USDA Tuning Out 'Listening' Conferences

The Nixon administration's original plan to hold a series of six or seven "listening conferences" around the country so farm people could express themselves has 10 days later. developed a 2-month siege of ear trouble

Clifford M. Hardin, agriculture secretary headed the first one at Lincoln, Nebr., on April 12, and the second at Pullman, Wash.,

But no hearings have been held since and no more are planned until at least July, a spokesman said. "Right now it's pretty hard to say," the official said, "but he may have two more next month."

After that?

"Well, that's getting into August and it's pretty hard to say," the spokesman said.

The original plan called for regional meetings conducted at land-grant universities during which farm and other rural spokesmen would be invited to have their say. In this way, officials said, Hardin and other top administration farm leaders would have a direct line to rural mood. And, they added at the time, this would help planners when they drafted new farm legislation.

No timetable or location for the July listening conferences have been decided thus far, Hardin's office said.

Too Optimistic Of Food Output?

The head of the United States Food and Agriculture organization has warned against over optimism about the present world food situation.

He said production barely kept pace with the population increase last year. Director General A. H. Boerma called 1968 a normal year, with food production gains of 2 per cent to 3 per cent. But he added: "The question is whether 'normal' is enough.

"If we look at the estimates that the food production requirements of the developing countries are going to increase by between 3 per cent and 4 per cent per annum over the next couple of decades, I think that the answer must definitely be that it isn't."



The Kansas Crop Reporting Service says pasture conditions are the best in the state since 1949. Rating 100% as optimum condition of grass, the Service says the June 1 grassland condition is 95%, up 16 points from a year ago.

Pasture And Hay Crops

Pasture feed condition on June 1 was the best since 1949. Farmers and ranchers reported the condition at 95 per cent of normal, up 5 percentage points from a month earlier and 16 points above a year ago.

Grass made excellent growth during May and by the first of June most cattle had been moved onto pasture, with supplemental feeding deckining sharply.

Hay prospects at the first of the month were the best in more than a decade as the result of generally adequate moisture and relatively little damage from insects.

By June 1 nearly half of the first cutting of alfalfa hay was harvested compared with only a third at the same time last year. Some losses and quality deterioration resulted from rains during harvest.

Hidden Weakness In Beef Market?

There may be a hidden weakness in the present cattle market. Since ranchers and farmers have some \$18 billion tied up in cattle, they should be aware of this hazard.

Most discussions of the cattlethe relationship between the beef outlook are limited to two prices of live cattle and prices of

beef at the retail store. Many cattlemen do watch the wholesale prices of beef, comparing these with the prices of live cattle. This is a useful activity, but it's not where the big action is. The margin between the prices of cattle on the hoof and cattle on the rail is relatively small, and it changes very little from month to month.

Where the action is. The big action is in the retailing part of meat marketing. Retailing meat is a complex business. Each carcass must be cut into several hundred pieces, and each piece must be weighed, wrapped, priced, placed in the display counter, recorded on the cash register, and put into the customer's sack.

Meat departments of retail food stores usually are operated at a loss, since store managers generally price popular cuts low in order to attract customers into the store, in the hope that they will buy higher-profit items before they leave.

search has shown that there is a lag between changes in prices of live cattle and changes in prices of beef at retail. When cattle prices are going up, retail prices are seldom raised fast enough to maintain the usual wholesale-to-retail margins. For a time, meat continues to be sold at bargain prices and consumers buy freely. The retailers bid up wholesale prices in order to get supplies to keep the customers coming into their stores.

Eventually, retailers raise prices to more nearly cover their costs of operation. At some point, retail sales are checked, wholesale prices are undermined, and cattle prices begin to slip.

Again, there is a lag between the decline in cattle prices and the reduction in retail prices. Retail sales continue slow, while cattle prices slide further - until retail prices are cut enough to stimualte sales.

Summary. Some of the recent strength in cattle prices probably has been at the expense of re-

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

Schnittker made his proposals in a letter to Sen. Spessard L. Holland (D-Fla.), chairman of the agriculture appropriations subcommittee. He offered them as an amendment to the 1970 fiscal year agricultural appropriations bill.

Several farm corporations received more than 1 million dollars in farm subsidies last year. One corporation received more than 4 million dollars in 1967 and more than 3 million in 1968.

Schnittker said that in the absence of his amendment, in 1970 some 3,000 giant farms will collect 150 million dollars in subsidies

"Continuation of this farm program is indefensible at a time when government funds are urgently needed for more worthy domestic programs," he said.

Schnittker said that for the longer term, the federal payment ceiling should be no higher than \$10,000 a farm or \$5,000 a program

"The large payments under the sugar and wool programs serve no public purpose, and should be kimited," he said. "Annual savings approaching 500 million dollars should result from the lower ceiling and from including wool and sugar."

The Johnson administration and Orville L. Freeman, former secretary of agriculture, opposed any payment limitations.

Schnittker's amendment would provide that:

 Any wheat or feed-grain producer who has his 1970 government payment limited by the \$10,000 ceiling would have his minimum acreage diversion requirement reduced by the same


percentage as his payment is reduced.

 Any cotton producer who has his payments reduced by the limitation would be allowed to plant some additional cotton acreage without being subject to marketing-quota penalties. If he plants within the larger limits authorized he would receive his \$10,000 payment and all cotton produced on the farm would be eligible for price-support loans.

"Frankly, I can conceive of no greater disservice to economic progress than the imposition of price and wage controls."

Stewart S. Cort, president of the Bethelem Steel corporation, said controls "would aggravate our problems" and that they are "least effective in the areas of greatest concern, such as construction wages,"

Walter Heller and Leif Olsen, economists, also expressed opposition to wage and price controls.

"Putting on controls," said Heller, "would be like giving up the game. That's about the last resort. The penalties in distortions is enormous. Any attempt to substitute human judgment (through controls) for the cybernetic market system is a selfdefeating proposition."

Olsen, senior economist of the First National City bank of New York, commented:

"I am definitely not in favor of wage and price controls. They won't be a solution to inflation. They never have been. When a boiler has a full head of steam, you're not going to tie down the safety valve. You've got to bank the fire by monetary policy."

A different attitude was expressed by other businessmen.

The commissioners have rescinded a resolution to build a new courthouse and have hired an architect to repair the present courthouse at a cost of \$75,000.


Repair of the counthouse is to be paid for by the issuance of nofund warrants. These will be picked up by a mill levy to be paid over a period of about five years.

Plastic 'Roughage' That Lies In Cow's Stomach

There are at least two new products useful as roughage for ruminants. One is an artificial roughage called "Ruff Tabs" introduced by Farmland Industries. The other is called a roughage extender, for use in formulating feeds, called "Ruff Ade" by W. R. Grace & Co.





'Southwest' **Tornado** Notion Is Debunked

A University of Kansas researcher debunked an apparent myth which Weather Bureau scientists have been telling residents of Tornado alley for years.

Don't believe the old admonition to head for the southwest corner of the house if a twister is sighted, warned Dr. J. R. Eagleton, head of the meteorology curriculum at the university.

Heeding the advice, Eagleton said, may take you to a death trap instead of safety.

Eagleton's research started more than a year ago as a result of data gathered after a tornado struck Topeka in 1966. In the aftermath, it was found that most of the serious damage occurred in the southwest corner of homes which did not have; basements. Even in twister-notorious Kansas, a surprisingly small number of homes have basements or storm cellars, Eagleton said.

Eagleton's research took him to Ohio, Mississippi, and Florida to examine tornado damage. In these areas, as in Topeka, he found the southwest corner generally was the most dangerous.

"Most tornadoes really do come from the southwest," he said. In the past, weathermen have advised people to take shelter there, thinking that the worst of the damage would pass over quickly, leaving them safe."

Actually, his research showed,

"when people take shelter in the southwest corner of the house on the first floor, not the basement, the brunt of the impact strikes the southwest, carrying with it heavy debris."

Eagleton said that even in homes which do have basements the southwest corner is not the safest.

"If a tornado is sighted," he said, "it is the north or northeast corner of the house, either on the first floor or in the basement, that is the safest."

The U.S. Public Health service is funding research for Eagleton for a five-year period. The work includes study of the effects of wind velocities and pressures on





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

New State Law May Limit Hoofed Shipments Into Iowa

Many Iowa cattle feeders may soon experience some damaging percussions from a recently macted amendment to Iowa's animal health laws regarding he movement of female stocker and feeder cattle into the state. Concern has been expressed by some stockmen in the state that rovisions of the law may beme a discriminatory factor in he purchase of feedlot and pas-

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ture heifers from other states by Iowa feeders.

The amendment, which goes into effect on July 1, reads in part that "Female cattle of a recognized beef type over eight months of age but under 21 months may enter the state for feeding and grazing purposes under quarantine for no more than 12 months. Such cattle shall be individually identified by consec-

Pickett said hogs are not eligible for any benefits under the program and are endangering the health of Kansas herds.

Block All DDT In California

California will ban the use of DDT and DDD pesticides in the home and garden after January 1. Also prohibited will be the agricultural use of both in dust

Larry W. Fielder, agricultural director, called the pesticides "a orderly changeover in home, farm and store pesticide stocks. The difference between some pesticides and DDT or DDD is persistence. DDT and the lesser known DDD are chlorinated hydrocarbons that do not break down and dissipate readily after use

Their general use in this major farming state has dropped in the last five years. They have been on the state's "injurious materials" list since 1963, meaning they could be used in agriculture only with a permit.



"When they realize they are paying the same rates as before they'll still make the loan," he added.

age children to public school. To force them into that educational environment would violate their religious rights, hinder their religious rearing and practice and "mortally threaten" the means of survival of a venerable religious community, says a brief filed in their behalf by William B. Ball, a Harrisburg, Pa., constitutional lawyer. On the other hand, the state contends their failure to accept public school is "against the peace and dignity of the state."

The case is one of a succession that have turned up in recent years in the Midwest - in Kansas, Iowa and elsewhere, in attempting to bring Amish schooling into conformity with state patterns.

"Not only religious liberty, but deep moral issues are involved," says the Rev. Dean M. Kelley, director of civil and religious liberties for the National Council of Churches.

He noted that while older eastern state laws allow alternative private-school criteria, the school systems to the West have stressed professional uniform requirements, resulting in conflicts with Midwestern Amish communities. "They don't subscribe to soci-

ety's technological-materialistic values, which are seen as dehumanizing and contrary to the will of God," he said. "It's a lifeor-death matter to their whole way of life."

Actually, the Amish were among the founders of popular education nearly five centuries ago, insisting that all believers should be "trained in the Word," and not just the clergy.

Altogether there are about 160,000 Mennonites in the U.S. in several church bodies, with various degrees of strictness in custom.


While others have relaxed their rules on dress and transportation, the Amish stick to their old ways, wearing plain clothes, fastened with hooks and eyes instead of buttons, and use horse and buggy for travel.

They shun movies, dancing, showy possessions, drinking, competitiveness for rank and power, the pecuniary, consumer aspects of modern culture. "Be not conformed to this world but be transformed by the renewal of your mind," reads Romans 12:2. And they believe it.

The Amish maintain their own full-time schools through the eighth grade, but beyond that, sons and daughters learn farm and household skills under personal community guidance of their elders through an intensive apprenticeship.

None of the Amish has ever been arrested for a felony, nor have any ever been on public welfare. As farmers, they are highly proficient.

"They're producing better citizens than the rest of us," says Mr. Kelley. "Maybe we should try their kind of education instead of trying to make them conform to our sort of pot-smoking system."







Some Say There Is No Local Control At All Over Welfare Costs

TOPEKA - An investigation into whether mill levies raised in Kansas counties have any bearing on welfare costs has been begun by a Kansas Legislative Council committee.

The study is a move directed at considering the elimination of the mill levies to the 1970 Legislature to pay part of the cost of welfare programs in Kansas and having the state cover local government support of the programs.

Rep. Rex Borgen (R-Asherville), chairman of the legislative council public health and welfare committee, as well as chair. man of the house public health & welfare committee, questioned whether local levies serve any purpose in keeping down welfare costs.

He said the state currently picks up the local share of the cost of the program for everything above 5 mills. He pointed consider either eliminating the out that the committee ought to local property tax levy or having counties levy for the full local shares.

Sen. C. Y. Thomas (R-Mission

Hills), a member of the committee, said he was interested in retaining the mill levy if there was any indication at all that the levy was having an effect in holding down welfare costs.

"As a matter of fact," Senator Thomas said, "I think this committee ought to look into what other states or areas might be doing in the way of incentives to keep local welfare costs down." Rep. Robert Coldsnow (R-Wi-

chita), a committee member, said the recent U.S. Supreme court ruling eliminating residency requirements as a prerequisite for welfare payments virtually did away with local control over costs.

"What this ruling does is say that we can no longer determine who will receive welfare in our county," Coldsnow said. "When we have no control over that, we have very little control over the size of our local welfare load.

"Under those kinds of circumstances, the mill levy we are required to pay cannot have too much effect on the total of our welfare costs since we cannot any longer control the number

of persons to whom we are going to make payments. As far as I'm concerned, in that kind of a circumstance, we might as well eliminate mill levies."

Coldsnow also said that the elimination of residency requirements means that the welfare costs in metropolitan areas, which have traditionally had higher benefits than many rural areas, will rise because of the number of persons moving in to take advantage of those payments.

"It would seem to me that the state ought to pick up the local share instead of requiring Sedgwick County residents to levy a mill rate to pay the cost in a situation over which they have no control," Coldsnow said.

Rep. Bill Fribley (R-Crestline), chairman of the House ways and means committee and a member of the committee, said there are now some 28 counties in Kansas which are levying at or near the 5-mill maximum.

Among them he listed the three big metropolitan counties of Wyandotte, Shawnee and Sedgwick. He said the fourth of

the counties in Kansas, Johnson is levying only 2.45 mills for wel. fare.

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"Of course, you can see that the levy has been going up year. ly for the last four years," said Thomas, who is from Johnson County.

Statistics furnished by the Kan sas legislative research depart. ment to the committee showed that in 1968 the amounts levied by each of the 105 counties for welfare purposes varied from a low of 0.24 and 0.25 of a mill in Stevens and Stanton counties up to a high of 5.46 mills in Doniphan County. The amount above five mills there was required to pay advances made by the state welfare department in the previous year.

Thomas said he believed there were a growing number of Kansans who believed that there were too many persons on welfare rolls and that something needed to be done to reduce the load. He said he would like to see the committee look into al. leged abuses of the system.

The ranch is in the sand hills area of the county and is largely pasture land. It will remain on the county tax rolls, Moore said.

Sale of the ranch was handled by Doug Wildin, representing Gene Watson Land & Livestock Co., Hutchinson, Kans.

The commission is planning an extensive wildlife management program for the area, beginning with planting food plots and shelter belt areas to provide food and cover for quail, pheasants, rabbits and other wildlife, he added.

"In addition, some of the land will be leased to area residents for light grazing, which will not interfere with good game management," Moore said.

In addition to its hunting potential, the area should prove a popular spot for arrowhead col-

lecting, nature photography and bird watching, Wildin said. A strip along the northern side

of the ranch was set aside at one time by the federal government as a passageway for Quapaw and Cherokee Indians to travel from their reservations in the East to buffalo grounds in western Kansas.

The north side of the ranch also is the northern border of Osage Indian trust lands, which extended south to the Mexican border and were granted by the government under a treaty written in 1825, Wildin added.

The Kansas Forestry, Fish and Game Commission owns or leases more than 150,000 acres of land in the state which is managed for wildlife production, hunting and fishing.







traditional markets for food, feed and fiber to substitutes and synthetics.

Substitutes are products which are manufactured from agricultural raw materials. Examples are coffee whiteness, margarine and meat analogs.

Synthetics are products which use raw materials derived from non-agricultural sources. Urea, saccharin and non-cellulose fibers are examples.



A combination of economic, technical, social and institutional factors are responsible for the growth of these synthetics and substitutes, says Arlo W. Biere, Kansas State University economist.


Increases in personal disposable income have influenced the demand for agricultural products and their competitors, he explains. People with higher incomes are willing to try new products. In addition, they demand products which are more convenient and are of a high, uniform quality.

On the production side is the premium which industry and society place on technology. The result is technological advance which has made possible development of synthetic and substi-

tial shifts not only in rural-urban distribution of population, but also shifts away from jobs which require high physical exertion. Both these factors have increased the demand for synthetics.

Finally, there are the institutional factors. Government legislation is more concerned about the needs of the consumer these days, Biere says. Agriculture's political influence has declined and it is less likely that laws will be passed to protect agriculture from synthetic and substitute products.

All this means, the economist says, that the farmer and other sectors of agriculture should be that he believes the situation in- of safety regulations should be concerned about the consumer and his wants. If agricultural products do not meet his specifications, the consumer will look for a substitute.



"On federal reservoirs, for instance, we have one part of the water under the jurisdiction of the state park authority and other parts of it under the Kansas Forestry, Fish and Game Commission," Representative Coldsnow said.


"There are different regulations covering the various areas of water and yet there are no buoys or other markers to indicate to the boat operator these differences.

"It seems to me that Kansas is going to have to consider the possibility of creating a department of recreation so that these things are coordinated."

The committee is beginning a study into the need for better regulation of waterway use in Kansas from a marine safety standpoint.

Rep. Bill Fribley (R-Crestline) a member of the committee and chairman of the House Ways and Means Committee, said as far as he could see there is currently no method of enforcing operating safety on boats on many of the federal reservoirs.

"They tell me there is no one with the jurisdiction that can say how old the person must be to operate a motor boat, what kind



"I think we probably need some kind of a law to give one specific agency the authority to deal with these things."

Representative Coldsnow said a good example is the Cheney reservoir where he said some of the best water skilng surface is under the jurisdiction of the Kansas Forestry, Fish and Game commission and this automatical-, ly prohibits skiing.

"You see this big water area and it looks ideal for skiing," Representative Coldsnow said. "You get over there and you find out you are in violation of the commissin regulations, but you don't have any way to know it.

"It seems to me there ought to be some kind of marking buoys so that a boat owner can know under what conditions he is operating in specific areas."

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

"He must learn that anything that helps to sell a drug is valid even if it is supported by the crudest testimonial, while anybe suppressed, distorted and rejected because it is not absolute. ly conclusive proof.

"He must learn to word a warning statement so it will appear to be an inducement to use the drug rather than a warning of the dangers inherent in its use. He must learn, when a drug has been found too dangerous for use in this country, he can approve its use in other countries.

Asked by Nelson how physicians can be legitimately educated on the uses and dangers of prescription drugs, Console replied:

"How can legitimate education compete with the carefully contrived distortions driven home by the triphammer effect of weekly mailings, the regular visits of the detailmen (drug salesmen), the 2-page spreads and the ads that appear six times in of Netawaka. the same journal; not to mention the added inducement of a free cocktail party and the golf outing complete with three gold golf balls stamped with the name of the doctor and the company in contrasting colors?

"The average practitioner is the captive of the drug industry," Console said, and the American Medical Association is also a captive.

No More Poor

The House, in a belated reaction to last year's Poor People's campaign, has voted to bar the use of federal property in the district of Columbia for overnight camping.

The bill, aimed at preventing the establishment of an encampment similar to last year's Resurrection City, was sent to the Senate by a 327 to 51 vote. It removes from the executive branch of the government any authority to issue permits for any overnight camping in the District.

Rep. Ken Gray (D-Ill.) said Resurrection City cost the government more than 1 million dollars in direct and indirect costs. The Southern Christian Leadership conference, which sponsored the Poor People's campaign, has failed to respond to a bill for \$71,000 as its share of the costs, he said.



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

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U.S. Livestock Research Lab Opened At Clay Center, Nebr.

CLAY CENTER, Neb. — Many farm and livestock industry leaders including Secretary of Agriculture Clifford Hardin were among more than 500 people on hand here for what may well prove to be an agricultural milestone.

The occasion was the official dedication of the new U.S. Meat Animal Research Center located near Clay Center in southeastern Nebraska.

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The sprawling 35,000 acre facility is destined to become the hub for meat animal research in the United States. When fully developed, the center will house some 5000 beef cows, 4000 swine and 10,000 sheep. It will be manned by approximately 300 employees including 67 scientists.

Research conducted at the center will be aimed at a number of targets including improvement of carcass quality and cutability, increasing the reproductive ability of meat animals, upping feed efficiency and lowering the cost of meat production. Gains in any one of these areas could mean billions of dollars more for agriculture each year.

Site of the research center is the former Hastings Naval Ammunition Depot which was purchased through congressional appropriation in 1966. The facility is currently in the first of a twophased construction program

which initially involves construction of an office-laboratory building and several livestock units. This first phase is scheduled for completion in 1970.

Later construction will include facilities for livestock engineering research, facilities for meats research and animal and service buildings. A completion date for phase II construction was not announced.

Research at the center will be conducted by the USDA in cooperation with the University of Nebraska and other land grant university experiment stations. Initially, research will deal with three areas — animal husbandry, agricultural engineering and

market quality.

Hardin noted that researchers foresee the day when livestock men will produce two calves per cow, 20 to 25 pigs per sow and three to four lambs per ewe each year. But it will take research to reach these goals.

Concerning the potential return from research in only one of these areas, carcass merit, he added that "if we could achieve an increase of just 5 per cent in the proportion of beef, pork and lamb carcasses which have the tenderness and flavor of higher priced cuts, the enhanced value of livestock would exceed a half billion dollars annually."

USDA Hiring Veterinarians

The Agriculture department is hiring about 30 veterinarians and 20 inspectors to fill gaps in the government's meat inspection program.

Dr. Robert K. Somers, deputy administrator for consumer protection, said, however, that more will be needed soon to meet the expansion of more plants coming under the federal program.

Somers said in an interview that the 50 new veterinarians and inspectors actually will be replacements for those who have resigned recently and that they will provide little net gain, if any. The department employs more than 1,300 veterinarians who supervise around 6,000 inspectors in the federal meat and poultry inspection program at more than 3,000 plants. The employment picture has been complicated by an economy move last year in Congress directing agencies to roll back payrolls to 1966 levels.

The Agriculture department has been operating under a formula allowing only one replacement to be hired for every two persons who quit.

But, officials said, agencies within the department have juggled the formula to give priority to hiring of meat inspectors and veterinarians in an effort to meet the rising demand.
