If these winds of criticism develop into hurricanes of change, as well they might, the national economy as well as international politics may feel a major upheaval.

Many billions of dollars in oilcompany earnings, foreign exchange and taxes are in the balance. In addition, the nation's defense posture and political outlook are deeply involved.

The oil industry's present situation in Washington has been brought about by a combination of real issues and circumstanc-

The real issues are:

 Depletion allowance or the right of an oilman for tax purposes to deduct 27.5 per cent of the gross income from his producing property, but not more than 50 per cent of the net income from that property. The oil industry has had this right since 1926. The depletion allowance has benefited the industry to the extent of \$1.1 billion to \$3 billion a year, depending on who makes the estimate.

AMA Switch On Brand Names On Medicines

Edmund Muskie, D-Maine, have become deeply involved because of New Eng. land's demands for a refinery in Machiasport, Maine, and the accompanying requests for foreign-trade-zone status and import quotas to feed the refinery.

For the first time in recent memory, the oil industry has few friends in Washington. The days of Speaker of the House Sam Rayburn of Texas, former President Johnson and the late Sen. Robert S. Kerr, D-Okla., are gone. A new breed that is less rural and oil oriented and more urban and consumer directed is in Congress.

The oil spill in the Santa Barbara channel and other charges of air and water pollution against the industry have not helped its image.

There are at present 15 bills before the Congress directly involving the oil industry. Most of them concern altering or eliminating the depletion allowance. GRASS

Agriculture department experts are forecasting rough weather for a long time to come in the world wheat market. Reason: Huge crops and fewer cus-

K-State Economist Calls For Free Wheat Market

DODGE CITY - A 10-year projection of the wheat overproduction problem conducted by Kansas State University indicates that the only long-range solution is a free market, not more government control.

Salient points of the projection were discussed in Dodge City by Dr. Jack Richards of Kansas State, speaking to a group of Western Kansas county agents.

Richards said the projection shows that wheat overproduction will still be with us in 1980, regardless of what farm program is adopted by the Nixon administration, and prices prohably won't be any better.

With a sharp drop in wheat exports the last year and another record harvest in the offing, supply is far exceeding demand. Richards said.

Continuation of voluntary land retirement over a 10-year period, the projection shows, would be an almost complete failure in reducing production. Acreage restrictions, Richards said, would not be much better.

Only through placing wheat upon the free market could a meaningful cut in production be accomplished, Richards said.

He explained that when the crice of wheat fell on the free market to feed-grain levels; or below, farmers would abandon wheat in favor of other crops. Production of feed grains should then increase sharply.

The projection also looked into the possibility of an export subsidy to make U.S. wheat more competitive on the world market.

"Other countries do this," Richards said. "Through use of an export subsidy, the world price need not affect domestic price."

Without a subsidy, the projection estimates 800 to 850 million bushels of total wheat export through 1980, barely more than the export of recent years.

The brightest agricultural picture foreseen by the K-State forecast is that acreage now devoted unprofitably to wheat can be used profitably to support the growing beef cattle indus-

Richards said the projection sees the Kansas beef cattle industry almost doubling between now and 1980, because it is linked so closely with the increase in national population.

The prospect is also bleak for American wheat growers. Agriculture department estimates cnvision another large crop against a drastically reduced export market. The U.S. carryever on July 1 will be about 800 million bushels. Department officials now say their original export target of 750 million bushels was far out of line. The figure for the year ending June 30 will most likely total 535 million bushels, smallest in 10 years.

The Australian picture is even darker, considering that the country is almost as large as the United States in area but with only 12 million population. Clarence E. Pike, an economic research service analyst, said in a report last week that Australia "not only is faced with the largest carryover of wheat in its history . . . but also with the prospect of another large crop in 1969-70."

The Australians produced a record 14,500,000 tons of wheat last year — around 537 million bushels - which was about onethird of U.S. output. The Australian government is considering controls on production, but officials here doubt that action if any -- will be taken before

There is little doubt that Australia - like other big exporters — will be scouring the world markets for outlets during the coming year, adding more complexities to the U.S. trade position.

The Agriculture department's May estimate of 1.1 billion bushels of winter wheat production this summer may be too low. some grain experts say privately. The estimate for Kansas, for example, was 278,500,000 bushels, but some sources in the state say a 300 million bushel crop is possible.

And the 1.1 billion bushel estimate made as of May 1 conditions does not include what spring wheat growers will turn out this year. A likely crop, officials say, would be around 298 million bushels, but the department's first spring wheat estimate won't be made until July.

Thus, it appears certain that the United States is headed for another near-record wheat year. And as exports shrink, as other competing countries such as Australia face rising supplies and as poorer nations raise more and more of their own food crops the outlook for U.S. wheat does not seem bright. If the Nixon administration's pledge to work for expanded exports does not pay off, the country could have a billion bushels of wheat surplus by mid-1970:







May and June usually bring rising prices for hogs. The highest prices for the year are gencrally in July. The July coverage usually is \$3 or \$4 higher than the April figure. The high monthly average this summer is likely to be around \$23 or \$24. Market receipts of hogs usually decrease during May and June, and reach the smallest figure of the year during the first week of July. After that, weekly receipts of hogs will increase until about November 1.

Outlook for June and July. The prospective market receipts of hogs for this summer are about 4 percent larger than last year: The USDA survey and report of hogs and pigs on farms March 1 showed such an increase in number on hand at that time.

This increase in supply may be more than matched by an increase in consumer demand for pork. Consumers have been spending freely for pork and other meats during the past year or so. Their strong spending for meats has pushed live stock prices up even though supplies were increasing. Some of the increased income received by consumers is showing up at the meat counters. Farmers think it's about time.

Prospects for August-October. Prices generally trend downward during August, September, and October. Typical declines are \$3 to \$5 over a threeor four-month period. Yet prices often drop quite suddenly, as a result of the accumulation of pork in packing-house and retail coolers as well as from increasing market receipts

The pricing and promotion of pork at retail have a strong influence on hog prices at certain times. Low prices and special promotions for pork stimulate sales and tend to raise hog prices. Conversely, high prices for pork with little advertising tend to restrict sales, and to depress the price of live hogs.

Longer-range outlook. Hog pri-

ces have been at profitable levels for 49 months — since May of 1965. There is a good prospect that they will continue at profitable levels for another 6 to 12 months.

The USDA report Hogs and Pigs, issued in March, showed that hog producers planned to have 5 percent more sows to farrow during March-May than last year, and 6 percent more during June-August than in

Most of this increase will come from a relatively few producers. Each year there are some producers who build new facilities to increase production. If only 10 percent of the producers increase their capacity by 50 percent, the total increase in pork output would be 5 per-

Fewer hogs in Illinois. Pork production is the most profitable livestock enterprise in Illi-

nois. Even so, many Illinois farmers have quit the hog business during recent years. The survey that was made on March 1 showed 2 percent fewer hogs on Illinois farms than one year before. At the same time, each of the other nine Corn Belt states showed increases, ranging from 1 percent to 11 percent. The total increase for the nine states was 5 percent.

Exporting Fewer Breeding Cattle

Exports of dairy breeding cattle in 1968 totaled 16,030 head, a decline of 12 percent from calendar 1967 and 32 per cent fewer than the record high of 23,515 in 1966, the Agriculture Depart. ment reported.

The Foreign Agricultural service said last year's decrease was mostly because of less de mand in Italy, Venezuela and Mexico.

Holsteins continued to be the favorite export breed, totaling 13,876 last year, compared with 15,967 in 1967. Brown Swiss were second, accounting for 1025 last year, and Jerseys mov. ed from fifth in 1967 to third last year with 487, Ayrshire cattle for export totaled 376 and Guernseys 255.

Mexico continued as the top customer, receiving 10,505 head followed by Canada 1102, Japan 975, Dominican Republic 804, Jamaica 601, Italy 569, Venezuela 408, Guatemala 192 and Peru 137. Other countries buying fewer than 100 head each included India, Portugal, Trinidad, Brazil, Bahamas, Costa Ri ca, Korea, Nicaraugua, Ecuador, Colombia, Honduras and West Germany.

An FAS spokesman said the estimated value of 1968 shipments was about \$7,500,000 com pared with more than \$9,000,000 in 1967.

Officials said the largest single factor for reduced exports last year was a temporary loss of the Italian market because of animal health certification prob

Pearson Gains Support For Rural Bill

Sen. James B. Pearson (R. Kans.) has won important support for his bill to provide tax incentives to business and thus

stimulate the economy in rural areas

The senator testified before the Senate finance committee and won endorsement of the objectives of the bill from the chairman. Sen. Russell Long (D. La.), and other committee members. Pearson stressed the need for providing more jobs in rural

Long told a story of the in. tense competition for a rural postmastership in his state and when he inquired into it he found the reason was not for political prestige, but it was th only job opportunity in the county. The man who lost had

to move away to get a job. Other senators agreed that finding jobs in small towns and rural areas is a most discourag ing hunt and therefore mor and more persons are forced to move to big cities. The migration then complicates problems in metropolitan centers. The objective is to reverse this trend

Sen. John Williams (R-Del. was concerned about how the bill could be administered. Pea son argued that questions o method should not get in the way of the objective of the measure — to provide for an economic balance between urban and rural growth. Williams pledged to work with Pearson in find ing solutions to the administra tive problems.

Donald Paarlberg, director of agriculture economics, gave his personal endorsement to the bill, but noted the Nixon admin istration has not yet taken position and does not expect to until next year when it considers the whole package of tax incentives. One of the problems is that such incentives result in tax loss revenues to the Trea sury that may be substantial.

William S. May, vice-presi dent of the Federal Land Bank at Wichita, and Floyd W. Smith, vice-president for agriculture at Kansas State University both supported the bill. Smith said it would be effective in encourage ing business to expand in small towns.

While acknowledging the tax loss to the Treasury, Pearson in sisted it would be temporary, in that new jobs would create in come that would generate taxe paid by individuals.

Senator Long suggested a guaranteed loan plan as an alternate means, but it was noted capital is limited in rural areas Williams was concerned, too, with the amount of incentives believing them to be excessive. The bill provides for a 15 per cent credit on machinery and equipment and 7 per cent on land and buildings, plus accelerated depreciation and deductions for training workers. Those amounts could be pared down, however.

Pearson argued that the tax features are controversial, but emphasized they are in his opin ion the best method of accomplishing the objective of providing more job opportunities in rural areas. The other senators pointed out they are for more jobs, too. The hearing will con

The higher costs dampened a hig gain in January-March cash receipts, a record 10 billion dollars, a gain of 500 million from the first quarter of last year.

Actual net farm income was up about 400 million dollars from the period in 1968, officials said, but the adjusted rate of net income for this year remained at about the 14.8 billion reported for the last quarter of 1968

Among items cited in Monday's report as gaining from a year earlier were building materials, interest and wages - all up more than 10 per cent; feeder livestock, machinery, motor vehicles and taxes -- 5 to 10 per cent higher.

The report said further increases in costs of production can be expected this year but suggested that some of the increases may be tempered by anti-inflation measures taken by the administration to help cool off the economy.

Altering Environment Like Living Off Capital



That vast and intricate machine, the environment, may grind to a halt within the lifetimes of most people now living, a noted scientist warns.

That breakdown, a Senate committee was told by Prof. Barry Commoner of Washington University in St. Louis, could come within 50 years and severe effects could start being felt in 10 years. A prompt beginning on radical measures to save the environment is necessary, he asserted, because "our very survival is at stake."

If the collapse occurs, it will not be because modern technology has failed, but because it has succeeded too well, Commoner said. Likening the environment and the people who live in it to "capital goods," he charged that "our present system of technology is not merely consuming this capital but threatening . . . to destroy it."

A leading scientific missionary on the subject of the responsibility of science to the public, Commoner was testifying in support of a proposal by Sen. Edmund S. Muskie (D-Me.) for a new Senate committee to keep tabs on the effects of technology on the environment.

Establishment of such a committee, Commoner said, "is of overriding importance to the future of the nation." Its purpose, he added, would be to try to foresee the effects of new technological advances before they are put into widespread use.

Commoner cited three examples of "cures" for environmental ills that have created worse problems than they have solved. None of these was a failure, Commoner emphasized — all worked too well, but in unforeseeable ways.

"Much of our present water pollution problem is not due to inadequate use of the present technology of sewage disposal but rather to the very success of that technology," he said.

In a modern treatment plant, crganic wastes are converted to supposedly innocuous inorganic products, but these turn out not to be innocuous at all, he continued.

"These inorganic products are themselves reconverted into organic materials by the green plants . . . in the aquatic biological system and thereby totally frustrate the initial aim of the treatment process," he said.

A second technological system cited by Commoner as having backfired is the use of nitrogen-rich inorganic fertilizers.

Use of these chemicals gives farmers a quick and cheap way to improve crop yield, but they also change the character of soil and increase the runoff of nitrogen compounds into streams and lakes.

"A third example which is, surprisingly, closely related to the previous ones is air pollution due to automotive exhaust fumes," Commoner told the senators. Smog control devices actually increase the amount of nitrogen oxides in the air, he said.

"(These) are readily converted into nitrates, which are then brought down by rain and snow to the surface waters," Com-



moner pointed out. "There they add to the growing nitrate burden . . . which . . . is an important aspect of water pollution."

Commoner quoted a study of a national academy of sciences panel on the danger of catastrophic water pollution by 1980.


"It is estimated that the oxygen demand of treated effluents (from sewage plants) will be great enough to consume the entire oxygen content of a volume of water equal to the dryweather flow of all the United States' 22 river basins," the study said.

Commoner acknowledged that his is probably a minority view but, citing the warnings of Rachel Carson in the early 1950s about the danger of insecticides, he said it is apparent that "the minority view often turns out to be right."



Wichita Backing **Away From Equus Beds**

WICHITA — Officials in Wichita have been negotiating quietly with farmers in the Equus beds area in Harvey County to relieve the city of the responsibility of maintaining the quality of water in the private wells of farmers in the

As of May 1, the city terminated its water treatment services and maintenance of treatment systems in wells used for home and stock use.

The service was initiated by the city to help placate farmers hostile about Wichita drawing large amounts of water from the Central Kansas Equus beds formation. The service has caused maintenance headache for the city and costs from \$5000 to \$8000 annually, according to John Dekker, city attorney.

Since completion of the Cheney reservoir west of Wichita in 1965, the city has been taking less and less water from its 55 wells in the Equus beds wellfield, Dekker pointed out.

"With the acceleration of irrigation in the area, it becomes more and more difficult to determine responsibility for changes in the quality of water in

the private wells," Dekker said.

"We don't want to get involved in that problem. We have treated their water out of good will over the past 10, 15 to 20 years, through farm well agreements, but we felt now it was better to make settlements to permit the farmers to handle their own problems."

Some 50 landowners in the area who had been receiving the special water treatment service each received settlement for signing a release relieving the city of the obligation of main. taining water quality in their private wells, Dekker said. The city has won more than 30 suits arising out of the water contro-

Although the city began pumping water out of the Equus beds in 1940, most of the ill feeling developed in 1951 and 1952, when the city obtained permission from the state to drill an additional 20 wells and install a pipeline to the well-

Combined with a dropping water table and drought, the situation became so tense that farmers often met pipeline crews with shotguns and ordered them off their land.

The city began a program of drilling wells for farmers and installing water softeners for farmers who experienced difficulty with the quality of their

Wichita spent about \$150,000 to drill 300 wells and treat the water, about \$20,000 to \$25,000 a year to maintain the wells, plus water treatment costs.

The city will continue to deepen the wells for farmers in the area, if the water table drops below current levels, Dekker said. Water level actually has come up, he added.

It was in 1963 that the U.S. Supreme Court ruled it did not have jurisdiction in the 11-year ccurt battle with the Equus bed farmers, the decision thereby upholding the state court, which had ruled the state's Water Act of 1945, allowing cities to draw water from the 100 square mile Equus bed area, was constitutional.



Narrower Margin Between Feeder Steers and Choice Slaughter Steers

By J. Hugh Winn Colorado State Univ. Economist

The margin has narrowed between the price of yearling feeder steers and choice slaughter steers. Yearling feeders sold 1-2 cents a pound under choice slaughter prices most of the time since mid-1967. But feeder prices went up more than slaughter prices since mid-January.

Much of the strength in feeder prices has been due to increased fed cattle prices, prospects for good grass, and general optimism regarding prices in the last half of this year.

The strong demand situation also is being reflected in the price for younger and lighter feeders as farmers and ranchers move into the market to purchase wintered calves for ther summering programs. Grass prospects are good for large areas of the country. Demand for feeders the rest of this year will be strong. A less than usual seasonal price drop can be expected in the late summer and early fall with prices likely to stay well above the 1968 level.

The 1969 beef calf crop will be larger than last year's because U.S. beef cow numbers ou Jan. 1, 1969 were 700,000 head more than a year earlier. There have been some weather problems in the northern Plains and California, which may increase death loss. But in total there will be more beef calves than last year. Cattle slaughter this year is likely to total more than in 1968, but total cattle inventories are also likely to increase by a small amount dur-

In the last 10 years, beef cow numbers have increased 10,890,-000 head in the United States. Texas had the largest increase followed by Oklahoma, Missouri, and Kansas. Other large increases in western states were in Montana, South Dakota and Nebraska. Beef cows have increased every year since 1958.

It is expected that beef cows again next year, thus providwill increase during 1969 and ing additional feeders.





World Plan For Control Of Population?

United States leaders in family planning have proposed that the United Nations take the lead in a global effort to reduce population growth through a program with an annual budget of \$100 million under a new commissioner for population.

The far-reaching proposal, which has been discussed with Secretary General Thant and the heads of the U.N. economic and social agencies, was made by a panel headed by John D. Rockefeller III, chairman of the Rockefeller Foundation and the Population Council, Inc.

The task involved, the panel's report said, is to contain the rate of growth of today's world population of 3.5 billion so that instead of reaching 7 billion people by the year 2000, as it will if present tendencies continue, the figure at the end of the 20th century will be between 5.5 and 6 billion.

The study, which was financed by a Ford Foundation grant, was issued as a national policy paper by the U.N. Association of the U.S., whose chairman is Arthur J. Goldberg, former permanent representative of the US to the UN.

The panel said that the world population crisis requires international cooperative efforts because the highest levels of population growth are in the developing countries, whose two billion people can least afford the investments required for economic development.

"This is an age when the internal stability of countries is constantly threatened by the massive disaffection or disappointment of those whose expectations have not been met." the study said.

Nebraska Gives In On Pay-As-You-Go

years, the state of Nebraska has gone into debt.

The state legislature has authorized the issuance of 30 million dollars in highway construction bonds. Never before has deficit financing been directly, deliberately approved for the operation of a Nebraska state government program.

Even the state capitol building in Lincoln was constructed on a pay-as-you-go basis. It took

Back in the 1930's Nebraskans billed themselves as the "White Spot of The Nation," the state without a sales tax, an income

tax or bonded indebtedness.

Now, when the highway bonds are issued, Nebraska will have all three.

Voters last November approved a change in the state's constitutional antidebt stance, allowing floating of highway revenue or limited obligation bonds with the approval of three-fifths of the Legislature's members.

Last week, 38 of the 49 senators gave final reading assent to the highway bonding proposal by Sen. Terry Carpenter, Scottsbluff.

The first 20 million dollars, to

be issued soon, would finance accelerated completion of Interstate highway projects in Omaha, Western Nebraska, and the South Sioux City area. A new bridge across the Missouri river is planned at Sioux City.

The remaining 10 million dol. lars, slated for issuance next year, would fill remaining holes in Interstate financing. Any funds then remaining are to be spent in hard-surfacing some of the 2000 miles of roadway on the state highway system which still isn't permanently blacktopped.

Senators anticipate that the federal government will pay 90 percent of the principal of the bonds sold for Interstate work, Payments will arrive in the next few years when more Interstate cash is released by the Nixon administration.

Rural legaslators fought the bond bill to the end. They are concerned that money from the bond issuance not used on Interstate projects might be diverted for development of a freeway-expressway system in the more populous areas of the

Behind the bonds are the assets of the state's gas tax nourished highway cash fund.

And still to come before the one house Legislature is a proposal boosting the state's gas tax from seven and one-half cents to eight and one-half cents per gallon, plus other measures raising license and registration fees.

Strictly speaking, parts of state government have been involved in deficit financing be-

The University of Nebraska and the four state colleges have, together, about 50 million dollars of outstanding debt from the sale of revenue bonds for construction of dormitories and ether student-use facilities. These revenue bonds had been considered outside the scope of the constitution's antidebt declaration. But a court suit is pending to test that assumption.



SOCIAL SECURITY BENEFITS

Throughout Kansas, federal Social Security benefits are an important segment of the economy. Listed above is each county's population as of January 1, 1968 (top figure); the number of recipients (center figure) on December 31, 1968; and the sum paid to recipients in December 1968 (figure in thousands of dollars)

Before the month of May ends, 25 million people in the United States will be receiving benefits under the Social Security pro-

Of that total, 299,391 are Kansans. Payments to Kansas recipients in December 1968 totaled \$24,706,000.

In the most recent official census for Kansas, made by the State Department of Agriculture for the period ending Jan. 1, 1968, the state's population was 2,265,170.

On that basis, the Kansas share approximates the national average - one of every eight residents receives a monthly Social Security benefit check.

A report given to Rep Garner E. Shriver, R-Kans., by Robert Finch, secretary of the Department of Health, Education and Welfare, points out that while the largest number of recipients in this program are retired workers and their dependents, almost one-fourth the nationwide total is under age 60.

Of the 299,391 total in Kansas, 48,576 are under 60.

Among Kansans, 150,501 are female and 99,314 male.

A breakdown of Sunflower State recipients by groups and the dollar amounts paid each group shows:

Retired workers, \$15,243,000: disabled workers under age 65, \$1,221,000; all other beneficiaries and survivors, \$8,242,000.

In a memo to Shriver, Secretary Finch pointed out that the "1965 amendments which extended survivors and dependent benefits to students attending school up to age 22 resulted last year (1968) in continuing benefits (across the nation) for 470,000 young people, many of whom would have been unable to continue their education without this support."

He further noted that "monthly benefits payable at the end of 1968 amounted to nearly \$2.1 billion, about \$350 million higher than at the end of 1967.

"Roughly, about three-quarters of the increased monthly amount can be attributed to the increased benefit rates authorized by the 1967 amendments to the Social Security Act, which became effective in February

"The balance of the increased monthly amount, is, of course, due to the growth in the number of beneficiaries," the secretary noted, adding that total benefit payments in 1968 were \$24.7 billion. This was an increase of \$3.5 billion over 1967.

Nationally, at the end of 1968, about 90 per cent of all persons aged 65 and over were either receiving cash benefits or would have been ligible for those benefits if they or their spouses had not been working, said Finch.

Shriver has introduced a package of three bills in the House of Representatives to increase social security benefits.



GREENBUG RESISTANT SORGHUM

Kansas State University scientists at the branch experiment station at Hays have discovered a grass-like sorghum which is resistant to greenbugs. Called KS 30, the new breeding line is being released to sorghum breeders so that greenbug resistant hybrids can be developed. Bonafide sorghum breeders can now get up to 50 seeds each, according to Dr. Floyd E. Smith, director of the Kansas Agricultural Experiment Station. KS 30 also resists greenbugs that attack wheat and other small grains and it has some resistance to corn leaf aphids. Last year, greenbugs did an estimated \$68 million of damage in the sorghum states west of the Mississippi River. The damage in Kansas, alone, was \$12 million. T. L. Harvey (left) and H. L. Hackerott, Kansas State University scientists, are shown here with two samples of the KS 30 sorghum that survived while other breeding lines were killed by greenbug attacks. W. R. Hot Dogs Grow Fat While Hogs Get Slim

The Agriculture department says hot dogs have grown fatter over the years but hogs are leaner than ever.

A department study of slaughtered hogs shows that average lard yield per carcass decreased more than 25 per cent between 1952 and 1967,

The department reported that hot dogs and other cooked sausages, however, have been gaining. A spokesman said the average fat content of sausages rose from 18.6 percent in 1930 to about 31.2 percent in 1967. leaner cuts of pork for many

Consumers have preferred years, and hog producers responded by breeding their stock along trimmed lines.

Farmers, however, do not breed hot dogs and sausages.

These are produced by meat packers, many of whom also process the leaner pork turned out by farmers.

The department is considering a proposal to limit the fat content of hot dogs to 33 percent, and will hold a public hearing on the issue June 18-20.

Farmers, however, appear to have settled the fat question for hogs on their own.

The hog survey showed that 49.9 percent of the carcasses checked in 1967 to '68 graded No. 1, the leanest and meatiest category, compared with 33.4 percent in a smillar survey in 1960 to 61.

The latest check reveiled 35.4 per cent of the hogs in No. 2, or the next best category, compared with 38.6 earlier; 11.9 percent in No. 3, compared with 25.9 percent; 2.6 percent in the fourth or "medium" grade, compared with 2 percent previously; and 0.2 percent in the lower or "cull" grade, compared to 0.1 percent in the first study.

A marked increase in the proportion of top-grade hogs among total butcher hogs marketed by U.S. farmers would present important progress in tailoring physical characteristics of hogs to consumer prefcrences.


