Lyons Creek Voters Say 'No' Again

WOODBINE -- Voters in Lyons Creek Watershed Joint District No. 41 in Dickinson, Geary, Morris and Marion Counties last week rejected for the second time a two mill tax levy to finance watershed construction.

The unofficial vote was 233 in favor and 314 against. A similar levy was defeated by a 44-vote margin Dec. 5.

Both elections were forced by the filing of protest petitions

after the district board of directors adopted the levy

A \$5,267,100 watershed work plan will be submitted to Congress for approval. The federal government would provide \$2,424,000 for construction of 22 dams while the district furnishes \$2,824,900 for 36 additional structures and land treatment.

The two-mill tax would have raised \$22,000 annually. Another method of financing now will have to be found.

Such weather vagaries assume enormous significance to anyone assessing production in the Soviet Union, the world's largest wheat grower. For the Russians, who harvested some 172 million acres last year, against 50 million acres in the U.S., a highly possible fluctuation of two bushels in per-acre yields prior to harvest can mean more than a 300-million-bushel miscalculation — almost equal to the total food-grain imports required by hungry India this year to make up food deficien-

Added to this, of course, is the "puzzle wrapped up in an enigma" represented by Soviet agricultural statistics, which must be picked over for hidden meaning as carefully as any other Kremlin action.

A case in point was the Soviet claim that its 1966 harvest yielded about 3.7 billion bushels. U.S. experts know Soviet wheat figures are inflated by use of bunkered tonnages, which include the stones and trash often left unseparable from used grain. Also, the totals aren't adjusted for moisture content, which can range as high as 30% of total weight. The U.S. agricultural attache in Moscow advised that 3.1 billion bushels would be more realistic, but Washington analysts appraised the crop still lower, at 2.8 billion hushels.

Fall Expected In Russia

In the current year, department analysts look for Soveit production to fall to 2.2 billion bushels, largely because last year's almost perfect growing conditions aren't being repeated. Wet ground deayed planting of spring wheat, which accounts for about 60% of total Russian production, while the "new lands" west of the Ural Mountains continue to suffer from lack of moisture.

"The Soviets talk of increased use of fertilizer, but we just don't know enough about their agriculture to allow them much more wheat than they've averaged in past years," one agriculture official observes. He notes that USSR wheat yield jumped to 16 bushels an acre last year from 9.9 bushels in 1965; the 1960-64 average was 11.5 bushels.

Elsewhere in the world:

-The Canadians, chief competitors of U.S. grain farmers in the export wheat market, have indicated planting intentions which, if fulfilled, could produce a crop slightly larger than their 1966 record of 844 million bushels. Unlike the U.S., though, Canada depends on spring wheat for 98% of its production. Because planting was delayed by too much moisture, the harvest might be delayed, too, meaning snow may fall on the grain before it can be gathered. This is a common occurence in Canada, but it does reduce yields.

The Australians also are striving to exceed their record 1966 crop of 448 million bushels. Farmers down under, who've just finished planting their 1967 wheat, indicate they would increase their seeded acreage by 7%, but promptly ran into dry weather problems following last year's above-normal moisture. 'In New South Wales, the leading wheat state, seed was planted in the dust.) Now "good soaking rains" have arrived, a department wheat man in Washington says, and a good Australian crop seems likely.


Argentina's Optimistic -Argentina also is "something of an enigma this year," the department analyst finds. The Argentinian government is urging a harvest next December

of about 481 million bushels, a highly optimistic goal in view of last year's 246 million-bushel crop, and the 1960-64 average of 26 million bushels. Washington believes Argentinian wheat farmers, many of them bankers. lawyers and wealthy industrialists with large landholdings, aren't likely to increase planting much because of domestic inflation and the belief that their nation's wheat program offers insufficient benefits. On balance, a

crop close to the 1960-64 aver-

age seems the most likely at this point.

France, though hampered by its second consecutive year of weather too wet for ideal planting, nonetheless projects wheat crop of about 475 million bushels, which would be up from last year's 414 million bushels. As a result, French wheat available for export could be around 130 million bushels, compared with slightly fewer than 199 million bushels in the year ended June 30.

Hog Production Is Leveling Off

close eye on hog numbers and the market price of hogs. The June Pig Crop Report indicated that the December 1966 - May 1967 pig crop of 46 million was up 1 percent from the 45.6 million figure for the same period a year earlier.

While the spring pig crop was 1 percent greater than in 1966 (and 8 percent above the 1965 figure), it was 5 percent smaller than the 5-year (1961-65) average. (The spring pig crop includes pigs born from December 1 to June 1. These pigs are marketed mostly from July 1 to January 1.)

From these data we might assume that market supplies will be about 1 percent larger than during the last half of 1966. In the 10 Corn Belt states, the December 1966 - February 1967 pig crop was 5 percent

Hog producers are keeping a above that for the same period a year ago. The march · May 1967 pig crop was 3 percent less than a year earlier. These percentage changes are similar to changes for the U.S. crop.

The number of hogs on feed in the 10 Corn Belt states on June 1 in the 120-pound and up range was 4 percent more than a year ago, while the number under 120 pounds was about 2.5 percent less than a year earlier. The heavier group of hogs will make up the market supply during July and August. The lighter group will provide the market hogs from September through December.

We may expect July and August hog prices to remain slightly below those of a year ago. Toward the end of this year, prices may be a little stronger than they were last year in November and December.

What are the prospects for the remainder of the 1967 production? U.S. hog producers indicate that they intend to farrow 5,452,000 sows during June-November, 1967. This is a 3-percent decrease from the year-earlier

If farmers can save 7.27 pigs per litter (equal to the 1965 level), then a fall pig crop of 85,549,000 would be realized -1percent fewer pigs than in the fall of 1966.

With 2 to 3 percent fewer hogs available for market on January 1 and a slight reduction in fall farrowings, we should see a slight increase in market prices during the first part of 1968, over the 1967 earlywinter marketings.

the bottom tray three inches from the oven floor. Don't use the top unit in an electric oven. Prop oven door open 1/2 inch if electric or eight inches if gas. This helps control heat and lets out moist air. Alternate trays every one or two hours.

The fruit is dry when pliable and leathery; it usually takes about six hours. Pieces around the edges of the tray will dry first. Remove them as soon as they dry.

Cool fruit and package immediately. Pack in glass jars or plastic, metal, or heavily waxed cardboard frozen food containers. Use tight-fitting lids.



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

How Creams Differ

When you want real whipped cream to top your fruit desserts this summer, you buy whipping cream. You want it to stand firm. You'll want cream which is 30-35 percent butterfat because it will give you the largest volume and the best texture.

Cream with less butterfat is generally labeled coffee cream. It may whip, but not very satisfactorily.

Half-and-half is a favorite cream to use over cereal or fruit. Half-and-half contains about 11 percent butterfat. It is pasteurized and homogenized so that the fat won't rise to the



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



The 24 Federal Land Bank Associations in Kansas completed the fiscal year, June 30, lending \$40.5 million in long-term Federal Land Bank loans to farmers and ranchers of the state.

This represented 1,940 loans made by Kansas associations, William G. Plested, Jr., president of The Federal Land Bank of Wichita, said Thursday.

The 24 associations and 36 additional associations in Colorado, Oklahoma and New Mexico were cited for volume of lending in the 4-state district. Plested said 4,006 loans were made in the district totaling \$100.2 million. This lending and prior loans represent an unpaid balance of \$457 million for the borrowers in the four states.

Plested reported that 38 per cent of member borrowing was

to purchase land, 33 per cent to refinance real estate mortgages, 14 percent for chattel securities and other open accounts and 6 percent for repairs and improvements to land and buildings. The remaining 9 percent was for general operations.

Hope To Control Pasture Scale

A small wasp found in India by a USDA entomologist promises to control scale insects that make pastures unfit for grazing in large areas of the Gulf states and in other nations.

The wasp, Neodusmetia sangwani, lays its eggs in the scale, Antonina graminus, which dies when the eggs are hatched. Controlling scale in this manner could increase forage yields as much as 50 percent and prevent losses in those pastures where the scale is most harmful.

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



The most likely step, observers figure, is that Docking will make an appointment as livestock sanitary commissioner without the recommendation of the Kansas Livestock Association. If the association does not then place its recommendation on the Docking appointee, the controversy will presumably end up in the courts in a test case.

The livestock association has asked Docking to reappoint its executive secretary A. G. Pickett as the livestock sanitary commissioner. The association has refused to go along with the Democratic governor's request for additional recommendations.

The law requires that the association recommends and the governor appoints the livestock sanitary commissioner. The law has stood since 1919.

The recommendation by the KLA applies not only to the livestock sanitary commissioner's post but that of the state brand inspector and the 7-man Kansas Livestock Commission as well.

The law provides for the president of the KLA, two dairy cattle producers, a veterinarian, a swine producer and two beef producers to be members of the commission.

Three posts on the commission are also up for appointment and the KLA has listed only three recommendations. Docking has asked for more.

The group is approved by the KLA executive board - 353 members from all counties of the state - for recommendation to the governor for appointment.

For the post of brand commissioner, the livestock commission is required to recommend three names. Those recommended are the current brand commissioner Hade Gupton of Greensburg, Francis ArJuly 18, 1967

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

Another Rise In Farm Efficiency This increase in productivity

Agriculture increased its efficiency rate again last year by nearly 7 percent.

The Agriculture department's annual report on farm efficiency said one American farmworker produced, on the average, sufficient farm products to supply himself and 38.56 other persons. This compared with an average of 37.02 persons, including himself, in 1965.

Largely because of technological advances, farming has made significant gains in ef-

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ficiency since 1950 when each farm worker produced sufficient supplies for 15.47 persons.

contrasts sharply with the slight advance made in the 100year period ending in 1920. The production per worker supplied 4.12 persons in 1820 and 8.27 in

Labor use on U.S. farms last year was reported at 7.5 billion man-hours, the lowest in more than 100 years of record-keep-

Labor use reached a peak of nearly 24 billion man-hours a year during the 1910-14 period. Yet in this latter period, farm production was only 46 per cent of the 1966 level.

The cropland harvested last year totaled 289 million acres, the smallest in this century. The peak was 348 million in the 1920-24 period.

The number of tractors on farms climbed this year to 5,5700,000, a record high, and compared with 3,610,000 in 1950. Farm use of fertilizers and liming materials was nearly three times as great in 1965 as in 1950 and nearly 15 times as great as in the 1910-14 period. of Mid-America at the first meeting of the board of direc-

Food Chains See Farm Danger In Low Prices

Farmers efforts to obtain higher prices for their livestock and food crops are getting an assist now from the National Association of Food Chains.

It explained in a newsletter which went to its members last week that "food retailers want prices to go up . . . Modest increases are needed in some basic foods - notably beef, milk, poultry and eggs - in order to interest a sufficient number of farmers to stay in the bus-

The newsletter pointed out that "unless the business of producing these basic farm goods is made more attractive, we will face very serious shortages in the years ahead." This is a point that spokesmen for the livestock industry have been making - that poor prices would force production into the hands of a relatively few large operators.

The comments were seen as a move to help forestall any demonstrations of the type which found consumer groups picketing a number of food stores in the spring of 1966.

The newsletter noted that further advances in food prices could come later in the summer and fall. It added, "an increase in far mprices had been long overdue.'

In contrast to remarks from Administration spokesmen little more than a year ago, views like those expressed in the chain store's newsletter have been expressed now by Secretary of Agriculture Orville Freeman.

Noting that consumers today spend only 19 percent of their take-home pay for food compared with 21 percent 10 years ago and 25 percent 20 years ago, he said recently: "Consumers must realize that if farm

prices are not strengthened, the nation's family farm system could be replaced by monolithic corporate farming operations that conceivably could so

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

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

Winter Wheat: Average Test Weight, Protein And Moisture Content 1967

Quality tests of 1967 Kansas wheat continued to show protein content well above last year and average but test weight moderately below the previous year and average, according to

the Kansas Crop Reporting Service.

Tests on 62 Kansas counties showed average protein content at 12.9 percent compared with 12.1 a year earlier in the same counties. The 1956-61 average was 11.7 percent.

Recommends Aid For Displaced Farmers

A presidential advisory commission has recommended increased federal aid for low-income rural Americans being forced out of farming, but was divided on the question of continuing government subsidies to farmers in general.

The 29-member National Advisory Commission on food and fiber, reporting to President Johnson on its 18-month study of farming and economics, foreign trade policies and agriculture programs, recommended tooling up American agriculture as an active competitor in world markets.

The commission also agreed that "freely functioning markets were the best mechanism to guide the needed changes in agricultural production and resource use." The advisory group split, however, on the issue of continuing federal price protection programs.

A majority of 16 members mainly farmer spokesmen recommended continuing with some modifications the basic government farm price support and production program, now in operation under the Johnson administration.

A 13-member minority, which included business and industry representatives, proposed that price supports should be phased out and eliminated in a relatively short time. The minority suggested temporary direct payments to farmers during the transition period, but called for a long-range policy based on the operations of efficient farmers competing in a "market oriented" economy.

The commission report, which included 74 recommendations,

was presented to President Johnson Friday by Secretary of Agriculture Orville Freeman. The advisory panel, appointed by Johnson in November 1965 to make its long-range study was headed by Dr. Sherwood O. Berg, dean of the University of Minnesota's Institute of Agri-

The advisory group found that for the foreseeable future, the United States will have the agriculture capacity to produce more than is needed for domestic use and export. The report noted that according to some studies, the present 3.1 million farms in the United States will have diminished in number to 1.8 million by 1980.

By 1980, the report continued the United States will require one-third less labor on farms than at present regardless of what types of domestic farm policies are pursued.

To help displaced farmers in the years ahead, the commission recommended rural education and non-farm job training programs and a direct relief program for giving low-income rural dwellers federal payments to increase their incomes \$600 a

Kansas Turnpike To Consider Hike

The Kansas Turnpike Authority (KTA) will decide July 24 whether to increase rates on the Kansas Turnpike by 8 percent.

The turnpike showed a net profit this year exceeding \$3 million, according to Robert Duncan, KTA chairman. Recommendations for rate increases were made at a meeting Monday by traffic engineers.

Duncan said not all KTA crease was necessary. At the members were agreed a rate inpresent rate of profit, bonds supporting the turnpike could be retired six years ahead of schedule, he said.

Government Study Sees Free-er Trade In Farm Future

A presidential commission recommended that agricultural policies for the future be built around free markets rather than government programs.

However, a majority of the 29-member national food and fiber commission called for continuation of federal farm programs "until the problem of excess capacity in farming is alleviated and farmers are able to earn incomes from the market that are comparable to nonfarm incomes."

The commission split, 16 to 13, on the need for continuing federal aid to agriculture, but both sides agreed that freely functioning markets were the best mechanism to guide the needed changes in agricultural production and resource use.

The minority urged that government programs, including price supports and production controls, should be phased out as soon as possible, but called for some protection to small farmers who are being squeezed out of commercial agriculture. This help would be in the form of direct payments to ease the transition.

The minority and majority agreed that displaced small farmers should be helped thru various programs to find new pursuits.

The aids would include education and job training in rural areas, development of nonfarm jobs and in effect, a major relief program under which some disadvantaged and older rural

Clerk: Max Reiter. Beloit Test For Soybean Chemical

SKOKIE, Illinois - One hundred Midwestern farmers within the next few weeks will test a chemical growth regulator that is said to increase soybean yields by as much as 20%.

Last month the Agriculture Department issued an experimental permit to International Minerals & Chemical Corp. for the regulator. The chemical, effective with application rates as low as half an ounce per acre, is mixed in water and sprayed on the plant when it flowers, according to the company.

"We hope to obtain full Federal clearance to offer the product to all soybean growers by 1969, said Thomas J. Army, head of chemicals research at International. Soybean seed growers in Illinois, Indiana, Iowa, Nebraska, and Minnesota will apply the plant growth regulator, which is called triiodobenzoic acid — Tiba for short.

Dairy Outlook Is Encouraging

The dairy situation has improved considerably in the past few years. Between 1962 and 1965, uncommitted government stocks of dairy products declin ed 88 percent. Between 1964 and 1966, milk production declined 5.3 percent; the prices farmers received for milk increased 20 percent.

Between 1950 and 1966, the number of milk cows in the United States declined 36 percent, while production per cow increased 60 percent. With these changes, total milk production increased from 117 to 120 billion pounds.

From 1950 to 1966, total U.S. consumption of dairy products increased 29 percent. On a percapita basis, however, the consumption of dairy products decreased, from 740 pounds in 1950 to 603 pounds in 1966.

Imports of dairy products increased over 200 percent from 1965 to 1966. These increases were stimulated by high U.S.

prices for dairy products, less restrictive trade barriers for some dairy products, and increased milk production in other countries. During this period, exports of dairy products declined 58 percent. The Secretary of Agriculture and many farm er cooperatives have urged a tightening of import restrictions.

During 1967 the number of milk cows is expected to decline further, production per cow should continue to increase, total milk production is likely to be slightly higher, and the prices received by dairy farmers should average about 5 percent higher than in 1966. For the first 5 months of 1967, blend prices received by producers in the Chicago market averaged \$4.58, as compared to \$4.08 in 1966. The minimum basic formula price used to calculate Class 1 prices in federal orders be \$4.05 through April of 1968. Class I milk prices thru April, 1968 will remain higher than they were for the first 6 months of 1966.

Over the next 5 to 10 years, the dairy outlook appears bright. Population projections indicate that there will be 230 million people in the U.S. by 1975, a 20 percent increase. The purchasing power of the American consumer, which has doubled since 1940, will continue to increase. As foreign countries become more affluent, the demand for U.S. agricultural products, especially soybeans and corn, should increase. High prices for soybeans, corn, and other farm pro-

Heavy rains soaked shelled corn in the pig pen, which fermented under the hot Florida sun. The hogs ate the corn and became "polluted."

Peel says the drunk hogs acted just like drunk people. Some became belligerent, some playful, others just staggered off and went to sleep.

Total U.S. milk production is expected to increase 12 percent between 1965 and 1975. With the large exodus of dairymen, Illinois production is expected to decrease 15 percent over this period. The number of cows will decrease by at least 38 percent; the number of farms reporting milk sold, by 63 percent.

Developments in consumption that may influence the amount of increase needed in production include possible increases in the use of substitute dairy products and a wider use of low-fat dairy products.

No Question Drouth Is Broken

Only three of 17 state weather-reporting stations did not have more than normal rainfall up to July 7, according to this map compiled from data from the Weather Bureau state climatologist's office at Kansas State University.

The dark circles show areas with above normal rainfall. Lighter circles still had reported subnormal amounts.

The heavy rains of June and July broke more than a year of drouth in Kansas.

Climatologist Merle Brown at K-State said 1966 was one of the driest years on record, particularly in portions of east central, central and south central Kansas

In Topeka and Manhattan it was the second driest year on record.

Brown compared the June rains in the state to those of 1951, one of the wettest years on record. Rainfall values then measured more than 14 inches

above normal in parts of Kansas.

Brown said there was no consistent pattern or cycle in rainfall amounts of recent years. The last lengthy drouth was 1952 to 1957, comparing in severity to the baked conditions of the 1930's. Other generally wet years were 1958, 1959 and 1962, while in 1964 and 1966 portions of the state were extremely
