On Farm Hog Testing

G&G area hog producers are apparently becoming fast convinced of an on-farm testing program from Kansas State Extension which identifies superior sires.

Willard Olson, a specialist in live animal evaluations, has been heading the program, and he's shown here administering tests, taking readings, and scanning results with Wendell Moyer, longtime K-State hog specialist.

The tests determine a pig's ability to grow fast, to grow mostly lean meat, and his ability to grow lean meat that will grade into prime commercial cuts.

Pork Producers Extolling On-Farm Testing

Progressive minded Kansas swine producers are making rapid strides toward producing trimmer, more economical pork for consumers.

One of the ways they are making such progress is by identifying superior herd sires to use in their breeding programs.

The On-Farm Testing Program of the Kansas Extension Service at Kansas State University offers a scientific means of identifying these superior sires. It is rapidly gaining popularity among the state's purebred swine producers.

Willard Olson, Extension specialist in live animal evaluations at KSU, is heading the program.

Swine producers wishing to have young male and female pigs (weighing approximately 220 pounds) evaluated contact Olson through their local county Extension

agents. Olson then schedules to bring his scientific instruments to the farm.

The pigs are tested for three traits which are economically important for both farmers and pork consumers. These are: (1) days required to reach 220 pounds—an indication of the pig's capability of growing fast; (2) backfat thickness—an indication of its ability to add pounds of desirable lean meat instead of undesirable fat, and (3) loin-eye area—an indication of the pig's total lean meat content and its amount of prime commercial pork cuts.

Birth records and a set of portable scales are used to determine days required to reach 220 pounds.

Backfat thickness and loin-eye area are measured with a machine called an An-Scan. The machine

bounces ultrasonic waves from bone and fat. A camera records the bouncing pattern and reveals backfat thickness and loin-eye area to a skilled technician like Olson.

A recent on-farm testing report released by Olson summarizes information from 255 pigs on 11 farms. It shows how closely the average pigs in the program are measuring up to the "recommended" levels for backfat thickness, loin-eye area, and days to 220 pounds.

Wendell Moyer, Extension swine specialist at KSU, says hog farmers should try to buy sires that have not more than .75 inch of backfat at 220 pounds, that have at least 5.5 square-inches of loin-eye area at that weight, and reach 220 pounds in 150 days.

Information on 226 young male

pigs summarized in Olson's report shows that the average backfat thickness was .81 inch; the average loin-eye area was 5.33 square-inches, and average time to 220 pounds was 166.5 days.

"When the average for that many pigs comes so close to the recommended levels, then many individual pigs meet or exceed these levels," Olson notes.

Olson says he expects continued improvement in Kansas pork through on-farm testing because "the traits that we measure are passed along readily from sire to offspring. As more good boars are identified and infused into average Kansas swine herds, the state's overall pork quality just has to rise."

Federal Boost In Cholera Indemnity

The Agriculture Department has published new regulations allowing a boost in federal indemnity payments to farmers whose swine must be killed under hog cholera eradication programs.

At present the federal government shares equally with the states the costs of paying hog cholera indemnities. The new rules will allow the federal payment to cover 90 per cent of the costs in 23 states where hog cholera technically does not exist.

The payments, however, would be made if future outbreaks occurred and swine herds had to be destroyed.

In 22 other states in "phase four" of the eradication program, the disease is not known to exist but they still are not considered "hog cholera free" yet. In those states the federal share will be boosted to 75 per cent.

The 50-50 cost sharing will be continued in five states still in the third or "stamping out" phase of eradication.

62 PERCENT OF ABORTIONS TO NON-KANSANS

Women from outside the state had 62 percent of the abortions performed in Kansas hospitals in the past year. There were 8540 legal abortions performed, about 3200 to Kansas women. All but a few of the others involved women from Missouri Illinois, Iowa and Oklahoma.

Delay Again On Octane Ratings

Gasoline refiners and marketers have won an indefinite delay in the formulation of a federal regulation requiring octane ratings to be posted on pumps in gasoline stations. The delay resulted from the Federal Trade Commission's decision, at the industry's urging, to reconsider a key provision of a regulation that it issued last December. The provision called for posting that is called the "research" octane number. This number, determined by standard laboratory tests, is the most widely used standard of the antiknock quality of gasoline.

The commission is proposing to substitute another less familiar type of octane number in the belief that it would more accurately measure antiknock quality. In an announcement, the commission invited public comments on the proposed change, setting a 30-day deadline for submission of written statements. At the same time it postponed "indefinitely" the effective date, which earlier had been moved from June 28 to Sept. 1. Despite the new delay, officials said the commission was still determined to put the regulation into effect, possibly early next year.

The outlook is clouded, however, by a pending lawsuit in which 34 refiners and two trade associations are seeking an injunction against the regulation in the federal district court here. The plaintiffs are challenging the commission's authority to issue the regulation as well as the validity of research octane numbers in rating gasoline quality.

It was on April 13, two weeks after the suit had been filed, that the commission changed the regulation's effective date from June 28 to Sept. 1.

The commission cited recent changes in the design of automobile engines to allow the use of low-octane gasoline. New gasoline containing little or no lead, the additive that increases octane quality but contributes to the air pollution from engine exhausts, has

consequently been marketed. The commission said these developments "may warrant reconsideration of the use of the research method of measuring octane value." Data filed with the commission by industry experts supported that view.

In some instances, especially with low-or nonleaded gasoline, data submitted by Texaco, Inc., and others indicated that engine knocking was worse when some brands having higher research octane numbers than other brands were used.

Another designation called a "motor" octane number was said to provide a more reliable measure of the antiknock quality of low-lead gasoline.

Both numbers are determined by standard laboratory tests of a one-cylinder engine. The engine is run at a higher temperature and speed in the motor octane test. The motor octane number is usually 6 to 10 units lower than the research number.

Regardless of which test is used, the number is based on an arbitrary scale on which the pure hydrocarbon N heptane is assigned a zero rating and the pure hydrocarbon iso-octane is given a rating of 100.

As a rule, the higher the octane number of either type, the greater the gasoline's antiknock quality. But to allow for exceptions to that rule,

the commission is now proposing the posting of a number representing the average of a gasoline's research and motor octane numbers.

If the regulation is issued in its newly revised form, this "averaged laboratory octane number" will provide a more accurate if unfamiliar benchmark of antiknock quality, according to industry experts.

Their position is supported by a commission consultant, Dr. Scott Samuelson, professor of mechanical engineering at the University of California at Irvine. Samuelson has submitted a report holding research octane numbers "not adequate as a benchmark."

But consumer advocates are likely to contest the revised regulation on the ground that it would unnecessarily confuse motorists. Consumer spokesmen have contended in testimony before the commission that posting the familiar research octane number, though not always an accurate benchmark, would be a valuable aid to motorists in choosing gasoline with sufficient but not superfluous antiknock characteristics for their respective cars.

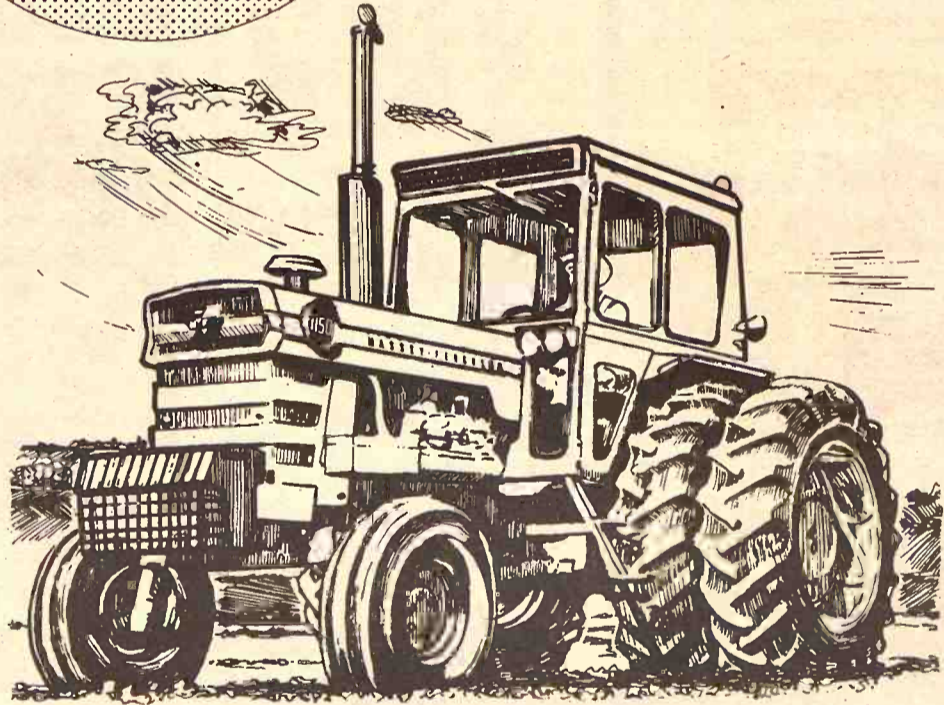

Approve Flight Reduction To Cut Empty Seats

The Civil Aeronautics Board has given three airlines permission to curtail service to major points on the East and West Coasts and Chicago for one year in an effort to reduce the number of empty seats on flights between the cities involved.

The CAB said the cutback was agreed upon by American, Trans World and United Airlines.

The largest reduction, 38 per cent, will be in the number of flights between New York—Newark and San Francisco.

Other reductions would affect flights between New York—Newark and Los Angeles, Chicago and San Francisco, and Washington—Baltimore and Los Angeles.

The CAB said flights between the affected cities have run only 26 to 36 per cent of capacity. The airlines hope the reductions will raise passenger levels to 52.5 per cent of capacity, the CAB said.

The biggest cutbacks will run from Oct. 1, 1971, through May 31, 1972, when some flights will be restored, the CAB said.

All flights will be restored Sept. 16, 1972, unless the agreement is renewed the CAB said.

Effect On Inflation May Tell Freeze's Role To Farmer

What will be the effects on agriculture of President Nixon's price-wage-rents freeze?

That was the question asked by many farmers after the bold move by the White House in putting a ceiling on non-agricultural prices and wages for a 90-day period.

Farm leaders generally were optimistic that it would benefit agriculture where raw agricultural products were not subject to the freeze.

Washington officials assured farmers of its many benefits.

"American farmers stand to benefit from the actions announced by the President to combat inflation, spur the competitiveness of the U.S. economy and to improve our foreign trade and monetary position," Secretary of Agriculture Clifford M. Hardin said.

"Farmers will benefit by the

actions taken to fight inflation. The cost-price squeeze is the No. 1 problem facing the American farmer," he added.

In Washington, Asst. Deputy Administrator Charles Cox said it would put a ceiling on processed products and this automatically would tend to put a ceiling on what a farmer would receive.

"No one suffers from inflation like the farmer does... a curb on inflation should be especially beneficial to him," Cox added.

"Farmers are protected by price support loans and wheat certificate payments. We've heard nothing but compliments as far as agriculture is concerned," he added.

"All indications are that there is some stimulation to various parts of the economy and this has to be good for agriculture," said Associated Professor Wilton B. Thomas, KSU

farm management extension economist.

"Livestock commodities are not affected directly, but indirectly they are," he added.

"At the retail level, meat has a ceiling. This has to have some effect on livestock prices," Thomas explained.

The KSU Ag economist said beef cattle prices will fluctuate some, but "if we don't have too big a supply, prices will stay at current levels in months right ahead."

Thomas said hogs selling under ceiling prices and the hog market is in a position to react. "If we can get some reduction in the marketing in the next 90 days, we think that the hog market has some leeway to respond favorably to reduction in marketing. Hogs could go up."

"But cattle are selling generally at what the ceiling would figure out to be," Thomas said.

"Lambs are in the same ball game as cattle and are near the ceiling at the present," he added.

Hogs are coming into the seasonal low and should sell around \$19, but we are expecting better hog prices at the turn of the year, Thomas said.

American beef cattle producers are not effected by President Nixon's price-fixing order, assured Secretary of the Treasurer John Connally before the American International Charolais meeting.

Nation-wide agricultural organizations commented favorable. "Agriculture has carried the brunt of inflation and seems to be relieved that specific action has been taken to

halt the cost-price squeeze," said a spokesman for the National Association of Wheat Growers. "Final judgment will be based on success of the policies designed to suffocate inflation and the effect of such action on agricultural exports."

"Prices cannot be frozen below levels prevailing on May 25, 1970 under the price and wage freeze," said Don F. Magdanz of National Livestock Feeders Association.

Magdanz called it "heartening news to the swine industry caught in a low price bind."

"Products whose prices have declined since May 25, 1970, cannot be frozen below the price level which prevailed on that date last year," he added.

"Although the price freeze does not apply directly to live hog prices, they are indirectly affected by the application of the ceiling to carcass and processed pork prices," he added.

"The American farmer stands to gain from the shift in the administration's economic policies," said John W. Scott, master of the National Grange, Washington.

"Farmers have been victims of inflation... The President's program, if given an opportunity to work, will halt inflation and farmers can look ahead to brighter days," the grange leader said.

In a congratulatory letter to President Nixon, the national grange master expressed appreciation for the "bold display of national leadership." He predicted other decisions would act as a catalyst in further improving exports of U.S. farm commodities.

Great Plains Wheat hopes the freeze will help settle a dock strike on the west coast that has held up exports of farm products.

Step Toward New School For Bennington Area

BENNINGTON—The Twin Falls schools board of education has taken the first step toward establishing a combined junior-senior high school.

The board has applied to the Kansas School Fund commission for permission to schedule a public election on the proposal.

State law requires the approval of the commission before a vote is held on bonds in excess of 7 percent of the valuation of the school district.

The amount of bonds sought for the project is \$1,650,000.

The proposal, which has been under consideration more than a year, calls for a new junior-senior high school, centrally located to serve all district students in grades 7-12.

There are 2 high schools in Bennington and Tescott—presently in operation in the district. Both are 4-year schools, serving grades 9-12. Two of the 3 schools in the district are serving students through the 8th grade. Total enrollment for the 5 schools in the district is 525.

Members of the board and administrative staff will appear before the commission in Topeka Sept. 14. The election permission is granted will be Oct. 5. Public meetings will be scheduled in each attendance center prior to the vote.

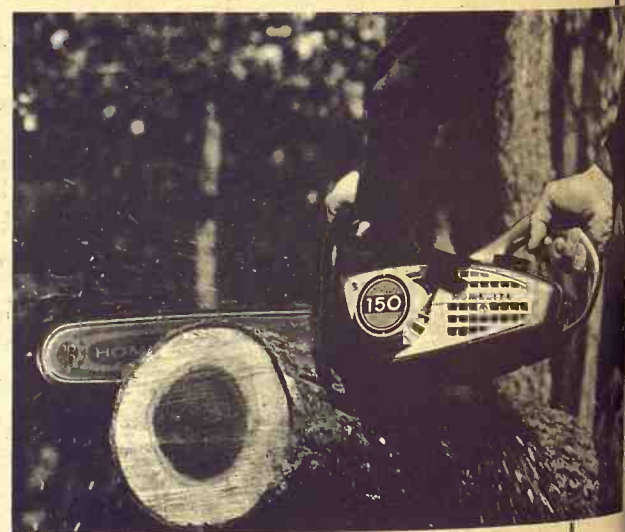

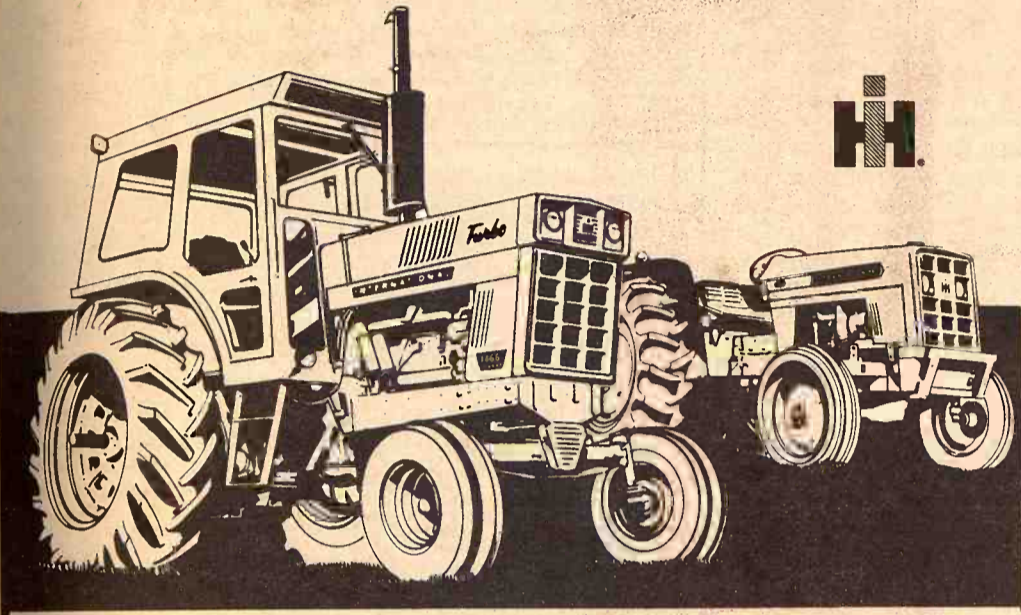

Women's Rights Show In Policy, Coverage

New attitudes about morals and the fight against sex discrimination have brought about some interesting changes in insurance coverage and in laws dealing with women employees.

Many insurance companies, for example, have been quietly amending hospital and medical coverage to keep up with today's moralities. More and more plans provide for payments covering abortions and similar medical treatment for the unmarried woman, including babies born out of wedlock.

The Greater New York Blue Cross and Blue Shield also has liberalized its coverage to include the unmarried woman, providing she was at one time a member of a group-type plan. The company says premiums have not been raised as a result. Since New York's liberalized law was enacted about a year ago, there have been about 20,000 abortions covered by Blue Cross-Blue Shield out of 165,000 in the New York area. The money paid out amounts to less than 1 per cent of the \$500 million premium income. New York state employees do not now receive abortion benefits.

Maternity-benefit "house" rules may soon be under challenge. Many companies require that women give up jobs when they have babies, often insisting that they quit work several months before confinement.

A recent court decision in Texas may upset such practices. In a Texas lawsuit *Schattman vs. Texas Employment Commission*, the United District court ruled that a pregnant woman's rights were violated under the Civil Rights Act of 1964 when she was forced to leave her employment two months before the birth of her child. It awarded her damages of \$1,103 plus interest, to cover back pay, sick leave, vacation pay and \$500 in attorney's fees.

The court noted: "Women are terminated not because of their unwillingness to continue work, their poor performance, or their need for personal medical safety, but because of a condition attendant to their sex."

If the employer—in this instance a state agency—had been able to show that her safety or efficient performance of the job was in doubt, then it might have had a stronger

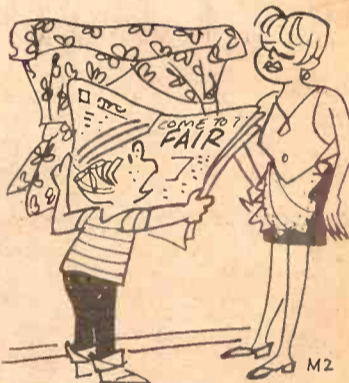
case.

Under the liberalized morals of today would such a ruling apply also for unmarried mothers whom an employer might want to discharge because of the embarrassment involved? Another unsettled question: How much time for maternity leave can a company require a mother to take without being considered discriminatory?

A recent decision by the Equal Employment Opportunity Commission has interesting ramifications for companies and their employees. It ruled that companies cannot apply "different standards to female employees and the wives of their male employees." The case involved an employer's group insurance plan that provided maternity coverage for the wife of a male worker "immediately," while female employees were not entitled to maternity benefits until they have completed two years of service.

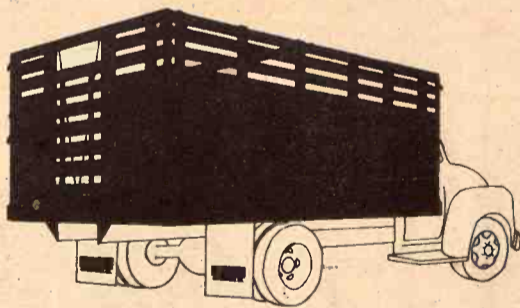
In one area, the rules have not changed thus far. The Internal Revenue Service will not permit young couples living together as man and wife to file joint income tax returns, which often are a tax saver. Milton J. Wilpon, president of Taxtronics, a tax preparation service for business, wants reform in this area. He points out an anomaly—children of unwed parents can qualify as dependents and yet the parents themselves cannot file joint returns.

Winner is Miss Juliana L. Ewald, 427 West 14th, Hutchinson: PENNSYLVANIA DUTCH PLUM CAKE

- 1/4 cup shortening
- 3/4 cup sugar
- 1 cup flour
- 1/4 cup milk
- Pinch of salt
- 2 eggs
- 2 tablespoons melted butter
- 1 teaspoon baking powder
- 1/2 cup chopped nuts
- 1/4 cup sugar
- 1/2 teaspoon cinnamon
- 2 pounds blue plums (approximately 20)
- 1 teaspoon vanilla

Cream 3/4 cup sugar and shortening, add unbeaten eggs, one at a time. Add milk, then flour sifted with baking powder and salt; add vanilla. Spread dough evenly with spatula on a large, well greased shallow cooking sheet. .15 x 10-inches. Wash plums and cut in half along sides; remove stones and lay fruit cut side up in rows on the dough. Mix nuts, remaining sugar and cinnamon; sprinkle over fruit, brush melted butter on top of cake. Bake 30 min. at 350 degrees. Test by puncturing dough, not fruit. Cool cake and cut into four-inch squares. Peaches or tart apples may be used instead of plums.

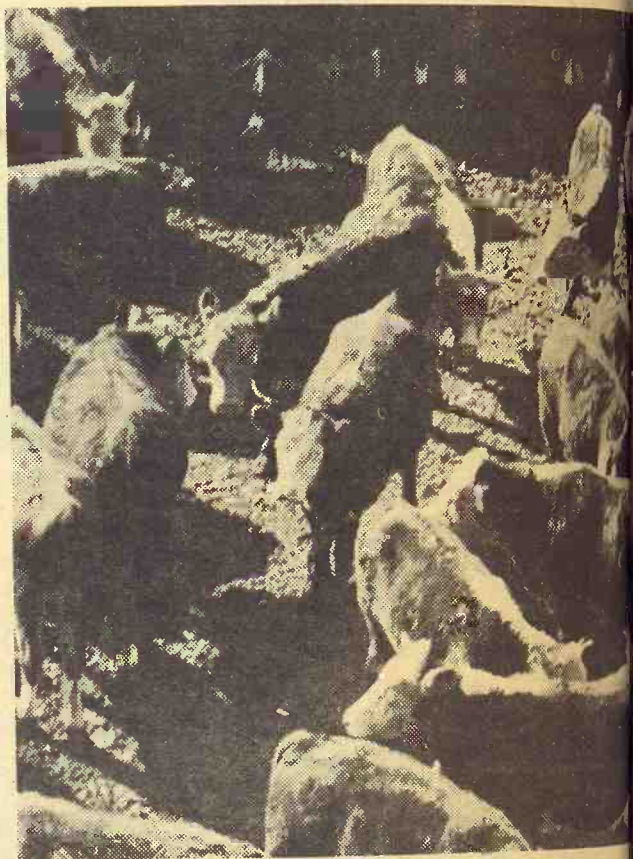

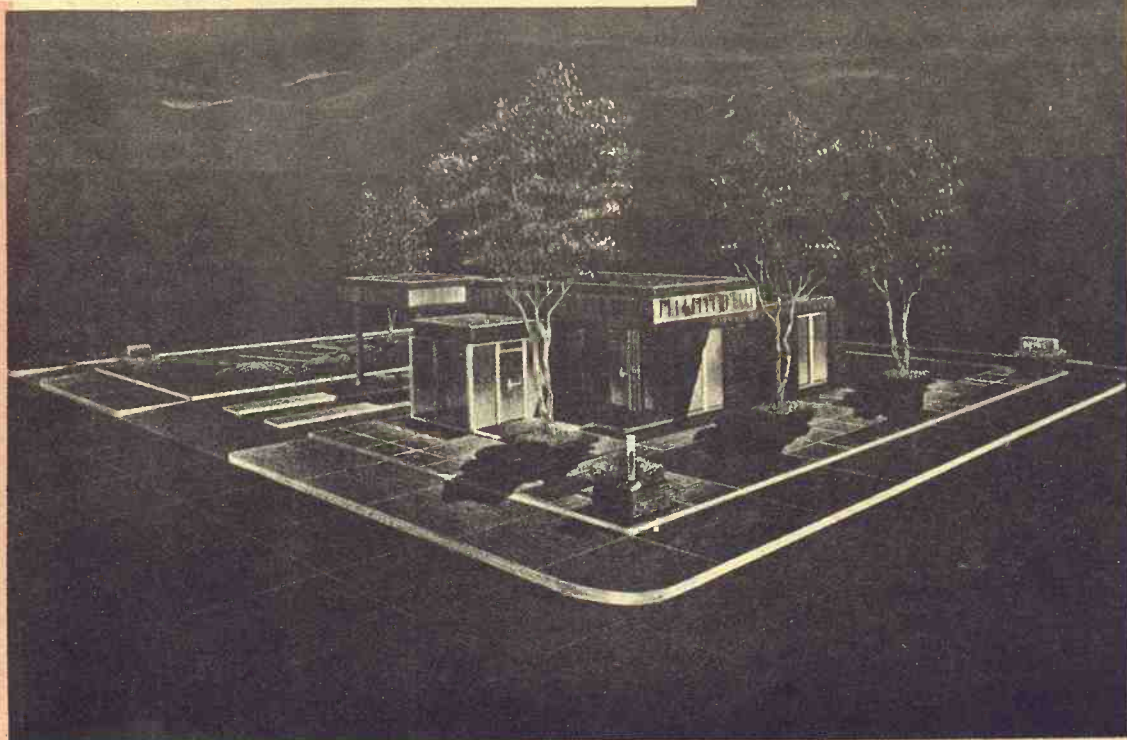
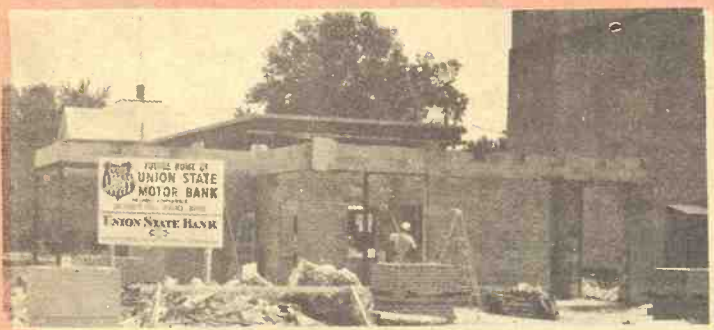

Remodeling Attic Can Provide Needed Space

The most salvageable treasure in your attic may be space. Behind the disorganized clutter and catch-all storage of many attics is a potential bedroom, study, playroom or den. Well-planned remodeling can give you this extra room now and increase your home's resale value.

Whatever the type of attic conversion, basic requirements remain the same—sufficient head room, windows, attic access and heating and cooling.

Ideally, there should be about seven feet of stand-up space from the finished floor to the finished ceiling. Sloping roofs can reduce this height; if there is enough central space and headroom, the low areas under the eaves can be used for storage. If central space is minimal, dormers can provide maximum use of existing floor space and allow for additional light and air.

Good light and ventilation are

essential. The windows should admit as much natural light as possible, provide maximum ventilation, be easy to reach and operate and blend with the home's decor.

Because of attic height, windows that require little or no exterior maintenance are most practical. The vinyl-clad units available in a full style line do not require painting and come with welded insulation glass which eliminates the need for a storm sash.

When remodeling, provide full insulation in walls and ceiling. See that the areas behind the insulation are adequately ventilated to prevent condensation. The main heating system can often be extended to the attic through ducts or radiators. If this is impractical a separate electric heat system can be used.

To create a feeling of space, build closets head high.

Clothespins Pull Curtains Straight

Curtains made of miracle fabrics require practically no ironing. If the side hems pucker, clamp a couple of spring clothespins on the bottom of the side hems while they are still quite damp and the weight will pull the curtains straight.

Holds Mended Item

A piece of modeling clay or florist's clay, wrapped around a mended object to hold it in place until the glue dries, is then easily peeled off.

Removes Decals

Use tepid vinegar to remove decals from any surface.

Cake Topping

Add a teaspoon of cocoa, 2 teaspoons of sugar and a few drops

of vanilla to ¼ cup of heavy cream. Beat with a rotary beater until just thick. Serve on slices of sponge cake.

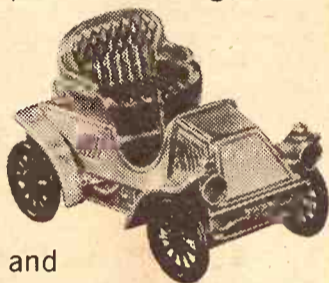

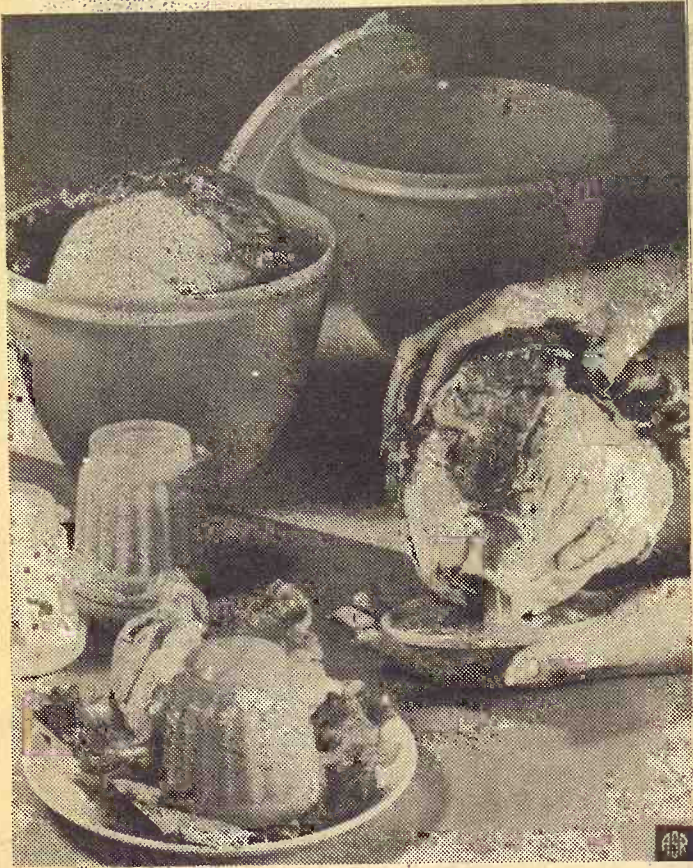

Serve Orange Sherbet Salad For Gala Parties



Orange Sherbet Salad, fashioned of orange and lemon gelatin, actually contains tingling orange sherbet. No wonder it's cooling and delectable as a go-along with summer meals. Whether it's a light repast served in the dining room or an outdoor patio party, the main course needs just such a salad to help tempt summer appetites.

To insure freshness (and help the cook stay cool), summer salads should be prepared early in the day, even the day before the party and refrigerated.

ORANGE SHERBET SALAD

- 1 package (3 ounces) orange flavored gelatin
- 1 package (3 ounces) lemon flavored gelatin
- 2 cups boiling water
- 1 can (11 ounces) mandarin orange segments
- Water
- 1 pint orange sherbet
- Salad greens

Dissolve orange and lemon gelatins in boiling water. Drain mandarin orange segments; pour syrup into measuring cup and add cold water as needed to make $\frac{3}{4}$ cup liquid. Stir liquid into gelatin. Chill until cold.

Beat in sherbet and fold in orange segments. Pour into individual salad molds. Refrigerate until set. Unmold onto crisp salad greens. Yield: About eight servings.

To Wrap Hams, Turkeys

Seal two or three pieces of waxed paper together with a hot iron and it will give you an extra large piece of paper for wrapping such bulky items as turkeys and hams.

Flour Cutter Before Each Use

Be sure to flour the biscuit cutter each time you use it. And don't twist

the cutter if you want your biscuits to look their best. Use the cutter "straight on" and pull it straight up when you remove it.

Sew Snaps On Towels

To solve the problem of keeping hand towels off the floor, sew dot snappers on the opposite ends of the towels. When you hang a fresh towel, just snap it over the towel bar.

Dries Pockets

When you hang a raincoat to dry after laundering, stuff the pockets with tissue paper. This will hold them open so that the inside corners can dry out.

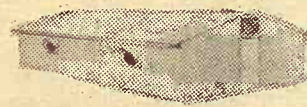
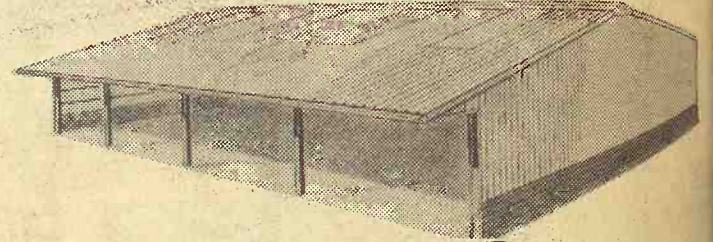

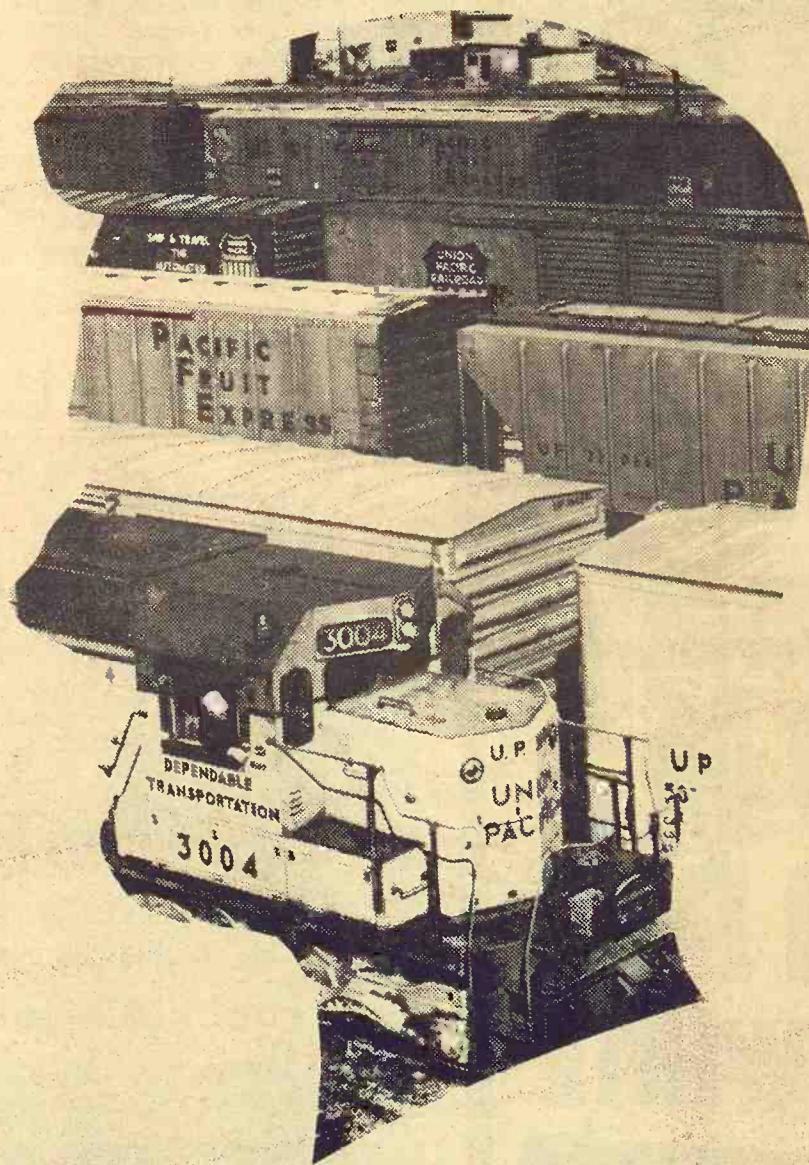

Harvey County Honors At Junior Dairy Show

SALINA—Young Riley county dairymen were denied permanent possession of the coveted T. Hobart McVay traveling trophy for at least another year, as Harvey county's 5-year herd walked away with top honors at the Kansas All-Breeds Junior Dairy Show.

The show, largest of its kind in the state, was organized in 1966. The 1971 show attracted 190 young 4H and FFA members from 40 Kansas counties, exhibiting 283 top-grade dairy cattle. All figures represent records for the event, growing yearly in popularity among Kansas dairymen.

Competition was held in 8 age classes for 6 dairy cattle breeds: Ayrshire, Brown Swiss, Guernsey, Holstein, Jersey and Milking Shorthorn. Fitting and Showing contests in each breed determined the top groomers and handlers at the

show. But the county herd contest, waged for a year's possession of the mammoth McVay trophy, is the highlight of the annual event. Riley county cows had won the contest in 1968 and 1970; a 3rd win would retire the trophy and give young Manhattan area dairymen permanent possession.

But hard-working Harvey county youth snatched the trophy this year on the strength of a county herd that included 2 breed champions. They were a 3-year old Ayrshire shown by Lynn Schmidt, Newton, and a 2-year old Guernsey, shown by Karla Allen, Halstead. The McVay trophy will now reside in Harvey county until the 1972 show.

Individual breed honors in the Holstein division went to Donnie DeWerff, Ellinwood, showing an aged cow for Grand Champion.

David Kettler, Paola, took reserve with another aged cow.

Lynn Schmidt's top Ayrshire was dogged closely by the reserve champion, a 4-year-old cow shown by Margie Barrager, Oswego.

Christine Enns, Hillsboro, showed the reserve champion Guernsey, an aged cow. She was second to Karla Allen's champion.

Kelly Thiessen, Conway, exhibited the Grand Champion Milking Shorthorn, a 2-year old; reserve was taken by an aged cow shown by Patricia Lisenby, Burrton.

The Grand Champion Jersey, a 2-year old, was shown by Linton Lewis, Piedmont. Stan Campbell, Kingman, showed reserve with another 2-year old cow.

The Lust family of Iola walked away with honors in the Brown Swiss division. Denis showed Grand champion with an aged cow while Terry took reserve with a 3-year old.

The Lusts also turned the overall fitting and showing contest into a family affair, with Denis taking the senior championship and Terry winning the junior division. Senior reserve F&S champion was Carol Hunter, Parsons. Reserve champion in the junior division was Karl Burgess, Sterling.

a year earlier, but Agriculture Department officials expect shipments will pick up sharply during the July-September quarter.

Nearly 500.8 million pounds of the quota-type meat, mostly beef, were imported in the first six months, about 80 million less than during the first half of last year.

Most of the cutback occurred in Australian shipments, a six-month total of 204 million pounds, down 27 per cent from a year earlier. New Zealand, second to Australia, was up 6.2 per cent during the first half to almost 95 million pounds.

Department officials said a dock strike on the West Coast has forced some rerouting of meat shipments to Gulf and eastern ports. Prospects of a dock strike in those areas beginning Oct. 1 probably will result in larger shipments during the third quarter, the officials said.

The government's estimate for meat imports for all of 1971 is 1.16 billion pounds. That is the amount foreign suppliers have agreed to send into the United States this year under "voluntary restraint" arrangements used to keep imports within bounds.

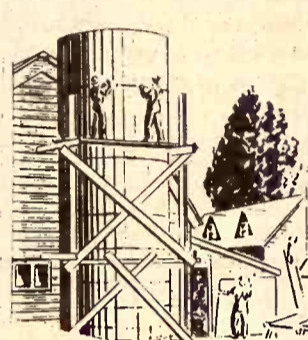

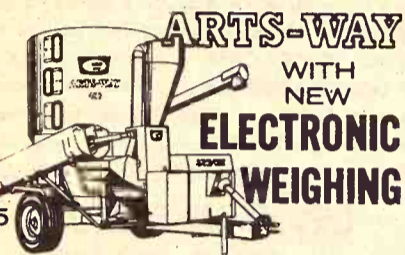

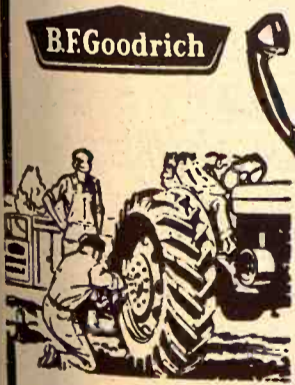

Turkey Crop On Rise In U.S., But Not In Kansas

Turkeys raised in Kansas during 1971 are expected to total 301,000, 8 percent below 1970 and the smallest for any year since 1931 according to the Kansas Crop and Livestock Reporting Service.

Heavy breed turkeys raised are estimated at 299,000, a decrease of 8 percent from last year. Light breed turkeys raised are expected to total 2,000 birds, twice the number raised in 1970.

The turkey poult hatch in Kansas from September 1970 through July 1971 was 28 percent above the same period a year earlier. Turkey poult shipments to other States were 17

times larger than in shipments.

UNITED STATES

Turkeys raised in 1971 are expected to total 117.8 million birds, 1 percent above 1970. More turkeys are expected in all except the East North Central region.

In the West North Central region, the combined Minnesota-Wisconsin crop is expected to be 1 percent below last year but Iowa expects to raise 3 percent more turkeys than in 1970. Missouri expects a crop 8 percent larger and North Carolina, 9 percent larger than last year.

In the South Central region, Arkansas expects a crop 6 percent and Oklahoma 5 percent more than last year while Texas expects no change from 1970.

California in the Western region will raise a 7 percent larger crop than in 1970 while Oregon shows a sharp decline in numbers raised.

Heavy breed turkeys raised in 1971 are expected to total 105.5 million compared with 103.5 million last year, an increase of 2 percent. Light breed turkeys raised during 1971 are estimated at 12.2 million birds, 2 percent below the 12.5 million raised in 1970.

Minnesota and Wisconsin, the leading turkey producing States this year, will raise 21.5 million birds.

Other leading States are California with 16.6 million, North Carolina, 10.5; Missouri, 8.6; Texas, 8.3; Arkansas, 7.7; Iowa, 6.3; Virginia, 5.1; Ohio, 4.3; and Indiana, 4.3 million.

Turkey poults hatched during the period September 1970 through July 1971 was 2 percent above the corresponding period a year earlier. Compared with a year earlier increases occurred in all months except March, April and May. Turkey eggs in incubators on August 1, 1971 were up 8 percent from a year earlier.

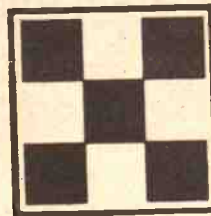

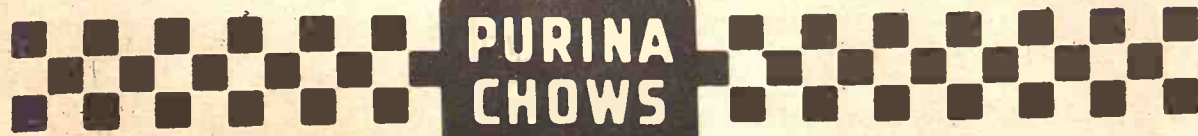

Argentines Cry Against Surtax On Canned Meat

Argentine meat packing officials have warned that President Nixon's new 10 per cent import tax may deprive the American housewife of her Saturday night friend: the frozen TV dinner.

"The tax is strictly discriminatory against South American beef shipments because it does not apply to fresh beef shipped to the United States from Australia and New Zealand," Enrique Holmberg said. "We can't compete if we have to pay the tax and they don't," added Holmberg, president of Swift de la Plata, Argentina's biggest packing firm.

But Marcelo Ordonez, general manager of the firm drove the point right to American kitchens:

"The people who put out the frozen chopped beef, roast beef and other meat and gravy dinners in the States will stop producing before they buy high-priced fresh U.S. beef for the dinners," he said.

Swift de la Plata, one of seven or eight giant packing plants in Argentina, shipped about \$70 million worth of canned and frozen cooked beef to the United States last year. South American countries are not permitted to ship fresh beef to the United States because of hoof and mouth disease in some Latin American countries.

Among the South American beef products which are abundant on stateside grocery shelves now are canned corned beef, canned roast beef and gravy and the frozen TV dinners. Such firms as Campbell, Morton and Banquet buy Argentine meat products.

Uruguay and Brazil also ship a great deal of frozen cooked beef and beef products to the United States.

"New Zealand and Australia ship fresh beef to the States and, since they are on a quota system, they will not be affected by the new tax," said Ordonez. "But our processed beef, which already is under a 10 per cent tax, now will get slapped with an extra 10 per cent. As you know, Argentina's beef business is already in a bad way."

K-State Names Hyde Jacobs As Agronomy Head

Dr. Hyde S. Jacobs, a member of the agronomy faculty at Kansas State University the past 14 years, has been appointed head of the department effective Sept. 1.

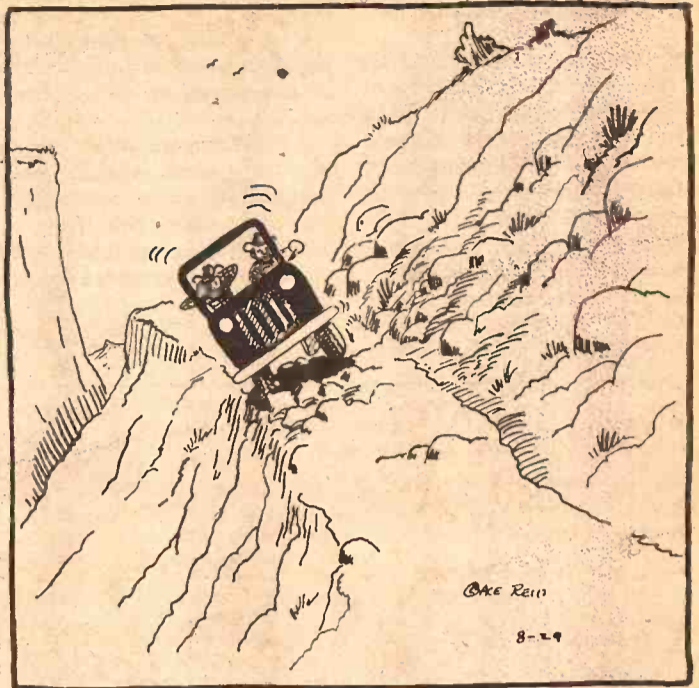
Jacobs is succeeding Dr. Raymond Olson who resigned June 30, 1970, to become director of the International Agricultural Programs at K-State. Olson had been director of the department since 1952. Dr. O. W. Bidwell has been acting head since July 1, 1970.

Jacobs is serving as director of both the Kansas Water Resources Research Institute, which operates in cooperation with Kansas University, and the Evapotranspiration Laboratory.

He has developed irrigation water quality charts for Kansas which can be used to predict the salinity hazard of water added to the soil. Jacobs is developing a computer program for use in scheduling irrigation of soybeans.

Recall GM Trucks To Check Front Spring Assemblies

General Motors says about 260,000 Chevrolet and G.M.C. light duty trucks are being recalled for inspection and correction of a front spring assembly and a possible power brake problem.

The company said front spring assemblies will be inspected on about 124,000 4-wheel-drive trucks produced in the 1969, 1970 and 1971 model years.

In addition brake vacuum cylinders and support brackets will be inspected on some 136,000 three-quarter and one-ton trucks equipped with dual brake systems produced in the 1971 model year.

G.M. said under certain operating condition it was possible for a spring to break near the front attachment on the steering column side, causing the truck to veer toward the left in left-hand drive trucks and to the right in right-hand drive trucks.

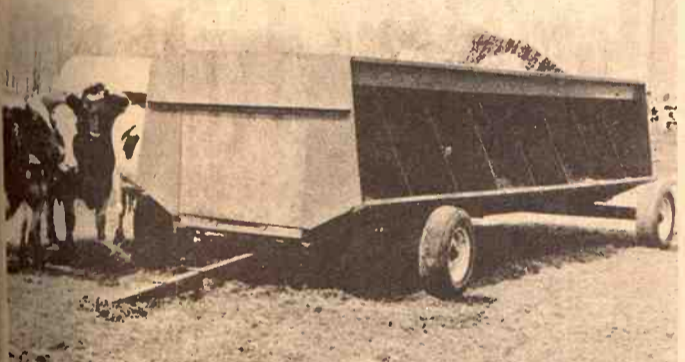

Varied Impact Of Import Surtax

In addition to the jolt given importers, the 10 per cent increase of import duties included in President Nixon's emergency economic measures has produced some surprises for consumers.

Purchasers of Scotch whiskeys and choice champagnes, for example, will scarcely notice the small price increases resulting from the higher rates of duty. But for buyers of children's toys, Italian shoes or imported household goods usually sold in variety stores and bargain basements, the import surcharge will bring substantial price rises.

The lesser impact of the extra duty levies on imported liquors and wines and on such higher-priced items as cameras was noted by importers last week as they assessed the effects of the emergency program on their business.

Generally, it was found that the 10 per cent increase of duties, which

importers may pass on to customers, imposes a proportionately larger price increase in lower-cost items. A main reason is the variation of basic duty rates, which, on the whole, tend to be proportionately smaller for higher-priced items.

The regular duty on Scotch whiskey is 61 cents a gallon. It is a "specific," rather than a percentage or ad valorem rate. The 10 per cent extra duty on Scotch is assessed on the customs valuation—roughly the wholesale price—which averages \$5 a gallon in most cases and up to \$10 a gallon for the more expensive brands.

At the lower value, the extra duty would be 50 cents a gallon, making the increase in duty 10 cents on a fifth. The main single item adding to the cost of both imported and domestic whiskey is still the federal tax amounting to \$10.50 a gallon.

According to Jack Yogman,

president of Joseph E. Seagram & Sons, Inc., the effect of the higher duties on imported liquors and wine will be an average price increase of 2 per cent at the retail level. He calculated that the extra duty on French vintage champagne would be about 19 cents a bottle.

He said that Seagram, the American subsidiary of Distillers Corporation-Seagrams, Ltd., would require wholesalers and retailers to pass the higher duty on to consumers as a separate item not part of their mark-up.

But, according to Daniel Shackman Jacoby, president of B. Shackman & Co., Inc., importers, the 10 per cent duty increase will have a much sharper price effect on many variety merchandise items such as toys and games.

The regular duty on toys, he noted, is 21 per cent of customs valuation, while that on games is 12 per cent.

The extra duty for these items will be a full 10 per cent additional on the customs valuation.

Thus, Jacoby said, a toy with a \$3 valuation will pay total duty of 33 cents (30 cents additional), while a game also valued at \$3 will pay a total of 66 cents.

Victor Silverman, president of A.I.C. Photo, Inc., importer of Japanese and German cameras and other photographic equipment, said he did not expect the higher duty to result in a retail price increase of more than 5 per cent.

He said that a great majority of the imported cameras were sold at prices higher than on domestic varieties, and therefore could not be considered competitive. The average regular import duties on these items, he noted, has been 8 to 12 per cent and with extra duties the rate has risen to an average of 18 per cent.

A Federal Park From Giant Ranch In New Mexico 4

One of the West's great ranches, 480,000 acres of timbered mountains and green meadows, is for sale at \$26.5 million.

Conservationists are campaigning,

to make the WS Ranch near Cimarron, New Mexico, a national forest or recreation area. The U.S. Forest Service is circulating, privately, an enthusiastic appraisal of the idea.

But as one local Forest Service official commented, "Financing is a bit of a problem."

Rep. Manuel Lujan (R-N.M.) has said he was preparing a bill that would enable the Forest Service to

acquire the ranch.

The 10,000-member New Mexico Wildlife and Conservation Association (W.C.A.) began seeking help this week from similar groups across the nation in a "contract your congressman" drive.

"Time is of the essence because several private interests are investigating the possibility of buying the property," the W.C.A. said in a form letter to its cousin organizations.

The letter suggested that \$10 million worth of what it called excess federal property near El Paso, Tex., could be sold for part of the financing.

D. D. Cutler of the Forest Service's southwest regional headquarters in Albuquerque acknowledged that the office sent a delegation a month ago to Fort Worth to talk with the lawyer in charge of the sale.

Sale of the WS Ranch Company is to be part of the settlement of the estate of William J. Gourley, a Fort Worth businessman who died Aug. 9,

1970.

The holding, which Gourley began putting together in 1945, is in the land-grant country of northern New Mexico and southern Colorado.

U.S. Cars Get Few Duty Breaks At Foreign Ports

U.S. carmakers may have a right to be a little scornful of the cries from European and Japanese auto manufacturers following President Nixon's proposal that a 10 per cent surcharge be placed on all imports.

For in more cases than not, U.S. cars get rough receptions at foreign ports. Import duties range up to 400 per cent.

Even in neighboring Mexico the duty on a U.S. made car is greater than the price of the car. A U.S. car that would sell for 40,000 to 50,000 pesos (a peso is worth slightly more than 8 cents) slapped with a 70,000 peso import duty.

Japan, from which the Datsun and Toyota cars come, has a 32 per cent duty on U.S. cars. The European Common Market has a levy of 13.2

percent, although this figure due to go down to 11 percent first of 1972.

Even neighboring Canada has a 10 percent duty on U.S. cars.

In South America in particular U.S.-made car has big import hurdles. The tax goes over 100 percent in both Chile and Colombia. It's up to 180 percent in Bolivia, 100 percent in Argentina, 135 percent in Brazil.

Cars to Australia have a 40 percent levy added. In Spain the rate is 68 percent; in Yugoslavia, 30 percent.

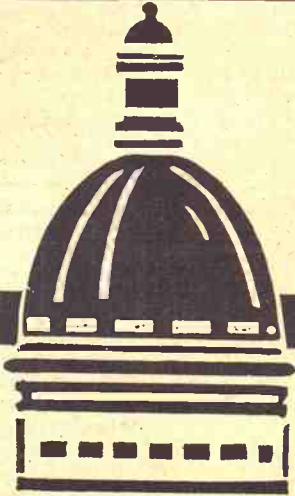

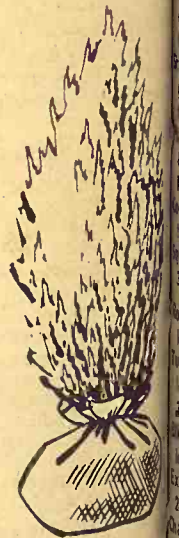

FARMERS OUTLOOK

Farm Give And Take In New Policy

Many persons have expressed concern about the effects of the administration's new inflation control program. Questions directed to Simerl are mostly concerned the effects upon farmers and consumers. While there are no simple and sure answers to many of these questions, some things are apparent: There seem to be three principal

economic reasons or objectives for the President's program: (1) to restrain inflation, (2) to increase employment, and (3) to check the dollar drain and save our gold reserves. Almost everyone is in favor of controlling inflation, providing jobs for the unemployed, and saving our gold. Hence, for the first 24 hours after the President's announcement, there was widespread praise and little criticism of the various orders and proposals.

Later, however, many workers found that they would be at a disadvantage under the new regulations and proposed legislation. Some farmers, too, saw that they might lose. And some businessmen, importers for example, found that they might suffer heavy losses. These groups understandably raised strong objections to one or more parts of the Administration's program.

Retail Price Ceilings
Retailers were instructed to sell at not more than the highest prices charged during the previous 30 days. This rule won't have much effect on total costs of food and most other items purchased by consumers during the 90-day freeze period. One important exception may be automobiles, since the new policy will prevent or at least delay the scheduled price increases for 1972 models. And if Congress eliminates the 7-percent excise tax on automobiles, as the President requested, there will be an additional saving for new car buyers.

The retail price ceilings could hurt some farmers, notably producers of cattle and hogs. While no direct ceilings were imposed on farm products, limiting the retail prices of beef and pork would hold down prices that processor-distributors could afford to pay for cattle and hogs. Hog producers might be penalized most seriously. Farmers produced an unusual abundance of pork in recent months and hog prices were depressed to unprofitable levels. They were hoping to recoup some of their losses during the next year or so.

Surcharge On Imports
The new 10-percent surcharge (tax) on imports will make many imported items more costly to consumers and business firms. The apparent purpose of this tax is to

restrict imports, check the outflow of dollars (and possibly gold), and stimulate employment. It may accomplish these purposes, in whole or in part, but by raising prices it is directly inflationary.

This tax is injurious to our trading partners—for example, Japan, Canada, and the European countries. These and other nations will be strongly tempted to impose higher tariffs and other restrictions upon imports from the United States. Farmers might be hurt severely in a trade restriction war, because they are highly dependent on markets in other countries. Foreign buyers take about half of our soybeans, wheat and rice; one-fourth of our cotton;

and one-fourth of the corn that farmers send to market. No other major industry in the United States is so dependent upon export markets as is agriculture.

The number of farms during this period has decreased from 159,000, averaging 303 acres, to 86,000, averaging 581 acres.

The number of acres harvested

decreased during this period from 20.3 million to 18.9 million. More noteworthy is the fact that the amount of irrigated land increased from 83,000 acres in 1940 to 1.5 million in 1970.

Thanks to research and the willingness of farmers to try new varieties and adopt new farm management practices, the average yield has increased from 14.5 bushels to 33 bushels per acre for wheat, 12.8 bushels to 56 bushels per acre for grain sorghum, 17.5 bushels to 74 bushels per acre for corn, and

Test Results From New Bull Lot At Beloit

Bulls on test at the new Kansas Bull Test Station at the Solomon Valley Feedyard near Beloit have made excellent gains since the test started in June.

Dr. Keith Zoellner, Extension beef specialist at Kansas State University, reports that 56-day weights for the 134 bulls on test showed an average daily gain of 3.37 pounds.

"The bulls are making excellent progress," Zoellner says, "and there's every indication that the test is working like it was set up to do—that is, identifying superior bulls for infusion into the Kansas beef industry."

The bull test will be completed this fall and all bulls meeting specified quality and performance standards will be offered for sale in Beloit, November 17.

The bull test is jointly sponsored by the Kansas Cooperative Extension Service and the Kansas Livestock Association.



Mulching, Fertilizing Or Composting To Cost \$50, Says Bureaucrat

If an assistant attorney general's interpretation of the law stands, a home gardener will be required to obtain a \$50 annual state permit to mulch his flowers with grass clippings.

A farmer will need the \$50 permit to spread manure on his pasture and

it will cost a homeowner \$50 to maintain a compost pile in his backyard.

The problem came to light as hearings opened in Scott City on the State Health Department's proposed regulations to the 1970 solid waste disposal law. As proposed, the regulations outlined certain sites which would be exempt from the permit requirements.

William Ward, assistant attorney general, rejected the proposal, and said it was not supported by the solid waste disposal law.

The law makes it unlawful for any person to "dump or deposit, or permit the dumping or depositing of any solid wastes onto the surface of the ground or into the waters of the state without having obtained a permit," he said.

Two provisos in the law provide that certain dumping will be allowed if it "will not create a public nuisance or adversely affect the public health," Ward said.

Ward contended, in an opinion on the proposed regulations, that the provisos "do not support the exemption of any site from the registration and permit requirement."

Melville Gray, director of the health department's environmental health services division which proposed the regulations, said he disagrees with Ward's interpretation of the law and said it is not in line with the intent of the Legislature.

Gray estimated that if Ward's interpretation stands, as many as 100,000 farmers would be required to register and pay a \$50 fee before they could dump almost anything on their own property. Homeowners would be in the same boat.

If Ward is correct in his interpretation of the law, the Legislature has plenty of time to change it since the permit requirements do not go into effect until June 30, 1976. That would give the lawmakers four years to enact an amendment.

In the meantime, the health department will continue with its scheduled series of hearings on the solid waste disposal regulations.



BOB PERRY SR. DIES

"It's funny about this cattle business. I mean I studied for 30 years and nobody gave me a degree."

That was Robert Perry Sr. of Salina reminiscing about his start in the cattle business. He started to learn about cattle in the Kansas City stockyards in 1905 and he came to Salina in 1935.

"I studied the business in Kansas City for 30 years and felt I knew less than I did at the end of 10." Perry came to Salina then and began a livestock business with his son Bob Jr. and Lon Wilson. The business still continues. For more than 30 years his early morning livestock report was heard on KSAL radio.

From his 30-year education in Kansas City, Bob Perry continued buying and selling cattle, feeding them, fixing fence. Last week at the age of 83, Bob Perry died. He had continued to study the cattle business, 65 years in all, and no one ever gave him that degree.

Wabaunsee Co. Sues Over Damaged Bridge

ALMA—Wabaunsee County officials are suing for \$100,000 in damages for a county bridge over Mill Creek which collapsed when a truck loaded with corn was driven over it.

The suit was filed against a Texas truck firm and the driver. It alleges that Clarence Pippin drove a truck tractor and semi-trailer with a gross weight of 92,280 pounds over a bridge that was marked for a four-ton limit.

Myers Vittletoe, Greenfield, Tex., is the other defendant in the action.

County Court Judge Harold Bennett fined Pippin and his employer on charges of driving an overweight vehicle and of exceeding the posted weight limit on a bridge. The weight limit in Kansas without special permit is 73,280 pounds. Pippin and his employer paid \$859 in fines and court costs.

Judge Bennett said trucks leaving Interstate 70 for county and city roads to avoid state weight scales on I-70 have become a big problem in the county.

Reports from several sources said Moore's resignation would become effective October 1, at which time he would have 10-year tenure and would be eligible for retirement pay.

To replace, the reporters seemed equally sure, would be Robert Henderson, a professor of wildlife for K-State Extension.

Henderson wasn't saying if he would take the job, but he did agree that he had talked about it with the commission. Henderson said he had been asked to take a better paying federal job, but did not rule out the possibility of taking the Fish & Game job if it were tendered.

ASCS Gets Role Clearing Queries On New Policy

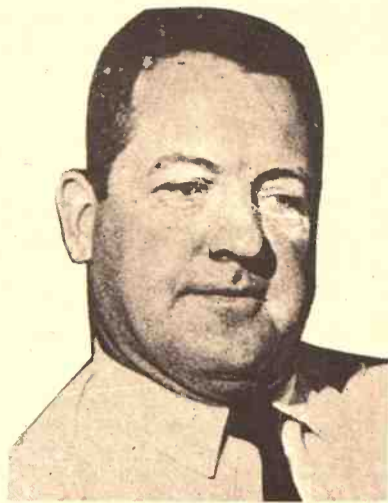
The administration has turned to an agricultural agency for help in administering its new economic program. The Agricultural Stabilization and Conservation Service, which deals almost solely with farmers, now finds itself as the center for answers to questions from the public about prices.

Specific questions on prices, rents, wages and salaries may be taken to the nearest ASCS office, except in highly urbanized areas.

Frank A. Mosier, Kansas ASCS executive director, emphasizes these offices are not authorized to handle complaints nor to help resolve them.

Questions are answered only if an official answer to that question has been received. No guess or interpretation is given.

Kansas has 104 ASCS offices. Their selection as information centers, in addition to urban IRS offices, means that everyone, regardless of where he lives, will have access to official information on President Nixon's move to stem inflation and strengthen the economy.

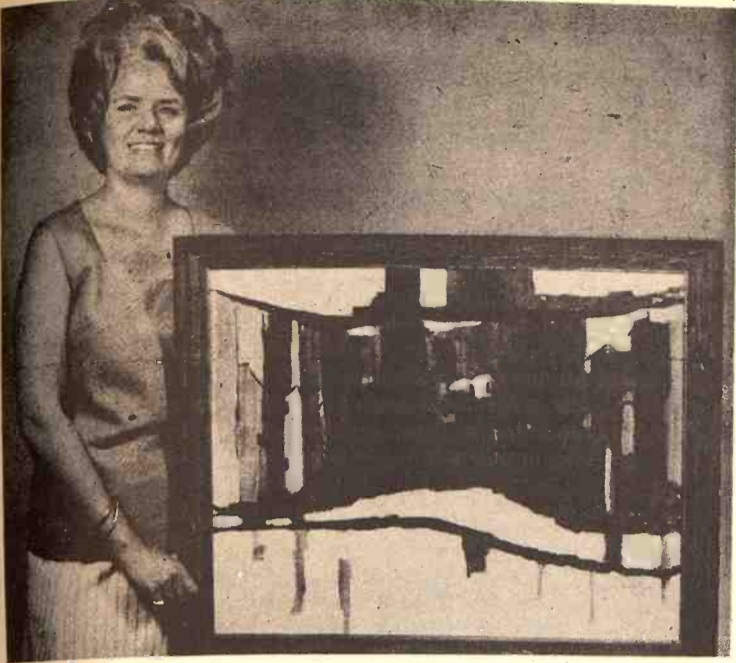
Threat To Joint Farm Policy In Common Market

The decision by Belgium and Italy to let their currencies float on the open market has threatened another serious blow at one of the Common Market's main accomplishments: Its joint farm policy.

Common Market officials had their slide rules and calculators out to see what effect a change in the value of the lira and Belgian franc would have on trade in farm products among the six member countries.

If either country's currency rises 2.5 per cent or more against the dollar, that government will be entitled to impose an equivalent border tax on farm imports from other member countries—meaning largely France, where the franc is not being allowed to float. It would also be authorized to compensate its own farmers for the lower prices they would receive for exports.

The decision of Belgium to float its currency, and Luxembourg's along with the Dutch guilder, means that The Netherlands will no longer collect tax on imports from Belgium, the spokesman said. The Common Market's joint farm policy, laboriously negotiated over 13 years, resulted in free movement for most farm products at uniform prices throughout the six countries. It also brought a common system of price supports and protection against imports from outside countries.

Contingent Of G&G Area Dairymen To 'World's Largest Party' At Chicago

The G&G area will be well represented at what is being billed as the "world's largest party."

It's the annual meeting of the Associated Milk Producers Inc., the giant milk marketing co-op which includes the G&G area in its area from Wisconsin to the Gulf Coast.

The bash at Chicago September 3-4-5 will attract some 40,000 dairy farmers and their families. The association is picking up the tab for the 2nd annual meeting, paying all expenses but shopping for its members.

Four planes will take off from Salina September 3, delivering about 400 G&G area dairymen to Chicago. Departure times are 1:50 a.m., 2:50 a.m., 3 a.m., and 3:25 a.m. The association is arranging parking permits in Salina for area farmers.

They will return September 5. President Nixon is scheduled to address 25,000 persons at a banquet at McCormick Place September 3.

The airlift from Salina is a part of 120 charter flights which will clog both major Chicago airports. The flights will be supplemented by 450 buses and a train.

AMPI officials estimate it will take 1000 buses, loading and unloading at the rate of one bus every five seconds, to ferry the dairy farmers between McCormick Place and 66 Chicago hotels booked solid with AMPI conventioners.

Setting the table for the banquet will require four 40-foot trailer trucks loaded with a ton of silverware, 15 tons of milk, three tons of cottage cheese, three tons of potatoes, 800 gallons of green beans, and 18,750 pounds of Yankee pot

roast.

The trucks will be parked in the center aisle of the huge banquet hall; 160 cooks and 800 waiters will be on hand to unload the trucks.

Fourteen U.S. Congressmen will speak at breakfast meetings in 14 hotels September 4.

First Drop In Population In Los Angeles Area

Boom Town, U.S.A., the sprawling megalopolis covering Los Angeles County, has lost population for the first time in history, a state report says.

The net drop during the 12 months ended June 30 was 9,600. The county now has an estimated 7,024,600, still the most of any in the nation.

Millions have migrated to Los Angeles County—nearly a million in the 1960s alone—because of the lure of jobs, the sunshine and warm climate, the orange groves and easy poolside living.

Now, many are leaving daily because of the smog, overcrowding, jammed freeways, urban blight, crime and the depression in the aerospace industry, a principal employer in Southern California.

The county has had a net out-migration before, said Walter Hollmann, director of the Population Research Office in Gov. Ronald Reagan's state Finance Department.

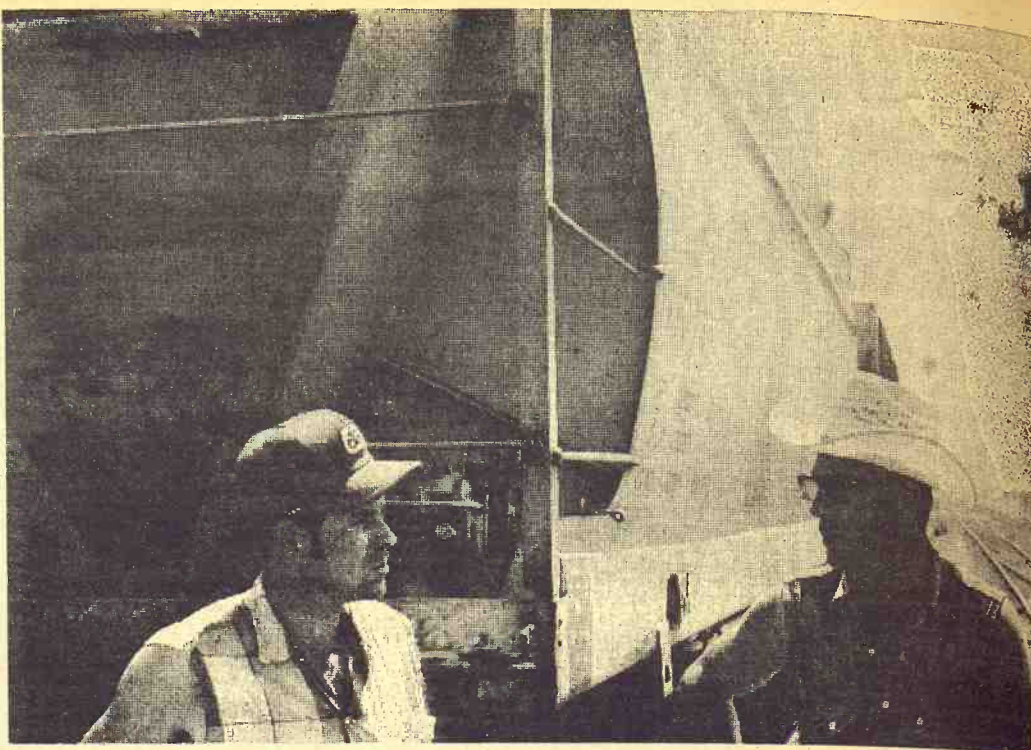

Liberal Wing Sees Pearson As Sure Loser

Senator James Pearson is likely to lose his Senate seat next year.

So forecasts Forum magazine, product of the Ripon Society, a liberal Republican group.

The current magazine listed four Republicans and one Democrat as "sure losers." The Republicans are Pearson, Robert Griffin of Michigan, Jack Miller of Iowa, and Karl Mundt of South Dakota.

Claiborne Pell of Rhode Island was the one Democrat picked for sure defeat.

Also vulnerable, says the magazine, are Republicans Margaret Chase of Maine, Carl Curtis of Nebraska, Mark Hatfield of Oregon, Strom Thurmond of South Carolina and John Tower of Texas. The party might also lose the seats of John Sherman Cooper of Kentucky and Len Jordan of Idaho, both of whom are retiring.

Most likely in danger on the Democratic side are David Gambrell of Georgia, Thomas McIntyre of New Mexico, Clinton Anderson of New Mexico, and Everett Jordan of North Carolina.

State Meat Inspection Meeting Federal Review

The Kansas mandatory meat and poultry inspection program apparently is getting good marks with federal inspectors currently reviewing its performance.

Dr. Earl F. Huffman, assistant director of the program, says 55 of the 267 meat and poultry processing plants under state inspection have been checked by the three federal inspectors.

"They are meeting federal criteria in good shape," he reports. Huffman says this complete review of plants under the state program is the first since the program was granted "equal to" status by the federal government Nov. 10, 1970. This indicated it met federal standards.

The 1968 Federal Wholesome Meat Act forced many states to improve meat inspection programs. It was passed in the wake of consumer concern about meat quality.

It required the U.S. Department of Agriculture to take over supervision of intrastate meat inspection unless state programs were kept "at least equal" to the departments criteria.

The federal government maintains its inspection of plants engaged in interstate commerce.

The 1968 Meat Act gave the 50 states and Puerto Rico until Dec. 15, 1970, to bring their inspection programs for intrastate plants up to federal requirements.

The federal government took over inspection where states refused to meet the standards.

Federal inspection was required for Puerto Rico, Minnesota, Montana and North Dakota, but state authorities were left in control of intrastate inspection in the 47 remaining states.

Huffman says the Nebraska legislature recently voted not to fund its program after Sept. 1, and the federal government will now

assume the role there.

Sources in the USDA say another state has been given 30 days to correct substandard inspection. The identity of the state has not been revealed.

There was some debate in the last Kansas Legislative session whether the federal government should be allowed to assume the inspection role in this state.

Huffman says to his knowledge Kansas is meeting all the federal requirements, and the program is receiving "good" acceptance from plant operators.

He says the current federal review of the state program is going well. Federal inspectors relate deficiencies to his office when they are found.

Huffman says some of the plants under state inspection have been reviewed before the federal government. He said inspections of 45 plants were made prior to granting of the "equal to" status last year.

Kansas had a voluntary meat inspection system prior to the wholesome meat act passed by

Congress. The state mandatory program became effective Dec. 1, 1969.

Commercial Feed Sales In State Up 42% Since '65

Kansas' booming livestock industry has a multi-million dollar companion in commercial feed sales. For the fifth consecutive year commercial feed sales have set new records in the state, says Dr. Robert Schoeff, section leader and formula specialist for the Cooperative Extension Service at Kansas State University.

He cites data from the Kansas Department of Agriculture that show 4,000 tons of commercial feed ingredients were sold in Kansas in 1970. The information was based on tonnage tax reports. The tonnage figure was 42 percent higher than in 1965.

Schoeff says the reasons for such spectacular growth in commercial feed sales were (1) increased livestock production; (2) increased demand for commercial feeds as livestock production becomes specialized, and (3) more aggressive marketing by commercial feed companies through grain and feed dealers, farm centers, and directly to producers.

The beef cattle industry led the commercial feed needs. The number of commercial feedlots and their capacity of them is 50 percent higher than in 1965.

Feed costs accounted for 48.6 percent (781,000 tons) of commercial feed sold. This compared to 40 percent in 1965.

Grain feeds were second in importance in 1970, accounting for 27.3 percent of the total. Feed for poultry and dairy were the other main categories with 9.5 percent and 6.6 percent, respectively.

Grain was the major feed ingredient sold in 1970, as other than grain was

soybean meal. It accounted for 30 percent of ingredient sales. Next highest categories were: wheat products, 15 percent; alfalfa products, 15 percent; molasses, 8.5 percent, and mineral products, 6.9 percent.

The sale of feed grains and roughages are not covered by the Kansas Feed Law, Schoeff reminds.

Start To Number Interchanges On Interstate Routes

Mileage numbers at the Interstate highway interchanges will be added to meet new federal regulations, John D. Montgomery, Kansas highway director, says.

The numbers will be added when new highway signs are installed for interchanges or when existing facilities are modified or enlarged, Montgomery said. Highway maintenance crews will add the mileage markers to established interchanges as soon as the work is completed on new construction.

The first markers will go up on I-70 in Saline and Dickinson counties, on I-35W in Saline and McPherson counties and on I-470 in Shawnee County.

The numbers will not be consecutive, Montgomery said. The markers will show the distance from the west or south state lines. For example, on I-70 the interchange with K-27 at Goodland will be numbered 17, since it is 17 miles from the Kansas-Colorado border.

The marker number will increase as a traveler goes east and decrease for westbound travelers, it was explained.

In urban areas where there are two or three interchanges in the same mile, letters will follow the mileage number, such as A, B or C. The new system was established by the American Association of State Highway Officials and was approved by the Federal Highway Administration.

Montgomery said the commission also approved contracts totaling \$1,505,959 for new road construction following bids Aug. 19 at Junction City. The work was for smaller jobs throughout the state, he said.

The commission authorized installation of a 4-way flashing red signal at K-150 and Mur-Len Road in Olathe for manual operation from a fire station at time of a fire.

Decline In Use Portends Change In Hospital Role

A recent national decline in the use of hospital beds was viewed by a member of the President's Cabinet as an opportunity for hospitals to

change their emphasis to different types of service.

Elliot Richardson, secretary of health, education and welfare, cited recent reports of an excess of hospital beds which cost an estimated \$3.6 billion to maintain.

Richardson, speaking at the annual convention of the American Hospital Association, said reasons for the recent decline in hospital bed use have been economic recession, lapsed insurance policies, increased use of out-patient facilities, postponement of elective surgery and stricter auditing by health officials of the need to hospitalize patients.

Richardson said the Nixon administration seeks to reduce the use of hospital beds by providing

alternatives to hospitalization, by emphasizing the maintenance of health, by providing incentives in insurance plans to use out-patient facilities and to avoid hospitalization, by rigorous utilization and peer review, and by other measures.

The secretary cited a study which showed the equivalent of \$10 billion worth of hospital construction could be saved, if the length of hospital stays were reduced by one day, if admissions were reduced by 10 percent and if occupancy rates were raised to 90 percent.

Commodity Promotions Get Poor Marks From USDA

The nation's livestock industry is being taken to the cleaners in the promotion department. At least that is the opinion of officials in the USDA.

A new USDA study says sales promotions by farm commodity groups are a waste of money, do not increase sales and are too poorly handled to compete with companies offering bargains on specific name brands.

According to the USDA, there are approximately 1,200 groups engaged in agricultural promotional activities. The number of groups has been more or less static since 1958, but the money being "milked" out of farmers has increased from \$67 million a year then to nearly \$120

million a year today. Department officials say the campaigns flunk out because of several reasons.

- Poorly planned campaigns.
- Too many promotions at the same time.
- Too high a cost in use of store personnel time.
- Poor timing with respect to supply of the products and seasonal demand by consumers.

Stimulating consumer interest through media advertising, publicity and other activities," the report said, "is of little value for sales if products are not available and are not properly displayed in the outlets where they are usually purchased."

Eisenhower Museum To Reopen Oct. 14

An enlarged and extensively remodeled Eisenhower Museum will be rededicated Thursday, Oct. 14—marking the date that would have been the 81st birthday of former President Dwight D. Eisenhower.

Extensive plans are being made for the rededication, including a wreath-laying ceremony at the grave of the former president in the chapel known as the Place of Meditation.

The museum, which opened in 1954, has been closed to the public

this summer to permit construction that has more than doubled its size. In addition to the expansion and renovation, all of the exhibits have been redesigned to present General Eisenhower's life and his impact on the American scene.

NFO Says 'Leave Spuds In Ground'

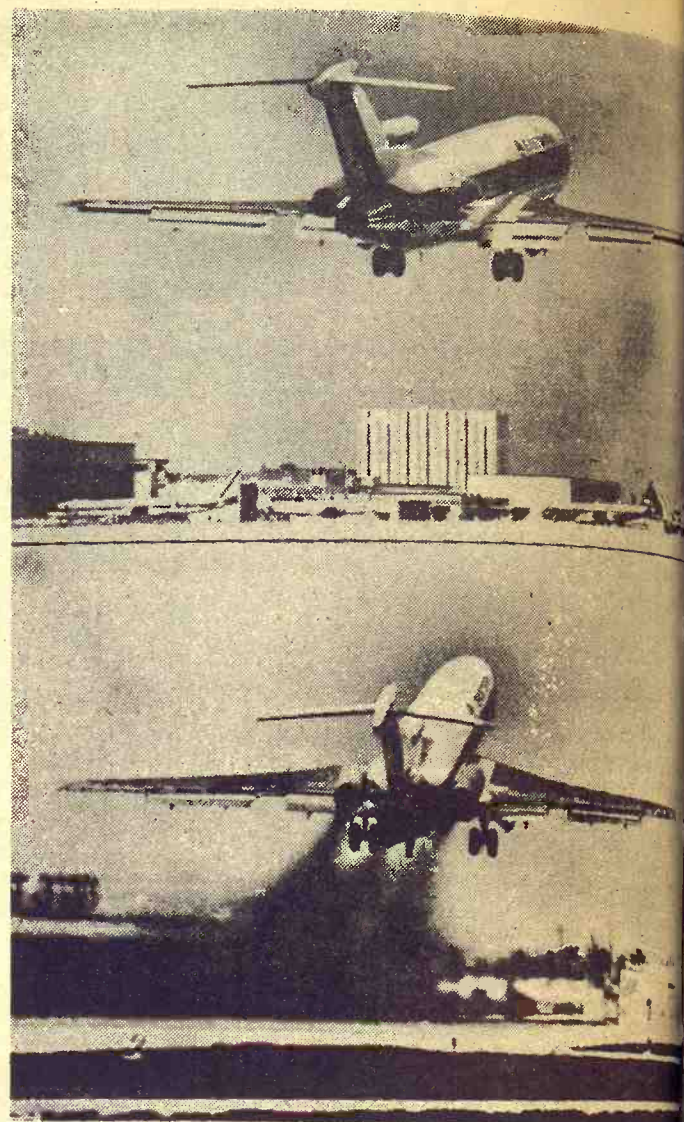
The NFO is after potato growers to leave 10 percent of their crop in the ground this fall to reduce the supply and strengthen market prices.

Evan Wright said the number of complaints is steady and his department is now shifting investigations from drive-ins to grocery stores. Wright, head of the division, says use of extenders in pork tenderloin is the same type of violation as the fillers in hamburgers and his department is investigating both types of mislabeling.

Bombers Back Over Salina?
