listed at 34.6 million — the same as last year, and 1 percent more than two years ago.

Considering these new and larger figures, we may have about as much beef this year as in 1966. Prices may rise, but less than seemed likely before the new figures on cattle were released.

## Might Apply \$7 Federal Park Fee On Area Engineer Reservoirs

Reservoir buffs in Kansas may have to take their pick between state and federal facilities if they don't purchase two permits next summer.

Federal entrance fees apparently will be charged at federal facilities on U.S. Army Corps of Engineers reservoirs.

The fee however, in the form of a \$7 federal "Golden Passport," will not affect state park users on corps lakes, such as Kanopolis, or any of the U. S. Bureau of Reclamation lakes.

Army Corps of Engineers representatives said areas where permits would be needed have not yet been established.

There will be a need for a federal permit in some areas on Kanopolis, Wilson, Tuttle Creek and Harlan County Reservoir, Nebraska.

The federal "Golden" permit will cost \$7 per car annually or \$1 for a short-term permit.

It will go into effect April 1.

The permit will also allow users to visit the national parks throughout the United States.

Tom Zouzas, Ellsworth, manager of the Tower Harbor concession at Kanopolis, said the federal permit may prove to be a boon to state parks.

"If people need a federal permit, they may choose to buy only a state permit and limit their visits to state parks at federal reservoirs.

"The federal permit would be a bargain for travelers but it may be expensive for one-time users."


"Concession operators could see a drop in state park usage when the state fees went into effect and there is no reason to believe the federal permits would not cause the same type of reaction," he said.

"No reservoirs in Kansas under the Bureau of Reclamation will come under the federal park permit, Lynn Burris, director of state parks, said.

The bureau has turned all park facilities over to the Kansas Park and Resources Authority and Kansas Forestry, Fish and Game Commission.

Bureau lakes in Central and Northwestern Kansas unaffected by the federal permit are Kirwin, Norton, Waconda lake, Webster, Cedar Bluffs, Lovewell


are all under the state park or fish and game authority.  
 If the state park fee permit is lifted by the legislature, as Gov. Robert Docking urges, no fee would be required at any of these lakes.

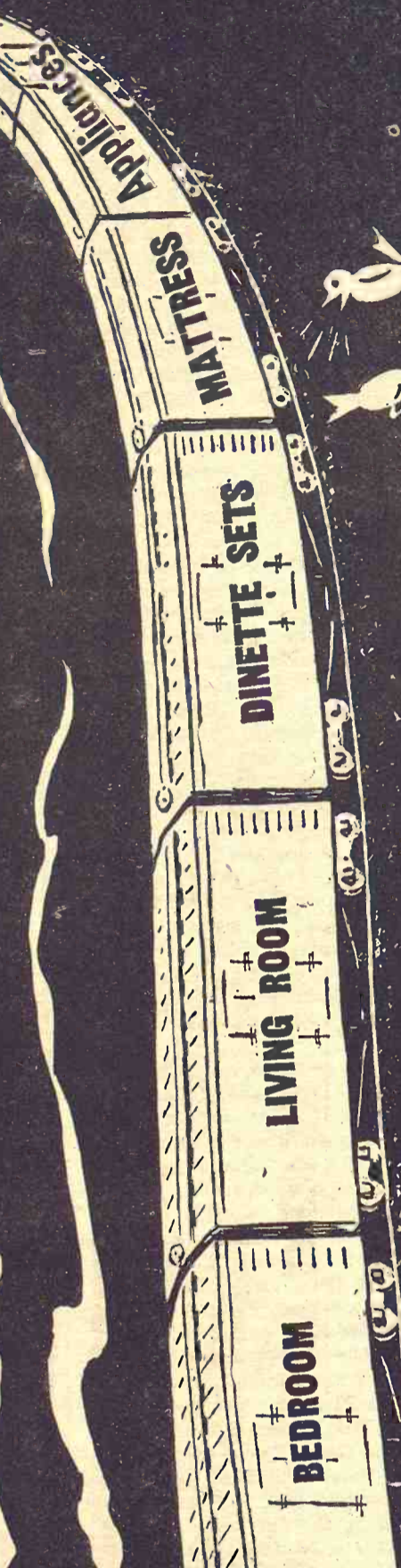

KRAUT-ONION SPECIAL

- 1 1-pound can of sauerkraut, undrained
1 4-ounce can of sliced mushrooms, undrained
1 package (1 1/2 ounce) onion soup mix
2 tablespoons butter or margarine
1 teaspoon sugar
1/4 teaspoon caraway seed

Mix all ingredients until they are well blended. Cook over medium heat for a few minutes, or until thoroughly heated.

Mrs. John Adams, R 1, Frankfort: "I always look forward each week for the new recipes. I'm sending something different for club meetings or any party. These are tempting coconut dainties and are nice as they taste like candy."

COCONUT DAINTIES

- 1 package cream cheese (3-ounce)
2 cups powdered sugar
1 cup grated or flake coconut
Work sugar into the cream cheese. (Can do this quickly if you use your hand.) When you

get a nice even mixture work in the coconut. (May need a bit more coconut.) Form into small balls. For an attractive touch top with bits of candied cherries. These can be made ahead of time as they keep well in a cool, dry place.

The next recipe is from Mrs. Cleo Morgan, Clyde:

WACKY CAKE

- 1 1/2 cups flour
1 cup sugar
1 teaspoon soda
2 tablespoons cocoa
Sift together in pan in which you plan to bake it. Make three holes in mixture. In one hole put 1 tablespoon vinegar, in another put 1/2 cup melted shortening, and in the last put 1 teaspoon vanilla. Pour 1 cup cold water over all and stir well. Bake in same pan that you mix it at 350 degrees. When cool put on frosting. "This cake is moist and keeps well."

Mrs. Donald Kalivoda, Agenda: "I read in a recent issue of Grass & Grain where a lady wanted a green bean recipe.

This recipe has been a favorite of our family for a long time."

GREEN BEAN PATTIES

- 1 can green beans, drained and cut fine, or 1 pint
1 egg
Salt
Pepper
1 teaspoon finely chopped onion
enough flour to form into patties
Fry slowly in lard and vegetable shortening until golden brown.

This recipe was sent by Mrs. Gladys V. Wise, 712 Alma, St. Marys:

RASPBERRY DELIGHT

Make a crust of 20 graham crackers crushed, 1/4 cup white sugar and 1/4 cup melted butter. Bake eight minutes at 350 degrees in a large pan, 13x9x1-in.

Dissolve 1 package lemon gelatin in 1 cup boiling water and 3 tablespoons lemon juice. When syrupy, beat until fluffy. Cream an 8-ounce package Philadelphia cream cheese with 1 cup sugar and 1 teaspoon vanilla. Whip 1 1/2 ounce can Carnation milk (must be cold). Combine gelatin, cheese and milk (whipped) and place in the crust.

Cook one package Junket brand Danish Dessert currant raspberry with 1 cup water until thick. While still hot, stir in 1 package frozen red raspberries.

When the above is cool, top the whipped mixture with it. Green coloring may be added to the bottom mixture for Christmas.

Mrs. Karl Stock, Oketo: "Find enclosed a recipe for an apricot salad you might like to put in Grass & Grain. I clip out and use some of the recipes in your paper."

APRICOT SALAD

- 2 packages orange gelatin
2 cups boiling water
Dissolve gelatin in hot water and let cool. Add 10 large marshmallows cut up or about 40 small marshmallows; 1 can No. 2 1/2 size apricots, cut up, and 1 small can crushed pineapple. Let set. Use the juices of the fruits and water to make 2 cups. Cook juices with 1/2 cup sugar, 2 tablespoons flour and 2 tablespoons butter or oleo until thickened and let cool. Fold in 1 cup of sweet cream whipped, or 1 package Dream Whip, whipped, and spread over top of salad which has set and sprin-

kled with some chopped nuts and coconut.

Mrs. Roland Shafer, Adair: "Here is a very good holiday salad that can be made ahead."

SNOW BALLS

- 36 vanilla wafers
1 pint whipping cream
coconut

FILLING

- 1/2 cup butter or margarine
1 cup sugar
2 eggs, separated
1 cup drained, crushed pineapple

1 cup nuts, chopped fine
Cream butter and sugar. Add beaten yolks; add nuts and fruit. Add egg whites, beaten. For each ball: Take 3 vanilla wafers; spread filling between and on top and sides. Place in refrigerator at least four hours. Whip 1 pint of cream; add 1/2 cup sugar. Cover each ball and sprinkle generously with coconut. Chill in refrigerator three hours.

Mrs. Merle Schmidt, R 1, Chapman: "Please find enclosed my Brownie recipe which my family thinks is great. I take this to many picnics and parties."

BROWNIES

- 1 stick oleo
1 cup sugar
4 eggs
1 1-pound can chocolate syrup
1 cup and 1 tablespoon flour
1/2 cup nuts

Beat oleo and sugar together. Add two eggs at a time. Alternate flour and chocolate syrup. Mix well at high speed. Beat in nuts. Bake in greased cookie sheet in 325 or 350-degree oven for 25-30 minutes.

BROWNIE FROSTING

- 6 tablespoons oleo
6 tablespoons milk
1 1/2 cups white sugar
Bring to full rolling boil for 30 seconds only. Remove from fire and add 1/2 cup chocolate chips. Beat until smooth and frost cooled brownies.

(Marshmallows will remain at the top and cherries at the bottom if a layered effect is desired. Or when salad begins to congeal, stir the ingredients to distribute them evenly. Molds well. If an extra firm salad is desired, decrease 1/2-1/4 cup of the liquid.)

**HAWAIIAN DROP COOKIES**

2 cups flour  
 2 teaspoons baking powder  
 1/2 teaspoon salt

 1 1/4 cups sugar  
 1/2 teaspoon almond extract  
 1 egg  
 1/2 cup coconut  
 Sift the dry ingredients. Cream the shortening, sugar and extracts. Beat egg until fluffy and add to creamed ingredients. Blend in pineapple and dry ingredients. Drop by teaspoonful onto ungreased cookie sheet. Sprinkle with coconut (or coconut may be added to other ingredients before baking.) Bake in a 325-degree oven for about 20 minutes.

**Periwinkle**

In times gone by periwinkles were used for making chaplets to be placed around the heads of important persons. In fact, the name periwinkle comes from the Latin words for "bind" and "about." Nowadays gardeners find periwinkle a useful plant for hot spots as it tolerates heat so well.

Periwinkles are upright-growing, bushy little plants, most about a foot and a half high. All kinds have glossy leaves and large, single blooms. These are white, pink or rose often

with an "eye" or center of another color.

Thus, the variety Bright Eyes has white flowers with rose eyes while Twinkles is blush pink with a bright red eye, haloed with rose.

Periwinkles are easily grown from seeds, bloom all summer and fall and never are troubled by diseases or insect pests. Wouldn't they be a fine addition to your garden?

The bill was for replacing two windshield wiper blades that had never been through a shower. You either pay or don't get your vehicle approved.

I had a '49 Ford one-ton flatbed that looked terrible but it ran and I hauled trash on it once a month. But it had to be in the same mechanical condition as one that was on the road 24 hours a day hauling a full load. Farmers will take note if they have some machine around they use to haul wheat once a year.

# Fertilizer Sales Continue Upward

Fertilizer sales in Kansas reached a record high for a six-month fall period, during the six months ending December 31, 1966. The new high was 412,185 tons, an increase of 65,000 tons over the corresponding period of 1965, which also was a new record. Only the spring period of 1966 with 487,631 tons had higher figures.

The report, based on commercial fertilizer sales by manufacturers to Kansas dealers, was issued by the Control Division of the State Department of Agriculture. A new high of 229,583 tons of actual plant nutrients was sold during the period. Nitrogen and available phosphoric acid accounted for most of the increase. Nitrogen showed a sales total of 124,002, a gain of 36,437 tons; available phosphoric acid a sales total of 95,015, a gain of 22,196 tons.

Nine of twelve fertilizer materials sold to dealers showed an increase over the previous fall period, with anhydrous ammonia up from 22,859 to 50,279 tons, better than 100 percent. Dry mixed fertilizers were up to 228,978, an increase of 32,555 tons.

The fertilizer grade showing the greatest increase was 18-46-0 with 116,325, up 33,137 tons. Sumner County led the state

in fertilizer sales with a total of 17,975 tons, followed by Sedgwick, last year's leader, with 14,240 tons. Other leaders, with tonnage are: Reno 12,795; McPherson 11,511; Marion 9,819; Cowley 9,629; and Crawford 9,405. Tonnage figures shown by counties represent reports of sales to dealers and others, and do not necessarily imply actual usage in that county.

## New Savings Bond

Here is the new "Freedom Share" U.S. savings note unveiled by the Treasury Department which is expected to attract up to \$1 million over the next year to help finance the Vietnam war.

The new bond, in denominations of \$25, \$50, \$75, and \$100, matures in 4½ years and if held that long would yield 4.74 percent interest. The bonds go on sale May 1 and are available only to persons who buy series E savings bonds on payroll savings or bond-a-month plans. The series E and new savings note will be sold in combination on a one-for-one basis.

## A New Federal Fish Hatchery Studied For Milford Reservoir

JUNCTION CITY — A proposal to establish a federal fish hatchery and aquarium in the area below Milford Dam is being studied by an official of the Department of Interior Fish and Wildlife Service.

Robert Stephens, regional supervisor for the division of fish hatcheries at Albuquerque, N. M., said his office plans to plant one million bass fingerlings in the reservoir May 3. The eggs will be hatched in Texas, flown to Milford in a tank-equipped plane, and dumped in the reservoir from a height of 200 feet. Backers of the project told

Stephens that 600 acres are available below Milford Dam which would be a logical place for establishment of the hatchery and aquarium.

Kansas has two federal hatcheries, one at Farlington in a strip-pit near Pittsburg, and the other at Cedar Bluff Reservoir near Hays. Each is more than 200 miles from Milford. A state hatchery is maintained at Pratt.

Milford is near the center of federal reservoirs at Tuttle Creek, Kanapolis, Council Grove, Perry and other facilities built by the Federal Reclamation Bureau.

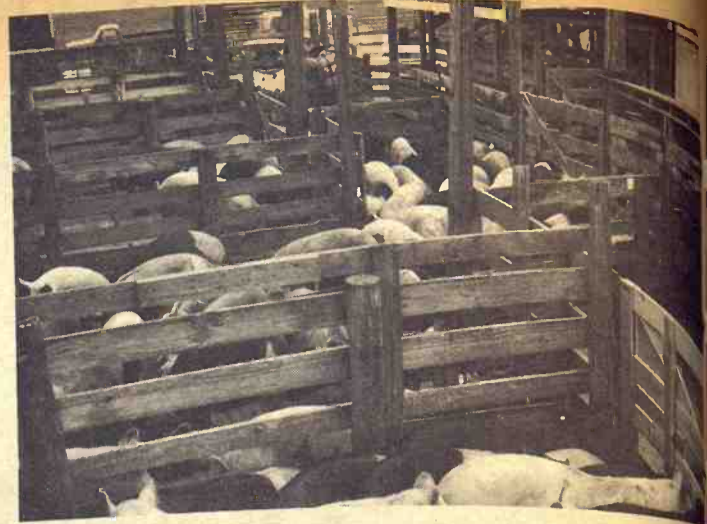
Stephens said that about 100 acres of land would be needed for the proposed hatchery with about 50 one-acre ponds.

## Farm Exports Continue To Grow

USDA reports that export markets for U.S. farm products are continuing to expand.

This year they are expected to top the 1966 calendar year total of \$6.9 billion, which exceeded the 1961-65 average by 23 percent and the 1955-59 average by 77 percent.

Commercial export sales earned \$5.3 billion, a gain of 58 percent over exports for dollars in 1960.



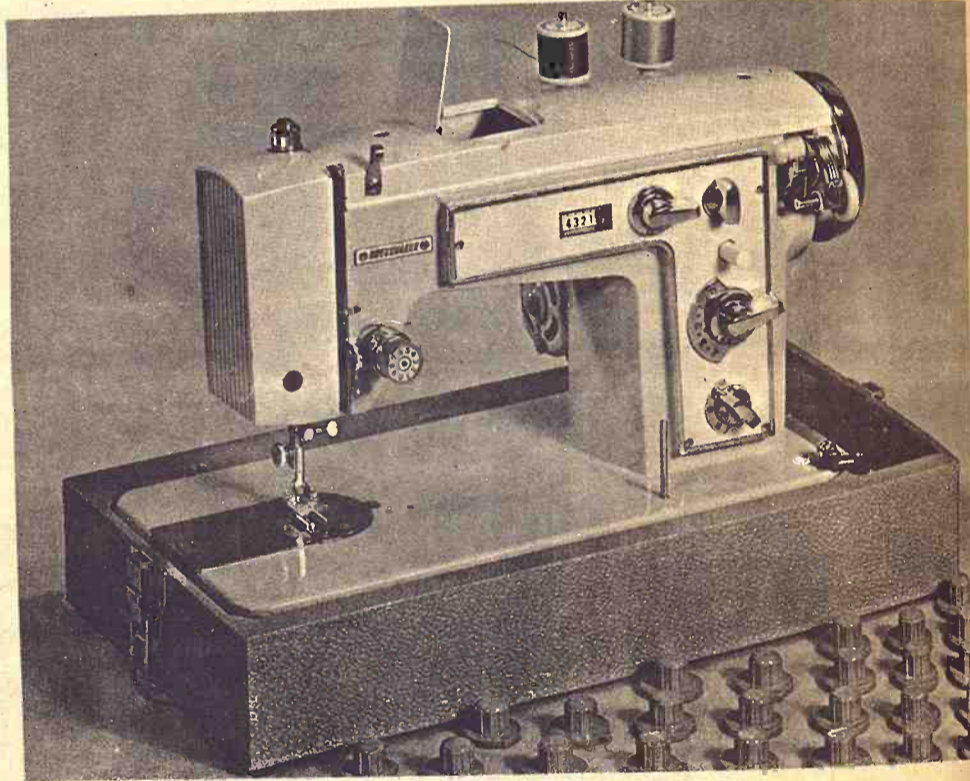
## NFO Hogs

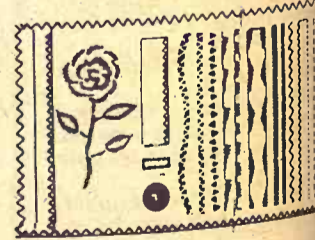

# '66 Kansas Calf Crop Was Down 4%

A calf crop of 1,677,000 head was recorded by Kansas stockmen during 1966, 4 percent less than the previous year, according to the Kansas Livestock Reporting Service.

The 1966 calf crop was 63,000 head smaller than the previous year's crop but still 6 percent

more than the 1960-64 average.

The number of calves born in 1966 expressed as a percentage of the number of cows and heifers two years old or older on January 1, 1966 was 88 percent, 4 percentage points less than a year earlier.

Since the January 1 inventory

of cows and heifers two years old and older does not include all heifers which gave birth to calves during the year and includes some cows that died or were slaughtered before calving, the calf crop as a percentage of cows and heifers two years old and older cannot be interpreted strictly as a calf

rate.

The percentage is calculated to show a trend in production over a period of time and may

fluctuate from year to year due to variation in cow slaughter and trends in breeding herd replacement.

## First Decline In Calf Crop Since 1958

The 1966 calf crop for the United States totaled 43,473,000 head compared with 43,928,000, according to the U. S. Department of Agriculture. This is the first decline in number of calves born from the previous year since 1958.

The decrease in the 1966 calf crop was the result of fewer cows and heifers two years old and older on farms Jan. 1, 1966. There were 50,420,000 cows and heifers two years old and over on farms Jan. 1, 1966, compared with 51,219,000 a year earlier.

In the north central states, nine states had smaller calf crops than a year earlier, one had the same number, and two had more calves born. Michigan, down seven percent, had the greatest percentage decrease. Nebraska and South Dakota each showed a one percent increase.

Of the eight south Atlantic states, seven had smaller calf crops and one was larger. In the south central region, four states had smaller calf crops than a year earlier, and four states showed an increase over the previous year. Texas, the largest cattle state in the nation, had a one percent increase.

In the 11 western states, six had smaller calf crops and five were larger than in 1965. Colorado with four percent more calves than a year earlier had

the greatest percentage increase. Nevada was down the most with a five percent decrease.

The 1966 calf crop was smaller in all north Atlantic states with the decline ranging from three to 10 percent below a year earlier.

The smell of scorched flesh and the sight of a red-hot branding iron may soon be as old-fashioned as the buckboard wagon on Kansas farms and ranches.

Animal husbandry researchers at Kansas State University, Manhattan, are confident that a new process called freeze-branding will some day prove to be the best method of herd identification.

Dr. Calvin Drake, professor of animal husbandry at K-State said that although it still is in the experimental stage, freeze-branding not only is arousing a great amount of interest in the state, but is being employed by some Kansas farmers. He said that K-State recently used the process on some of the college's animals but the hair has not grown enough to evaluate the results.

Freeze-branding can not be used yet as legal identification or proof of ownership. Drake says this is because no one knows yet how long a freeze brand will last and it would be rather easy to dye or paint over it. However he is sure that freeze-branding is better than ear tags or chains for individual identification of livestock.

The technique utilizes low temperature chemicals to reduce the temperature of an iron which is then applied to an animal's hide. Depigmentation of the dark hair follicles occurs and the hair grows back as white hair. Long application will cause permanent loss of hair. This would be useful for branding light colored animals.

Many advantages of freeze-branding are evident. The most important is that the process is less painful to the animal and produces no open sores. This eliminates danger of infection from flies during hot weather. There is no damage to the hide, yet the brand is permanent and easy to read. The brand can be applied at almost any age as the brand grows with the animal. In the winter the brand is not covered with long hair because the hair itself changes color.

Drake says the biggest problem is in getting the iron cold enough to do the trick. The iron can be cooled in a dry ice and 95 percent alcohol mixture. This will produce a brand temperature of about -94 degrees. Liquid nitrogen can be used, but is more expensive.

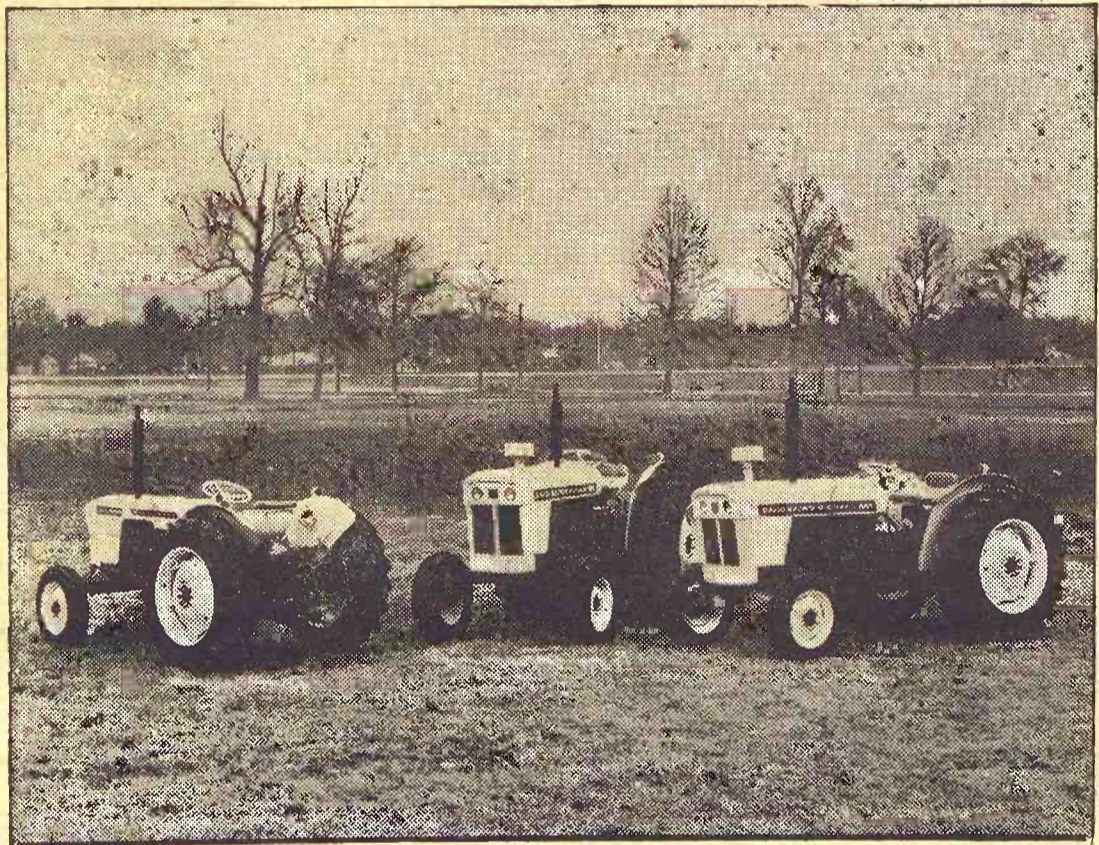
### CULVER BARN FIRE KILLS 75 HOGS

CULVER — Seventy-five hogs were killed in a barn fire near here. The barn was rented by Dave Shute from Mrs. Jessie Ireton. Mrs. Ireton had insurance on the barn, but Shute had no insurance on the animals. The farm is about five miles southwest of Culver.

The irons used should be of copper or bronze alloy. A four inch high iron is recommended for yearlings or older and a two-inch brand is used for yearlings or older and a two-inch brand is used for calves. The face of the iron should be round to get better contact with the skin for a distinct brand.

The animal should be securely restrained and the hair clipped around the area to be branded. The cold iron is then applied with a firm pressure for 15 to 20 seconds.

Pioneering work with freeze-branding began at Washington State University a few years ago. Most information on the process comes from Washington State; however, K-State researchers are hopeful that soon they can provide more information on the subject.

**Two Counties To Merge SCS Offices**

JUNCTION CITY — Consolidation of the Geary and Riley county soil conservation district offices effective June 1 for administrative purposes was announced last week.

Elmer Betz, Junction City, Geary County work unit conservationist for 22 years, will be transferred to Nemaha County where he holds a non-administrative position.

Dan Burris, Manhattan, Riley County Work Unit, conservationist, will head the new office.

Betz said there will be no reduction in the staffs. The offices in both counties will remain open.

Betz said the consolidation is one of three planned by the Soil Conservation Service during the current fiscal year. Morton and Stanton counties will be merged and another consolidation will be completed before June, Betz said.

Betz has completed 30 years of service with the SCS.

**\$10,000 For Duroc Boar**

A Duroc boar brought a record \$10,000 at the Southwestern Duroc Winter Type Conference and sale at Arkansas City recently.

The animal was purchased by Robert Johnson of Cash, Arkansas, from Fred Vandenberg, Jr., of Pampa, Texas.

The \$10,000 paid for the champion hog helped boost the sales total \$4530 above a previous record of \$72,000 at a Yorkshire sale in George several months ago.

In breaking the sales mark, 219 head of hogs went across the block, averaging \$349 a head.

Claude Massner of Caney, Kansas, paid \$1050 for the grand champion open gilt, owned by David Suttle of Moore, Okla.

**A Pilot Start At Area Factory**

SALINA — The Westinghouse plant south of here has started production in an initial testing plan. Fluorescent lamps will be produced in the pilot production in the local plant will be not initially make its own glass.

The furnace for glass production in the local plant will be started after initial production problems are ironed out. Continuous operation without shut-downs must be assured the huge furnace once glass production starts. A 2-week heat-up period is required before the glass furnaces are ready.

Construction on the plant was started in March 1966. It will employ several hundred workers when it reaches full production.

**State Livestock Values At \$808 Million**

Numbers of cattle and calves on Kansas farms and ranches January 1, 1967 totaled 5,506,000 head, down 4 percent from the all-time high set last year, but 8 percent above the 1961-65 average, according to the Kansas Livestock Reporting Service.

Hog and pig numbers, at 1,321,000 head, were up 11 percent from January 1, 1966 and 3 percent above the 5-year average.

The number of sheep and lambs declined 22 percent from a year earlier and, at 452,000 head, was the smallest number for the state in 40 years.

Chicken inventories reversed the steady decline of the past decade and increased 9 percent from a year earlier to 5,696,000 birds. Turkey numbers on farms January 1, 1967 totaled 63,000, 12 percent more than a year earlier through 20 percent below average.

The total value of all livestock and poultry in Kansas farms and ranches January 1, 1967 reached \$808,384,000, up 3 percent from last year and the second highest of record.

**CATTLE**

The number of all cattle and calves on hand January 1, 1967, at 5,506,000 head declined by 4 percent from the record number on hand a year ago.

Beef cattle numbers were 4 percent below last year while milk cows and young milk replacement stock declined by 6 percent.

Beef breeding stock were well maintained as cows 2 years old and over down 1 percent to 1,627,000 head.

Calves under 1 year declined from a year ago by 4 percent to total 2,172,000 on January 1, while steers over 1 year old dropped 15 percent from the previous year to 778,000 head.

Cows and heifers 2 years old and over kept for milk declined 7 percent during 1966 and totaled 245,000 head on January 1, the smallest number on Kansas

farms since 1875. The farm value of all cattle and calves was \$754,322,000 on January 1, 1967, an increase of 5 percent from 1966. The average value per head this year was \$137 compared with \$125 last year and the 5-year average of \$123.

**HOGS**

After 2 years of decline, numbers of all hogs and pigs on Kansas farms increased 11 percent during 1966 to 1,321,000 head on January 1, 1967.

The value of all hogs on farms January 1, 1967 was \$41,083,000, down from a year ago with the average value per head of \$31.10 compared with \$41.20 last year and the average of \$23.40.

**SHEEP**

All sheep and lambs on Kansas farms totaled 452,000 head on January 1, down sharply from a year ago.

Sheep and lambs on feed for market, either on wheat pasture or in feedlots, totaled 75,000 head, less than half the number on feed last year. Stock sheep, at 377,000 head, were 6 percent below the previous year.

**POULTRY**

The number of chickens on farms January 1, 1967, totaled 5,696,000 birds, 9 percent more than a year ago.

This increase reversed a persistent downward trend over the past 10 years that culminated in a 40-year low of 5,247,000 birds set last year.

Turkey numbers increased 12 percent from a year earlier to total 63,000 birds on January 1 this year.

Turkey breeder hens accounted for 43,000 compared with 36,000 a year ago.

Chickens on farms were evaluated at \$5,012,000, up 4 percent from last year.

Turkeys were valued at \$321,000 compared with \$297,000 last year.

**UNITED STATES**

On January 1, 1967 there were 108.5 million cattle and calves

on farms and ranches, a slightly smaller number than the revised level of 108.9 million head a year earlier. An increase of 1 percent in beef cattle was more than offset by the 5 percent decrease in dairy cattle. The number of cows and heifers 2 years old and older kept for milk decreased 5 percent to 15.2 million head — the smallest number since 1893.

The inventory of hogs and pigs on farms January 1 was 51.0 million head, and increase of 8 percent.

All sheep and lambs totaled 23.7 million head, 4 percent below the revised level of a year earlier, and the smallest inventory since records began in 1867.

The number of chickens on farms increased 9 percent to 427.6 million head on January 1, 1967 while the number of turkeys increased 6 percent to 7.3 million head.

# Farm Index Down 11 Points From A Year Ago

Prices received by Kansas farmers at mid-February were down moderately from last month and February a year ago, according to the Kansas Crop and Livestock Reporting Service.

The index of prices received for all farm products at mid-February was 234 percent of its 1910-14 base period average, down 7 points from mid-January and 11 points less than February 1966.

Most food and feed grain prices declined from a month earlier although sorghum grain was slightly higher. Prices for calves and sheep were higher while beef cattle declined slightly and hog prices remained steady.

### Meat Prices

The mid-February livestock

and livestock products index, at 298 percent, was down 6 points from a month earlier and 34 points below a year ago.

The meat animal price index, at 346 percent, was down 3 points from last month and 48 below February last year.

Hog prices, at \$18.80 per cwt., were unchanged from last month and \$8.30 below last year.

Beef cattle prices, at \$21.80 per cwt., were down 20 cents from mid-January and \$1.40 less than February 1966.

Calf prices, at \$26.00 per cwt., were up 20 cents from last month through \$1.60 less than mid-February a year ago.

Lambs averaged \$19.80 per cwt., \$1.40 below last month and well below the level of February 1966.

### Crop Prices

The crop price index, at 178 percent, was down 8 points from January but 9 points above February a year ago.

## No Need To Recruit For National Guard

TOPEKA — Kansas Army and Air National Guard units, for the first time in recent years, have no intensive recruiting programs under way. Col. J. E. Gardner, the adjutant general's administrative assistant for air, termed this a most unusual but welcome situation, as the state's military forces observed their "Muster Day."

"Muster Day," an annual event on George Washington's birthday, was initiated in the nation's early years as a time when all able-bodied men were summoned to determine if all were prepared to defend their homeland.

Since then it has been a tradition with Guard, and most generally tied closely with recruiting programs.

Col. Gardner said there are some manpower needs in specific areas of the State Guard.

Kansas has 89 Army Guard units with 8275 men on the ro-

ter, while the Air Guard has 16 units with 1504 members.

Of this number, some 4500 Army guardsmen are in the selected Army Guard reserve forces, having received and maintaining a training status that classes them as being combat ready.

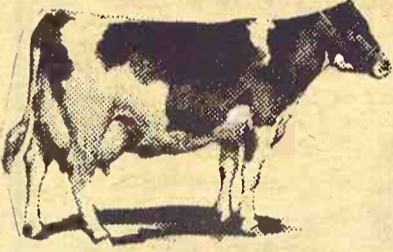

## First Lamb Crop Increase Since '61

The 1966 lamb crop was 339,000 head, an increase of 5 percent from 1965 but otherwise the smallest since 1954, according to the Kansas Livestock Reporting Service.

This was the first increase since 1961 following four years of steady decline.

The increased lamb crop was due primarily to an increase in breeding ewes on January 1, 1966, which at 353,000 head, were up 6 percent from the previous year.

The 1966 lamb crop percentage (number of lambs saved per 100 ewes one-year old and older at the beginning of the year) was 96 percent compared with 97 percent a year earlier.

The number of early lambs marketed by early summer 1966 was estimated at 176,000 or 52 percent of the total 1966 lamb crop. This was about 1 percent less than the number of early lambs in 1965.

**United States**  
The nation's 1966 lamb crop totaled 15,879,000 head, 3 percent less than the 16,312,000 head produced in 1965.

The 13 Western sheep States (11 West, South Dakota, and Texas) produced 2 percent fewer lambs than in 1965.

The lamb crop in the 35 Native sheep states (excludes 13 Western States and Alaska) was 4 percent smaller than in 1965.

In Texas, which produces nearly one-sixth of the nation's lambs, the lamb crop was 3 percent below 1965.

The lamb crop percentage (number of lambs saved per 100 ewes 1 year of age or older on farms and ranches January 1) for 1966 was 94, up 1 point from the 1965 average.

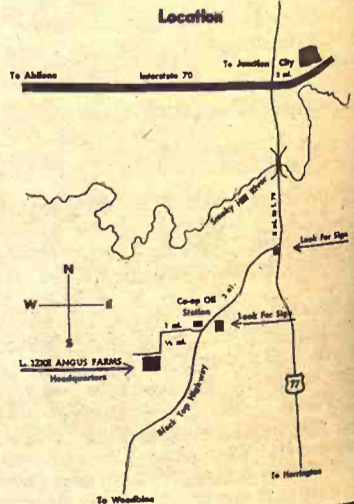

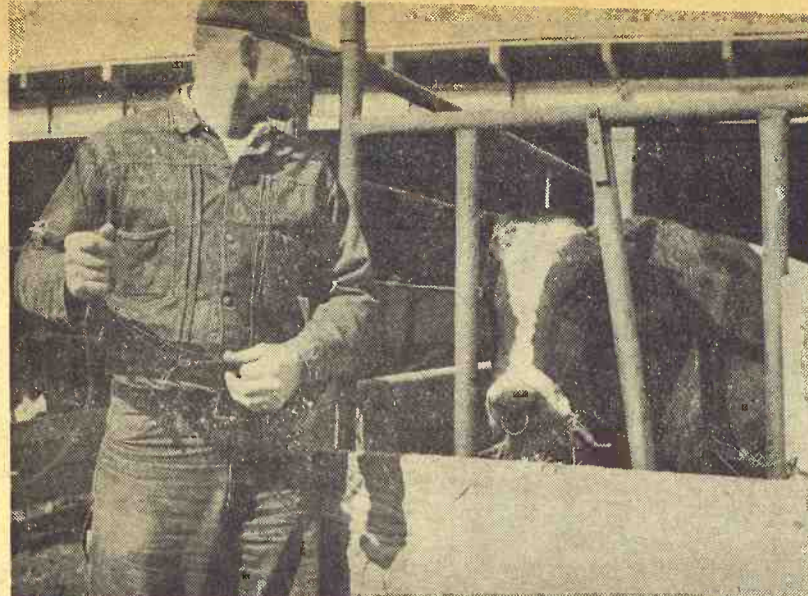

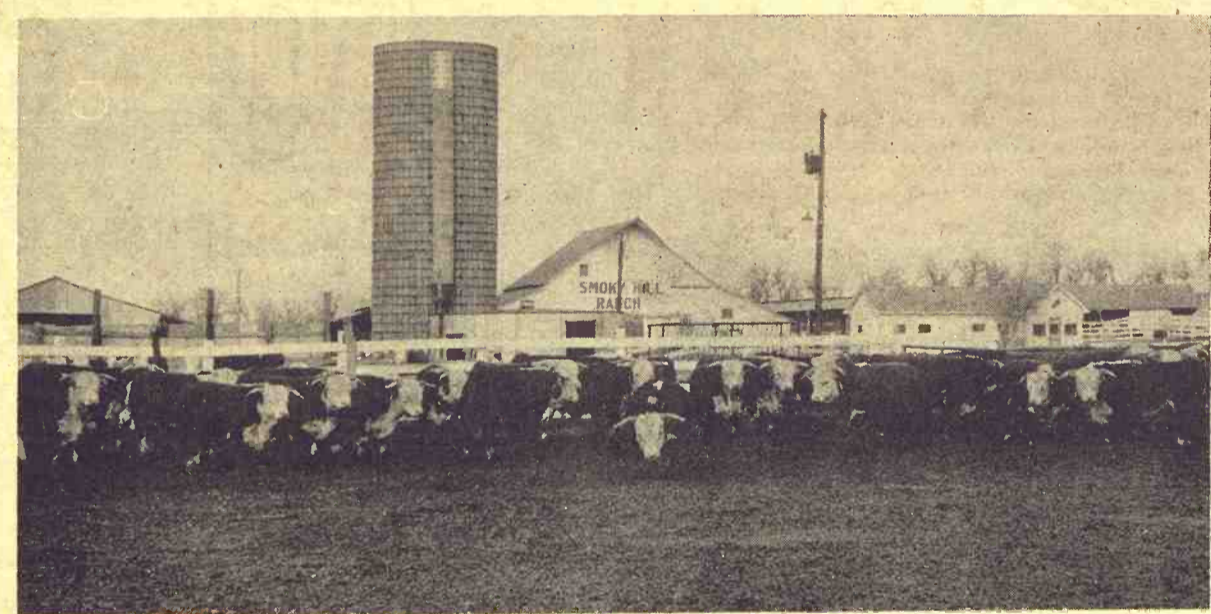

# Move For More Meat Inspection

Agriculture Department has recommended legislation which allows it to help states develop

and administer inspection programs covering meats not subject to federal inspection.

The plan calls for the federal government to pay up to 50 percent of the cost of the programs which would be administered by

the states. Only meats moving in interstate and foreign commerce now come under the department's inspection program, Meats processed and marketed within a state are not included.

# Signup Deadline Is March 17

March 17 is the deadline for filing applications to take part in either the 1967 wheat program or the feed grain program.

Several states have no meat inspection legislation. Many have only what the department called partial laws providing for inspection.

The department said only about 85 percent of the fresh meat and 75 percent of the processed meat products sold in this country now are federally

inspected. The legislation also would provide for registration and record-keeping by meat processors and related industries, such as renderers, animal food manufacturers, warehousemen and others who process, handle, transport, store or sell meat products.
